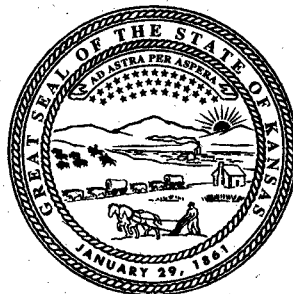

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, December 12, in the board room of the State Education Building, 120 S.E. 10th Ave., Topeka, to consider proposed changes in regulations numbered K.A.R. 91-12-22, 91-12-55 and 91-12-61.

The following is a summary of the substance of each proposed regulation and its anticipated economic impact. All of the proposed substantive changes are based upon federal requirements.

1. K.A.R. 91-12-22. This regulation contains definitions of the terms used in Article 12. Several of the proposed revisions are editorial in nature. However, substantive changes include adding definitions of "educational placement" and "supplemental aids and services." These definitions are currently in the State Plan for Special Education. The definitions of "assistive technology device," "autism," and "behavior disorder" are revised to conform with federal regulations. "Mental retardation" is revised to be in conformity with the most current definition from the American Association on Mental Deficiency, which focuses on limitations in two or more adaptive skill areas. Also, the definitions of the various methods of delivering services are changed to reflect guidelines from the state plan which have been followed by districts for quite some time.

There will be no economic impact upon the State Department of Education or upon school districts, private businesses or individuals.

2. K.A.R. 91-12-55. The proposed revision in (a)(3) clarifies that consideration must be given to the need for a mental health evaluation. The revision in (b) removes reference to an application for part-time homebound or hospital instruction. Such applications are no longer required.

There will be no economic impact upon the State Department of Education or upon school districts, private businesses or individuals.

3. K.A.R. 91-12-61. The proposed regulation specifies the requirements for persons employed as paraprofessionals. Also, the proposed revisions delete the specification of a prescribed number of paraprofessionals that can be supervised by a special teacher, require each local education agency to have a plan for paraprofessional inservice training on file, require 20 hours of inservice per year, and allow up to five clock hours of on-the-job learning experiences.

There will be no economic impact upon the State Department of Education or upon other governmental agencies, private businesses or individuals.

A copy of each of the proposed regulations and complete economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting the secretary of the State Board of Education at the address above prior to the date of the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and

may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Lanny Gaston at (913) 296-3906, or (913) 296-8172 (TDD).

All interested persons will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views, either orally or in writing, in regard to the proposed regulations. In addition, the period of public notice hereby provided constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Such written comments may be submitted to the secretary of the State Board of Education. The hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures of the State Board of Education.

Notice Concerning Kansas Water Pollution Control Permits

In accordance with state regulations 28-16-57 through 63, 28-18-1 through 4, and the authority vested with the state by the administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, tentative permits have been prepared for discharges to the waters of the United States and the state of Kansas for the applicants described below. The tentative determinations for permit content are based on preliminary staff review, applying the appropriate standards, regulations, and effluent limitations of the state of Kansas and the EPA, and when issued will result in a state water pollution control permit and national pollutant discharge elimination system authorization to discharge subject to certain effluent limitations and special conditions.

The feedlot has capacity for approximately 950 cattle and a contributing drainage area of approximately 9.3 acres. This is a new facility.

Runoff Control Facilities: Feedlot runoff from 5.85 acres is impounded for subsequent application to agricultural land for beneficial use. Feedlot runoff from 3.5 acres is impounded in a settling basin and released to a grass infiltration area 12,600 ft² in size.

Wastewater storage capacity is provided in excess of 2.75 acre-feet.

Compliance Schedule: The waste management plan developed by the designer and approved by the department shall be adhered to as a condition of this permit. The plan calls for nutrient analysis of both liquids and solids with applications to meet crop nutrient needs. If wastes are not analyzed for nutrient content, wastewater shall be applied at not greater than 3.0 acre inch per acre per year and solids shall be applied at not greater than 5.0 ton per acre.

Annually during April, soil in the grass (waterway) shall be sampled and analyzed for: nitrate-nitrogen, ammonia-nitrogen, Kjeld-

dahl-nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium. A minimum of 10 probes to a depth of two feet shall be taken uniformly spaced across the filter width at the mid-point of the filter length. The resulting soil cores shall be thoroughly mixed for a single, composite soil sample and sent to a reputable soil testing laboratory. The results of the soil test shall be submitted by May 10 to: Industrial Programs Section, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, 66620. Should the soil test show plant-available nitrogen to exceed 250 pounds of nitrogen per acre, modifications to the runoff pollution control system will be required.

There will be a public comment period at the beginning of the evening meeting for any issues not on the agenda and additional comment periods will be available during the meeting on agenda items.

