Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 2 p.m. Friday, May 24, at the SRS Staff Development, Room B, 300 S.W. Oakley, Topeka State Hospital grounds, to consider the adoption of new and amended changes in existing rules and regulations on a permanent basis effective July 1, 1996. Telephone conference will not be available.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing or during the public hearing to Hope Burns, Office of the Secretary, Room 603-N, Docking State Office Building, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views; it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

The phrase "Federal Mandate" following an item indicates that the change is required by federal policy. Optional changes in regulations related to federal programs are subject to approval by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Copies of the regulations and the economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting Hope Burns at (913) 296-3969.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Hope Burns at (913) 296-3969 or by calling the Kansas Relay Center at 1-800-766-3777.

The adoption of the July 1, 1996, permanent regulations will take place at 9 a.m. Wednesday, May 29, in the SRS executive conference room, 603-N, Docking State Office Building. Telephone conference will not be available.

A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows:

Article 4.—PUBLIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

30-4-63. KanWork program requirements. This regulation is being amended to remove the requirement that a person's illness or incapacity prevents the person from entering or engaging in training for purposes of exempting the person from the KanWork program. The exemption is now only applicable to persons who are prevented from employment by their condition. Other technical changes also have been incorporated.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernable economic impact.

30-4-64. Work program requirements. This regulation is being amended to remove the requirement that a person's illness or incapacity prevents the person from entering or engaging in training for purposes of exempting the person from work program requirements. The exemption is now only applicable to persons who are pre-

vented from employment by their condition. Other technical changes also have been incorporated.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernable economic impact.

30-4-85a. Eligibility factors specific to the emergency assistance program. This regulation is being amended to clarify language as per comments made by the Joint Committee on Rules and Regulations.

Economic Impact: None.

30-4-96. Burial assistance program. This regulation is being amended to make the following changes to the eligibility criteria and assistance provided:

1. Only the assets in the person's estate or owned by the person's family at the time of death will be considered in determining eligibility. Where the person was not living with his or her child under age 21, spouse, or adult disabled child, the estate will be considered available. If the person was living with one of the above mentioned individuals, the assets of the family will be considered.

2. The total proceeds from any life insurance policy on the decedent will be considered available if the policy was owned by the decedent, his or her spouse, or his or her parent if the decedent was a child under age 21.

3. Cash contributions from families and friends will no longer be counted in determining assistance.

4. If the assets considered available do not exceed \$2,000, burial assistance may be provided. If the assets are over \$2,000, there is ineligibility for assistance.

5. The agency will not participate in payment of burial expenses if the total expenses exceed \$3,000.

6. If eligible, the amount of assistance provided shall be \$550.

Other related technical changes also have been made as a result of the Governor's budget recommendation to reduce expenditures in the program in FY 1997.

Economic Impact: This change is expected to result in state general fund savings of almost \$182,000 in FY 1997 and succeeding fiscal years.

Bearer of Cost: None.

Affected Parties:

1. This change will have a moderate administrative impact on SRS staff by streamlining and simplifying current eligibility criteria.

2. This change will have negative impact on some families as the consideration of life insurance proceeds will result in 51 fewer burials paid under the program.

3. This change will have a beneficial impact on the state funeral home directors. Although less assistance will be provided by placing a \$3,000 limit on the total cost of burial expenses, the directors will be allowed to seek contributions from families and friends of the decedent to pay the remaining expenses without being subject to reduced assistance.

Other Methods: The agency considered other methods of achieving the necessary reductions to stay within the budget recommendation. This method was decided upon as it had only a minor impact on the total burials paid for under the program while achieving the cost savings needed. The agency worked in cooperation with the Kan-

sas Funeral Directors Association in developing this program change.

30-4-121. Special allowances for burial expenses. This regulation is being revoked as the payment standard for burial assistance is now contained in K.A.R. 30-4-96.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-96.

30-4-130. Types of payments. This regulation is being amended to remove the protective payment requirement when a caretaker relative has been removed from an AFDC or GA assistance plan due to failure to cooperate with child support enforcement, third party resource provisions, or work program requirements.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernable economic impact.

