The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. Anadarko Gathering Company has applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to install a natural gas compressor. Emissions of NOx, CO, and non-methane hydrocarbons were evaluated during the permit review process.

Anadarko Gathering Company, 1701 N. Kansas Ave., Liberal, owns and operates the stationary source located at S10, T34S, R34W, in Seward County, at which the compressor engine is to be installed.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting, nonconfidential documentation and all information relied upon during the permit application review process is available for public review during normal business hours at the KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka; and at the KDHE Southwest District Office, 302 W. McArtor Road, Dodge City. The standard departmental cost will be assessed for any copies requested.

Written comments must be received no later than the close of business June 19 in order to be considered in formulating a final permit decision.

The written request must be submitted to Connie Carreno, Bureau of Air and Radiation, no later than the close of business June 19 in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

The Kansas Council on Developmental Disabilities (KCDD) announces the availability, pending Congressional action, of developmental disabilities funding totaling \$315,000 to be distributed by state plan activities. Approximate funding amounts available for each competition are listed in parentheses following the program. Unless indicated, only one grant will be funded.

- I. For state plan goal activities which focus on innovative community living in the following areas: Personal Assistance Services (\$25,000) and Home-of-Your-Own (\$50,000).
- II. For state plan goal activities which focus on advocacy in the following area: Leadership, Advocacy and Education (\$50,000).
- III. For state plan goal activities which focus on assistive technology for children in the following area: A Statewide Assistive Technology System (\$100,000).
- IV. For state plan goal activities which focus on employment in the following areas: Job Training (three grants at \$20,000 each) and a Statewide Employment Conference (\$30,000).

Applicants will be funded based on feasibility, previous experience and, where applicable, potential for continuation by the grantee at the end of the project grant award. The level of funding for individual projects will be determined by feasibility, cost effectiveness of the proposal, and the following:

1. All proposals funded by the KCDD must promote the inclusion of individuals with developmental disabilities in society to the maximum extent of their ability and desire.
2. All projects must include a statewide dissemination component, including their capability for dissemination.
3. Where applicable, all projects must include a plan for continuation by the grantee or another entity at the end of the project's grant award.

**Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 8:30 a.m. Monday, June 19, in Room 108 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed rule and regulation of the Division of Accounts and Reports.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Deputy Secretary of Administration, Room 263-E, State Capitol, 300 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days

in advance of the hearing by contacting Faith Loretto at (913) 296-6000 [or TTY (913) 296-4798]. Handicapped parking is located at the south end of the Landon State Office Building and an accessible entrance is available at the north entrance.

This regulation is proposed for adoption on both a temporary and permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 1-18-1a. Mileage rates. Two amendments to this regulation are proposed. The regulation will be amended, effective July 1, 1995, to increase the mileage rate paid for use of private vehicles as follows:

Type of Vehicle	Current Mileage Rate	Proposed Mileage Rate
Automobile	\$.28	\$.29
Motorcycle	\$.12	\$.13
Airplane	\$.40	\$.41
Specially Equipped Van for the Physically Handicapped	\$.40	\$.41

The proposed amendment affects state agencies and their employees who travel on official state business in privately-owned vehicles. It is estimated that the proposed increase in mileage rates will increase annual mileage reimbursements in FY 1996 by approximately 3.57 percent if the present rate of travel continues. This represents an estimated statewide increase in expenditures in the amount of \$257,792 (\$102,557 from the state general fund and \$155,235 from all other funds). The proposed increase in private vehicle mileage rates would also have an indeterminable economic impact on any governmental units within the state of Kansas which do not elect to establish their own mileage rates and simply adopt the state rates.

A further amendment would provide that if a state employee chooses to use a privately-owned conveyance when a state-owned or leased vehicle is available, the reimbursement will be at the central motor pool rate (currently \$.19 per mile for compact cars). Exceptions to this requirement are when: (1) the employee's agency head determines it would be more expensive to use the motor pool vehicle, or (2) the employee has a disability which requires the use of a specially equipped private vehicle. The purpose of this amendment is to reduce overall state expenditures by implementing efficiencies and economies of state operations through maximum use of state vehicles, which generally provide the least costly mode of transportation. However, estimated savings cannot be readily determined, as accounting records do not indicate the number of instances in which a state employee elected to use a private vehicle although a state vehicle was available and less expensive than use of a private vehicle. No economic impact on the general public is anticipated.

All bids will be publicly opened and read at said time and place and will be acted upon by the county immediately thereafter. No oral or auction bids will be considered.

Bidders may deliver a bid to the county clerk, or they may telefax it to the county clerk prior to the said time and date. Bidders who transmit their bid by telefax must undertake the following: (a) send the "good faith" check and a blank copy of the official proposal form for the bonds in time to be received by the county not less than one business day prior to the date of sale; (b) the blank proposal must provide the name and telephone number of the authorized representative of the lead manager of each account signed by such representative and must list the members of the account on the back thereof. On the date of the sale, the authorized representative of the account may transmit to the county, by telefax, the bid for the bonds. The signed proposal will be completed by the county with such information. Telefax transmissions must be directed to (913) 325-2830. The county will not accept responsibility for inaccurate bids submitted by telefax, including garbled transmissions, or the inability of a bidder to access the telefax number prior to the indicated sale time.

Bond Details

The bonds will consist of fully registered bonds without coupons in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. The bonds will be dated June 1, 1995,

and will become due serially on August 1 in the years as follows:

The bonds will bear interest at rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, which interest will be payable semiannually on February 1 and August 1 in each year, beginning on February 1, 1996.

Place of Payment and Bond Registration

The principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America by check or draft of the Kansas State Treasurer, Topeka, Kansas (the paying agent and bond registrar). The principal of the bonds will be payable at maturity to the registered owners upon presentation and surrender of the bonds at the office of the paying agent. Interest on the bonds will be paid by check or draft mailed by the paying agent to the persons in whose names the bonds are registered on the registration books maintained by the bond registrar at the close of business on the record date for such interest, which shall be the 15th day (whether or not a business day) of the calendar month next preceding such interest payment date.

