Notice of Available Funding for Federal S.T.O.P. Violence Against Women Grant Program

A total of \$426,364 is available from the 1995 Federal S.T.O.P. Violence Against Women Formula Grant Program. Funds are available to distribute to law enforcement, prosecutors/courts, victim service programs and for discretionary purposes to address violent crimes against women. Twenty-five percent of the grant amount will be allocated without duplication in each of the following three areas: law enforcement, prosecution/courts and victim service programs. These funds are to be used to train law enforcement officers, prosecutors, judges, court service personnel, parole officers and victim service providers.

The remaining 25 percent discretionary money will be used for the following purposes: (1) establishment of a statewide 800 number for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, (2) training of medical personnel and upgrading medical equipment to recognize, assess and assist victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in medical settings, and (3) to conduct a feasibility study in regard to developing a statewide registry for protection from abuse orders and restraining orders.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Friday, March 15, in Conference Room 106 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the following proposed revocations of existing regulations:

Article 1.—Disease

28-1-9. This regulation outlines measures for control of staphylococcal disease in newborn nurseries.

28-1-10. This regulation contains measures for control of epidemic diarrhea in hospitals affecting newborns.

28-1-19. This regulation was first adopted in 1977 to carry out the provisions of K.S.A. 65-116j. It addresses the duties of the secretary regarding admissions of persons with tuberculosis to medical care facilities.

28-1-21. This regulation notifies KDHE of Agent Or-

ange claims.

28-1-22. This regulation contains reporting of HIV infection and AIDS. This regulation is a companion to K.S.A. 65-6002 and contains many redundancies.

There is no economic impact on KDHE, any other governmental agency or unit, private citizen or consumer as a result of these revocations.

Article 3.—Hearings

28-3-5. This regulation refers to deviation concerning hearing proceedings that differ from that of Article 3. The authorizing statute, K.S.A. 74-901e, was repealed in 1974. This regulation is obsolete.

28-3-6. Conduct of hearings under the Kansas Administrative Procedure Act. K.S.A. 77-503 states when KAPA applies, the procedures are set forth in K.S.A. 77-501 et seq.

There is no economic impact on KDHE, any other governmental agency or unit, private citizen or consumer as a result of these revocations.

Article 4.—Maternal and Child Health

28-4-72. This regulation requires posting of occupancy limits of nurseries. This is a duplication of K.S.A. 65-504.

28-4-431. This regulation contains the training required for staff members regarding safety procedures for children in emergencies. This regulation is a duplication of K.A.R. 28-1-128.

28-4-506. Laboratory procedures; screening of newborn infants. This regulation relates to the specimens that are tested by laboratories, quality control practices, laboratory test results and maintenance.

28-4-507. Laboratory reporting; screening of newborn infants. This regulation deals with reporting the results.

28-4-508. This regulation contains the procedures for follow-up for abnormal test results; and closure of records.

There is no economic impact on KDHE, any other governmental agency or unit, private citizen or consumer as a result of these revocations.

Article 5.—Sewage and Excreta Disposal

28-5-8. Construction of seepage pits. This regulation sets forth design standards for use in seepage pits as a means of disposing septic tank effluent. Seepage pits are not considered an effective means of protecting groundwater from pollution. KDHE plans to amend K.A.R. 28-5-7 by deleting paragraph (3) referring to seepage pits.

There is no economic impact on KDHE, any other governmental agency or unit, private citizen or consumer as a result of this revocation.

Article 6.—Common Drinking Cup; Common Towel

28-6-1. Abolition of the common drinking cup. 28-6-2. Abolition of the common towel.

These regulations were retained for historic reasons, because they were championed by Dr. Crumbine in the early 1900s as a means of controlling communicable disease. These regulations are obsolete.

There is no economic impact on KDHE, any other governmental agency or unit, private citizen or consumer as a result of these revocations.

Article 7.—Sterilization of Public Food and Drinking Utensils

28-7-1 through 28-7-9. Sterilization of public food and drinking utensils. These regulations are duplicated in K.A.R. 28-36-20 through 28-36-29, food service establishments.

