The Kansas Arts Commission will convene its quarterly business meeting at 9 a.m. Thursday, February 22, at the Koch Education Center in the Pottawatomie Indian Mission building on the grounds of the Kansas Museum of History, 6425 S.W. 6th, Topeka.

During their business meeting, the commissioners will vote upon the recommendations of advisory panels to award Kansas Artist Fellowships of \$5,000 each to five outstanding visual and literary artists and to award up to a dozen other Kansas artists with mini-fellowships of \$500 each. Also on the agenda is adoption of a preliminary apportionment plan for fiscal year 1997, based upon the governor's budget recommendation and an estimate of federal funds the commission might receive.

The commission and the Association of Community Arts Agencies of Kansas will co-host a reception in honor of the five Kansas Artist Fellowship recipients with their families and guests from 3 to 5 p.m. at Cedar Crest, the Governor's official residence.

Executive Order No. 96-182

Establishing the Governor's Commission on Housing

WHEREAS, ensuring a supply of adequate, affordable housing in Kansas is essential to the well-being of Kansas citizens and the economic health of Kansas communities; and

WHEREAS, the housing needs of special populations and particular communities must be considered in evaluating state housing issues; and

WHEREAS, both the public and private sectors bring valuable perspectives and resources to analysis of housing issues; and

WHEREAS, coordination between the public and private sectors is needed in the design of programs which address housing needs, including those programs which involve the state housing trust fund.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby establish the Governor's Commission on Housing.

(1) The Commission shall:

(a) assist the director of housing, the secretary of commerce and the Governor in the assessment of housing needs;

(b) serve as a sounding board in the development of programs or legislation related to housing;

(c) assist the office of housing in the development and updating of a state plan to meet housing needs in Kansas communities;

(d) provide a vehicle for public and private sector collaboration in identifying and addressing housing needs in Kansas;

(e) provide public and private sector involvement and coordination in the design of programs to address housing needs through the state housing trust fund; and

(f) submit a brief summary of its activities and findings to the Governor on or before December 15 of each year.

(2) Membership on the Governor's Commission on Housing shall be by official commission of appointment of the Governor.

(a) The Commission shall be comprised of nine members representing various disciplines involved in housing issues, which may include:

- architecture or engineering;
- construction;
- real estate appraisal, development, and sales;
- property management;
- property financing, including financing for multi-family or single family projects and public financing;
- economic development;
- manufactured housing;
- the law; and
- property insurance.

(b) In selecting the membership on the Commission, care shall be exercised in order to achieve geographical balance and representation from small and large cities, rural and urban interests, as well as members with a broad perspective of diverse housing issues.

(c) No members of the Commission shall be from the executive, legislative or judicial branches of state government, except that the Undersecretary for Housing shall be an ex officio member.

(d) Initially, three members shall be appointed for terms of one year; three for terms of two years, and three for terms of three years. Thereafter, members shall be appointed by the Governor for terms of three years.

(e) The chairperson and vice chairperson shall be appointed by and shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. The Commission, from among its members, shall elect a secretary to keep minutes of its meetings.

(3) The Commission may form one or more sub-committees from time to time should the need arise to address specific housing needs, conduct study and research projects, or to provide information to the public on housing issues or programs.

(4) The Commission shall meet quarterly. Special meetings may be called by the chairperson upon approval of the director of housing.

(5) Members of the Commission shall not receive compensation, but shall receive subsistence allowances, mileage, and expense reimbursements as provided in K.S.A. 75-3223 and amendments thereto for travel to and attendance at official meetings of the Commission or an authorized sub-committees established by the Commission. The subsistence allowances, mileage, and expense reimbursements shall be paid by the Department of Commerce and Housing from available appropriations.

Executive Order 91-148 is hereby superseded by this Order and the force and effect of Executive Order 91-148 is hereby rescinded.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 96-182 and shall become effective immediately.

Post-Closure Plan Modification

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has received a Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) post-closure plan modification request from the Farmland Industries Refinery located on north Linden Street in Coffeyville. The facility is operating under interim status with respect to its hazardous waste management activities and has been assigned EPA Identification No. KSD007138605.

As a result of discharge of hazardous waste into the surface pond located in the Coffeyville facility of Farmland Industries, the regulated unit was closed on June 21, 1991, in accordance with the closure plan of December 31, 1990. KDHE approved the closure plan on March 21, 1991. Following closure, Farmland was approved to divide the regulated unit into east and west clay-lined surface impoundments. The post-closure use of this unit was limited to temporary storage of stormwater during excessive rainfall. The unit is presently under post-closure care in accordance with the approved post-closure plan.

Farmland is currently upgrading the refinery's wastewater treatment system. The upgrade calls for many changes within the facility's wastewater system, including the installation of two 145,000-barrel above-ground storage tanks. These tanks in combination will provide temporary storage of excess stormwater during a 25-year 24-hour storm event. Following the storm event, the tanks will be drained followed by treatment of the stormwater within the facility's wastewater treatment system.

Farmland is proposing to modify the existing approved post-closure plan to install one 145,000-barrel tank on the east side of the closed surface pond. The other 145,000-

barrel tank will be placed outside the boundary of the regulated unit. In addition, Farmland is proposing to construct/install a lift station as required to deliver stormwater to the proposed tanks. The choice of location for the tank and the lift station is based on the hydraulics and existing plumbing for the stormwater management system.

The proposed post-closure plan modification for the closed surface pond is based on 40 CFR 265.118(d) and is in accordance with K.A.R. 28-31-8, which adopts by reference 40 CFR 265 as in effect on July 1, 1992. The proposed post-closure plan modification meets the classification of a Class 2 modification according to 40 CFR 270.42; therefore, the approval process must follow the requirements established under 40 CFR 265.118(f).

The specific regulation 40 CFR 265.118(f) requires the secretary of KDHE to provide the owner or operator and the public, through a newspaper notice, the opportunity to submit written comments on the post-closure plan and request modifications to the plan not later than 30 days from the date of the notice. Following the closing of the 30-day comment period, the secretary of KDHE may conduct a hearing on the matter depending the nature of comments.

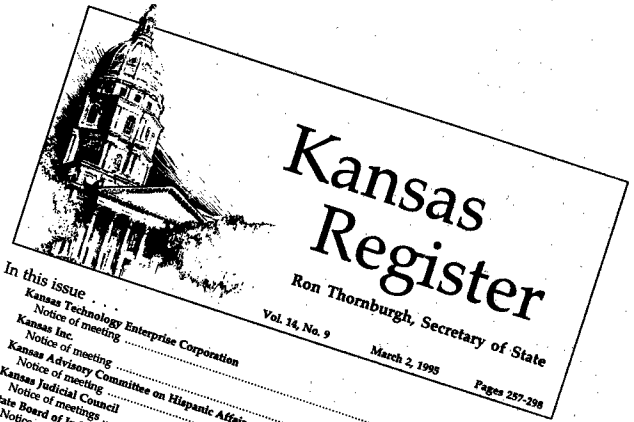