The county will pay for the fees of the bond registrar for registration and transfer of the bonds and will also pay for printing a reasonable supply of registered bond blanks. Any additional costs or fees that might be incurred in the secondary market, other than fees of the bond registrar, will be the responsibility of the bondholders.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received on the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of $\frac{1}{8}$ or $\frac{1}{20}$ of 1 percent. No interest rate shall exceed the index of treasury bonds published by *The Bond Buyer* in New York, New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold, plus 2 percent. The difference between the highest rate specified and the lowest rate specified shall not exceed 2 percent. No supplemental interest payments will be authorized. No bid of less than the principal amount of the bonds and accrued interest will be considered. Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the county during the life of the bond issue on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, and the net interest cost to the county on the basis of such bid. Each bid shall also specify the average annual net interest rate to the county on the basis of such bid. Bidders shall specify

in the bid form the prices (exclusive of accrued interest), expressed as a dollar price, at which the bidder intends that each maturity amount of the bonds shall be initially offered to the public (the initial reoffering prices).

Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the county, which will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the county. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing for identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the county shall determine which bid, if any, shall be accepted, and its determination shall be final.

Security for the Bonds

The bonds will be general obligations of the county payable as to both principal and interest from ad valorem taxes which may be levied, without limitation as to rate or amount on all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the county.

Internal Revenue Code of 1986

The Internal Revenue Code of 1986 imposes requirements on the county which must be met subsequent to the issuance of the bonds by the county and, as a result, the county will and does hereby covenant that it will diligently undertake those steps necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the bonds. The county's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the county's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted current earnings of certain corporations in the calculation of alternative minimum taxable income, with certain other adjustments. Furthermore, Section 59A of the code, as added by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, provides for an environmental tax generally based on corporate alternative minimum taxable income. The amount of the tax is equal to 0.12 percent of the excess of alternative minimum taxable income, without regard to net operating losses and the deduction for this tax, over \$2 million. The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the taxpayer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies to reduce the amount of their deductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on such obligations. With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the

bonds. The county does intend to designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the county, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the county with the provisions of the resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is exempt from federal income taxation. Interest on the bonds may also be excluded from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income.

Delivery and Payment

The county will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the bonds, without cost to the successful bidder, prepared, executed and registered, on or about June 15, 1995, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or greater Kansas City, Missouri, metropolitan area as may be specified by the successful bidder. Delivery elsewhere will be at the bidder's expense. Said bidder will also be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing documents, including a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity and a certificate regarding the completeness and accuracy of the official statement. Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve funds, immediately subject to use by the county. The denominations of the bonds and the names, addresses and social security or taxpayer identification numbers of the registered owners shall be submitted in writing by the successful bidder to the county and bond registrar not later than 3 p.m. C.D.T. on June 1, 1995. In the absence of such information, the county will deliver bonds in the denomination of each maturity registered in the name of the successful bidder.

The successful bidder shall furnish the county by 3 p.m. C.D.T. on June 1, 1995, a certificate acceptable to the county's bond counsel to the effect that (i) the successful bidder has made a bona fide public offering of the bonds at the initial reoffering prices, and (ii) a substantial amount of the bonds was sold to the public (excluding brokers and other intermediaries) at such initial reoffering prices. Such certificate shall state that (1) it is made on the best knowledge, information and belief of the successful bidder, and (2) 10 percent or more in par amount of the bonds of each maturity was sold to the public at or below the initial reoffering prices (such amount being sufficient to establish the sale of a "substantial amount" of the bonds).

Good Faith Deposit

Each bid shall be accompanied by a cashier's or certified check drawn on a bank located in the United States of America in the amount of \$6,000, payable to the order of the county to secure the county from any loss resulting

from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of the bid. No interest will be paid upon the deposit made by the successful bidder. Said check shall be returned to the bidder if the bid is not accepted. If a bid is accepted, said check shall be held by the county until the bidder shall have complied with all of the terms and conditions of this notice, at which time said check shall, at the option of the county, be returned to the successful bidder or deducted from the purchase price. Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted in sealed envelopes addressed to the undersigned county clerk and marked "Proposal for the Purchase of General Obligation Bonds." Date and Delivery of Preliminary and Final Official Statement

The county has authorized the preparation and disbursement of a preliminary official statement containing information relating to the bonds. The preliminary official statement comprises the final official statement required by Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

The preliminary official statement, when amended to include the interest rates specified by the purchaser and the price or yield at which the purchaser will re-offer the bonds to the public, together with any other information required by law, will constitute a "Final Official Statement" with respect to the bonds as that term is defined in Rule 15c2-12. No more than seven business days after the date of the sale, the county will provide without cost to the purchaser such reasonable number of copies of the final official statement. Further copies, if desired, will be made available at the purchaser's expense. If the sale of

the bonds is awarded to a syndicate, the county will designate the senior managing purchaser of the syndicate as its agent for purposes of distributing copies of the final official statement to each participating purchaser. Any purchaser executing and delivering a bid form with respect to the bonds agrees thereby that if the bid is accepted it shall accept such designation and shall enter into a contractual relationship with all participating purchasers for the purpose of assuring the receipt and distribution by each such participating purchaser of the final official statement.

Temporary Administrative Regulations

Article 4.—FEES AND CHARGES

25-4-1. Fees. (a) Definitions.

(1) "Regular hours" means 7:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. Regular hours for samplers may be adjusted to the elevator's hours of operation, but shall not exceed eight hours per day.

(2) "Overtime" means work performed during any hours other than the regular hours defined in paragraph (1) of this subsection.

(3) "Travel time" means time spent in roundtrip travel from portal to portal. If an employee performs inspections at several locations on one trip, travel time may be prorated.

