The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. Anadarko Gathering Company has applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300 to install and operate five compressor engines and one glycol dehydrator unit. Emissions of NOx, CO, VOCs and HAPs were evaluated during the permit review process.

Anadarko Gathering Company, Liberal, owns and operates the stationary source located at SE ¼ of Sec. 27, T34S, R 38W in Stevens County, at which the compressor engines and glycol dehydrator units are to be installed and operated.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting nonconfidential documentation and all information relied upon during the permit application review process is available for public review during normal business hours at the KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, and at the KDHE southwest district office, 302 W. Notice Concerning Variance Request from
Hazardous Waste Regulations

The Department of Health and Environment is providing public notice that on October 26, 1995, General Electric Aircraft Engine Maintenance Center, located at Strother Field Industrial Park in Arkansas City, submitted a request for a variance from specific hazardous waste regulations in accordance with K.A.R. 28-31-13(a).

The variance is requested from K.A.R. 28-31-4(j), which allows a Kansas or Environmental Protection Agency generator to accumulate as much as 55 gallons of each type of hazardous waste in not more than one container at or near any point of generation where waste initially accumulates and which is under the control of the operator of the process generating the waste.

General Electric generates spent fluorescent bulbs. The past few years General Electric has been investigating better and safer ways of handling spent bulbs. General Electric has found a company that manufactures fibre drums specifically for 4 ft. and 8 ft. spent fluorescent bulbs. These drums exceed the 55-gallon satellite container limit; however, General Electric believes that the fibre drums will make it both safer and easier to handle and accumulate the spent bulbs. KDHE has reviewed the variance request and concluded that the variance is justified.

In accordance with K.A.R. 28-31-13(b), public notice was provided that KDHE considered the request for a variance justified and made a tentative decision to grant the variance. A public comment period to receive comments regarding this tentative decision was established between November 27 and December 27, 1995. No public comments were received.

Therefore, in accordance with K.A.R. 28-31-13(b), the Kansas Department of Health and Environment announces its decision to approve this request for a variance and not to include any special conditions. The variance shall become effective January 11, 1996, and shall remain in effect until January 11, 2003.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Monday, March 4, in Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed rule and regulation of the Department of Administration, Division of Accounts and Reports.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Administration, Room 263-E, State Capitol, 300 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Faith Loretto at (913) 296-6000 [TTY (913) 296-4798]. Handicapped parking is located on the south end of Landon State Office Building, and the north entrance to the building is accessible.

A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 1-16-18a. Designated high cost geographic areas. This regulation is amended to update the list of high cost geographic areas which qualify for higher subsistence reimbursement rates pursuant to K.A.R. 1-16-18. In some instances, areas which are currently listed are no longer high cost geographic areas due to a study of current lodging rates and the increase in normal subsistence rates which took effect at the beginning of this fiscal year. Four areas are added to the list and 11 are deleted. Any increase in travel costs due to the additions to the high cost geographic area listing must be managed within existing agency resources.

In addition to updating the list of high cost geographic areas, a new subsection is proposed which would provide, under certain circumstances, for temporary designation of a high cost geographic area for travel associated with a conference or similar meeting. When an employee attends a conference in an area which is not designated as a high cost area, the location may be designated by the Secretary of Administration as a high cost area on a temporary basis if the conference is held in connection with a lodging establishment with rates which exceed applicable lodging expense limitations. The temporary high cost area designation would be effective only for the duration of the conference and would apply only to those state employees who are attending the conference.

Conferences are frequently held at a lodging establishment and offered as a "package rate." Currently, state

employees and their managers must decide whether the employee will stay at the lodging establishment, with the employee absorbing lodging costs to the extent the rate exceeds the applicable lodging maximums, or whether the employee will stay at another location and commute to the conference.