Article 5.—PROVIDER PARTICIPATION, SCOPE OF SERVICES, AND REQUIREMENTS FOR THE MEDICAID (MEDICAL ASSISTANCE) PROGRAM

30-5-58. Definitions. This regulation is being amended to remove the term "precertification."

Economic Impact: The definition for "precertification" has been identical with "prior authorization." Removing "precertification" has no impact.

30-5-64. Prior authorization or precertification. The term "precertification" is being eliminated from this regulation. There is no change in which services require prior authorization. Prior authorization and precertification have had identical definitions.

Economic Impact: This change will have no fiscal impact. Services that required precertification will require prior authorization.

30-5-81. Scope of hospital services. This regulation is being changed to remove heart and liver transplants from prior authorization. Also, since the Kansas University Medical Center has no heart transplant program, references to KUMC as the sole provider of these transplants is being removed.

Economic Impact: Since the agency has never withheld prior authorization of heart or liver transplants for an eligible consumer, lifting this burden from providers will have no fiscal impact.

30-5-88. Scope of physician services. This regulation is being amended to remove prior authorization requirements from heart and liver transplants and to remove references to the Kansas University Medical Center as the sole provider of these services.

Economic Impact: None.

Article 6.—MEDICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM— CLIENTS' ELIGIBILITY FOR PARTICIPATION

30-6-65. Automatic eligibles. This regulation has been amended to eliminate automatic medical coverage for persons rendered ineligible for ADC for failure to cooperate with child support enforcement and work program requirements or due to fraud disqualification.

Economic Impact: This change is expected to result in loss of medical coverage for approximately 790 adults

and an annual savings of approximately \$1.2 million (\$500,000 state general fund).

Bearer of Cost: None.

Affected Parties:

1. This change will have a moderate administrative impact on SRS staff in regard to casework required to eliminate coverage, but should have only minimal impact on an ongoing basis.

2. This change will have a negative impact on approximately 790 adults by eliminating medical coverage for them. Such adults would not be otherwise eligible for any other medical assistance program.

Other Methods: No other methods were considered. This change is being made to provide a further disincentive for adults who refuse to abide by ADC program requirements. Medical as well as cash assistance can be provided once the individual has cooperated. The change further promotes individual responsibility, one of the key components of welfare reform. Neither children nor pregnant women are affected by this change. This regulation is being further amended to delete the following requirements in the determination of transitional medical assistance eligibility:

1. Providing ongoing status reports;
2. Continuation of employment; and
3. Income below 185 percent of federal poverty.

Economic Impact: This change is expected to continue assistance for approximately 70 additional families each month resulting in an increase in expenditures of approximately \$398,000 a year (\$163,000 state general fund).

Bearer of Cost: The taxpayers of the State of Kansas will bear the additional costs of this change through appropriated state and federal funds.

Affected Parties:

1. This change will have a moderate impact on SRS staff as it simplifies the current program and streamlines the eligibility process.

2. The change will benefit approximately 70 families each month by continuing medical benefits to them.

Other Methods: The agency discussed other methods regarding this change, but took this action to streamline current program criteria without negatively impacting current eligibles. Although the change increases program costs, this increase is offset by changes made regarding automatic medical coverage as described above.

Article 7.—APPEALS, FAIR HEARINGS AND AFDC/GA DISQUALIFICATION HEARINGS

30-7-102. Disqualification hearings. This regulation is being amended to remove the provision that postpones the fraud disqualification until after a reapplication for AFDC or GA is approved. Other technical changes also have been made.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernable economic impact.

30-7-103. Waiver of the administrative disqualification hearing. This regulation is being amended to remove the provision to postpone the disqualification period after a reapplication for AFDC or GA is approved.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-7-102.

30-7-104. Court actions on consent agreements. This regulation is being amended to remove the provision for postponing the fraud disqualification until after a reapplication for AFDC or GA is approved.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-7-102.

