Social and Rehabilitation Services**Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Tuesday, February 6, in the SRS Staff Development, 300 S.W. Oakley, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in an existing rule and regulation on a permanent basis effective March 1, 1996.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Hope Burns, Social and Rehabilitation Services, Office of the Secretary, Room 603-N, Docking State Office Building, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes. Telephone hook-ups will not be provided.

Copies of the regulation and its economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting Hope Burns, (913) 296-3271.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Hope Burns or by calling the Kansas Relay Center at 1-800-766-3777.

The adoption of the March 1, 1996, permanent regulation will take place at 10 a.m. Wednesday, February 7, in the SRS executive conference room, 603-N, Docking State Office Building. Teleconference will not be available.

A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

Article 10.—ADULT CARE HOME PROGRAM

30-10-218. ICF-MR non-reimbursable costs. This regulation is being amended to require approval by the Community Developmental Disability Organization (CDDO) assigned by SRS for an individual's admission into a private ICF/MR, if payment through the Medicaid program is requested. If admission occurs without the CDDO's approval, no payment will be made.

Economic Impact: The amendment will not require any additional state general funds.

Bearer of Costs: Any additional costs will be incurred by the CDDO, which will be reimbursed for activities conducted under the Targeted Case Management certified match program.

Affected Parties:

1. Persons with mental retardation/developmental disabilities (MR/DD) will be made aware of noninstitutional services which could meet their needs in their home area.

2. CDDOs will have additional responsibilities to ensure that persons with MR/DD receive appropriate services. These responsibilities have been given to the CCDOs by HB 2458.
3. ICFs/MR will need to obtain approval from the responsible CDDO prior to admitting an individual into their facility in order to receive payment through the Medicaid program.

Other Methods: This regulation is being submitted because HB 2458, passed by the 1995 Kansas Legislature and signed by the Governor, assigns the CDDO as the single point of application for referral for services.

RegulationsArticle 21.—KANSAS BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION
DNA DATABANK

10-21-1. Definitions. As used in this article, the following terms shall have the meanings specified below:

(a) "CODIS" (Combined DNA index system) means the federal bureau of investigation's (FBI) national DNA identification index system that allows the storage and exchange of DNA records submitted by state and local forensic DNA laboratories.

(b) "Convicted offender" means a person 18 years of age or older who does an act which constitutes the commission of one of the crimes listed in K.S.A. 21-2511(a) and amendments thereto and is convicted by a court.

(c) "DNA" means deoxyribonucleic acid. DNA is located in the nucleus of cells and provides an individual's personal genetic blueprint. DNA encodes genetic information that is the basis of human heredity and forensic identification.

(d) "DNA" analysis" means the process through which DNA in a human biological specimen is analyzed and compared with DNA from another human biological specimen for identification purposes.

(e) "DNA databank" means the repository of DNA samples collected under the provisions of K.S.A. 21-2511 and amendments thereto.

(f) "DNA database" means the Kansas bureau of investigation's (KBI) DNA identification record system. It is administered by the KBI and provides DNA records to the FBI for storage and maintenance in CODIS. The KBI's DNA database system is computer software and procedures administered by the KBI, to store and maintain DNA records regarding forensic casework, certain convicted offenders, juvenile offenders and DNA records used for research or quality control.

(g) "DNA record" means the DNA identification information stored in the state DNA database or CODIS. The DNA record is the result obtained from the DNA analysis tests. The DNA record is comprised of the characteristics of a DNA sample which are of value in establishing the identity of individuals. The results of all DNA identification tests on an individual's DNA sample are also collectively referred to as the DNA profile of an individual.

(h) "DNA sample" means blood and saliva samples provided by any convicted offender or juvenile offender, or submitted to the KBI laboratory for analysis pursuant to a criminal investigation.

(i) "FBI" means the federal bureau of investigation.

(j) "Genetic marker" means a genetically-determined trait which is subject to accurate classification and whose inheritance is usually unequivocal.

(k) "Juvenile offender" means a person who:

(1) is 10 or more years of age, but less than 18 years of age;

(2) does an act while a juvenile which, if done by an adult, would constitute the commission of one of the

crimes listed in K.S.A. 21-2511(a) and amendments thereto; and

(3) is adjudicated by a court.

