Request for Comments

The Kansas Historic Preservation Office is soliciting input for its Historic Preservation Fund grant application for federal fiscal year 1996. Each year the KHPO receives a matching grant from the United States Department of the Interior to assist in the implementation of the federal preservation program in Kansas. Although the figure has not been established, the KHPO anticipates an award of \$315,000. These funds are used to provide operating costs and salaries for the KHPO and to provide funds for subgrant recipients.

Historic Preservation Fund subgrants are given for activities which aid in planning for the preservation of our cultural resources. Eligible activities include architectural and archeological surveys, preparation of nominations to the National Register of Historic Places, and the preparation of design guidelines. The goals for this year's program include the survey of historic properties in areas threatened by development pressures, the documentation of potentially eligible historic districts, the dissemination of historic preservation related information through educational activities, and the development of joint preservation efforts with local governments and nonprofit groups.

The KHPO welcomes public input to help it shape its program. Suggestions can be sent by October 20 to the Grants Manager, Kansas Historic Preservation Office, Kansas State Historical Society, 6425 S.W. 6th, Topeka, 66615.

Request for Proposals

The Kansas State Library is requesting proposals for the 1996 Kansas Volunteers for Literacy Grant Program. The Legislature and Governor provide a grant program seeking to assist in the development and implementation of existing and new adult literacy programs or to provide funding for the acquisition of materials and resources for adult literacy.

Applications are invited from existing and newly forming adult literacy organizations in Kansas. The Kansas State Library Literacy Program, with the advice of the state librarian, established grant eligibility criteria. Past recipients of Kansas Volunteers for Literacy grants are eligible to apply for funds to serve a different population of learners. Collaborations are encouraged. Programs with overdue evaluations are not eligible to apply.

Funds may be requested to buy literacy instruction materials; pay for volunteer/learner recruitment promotions; pay a stipend for volunteer coordination; pay for volunteer management support materials; pay for volunteer tutor training; pay for volunteer/learner recognition, etc.

The Kansas State Library reserves the right to fund grants at less than their requested amounts. The Kansas State Library has awarded an average of \$12,000 the past three years.

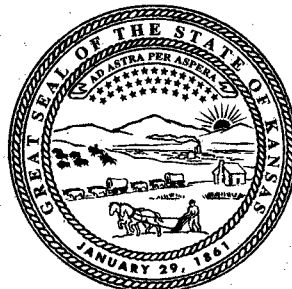

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 3 p.m. Monday, December 4, in Room 106, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations.

The 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the executive administrator of the Board of Nursing, Room 551-S, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. The proposed regulations and the economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 60-3-105 and 60-7-104, Reinstatement of license. K.A.R. 60-3-105 and 60-7-104 set out the provisions for nurses and mental health technicians to reinstate a license. The provision of work history for reinstatement is being removed from the procedure for nurses. The one

change for licensed mental health technicians is to expand the 60-day temporary permit to 120 days per statute change from last legislative session.

K.A.R. 60-12-106, License renewal; and K.A.R. 60-13-112, Authorization renewal. These two regulations have been expanded to be more flexible for the licensed mental health technician and registered nurse anesthetist in meeting continuing education requirements for license and authorization renewal. All 30 hours of continuing education may be obtained by independent study if an individual demonstrates extenuating circumstances. Also, use of fractions of CNE hours to meet requirements is being proposed. Additional changes are for clarification.

K.A.R. 60-11-108, Requirements for advanced registered nurse practitioner programs of study. The one major change in K.A.R. 60-11-108 is to require that three college hours of advanced pharmacology or its equivalent be included in programs for education of advanced registered nurse practitioners. Additional changes are for clarification.

K.A.R. 60-12-109, 60-13-115 and 60-11-117, Exceptions. The exceptions to continuing education requirements which were allowed in these regulations have been moved to regulation on license or authorization renewal or covered by statute as approved in 1995 Senate Bill 151. The board proposes revocation of these regulations.

K.A.R. 60-11-109, Initial certification. The board proposes to revoke this regulation since content is currently in statute or K.A.R. 60-11-119, payment of fees.

K.A.R. 60-11-112, Continuing education; and K.A.R. 60-11-114, Approval of advanced registered nurse practitioner continuing education. There are no continuing education requirements for advanced registered nurse practitioners (ARNP) to renew or reinstate the ARNP certificate, so these two regulations are not needed.

Economic Impact

There should be no negative economic impact on the licensee in meeting continuing education requirements for license or authorization renewal. Some licensees may have to obtain fewer classes since fractions of hours may be used.