Article 10.—ADULT CARE HOME PROGRAM

30-10-21. Reserve days. This regulation is being amended to end the requirement for an exchange of paperwork for reserve day billing.

Economic Impact: The regulation change reduces the amount of paperwork sent to the fiscal agent for processing.

30-10-217. ICF-MR reserve days. This regulation is being changed to reduce unnecessary paperwork transfer between the agency, providers and the fiscal agent.

Economic Impact: There is no fiscal impact.

Article 41.—LICENSING OF COMMUNITY BASED AGENCIES PROVIDING SERVICES TO ADULTS WITH MENTAL RETARDATION OR OTHER DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES

30-41-1 through 30-41-5, 30-41-6a, 30-41-6c through 30-41-6h, 30-41-7a through 30-41-7i, 30-41-8, and 30-41-10 through 30-41-20 are being revoked because they are being replaced by new Article 63—Licensing Providers of Community Services.

Economic Impact: None.

Article 63.—DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES: LICENSING OF PROVIDERS OF COMMUNITY SERVICES

30-63-1, 30-63-10 through 30-63-14, and 30-63-20 through 30-63-31. These proposed regulations replace the current licensing regulations found in Article 41. They provide for the health and safety requirements which community agencies providing services to developmentally disabled persons must meet in order to be licensed. These regulations update the language, streamline the regulatory process by eliminating unnecessary requirements, and clarify the department expectations of the minimum standards providers must meet in order to be licensed.

Economic Impact: None.

Article 64.—DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES: COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITY ORGANIZATIONS (CDDOs)

30-64-1. This proposed regulation outlines the requirements of an organized network of community services statewide which must be met by local Community Developmental Disability Organizations (CDDOs) pursuant to K.S.A. 39-1801 et seq. Outcome expectations were established for CDDOs in areas identified by a DD Reform Act Steering Committee as critical to implementation of a statewide organized network of community services for persons with developmental disabilities.

These expectations became the basis for the proposed regulations.

Economic Impact: A preliminary estimate is based on a range of projections from community agencies which represented large, medium and small Community Developmental Disability Organizations. The large agency represents an urban area and the medium and small agencies represent rural areas. The estimated costs varied by function as some agencies were engaging in some of the required activities prior to enactment of DD reform and some were not. There was general agreement the projected costs were not to include any costs of services to consumers or any provider administrative costs for providing services directly to consumers. Some agencies expect to carry out the required functions by adding duties to current staff with little fiscal impact, and some will need to add staff.

The range of estimates were from \$1.05 per client per day for the large urban agency; \$2.59 per client per day for the medium rural agency; and \$2.77 per client per day for the small rural agency. An average of the three is \$2.13 per client per day, which projects to a total possible economic impact system wide for persons currently receiving community services to be \$3.83 million. It is the agency's belief that this is a high estimate and actual implementation will be less. Estimates from additional agencies will be solicited.

Bearer of Cost: Community Developmental Disability Organizations within legislative appropriations.

Affected Parties:

1. Agency proposing regulation—None.
2. Other governmental agencies or units—None.
3. Consumers—Primary beneficiaries: an organized, coordinated, efficient system of community services will mean consumers and families will be able to access equivalent services in all areas of the state and will have portability to assure they have services no matter where they may need to move.

Other Methods: The committee working on the statement of economic impact could not agree on any other methods which would still carry out the letter and intent of the legislation.

30-64-10 through 30-64-13 and 30-64-20 through 30-64-34. These proposed regulations outline the requirements of an organized network of community services statewide which must be met by local Community Developmental Disability Organizations (CDDOs) pursuant to K.S.A. 39-1801 et seq. Outcome expectations were established for CDDOs in areas identified by a DD Reform Act Steering Committee as critical to implementation of a statewide organized network of community services for persons with developmental disabilities. These expectations became the basis for the proposed regulations.

Economic Impact: See economic impact statement for 30-64-1.

HB 3076, by Committee on Appropriations: An act concerning the department of revenue; relating to fees to provide access to or to furnish copies of certain data in electronic database systems of the department; prescribing certain guidelines; establishing the electronic databases fee fund; amending K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-2012 and repealing the existing section.