(l) "KBI" means the Kansas bureau of investigation.

(m) "Law enforcement" means those law enforcement officers and agencies authorized to receive information under K.S.A. 21-2511(f) and amendments thereto. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 21-2511; effective Dec. 22, 1995.)

10-21-2. Purpose of DNA identification. The DNA databank shall be utilized only for the following purposes:

(a) For identifying suspects in criminal investigations;

(b) for locating missing persons;

(c) for identifying unknown human remains;

(d) for a population statistic database, when personal identifiable information is removed.

(e) for research, protocol development and quality control, when personal identifiable information is removed. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 21-2511; effective Dec. 22, 1995.)

10-21-3. Procedural compatibility with the FBI. (a) The DNA identification system as established by the KBI shall be compatible with the procedures specified by the FBI, including use of comparable test procedures, laboratory equipment, supplies, and computer software.

(b) DNA samples shall be received by the KBI for the purpose of storage or analysis. The DNA typing analysis may be conducted under contract with the KBI by a qualified DNA laboratory that meets KBI procedural guidelines.

(1) Each DNA record of an identification characteristic profile submitted pursuant to K.S.A. 21-2511 and amendments thereto shall be classified and filed by the KBI and such information available for use as provided in this article.

(2) The DNA profile of individuals in the state database shall be made available to local, state, or federal law enforcement agencies, approved crime laboratories which serve these agencies, or the county or district attorney's office in furtherance of an official investigation of a criminal offense.

(c) A separate population database comprised of blood samples obtained pursuant to K.S.A. 21-2511 and amendments thereto shall be created by the KBI after all personal identification is removed.

(1) The KBI's population databases may be shared with or disseminated to other law enforcement agencies, crime laboratories that serve them, or other third parties the KBI deems necessary to assist the KBI with statistical analysis of the KBI's population database.

(2) The population database may be made available to and searched by other agencies participating in the CODIS system. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 21-2511; effective Dec. 22, 1995.)

10-21-4. Expungement. (a) Any person whose DNA record or profile has been included in the DNA database and whose DNA sample is stored in the databank may apply for expungement on the grounds that:

(1) the felony conviction that resulted in the inclusion of the person's DNA record or profile in the database or

the inclusion of the person's DNA sample in the databank has been reversed or dismissed; or

(2) the person has been acquitted on re-trial.

(b) The person, either individually or through an attorney, may make application to the KBI for expungement of the record. The written application for expungement shall be on a form approved by the KBI and shall include the person's:

- (1) Name;
- (2) date of birth;
- (3) sex;
- (4) race;
- (5) place of birth, including city and state;
- (6) district court case number and county; and
- (7) offense or offenses.

(c) The application shall be forwarded to the KBI along with a certified copy of the final order of reversal, dismissal or acquittal, which shall be attached to the application for expungement.

(d) When an application for expungement is submitted, the record contained in the state's DNA databank and database shall be reviewed by the KBI to confirm the existence of the record and the identity of the contributor. The DNA record and all other identifiable information shall be purged from the database and the DNA sample stored in the databank shall be purged when it appears the contributor no longer meets the requirements to submit blood and saliva pursuant to K.S.A. 21-2511 and amendments thereto.

(e) If the individual has more than one offense which requires submission of blood and saliva samples to the state database, databank, and CODIS, if applicable, then only the offense covered by the expungement shall be expunged.

(f) Thereafter, the expunged contributor shall be treated as not having had a record in the DNA database and databank or CODIS for that offense.

(g) Upon receiving information regarding a contributor, a record may be expunged by the KBI on its own initiative pursuant to this article.

(h) The Kansas department of corrections shall be notified by the KBI when the record of any inmate who has contributed DNA while housed with the department of corrections is expunged. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 21-2511; effective Dec. 22, 1995.)

10-21-5. Maintenance. (a) All genetic marker grouping analysis information maintained at the KBI shall be treated as confidential as provided in K.S.A. 21-2511(f) and amendments thereto.

