Request for Proposals

Rehabilitation Services is seeking proposals for the privatization of Kansas Industries for the Blind (KIB), Topeka. KIB is a sheltered workshop that offers employment to persons who are blind and who are not immediately able to succeed in competitive employment.

The objective of this RFP is to secure a qualified operator to assume ownership and operation of KIB. A one-year grant, which may be renewed for three subsequent years, will be awarded to facilitate this privatization. (Grant renewal will be contingent on grantee performance and the continued availability of funds.) The grant will be an establishment grant, which requires the grantee to:

1. Be a private, nonprofit organization; and
2. Provide nonfederal matching funds totaling 21.3 percent of the grant total.

The maximum annual total grant amount available is \$150,000. (The grantee would provide a match of \$31,950 in nonfederal funds and would receive an additional \$118,050 for a total grant amount of \$150,000.)

A pre-bid conference regarding this RFP will be conducted from 1 to 3 p.m. March 15 at the Rehabilitation Center for the Blind, 2516 W. 6th, Topeka.

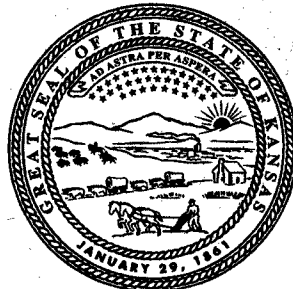

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted by the Wildlife and Parks Commission at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 4, at the Eisenhower Learning Center, Wolf Creek Nuclear Plant near Burlington, to consider the approval and adoption of four exempt department regulations. Four previously announced permanent regulations also will be considered. Wolf Creek is located 10 miles south of I-35 on highway 75. At the "Wolf Creek Generating Station" sign, turn east for one mile, then turn right (south) for 200 yards to the Eisenhower Learning Center. There will be a public comment period at the beginning of the evening meeting for any issues not on the agenda, and additional comment periods will be available during the meeting on agenda items.

A workshop meeting on business of the Wildlife and Parks Commission will begin at 1:30 p.m. April 4 at the location listed above. The public also will be given the opportunity to comment on any nonagenda items at the beginning of, and on agenda items during, the afternoon meeting. The meeting will recess at 5 p.m., then resume at 7 p.m. at the same location for the regulatory hearing. Old and new business also may be discussed at this time. If necessary to complete the hearing or other business matters, the commission will reconvene at 9 a.m. April 5 at the location listed above.

If notified in advance, the department will have an interpreter available for the hard of hearing. To contact the department for this or any other reason, members of the public with a hearing impairment may call the TDD service at 1-800-766-3777. All public meeting areas are accessible to the physically handicapped.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Request for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Marilyn Alberg at (316) 672-5911.

This 30-day notice period prior to the hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the chairman of the commission, Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, Suite 502, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for approving, amending and approving, or rejecting the proposed regulations.

The exempt regulations to be heard during the regulatory hearing portion of the meeting are as follows:

K.A.R. 115-25-5. Turkey; fall season bag limit and permits. This proposed exempt regulation will establish the fall archery and firearm turkey hunting seasons, hunting units, permit allowances and bag limits. Application dates are included. An unlimited number of archery and hunt-own-land permits are recommended. An unlimited number of firearms permits are recommended for Unit 2, and 200 are recommended for Unit 1.

Economic Impact Summary: The department will realize revenue based on the number of permits actually issued. Certain businesses will benefit from sportsmen hunting turkeys. Revenue to the department represents a cost to those sportsmen wishing to participate.

K.A.R. 115-25-7. Antelope; open season, bag limit and permits. This proposed exempt regulation will establish the fall archery and firearms antelope seasons, hunting units, permits allowances and bag limits. Application dates are included. Units are unchanged. An unlimited number of archery permits are recommended for Unit 1, and 12 are recommended for Unit 2. Two hundred firearms permits are recommended for Unit 1, and 40 are recommended for Unit 2.

Economic Impact Summary: The department will realize revenue based on the number of permits actually issued. Certain businesses will benefit from sportsmen hunting antelope. Revenue to the department represents a cost to those sportsmen wishing to participate.

K.A.R. 115-25-8. Elk; open season, bag limit and permits. This proposed exempt regulation will establish the fall elk hunting season, hunting areas, permit allowances, and bag limits. Application dates are included. Two archery "antlerless" permits and one firearms "any elk" permit are recommended for the Cimarron Unit. Six elk permits are recommended for the Fort Riley Unit.

Economic Impact Summary: The department will realize revenue based on the number of permits actually issued. Certain businesses will benefit from sportsmen hunting elk. Revenue to the department represents a cost to those sportsmen wishing to participate.

K.A.R. 115-25-9. Deer; regular open season, bag limit and permits. This proposed exempt regulation will establish the regular fall archery and firearms deer seasons and bag limits. Application dates are included.

Economic Impact Summary: The department will realize revenue based on the number of permits actually issued after authorized numbers are established by secretary's orders. Certain businesses will benefit from sportsmen hunting deer. Revenue to the department represents a cost to those sportsmen wishing to participate.

Notice is hereby given of the commencement of negotiations for architectural services for the renovation of the A & T Cellhouse at the Lansing Correctional Facility. The renovation will require bringing the cellhouse into compliance with current building codes and American Correctional Association standards. The project will utilize inmate labor whenever possible.

