Opinion No. 96-1

Amendments to the Constitution of the United States—Amendment I—Freedom of Religion, Speech and Press—Policies of the Regents Institutions Regulating Racial and Sexual Discrimination and Harassment. Ted D. Ayres, General Counsel, Topeka, January 12, 1996.

Government imposed content-based restrictions on speech are generally impermissible under the First Amendment. However, a carefully crafted racial and sexual discrimination and harassment policy that is directed at conduct violative of Title VI, Title VII or Title IX may indirectly regulate speech that is "swept up incidentally within" the policy's reach. Opinion No. 96-2

Agriculture—Conservation Districts—Power to Enter Into a Lease Purchase Agreement.

Bonds and Warrants—Cash-Basis Law—Definitions; Municipality and Governing Body; Conservation Districts. Tracy D. Streater, Executive Director, State Conservation Commission, Topeka, January 18, 1996.

The new definition of municipality under the cash-basis law did not repeal by implication the restrictions on conservation districts set forth in K.S.A. 2-1908(1), nor does subsection (e) of K.S.A. 2-1908 allow a conservation

district to exercise its corporate powers in violation of other provisions of the same act. However, a properly worded lease-purchase agreement, containing the language and limitations set forth in K.S.A. 10-1116b and 10-1116c, does not create a debt obligation exceeding the current budget year. Accordingly, it is our opinion that a conservation district as a municipality under the definition contained in K.S.A. 1995 10-1101(a) may utilize the provisions of K.S.A. 10-1116b to enter into a lease-purchase agreement if such an agreement does not violate the restrictions still in place under K.S.A. 2-1908(1). K.A.R. 66-6-4 prohibits a licensed land surveyor from directly or indirectly paying a commission in order to secure work. The fact pattern set forth herein violates this regulation. Cited herein: K.A.R. 66-6-4. GE

Wildlife and Parks Commission

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted by the Wildlife and Parks Commission at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 4, at the Eisenhower Learning Center at Wolf Creek Nuclear Plant near Burlington, to consider the approval and adoption of four permanent department regulations. Wolf Creek is located 10 miles south of I-35 on Highway 75. At the "Wolf Creek Generating Station" sign, turn east for one mile, then turn right (south) for 200 yards to the Eisenhower Learning Center. There will be a public comment period at the beginning of the evening meeting for any issues not on the agenda, and additional comment periods will be available during the meeting on agenda items.

A workshop meeting on business of the Wildlife and Parks Commission will begin at 1:30 p.m. April 4 at the location listed above. The public also will be given the opportunity to comment on any nonagenda items at the beginning, and on agenda items during, the afternoon meeting. The meeting will recess at 5 p.m., then resume at 7 p.m. at the same location for the regulatory hearing. Old and new business also may be discussed at this time. If necessary to complete the hearing or other business matters, the commission will reconvene at 9 a.m. April 5 at the location listed above.

If notified in advance, the department will have an interpreter available for the hard of hearing. To contact the department for this or any other reason, members of the public with a hearing impairment may call the TDD service at 1-800-766-3777. All public meeting areas are accessible to the physically handicapped.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Request for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Marilyn Alberg at (316) 672-5911.

This 60-day notice period prior to the hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the chairman of the commission, Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, Suite 502, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for approving, amending and approving, or rejecting the proposed regulations.

The regulations to be heard during the regulatory hearing portion of the meeting are as follows:

K.A.R. 115-4-1. Turkey; legal equipment, taking methods, reports, tags and general provisions. This permanent regulation is proposed for amendment. It establishes legal equipment, taking methods and general provisions for turkey hunting. The proposed amendments are: establish a 45-pound draw weight for bows instead of 45 pounds up to or at full draw; delete the 65 percent let-off restriction on bows; and remove the refund restriction.

Economic Impact Summary: Removing the 65 percent let-off provision should benefit businesses by allowing more types of equipment to be used. A wider range of permit refunds will be authorized.

K.A.R. 115-4-3. Antelope; legal equipment, taking methods, and general provisions. This permanent regulation is proposed for amendment. It establishes legal equipment, taking methods and general provisions for antelope hunting. The proposed amendments are: establish a 45-pound draw weight for bows instead of 45 pounds up to or at full draw; delete the 65 percent let-off restriction on bows; delete the 600 foot-pounds of energy at the muzzle requirement for muzzleloading pistols; remove the informational card requirement; and remove the refund restriction.

Economic Impact Summary: Removing the 65 percent let-off provision should benefit businesses by allowing more types of equipment to be used. A wider range of permit refunds will be authorized.

K.A.R. 115-4-5. Deer; legal equipment, taking methods, and general provisions. This permanent regulation is proposed for amendment. It establishes legal equipment, taking methods and general provisions for deer hunting. The proposed amendments are: establish a 45-pound draw weight for bows instead of 45 pounds up to or at full draw; delete the 65 percent let-off restriction on bows; delete the 600 foot-pounds of energy at the muzzle requirement for muzzleloading pistols; remove the informational card requirement; and remove the refund restriction.