HB 3077, by Committee on Appropriations: An act concerning district hospitals; selection of board members; amending K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 80-2508 and repealing the existing section.

HB 3078, by Committee on Appropriations: An act concerning the Kansas commission on veterans affairs; relating to the Kansas soldiers' home; authorizing contracts for administrative services and other services therefor; amending K.S.A. 76-1904 and repealing the existing section.

HB 3079, by Committee on Taxation: An act relating to collection of delinquent oil and gas property tax; amending K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 79-2101 and repealing the existing section.

House Concurrent Resolutions

HCR 5046, A concurrent resolution memorializing the President and the United States Congress to take action to identify, locate and provide funds for research and treatment of Gulf War illness among Persian Gulf War Veterans and their families; to work jointly with private research facilities; to review and declassify information on this illness; and place a moratorium on blood, blood products and organ donations by Gulf War Veterans.

HCR 5047, A concurrent resolution urging the Governor of Kansas, the Secretary of Health and Environment, the executive director of the Commission on Veterans' Affairs, other appropriate state agency heads and veterans service organizations to take action to create a state registry of spouses and family members of veterans and other persons having symptoms of Gulf War illness.

HCR 5048, A concurrent resolution concerning institutional and system-wide performance measures for state educational institutions under the control and supervision of the State Board of Regents.

House Resolutions

HR 6015, A resolution urging the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services and the administration of President Clinton to pursue

with all available means the granting of federal waivers for the 1994 Kansas Welfare Reform Act.

HR 6016, A resolution memorializing Congress to enact legislation providing for uniform income tax treatment of health insurance premium expenses.

Advisory Opinion No. 96-6

Written March 7, 1996, to Arlene Eveleigh, Ellis.

This opinion is in response to your letter of February 21, 1996, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the local level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction concerning your question is limited to the application of K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a Trego County Commissioner. You advise us that you own a business, as well as land you intend to develop into home sites, both of which have water meters that were purchased prior to you becoming a commissioner, from the Rural Water District Board that serves Trego County.

You note that other than voting on a block grant for the water district, neither you, nor your spouse, hold a position with the district board, or have any other connection with the board other than as a customer.

Question

Is it a conflict of interest if questions concerning the water district were to come before the county commission?

Opinion

We first note that for the local level conflict of interest laws to apply, a "substantial interest," as defined by K.S.A. 75-4301a(a), must be held in a "person" or "business." That subsection states:

"Substantial interest" means any of the following: (1) If an individual or an individual's spouse, either individually or collectively, has owned within the preceding 12 months a legal or equitable interest exceeding \$5,000 or 5% of any business, whichever is less, the individual has a substantial interest in that business.

(2) If an individual or an individual's spouse, either individually or collectively, has received during the preceding calendar year compensation which is or will be required to be included as taxable income on federal income tax returns of the individual and spouse in an aggregate amount of \$2,000 from any business or combination of businesses, the individual has a substantial interest in that business or combination of businesses.

(3) If an individual or an individual's spouse, either individually or collectively, has received in the preceding 12 months, without reasonable and valuable consideration, goods or services having an aggregate value of \$500 or more from a business or combination of businesses, the individual has a substantial interest in that business or combination of businesses.

(4) If an individual or an individual's spouse holds the position of officer, director, associate, partner or proprietor of any business, other than an organization exempt from federal taxation of corporations under section

501(c)(3), (4), (6), (7), (8), (10) or (19) of chapter 26 of the United States code, the individual has a substantial interest in that business, irrespective of the amount of compensation received by the individual or individual's spouse.

(5) If an individual or an individual's spouse receives compensation which is a portion or percentage of each separate fee or commission paid to a business or combination of businesses, the individual has a substantial interest in any client or customer who pays fees or commissions to the business or combination of businesses from which fees or commissions the individual or the individual's spouse, either individually or collectively, received an aggregate of \$2,000 or more in the preceding calendar year.