The scope of work shall include increasing the size of cells, increasing the width of walkways, installation of fire escapes, renovation of the third floor into classrooms and offices, replacement of roof insulation and membrane, installation of elevator and ADA accessible cells, upgrade of the mechanical system, installation of new lights and sprinkler system, and replacement of smoke alarm system.

Proposals will be issued upon request to all prospective bidders who have been prequalified by the Kansas Department of Transportation on the basis of financial condition, available construction equipment and experience. Also, a statement of unearned contracts (Form No. 284) must be filed. There will be no discrimination against anyone because of race, age, religion, color, sex, handicap or national origin in the award of contracts.

Each bidder shall file a sworn statement executed by or on behalf of the person, firm, association or corporation submitting the bid, certifying that such person, firm, association or corporation has not, either directly or indirectly, entered into any agreement, participated in any collusion, or otherwise taken any action in restraint of free competitive bidding in connection with the submitted bid. This sworn statement shall be in the form of an affidavit executed and sworn to by the bidder before a person who is authorized by the laws of the state to administer oaths. The required form of the affidavit will be provided by the state to each prospective bidder. Failure to submit the sworn statement as part of the bid approval package will make the bid nonresponsive and not eligible for award consideration.

Plans and specifications for the projects may be examined at the office of the respective county clerk or at the KDOT district office responsible for the work.

A public hearing will be conducted at 1 p.m. Thursday, May 9, in the Wahl Hall east auditorium, ground floor of the Bio-Med Building, University of Kansas Medical Center, Kansas City, concerning the adoption by the Board of Regents of regulations governing traffic and parking on the roads, streets, driveways and parking facilities at the University of Kansas Medical Center.

1.0 General Regulations: The Chancellor of the University of Kansas or his designated representative is empowered to create, modify, or preempt parking in controlled areas of the campus. The operation of a motor vehicle or bicycle on the Kansas University Medical Center property is a privilege granted by the University and is not an inherent right of any faculty/staff member, student or visitor. The following regulations are intended to facilitate the work of the faculty, staff and visitors through control of the parking and movement of motor vehicles while on campus. Any area so created or modified shall be posted with appropriate signs stating the type of permit or restrictions pertaining to the use of the area, or restrictions by manual control.

Permit holders at the Kansas University Medical Center may have similar parking privileges on the Lawrence campus as indicated by the type of permit displayed on their vehicle.

All property or lands, owned, leased or operated by the University.

2.1 Application for Parking: Parking privileges at the University of Kansas, Kansas City, campus are determined as follows: 1. Renewal applications, 2. Medical parking, and 3. Waiting lists.

Employees can have their names entered on any one color zone waiting list by calling or visiting the Parking Service Office. When space becomes available in a zone that has a waiting list, persons on that list will be called in the order that their names were taken. If a zone has no waiting list, any available space will be sold on a first come first served basis.

Each motor vehicle operated or parked on University property by any student, faculty member, staff member, must display a valid Kansas University Medical Center parking permit or a valid garage card. The Parking Services Department requires all employees to register their state handicap vehicles to the Parking office. The exception would be state owned and public service vehicles.

The Parking Services Department reserves the right to alter or revoke permit assignments as the needs of the individual or the University community change. Falsification of any information for the purpose of obtaining a parking permit or repeated violations of rules and regulations may result in the forfeiture of all parking permits, and parking fees paid.

2.2 Parking Permits: Parking assignees shall, upon payment of the scheduled fee, receive a parking permit

sticker. This permit shall be valid only when permanently attached to the vehicle registered with Parking Services, in the manner specified on the sticker or as otherwise authorized by Parking Services. It is not transferable to any other vehicle without authorization from Parking Services. A parking permit entitles the assignee to park only in color zones or lots designated by the permit, as well as other lots as follows:

- Blue: Any color zone
- Red: Any red or yellow zone
- Yellow: Any yellow zone
- Board of Regents
 - Pass: All zones on both campuses
- Emeritus: All color zones, except handicapped, loading zones, meter areas
- Campus After
 - Hours Permit: All color zones during off peak hours 4 p.m. to 7 a.m. Monday-Friday and 24 hours on weekends and holidays

2.4 Handicapped Parking: When a motor vehicle which bears a special license plate or identification card issued by the Director of Motor Vehicles pursuant to K.S.A. 8-1,125 or K.S.A. 8-161 is being operated by, or used for the transportation of, a handicapped person, such a motor vehicle may park in any space which is clearly marked as being reserved for the use of the handicapped or persons responsible for the transportation of a handicapped person, said vehicle shall be exempt from any parking meter fees. Designated patient handicap parking areas are reserved exclusively for patient use 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

3.8 Traffic Regulations: The speed limit on campus streets is 20 miles per hour; 10 miles per hour in parking lots unless posted otherwise.

4.5 Group III University violations: Permit Holders—Restricted Garage Areas \$25.00—over 14 days \$30.00.

5.4 The University reserves the right to remove the following from campus:

- (a) Vehicles repeatedly found on campus without a valid University parking permit. Removal shall be made irrespective of the knowledge that said vehicle belongs to or is operated by a person or persons eligible for University parking permit privileges.
- (b) Any vehicle registered or unregistered, which because of its physical condition is deemed a safety hazard to other vehicles and/or pedestrians.
- (c) Any vehicle, even though it displays a valid parking permit, not moved from the lot or garages where it was parked for a period of seven (7) days without the permission of the University Parking Services Department.