A workshop meeting on business of the Wildlife and Parks Commission will begin at 1:30 p.m. November 16 at the location listed above. The public also will be given the opportunity to comment on any non-agenda items at the beginning of the meeting, and on agenda items during the afternoon meeting. The meeting will recess at 5 p.m., then resume at 7 p.m. at the same location for the regulatory hearing. Old and new business also may be discussed at this time. If necessary to complete the hearing or other business matters, the commission will reconvene at 9 a.m. November 17 at the same location.

If notified in advance, the department will have an interpreter available for the hard of hearing. To contact the department for this or any other reason, members of the public with a hearing impairment may call the TDD service at 1-800-766-3777. All public meeting areas are accessible to those who are physically disabled.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for approving, amending and approving, or rejecting the proposed regulations.

The exempt regulations to be heard during the regulatory hearing portion of the meeting are as follows:

K.A.R. 115-25-6. Turkey, spring season, bag limit, permits and game tags. This exempt regulation establishes the 1996 spring turkey season, bag limits, hunting units, permit numbers, game tags and the application process.

Economic Impact Summary: It is estimated that 21,000 permits and 6,800 game tags would be issued, resulting in department revenue of approximately \$448,000. Approximately 148,000 recreational days would occur.

K.A.R. 115-25-14. Fishing; creel limit, size limit, possession limit and open season. This exempt regulation

establishes fishing seasons and limits. Two additional bodies of water are recommended for trout fishing.

Economic Impact Summary: It is estimated that 300 trout permits would be issued, resulting in department revenue of \$2,250. Additional trout fishing opportunity would be provided to those individuals wishing to participate.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 16.—TRAVEL REIMBURSEMENT

1-16-18. Subsistence allowance; rates. (a) General provisions.

(1) Except as otherwise specifically provided by law, subsistence allowances for in-state and out-of-state travel shall be paid on the basis of a quarter-day rate for meal expenses and the actual cost of lodging expenses incurred, within the lodging expense limits set forth in this regulation. The subsistence rates for meal expenses shall be paid on a per diem basis at the appropriate rate for any fraction of a quarter-day in which the official travel begins and for each full quarter-day thereafter. For purposes of this regulation, a day shall commence at 12:01 a.m. No quarter-day allowance shall be paid for any fractional quarter-day in which the traveler returns to the traveler's official station or domicile. As used in this regulation, "international travel" means travel outside the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

(2) Reimbursement for lodging shall be made on the basis of actual single-rate lodging expenses incurred, including taxes, and shall be supported by the original official receipt of the lodging place or other suitable documentation. Reimbursement for lodging expenses shall be limited to the lodging place's lowest available rate for normal single occupancy on the day or days the lodging expense was incurred.

(3) Subject to the approval of the secretary of administration, the director of accounts and reports may designate any city in a state bordering or near Kansas as a "border city." All meals allowances and lodging expense limitations shall be at the appropriate in-state rate for travel by state personnel to a border city.

(b) Meals allowance. The quarter-day meals allowance shall be:

(1) In-state	\$5.75
(2) Out-of-state	\$6.75
(3) Designated high cost geographic area— out-of-state	\$7.25
(4) Borough of Manhattan and the District of Columbia	\$9.50
(5) International travel	\$9.50

An exception to the quarter-day meal allowance for international travel may be made at the option of each agency by claiming actual expenses, subject to a daily limitation of \$70 for meals.

(c) Lodging expense limitations. The lodging expense limitations shall be:

(1) In-state, exclusive of designated high cost geographic areas	\$ 50.00
(2) In-state, designated high cost geographic area	\$ 63.00
(3) Out-of-state, exclusive of designated high cost geographic areas	\$ 76.00
(4) Out-of-state, designated high cost geographic area	\$110.00
(5) Borough of Manhattan and the District of Columbia	\$121.00
(6) International travel	actual

Specific exceptions to the dollar limitation on lodging expenses may be made pursuant to provisions in K.S.A. 75-3207a and amendments thereto.

(d) If the cost of meals is included within the cost of registration fees or other fees and charges paid by the agency or supplied without cost by another party, the meal expenses shall be reduced as follows:

(1) In-state travel:	Amount

(B) For each lunch provided	\$ 6.25

(2) Out-of-state travel:

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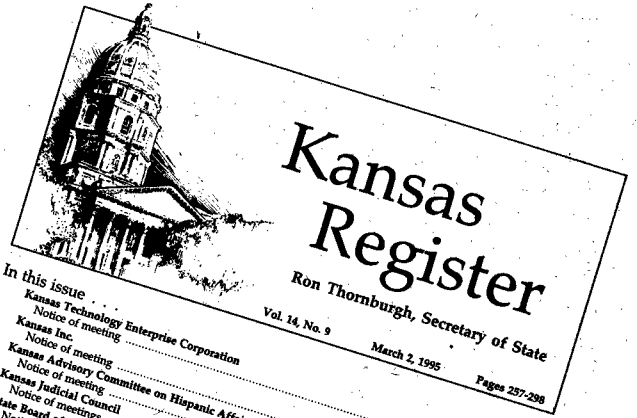
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