(b) A criminal defendant's rights to access DNA testing information during the course of a criminal case shall be governed by existing rules of discovery of scientific evidence in criminal cases.

(c) All genetic marker grouping analysis information obtained by the KBI shall be maintained, preserved and securely stored at the KBI for an indefinite period of time and in any event not less than 10 years. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 21-2511; effective Dec. 22, 1995.)

10-21-6. Collection of samples for DNA databank procedures. (a) The collection, labeling, storage, han-

dling, preservation, and shipment of blood and saliva samples obtained from convicted felons pursuant to K.S.A. 21-2511 and amendments thereto, for the DNA databank shall be in conformance with the "DNA collection kit" directions as prepared by the KBI and last revised in June, 1995. Copies of the applicable protocol may be obtained from the KBI DNA laboratory.

(b) Each offender shall be positively identified using photo identification prior to taking the blood and saliva samples.

(c) When the offender is positively identified, two blood samples and one saliva sample shall be taken from the offender in a reasonable manner according to generally accepted medical practices.

(d) Such samples shall be taken using only the DNA sample collection kit provided by the KBI.

(e)(1) The DNA information sheet provided in the collection kit shall be completed, providing all relevant information requested on the form.

(2) The offender's left and right thumbs shall be imprinted by means of an inked impression in the spaces indicated on the form.

(3) The person taking the blood and saliva samples and one other witness shall complete and sign, as indicated on the form, a verification that two blood samples and one saliva sample were taken from the positively identified offender. Additional supplies may be obtained from the KBI DNA laboratory.

(f) All samples so collected shall be transmitted within 7 hours of collection to the KBI in the manner prescribed in such instructions.

(g) Results from DNA identifications made from blood and saliva samples obtained from convicted felons under K.S.A. 21-2511 shall be submitted to the KBI and entered into the DNA databank.

(h) Each convicted offender or juvenile offender placed on probation and required to provide blood and saliva samples shall provide such samples within 10 days after sentencing or disposition.

(1) Court services officers or community corrections officers shall facilitate the collection of DNA samples.

(2) The offender may have the DNA sample collection kit completed at any public health agency, clinic, hospital or any other facility with persons qualified to draw blood as provided in K.S.A. 21-2511 and amendments thereto.

(i) Each convicted offender sentenced to the custody of the secretary of corrections or any juvenile offender placed in a youth residential facility or in a state youth center shall provide such samples upon arrival. The department of corrections and SRS, as appropriate, shall facilitate the collection of DNA samples.

(j) Each convicted offender or juvenile offender who is currently incarcerated and required to provide blood and saliva samples shall provide such samples prior to release, discharge or parole.

(k) Each convicted offender or juvenile offender who is paroled and required to provide blood and saliva samples shall provide such samples within 10 days of being paroled.

(1) Parole officers shall facilitate the collection of DNA samples.

(2) The offender may have the DNA sample collection kit completed at any public health agency, clinic, hospital or any other facility with persons qualified to draw blood as provided in K.S.A. 21-2511 and amendments thereto.

(l) Each convicted offender or juvenile offender placed on probation, parole, community corrections or in SRS custody may have the blood sample collection kit completed at any public health agency, clinic, hospital or any other facility with persons qualified to draw blood as provided in K.S.A. 21-2511 and amendments thereto.

(m) Any convicted offender or juvenile offender sentenced or receiving a disposition to a term of incarceration in the county jail and required to provide blood and saliva samples shall provide such samples upon arrival.

(n) When a convicted offender or juvenile offender is placed on probation, parole, community corrections or in SRS custody, any cost or fee associated with collection of the DNA sample shall be paid by the offender. Article 10.—ANIMAL HEALTH

112-10-38. Vaccinations. (a) Every greyhound at a racing facility shall be periodically vaccinated against each disease that the animal health officer has determined is communicable to other greyhounds at the facility.

(1) The racing secretary shall maintain records of vaccinations of each greyhound housed at the racing facility and shall make such records available to the animal health officer or the animal health officer's designee upon request.

(2) No licensee may permit a greyhound to enter its grounds unless the trainer or kennel owner of the greyhound provides proof of the necessary vaccinations to the racing secretary.