When a temporary high cost geographic area is requested and approved, the agency will reimburse the employee for the higher lodging expenses incurred on that trip; therefore, affected employees will benefit from reimbursement rates which more closely reflect the actual cost of travel. The higher rate may, in some instances, be partially or fully offset by savings in commuting costs. Because the proposed amendment is discretionary, it would provide flexibility to agency managers and employees while maintaining their responsibility to prudently use state funds in an environment of limited financial resources; therefore, no increase in state agency travel expenditures is anticipated. In addition, approval by the Secretary of Administration will permit oversight and provide a means to better gauge the effectiveness of this provision. No economic impact on the general public is anticipated.

The Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (the code) imposes requirements on the county which must be met subsequent to the issuance of the bonds by the county and, as a result, the county will and does hereby covenant that it will diligently undertake those steps necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the bonds. The county's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the county's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted current earnings of certain corporations in the calculation of alternative min-

imum taxable income with certain other adjustments. Furthermore, Section 59A of the code, as added by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, provides for an environmental tax generally based on corporate alternative minimum taxable income. The amount of the tax is equal to 0.12 percent of the excess of alternative minimum taxable income, without regard to net operating losses and the deduction for this tax, over \$2 million. The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the taxpayer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies to reduce the amount of their deductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on such obligations. With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds. The county does intend to designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the county, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the county with the provisions of the resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is exempt from federal income taxation. Article 4.—PUBLIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

30-4-85a. Eligibility factors specific to the emergency assistance program. Each applicant or recipient shall meet the following eligibility requirements to be eligible for emergency assistance. (a) General eligibility requirements. Each applicant or recipient shall meet the general eligibility requirements set forth in K.A.R. 30-4-55(a) and K.A.R. 30-4-59.

(b) Living in the state. Each applicant or recipient shall be physically living in the state.

(c) Emergency situation. A bona fide emergency situation shall exist.

(1) Emergency situations shall be limited to:

(A) Abuse, neglect or abandonment of children; or

(B) situations resulting in imminent risk of loss of custody or institutionalization of children.

(2) An application shall be made within 30 days of the emergency situation.

(d) Financial eligibility. The household of each applicant or recipient shall be without sufficient resources to provide needed emergency care of services.

(e) Household eligibility. A household shall be defined as a family group in which at least one child is:

(1) Under the age of 18, or under the age of 19 and a full-time student in a secondary school or the equivalent level of vocational or technical training if the child may reasonably be expected to complete the program before attaining age 19;

(2) living in the household, or who was living in that household within six months before the month in which assistance is requested. That household shall be maintained as the child's home by any of the relatives set forth in K.A.R. 30-4-72(c); and

(3) not in destitution or need because the child or a member of the household refused, without good cause, to accept employment or training for employment.

(f) Authorization period. Assistance authorization under emergency assistance shall be limited to one period of 30 consecutive days, following the date of approval, in any 12 consecutive months.

(g) Assistance provided. The assistance provided shall be limited to a maximum of 364 days of service or less in a 12-month period as necessary to alleviate the emergency condition. The need shall be directly related to the immediate emergency and shall be met in order to resolve the emergency. The assistance provided shall be given promptly and pursuant to K.A.R. 30-4-122a.

(h) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 31, 1996. 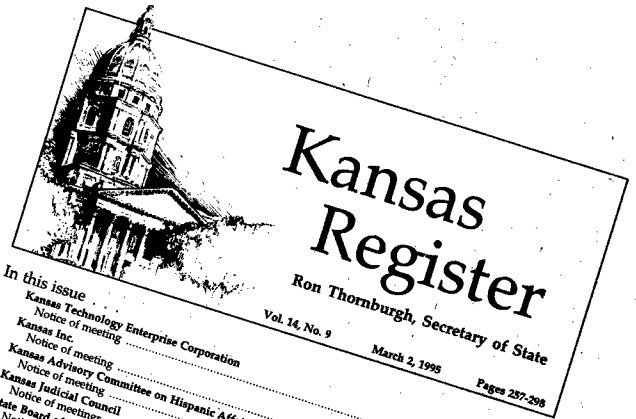