Economic Impact Summary: Removing the 65 percent let-off provision should benefit businesses by allowing more types of equipment to be used. A wider range of permit refunds will be authorized.

K.A.R. 115-4-7. Elk; legal equipment, taking methods, and general provisions. This permanent regulation is proposed for amendment. It establishes legal equipment, taking methods and general provisions for elk hunting. The proposed amendments are: establish a 50-pound draw weight for bows instead of 50 pounds up to or at full draw; delete the 65 percent let-off restriction on bows; remove the informational card requirement; and remove the refund restriction.

Economic Impact Summary: Removing the 65 percent let-off provision should benefit businesses by allowing more types of equipment to be used. A wider range of permit refunds will be authorized.

Redemption of Bonds

Bonds maturing in the years 1997 through 2004, inclusive, shall become due and payable on their respective maturity dates without option of prior call for redemption and payment. Bonds maturing in the year 2005 and thereafter, at the city's option, may be called for redemption and payment prior to their respective maturities on and after October 1, 2004, at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the redemption date, without premium. If the city shall call any bond for redemption and payment prior to the maturity thereof, the city shall give written notice of its intention to redeem and pay said bonds on a specified date, the same being described by number and maturity, said notice to be mailed by United States certified mail addressed to the paying agent and bond registrar and to the manager or managers of the underwriting account making the successful bid. Each of said notices shall be mailed at least 45 days prior to the redemption date. Thereafter, the paying agent and bond registrar will notify the owners of the bonds of the city's redemption call by United States first class mail, postage prepaid. Prior to any date established for redemption and payment, the city shall deposit with the paying agent sufficient funds to pay the bonds so called for redemption and payment at the redemption price set forth above and all unpaid and accrued interest thereon to the date of such redemption and payment. Upon the deposit of said funds, and the giving of notice of such redemption and payment as aforesaid, bonds thus called for redemption shall cease to bear interest from and after the date for which such call is made.

Condition of Bids, Bid Form and Good Faith Deposit

Bids will be received for the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidder. The same rate will apply to all bonds of the same maturity.

Each interest rate specified will be in an even multiple of $\frac{1}{8}$ or $\frac{1}{20}$ of 1 percent. The difference between the highest and lowest rates specified in any bid will not exceed 2 percent. No interest rate shall exceed a rate equal to the index of daily yield for the 30-year treasury bonds published by *The Bond Buyer* in New York, New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold, plus 2 percent. No bid of less than par and accrued interest will be considered. Bids for less than the entire issue of bonds will not be considered. No supplemental interest payments will be authorized.

No changes to said form are authorized; changes or erasures thereon may cause rejection of any bid.

All bids must state: (1) the total interest cost to the city during the life of the bond issue; (2) the premium, if any, offered by the bidder; (3) the net interest cost of the bid; and (4) the average annual interest rate to the city on the basis of such bid. Bidders shall specify in the bid form the prices (exclusive of accrued interest), expressed as a dollar price, at which the bidder intends that each maturity amount of the bonds shall be initially offered to the public (the initial re-offering prices). All of said information shall be certified by the bidder to be correct, and the city will be entitled to rely on the certification of correctness by the bidder.

Each bid must be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check equal to 2 percent of the total par value of the bonds (\$4,000), and shall be payable to "City of Waterville, Kansas." In the event a bidder whose bid is accepted shall fail to perform under the contract for the purchase of the bonds from the city, said deposit shall be retained by the city as liquidated damages. All checks of unsuccessful bids will be returned promptly. No interest will be paid upon the deposit made by the successful bidder.

Award of Bids

The sealed bids for the bonds will be opened publicly and only at the time and place specified in this notice. The city reserves the right to reject any and all of the bids, and to waive any irregularities. Unless all bids are rejected, the bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose proposal results in the lowest net interest cost to the city. The net interest cost to the city will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium, if any, from the total interest cost upon all the bonds from their dated date until their respective maturities. The city will be entitled to rely on such dollar amount as stated in the bid as the basis of determining the lowest net interest cost. If there is any discrepancy between the said net interest cost and the average annual interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost will govern and the rest specified in the bid will be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the city shall determine which bid, if any, shall be accepted, and its determination therefor shall be final.

Approval and Delivery of the Bonds

The bonds, duly printed, executed and registered, will be furnished and paid for by the city. The bonds will be sold subject to the approving legal opinion of Jonathan P. Small, Chartered, bond counsel, of Topeka, Kansas, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the city, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder as and when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will state that in the opinion of bond counsel under existing law and assuming continued compliance by the city with the provisions of the resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, the interest on the bonds is exempt from federal income taxation (with specified minor exceptions) and excluded from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income for income tax purposes.

The denomination of the bonds and the names, addresses and social security or taxpayer identification numbers of the registered owners to be shown on the bonds initially delivered shall be submitted in writing by the successful bidder to the city and bond registrar not later than 4 p.m. C.S.T. on March 1, 1996. In the absence of such information, the city will deliver the bonds in the denomination of each maturity registered in the name of the successful bidder.