5.4 Towing and Impoundment of Vehicles: Vehicles may be towed from campus at any time if they interfere with the efficient operation of the traffic and parking at the University of Kansas Medical Center. Group III and IV University violations subject a vehicle to removal from the campus and impoundment, or immobilization. Violations are posted to the record of the person in whose name a motorized vehicle is titled or in the name of the

person who has registered the vehicle with Parking Services. Any motor vehicle which has broken down on University property must be reported immediately to the Kansas University Medical Center Parking Services Department. Major repairs to vehicles on University property is prohibited. All charges for towing and/or storage are the responsibility of the individual. Parking Services shall release an impounded or immobilized vehicle after payment of all unpaid fines or by paying \$10.00 or 10% of the balance due and signing an agreement to schedule payments for the balance due within 90 days.

A public hearing will be conducted at 3 p.m. Monday, May 6, in the Parking Department conference room, 1501 Irving Hill Road, University of Kansas, Lawrence, concerning the adoption by the Board of Regents of regulations governing traffic and parking on the roads, streets, driveways and parking facilities at the University of Kansas. The following is a summary of the substance of the rules and proposed changes:

1. General Regulations. The current regulations specify who is subject to these rules and regulations, that all vehicles must have a valid parking permit, and hours of access to the central campus. No amendments are proposed.

2. Definitions. The current regulations specify, for the purpose of these regulations, the definitions of student, faculty, staff, visitors, residence hall visitor, medical parking needs, handicap parking, moped and motorcycle parking. No amendments are proposed.

3. Visitor Parking. The current regulations specify conditions under which visitors may legally park at the University of Kansas. No amendments are proposed.

4. Parking Permits. The current regulations establish procedures pertaining to parking permits and the types of permits available. The proposed amendment would prohibit all categories of Parking Facility permit (PF) from parking in lots 54, 70, 71 and 72. A new Park and Ride permit for lot 300E would be offered at \$20 for year.

5. Student, Faculty and Staff Parking. The current regulations establish procedures by which parking permits for vehicles may be obtained and appealed, and procedures for new employees. No amendments are proposed.

6. Permit Fees. The current regulations specify the fees charged for parking permits. The proposed amendment would raise the cost of the University Housing permit from \$35 to \$50. The cost of parking for events would be

raised from \$3 to \$5 for football, from \$2 to \$5 for basketball, and \$7 for reserved stalls.

7. Control of Parking Lots and Zones. The current regulations specify times and locations for parking restrictions at the University of Kansas. The proposed amendment would change the hours of restriction for Stouffer Place parking, lot 114, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, to 7 a.m. to 8 p.m., Monday through Friday, and on weekends or holidays where there is a home basketball game. Rates for parking meters would be raised from \$.35 per unit of time (20 minute, 40 minute or hour depending on the type of meter), to \$.50 per unit of time.

8. Violations. The current regulations specify violations for which a vehicle may be ticketed and the cost of such violations. The proposed amendment would increase the fines in each group as follows: Meter fines change from \$2 to \$4, Group I violations from \$10 to \$15, Group II violations from \$25 to \$30 and Group III violations from \$50 to \$60. The Group II, number 9 violation, display of forged, altered, lost or stolen parking authorization stickers or hangtags, would be moved to Group III. A new Group V violation would be \$100. The Group III, Number 11 violation, illegally parked in a space, accessible aisle, or blocking marked ramp designated accessible for the physically disabled, would be moved to the new Group V. Late fees in all categories would be eliminated.

9. Payment of Fees for Violations. The current regulations specify the method and procedure for payment of violation notices, late payment, what constitutes excessive violations and consequences of excessive violations and towing and impoundment procedures. The proposed amendment eliminates the late fees for violations.

10. Appeal of Violation Notices. The current regulations establish the procedures for appeals from a charge of misuse of parking area. No amendments are proposed.

11. Statutory Authorization. The current regulations establish the authorization of the Board of Regents to promulgate regulations for the control of parking and traffic on the University of Kansas campus and to establish misuse fees for violations of the regulations. No amendments are proposed.

Interested persons will be given reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views concerning the adoption of the proposed amendments to the existing regulations. Written comments also may be submitted prior to the hearing. Written comments or a request for a copy of the proposed regulations and a copy of the financial impact statement of such changes should be submitted to Raymond K. Moore, Professor, Civil Engineering, University of Kansas, 2006D Learned Hall, Lawrence, 66045.

