Kansas Ave., Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed temporary and permanent rule and regulation by the administrator of the Kansas Department of Credit Unions.

K.A.R. 121-3-1 pertains to credit union services organizations. The proposed regulation establishes requirements for credit unions investing in or loaning to a credit union services organization. There will be minimal economic impact on governmental agencies and the general public as a result of the proposed rule and regulation.

This 60-day notice of public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation. Comments may be submitted prior to the hearing to John P. Smith, Administrator, Kansas Department of Credit Unions, 400 S. Kansas Ave., Suite B, Topeka, 66603.

**Notice of Hearing on Proposed  
Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Wednesday, September 11, in Room 106, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the revocation of one existing regulation of the Division of Water Resources, the amendment of five existing rules and regulations, and the adoption of two new regulations pursuant to the Water Transfer Act, K.S.A. 82a-1501 *et seq.*

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Chief Engineer, Division of Water Resources, Kansas Department of Agriculture, 901 S. Kansas Ave., 2nd Floor, Topeka, 66612-1283. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

The Water Transfer Act was amended effective July 1, 1993. The primary purpose of the amendments and new regulations, which are being proposed by the chief engineer, are to amend existing regulations to be compatible with the change in the law and to implement the application process for a water transfer.

These new and amended regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

**5-50-1. Definitions.** Amends the definition of "application" and "approval of application" to be compatible with the new Act.

**5-50-2. Requirements for application.** Because the amendments to the Water Transfer Act changed the criteria which must be considered in processing a water transfer application, the information required on the application has been updated to provide the information necessary to process an application filed pursuant to the current Water Transfer Act.

**5-50-3. Hearing.** Because the Water Transfer Act proceedings are to be held pursuant to the provisions of the Kansas Administrative Procedures Act (KAPA), the hearing procedures in this regulation are no longer necessary; therefore, the regulation is being revoked.

**5-50-4. Emergency use.** This regulation was amended to improve grammar and form.

**5-50-5. Extension of emergency transfer.** This regulation was amended to improve clarity.

**5-50-6. Authority of the chief engineer.** Because the provisions of KAPA apply to Water Transfer Act proceedings, subsections (a) and (b) were no longer necessary. Subsection (c) was amended to improve clarity.

**5-50-7. Filing an application.** This new regulation clarifies that a water transfer application is not complete until the applicant has received contingent approval to divert water either under the Kansas Water Appropriation Act or a contract to purchase water pursuant to the State Water Plan Storage Act.

**5-50-8. Selection of hearing officer.** This new regulation sets forth a procedure for obtaining nominations for

the independent hearing officer pursuant to the Water Transfer Act.

None of these amended or new regulations is expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or to water users.

A public hearing will be conducted at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, September 10, in Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed rules and regulations of the Department of Administration, Division of Facilities Management.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Administration, Room 263-E, State Capitol, 300 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Faith Loretto at (913) 296-6000 or (913) 296-4798 (TTY). Accessible parking for people with disabilities is located at the south end of Landon State Office Building, and the north entrance to the building is accessible.

Summaries of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follow:

K.A.R. 1-45-4, K.A.R. 1-45-7 and K.A.R. 1-45-8 relate to parking permits and fees for certain state parking lots. These regulations are proposed for amendment on a permanent basis in order to provide for payment of parking permit fees on a biweekly rather than a monthly basis, as well as to update and clarify the regulations.

K.A.R. 1-45-4, **issuance of permits**, is amended to restate the application and issuance process more clearly and eliminate a reference to monthly parking fees. No changes in the application procedure will result from this amendment. Amendments to K.A.R. 1-45-7, **fees and charges**, change the parking fees from a monthly to a biweekly basis and prorate the amount of the fees accordingly. K.A.R. 1-45-8, **fee permits**, is amended to update the list of state properties associated with parking permits and clarify that permits can be issued for cars owned or leased by the employee rather than owned or used by the employee.

No economic impact on the Department of Administration, other state agencies, state employees or the general public is anticipated as a result of these amendments. The application procedure and qualifications for parking permits will not be altered. Biweekly parking fees are consistent with the state's biweekly payroll periods; therefore, this change avoids administrative problems and inefficiencies that result from monthly parking fees.

The parking fees are pro-rated accordingly; therefore, there is no significant increase in parking rates associated with these amendments.

K.A.R. 1-17-10, **state-owned or leased motor vehicles; travel records**, is amended to provide authority for state agencies to request an exemption from the recordkeeping requirements of this regulation. Such an exemption may be approved by the Secretary of Administration upon a finding by the secretary that the exemption is necessary or desirable to meet the reasonable operational needs of the agency.

There is no economic impact on the Department of Administration anticipated as a result of these amendments. By requiring approval of the Secretary of Administration, the department will be able to ensure that any state agency operating under an exemption would continue to record sufficient information for billing and vehicle maintenance purposes. The availability of a recordkeeping exemption to meet agency operational needs may create some operational efficiencies for affected state agencies and their employees. However, it is not possible to quantify any economic impact resulting from such efficiencies.

