## Notice of Advisory Panel Meetings

The Kansas Arts Commission has scheduled meetings of its funding advisory panels during April to review applications for financial support of arts-related programs and projects by Kansas community and arts organizations. The funds are offered through grant programs for fiscal year 1998 (July 1, 1997-June 30, 1998).

Each panel is scheduled to convene at 9 a.m. in meeting rooms on the lobby level of the Jayhawk Tower, 7th and Jackson, Topeka. Applicants will be notified which of the following panels will review their respective applications:

- Operational Support Panel A, April 17 and 18, Florentine Room
- Project Support, and Arts & Education Curriculum (QPA), April 21, Senate Room
- Operational Support Panel B, April 24 and 25, Florentine Room

Panel recommendations will be acted upon by the commission during its next quarterly business meeting, when the actual grant amounts will be determined and announced, on June 24 at a Wichita location to be announced.

The panels are comprised of knowledgeable individuals from across Kansas. Each panel is chaired by a member of the commission, and one or more other commissioners serve on each panel.

Meetings of the Kansas Arts Commission, a state agency, and its advisory panels are open to public observation. Applicants are encouraged but not required to attend the panel meetings and hear the critiques of their applications and programs. Applicants do not make presentations to the panels, but may answer specific questions directed to them by the panelists.

Funding for commission programs is provided through grants from the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency, and appropriations by the Kansas Legislature.

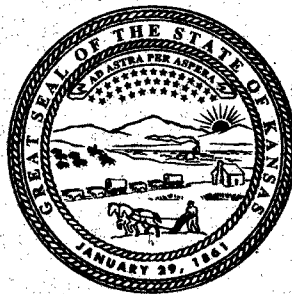

Notice of Hearing on Proposed  
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday, June 18, at the Kansas Department of Human Resources office, 401 S. Topeka Blvd., third floor conference room, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in the existing regulation concerning the Boiler Safety Act, K.S.A. 44-914 et seq. This 60-day notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and the economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least 10 working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Merrill J. Hicklin Befort, Staff Attorney, Kansas Department of Human Resources, 401 S. Topeka Blvd., Topeka, 66603, (913) 296-4902.

A copy of the full text of the regulation and the economic impact statement may be reviewed or obtained by contacting Merrill J. Hicklin Befort. The following is a summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact:

**K.A.R. 49-49-1.** In accordance with K.S.A. 44-926, the Department of Human Resources is amending the regulation to increase the fees that are charged to owners of boilers. K.A.R. 49-49-1 has not been amended since 1990. K.A.R. 49-49-1 is being amended in order to meet the cost of performing services required to be performed in accordance with the Boiler Safety Act, which include inspections of boilers along with administrative support costs. Fees have been added to cover additional services, including internal inspections for low pressure boilers and added categories for external inspection for high pressure boilers. Certificate fees are increased from \$22 to \$25. Due to an increase in requests for replacement of lost boiler certificates, a \$10 fee has been added to cover the cost of handling and postage to replace a certificate.

**Economic Impact:** Uninsured boiler owners or owners who elect to have the state inspect the boilers will be the most affected by the fee increase. This proposed fee increase is still substantially less than what is currently being charged by insurance companies and private contractors who perform similar inspections. The fee increase meets the cost of providing present as well as additional services.

Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, May 28, in the MTAA conference room in the Forbes Field air terminal, 6700 S. Topeka Blvd., Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed amendments to an existing regulation of the Division of Environment. This amended regulation is proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulation and its environmental and economic impact follows.

**K.A.R. 28-31-10a. Off-site hazardous waste treatment fees.** In 1991, the Legislature amended K.S.A. 65-3431 to require the Secretary of Health and Environment to adopt regulations establishing a schedule of fees to be paid by off-site hazardous waste treatment and disposal facilities. K.A.R. 28-31-10a was adopted April 6, 1992, and established fees to be paid by off-site hazardous waste treatment facilities. In 1996, the Legislature made changes to the statute which require corresponding changes to the regulation.

The existing regulation has two treatment fee categories, based upon the purpose of the hazardous waste treatment (treatment only and treatment for material or energy recovery). The proposed amendment would establish three hazardous waste treatment fee categories, based upon the energy content and toxicity of the waste (Dioxin, <5000 BTUs/lb, and >5000 BTUs/lb).

The proposed amendments will not have a direct impact on public health or the environment. The amendments do have an indirect impact on human health and the environment in that the fees collected under this regulation help support the Department of Health and Environment's Hazardous Waste and Pollution Prevention Programs. The Pollution Prevention Program benefits the state by encouraging business and industry to prevent creation of polluting materials, or in instances where such materials must be produced, to minimize their production. The Hazardous Waste Program benefits the state by encouraging the minimization of hazardous waste by generators as well as assuring proper management of the waste by well operated facilities.

Four facilities are currently subject to this regulation: Aptus (Coffeyville), Ash Grove Cement (Chanute), Heartland Cement (Independence), and LaFarge Corporation (Fredonia). Shown below in the column labeled "Present

fee schedule" are the actual fees paid by Ash Grove, Heartland and LaFarge under current K.A.R. 28-31-10a during calendar year 1995. The figure for Aptus is based on an extrapolation of the amounts and types of waste treated in calendar year 1996. The column labeled "Proposed fee schedule" shows the amount each facility would have paid under the proposed fee schedule, for the same types and number of tons of hazardous waste.