(3) The record of each vaccination series shall be signed by the licensed veterinarian administering the vaccine and shall include the vaccine's trade name and expiration date.

(b) Every greyhound kenneled at a racing facility shall be vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian. Every three months the trainer or kennel owner and the racing secretary's office shall review the rabies vaccination file for each animal and shall provide to the animal health officer a list of animals whose immunity will expire during the upcoming quarter. Said animals shall receive booster vaccinations on an annual basis.

(c) Every trainer or kennel owner bringing a greyhound into a racing facility shall immediately file with the racing secretary for each greyhound a copy of its registration certificate and an individual certificate of identification which shall include:

- (1) the name of the animal;
- (2) the sex of the animal;
- (3) the date of birth of the animal;
- (4) the place of birth of the animal;
- (5) a complete history of rabies vaccinations; and
- (6) a description of any and all kennel identification including:
 - (A) tattoos;
 - (B) tags;
 - (C) color; and
 - (D) markings.

(d) The certificate required by subsection (c) above shall be filed with the racing secretary a minimum of 72 hours prior to any start made by the animal and shall remain on permanent file with the secretary.

(e) All dogs entering Kansas, regardless of the state or country in which they were whelped, shall be accompanied by a small animal health certificate issued by the division of animal health of the state or country of departure. This certificate shall list:

- (1) the names of both the consignor and the consignee;
- (2) both addresses;
- (3) the name and age of the dog; and
- (4) its rabies vaccination status which shall be signed by a veterinarian and shall include the vaccine's trade name and expiration date.

The certificate shall be dated within 30 days prior to arrival in Kansas.

(f) Young dogs prior to racing shall be in full compliance with this regulation at the time of their first entry-level schooling session at a racing facility. (Authorized by 1994 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 74-8806; effective Dec. 22, 1995.)

Article 12.—KANSAS HORSE BREEDING DEVELOPMENT FUND

112-12-14. Registration of Arabian, Appaloosa, Paint and Standardbred horses. (a) Any Arabian, Appaloosa, Paint or Standardbred horse may be registered into the Kansas bred program if the horse is:

- (1) registered with a national breed association; and
- (2) owned wholly or in part by a resident of Kansas as defined by these racing regulations, or leased by a resident of Kansas as defined by these racing regulations, and the lease is effective throughout the time the horse is registered as a Kansas-bred horse. Horses leased from non-resident owners shall not be eligible to race for funds to be paid out of the Kansas horse breeding development fund.

(b) Each person who intends to register a horse under this regulation shall:

- (1) file an application for registration with the official registering agency on or before December 31, 1995, on forms approved by the commission;
- (2) file with the official registering agency evidence of ownership including:
 - (A) bills of sale;
 - (B) the official breed registration certificate issued by the national breed association; and
 - (C) contracts or other documents that demonstrate proof of ownership and reflect all agreements concerning

breeding rights, repurchase and any other terms and conditions;

(3) pay the \$50.00 fee for registering each horse under this regulation; and

(4) make each horse registered under this regulation available at any reasonable time for inspection by representatives of the official registering agency. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 74-8804 and implementing K.S.A. 74-8830; effective, T-112-6-16-94, June 16, 1994; effective Sept. 6, 1994; amended Dec. 22, 1995.)

Article 16.—SIMPLIFIED HEARING PROCEDURES

112-16-14. Appeal, stewards' and racing judges' hearing. (a) Any order entered by the stewards or racing judges that imposes a fine or suspension shall be subject to appeal to the commission.

(b) Any respondent who wishes to appeal the stewards' or racing judges' order shall file a notice of appeal in the stewards' or racing judges' office during regular office hours within 10 days after service of the order from which the respondent is appealing.

(c) Every notice of appeal shall be fully executed by the respondent upon the form available in the stewards' or racing judges' office. Incomplete forms shall not be accepted by commission personnel.

(d) Every notice of appeal form shall include a statement that in reviewing any stewards' or racing judges' order the commission, or one or more commissioners designated by the commission, may exercise broad decision-making powers and that, in doing so, the commission, or one or more commissioners designated by the commission, may affirm, reverse, remand for further hearing, increase any penalty or otherwise modify the order. The commission, or one or more commissioners designated by the commission, may also conduct a new hearing and suspend or revoke an occupation license or impose a fine of \$5000 for each violation of the racing act or regulations, or both.