Executive Order No. 96-6

Authorizing Executive Branch  
Employees to Participate in Healthcheck '96

WHEREAS, the State of Kansas Employees Health Care Commission in developing and providing for the implementation of a health benefits program has established HealthQuest, a statewide health promotion program; and

WHEREAS, one of the main components of the HealthQuest program is HealthCheck '96, a health risk appraisal program; and

WHEREAS, health risk appraisals can provide state employees with a means to understand their health status and take positive action in improving their health and fitness; and

WHEREAS, state employees are a valuable asset for the State of Kansas and the state has an interest in aiding in employee health and fitness; and

WHEREAS, HealthCheck '96 provides the opportunity to save state employees and state taxpayers money by reducing future health care costs;

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby authorize paid leave under K.A.R. 1-9-9 for executive branch state employees who desire to take advantage of HealthCheck '96, provided that employees obtain approval from their supervisor concerning when the appointment time can be scheduled. I further hereby direct executive branch agencies to reimburse private car mileage pursuant to regulations for employees to travel to obtain authorized HealthCheck '96 services, as follows: mileage reimbursement of 50 miles to 200 miles round trip maximum or 25 to 100 miles one way. Mileage under 50 miles round trip will not be reimbursable for this purpose.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order 96-6 and shall be effective immediately.

Public Notice

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has received and reviewed a request to vertically expand the Brooks Municipal Solid Waste Landfill, 4100 N. West St., Wichita. The Brooks Landfill is owned by the City of Wichita and operated by Herzog Waste Management, Inc. The requested vertical expansion would allow the landfill to operate after October 9, 1996, without the construction of a lined cell and allow an increase in height of the currently operating cell (Cell D) from the original maximum permitted elevation of 1,400 feet above mean sea level to 1,495 feet above mean sea level. KDHE is providing public notice of its intent to modify the existing municipal solid waste landfill permit for the Brooks Landfill to allow the vertical expansion of Cell D for an initial 18-month period.

The draft permit contains provisions which allow KDHE to extend the initial 18-month period to a maximum period of five years if corrective measures proposed to remediate groundwater contamination at the landfill are implemented and it can be demonstrated that the corrective measures will be effective.

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Friday, September 27, in the conference room at the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission office, 3400 Van Buren, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed regulations of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission. The 60-day notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting the secretary at the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission, 3400 Van Buren, Topeka, 66611-2228, (913) 296-5800.

A copy of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statement may be reviewed or obtained at the commission office. The following is a summary of the proposed amendments:

**K.A.R. 112-18-21. Election and recognition of recognized greyhound owners' group.** The 1996 legislative changes required the drafting of a new regulation regarding the election procedures to be used for recognized greyhound owners' groups. This regulation sets out the duties of those who will serve as members of each recognized group. The procedure to be used by the agency for electing each group also is described in detail together with the eligibility requirements for those participating in the election. The regulation states that the agency will hold the election pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8802(dd). Provisions are made for the filing of a complaint concerning the conduct of an election, in which case the agency shall commence a hearing in accordance with the Kansas administrative procedures act, K.S.A. 77-501 *et seq.*

**Economic impact:** The agency will bear the expenses incurred during the election process. Beginning December 1995 through January 1996, the agency held its first election and mailed notice of election and official ballot forms to all eligible voters, and mailed nominating petition forms to those requesting the same, at an approximate cost of \$480. The costs incurred by the agency for administrative services and staff support were less than \$500.

**K.A.R. 112-18-22. Election and recognition of recognized horsemen's group.** The 1994 legislative changes required the drafting of a new regulation regarding the election procedures to be used for recognized horsemen's groups. This regulation sets out the duties of those who will serve as members of each recognized group. The procedure to be used by the agency for electing each group also is described in detail together with the eligibility requirements for those participating in the election. The regulation states that the agency will hold the election pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8802(dd). Provisions are made for the filing of a complaint concerning the conduct of an

election, in which case the agency shall commence a hearing in accordance with the Kansas administrative procedures act, K.S.A. 77-501 *et seq.*

Economic impact: The agency will bear the expenses incurred during the election process. The costs to the agency for postage, administrative services and staff support are expected to be less than \$1,000.

Article 5.—IN-HOME NUTRITION PROGRAM

**26-5-6. Eligibility for nutrition services or in-home meals, and method of determining eligibility for specific population groups.** (a) A certified assessor shall make a written determination of the eligibility of each individual requesting nutrition services or in-home meals using sections, designated by the department, of the state of Kansas uniform assessment instrument adopted in K.A.R. 120-1-1. The assessment shall be made at the individual's residence and shall be completed:

(1) not later than the end of the first week of meal delivery if that individual has not been a customer of the congregate nutrition program;

(2) not later than the end of the third week of meal service if that individual has been a congregate customer receiving home-delivered meals due to a temporary illness;

(3) not later than the third week of meal service if the individual has not been a congregate customer and needs meals on a temporary basis during a recuperative period after discharge from a hospital, and after the first week of meal service, needs a continuation of meal service as certified by a physician on a form prescribed by the department;

(4) prior to the receipt of a home-delivered meal if that individual has been a congregate customer and is requesting home-delivered meals for reasons other than temporary illness;

(5) not later than six months after the first determination of eligibility for nutrition services or in-home meals;

(6) annually for individuals whose condition has been determined by written assessment as not likely to improve; or

(7) every six months if the individual chooses, by request, not to receive meals at a congregate site and the certified assessor determines the individual is homebound due to psychological, emotional, or social impairment.