(4) "Holidays" means:

- (A) New Year's Day;
- (B) Memorial Day;
- (C) the Fourth of July;
- (D) Labor Day;

- (E) Veteran's Day;
- (F) Thanksgiving Day; and
- (G) Christmas Day.

(5) "Call in" and "call back" means any work performed when the employee is called back to work after a regular work schedule.

(b) (1) This revised schedule shall supersede all other schedules issued by this agency.

(2) Official inspection shall include grading and sampling, except where indicated in this schedule.

(3) Reduced rates for official commercial inspection services shall be available by contract only. Such reduced rates shall be negotiable based upon the level of services required and the volume guaranteed by the contract.

(4) Federal grain inspection service (FGIS) user fees shall not be included in this schedule, but are in addition to such fees.

(5) The following fees shall be charged for the services rendered by this department under the United States grain standards act, as amended.

(1) The regular hourly rate shall be \$15.00. The number of regular hours shall be calculated in 1/4-hour increments.

(A) When no fee for services has been established, the hourly rate shall apply.

(2) The overtime hourly rate shall be \$15.00 per hour. The number of overtime hours shall be calculated in 1/4-hour increments.

(A) For on-site inspections in excess of four carlots per hour, the overtime hourly rate shall not apply.

(B) For those inspections for which the fee is based on a per unit charge, the overtime hourly rate shall be applied in addition to that per unit fee.

(C) For those inspections for which fees are based on an hourly rate, the overtime hourly rate shall not be applied in addition to the regular hourly rate.

(3) The holiday hourly rate shall be \$20.00 per hour. The number of holiday hours shall be calculated in 1/4-hour increments.

(A) For those inspections for which fees are based on a per unit charge, the holiday hourly rate shall be applied in addition to that per unit fee.

(B) For inspections for which fees are based on an hourly rate, the holiday rate shall not be applied in addition to the regular hourly rate.

(4) If an employee is called in or called back, a minimum of two hours at the overtime hourly rate shall be charged.

(5) The travel time rate shall be \$15.00 per hour.

(6) Mileage expenses shall be charged at the rate per mile determined by the secretary of administration pursuant to K.S.A. 75-4607 and amendments thereto. If any employee performs inspections at several locations on one trip, the mileage expenses may be prorated.

(e) The following fees shall be charged for the services rendered by this department which are not under the U.S. grain standards act, as amended, or the U.S. agricultural marketing act of 1946, as amended.

Temporary Administrative Regulations

Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-34. Bingo retailer incentive promotion. (a) In addition to compensation specified in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery offers bonus incentive to enhance the sale of "Bingo" instant tickets. All retailers will be contacted by lottery representatives concerning this promotion on or after April 10, 1995. To qualify for entry into the drawing following contact by the lottery representative, the retailer must do the following from the contact date through the date of the drawing:

(1) Place an additional single game instant ticket dispenser for exclusive display of "Bingo" tickets if the retailer has five or fewer single game instant dispensers displayed.

(2) Agree to designate at least one dispenser for exclusive display of "Bingo" tickets if the retailer has six or more single game instant ticket dispensers.

(3) Place an additional single game instant ticket dispenser or designate at least one dispenser game space for exclusive display of "Bingo" tickets if the retailer has an in-counter multiple game dispenser provided by the lottery.

(b) To be eligible for the drawing, every participating retailer shall display point of sale materials provided by the lottery and actively offer for sale Kansas lottery "Bingo" tickets from the date "Bingo" tickets become available to each retailer through June 2, 1995.

(c) For any retailer meeting the above criteria, the lottery district manager servicing the account will complete an entry form for the retailer and return the form to lottery security at lottery headquarters to be held until the drawing. Each qualifying retailer shall be eligible for only one entry into the drawing.

(d) At the end of the promotion and prior to the drawing, all entries will be placed in a drum at lottery headquarters by lottery security.

(e) Following the end of the promotion, a random drawing of all eligible retailers will be conducted by the lottery at 11:00 a.m. on Friday, June 2, 1995, at lottery headquarters, in accordance with lottery drawing procedures, to determine the grand prize winner of a trip for four to Orlando, Florida, for four days and three nights starting August 4, 1995. The trip consists of:

(1) Round trip air fare for four to Orlando from Kansas City, Missouri, and transfers to and from the airport in Orlando.

(2) Two double accommodations for four days and three nights in Orlando at Disney's Dixie Landing Resort on August 4, August 5 and August 6, 1995.

(3) Four passes to Disney World, including shuttle service.

(4) One thousand dollars in cash.

(e) All prizes will be awarded upon verification of eligibility. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-22-95, March 16, 1995; amended T-111-5-3-95, April 27, 1995.)

Article 4.—INDIVIDUAL GAME RULES

111-4-405. Name of drawings. The Kansas lottery shall conduct a series of drawings, entitled the "Heartland Park Drawings." The "Heartland Park Drawings" shall take place on Sunday, July 2, 1995, at Heartland Park, 1805 SW 71st, Topeka, Kansas 66619. Rules applicable are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 et seq. and 111-4-405 through 111-4-413. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-4-92, April 30, 1992; amended, T-111-9-1-92, Aug. 28, 1992; amended, T-111-5-28-93, May 21, 1993; amended, T-111-5-20-94, May 13, 1994; amended, T-111-5-3-95, April 27, 1995.)

111-4-408. Entry into drawings. Entry into the "Heartland Park Drawings" is accomplished by the process detailed in the following subparagraphs:

(a) Obtain a valid Kansas instant lottery ticket from the lottery's selling location at Heartland Park Topeka.

(b) Determine if the ticket is a winning ticket in accordance with any instant game rules. If the ticket is a winning ticket, it is not eligible for the "Heartland Park Drawings," and shall be redeemed in accordance with the instant game rules.