The purchaser will be furnished with a complete transcript of proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing proofs, which will include a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity. Payment for the bonds will be made in immediately available funds. Delivery of the bonds will be made to the successful bidder on or about March 15, 1996, at any bank in the state of Kansas or Kansas City, Missouri, at the expense of the city. Internal Revenue Code of 1986

Subsequent to the issuance of the bonds, the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, imposes requirements upon the city which must be met to maintain the excludability of the interest on the bonds from gross income for federal income tax purposes. The city will and does hereby covenant to comply with these requirements. Its failure to do so could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that in the event the bonds lose their tax-exempt status as a result of the city's failure to comply with the requirements imposed upon it under the code, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds in the adjusted current earnings of certain corporations in the computation of alternative minimum taxable income.

The city will designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

(1) current licensure in another jurisdiction which requires completion of a number of contact hours of continuing nursing education for license renewal which are equivalent to or greater than the number of hours required in Kansas;

(2) licensure in another jurisdiction sometime during the preceding five-year period, and completion of 30 contact hours of approved continuing nursing education within the preceding two-year period; or

(3) satisfactory completion of a refresher course approved by the board. (b) The educational program shall consist of a minimum of nine months of study or one academic year of full-time study or its equivalent, as defined by the sponsoring academic institution. The program shall contain both didactic and clinical components. The clinical component shall include a preceptorship meeting a minimum of eight hours a week for one academic year or its substantial equivalent of practice.

(c) The philosophy, purpose, objectives, and outcomes of the program shall be clearly defined and available in written form.

(d) The objectives and outcomes reflecting the program philosophy shall be stated in behavioral terms and shall describe the expected competencies of the graduate.

(e) A majority of the faculty members shall be advanced registered nurse practitioners who are currently certified by the board in Kansas.

(f) Each faculty member shall have earned a graduate degree.

(g) The content, methods of instruction, and learning experiences shall be consistent with the philosophy, objectives, and outcomes of the program.

(h) Course syllabi shall be available in writing.

(i) The program shall include:

(1) content relating to:

(A) role realignment;

(B) the area of advanced nursing practice; and

(C) the health care delivery system;

(2) ethical and legal implications of advanced nursing practice; and

(3) after January 1, 1997, three college hours in advanced pharmacology or the equivalent.

(j) The program shall provide clinical instruction in the performance of diagnostic procedures and the transmittal of prescriptions for medications that are essential to practice in the area of specialization. Clinical instruction shall be under the supervision of the faculty, an advanced registered nurse practitioner or a physician preceptor.

(k) Admission criteria shall be clearly stated and available in written form, and shall include the requirement of a current license to practice in Kansas as a registered professional nurse.

(l) Policies for withdrawal, dismissal, and readmission shall be available in written form.

(m) The director of the program shall provide official evidence of completion to each individual who successfully completes the program of study.

(n) The faculty shall develop, adopt, and implement a written plan for continuing program evaluation. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1133; effective May 1, 1984; amended, T-85-16, June 5, 1984; amended

The provider shall issue a certificate listing the number of contact hours earned and clearly identifying the hours as instructor credit.

Article 4.—INDIVIDUAL GAME RULES

**RULES FOR INSTANT GAME NO. 47
"FABULOUS FIFTIES"**

111-4-804. Name of game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Fabulous Fifties" commencing on or after February 12, 1996. The specific rules for the "Fabulous Fifties" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-804 through 111-4-807. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710, as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; effective, T-111-1-23-96, Jan. 12, 1996.)

111-4-805. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Fabulous Fifties" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink in 15 point WGI Symbol font with matching captions in WGI Cap font. A game symbol appears in each of the six play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: FREE - \$2.00 - \$5.00 - 10.00 - 15.00 - 50.00 - \$500\$.

(b) "Game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The game symbol caption associated with each game symbol is as follows:

Game Symbol	Game Symbol Caption
FREE	TICKET
\$2.00	TWO\$
\$5.00	FIVE\$
10.00	TEN\$
15.00	FIFTEEN
50.00	FIFTY
\$500\$	FIVE-HUN

(c) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is an 11-digit number which appears below the game symbols under the latex covering in the play area on the front of each instant ticket.

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the back of each instant game ticket below the bar code.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each

instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three-letter code printed and appearing in three of six varying locations among the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: FRE - Free ticket; TWO - \$2.00; FIV - \$5.00; TEN - \$10.00; FTN - \$15.00; FTY - \$50.00; FHN - \$500.00.

(f) "Bar code" means the 16-digit bar coded number appearing on the back of each ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710, as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; effective, T-111-1-23-96, Jan. 12, 1996.)

111-4-806. Determination of instant prize winners. An instant prize winner is determined in this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the six game symbols and captions. This is a match three of six game. If three of the six concealed prize amounts match, the player wins the amount shown. No ticket will be eligible to win more than one prize. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-8710(b), (c) and (i), as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1; implementing K.S.A. 74-8710(b), (c) and (i), as amended by L. 1995, Chapter 261, §1, and 74-8720(b) and (d); effective, T-111-1-23-96, Jan. 12, 1996.)