(b) In order to be eligible to receive a home-delivered meal provided under either the in-home meal program or the older Americans act nutrition services program, each individual shall meet the qualifications in paragraph (1), (2), or (3).

(1) Any individual who is age 60 or older and homebound by reason of illness or incapacitating disability shall qualify for services.

(2) Any individual who is age 60 or older and who is homebound due to psychological, emotional, or social impairment shall qualify for services if the individual is:

(A) lacking an informal support system of family, friends, neighbors, or others who are willing and able to prepare meals for the individual; and

(B) unable to prepare meals at home for at least one of the following reasons:

(i) limited physical mobility;

(ii) cognitive impairment; or

(iii) lack of the knowledge or skills to select and prepare nourishing and well-balanced meals.

(3) An individual who is age 60 or older and isolated because there is no nutrition site in the community of residence shall qualify for services if:

(A) there is no resource offering transportation to a neighboring community with a nutrition site; or

(B) the individual is not able to drive, or chooses not to drive, to a neighboring community with a nutrition site.

(c) Any provider may permit a person to receive home-delivered meals funded only under the older Americans act after determining that the following conditions exist:

(1) the person resides with, or cares for, an individual who is determined to be eligible for home-delivered meals under either paragraph (b)(1) or (b)(2);

(2) the person is:

(A) the eligible individual's spouse, regardless of age, who resides with the eligible individual;

(B) a person with a disability, regardless of age or relationship to the eligible individual, who resides in a non-institutional home with the eligible individual; or

(C) an eligible individual's unpaid, non-spousal caretaker, regardless of age, if the certified assessor has determined that providing the home-delivered meal to the caretaker would be a cost-effective alternative to institutionalizing the eligible individual; and

(3) the best interests of the eligible individual will be served by permitting the person to receive the home-delivered meal. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5908; effective, T-86-48, Dec. 12, 1985; effective May 1, 1986; amended Sept. 7, 1993; amended, T-26-7-1-96, July 1, 1996.)

**26-5-9. Limitation on delivery of in-home or home-delivered meals.** The provider shall only provide a meal to an eligible individual if the meal meets the individual's special dietary needs and conforms to the department's published meal pattern. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5908; effective, T-26-7-1-96, July 1, 1996.)

**26-5-10. Targeting.** Each provider shall give priority for receipt of in-home or home-delivered meals to those eligible individuals who are most in need and at greatest nutritional risk as determined by a nutritional risk assessment on the state of Kansas uniform assessment instrument adopted in K.A.R. 120-1-1. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5908; effective, T-26-7-1-96, July 1, 1996.)

**1-18-1a. Mileage rates.** (a) Subject to the provisions of subsection (d), each employee who has been authorized to use a privately-owned conveyance to engage in official business for an agency shall be entitled to reimbursement for use of that conveyance at the following rates:

- (1) 14¢ per mile for the use of a privately-owned motorcycle;
- (2) 30¢ per mile for the use of a privately-owned automobile;
- (3) 42¢ per mile for the use of a privately-owned airplane; or
- (4) 42¢ per mile for the use of a specially equipped van for the physically handicapped.

(b) In addition to the mileage allowance authorized under subsection (a) of this regulation, the employee may be reimbursed for:

- (1) parking fees when on an official trip;
- (2) toll road and toll bridge costs; and
- (3) airplane landing and tie-down fees.

(c) When an employee travels by privately-owned airplane, reimbursement may be made for one round trip in a privately-owned automobile or taxi fare charged in travel:

- (1) between the official station or domicile and the airport in the city in which the official station or domicile is located; and
- (2) between the airport in the destination city and the place of official business.

(d) Exceptions to the mileage rates prescribed in subsection (a) shall be as follows.

(1) When a mode of transportation is available and is less costly than transportation by privately-owned conveyance, mileage payments for use of a privately-owned conveyance shall be limited to the cost of that other mode of transportation.

(2) An agency may pay a specified mileage rate that is lower than prescribed by subsection (a) when an employee's travel is not required by the agency and the employee is informed of the specified rate in advance of the travel.

(3) For employees of the state of Kansas only, any state employee choosing to use a privately-owned automobile when a state-owned or leased vehicle, as defined by K.A.R. 1-17-1, is available for use shall be reimbursed at the central motor pool rate for compact cars, unless:

(A) the employee's agency head or the agency head's designee determines that the use of a state-owned or leased vehicle would be more expensive than the use of the employee's privately-owned automobile; or

(B) the employee has a disability which requires the use of privately-owned vehicle which is specially equipped.

This regulation shall take effect on and after July 1, 1996. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-3203,

## Article 18.—KANSAS ATHLETE AGENT ACT

**7-18-1. Kansas athlete agent act; registration; renewal; expiration.** (a) A certificate of registration issued to an athlete agent shall expire one year from the date of issuance.

**7-18-3. Kansas athlete agent act; contracts.** The form of any agent contract or financial services contract to be used by a registered athlete agent shall be approved by the secretary of state. The form shall include, in addition to the requirements of 1996 H.B. 3081, Sec. 7, the following: (a) the date the athlete signs the contract; and

(b) the institution of higher education where the athlete attended and participated in intercollegiate sports contests. (Authorized by 1996 H.B. 3081, Sec. 15; implementing 1996 H.B. 3081, Sec. 7; effective, T-7-7-1-96, July 1, 1996.)