(c) If the ticket is a valid non-winning ticket purchased at the Heartland Park lottery selling location, the ticket is eligible for winning a drawing and the holder of the ticket may enter the "Heartland Park Drawings."

(d) The holder of the non-winning ticket must complete the information form on the back of the ticket in a legible manner and sign it.

(e) The holder of the ticket need not be present to win at the time of the "Heartland Park Drawings."

(f) There is no limit to the number of entries a participant may make.

(g) For the racing events occurring on June 29 and 30, and July 1 and 2, 1995, the receptacle(s) or drum(s) shall be open during lottery selling hours.

(h) The holder of a non-winning ticket must take each non-winning ticket with the information form on the back completed, to the location of the receptacle(s) or drum(s) at the "Heartland Park Drawings" and place it in the receptacle(s) or drum(s) provided by the lottery.

(i) On Sunday, July 2, 1995, the Kansas lottery will sponsor its "Heartland Park Drawings." Players enter the drawings by placing non-winning tickets purchased at Heartland Park Topeka into the receptacle(s) or drum(s) located near the lottery's selling location in the pit area. Eleven tickets will be drawn from the contents of the receptacle(s) or drum(s). Following validation by lottery security personnel, the winners' names shall be announced.

(j) Drawings shall be held at the lottery selling location on the east side of the pit area.

(k) Anyone wishing to purchase lottery tickets to enter the Heartland Park Drawings without buying a ticket to the races may do so by making a request for lottery tickets at the Heartland Park ticket office. 111-4-409. Determination of winners. (a) The receptacle or drum shall be sealed and mixed to ensure random selection.

(b) The executive director shall designate one individual of his choice to participate in the selection process.

(c) The selection of the "Heartland Park Drawings" winners shall be accomplished by the individual designated by the executive director, using a bare arm technique, removing only one ticket at a time from the contents of the receptacle(s) or drum(s) for each of the eleven drawings. Lottery security shall review the selected ticket to determine if the ticket is valid, the name stated on the information form located on the back of the selected ticket is legible, and that the ticket was purchased at Heartland Park Topeka. If the ticket is valid, the ticket is a non-winning ticket, the name is determined to be legible and verification confirms the ticket was purchased at the Heartland Park lottery location, the name shall be announced to the audience.

(d) The named person need not be present at a drawing, but must in any event provide proper identification in order to claim the "Heartland Park Drawings" prize.

111-4-700. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Double Doubler" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink in 15 point WGI Symbol font with matching symbols in WGI Cap font. A game symbol appears in each of six play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: \$1.00 - \$2.00 - \$5.00 - 20.00 - 40.00 - \$2500 - \$5000 - "Single Prize" - "Double Prize" - "Double Doubler."

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. 111-4-701. Determination of instant prize winners. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal

the six game symbols and captions. This is a match three of six game which includes a doubler which is double the prize amount shown and a double doubler which is four times the prize amount shown. If three of the six concealed prize amounts match, the player wins the amount shown if the "Your Prize Level" box shows "Single Prize." If "Your Prize" box shows "Double Prize," the player wins double the prize amount. If the "Your Prize" box shows "Double Doubler," the player wins four times the prize amount. SENATE BILL No. 333

AN ACT concerning crimes, punishment and criminal procedure; relating to unlawful acts involving controlled substances; relating to collection of specimens; amending K.S.A. 65-4113 and K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 21-2511 and 65-4162 and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 21-2511 is hereby amended to read as follows: 21-2511. (a) Any person convicted or adjudicated as a juvenile offender because of the commission of an unlawful sexual act as defined in subsection (4) of K.S.A. 21-3501, and amendments thereto, or an attempt of such unlawful sexual act or convicted or adjudicated as a juvenile offender because of the commission of a violation of K.S.A. 21-3401, 21-3402, 21-3602, 21-3603 or 21-3609, and amendments thereto, regardless of the sentence imposed, shall be required to submit specimens of blood and saliva to the Kansas bureau of investigation in accordance with the provisions of this act, if such person is:

(1) convicted or adjudicated as a juvenile offender because of the commission of a crime specified in subsection (a) on or after the effective date of this act;

(2) ordered institutionalized as a result of being convicted or adjudicated as a juvenile offender because of the commission of a crime specified in subsection (a) on or after the effective date of this act; or

(3) convicted or adjudicated as a juvenile offender because of the commission of a crime specified in this subsection before the effective date of this act and is presently confined as a result of such conviction or adjudication in any state correctional facility or county jail or is presently serving an authorized disposition under K.S.A. 21-4603, 22-3717 or 38-1663, and amendments thereto.

(b) Any person required by paragraphs (a)(1) and (a)(2) to provide specimens of blood and saliva shall be ordered by the court to have specimens of blood and saliva collected within 10 days after sentencing or adjudication:

(1) If placed directly on probation, as a condition of probation, that person must provide specimens of blood and saliva, at a collection site designated by the Kansas bureau of investigation. *Failure to cooperate with the collection of the specimens and any deliberate act by that person intended to impede, delay or stop the collection of the specimens shall be punishable as contempt of court and constitute grounds to revoke probation;*

(2) if sentenced to the secretary of corrections, the specimens of blood and saliva will be obtained immediately upon arrival at the Topeka correctional facility; or

(3) if a juvenile offender is placed in the custody of the secretary of social and rehabilitation services, in a youth residential facility or in a state youth center, the specimens of blood and saliva will be obtained immediately upon arrival.

(c) Any person required by paragraph (a)(3) to provide specimens of blood and saliva shall be required to provide such samples prior to final discharge, parole, or release at a collection site designated by the Kansas bureau of investigation.