The pharmacology content for advanced registered nurse practitioner programs is not required until January 1, 1997. The directors of the Kansas programs should have ample time to change curriculums. There might be some economic impact for the advanced registered nurse practitioner who completes a program after that date and does not have the required 45 hours of pharmacology content. The individual applicant might have to postpone employment as an advanced registered nurse practitioner while acquiring the required pharmacology content.

The anticipated changes in these regulations will have minimal economic impact on the Board of Nursing staff.

Executive Order No. 95-178

Establishing the Governor's
Tax Equity Task Force

WHEREAS, it is incumbent upon Kansas state government to ensure that the system of taxation within the State is as fair as possible; and

WHEREAS, an independent, objective, and comprehensive review of the state's tax system is essential in achieving a fair tax system; and

WHEREAS, a balanced review of the tax system must involve a diverse group of Kansas citizens representing a variety of geographical areas, vocations, and perspectives, including those of private citizens, business people, property owners, finance professionals and law-makers.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as the Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby establish the Governor's Tax Equity Task Force.

1. Membership on the Task Force shall be by official commission of appointment of the Governor. The members shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The chairperson of the Task Force shall be appointed by the Governor.
2. The Task Force shall meet upon call of its chairperson as necessary to carry out its duties under this Executive Order.
3. Members of the Task Force shall receive subsistence allowances, mileage, expenses, and compensation as provided in K.S.A. 75-3223 and amendments thereto for travel to and attendance at official meetings of the Task Force or authorized subcommittee meetings thereof. The expenses and compensation shall be paid by the Division of the Budget from available appropriations in the policy analysis initiatives account of the State General Fund. In recognition of work begun by the Task Force at the request and direction of the Governor in advance of the effective date of this Executive Order, payments for compensation and travel expenses in accordance with this paragraph may be made for meetings of the Task Force called for the purpose of conducting such preliminary work.

The Governor's Task Equity Force shall:

- A. Conduct a comprehensive review of the tax structure of the state of Kansas, including:
 - (1) the current mix of statewide property taxes, sales taxes, and income taxes;
 - (2) the current reliance on statewide property taxes as a method of financing public education; and
- B. Prepare a report containing an analysis of the fairness of the state's current tax policies and recommendations for any improvements and revisions to the State's tax codes. The report shall be submitted on or before January 1, 1996.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 95-178 and shall become effective immediately.

Rescinding Executive Order No. 79-36
Establishing the Governor's Council on Fitness

WHEREAS, the Governor's Council on Fitness was established in 1979 to recommend to and advise the Governor and the Department of Health and Environment of ways to improve the fitness of Kansas citizens and assist in the implementation of all state fitness programs, and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Department of Health and Environment maintains and oversees extensive physical fitness programs for youth in conjunction with the President's Council on Physical Fitness, and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Department of Education oversees similar physical fitness programs, and

WHEREAS, the Governor's Council on Fitness merely duplicates the more extensive efforts of these and other physical fitness educational groups;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as the Governor of the State of Kansas, it is hereby ordered that Executive Order No. 79-36 establishing the Governor's Council on Fitness is hereby rescinded.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 95-179 and shall be effective immediately.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

The State Board of Accountancy will conduct a public hearing at 2 p.m. Friday, December 8, in Conference Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider proposed amendments and revocations to existing administrative regulations.

A summary of the proposed regulation changes are as follows:

74-1-3, Conditional credit, is being amended to delete the limitation of only four sittings out of the six exams offered after passing two subjects for conditional credit in which to pass the remaining subject(s), and to allow the board to waive the minimum 50 score in the case where a candidate passes three of the four subjects.

74-4-1, Permit to practice, is being amended in wording only; there are no changes in substance.

74-4-4, Experience requirement for permits, is being amended to set out some specifics to implement the reduced experience law passed by the 1995 Kansas Legislature for issuance of permits to practice limited to doing taxes and compilation work to CPAs who only have one year of qualifying accounting experience obtained under a permit-holding CPA, reserving the two years experience, at least one year of which must still be in a certified public accounting firm including 1,000 hours of auditing, to obtain an unlimited permit in order to do reviews and audits.

74-5-2, Definitions under the Code of Professional (ethics) Conduct, to include limited liability partnerships as an acceptable form of practice for CPAs, since such was recently legislated.

74-5-103, Commissions and referral fees, is being amended to update the financial planning specialist designation conferred by the AICPA from AFFS to PFS.

74-5-202 and 74-5-203, Auditing standards and accounting principles, are receiving their annual amendment due to inclusion therein of reference to the Generally Accepted Auditing Standards (GAAS) and Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), which are annually updated and reprinted by the American Institute of CPAs (AICPA) and the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB).