A public hearing will be conducted at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, September 10, in Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed rule and regulation of the Department of Administration, Division of Accounts and Reports.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Administration, Room 263-E, State Capitol, 300 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Faith Loretto at (913) 296-6000 or (913) 296-4798 (TTY). Accessible parking

for individuals with disabilities is located at the south end of Landon State Office Building, and the north entrance to the building is accessible.

A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows:

**K.A.R. 1-18-1a. Mileage rates.** This regulation is proposed for amendment in order to increase the rate at which state employees and state officials are reimbursed for use of their private vehicles. Each of the current rates would be increased by one cent. However, K.A.R. 1-18-1a currently provides that, if an employee chooses to drive a private vehicle when a state-owned or leased vehicle is available, the employee will be paid at the state central motor pool rate for compact cars, rather than the rate stipulated in the regulation. Therefore, the proposed rate would apply only in those situations where a state vehicle is unavailable, use of a state vehicle would be more expensive than use of the privately-owned vehicle, or the employee has a disability which requires a specially-equipped private vehicle.

Those state employees and officials who are eligible to receive the mileage rate set out in the regulation would realize an increase in their reimbursement rate of 3.4 percent. State agencies may experience an increase in travel costs, to the extent that state vehicles are not available, are more expensive, or cannot be driven by a disabled employee. However, it is not possible to estimate the economic impact on state agencies, as no summary data is available to indicate how often agencies are reimbursing employees at the state motor pool rate for compact cars. If it is assumed that all FY 96 expenditures for mileage reimbursement for privately-owned vehicles had been paid at the current rates, the one cent increase is estimated to raise agency costs by \$237,072 in FY 97 (\$79,823 state general fund). The proposed increase in private vehicle rates would also have an indeterminable economic impact on any local units of government in Kansas that elect to use the state mileage reimbursement rates.

## Article 2—LOTTERY RETAILERS

**11-2-30. Retailer bonus; Powerball and Cash Lotto.** (a) On all Powerball and Cash Lotto drawings in which the prize claimed and awarded is the "jackpot prize" offered in the game it represents, the Kansas lottery-retailer(s) selling the ticket(s) shall receive \$10,000 for Powerball and \$1,000 for Cash Lotto, or share equally in a bonus if there are multiple winners. The bonus shall

be in addition to compensation specified in K.A.R. 111-2-4.

(b) A "jackpot prize" is the highest prize awarded for correctly matching all the numbers reflected in the prize structure of the Powerball or Cash Lotto game it represents.

(c) On all Powerball drawings where the prize claimed and awarded is not less than \$100,000, and which occurs on and after May 15, 1996, the Kansas lottery retailer selling the ticket shall receive \$1,000.

(d) On all Keno drawings where the prize claimed and awarded is not less than \$100,000, or for the parimutuel prizes awarded for matching 10 in the 10 spot game as specified by subsection (e) of K.A.R. 111-7-81, and which occurs on and after May 15, 1996, the Kansas lottery retailer selling the ticket shall receive \$1,000. **111-2-43. "Ask for the sale" promotion.** (a) During the period beginning July 1, 1996, and ending July 31, 1996, in addition to compensation provided for in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery also offers all Circle K stores located in Kansas an opportunity to participate in a bonus retailer "ask for the sale" incentive promotion of lottery tickets.

(b) On each Friday in July 1996, including July 5, 12, 19, and 26, all Circle K stores' personnel selling Kansas lottery tickets will ask every adult customer making a purchase if the customer would like to purchase a lottery ticket. If the employee fails to ask adult customers for the purchase of a lottery ticket and the customer brings it to the clerk's attention before leaving the premises, the retailer shall give the adult customer one \$1.00 instant lottery ticket at no charge.

(c) All retailer employees at each location shall wear promotional buttons and display special point-of-sale materials provided by the lottery each Friday from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. during the promotion announcing the promotion to its customers. These promotional materials consist of:

(1) A tent card to be displayed at the point where tickets are sold.

(2) A window/monitor banner to be displayed at the front entrance of the business and/or below the lottery information display system monitor.

These materials must be on display during all hours of the promotion at the times and dates established in subsection (b) and (c) for a store to be eligible for a prize.

(d) The Kansas lottery will provide each location with a credit of \$35. This will be credited to each store's account at the beginning of the promotion.

(e) Any tickets given away above the \$35 allowance representing 35 tickets per location will be the responsibility of Circle K stores.

(f) Each retail location shall maintain a ticket log form to be completed every time a lottery ticket is given away. The log will be picked up by the Kansas lottery district manager servicing the retailer location at the end of the promotion.

(g) At the end of the promotion, the Circle K store with the greatest percentage increase in lottery ticket sales for the period from July 1, 1996, through July 31, 1996, over the period from July 1, 1995, through July 31, 1995, will win a portable compact disc player and promotional items. The second and third place stores will receive promotional items provided by the lottery. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710 and K.S.A. 74-8708; effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-2-49. "Ask for the sale" promotion.** (a) During the period beginning July 1, 1996, and ending July 31, 1996, in addition to compensation provided for in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery also offers all T & E Oil stores located in Kansas an opportunity to participate in a bonus retailer "ask for the sale" incentive promotion of lottery tickets.