(d) The Kansas bureau of investigation shall provide all specimen vials, mailing tubes, labels and instructions necessary for the collection of blood and saliva samples. The collection of samples shall be performed in a medically approved manner. No person authorized by this section to withdraw blood and collect saliva, and no person assisting in the collection of these samples shall be liable in any civil or criminal action when the act is performed in a reasonable manner according to generally accepted

medical practices. The withdrawal of blood for purposes of this act may be performed only by: (1) A person licensed to practice medicine and surgery or a person acting under the supervision of any such licensed person; (2) a registered nurse or a licensed practical nurse; or (3) any qualified medical technician including, but not limited to, an emergency medical technician-intermediate or mobile intensive care technician, as those terms are defined in K.S.A. 65-6112, and amendments thereto, or a phlebotomist. The samples shall thereafter be forwarded to the Kansas bureau of investigation for analysis and categorizing into genetic marker groupings.

(e) The genetic marker groupings shall be maintained by the Kansas bureau of investigation. The Kansas bureau of investigation shall establish, implement and maintain a statewide automated personal identification system capable of, but not limited to, classifying, matching and storing analysis of DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) and other biological molecules. *The genetic marker grouping analysis information and identification system as established by this act shall be compatible with the procedures specified by the federal bureau of investigation's combined DNA index system (CODIS). The Kansas bureau of investigation may participate in the CODIS program by sharing data and utilizing compatible test procedures, laboratory equipment, supplies and computer software.*

(f) The genetic marker grouping analysis information obtained pursuant to this act shall be confidential and shall be released only to law enforcement officers of the United States, of other states or territories, of the insular possessions of the United States, or foreign countries duly authorized to receive the same, to all law enforcement officers of the state of Kansas and to all prosecutor's agencies.

(g) The Kansas bureau of investigation shall be the state central repository for all genetic marker grouping analysis information obtained pursuant to this act. The Kansas bureau of investigation may promulgate rules and regulations for the form and manner of the collection of blood and saliva samples and other procedures for the operation of this act. The provisions of the Kansas administrative procedure act shall apply to all actions taken under the rules and regulations so promulgated.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 65-4162 is hereby amended to read as follows: 65-4162. (a) Except as authorized by the uniform controlled substances act, it shall be unlawful for any person to possess or have under such person's control:

(1) Any depressant designated in subsection (e) of K.S.A. 65-4105, subsection (e) of K.S.A. 65-4107, subsection (b) or (c) of K.S.A. 65-4109 or subsection (b) of K.S.A. 65-4111, and amendments thereto;

(2) any stimulant designated in subsection (f) of K.S.A. 65-4105, subsection (d)(2), (d)(4) or (f)(2) of K.S.A. 65-4107 or subsection (e) of K.S.A. 65-4109, and amendments thereto;

(3) any hallucinogenic drug designated in subsection (d) of K.S.A. 65-4105 and amendments thereto or designated in subsection (g) of K.S.A. 65-4107 and amendments thereto;

(4) any substance designated in subsection (g) of K.S.A. 65-4105, and amendments thereto, and designated in subsection (c), (d), (e), (f) or (g) of K.S.A. 65-4111 and amendments thereto; or

(5) any anabolic steroids as defined in subsection (f) of K.S.A. 65-4109, and amendments thereto.

Except as otherwise provided, any person who violates this subsection shall be guilty of a class A nonperson misdemeanor. If any person has a prior conviction under this section or, a conviction for a substantially similar offense from another jurisdiction or a conviction of a violation of an ordinance of any city or resolution of any county for a substantially similar offense if the substance involved was marijuana or tetrahydrocannabinol as designated in subsection (d) of K.S.A. 65-4105 and amendments thereto, then such person shall be guilty of a drug severity level 4 felony.

(b) It shall not be a defense to charges arising under this section that the defendant was acting in an agency relationship on behalf of any other party in a transaction involving a controlled substance.

(c) For purposes of the uniform controlled substances act, the prohibitions contained in this section shall apply to controlled substance analogs as defined in subsection (bb) of K.S.A. 65-4101 and amendments thereto.

(d) The provisions of this section shall be part of and supplemental to the uniform controlled substances act.

Sec. 3. K.S.A. 65-4113 is hereby amended to read as follows: 65-4113. (a) The controlled substances or drugs, by whatever official name, common or usual name, chemical name or brand name designated, listed in this section are included in schedule V.

(b) Unless specifically excepted or unless listed in another schedule, any material, compound, mixture or preparation containing the following narcotic drug or its salts:

- Buprenorphine 9064
- (c) Any compound, mixture or preparation containing limited quantities of any of the following narcotic drugs which also contains one or more nonnarcotic active medicinal ingredients in sufficient proportion to confer upon the compound, mixture or preparation valuable medicinal qualities other than those possessed by the narcotic drug alone:
 - (1) Not more than 200 milligrams of codeine or any of its salts per 100 milliliters or per 100 grams.
 - (2) Not more than 100 milligrams of dihydrocodeine or any of its salts per 100 milliliters or per 100 grams.
 - (3) Not more than 100 milligrams of ethylmorphine or any of its salts per 100 milliliters or per 100 grams.
 - (4) Not more than 2.5 milligrams of diphenoxylate and not less than 25 micrograms of atropine sulfate per dosage unit.
 - (5) Not more than 100 milligrams of opium per 100 milliliters or per 100 grams.
 - (6) Not more than .5 milligram of difenoxin (9168) and not less than 25 micrograms of atropine sulfate per dosage unit.

(d) Unless specifically excepted or unless listed in another schedule, any material, compound, mixture or preparation which contains any quantity of the following substances having a stimulant effect on the central nervous system, including its salts, isomers (whether optical, position or geometric) and salts of such isomers whenever the existence of such salts, isomers and salts of isomers is possible within the specific chemical designation:

- (1) Propylhexedrine (except when part of a compound used for nasal decongestion which is authorized to be sold lawfully over the counter without a prescription under the federal food, drug and cosmetic act, so long as it is used only for such purpose) 8161
- (2) Pyrovalerone 1485

(e) Unless specifically excepted or unless listed in another schedule, any product containing as its single ingredient the substance Ephedrine.