There is no economic impact on KDHE, any other governmental agency or unit, private citizen or consumer as a result of these revocations.

Article 8.—Home Health Fee Schedule

28-8-1. Sliding fee schedule for home nursing care service. This regulation is no longer used and is obsolete.

There is no economic impact on KDHE, any other governmental agency or unit, private citizen or consumer as a result of this revocation.

Article 10.—Sanitary Conditions Around Reservoirs

28-10-36. Boundaries of Fort Scott reservoir sanitation zone. Authorization for this project has been rescinded by the U.S. Congress. The reservoir was never built; therefore, this regulation is not necessary.

28-10-40. Boundaries of Grove reservoir sanitation zone. Authorization of this project has been rescinded by the U.S. Congress. The reservoir was never built; therefore, this regulation is not necessary.

28-10-41. Boundaries of Onaga reservoir sanitation zone. Authorization of this project has been rescinded by the U.S. Congress. The reservoir was never built; therefore, this regulation is not necessary.

There is no economic impact on KDHE, any other governmental agency or unit, private citizen or consumer as a result of these revocations.

Article 11.—Approval of Laboratories Performing Examination of Milk

28-11-1 through 28-11-6. Approval of laboratories performing examination of milk. The Department of Agriculture laboratory now handles milk samples. These regulations no longer apply to nor are enforced by KDHE.

There is no economic impact on KDHE as a result of these revocations. The Department of Agriculture is affected and will need to adopt new regulations regarding laboratories performing examination of milk. There is no cost to the private citizen or consumer.

Article 13.—Underground Storage, Disposal Wells and Surface Ponds

28-13-10. Permits required for disposal wells. The objective of this regulation is duplicated under Article 46 — Underground Injection Control Regulations.

28-13-11. Applications for disposal well permits. The objective of this regulation is duplicated under Article 46 — Underground Injection Control Regulations.

There is no economic impact on KDHE, any other governmental agency or unit, private citizen or consumer as a result of these revocations.

Article 16.—Water Pollution Control

State grants to municipalities for the construction of water pollution control projects benefiting from federal grants:

28-16-50. Definitions.

28-16-51. Applications.

28-16-52. Limitations.

28-23-76. Packaging for storage. This regulation is ob-

solete.

28-23-77. Human food only to be stored. This regulation is obsolete. It prohibits the storage of products intended for pet food to be stored in any frozen food warehouse facility.

Executive Order No. 95-180

Establishing the Kansas Geographic Information Systems Policy Board

WHEREAS, Article 1, Section 3 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests the supreme executive power of the State in the Governor; and

WHEREAS, Article 1, Section 4 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests in the Governor, the power to require information from the officers of the executive department, upon any subject related to their duties; and

WHEREAS, Kansas state government is a complex combination of organizations and functions providing a wide variety of services to citizens and other customers; and

WHEREAS, there is a recognized need to increase quality and lower cost of services provided to Kansas citizens through informed application of geographic information systems technology; and

WHEREAS, improved coordination of the State's geographic information systems resources and development of an infrastructure that promotes efficient service delivery and data sharing among state organizations and government entities is an essential element in improving the quality of services provided to the people of Kansas now and into the next century;

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby establish the Kansas Geographic Information Systems Policy Board.

- (1) The Kansas Geographic Information Systems Policy Board shall:
 - (a) Establish a strategic management plan to guide the development and implementation of geographic information systems technology for the best value and benefit of the citizens of Kansas and update the plan biennially;
 - (b) Develop and maintain policies, standards, guidelines, and strategies which emphasize cooperation and coordination among agencies, organizations, and government entities developing and implementing geographic information systems in order to maximize the cost effectiveness of geographic information systems and their value to the State;
 - (c) Establish public and private partnerships throughout Kansas to maximize value, minimize cost, and avoid redundant activities in the development and implementation of geographic information systems; and
 - (d) Coordinate, review, and provide recommendations on geographic information systems programs and investments and provide assistance with dispute resolution among geographic information systems partners.
- (2) The Kansas Geographic Information Systems Policy Board shall be administratively established as a permanent standing committee of the Kansas Information

Resources Council. The Board shall provide an annual report of its activities to the Council, and shall coordinate its activities with those of the Council.