(b) On each Friday in July 1996, including July 5, 12, 19, and 26, all T & E Oil stores' personnel selling Kansas lottery tickets will ask every adult customer making a purchase if the customer would like to purchase a lottery ticket. If the employee fails to ask adult customers for the purchase of a lottery ticket and the customer brings it to the clerk's attention before leaving the premises, the retailer shall give the adult customer one \$1.00 instant lottery ticket at no charge.

(c) All retailer employees at each location shall wear promotional buttons and display special point-of-sale materials provided by the lottery each Friday from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. during the promotion announcing the promotion to its customers. These promotional materials consist of:

(1) A tent card to be displayed at the point where tickets are sold.

**111-2-50. "Blackjack Doublor Two" retailer incentive.** (a) During the period between the start of the "Blackjack Doublor Two" game and ending 5:00 p.m., September 21, 1996, in addition to compensation provided for in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery shall also offer for all retailers the "Blackjack Doublor Two" retailer incentive promotion. It will be held in conjunction with the Kansas lottery's "Blackjack Doublor Two" game (K.A.R. 111-4-834 through 111-4-838) as follows:

(b) With each book of "Blackjack Doublor Two" tickets activated, a retailer will automatically be entitled one entry card. Entry cards for each eligible book of tickets will be completed by the lottery based upon computer records identifying the activation of each book of "Blackjack Doublor Two" by a retailer, and entered into the random drawing. Only "Blackjack Doublor Two" books activated by 5:00 p.m., September 21, 1996, will be eligible for the drawing.

"WILD BINGO"**

**111-4-868. Name of Game.** The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Wild Bingo" commencing on or after July 15, 1996. The specific rules for the "Wild Bingo" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-868 through 111-4-872. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-4-869. Definitions.** The following definitions shall apply to the "Wild Bingo" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols for the "PLAYER'S CARDS" are printed in black ink in 10 point WGI font, and for the "CALLER'S CARD" and "BONUS NUMBERS" in black ink in WGI 15 font. A game symbol appears on "PLAYER'S CARDS" in each of 30 play spots within the play area, including the word "BINGO" at the top of each of the four cards, and in 24 play spots on the "CALLER'S CARD" and in four play spots in the "BONUS NUMBERS" area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following:

(b) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is an 11-digit number which appears below the game symbols under the removable covering in the play area on the front of each instant ticket.

(c) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 149. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink

on the back of each instant game ticket both above the information form and below the bar code.

(d) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three letter code printed and appearing in three of six locations at either end of the game symbols on the "CALLER'S CARD." The codes and their meanings are as follows: TWO = \$2.00; FOR = \$4.00; FIV = \$5.00; SEV = \$7.00; TEN = \$10.00; TWY = \$20.00; TWF = \$25.00; FTY = \$50.00; HUN = \$100.00; THN = \$200.00; THY = \$250.00; FHN = \$500.00.

(e) "Bar code" means the 16-digit bar coded number appearing on the back of each ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-4-870. Cost of ticket.** The price of "Wild Bingo" instant tickets sold by a retailer shall be \$2.00 each. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-4-871. Determination of instant prize winners.** This game is played similarly to the traditional "BINGO" game. The player removes the scratch-off material on the area of the ticket indicated as the "CALLER'S CARD" and "BONUS NUMBERS" to reveal 24 and four "BINGO" letter/number combinations, respectively. The player then checks to see if any of the letter/number combinations on the "CALLER'S CARD" match the letter/number combinations on any of the four "PLAYER'S CARDS." The player may then mark matching combinations by scratching or marking the matched spot on the "PLAYER'S CARDS." A "W in a circle" uncovered on the "CALLER'S CARD" may be used to fill any unmarked space on each of the four "PLAYER'S CARDS." If the player gets a "BINGO" by matching the letter/number combinations on one of the four "PLAYER'S CARDS" in any horizontal, vertical, or diagonal line as shown in illustration number one on the back of each "BINGO" card; by matching combinations in all four corners as shown in illustration number two on the back of each "BINGO" card; or by matching combinations in both diagonals forming an "X" as shown in illustration number three on the back of each "BINGO" card, the player wins the prize amount indicated on the appropriate winning "PLAYER'S CARD." Players can win up to four times on this ticket, but can win only one way on any of the four "PLAYER'S CARDS" on each ticket; that is there will only be one winning pattern per "PLAYER'S CARD." Prizes a player can win are as follows:

(b) The executive director may terminate the sale of tickets prior to the complete sale of all tickets. In this event, the number and value of prizes will be approximately proportional to the number of tickets actually sold. The odds of winning a prize in this game are one in 4.30.

(c) All prizes are subject to deductions provided by law. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710(b), (c) and (f); implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710(b), (c) & (f), and K.S.A. 74-8720; effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**Article 5.—POWER BALL**

**111-5-23. Definitions.** The following definitions shall apply to the "Powerball" game:

(a) "Computer pick" means the random selection of two-digit numbers by the computer system, which appear on a ticket and are played by a player in the game.