- III. **Parking, visitors.** The current regulation specifies where visitors may park and where to obtain visitor permits. The proposed amendment changes the location of the information booth from 15th to 18th and Morse.
- IV. (1) **Physically handicapped.** The current regulation specifies the reserved areas for the physically disabled drivers. The amendment would clarify the issuance and display of handicap placards or state license plates.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Community Right-to-Know Program is extending the compliance deadline for the submittal of toxic release inventory (TRI) reports for calendar year 1995 until August 1, 1996. This action is taken to conform the state deadline to that of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, which announced that it will allow facilities required to submit TRI reports for calendar year 1995 until August 1, 1996, to file those reports. (See Federal Register, January 29, 1996 at 61 FR 2722-2723.) These TRI reports under Section 313 of the Emergency Planning and Community Right-to-Know Act and Section 6607 of the Pollution Prevention Act would otherwise be due on or before July 1, 1996. Because of unforeseen circumstances beyond the control of EPA, EPA has been delayed in developing and distributing the reporting package required to submit the 1995 reports. This package includes extensive materials and guidance for preparing TRI reports for the 1995 reporting year. To allow facilities adequate time to prepare and submit complete and accurate TRI reports, EPA is allowing facilities an extra month in which to report.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Community Right-to-Know Program also receives the TRI report. This notice embraces the federal time allowance to avoid potential non-compliance resulting solely from the delay in availability of the TRI reporting package. No other deadlines, requirements, obligations or standards are affected by this notice. - XIII. Parking, permits and misuse of areas, disposition of all fees collected.** The proposed amendment would change policemen to police officers and would add immobilization fees and toll parking fees to the misuse fee listing. The amendment would also remove towing fees from the above list.
- XVI. Towing or immobilization of vehicles.** The current regulation specifies the authority for and the manner in which a vehicle may be removed from or immobilized on campus. The proposed amendment would remove the statements reflecting procedures from towing by University Facilities. The proposed amendment would increase the charge imposed for removal of an immobilizer from \$5 dollars to \$25 dollars. The amendment also would add the following statement: After seventy-two hours of the installation of a vehicle immobilizer, with no payment or arrangements having been made, the vehicle shall be subject to tow. The amendment also would remove the wording "campus property" and replace the property owned or maintained by Emporia State University.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality operating permit. Osage City Municipal Power Plant has applied for a Class II operating permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-540. Emissions of oxides of nitrogen, sulfur dioxide and carbon monoxide were evaluated during the permit review process. The purpose of a Class II permit is to limit the potential-to-emit for these pollutants to below major source thresholds.

Osage City Municipal Power Plant owns and operates an electric generating station located at 5th and Main, Osage City.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting nonconfidential documentation and all information relied upon during the permit application review process is available for public review during normal business hours at the KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, and at the KDHE northeast district office, 800 W. 24th, Lawrence. The standard departmental cost will be assessed for any copies requested.

Direct written comments or questions regarding the proposed permit to Rick Bolfig, KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, 66620. Written comments must be received by the close of business April 1 in order to be considered in formulating a final permit decision.

A person may request a public hearing be conducted on the proposed permit. The request for a public hearing shall be in writing and set forth the basis for the request. The written request must be submitted to Connie Carreno, Bureau of Air and Radiation, not later than the close of business April 1 in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

RegulationsArticle 19.—AMBIENT AIR QUALITY STANDARDS
AND AIR POLLUTION CONTROL

28-19-202. Annual emissions fee. (a) The owner or operator of each stationary source of air emissions that has actual emissions of the type and quantity specified in subsection (b) of this regulation shall pay an annual emissions fee to the department. Actual emissions shall be calculated for a calendar year according to K.A.R. 28-19-210.

(b) The types of air emissions and the quantity of actual emissions for which annual emissions fees shall be assessed are:

(1) air emissions of 100 tons per year or more of any of the following:

(A) sulfur oxides measured as sulfur dioxide;

(B) particulate matter calculated as PM10, except if no emission factor or approvable method for calculating PM10 is available, annual emissions fees shall be assessed for total particulate emissions;

(C) nitrogen oxides expressed as nitrogen dioxide; and

(D) total volatile organic compounds;

(2) air emissions of hazardous air pollutants, from source categories other than source categories specifically excluded from the USEPA notice entitled "Initial list of categories of sources under section 112(c)(1) of the clean air act amendments of 1990," 57.FR 31576, July 16, 1992:

(A) of 10 tons per year or more of any single hazardous air pollutant; or

(B) of 25 tons per year or more of any combination of hazardous air pollutants, whichever is greater.

For purposes of this subsection, actual emissions shall include fugitive emissions from federally designated fugitive emission sources and fugitive hazardous air pollutant emissions.

(c) The annual emissions fee shall equal the sum of the actual emissions of the pollutant or pollutants specified in subsection (b) of this regulation, rounded to the nearest ton, multiplied by \$18.00 per ton of emissions, subject to the following:

(1) the owner or operator shall not be required to include any pollutant emitted from the stationary source more than one time in the fee calculation;

(2) the owner or operator shall not be required to include in the emission fee calculation:

(A) emissions of any pollutant of 500 pounds per year or less from any emissions source, unless the total emissions from similar sources at the stationary source equal or exceed 2000 pounds per year;

(B) emissions in excess of 4000 tons per year of any single pollutant from any stationary source;

(C) for a portable emissions unit or stationary source which operates both in Kansas and out-of-state, emissions from the unit or source while operating out-of-state; and

(D) emissions during the years 1995 through 1999 inclusive, from any unit which, as of January 1, 1996, is

designated as an affected unit under section 404, phase I sulfur dioxide requirements, of the federal clean air act;

(3) for emissions occurring during the years 1995 and 1996, the annual emission fee shall be calculated by multiplying the actual emissions of the pollutant or pollutants specified in subsection (b) of this regulation, rounded to the nearest ton, times \$15.00 per ton of emissions.

(d) The owner or operator shall complete the calculations of actual emissions and calculation of the annual emissions fee on forms provided by or approved by the department.

(1) A responsible official or the person most directly responsible for the compilation of the submitted information shall sign the completed forms.