(e) Any respondent may be deemed to have filed a notice of appeal within 10 days after service of the stewards' or racing judges' order if the respondent:

(1) within the appeal time described in subsection (b) of this racing regulation, files a writing that states an intention to appeal the order and that includes substantially the same information elicited in the appeal form available in the stewards' or racing judges' office; and

(2) within a period of time authorized by the chief steward or racing judge, fully executes and files in the stewards' or racing judges' office the appeal form available in that office. Temporary Administrative Regulations

Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-2a. Accessibility. (a) Kansas lottery retailers shall meet program accessibility standards at each retailer location for disabled customers pursuant to title II of the Americans with disabilities act of 1990, 42 United States Code, §§12131-12134 (July 1, 1995), applicable federal rules (28 CFR §§35.149-35.151 (July 1, 1995)) and the Kansas architectural accessibility standards act. All Kansas lottery retailers shall comply with the requirements contained in K.A.R. 111-2-2a through 111-2-2e.

(b) Any Kansas lottery retailer failing to meet the accessibility requirements set forth in subsection (a) will be subject to the termination or suspension provisions of K.A.R. 111-2-14. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710, as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; effective, T-111-11-22-95, Nov. 17, 1995.)

111-2-2b. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to accessibility to retailer locations authorized by contract to sell Kansas lottery products:

(a) "Accessibility of the applicant's place of business to the public" means a location where a significant number of customers will frequent the business and will thereby be exposed to the availability of lottery games. It also means that a person with a disability will be able to purchase lottery products at that location.

(continued)

(b) "ADA" means the Americans with disabilities act of 1990, 42 United States Code, §§12101-12213 (July 1, 1995) and 47 United States Code, §225 and §611 (March 1, 1991).

(c) "KAASA" means the Kansas architectural accessibility standards act, K.S.A. 58-1301 *et seq.* (Furse 1994), and amendments thereto.

(d) "Applicant" means a person who has filed an application to become a lottery retailer, and includes existing lottery retailers who seek to renew their contract with the lottery.

(e) "Executive director" means the executive director of the Kansas lottery, or the person designated by the executive director.

(f) "Disability" with respect to an individual means a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of such individual; or, having had a record of such an impairment; or, being regarded as having such an impairment.

(g) "Enforcement authority" means the United States department of justice or other federal agency having jurisdiction pursuant to 28 C.F.R. §35.171, and the Kansas secretary of administration or the person or governmental entity designated pursuant to K.S.A. 58-1304 as being responsible for enforcement.

(h) "Lottery game" means any game established and operated by the Kansas lottery.

(i) "Lottery retailer facility" means a place which is operated by an applicant to become a lottery retailer, including all or any portion of buildings, structures, sites, complexes, equipment, walks, passageways, parking lots, or other real or personal property including the site where the building, property, structure, or equipment is located, to the extent used in the conduct of the sale of lottery products to the public.

(j) "Lottery retailer" or "retailer" means any person with whom the Kansas lottery has entered a contract authorizing the sale of Kansas lottery products to the public.

(k) "Lottery product" means a lottery ticket or other tangible evidence of participation used in lottery games or gaming systems. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710, as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; effective, T-111-11-22-95, Nov. 17, 1995.)

111-2-2c. General accessibility requirements. (a) Standard. The general standard for determining accessibility of lottery games to a disabled customer is the ability of that customer to buy a lottery ticket and/or to play a lottery game.

(b) Prohibition of discrimination. No lottery retailer shall discriminate against any individual on the basis of a disability in the full and equal enjoyment of lottery related goods, services, facilities, privileges, advantages, or accommodations of any authorized lottery facility.

(c) Integrated accessibility. A lottery retailer facility shall afford lottery related goods, services, facilities, privileges, advantages, and accommodations to any individual with a disability in the most integrated setting appropriate to the needs of the individual. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710, as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; effective, T-111-11-22-95, Nov. 17, 1995.)