74-5-406, Firm names, is being amended to eliminate the last sentence, which has sometimes caused confusion when a sole practitioner was left with a firm name which was misleading.

74-6-1 and 74-6-2, Definition of office and management of an office, are being amended to include limited liability partnerships and other minor language cleanup.

74-7-2, Firms eligible for registration, is being amended to combine all forms of practice under one regulation, since the requirements are the same for all, rather than being just for partnerships. Accordingly, the board is proposing to revoke regulations 74-8-2 and 74-8-5, pertaining to the corporate form of practice, and 74-14-1 and 74-14-2, pertaining to the limited liability company form of practice.

74-4-6, pertaining to the "concentration in accounting" under the masters or advanced degree programs, also is being revoked because with the enactment of the revised reduced experience statute for obtaining permits to practice as CPAs to do taxes and compilations, the advanced degree provision was deleted.

74-13-1 and 74-13-2, pertaining to temporary permits for out-of-state CPAs, are being revoked since the 1995 legislation deleted that provision from the accountancy statute. Legislation also eliminated the residency requirement for obtaining Kansas CPA certificates by reciprocity from other states, so CPAs who previously had temporary permits may now obtain Kansas CPA certificates by reciprocity and regular permits to practice in Kansas if needed.

Amending and revoking the above regulations proposed by the Board of Accountancy should not have any economic impact on anyone other than CPAs and the Board of Accountancy. The regulations make it easier for a Kansas CPA to obtain an initial permit to do limited public accounting, i.e., income taxes and compilations; and make reciprocity easier for out-of-state CPAs to get licensed to practice in this state, and thus regulated by the board. This should make the services of a CPA available to the public in some smaller or remote communities where previously there were none because successful CPA exam candidates might be unable to obtain the required auditing experience to obtain a permit (the actual license) to practice public accounting as a CPA. There would be no economic impact on other state agencies.

**Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations**

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Health, Bureau of Disease Control, will conduct a public hearing at 9 a.m. Wednesday, December 6, in the basement conference room of the Mills Building, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption on a permanent basis of proposed amendments to existing disease reporting regulations, as well as revocation of one disease reporting regulation. The regulations proposed to be amended are K.A.R. 28-1-2, 28-1-4 and 28-1-18. The regulation proposed for revocation is K.A.R. 28-1-3. A summary of the proposed amendments and their economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 28-1-2. Designation of reportable infectious or contagious diseases. The proposed amendment to the list of reportable diseases drops urethritis, vaginitis and murine typhus as reportable diseases. None of these diseases are currently nationally notifiable diseases. In Kansas in 1993, urethritis and vaginitis accounted for 4,401 reports. Dropping them from the list of reportable diseases should result in net economic savings to health care providers and others required to report as well as to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

K.A.R. 28-1-3. Reportable industrial diseases. The list of reportable industrial diseases is proposed for revocation, as it was developed in 1966 and is outdated. Cancer and lead poisoning, diseases of current public health importance, are reportable under other regulations (K.A.R.

28-1-4 and K.A.R. 28-1-18, respectively). Deleting 31 industrial diseases should result in economic savings for individuals or institutions responsible for reporting as well as for the Kansas Department of Health and Environment.

K.A.R. 28-1-4. Registration of disease prevalence by hospitals. The proposed amended list of reportable diseases by hospitals drops Toxic Shock Syndrome, as it is reportable under K.A.R. 28-1-2. The proposed amendment also drops Reye and Guillain-Barre syndromes, as they are no longer nationally notifiable diseases. Hospitals may see some economic savings due to the proposed deletions.

K.A.R. 28-1-18. Notification by laboratories to Kansas Department of Health and Environment of positive reaction to tests for certain diseases. The proposed amendment to the list of diseases notifiable by laboratories adds *Escherichia coli* O157:H7 and *Cryptosporidium*. Increasing public health concern has focused on diseases caused by both agents. *Escherichia coli* O157:H7 has been associated with a large multistate outbreak and numerous food or water-related local outbreaks. In 1993, cryptosporidium-contaminated public water was related to the largest waterborne outbreak ever recorded in the United States. It is estimated that approximately 100 reports will be received annually by the addition of these two agents; therefore, costs to laboratories may increase slightly. Some of these additional costs may be passed on to consumers.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled public hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulatory action. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Corinne Miller, Bureau of Disease Control, Mills Building, Suite 602, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed regulatory action during the hearings. It may be necessary for participants to limit oral presentations to five minutes.

Copies of the proposed amendments and the economic impact statements may be obtained from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Disease Control, (913) 296-6215. Questions pertaining to these proposed amendments should be directed to Corinne Miller.