(2) The owner or operator shall submit the annual emissions fee payment to the department by June 1 of the year following the calendar year for which the actual emissions were determined. Timeliness of submissions shall be determined by the postmark if submitted by mail.

(3) The owner or operator shall make annual emissions fee payments by check, draft, or money order payable to the Kansas department of health and environment.

(4) Payment of emission fees to the department shall be the responsibility of the person or persons who are the owners or operators of the emissions unit or stationary source on the date the emissions fee is due. For purposes of calculating actual emissions for a period in which someone other than the current owner or operator was the owner or operator of the stationary source, the owner or operator responsible for paying the fee may assume that operations of the facility were identical to the operation of the facility by the current owner or operator if the current owner or operator has been unable, after reasonable and diligent inquiry, to obtain the actual operating information from the previous owner or operator.

(e) Any owner or operator who fails to timely pay the annual emissions fee:

(1) shall pay an additional fee of \$100.00 or 1% of the annual emissions fee, whichever is greater; and

(2) beginning seven days after the department notifies the permittee in writing that the department has not received the annual emissions fee, shall pay an additional \$10 per day or .05% of the annual emissions fee per day, whichever is greater.

(f) The amount of any overpayment, as determined by the department, made by the owner or operator of a stationary source shall be credited to the annual emissions fee for subsequent years for that stationary source. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 65-3005; implementing K.S.A. 1994 Supp. 65-3024; effective Nov. 22, 1993; amended Jan. 23, 1995; amended March 15, 1996.)

28-19-801. Transportation conformity. (a) The provisions of this regulation shall apply:

(1) to areas of the state which have been identified as not meeting the national primary ambient air quality standard for ozone in the manner prescribed by the provisions of section 107(d) of the federal clean air act, 42 U.S.C. §7407, as promulgated at 40 CFR part 81, as in effect July 1, 1986 and amended at 51 Fed. Reg. 25,202, July 11, 1986; and

(2) with respect to emissions of ozone precursors.

(b) Applicable provisions of the federal transportation conformity rule.

(1) The following sections of 40 CFR part 93, subpart A, entitled "Conformity to State or Federal Implementation Plans of Transportation Plans, Programs, and Projects Developed, Funded or Approved Under Title 23 U.S.C. or the Federal Transit Act," promulgated by the U.S. environmental protection agency on November 24, 1993, are adopted by reference: §§93.100, 93.103, 93.104, 93.106, 93.107, 93.108, 93.109, 93.110, 93.111, 93.113, 93.114, 93.115, 93.118, 93.119, 93.120, 93.122, 93.123, 93.124, 93.129, 93.132, 93.134, and 93.135.

(2) 40 CFR §93.102, as promulgated on November 24, 1993, is adopted by reference except that subparagraphs (b)(1), (b)(2), (b)(3)(ii) and (b)(3)(iii) are deleted.

(3) 40 CFR §93.128, as promulgated on November 24, 1993, is adopted by reference, except that subparagraph (e)(2) is deleted.

(4) 40 CFR §93.130, as promulgated on November 24, 1993, is adopted by reference with the following modifications:

(A) subparagraph (b)(5) of 40 CFR §93.130 is renumbered as subparagraph (a)(6);

(B) the reference in subparagraph (b) of 40 CFR 93.130 to "paragraphs (b)(1) through (5) of this section" shall read "paragraphs (b)(1) through (4) of this section";

(B) any reference made to 40 CFR §93.136 in any of the sections of 40 CFR, part 93, subpart A, adopted by reference pursuant to subparagraph (b)(1) of this regulation, shall be deemed to refer to this subparagraph (b)(5).

(6) The following is adopted in lieu of adoption by reference of 40 CFR §93.133, as promulgated on November 24, 1993, parts of which are inapplicable to the areas of the state identified in paragraph (a) of this regulation:

(A) Before a conformity determination is made, enforceable written commitments must be obtained from project sponsors for any project-level mitigation or control measures which are either:

(i) conditions of the conformity determination for a transportation plan or transportation improvement program; or

(ii) included in the project design concept and scope that is used in the regional emissions analysis required by 40 CFR §93.118 through §93.120 and 40 CFR §93.122 through §93.124.

(B) During the control strategy and maintenance periods, if the metropolitan planning organization or project sponsor believes the mitigation or control measures are no longer necessary for conformity, the project sponsor or operator may be relieved of its obligation to implement the mitigation or control measures if:

(i) it can demonstrate that the requirements of 40 CFR §93.118 and 40 CFR §93.119 are satisfied without the mitigation or control measures; and

(ii) it so notifies the agencies involved in the interagency consultation process required under paragraph (d) of this regulation. The metropolitan planning organization and the U.S. department of transportation shall confirm that the transportation plan and transportation improvement program still satisfy the requirements of 40 CFR §93.118 and 40 CFR §93.119 and that the conformity determinations for the transportation plan, transportation improvement program, and project are still valid without implementation of the mitigation or control measures.

(C) The reference to 40 CFR §93.133(a) in 40 CFR §93.115, which is adopted by reference pursuant to subparagraph (b)(1) of this regulation, shall be deemed to refer to this subparagraph (b)(6).

(7) Any reference to federal regulations in 23 CFR part 450 in any of the sections of 40 CFR part 93 adopted by reference pursuant to this regulation, is to 23 CFR part 450 as in effect on the date of adoption of this regulation.