111-2-2d. Contract issuance and renewal. When a person applies for, or seeks renewal of, a contract to sell

lottery products, the Kansas lottery will provide that person the "Retailer Statement of Compliance" checklist form to complete and submit to the lottery which will inquire about whether that person's business location complies with the ADA requirements for accessibility.

(a) Only persons whose checklist reflects compliance will be eligible for a contract or renewal of an existing contract.

(b) The Kansas lottery will not issue a new contract to a retailer who fails to satisfy the compliance requirements of the checklist.

(c) Any applicant initially failing to satisfy compliance requirements which modifies its premises or business operation to comply with ADA requirements may then reapply and complete a new "Retailer Statement of Compliance" form.

(d) Any former retailer who modifies the retailer premises to comply with ADA requirements, may then resubmit a new "Retailer Statement of Compliance" form. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710, as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; effective, T-111-11-22-95, Nov. 17, 1995.)

111-2-2e. Enforcement provisions. Enforcement of this provision shall be pursuant to the ADA and KAASA. If it is determined that a lottery retailer is not in compliance with the ADA, KAASA, and this rule, the retailer shall immediately report any notice of non-compliance from the enforcement authority to the lottery.

Upon receipt of notification of non-compliance from any source, the Kansas lottery shall determine the basis for non-compliance and require program compliance by the retailer. The lottery retailer is authorized to continue sales at the cited retail location for up to 60 days to allow it to get into compliance with the requirements of the ADA. If a cited lottery retailer fails to comply with the requirements of the ADA within 60 days, its lottery contract(s) shall be suspended or terminated by the executive director and no further lottery sales shall occur at the cited location until the retailer is determined to be in compliance. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710, as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; effective, T-111-11-22-95, Nov. 17, 1995.)

111-2-14. Termination or suspension of retailer certificate. (a) The executive director may terminate or suspend the certificate of any lottery retailer who fails to meet any of the applicable qualifying standards for selection as a retailer as provided for in the Kansas Lottery Act K.S.A. 75-8702 *et seq.* and amendments thereto or on the grounds for termination or suspension provided in the contract between a lottery retailer and the Kansas lottery, pursuant to rules and regulations adopted by the commission.

(b) The lottery may temporarily or permanently suspend this contract, without prior notice, if the executive director determines that immediate suspension is necessary in order to ensure the integrity, security, honesty or fairness of the operation of the lottery, or that an emergency exists which requires immediate suspension or termination of this contract and the retailer's certificate.

(c) Termination or suspension except as specified in subsection (b) shall be effective on a date specified by the

executive director, but shall be no sooner than 15 days from the date that delivery of notice of such termination or suspension.

(d) Written notice of termination or suspension shall be delivered to the retailer in person or by United States certified mail, return receipt requested, delivered to the retailer at the mailing address furnished to the lottery by the retailer. If the lottery is unable to obtain delivery at such address, then the notice shall be delivered to any employee or apparent agent or representative of the retailer or mailed to the retailer at the location authorized for the sale of tickets or the retailer's last known home address.

(e) Upon receipt of notice of termination or suspension, the retailer may request reconsideration of the termination or suspension action. Such request shall be in writing and shall include the legal and/or factual basis for reconsideration. Such request shall be addressed to the executive director and shall be delivered to the headquarters office of the lottery in Topeka, Kansas, no later than three days prior to the effective date of the termination or suspension, excluding Saturdays, Sundays and holidays.

(f) Upon the timely receipt of the retailer's request for reconsideration, the executive director shall consider and make a decision regarding such request. The executive director shall either proceed with the termination or suspension as originally specified, postpone the termination or suspension to a specified date pending further investigation and consideration, or cancel the termination or suspension. The executive director shall give the retailer written notice of the decision. If the executive director is unable to deliver such written notice to the retailer prior to the termination or suspension date originally specified, then the executive director shall also attempt to give verbal notice by telephone.

(g) If the retailer fails to receive notice of the decision of the executive director regarding the retailer's request for reconsideration prior to the effective date of termination or suspension as originally specified, the request is deemed to have been denied and the contract is terminated or the retailer's authorization to sell lottery products is suspended upon such effective date as specified in the notice.