Sec. 4. K.S.A. 65-4113 and K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 21-2511 and 65-4162 are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

HOUSE BILL No. 2111

AN ACT concerning jails; amending K.S.A. 19-1923 and K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 12-187, as amended by section 1 of 1995 Senate Bill No. 20, and 12-189, as amended by section 3 of 1995 Senate Bill No. 20, and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 12-187, as amended by section 1 of 1995 Senate Bill No. 20, is hereby amended to read as follows: 12-187.

(a) (1) No city shall impose a retailers' sales tax under the provisions of this act without the governing body of such city having first submitted such proposition to and having received the approval of a majority of the electors of the city voting thereon at an election called and held therefor. The governing body of any city may submit the question of imposing a retailers' sales tax and the governing body shall be required to submit the question upon submission of a petition signed by electors of such city equal in number to not less than 10% of the electors of such city.

(2) The governing body of any city located in any county which does not impose a countywide retailers' sales tax pursuant to paragraph (5) of subsection (b) may submit the question of imposing a retailers' sales tax at the rate of .25%, .5%, .75% or 1% and pledging the revenue received therefrom for the purpose of financing the provision of health care services, as enumerated in the question, to the electors at an election called and held thereon. The tax imposed pursuant to this paragraph shall be deemed to be in addition to the rate limitations prescribed in K.S.A. 12-189, and amendments thereto. As used in this paragraph, health care services shall include but not be limited to the following: Local health departments, city, county or district hospitals, city or county nursing homes, preventive health care services including immunizations, prenatal care and the postponement of entry into nursing homes by home health care services, mental health services, indigent health care, physician or health care worker recruitment, health education, emergency medical

services, rural health clinics, integration of health care services, home health services and rural health networks.

(b) (1) The board of county commissioners of any county may submit the question of imposing a countywide retailers' sales tax to the electors at an election called and held thereon, and any such board shall be required to submit the question upon submission of a petition signed by electors of such county equal in number to not less than 10% of the electors of such county who voted at the last preceding general election for the office of secretary of state, or upon receiving resolutions requesting such an election passed by not less than 2/3 of the membership of the governing body of each of one or more cities within such county which contains a population of not less than 25% of the entire population of the county, or upon receiving resolutions requesting such an election passed by 2/3 of the membership of the governing body of each of one or more taxing subdivisions within such county which levy not less than 25% of the property taxes levied by all taxing subdivisions within the county.

(2) The board of county commissioners of Barton, Butler, Cowley, Cherokee, Crawford, Jefferson, Lyon, Montgomery, Ottawa, Riley, Saline, Seward and Wyandotte counties may submit the question of imposing a countywide retailers' sales tax and pledging the revenue received therefrom for the purpose of financing the construction or remodeling of a courthouse, jail, law enforcement center facility or other county administrative facility, to the electors at an election called and held thereon. The tax imposed pursuant to this paragraph shall expire when sales tax sufficient to pay all of the costs incurred in the financing of such facility has been collected by retailers as determined by the secretary of revenue. Nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to allow the rate of tax imposed by Butler, Cowley, Lyon, Montgomery or Riley county pursuant to this paragraph to exceed or be imposed at any rate other than the rates prescribed in K.S.A. 12-189, and amendments thereto.

(3) (A) Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, the result of the election held on November 8, 1988, on the question submitted by the board of county commissioners of Jackson county for the purpose of increasing its countywide retailers' sales tax by 1% is hereby declared valid, and the revenue received therefrom by the county shall be expended solely for the purpose of financing the Banner Creek reservoir project. The tax imposed pursuant to this paragraph shall take effect on the effective date of this act and shall expire not later than five years after such date.

(B) The result of the election held on November 8, 1994, on the question submitted by the board of county commissioners of Ottawa county for the purpose of increasing its countywide retailers' sales tax by 1% is hereby declared valid, and the revenue received therefrom by the county shall be expended solely for the purpose of financing the erection, construction and furnishing of a law enforcement center and jail facility.

(4) The board of county commissioners of Finney and Ford counties may submit the question of imposing a countywide retailers' sales tax at the rate of .25% and pledging the revenue received therefrom for the purpose of financing all or any portion of the cost to be paid by Finney or Ford county for construction of highway projects identified as system enhancements under the provisions of paragraph (5) of subsection (b) of K.S.A. 68-2314, and amendments thereto, to the electors at an election called and held thereon. Such election shall be called and held in the manner provided by the general bond law. The tax imposed pursuant to this paragraph shall expire upon the payment of all costs authorized pursuant to this paragraph in the financing of such highway projects. Nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to allow the rate of tax imposed by Finney or Ford county pursuant to this paragraph to exceed the maximum rate prescribed in K.S.A. 12-189, and amendments thereto. If any funds remain upon the payment of all costs authorized pursuant to this paragraph in the financing of such highway projects in Finney county, the state treasurer shall remit such funds to the treasurer of Finney county and upon receipt of such moneys shall be deposited to the credit of the county road and bridge fund. If any funds remain upon the payment of all costs authorized pursuant to this paragraph in the financing of such highway projects in Ford county, the state treasurer shall remit such funds to the treasurer of Ford county and upon receipt of such moneys shall be deposited to the credit of the county road and bridge fund.