(8) Any reference to 40 CFR §93.105, consultation, in any of the sections of 40 CFR part 93 adopted by reference, shall be deemed to refer to paragraph (d) of this regulation.

(c) Definitions.

(1) 40 CFR §93.101, definitions, as promulgated on November 24, 1993, is adopted by reference.

(2) For the purposes of this rule the term "Kansas consulting agencies" shall mean:

(A) the Kansas department of health and environment;

(B) the Kansas department of transportation;

(C) the Wyandotte county health department; and

(D) the Johnson county environmental department.

(d) Interagency consultation requirements.

(1) Consultation pursuant to this section shall take place during all periods identified in 40 CFR §93.109, which is adopted by reference pursuant to paragraph (b) of this regulation.

(2) The Kansas consulting agencies shall participate in a consultation process with representatives of:

(A) the Missouri department of natural resources, division of environmental quality, and Missouri local air agencies that elect to participate in the consultation process;

(B) the Missouri department of transportation, and Missouri local transportation agencies;

(C) the federal highway administration of the U.S. department of transportation, the federal transit administration of the U.S. department of transportation, and the U.S. environmental protection agency; and

(D) the Mid-America regional council, in its capacity as the lead planning agency for the Kansas-City air quality region certified by the state of Kansas under section 174 of the federal clean air act, 42 U.S.C. §7504, and in its capacity as the metropolitan planning organization for the Kansas City metropolitan area, designated by the governor of the state of Kansas as responsible for transportation planning under section 134 of Title 23 U.S.C.

(3) Consultation shall be required for:

(A) any conformity determination pertaining to transportation plan, programs, and projects required pursuant to section 176(c)(4) of the federal clean air act, 42 U.S.C. §7506(c)(4), and 40 CFR part 93, subpart A, as promulgated on November 24, 1993; and

(B) all matters listed at 40 CFR §93.105(c), as promulgated on November 24, 1993, which is hereby adopted by reference, with the following modifications:

(i) subparagraph (1)(v) of 40 CFR §93.105(c) is deleted; and

(ii) the reference in subparagraph (5) of 40 CFR §93.105(c) to 40 CFR §93.130 shall be deemed to refer to subparagraph (b)(4) of this regulation. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 65-3005; effective March 15, 1996.)

SENATE BILL No. 409

AN ACT concerning emergency telephone service; relating to the emergency telephone tax and the use of the proceeds thereof; amending K.S.A. 12-5304 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 12-5304 is hereby amended to read as follows: 12-5304. (a) Any governing body imposing the tax authorized by K.S.A. 12-5302, and amendments thereto, may contract directly with the provider of the emergency telephone service or may contract and cooperate with any public agency or with other states or their political subdivisions or with any association or corporation for their political subdivisions or with any association or corporation for the administration of emergency telephone service as provided by law.

(b) Funds collected from tax imposed pursuant to K.S.A. 12-5302, and amendments thereto, shall be spent solely to pay for any or all of the following: (1) The monthly recurring charges billed by the service supplier

for the emergency telephone service; (2) initial installation, service establishment; nonrecurring start-up charges billed by the service supplier for the emergency telephone service; (3) charges for capital improvements and equipment or other physical enhancements to the emergency telephone system; or (4) any combination thereof; or (4) the acquisition and installation of road signs designed to aid in the delivery of emergency service.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 12-5304 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

SENATE BILL No. 464

AN ACT concerning Kansas City, Kansas, and Wyandotte county; relating to consolidation; authorizing the governor to appoint a consolidation study commission; relating to the powers and duties of the commission; amending K.S.A. 19-205 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

New Section 1. As used in the act:

(a) "Commission" means the consolidation study commission of Kansas City, Kansas, and Wyandotte county.

(b) "City" means Kansas City, Kansas.

(c) "County" means Wyandotte county.

New Sec. 2. (a) Except as provided by subsection (c), the following question shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Wyandotte county for their approval or rejection:

"Shall a consolidation study commission be appointed by the governor to study the consolidation of Kansas City, Kansas, and Wyandotte county or the consolidation of certain offices, functions, services and operations thereof?"

(b) The question shall be submitted at the primary election held on the first Tuesday in April, 1996. Such election shall be called and held by the county election officer in the manner provided by the general bond law.

(c) If the presidential preference primary is not held in 1996, the provisions of this section shall not apply.

New Sec. 3. (a) If a majority of the electors voting at the election vote in favor of the question submitted pursuant to section 2, or if there is no presidential preference primary held in 1996, the governor shall appoint a five-member consolidation study commission. Such appointments shall be made by May 15, 1996. No more than three members of the commission shall be from the same political party. Members of the commission shall include, but not be limited to, persons with experience in accounting, business management, municipal finance, law, education, political science or public administration. No elected official of the cities of Bonner Springs, Edwardsville, Lake Quivira or Kansas City or Wyandotte county, nor any person appointed to fill a vacancy in an elected office of such cities or county, shall serve on the commission. No full-time paid employee of the cities of Bonner Springs, Edwardsville, Lake Quivira or Kansas City or Wyandotte county shall serve on the commission. Members of the commission shall be residents of Wyandotte county.

(b) Members of the commission shall be paid compensation, subsistence allowances, mileage and other expenses as provided by K.S.A. 75-3223, and amendments thereto.