(h) Upon termination of a lottery contract, the retailer shall immediately pay to the lottery any amounts owed to the lottery and shall surrender to the lottery the following:

- (1) The lottery retailer certificate issued by the lottery.
- (2) All lottery property.
- (3) All unexpired tickets, for which the retailer may be given credit.
- (4) All property provided for use by the lottery or by the retailer which is owned by a lottery vendor., (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-8170, as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; implementing K.S.A. 74-8708; effective, T-111-12-15-89, Dec. 8, 1989; amended, T-111-8-26-94, Aug. 19, 1994; amended, T-111-11-22-95, Nov. 17, 1995.)

111-4-792. Name of game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Hoops

Cash" commencing on or after December 19, 1995. The specific rules for the "Hoops Cash" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-792 through 111-4-795. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710, as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; effective, T-111-11-22-95, Nov. 17, 1995.)

111-4-793. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Hoops Cash" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the numbered game symbols are printed in black ink in 10 point WGI font with matching captions in WGI Cap font. Game symbols appearing in the "FREE THROW" play area will be imaged in 15 point WGI font. A game symbol appears in each of seven play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: 60 - 61 - 62 - 63 - 64 - 65 - 66 - 67 - 68 - 69 - 70 - 71 - 72 - 73 - 74 - 75 - 76 - 77 - 78 - 79 - 80 - 81 - 82 - 83 - 84 - 85 - image of a basketball - image of a shirt - image of a whistle - image of a basketball goal - \$1.⁰⁰ - \$5.⁰⁰ - 10.00 - \$500\$ - \$1500.

(b) "Game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The game symbol caption associated with each game symbol is as follows:

(c) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is an 11-digit number which appears on the front of each instant ticket and will be covered by latex.

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the back of each instant game ticket both above the information form on the back of the ticket and below the bar code.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three letter code printed and appearing in two of six varying locations among the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: ONE = \$1.00; TWO = \$2.00; THR = \$3.00; FIV = \$5.00; TEN = \$10.00; FTN = \$15.00; TRY = \$30.00; FHN = \$500.00.

(f) "Bar code" means the 16-digit bar-coded number appearing on the back of each ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710, as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; effective, T-111-11-22-95, Nov. 17, 1995.)

111-4-794. Determination of instant prize winners. An instant prize winner is determined in this "beat their score" instant game when the player "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the three separate games, each containing a "YOUR SCORE" area, a "THEIR SCORE" area, and a "PRIZE" area for each game, plus a bonus "FREE THROW" area. A solid line is imaged between "Game 1" and "Game 2" and between "Game 2" and "Game 3." "YOUR SCORE" and "THEIR SCORE" in "Game 1," "Game 2," and "Game 3" relate to each specific game only and not to either of the other two games. A player can win up to three times on a single ticket. If "YOUR SCORE" is higher than "THEIR SCORE" in a single game, the player wins the dollar amount shown in the prize area for that game. If the image of a basketball symbol appears in the "FREE THROW" area, the player wins \$5.00. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-8710(b), (c) and (i), as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; implementing K.S.A. 74-8710(b), (c) and (i), as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1, and 74-8720(b) and (d); effective, T-111-11-22-95, Nov. 17, 1995.)

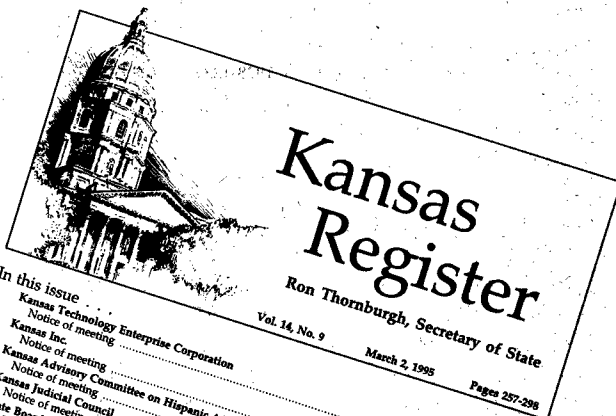