(5) The board of county commissioners of any county may submit the question of imposing a retailers' sales tax at the rate of .25%, .5%, .75% or 1% and pledging the revenue received therefrom for the purpose of financing the provision of health care services, as enumerated in the question, to the electors at an election called and held thereon. Whenever any

county imposes a tax pursuant to this paragraph, any tax imposed pursuant to paragraph (2) of subsection (a) by any city located in such county shall expire upon the effective date of the imposition of the countywide tax, and thereafter the state treasurer shall remit to each such city that portion of the countywide tax revenue collected by retailers within such city as certified by the director of taxation. The tax imposed pursuant to this paragraph shall be deemed to be in addition to the rate limitations prescribed in K.S.A. 12-189, and amendments thereto. As used in this paragraph, health care services shall include but not be limited to the following: Local health departments, city or county hospitals, city or county nursing homes, preventive health care services including immunizations, prenatal care and the postponement of entry into nursing homes by home care services, mental health services, indigent health care, physician or health care worker recruitment, health education, emergency medical services, rural health clinics, integration of health care services, home health services and rural health networks.

(6) The board of county commissioners of Allen county may submit the question of imposing a countywide retailers' sales tax at the rate of .5% and pledging the revenue received therefrom for the purpose of financing the costs of operation and construction of a solid waste disposal area or the modification of an existing landfill to comply with federal regulations to the electors at an election called and held thereon. The tax imposed pursuant to this paragraph shall expire upon the payment of all costs incurred in the financing of the project undertaken. Nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to allow the rate of tax imposed by Allen county pursuant to this paragraph to exceed or be imposed at any rate other than the rates prescribed in K.S.A. 12-189 and amendments thereto.

(7) The board of county commissioners of Dickinson county may submit the question of imposing a countywide retailers' sales tax at the rate of .25% and pledging the revenue received therefrom for the purpose of financing the costs of renovating a building owned by the county to be used for community purposes to the electors at an election called and held thereon. The tax imposed pursuant to this paragraph shall expire after three years from the date such tax is first collected.

(c) The boards of county commissioners of any two or more contiguous counties, upon adoption of a joint resolution by such boards, may submit the question of imposing a retailers' sales tax within such counties to the electors of such counties at an election called and held thereon and such boards of any two or more contiguous counties shall be required to submit such question upon submission of a petition in each of such counties, signed by a number of electors of each of such counties where submitted equal in number to not less than 10% of the electors of each of such counties who voted at the last preceding general election for the office of secretary of state, or upon receiving resolutions requesting such an election passed by not less than $\frac{2}{3}$ of the membership of the governing body of each of one or more cities within each of such counties which contains a population of not less than 25% of the entire population of each of such counties, or upon receiving resolutions requesting such an election passed by $\frac{2}{3}$ of the membership of the governing body of each of one or more taxing subdivisions within each of such counties which levy not less than 25% of the property taxes levied by all taxing subdivisions within each of such counties.

(d) Any city retailers' sales tax in the amount of .5% being levied by a city on July 1, 1990, shall continue in effect until repealed in the manner provided herein for the adoption and approval of such tax or until repealed by the adoption of an ordinance so providing. In addition to any city retailers' sales tax being levied by a city on July 1, 1990, any such city may adopt an additional city retailers' sales tax in the amount of .25% or .5%, provided that such additional tax is adopted and approved in the manner provided for the adoption and approval of a city retailers' sales tax. Any countywide retailers' sales tax in the amount of .5% or 1% in effect on July 1, 1990, shall continue in effect until repealed in the manner provided herein for the adoption and approval of such tax.

(e) A class B city shall have the same power to levy and collect a city retailers' sales tax that a class A city is authorized to levy and collect and in addition, in 1990, 1991 or 1992, the governing body of any class B city may submit the question of imposing an additional city retailers' sales tax in an amount not to exceed 1% and pledging the revenue received therefrom for flood control projects to the electors at an election called and held thereon. Any additional sales tax imposed pursuant to this paragraph shall expire upon the payment of all costs incurred in financing such flood control projects.

(f) A class D city shall have the same power to levy and collect a city

retailers' sales tax that a class A city is authorized to levy and collect and in addition, the governing body of any class D city may submit the question of imposing an additional city retailers' sales tax in the amount of .25%, .5% or .75% and pledging the revenue received therefrom for economic development initiatives, strategic planning initiatives or for public infrastructure projects including buildings to the electors at an election called and held thereon. Any additional sales tax imposed pursuant to this paragraph shall expire no later than five years from the date of imposition thereof.

(g) Any city or county proposing to adopt a retailers' sales tax shall give notice of its intention to submit such proposition for approval by the electors in the manner required by K.S.A. 10-120, and amendments thereto. The notices shall state the time of the election and the rate and effective date of the proposed tax. If a majority of the electors voting thereon at such election fail to approve the proposition, such proposition may be resubmitted under the conditions and in the manner provided in this act for submission of the proposition. If a majority of the electors voting thereon at such election shall approve the levying of such tax, the governing body of any such city or county shall provide by ordinance or resolution, as the case may be, for the levy of the tax. Any repeal of such tax or any reduction or increase in the rate thereof, within the limits prescribed by K.S.A. 12-189, and amendments thereto, shall be accomplished in the manner provided herein for the adoption and approval of such tax except that the repeal of any such city retailers' sales tax may be accomplished by the adoption of an ordinance so providing.

(h) The sufficiency of the number of signers of any petition filed under this section shall be determined by the county election officer. Every election held under this act shall be conducted by the county election officer.