(b) "Drawing" means the formal process of selecting winning numbers which determine the number of winners for each prize level of the game.

(c) "Game board" or "boards" means that area of the play slip which contains two sets of numbered squares to be marked by the player, each set containing 45 squares, number one through 45.

(d) "Game ticket" or "ticket" means a computer generated ticket issued by a terminal to a person as a receipt for the combination a person has selected.

(e) "MUSL" means the Multi-State Lottery Association, a government-benefit association wholly owned and operated by the party lotteries.

(f) "MUSL Board" means the governing body of the MUSL which is comprised of the chief executive officer of each party lottery.

(g) "On-line lottery game" means a lottery game in which each player selects numbers out of a larger predetermined set or sets of numbers.

(h) "Party Lottery" means a state lottery or lottery of a political subdivision or entity which has joined the MUSL and, in the context of these Powerball product group rules, which has joined in selling the Powerball game.

(i) "Product group" means the group of lotteries which has joined together to offer a product pursuant to the terms of the multi-state lottery agreement and the group's own rules.

(j) "Play" means the six numbers from one through 45 which appear on a ticket as a single lettered selection and are to be played by a player in the game.

(k) "Play slip" means a card used in marking a player's game plays and containing one or more boards.

(l) "Retailer" or "agent" means a person or entity authorized by the Kansas lottery to sell lottery tickets.

(m) "Set Prize" means a prize that is advertised to be paid by a single cash payment and, except in rare instances, outlined in these rules, will be equal to the prize amount established by the MUSL Board for the prize level.

(n) "Terminal" means a device authorized by a party lottery to function in an on-line, interactive mode with the lottery's computer system for the purpose of issuing lottery tickets and entering, receiving and processing lottery transactions, including purchases, validating tickets and transmitting reports.

(o) "Validation" or "validate" means the process of determining whether a ticket presented for a prize is a winning ticket.

(p) "Winning numbers" means the six numbers between one and 45 randomly selected at each drawing which shall be used to determine winning plays contained on a game ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992; amended, T-111-3-24-92, March 20, 1992; amended, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-5-25. Prize pool; reserve account.** (a) The prize pool for all prize categories shall consist of 50% of each

drawing period's sales until the grand prize is funded to the annuitized amount guaranteed by the product group. Any amount remaining in the prize pool at the end of this game shall be carried forward to a replacement game or expended in a manner as directed by the product group.

(b) When the grand prize fund reaches the annuitized amount guaranteed by the product group, two percent of sales shall be placed in trust in one or more prize reserve accounts until the prize reserve accounts reach the amount designated by the MUSL board. When the prize reserve accounts exceed the designated amount, the excess shall become part of the prize pool. Any amount remaining in prize reserve accounts at the end of this game shall be carried forward to a replacement prize reserve account or expended in a manner as directed by the product group in accordance with state law. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710 and K.S.A. 74-8731; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992; amended, T-111-3-24-92, March 20, 1992; amended, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-5-28. Prize payments; annuitized and cash prizes.** (a) Grand prizes shall be paid with per winner annuities. If an annuity has a cash value of less than \$250,000, the product group, in its sole discretion, may elect to pay the cash value of the annuity. All annuitized prizes shall be paid annually in twenty equal payments with the initial payment being made in cash, to be followed by nineteen payments funded by the annuity. Funds for the initial payment of an annuitized prize shall be made available by MUSL for payment by a party lottery by the fifteenth calendar day following the drawing. A state may elect to make the initial payment from its own funds after validation, with notice to MUSL.

(b) In the event of the death of a lottery winner during the payment period, the product group, in its sole discretion, upon the petition of the estate of the lottery winner to the Kansas lottery may accelerate the payment of all of the remaining lottery proceeds to the estate. If the product group makes such a determination, then securities and/or cash held for the deceased lottery winner, which represents the present value of that portion of the future lottery payments that are to be accelerated, shall be distributed to the estate. The valuation of the securities and determination of the present value of the accelerated lottery payments shall be at the sole discretion of the product group.

(c) All prizes, other than grand prizes, shall be paid in cash through the party lottery which sold the winning ticket(s). A party lottery may begin paying cash prizes after receiving authorization to pay from the MUSL central office.

(d) Annuitized payments of the grand prize or a share of the grand prize may be rounded to facilitate the purchase of an appropriate funding mechanism. Breakage on a grand prize win shall be added to the first cash payment to the winner or winners. Prizes which, under these rules, may become single-payment, pari-mutuel prizes, may be rounded down so that prizes can be paid in multiples of whole dollars. Breakage resulting from rounding these prizes shall be carried forward to the prize pool for the next drawing.

(e) If the grand prize is not won in a drawing, the prize money allocated for the grand prize shall roll over and be added to the grand prize pool for the following drawing.

(f) The product group may offer guaranteed minimum grand prize amounts or minimum increases in the grand prize amount between drawings or make other changes in the allocation of prize money where the product group finds that it would be in the best interest of the game. Changes in the allocation of prize money shall be designed to retain approximately the same prize allocation percentages, over a year's time, set out in these rules. Minimum guaranteed prizes or increases may be waived if the alternate funding mechanism set out in K.A.R. 111-5-26 becomes necessary.