As used in this subsection, "client or customer" means a business or combination of businesses.

K.S.A. 75-4301a(b) states:

"Business" means any corporation, association, partnership, proprietorship, trust, joint venture, and every other business interest, including ownership or use of land for income.

As the commission understands the situation, neither you, nor your spouse, meet the statutory definition for holding a "substantial interest" in the water district. Therefore, the prohibitions found in the local level conflict of interest laws would not be applicable to your situation. Thus, it would not be a conflict for you to act, in your capacity as a commissioner, in dealings with the water district.

In closing, we note that even if you or your spouse met the K.S.A. 75-4301a(a) statutory definition for holding a "substantial interest" in the water district, since the definition of "business" found in K.S.A. 75-4301a(b) does not include governmental subdivisions, and there is not a definition of "person" in the local level conflict of interest laws, this commission has consistently held that a "substantial interest" cannot be held in local subdivisions of government such as a water district. Therefore, the prohibitions found in the local level conflict of interest laws would not be triggered and you could act, in the capacity as a commissioner, in dealings with the water district.

Advisory Opinion No. 96-7

Written March 7, 1996, to Honorable Bob Knight, Office of the Mayor, Wichita.

This opinion is in response to your letter of February 21, 1996, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the Campaign Finance Act (K.S.A. 25-4142 *et seq.*).

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as the mayor of the City of Wichita. You advise us that you have been appointed by the National League of Cities to co-chair the "Election '96 Task Force." As a member of this task force, you have been invited to attend the Republican National Convention in San Diego, California.

Question

Is it permissible, under the campaign finance act, for you to use campaign funds to pay for the expenses of attending the Republican National Convention?

Opinion

K.S.A. 25-4157a(a) applies to your question. That subsection states:

No moneys received by any candidate or candidate committee of any candidate as a contribution under this act shall be used or be made available for the personal use of the candidate and no such moneys shall be used by such candidate or the candidate committee of such candidate except for legitimate campaign purposes, for expenses of holding political office or for contributions to the party committees of the political party of which such candidate is a member.

For the purpose of this section, expenditures for "personal use" shall include expenditures to defray normal living expenses for the candidate or the candidate's family and expenditures for the personal benefit of the candidate having no direct connection with or effect upon the campaign of the candidate or the holding of public office.

Based on the information you have provided to the commission, we believe that since the mayor of Wichita is elected on a non-partisan basis, and since co-chairing the task force and attending the Republican National Convention does not have a "direct connection with or effect upon" being the mayor of Wichita, the situation you describe would not be "for legitimate campaign purposes" or "for expenses of holding political office." Thus, you would not be permitted, under the campaign finance act, to use your campaign funds to attend the convention.

Advisory Opinion No. 96-8

Written March 7, 1996, to Steve Seawall, Department of Administration, Division of Accounts and Reports, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of February 16, 1996, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction concerning your question is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as an accountant for the Department of Administration, Division of Accounts and Reports. You advise us that until recently you were employed in the Municipal Accounting Section as an audit review supervisor. Your job responsibilities did not include designing computer software. However, during your off-duty hours, you developed computer software called "Budget Helper" which would assist municipalities in their budget preparation. You have now entered into an agreement with a CPA firm to market your software. The Municipal Accounting Section has budget spreadsheet software that was developed by other employees within the section that is sold to various municipalities.

Question

Is it a violation of the state level conflict of interest laws for a state employee, during off-duty hours, to develop and market computer software that would be in business

competition with software designed by that employee's state agency?

Opinion

As the commission understands the situation, we find nothing in the state level conflict of interest laws which prohibits the situation you describe. However, we do note that under K.S.A. 46-241 you may not use any confidential information acquired during your state duties to further your private business interest.

Advisory Opinion No. 96-9

Written March 7, 1996, to Thomas Dow, Kansas Department of Commerce and Housing, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of March 5, 1996, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction concerning your question is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as an employee of the Community Development Division within the Kansas Department of Housing and Commerce (KDH&C). You advise us that in that capacity, you perform administrative duties related solely to the administration of the Disaster Recovery Program.