(i) The governing body of the city or county proposing to levy any retailers' sales tax shall specify the purpose or purposes for which the revenue would be used, and a statement generally describing such purpose or purposes shall be included as a part of the ballot proposition.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 12-189, as amended by section 3 of 1995 Senate Bill No. 20, is hereby amended to read as follows: 12-189. Except as otherwise provided by paragraph (2) of subsection (a) of K.S.A. 12-187, and amendments thereto, the rate of any class A or class C city retailers' sales tax shall be fixed in the amount of .25%, .5%, .75% or 1% which amount shall be determined by the governing body of the city. Except as otherwise provided by paragraph (2) of subsection (a) of K.S.A. 12-187, and amendments thereto, the rate of any class B city retailers' sales tax shall be fixed in the amount of .25%, .5%, .75%, 1%, 1.25%, 1.5%, 1.75% or 2%. Except as otherwise provided by paragraph (2) of subsection (a) of K.S.A. 12-187, and amendments thereto, the rate of any class D city retailers' sales tax shall be fixed in the amount of .25%, .5%, .75%, 1%, 1.25%, 1.5% or 1.75%. The rate of any countywide retailers' sales tax shall be fixed in an amount of either .25%, .5%, .75% or 1% which amount shall be determined by the board of county commissioners, except that:

(a) The board of county commissioners of Cherokee, Crawford, Saline, Seward or Wyandotte county, for the purposes of paragraph (2) of subsection (b) of K.S.A. 12-187, and amendments thereto, may fix such rate at 1.5%, and the board of county commissioners of Barton or Jefferson or Ottawa county, for the purposes of paragraph (2) of subsection (b) of K.S.A. 12-187, and amendments thereto, may fix such rate at 2%;

(b) the board of county commissioners of Jackson county, for the purposes of paragraph (3) of subsection (b) of K.S.A. 12-187, and amendments thereto, may fix such rate at 2%;

(c) the boards of county commissioners of Finney and Ford counties, for the purposes of paragraph (4) of subsection (b) of K.S.A. 12-187, and amendments thereto, may fix such rate at .25%;

(d) the board of county commissioners of any county for the purposes of paragraph (5) of subsection (b) of K.S.A. 12-187, and amendments thereto, may fix such rate at a percentage which is equal to the sum of the rate allowed to be imposed by a board of county commissioners on the effective date of this act plus .25%, .5%, .75% or 1%, as the case requires; or

(e) the board of county commissioners of Dickinson county, for the purposes of paragraph (7) of subsection (b) of K.S.A. 12-187, and amendments thereto, may fix such rate at 1.25%.

Any county or city levying a retailers' sales tax is hereby prohibited from administering or collecting such tax locally, but shall utilize the services of the state department of revenue to administer, enforce and collect such tax. Except as otherwise specifically provided in K.S.A. 12-189a, and

amendments thereto, such tax shall be identical in its application, and exemptions therefrom, to the Kansas retailers' sales tax act and all laws and administrative rules and regulations of the state department of revenue relating to the Kansas retailers' sales tax shall apply to such local sales tax insofar as such laws and rules and regulations may be made applicable. The state director of taxation is hereby authorized to administer, enforce and collect such local sales taxes and to adopt such rules and regulations as may be necessary for the efficient and effective administration and enforcement thereof.

Upon receipt of a certified copy of an ordinance or resolution authorizing the levy of a local retailers' sales tax, the state director of taxation shall cause such taxes to be collected within or without the boundaries of such taxing subdivision at the same time and in the same manner provided for the collection of the state retailers' sales tax. All moneys collected by the director of taxation under the provisions of this section shall be credited to a county and city retailers' sales tax fund which fund is hereby established in the state treasury. Any refund due on any county or city retailers' sales tax collected pursuant to this act shall be paid out of the sales tax refund fund and reimbursed by the director of taxation from collections of local retailers' sales tax revenue. All local retailers' sales tax revenue collected within any county or city pursuant to this act shall be apportioned and remitted at least quarterly by the state treasurer, on instruction from the director of taxation, to the treasurer of such county or city.

The director of taxation shall provide, upon request by a city or county clerk or treasurer of any city or county levying a local retailers' sales tax, a monthly report identifying each retailer having a place of business in such city or county and setting forth the amount of such tax remitted by each retailer during the preceding month. Such report shall be made available to the clerk or treasurer of such city or county within a reason-

able time after it has been requested from the director of taxation. The director of taxation shall be allowed to assess a reasonable fee for the issuance of such report. Information received by any city or county pursuant to this section shall be confidential, and it shall be unlawful for any officer or employee of such city or county to divulge any such information in any manner. Any violation of this paragraph by a city or county officer or employee is a class B misdemeanor, and such officer or employee shall be dismissed from office.

Sec. 3. K.S.A. 19-1923 is hereby amended to read as follows: 19-1923. That The county commissioners of any county shall have the power to appropriate any sum out of the county treasury not otherwise appropriated, not to exceed one thousand dollars, for the purpose of erecting or building in such city area other than the county seat of such county, a jail or holdover, for the use of said such county and the city area cities in which such jail shall be erected. *Provided*, That such city shall be at least eighteen miles distant from the county seat and not more than two miles from the boundary of any other state, nor shall such city have a population of less than 1,400 people, according to the assessor's returns of the year previous to the one in which such jail shall have been ordered built. *Provided further*, That Nothing in this act shall be construed as preventing the aforesaid city area cities from joining and cooperating with said such county in the erection thereof, nor to exclude the authorities of any area city in such county which any jail that shall be so built from the use of such jail for the use of the city cities.

Sec. 4. K.S.A. 19-1923 and K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 12-187, as amended by section 1 of 1995 Senate Bill No. 20, and 12-189, as amended by section 3 of 1995 Senate Bill No. 20, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

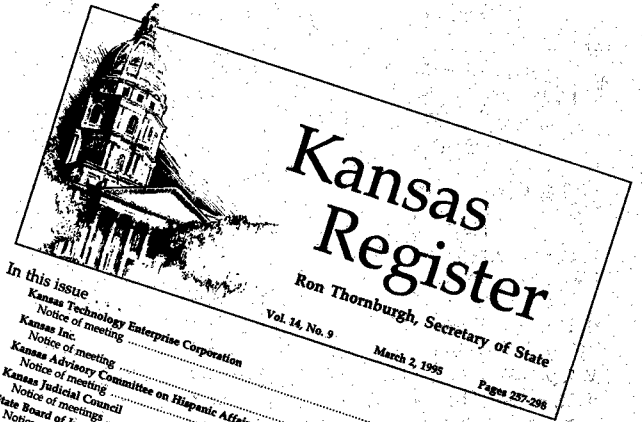