(3) The Board shall consist of 22 members as follows:

(a) The Chief Information Architect of the Kansas Information Resources Council shall be a permanent, voting member of the Board.

(b) Eight voting members of the Board shall be appointed by official commission of appointment of the Governor, certified by and filed with the Secretary of State, to represent the following:

- (i) The Secretary of the Department of Agriculture:
- (ii) The Chairperson of the Kansas Corporation Commission;
- (iii) The Director of the Kansas Water Office;
- (iv) The Secretary of the Department of Health and Environment;
- (v) The Secretary of the Department of Revenue;
- (vi) The Secretary of the Department of Transportation;
- (vii) The Executive Director of the State Conservation Commission; and
- (viii) The Secretary of the Department of Wildlife and Parks.

Each of these members shall be a senior level manager who has a comprehensive understanding of the agency's overall information needs. Two members shall be appointed for a term of two years, three for a term of three years and three for a term of four years, and thereafter, upon the expiration of each initial term, the successor member shall be appointed for a term of forward term.

pointed for a term of four years.

- (c) Five voting seats of the Board shall be filled with representatives of county and municipal governments by official commission of appointment of the Governor, certified by and filed with the Secretary of State. At least two of the five members shall represent counties and at least two shall represent municipal governments. Of the five members, one shall be appointed for a term of two years, two shall be appointed for a term of three years, and two for a term of four years, and thereafter, upon the expiration of each initial term, the successor member shall be appointed for a four-year term. (d) Three voting members of the Board shall be
- representatives from Board of Regents institutions appointed by official commission of appointment of the Governor, certified by and filed with the Secretary of State. One member shall be appointed for a term of two years, one for a term of three years and one for a term of four years, and thereafter, upon the expiration of each initial term, the successor member shall be appointed for a term of four years.
- (e) In addition to the above members, five *ex officio*, non-voting seats of the Board shall be filled by official commission by appointment of the Governor, certified by and filed with the Secretary of State, allocated as follows:

(i) Two seats shall be filled by executive level representatives from the private sector.

(ii) Two seats shall be filled by executive level representatives of two federal agencies with offices in Kansas.

(iii) One seat shall be filled from a state-wide or-

ganization designated by the Governor.

Of these five seats, one member shall be appointed for a term of two years, two for a term of three years, and two for a term of four years, and thereafter, upon the expiration of each initial term, the successor member shall be appointed for a term of four years.

(4) Notwithstanding the designation of membership terms, the Governor may remove members from the

Board, with or without cause or hearing.

- (5) The Chairperson and Vice Chairperson of the Board shall be appointed by the Governor by official commission of appointment of the Governor, certified by and filed with the Secretary of State, and shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The Board may elect other officers from among its members and may establish any committees that are deemed necessary to discharge its duties.
- (6) Members of the Board shall not receive compensation, subsistence allowance, mileage or associated expenses. Officers or employees of state agencies who are appointed to the Board shall be authorized to participate on the Board as part of their duties and may claim subsistence allowance, mileage or associated expenses as permitted by law.

(7) For administrative purposes the Board shall be housed in the Kansas Water Office. The Board shall receive staff support from the State Geographic Information

Systems Coordinator.

(8) The Board shall work jointly with officials from other state agencies, organizations, and county and municipal governments, as well as officials from private sector organizations who are concerned with the efficient management of the State's geographic information systems resources.

This order shall continue in full force and in effect until the date of any subsequent Executive Order with respect to the subject hereof is promulgated.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 95-180 and shall become effective immediately.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 8:30 p.m. Thursday, March 14, at the Stafford High School auditorium, 400 W. Broadway, Stafford, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations for the Big Bend Groundwater Management District No. 5 (GMD No. 5).