You have the opportunity to perform some consulting work for a not-for-profit economic development corporation during your off-duty hours with the state. You state that your consulting work would not involve any program, product or service offered by Community Development Division, nor would you be using any state office equipment.

Question

Is it a violation of the state level conflict of interest laws for an employee of KDH&C to work as a consultant for a not-for-profit economic development corporation during off-duty hours?

Opinion

K.S.A. 46-233(a) may apply to the situation you describe. That subsection states:

No state officer or employee shall in the capacity as such officer or employee be substantially involved in the preparation of or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which such officer or employee is employed or in whose business such officer or employee or any member of such officer's or employee's immediate family has a substantial interest and no such person or business shall enter into any contract where any state officer or employee, acting in such capacity, is a signatory to, has been substantially involved in the preparation of or is a participant in the making of such contract and is employed by such person or business or such officer or employee or any member of such officer's or employee's immediate family has a substantial interest in such person or business. Substantial interest means "substantial interest" as defined by K.S.A. 46-229, and amendments thereto, and any such interest held within the pre-

(continued)

ceding twelve months of the act or event of participating in the preparation of making a contract.

Whenever any individual has, within the preceding two years participated as a state officer or employee in the making of any contract with any person or business, such individual shall not accept employment with such person or business for one year following termination of employment as a state officer or employee.

The issue raised in applying this language to your situation is the appropriate definition of the word "employment." While it could be argued that a broad definition of that term would include consulting as an independent contractor, this commission has consistently held that since the term is used twice in the same sentence and the second usage clearly applies to a master/servant setting, and further, since this is a criminal statute which must be strictly construed, that "employment" means those settings where a true employer/employee relationship is established.

Thus, we believe that as an independent contractor doing consultant work, this section would not apply and the situation you describe would not be a violation of the state level conflict of interest laws.

If, instead, you were going to do consulting work for the corporation as an employee, then so long as you had not participated, as a state employee, in the making of any contracts between the state and the corporation, the situation you describe would not be a violation of the state level conflict of interest laws.

The commission does draw your attention to K.S.A. 46-241, which prohibits the use of confidential information obtained as a state employee to further personal economic interests.

Advisory Opinion No. 96-10

Written March 7, 1996, to Jacqueline Clark, State Legislative Coordinator, Hallmark Cards, Inc., Kansas City, Missouri.

This opinion is in response to your letter of March 6, 1996, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction concerning your question is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as legislative coordinator for the Hallmark Cards Corporation. You advise us that Hallmark wants to assist the state of Kansas in encouraging parents to immunize their children by donating a large quantity of greeting cards to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE). The cards would be pre-printed with the signatures of the governor and first lady and "Operation Immunize." The cards, which would be sent to new parents, would include a detachable immunization record for their use. You believe the cards would help promote the state's efforts to increase immunization rates for children.

Question

Based on the factual situation you describe, we understand you ask us the following questions:

1. Is it a violation of the state level conflict of interest laws for Hallmark Cards, Inc. to give the greeting cards to the KDHE?
2. If it is not a violation to give the cards, what reporting requirements, if any, would exist?

Opinion

We have reviewed the state level conflict of interest laws in their entirety and two sections may apply to your questions.

K.S.A. 46-237(c) states:

(c) No person licensed, inspected or regulated by a state agency shall offer, pay, give or make any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year to such agency or any state officer or employee, candidate for state office or state officer elect of that agency.

K.S.A. 46-225(a)(1) states:

"Lobbying" means promoting or opposing in any manner action or nonaction by the legislature on any legislative matter or the adoption or nonadoption of any rule and regulation by any state agency.

As the commission understands the situation, the KDHE does not license, inspect or regulate your company as those terms are used in K.S.A. 46-237(c). Therefore, the prohibition in that subsection would not apply to your question. In addition, K.A.R. 19-40-3a(7)(b)(2)(A) excludes from the definition of "gift" those "goods or services which are provided to a state agency which does not license, inspect nor regulate the giver and are used to benefit the state as a whole." We believe the cards and immunization checklists will benefit the citizens of Kansas as a whole, and therefore are not a "gift." Thus, the situation you describe would not be a violation of the state level conflict of interest laws.