(c) The governor shall appoint an executive director of the commission. The executive director shall receive compensation established by the governor, within the limits of appropriations for that purpose. The executive director shall employ other staff and may contract with consultants, as the executive director deems necessary to carry out the functions of the commission. Staff employed by the executive director shall receive compensation established by the executive director and approved by the governor, within the limits of appropriations for that purpose.

(d) Within 30 days following the appointment of all members of the commission, the commission shall meet and organize by the election of a chairperson and vice-chairperson and other officers deemed necessary. The commission may adopt rules governing the conduct of its meetings.

New Sec. 4. (a) The commission shall prepare and adopt a plan addressing the consolidation of the city and county or certain city and county offices, functions, services and operations. The commission shall conduct

such studies and investigations, as it deems appropriate to complete its work. Such studies and investigations shall include, but not be limited to:

(1) Studies of the efficiency and effectiveness of the administrative operations of the city and county.

(2) Studies of the costs and benefits of consolidating the city and county or certain city and county offices, functions, services and operations.

(b) The commission shall hold public hearings for the purpose of receiving information and materials which will aid in the drafting of the plan.

(c) For the purposes of performing its studies and investigations, the commission or its executive director may administer oaths and affirmations, subpoena witnesses, compel their attendance, take evidence, require the production of any books, papers, correspondence, memoranda, agreements or other documents or records which the commission or executive director deems relevant or material to its studies and investigation.

(d) On or before November 29, 1996, the commission shall prepare and adopt a preliminary plan addressing the consolidation of the city and county or certain city and county offices, functions, services and operations it deems advisable. Copies of the preliminary plan shall be filed with the county election officer, city clerk and each public library within the county and shall be available to members of the public for inspection upon request. The commission shall hold at least one public hearing to obtain citizen views concerning the preliminary plan. Notice of such hearing or hearings shall be published at least once in a newspaper of general circulation within the county. Following the public hearings on the preliminary plan, the commission may adopt, or modify and adopt, the preliminary plan as the final plan.

(e) On or before January 13, 1997, the commission shall submit its final plan to the governor and legislature. The final plan shall include the full text and an explanation of the proposed plan, and comments deemed desirable by the commission, a written opinion by an attorney admitted to practice law in the state of Kansas and retained by the executive director for such purpose that the proposed plan is not in conflict with the constitution or the laws of the state, and any minority reports. Copies of the final plan shall be filed with the county election officer, city clerk and each public library within the county and shall be available to members of the public for inspection upon request. The commission shall continue in existence at least 90 days following the submission of the final plan pursuant to this subsection.

(f) Unless the legislature, by concurrent resolution adopted on or before February 12, 1997, the 30th day of the 1997 regular session, rejects such plan, the plan shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the county at the school district general election on April 1, 1997. Such election shall be called and held by the county election officer in the manner provided by the general bond law. A summary of the final plan shall be prepared by the commission and shall be published once each week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation within the county. If a majority of the electors voting on the plan vote in favor thereof, the consolidation plan shall be implemented in the manner provided by the plan. If a majority of the electors vote against such plan, the proposed consolidation plan shall not be implemented.

If the commission submits a final plan which does not recommend the consolidation of the city and county or certain city and county offices, functions, services and operations, the provisions of this subsection shall not apply.

New Sec. 5. (a) Any plan submitted by the commission shall provide for the exercise of powers of local legislation and administration not inconsistent with the constitution or other laws of this state.

(b) If the commission submits a plan providing for the consolidation of certain city and county offices, functions, services and operations, the plan shall:

(1) Include a description of the form, structure, functions, powers and officers and the duties of such officers recommended in the plan.

(2) Provide for the method of amendment of the plan.

(3) Authorize the appointment of, or elimination of elective officials and offices.

(4) Specify the effective date of the consolidation.

(5) Include other provisions determined necessary by the commission.

(c) If the plan provides for the consolidation of the city and county, in addition to the requirements of subsection (b) the plan shall:

(1) Fix the boundaries of the governing body's election districts, provide a method for changing the boundaries from time-to-time, any large positions on the governing body, fix the number, term and initial compensation of the governing body of the consolidated city-county and the method of election.

(2) Determine whether elections of the governing body of the consolidated city-county shall be partisan or nonpartisan elections and the time at which such elections shall be held.

(3) Determine the distribution of legislative and administrative duties of the consolidated city-county officials, provide for consolidation or expansion of services as necessary, authorize the appointment of a consolidated city-county administrator or a city-county manager, if deemed advisable, and prescribe the general structure of the consolidated city-county government.

(4) Provide for the official name of the consolidated city-county.

(5) Provide for the transfer or other disposition of property and other rights, claims and assets of the county and city.

New Sec. 6. (a) If the voters approve a plan which provides for the consolidation of the city and county, such consolidated city-county shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

(b) Wyandotte county is hereby designated an urban area, as authorized under the provisions of section 17 of article 2 of the constitution of the state of Kansas, for the purpose of granting to such county and urban area powers of local government and consolidation of local government.

(c) The consolidated city-county shall be subject to the cash-basis and budget laws of the state of Kansas.

(d) Except as provided in subsection (e), and in any other statute which specifically exempts bonds from the statutory limitations on bonded indebtedness, the limitation on bonded indebtedness of a consolidated city-county under this act shall be 30% of the assessed value of all tangible taxable property within such county on the preceding August 25.