(g) The holder of a winning ticket may win only one prize per board in connection with the winning numbers drawn, and shall be entitled only to the prize won by those numbers in the highest matching prize category.

(h) All prizes must be claimed within 365 days of the day of the drawing in which the prize was won. In the event the final day of the 365-day period falls on a Saturday, a Sunday or a state holiday, the claim period will be extended to end on the next business day. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710 and K.S.A. 74-8731; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992; amended, T-111-3-24-92, March 20, 1992; amended, T-111-2-23-93, Feb. 19, 1993; amended, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-5-29. Ticket validation requirements.** To be a valid ticket and eligible to receive a prize, a multi-state lottery (MUSL) ticket shall satisfy all the requirements established by the Kansas lottery for validation of winning tickets sold through its on-line system and any other validation requirements established by the product group and published as the confidential MUSL minimum games securing standards. The MUSL and the Kansas lottery shall not be responsible for tickets which are altered in any manner. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992; amended, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

#### "POWERBALL CARAVAN DRAWINGS"

**111-5-45. Name of drawings.** The Kansas lottery shall conduct a drawing entitled "Powerball Caravan Drawings." The first drawing will be held at 3:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 15, 1996, at lottery headquarters, and the second drawing will be held as soon after 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 15, 1996, at the Kansas state fair lottery building, Hutchinson, Kansas. Rules applicable to the "Powerball Caravan Drawings" are contained in K.A.R. 111-5-45 through 111-5-50 and K.A.R. 111-6-1 *et seq.* (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-5-46. Prize.** The prize winners selected in each of the "Powerball Caravan Drawings" shall receive a 1997 Dodge Grand Caravan ES and cash, with a total value of \$44,623.49, and \$1,200 worth of gasoline from Kwik Shop. The prizes are subject to lottery validation, set-offs and deductions authorized by law. (Authorized

by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-5-47. Method of entry.** Entry into the "Powerball Caravan Drawings" to be conducted on August 15, 1996, and on September 15, 1996, shall be accomplished as follows:

(a) Obtain a valid "Powerball Caravan Drawings" entry coupon by purchasing a single Powerball ticket costing \$5.00 or more between July 14, 1996, and September 5, 1996, at any Kansas Powerball retailer. Entry coupons will automatically be issued by the on-line terminal at any Kansas Powerball retailer upon making such a purchase. Only valid entry coupons issued between these dates by all Kansas on-line retailers which are mailed pursuant to subsection (d) and received by the time specified in subsection (g) shall be eligible for the first drawing. Mailed entries received by the post office identified in subsection (d) after 5:00 p.m. on August 13, 1996, and entries issued at the Kansas state fair lottery building in Hutchinson, Kansas, and entered as specified in subsection (h) shall be eligible for the second drawing.

(b) Whether or not the \$5.00 Powerball ticket itself is a winning ticket, the entry coupon is eligible for the "Powerball Caravan Drawing" if entered as specified by subsection (d).

(c) Each individual entry coupon shall constitute one entry whether it is a single \$5.00 ticket or a \$5.00 multi-draw ticket.

(d) Place one or more entry coupons, not the Powerball ticket itself, into an envelope and mail them to: "Powerball Caravan Drawings," P.O. Box 7777, Lawrence, Kansas, 66044-7777. The mailing address shall also be printed on each entry coupon issued.

(e) The holder of the entry coupon must complete the information form on each entry coupon in a legible manner. Only one name shall appear on entry coupons in any one entry.

(f) There is no limit on the number of entries a person may make.

(g) All entry coupons which are mailed and received by 5:00 p.m. on August 13, 1996, shall be entered into the first "Powerball Caravan Drawing."

(h) Only valid entry coupons mailed and received after 5:00 p.m. August 13, 1996, and mailed and received by 5:00 p.m. on September 10, 1996, as well as entry coupons issued and entered at the Kansas state fair lottery building between September 6, 1996, and 6:00 p.m. on Sunday, September 15, 1996, will be eligible for the second drawing.

(i) Eligible entrants in either drawing must be 18 years of age or older.

(j) Entry coupons eligible for the first drawing shall not be eligible for entry into the second drawing.

(k) Completing the information form on the entry coupon and entering the coupon into the drawing constitutes authorization to publicly identify the person whose entry is drawn. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-5-48. Certification of drawings.** (a) The "Powerball Caravan Drawings" shall be personally observed

by a member of the Kansas lottery division of security and the lottery draw manager.

(b) Upon completion of the drawing, the security official and the draw manager shall issue a report to the executive director, certifying that the name of the prize winner is correct, and that to the best of their knowledge the procedures required by these rules were followed in selecting the prize winner. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710(b); effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-5-49. Selection of winners.** The following process shall be used for the selection of winners in the "Powerball Caravan Drawings":

(a) Kansas lottery personnel shall pick up all mail containing Powerball Caravan Drawings envelopes at the United States Post Office in Lawrence, Kansas.

(b) Lottery personnel shall transport the mail to the mail room where the entries will be removed from the envelopes and placed in a secure receptacle by lottery security personnel.

(c) The first drawing shall be held at lottery headquarters in a place accessible to the public and open for public attendance with lottery security personnel present. The second drawing shall be held at the Kansas state fair lottery building and shall be open to the public with lottery security personnel present. The drawings shall be audio and video taped.