In answer to your second question, the lobbying laws would not be triggered since the giving of the cards is not to "promote or oppose" any rule or regulation of the KDHE. Thus, Hallmark Cards Corporation would have no reporting requirements under Kansas lobbying provisions.

Advisory Opinion No. 96-11

Written March 7, 1996, to Honorable Dale Oglesby, Galena.

This opinion is in response to your letter of January 29, 1996, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the local level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction concerning your questions is limited to the application of K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as mayor for the City of Galena, Kansas. You advise us that in order to improve jail conditions in Cherokee County, you are proposing, as a private businessman, a business idea to the county commissioners that would involve a contract between the county and a management company in which you have a minority interest. You further advise us that you have filed to run for the position of sheriff and the proposal could affect that position's salary, although any proposed contracts would be in place before you became sheriff.

Question

Based on the factual situation you have described, you ask us the following questions:

1. Is it a violation of the local level conflict of interest laws for a mayor, in the capacity as a private businessperson, to be involved in a contract with the county?
2. Is it a violation of the local level conflict of interest laws for a candidate for sheriff, as a private businessperson, to be involved in a contract with the county?

Opinion

K.S.A. 75-4301a and K.S.A. 75-4304 apply to your questions.

K.S.A. 75-4301a(a) states:

"Substantial interest" means any of the following: (1) If an individual or an individual's spouse, either individually or collectively, has owned within the preceding 12 months a legal or equitable interest exceeding \$5,000 or 5% of any business, whichever is less, the individual has a substantial interest in that business.

(2) If an individual or an individual's spouse, either individually or collectively, has received during the preceding calendar year compensation which is or will be required to be included as taxable income on federal income tax returns of the individual and spouse in an aggregate amount of \$2,000 from any business or combination of businesses, the individual has a substantial interest in that business or combination of businesses.

(3) If an individual or an individual's spouse, either individually or collectively, has received in the preceding 12 months, without reasonable and valuable consideration, goods or services having an aggregate value of \$500 or more from a business or combination of businesses, the individual has a substantial interest in that business or combination of businesses.

(4) If an individual or an individual's spouse holds the position of officer, director, associate, partner or proprietor of any business, other than an organization exempt from federal taxation of corporations under section 501(c) (3), (4), (6), (7), (8), (10), or (19) of chapter 26 of the United States code, the individual has a substantial interest in that business, irrespective of the amount of compensation received by the individual or individual's spouse.

(5) If an individual or an individual's spouse receives compensation which is a portion or percentage of each separate fee or commission paid to a business or combination of businesses, the individual has a substantial interest in any client or customer who pays fees or commissions to the business or combination of businesses from which fees or commissions the individual or the individual's spouse, either individually or collectively, received an aggregate of \$2,000 or more in the preceding calendar year.

As used in this subsection, "client or customer" means a business or combination of businesses.

K.S.A. 75-4304 states:

(a) No local governmental officer or employee shall, in the capacity of such an officer or employee, make or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which the officer or employee is employed or in whose business the officer or employee has a substantial interest.

(b) No person or business shall enter into any contract where any local governmental officer or employee, acting in that capacity, is a signatory to or a participant in the making of the contract and is employed by or has a substantial interest in the person or business.

(c) A local governmental officer or employee does not make or participate in the making of a contract if the officer or employee abstains from any action in regard to the contract.

(d) This section shall not apply to the following:

(1) Contracts let after competitive bidding had been advertised for by published notice; and

(2) contracts for property or services for which the price or rate is fixed by law.

(e) Any local governmental officer or employee who is convicted of violating this section shall forfeit the office or employment.

The commission first notes that for the local level conflict of interest laws to apply, you must hold a "substantial interest," as defined by K.S.A. 75-4301a, in the management company. If you do not hold a "substantial interest" in the company, the conflict of interest laws would not apply and both of your questions would be answered as such. Assuming that under K.S.A. 75-4301a you do have a "substantial interest" in the management company, then your questions require further analysis.