(e) The following shall not be included in computing the total bonded indebtedness of the consolidated city-county for the purposes of determining the limitations on bonded indebtedness:

(1) Bonds issued for the purpose of refunding outstanding debt, including outstanding bonds and matured coupons thereof, or judgments thereon.

(2) Bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of article 46 of chapter 19 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, and amendments thereto.

(3) Bonds issued for the purpose of financing the construction or remodeling of a courthouse, jail or law enforcement center facility, which bonds are payable from the proceeds of a retailers' sales tax.

(4) Bonds issued for the purpose of acquiring, enlarging, extending or improving any storm or sanitary sewer system.

(5) Bonds issued for the purpose of acquiring, enlarging, extending or improving any municipal utility.

(6) Bonds issued to pay the cost of improvements to intersections of streets and alleys or that portion of any street immediately in front of city or school district property.

(f) Any bonded indebtedness and interest thereon incurred by the city or county prior to consolidation shall remain an obligation of the property subject to taxation for the payment thereof prior to such consolidation.

(g) Upon the effective date of the consolidation of the city and county, any retailers' sales tax levied by the city or county in accordance with K.S.A. 12-187 *et seq.*, and amendment thereto, prior to such date, shall remain in full force and effect, except that part of the rate attributable to the former city shall not apply to retail sales in the cities of Bonner Springs, Edwardsville and Lake Quivira.

(h) Upon the effective date of the consolidation of the city and county, the territory of the consolidated city-county shall include:

(1) All of the territory of the county for purposes of exercising the powers, duties and functions of a county.

(2) All of the territory of the county, except the territory of the cities of Bonner Springs, Edwardsville, Lake Quivira and the unincorporated area of the county, for purposes of exercising the powers, duties and functions of a city.

(i) For the purposes of section 1 of article 5 of the constitution of the state of Kansas, the "voting area" for the governing body of the consolidated city-county shall include all the territory within Wyandotte county.

(j) Except for the consolidated city-county and unless otherwise provided by law, other political subdivisions of the county shall not be af-

fect by consolidation of the city and county. Such other political subdivisions shall continue in existence and operation.

(k) Unless otherwise provided by law, the consolidated city-county shall be eligible for the distribution of any funds from the state and federal government as if no consolidation had occurred. Except as provided in this subsection, the population and assessed valuation of the territory of the consolidated city-county shall be considered its population and assessed valuation for purposes of the distribution of moneys from the state or federal government.

(l) The consolidated city-county shall be a county. The governing body of the consolidated city-county shall be considered county commissioners for the purposes of section 2 of article 4 of the constitution of the state of Kansas and shall have all the powers, functions and duties of a county and may exercise home rule powers in the manner and subject to the limitations provided by K.S.A. 19-101a, and amendments thereto, and other laws of this state.

The governing body of the consolidated city-county shall be responsible for any duties or functions imposed by the constitution of the state of Kansas and other laws of this state upon any county office abolished by the consolidation plan. Such duties may be delegated by the governing body or as provided in the consolidation plan.

(m) The consolidated city-county shall be a city of the first class. The governing body of the consolidated city-county shall have all the powers, functions and duties of a city of the first class and may exercise home rule powers in the manner and subject to the limitations provided by article 12 of section 5 of the constitution of the state of Kansas and other laws of this state.

(n) The governing body of the consolidated city-county may create special service districts within the city-county and may levy taxes for services provided in such districts.

(o) Changes in the form of government approved by the voters in accordance with the consolidation plan are hereby declared to be legislative matters and subject to initiative and referendum in accordance with K.S.A. 12-3013 et seq., and amendments thereto.

New Sec. 7. (a) The governing body of a consolidated city-county may not annex any land located outside the county.

(b) The governing body of a consolidated city-county may not initiate annexation procedures of land located within the county, but may annex land upon petition of the owners of any such land.

Sec. 8. K.S.A. 19-205 is hereby amended to read as follows: 19-205. Except as provided by sections 5 and 6, no person holding any state, county, township or city office shall be eligible to the office of county commissioner in any county in this state.

Nothing in this section shall prohibit the appointment of any county commissioner to any state board, committee, council, commission or similar body which is established pursuant to statutory authority, so long as any county commissioner so appointed is not entitled to receive any pay, compensation, subsistence, mileage or expenses for serving on such body other than that which is provided by law to be paid in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 75-3223, and amendments thereto.

Sec. 9. K.S.A. 19-205 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 10. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

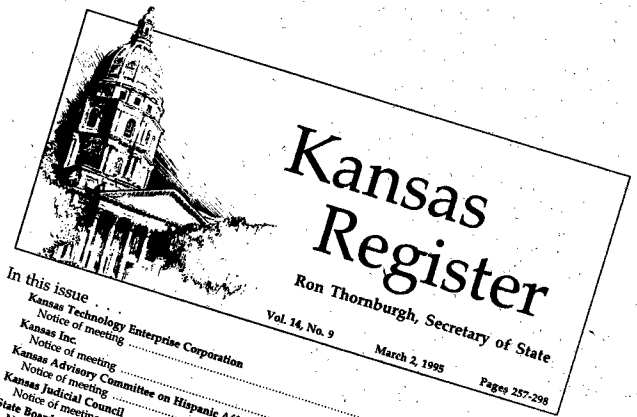