(d) Prior to each drawing, the drum or receptacle shall be sealed and the contents mixed by rotating the drum five times, if a drum is used, or by mixing the contents with a shovel or by other means for at least three minutes if another type receptacle is used.

(e) The designated individual shall then unseal the drum or receptacle, and using the bare-arm technique, remove one coupon entry from the drum or receptacle.

(f) After the entry has been drawn and certified valid, three more entries will be drawn, one at a time, to serve as alternate entries. The alternate entries will be marked in order drawn, 1A, 2A, and 3A. The alternate coupon entries will be used only if the original winners cannot be located or declared ineligible.

(g) The Kansas lottery security official present shall review each coupon drawn to determine the validity of the entry into the Powerball Caravan Drawing in accordance with these regulations. If it is a valid entry coupon and the name is legible, the draw manager and the security person shall record the name of the winner and the winner shall be promptly notified.

(h) If an entry coupon is determined to be ineligible, it shall be discarded by the security person present and another coupon drawn. This procedure will be repeated until valid selections are obtained.

(i) The person whose name appears on each entry coupon on the entry drawn shall win the prize identified in K.A.R. 111-5-42, subject to validation by the lottery as set forth in these rules.

(j) All Powerball Caravan Drawings coupons remaining in the drum or receptacle on August 15, 1996, after the winner has been selected and certified shall be destroyed.

(k) All Powerball Caravan Drawings coupons remaining in the drum or receptacle on September 15, 1996, after the winner has been selected and certified shall be destroyed. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710(b); effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**111-5-50. Rights of participants.** Any Kansas Powerball entry coupon entered into either of the Powerball Caravan Drawings is disqualified from any other Kansas lottery prize or eligibility for which that entry coupon may have been redeemable. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710(d); effective, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

**Article 7.—CASH LOTTO GAME RULES**

**111-7-31. Determination of winners.** (a) "Club Keno" tickets may be sold every day of the year between 6:00 a.m. and 11:50 p.m. with validations allowed until 12:00 midnight. Upon implementation of software changes, tickets may be sold between 6:00 a.m. and 12:50 a.m. with validation allowed until 1:00 a.m.

(b) The selection of winning numbers shall take place as nearly as possible, at five-minute intervals. The first drawing will be at 6:05 a.m. with subsequent drawings every five minutes thereafter with the last drawing at 11:50 p.m. With the one-hour time expansion specified in subsection (a), the last drawing will occur at 12:50 a.m. All drawings will occur either on the hour or at multiples of five minutes past the hour. If a drawing cannot be held at the scheduled drawing time, the delayed drawing will take place at the next scheduled drawing time. Ticket sales for each drawing will end momentarily immediately prior to the scheduled drawing and then resume for the next drawing without delay. Club Keno wagering will not be inhibited between games. Each game is identified by a 6-digit consecutive game number that is assigned by the central system and the game number(s) for the drawing(s) for which the ticket was purchased will appear on

the ticket. In the event a drawing does not occur at the drawing time scheduled, sales for that drawing will remain closed. Sales for the following drawing will remain open until five minutes after the results of the delayed drawing have been posted by the system. Winning game number selections for any games remaining on a player's ticket at the end of daily sales shall take place the next day.

(c) Winning number combinations shall be generated every five minutes through the use of a computer-driven random number generator located at lottery headquarters. The generator shall be statistically analyzed, tested, and certified by an independent qualified statistician for integrity. Periodic checks shall be made to ensure the security and integrity of the system at least quarterly.

(d) The Kansas lottery director of security shall establish the procedures for the operation and security of the random number generator, including the specification of those individuals who shall have access to the system. A security officer shall accompany anyone needing access to the secured area containing the generator for any reason.

(e) All Club Keno prizes shall be the prizes set forth in subsection (a) above except for the 10 spot match 10 category prize when total prizes for that prize category for a single draw exceeds \$1,500,000. If that occurs, each valid winner's share for the 10 spot match 10 \$100,000 prize category shall be calculated as a parimutuel prize from a prize pool of \$1,500,000. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 74-8710; and K.S.A. 74-8720; effective, T-111-9-1-92, Aug. 28, 1992; amended, T-111-8-5-94, July 15, 1994; amended, T-111-12-18-95, Dec. 14, 1995; amended, T-111-6-27-96, June 21, 1996.)

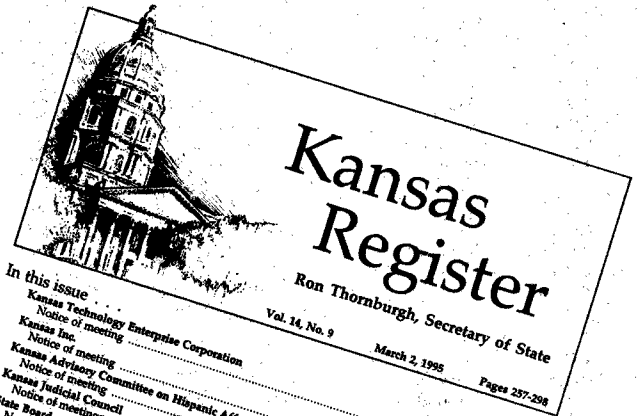