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Sharon Falk, Manager, GMD No. 5, 125 S. Main, P.O. Box 7, Stafford, 67578; or to the Chief Engineer, Division of Water Resources, Kansas Department of Agriculture, 901 S. Kansas Ave., 2nd Floor, Topeka, 66612-1283. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of proposed regulations and

their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 5-25-1. Definitions. The definition of aquifer has been amended and definitions added for stream, bedrock aquifer, baseflow, baseflow node, sustainable yield, baseflow node allocation and Dakota aquifer. Definitions of safe yield, waste of water and aquifer have been deleted. This is not expected to result in significant fiscal impact to water users or governmental agencies.

K.A.R. 5-25-2. Well spacing regulations. This regulation has been amended primarily for clarification purposes. This is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to water users or to governmental agencies.

K.A.R. 5-25-3. Reasonable appropriation. This regulation has been amended to improve clarity. This is not expected to result in significant fiscal impact to water users or governmental agencies.

K.A.R. 5-25-4. Sustainable yield. This regulation has been amended to change the formula for evaluation of new applications from a safe yield concept to a sustainable yield concept effective March 9, 1990. The amendment will reduce the amount of water available for appropriation in a two-mile radius circle from 3,000 acre feet to 1,500 acre feet, including water attributable to baseflow node allocations. The regulation also closes the following four drainage basins to further new appropriations effective March 9, 1990: the Arkansas Basin, the Rattlesnake Basin, the Pawnee River Basin and the Walnut Creek Basin. This regulation is intended to protect the long term sustainability of the aquifer and the public and economic value it provides and to prevent impairment of senior water rights that would ultimately occur if more water is appropriated than the aquifer can sustain in the long term.

This regulation is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or to water users unless it causes a new application to appropriate water to be denied. There are currently about 96 new applications for permits to appropriate water pending in GMD No. 5, which will be subject to this regulation. It is anticipated that approximately 36 new applications will be denied because they are in basins which will be closed. No analysis has yet been conducted to determine how many of the remaining 60 applications may be denied based on the new sustainable yield criteria. All new applications filed on or after the effective date of this regulation will be subject to these criteria, and it is not possible to estimate the number of applications that will be filed.

K.A.R. 5-25-5. Well equipment. This regulation has been amended to now require properly installed and satisfactorily maintained water flow meters on all wells. This amendment is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or water users because water flow meters were previously required by district policy.

K.A.R. 5-25-6. Reporting water use. This regulation has been amended to delete the district's requirement for an annual water use report and make such reporting at the discretion of the district. This amendment is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or water users. It will eliminate the potential for a duplicative annual reporting requirement.

K.A.R. 5-25-7. Water quality tests. This regulation has only been amended for clarity and, therefore, is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or water users.

K.A.R. 5-25-8. Waste of water. This regulation has been amended to adopt the statewide definition of waste of water. This is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or to water users, as the statewide definition is nearly identical to the GMD No. 5's definition.

K.A.R. 5-25-9. Procedures for noncompliance with rules and regulations. This regulation has been amended for clarity purposes only. This is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or to water users.

K.A.R. 5-25-10. Test holes and water quality analyses. This regulation has been amended to require that a water quality analyses for chlorides be conducted by a laboratory certified by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment and included with all new applications to appropriate water. If chloride content exceeds 500 milligrams per liter, the application to appropriate water shall be recommended for denial by the district unless certain criteria are met, including the drilling of two observation wells. This regulation is intended to prevent contamination of the fresh water portion of the aquifer from potential salt water intrusion that could be induced by pumping from inappropriate depths and locations in the district.

The cost of having a water quality analysis for chloride content conducted by a certified laboratory is less than (continued)

\$30. The cost of constructing the two additional obser-

vation wells is approximately \$1,680.

If the irrigation well eventually pumps more than 500 milligrams per liter of chloride for more than a year and has to be plugged, the owner will lose the cost of drilling and constructing the well and the plugging will cost approximately \$500-\$1,000 per well. No estimate is available for the costs of removing the pump, motor, distribution system and other equipment because of the variability of installations.