In answer to your first question, the prohibitions found in K.S.A. 75-4304 would only apply to a contract between you, as a private businessperson, and the city. However, the situation you describe involves your participation on behalf of the management company in a contract with the county. Therefore, it would not be a violation for you to participate in the making of a contract between the management company and the county.

Turning to your second question, we first note that the prohibitions in K.S.A. 75-4304 apply to a local governmental officer or employee, and not to a candidate for local office. Thus, it would not be a violation of the local level conflict of interest laws for you to participate in the making of contracts between the county and the management company while a candidate for sheriff.

While we do not find a violation of the local level conflict of interest laws, the commission is concerned about the appearance of impropriety this situation could create. All elected officials should avoid taking any actions that tend to undermine the public's confidence in government.

HOUSE BILL No. 2678

AN ACT repealing K.S.A. 74-7257; relating to the Kansas sunset law; concerning the department of transportation and office of the secretary of transportation.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 74-7257 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

SENATE BILL No. 407

AN ACT concerning the legislative post audit act; prescribing confidentiality for audit reports under certain circumstances.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) Except as provided by subsections (b) and (c) of this section and by subsections (d), (e) and (g) of K.S.A. 46-1106 and amendments thereto, each audit report prepared by the division of post audit or by a firm under the legislative post audit act, and each finding, conclusion, opinion or recommendation contained in the audit report, shall be confidential and shall not be disclosed pursuant to the provisions of the open records act or under any other law until: (1) The time of the next scheduled meeting of the legislative post audit committee held after distribution of the report to members of such committee; or (2) the time of the next scheduled meeting of another legislative committee held after distribution of the report to the members of such committee as authorized by the legislative post audit committee.

(b) The legislative post audit committee may authorize a specific confidential distribution of any audit report, prior to any such presentation of the audit report, by motion adopted by the legislative post audit committee or by rule adopted by the committee, in accordance with such motion or rule. Each person who receives an audit report pursuant to any such motion or rule authorizing a specific confidential distribution of the audit report shall keep the audit report and each finding, conclusion, opinion or recommendation contained in the audit report confidential until the audit report is presented to the legislative post audit committee or another legislative committee at an open meeting of the committee.

(c) The post auditor, or the post auditor's designee may make a limited distribution of preliminary audit findings, conclusions or recommendations to any person affected by the audit as part of the process of conducting the audit. Such preliminary audit findings, conclusions, opinions or recommendations shall be confidential and shall not be subject to disclosure pursuant to the provisions of the open records act or any other law, except as provided in subsections (d), (e) and (g) of K.S.A. 46-1106 and amendments thereto.

(d) As used in this section, "audit report" means the written report of any financial-compliance audit, performance audit, or any other audit or audit work conducted under the legislative post audit act by the division of post audit or by a firm under the legislative post audit act; and any other words and phrases used in this section shall have the meanings respectively ascribed thereto by K.S.A. 46-1112 and amendments thereto.

(e) This section shall be construed as part of the legislative post audit act.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

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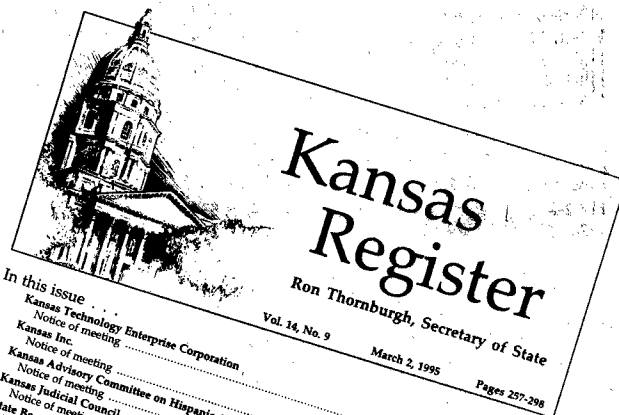
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