Due to the nature of Aptus' business, the types and amounts of waste treated may vary greatly from year to year, so the figures shown may not be representative of the fees which will be paid by Aptus in future years. If projections of fees to be paid under the new fee schedule are accurate, and the department realizes an increase in revenue from the fees, the money will be used to support the department's Pollution Prevention Program and to offset the decrease in state general funds which have been used to match federal grants supporting the Kansas Hazardous Waste Program. Both of these programs benefit the state by encouraging increased waste minimization and proper management of hazardous wastes, the generation of which cannot be completely avoided.

The time period between publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing serves as the required public comment period of at least 60 days for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Christine Mennicke, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Waste Management, Forbes Field, Building 740, Topeka, 66620. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and regulatory impact statement in an accessible format. #### Permanent Administrative Regulations

#### Article 2.—LIFE INSURANCE

#### 40-2-24. Life and health reinsurance agreements.

Sections 3, 4, 5, and 6 of the national association of insurance commissioners' "life and health reinsurance agreements model regulation," adopted by the NAIC on September 20, 1992, are hereby adopted by reference, subject to the following additions and exceptions:

(a) The formula in section 4A(7)(b) is hereby amended to read as follows: "The following formula shall be acceptable:

$$\text{Rate} = \frac{2(I + CG)}{X + Y - I - CG}$$

"Where: 'I' is the net investment income [(exhibit 2, line 16, column 7 of the life and accident and health annual statement) or (underwriting and investment exhibit part 1, line 15, column 8 of the property and casualty annual statement)];

"'CG' is the capital gains less capital losses [(exhibit 3, line 12, column 4 plus exhibit 4, line 10, column 4 of the life and accident and health annual statement) or (part 1A, line 10, column 7 of the property and casualty annual statement)];

"'X' is the current year cash and invested assets [(page 2, line 11, column 4 of the life and accident and health annual statement) or (page 2, line 9, column 4 of the property and casualty annual statement)] plus investment income due and accrued [(page 2, line 17, column 4 of the life and accident and health annual statement) or (page 2, line 16, column 4 of the property and casualty annual statement)] less borrowed money [(page 3, line 22, column 1 of the life and accident and health annual statement) or (page 3, line 7, column 1 plus line 8, column 1 of the property and casualty annual statement)]; and

"'Y' is the same as X but for the prior year."

(b) The first paragraph of section 4C(2) is hereby amended to read as follows: "Any increase in the surplus net of federal income tax resulting from arrangements described in subsection C(1) shall be identified separately on the insurer's statutory financial statement as a surplus item [(aggregate write-ins for gains and losses in surplus in the capital and surplus account, page 4, line 46, column 1 of the life and accident and health annual statement) or (aggregate write-ins for gains and losses in surplus in the capital and surplus account, page 4, line 30, column 1 of the property and casualty annual statement)], and recognition of the surplus increase as income shall be reflected on a net of tax basis in "commissions and expense allowances on reinsurance ceded" (page 4, line 5, column 1 of the life and accident and health annual statement) or in "other underwriting expenses incurred" (page 4, line 4, column 1 of the property and casualty annual statement) as earnings emerge from the reinsured business."

(c) Section 6 is hereby amended to read as follows: "Insurers subject to this regulation shall reduce to zero by December 31, 1997 any reserve credits or assets estab-

lished with respect to reinsurance agreements entered into prior to the effective date of this regulation that, under the provisions of this regulation, would not be entitled to recognition of the reserve credits or assets. However, these reinsurance agreements shall have been in compliance with laws or regulations in existence immediately preceding the effective date of this regulation. (Authorized by K.S.A. 40-103; implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 40-221a; effective April 11, 1997.)

#### Article 7.—AGENTS

**40-7-20a. Agents; brokers; continuing education; approval of courses; requirements.** (a) Definitions. For the purposes of this regulation:

(1) "Coordinator" means an individual who is responsible for monitoring continuing education offerings;

(2) "correspondence courses" means courses that are primarily delivered or conducted in other than a classroom setting or with on-site instruction and are designed to be completed independently by the student;

(3) "course" means a series of lectures or lessons which deals with a particular subject following a prearranged agenda or study plan and which may culminate in a written examination;

(4) "instructor" means an individual lecturing in a continuing education offering;

(5) "licensee," "licensed agent" or "agent" means a natural person licensed by this state as an agent or broker;

(6) "person" means a natural person, firm, institution, partnership, corporation or association; and

(7) "provider" or "providing organization" means a person or firm offering or providing insurance education.

(b) General requirements.

(1) Only courses which impart substantive and procedural knowledge relating to insurance and are beneficial to the insuring public subsequent to initial licensing shall be approved for credit. Approved courses shall be classified as life, health and variable contracts courses, property and casualty courses, general courses, or ethics courses. Credit earned from general or ethics courses shall be acceptable in meeting the requirements for the property and casualty insurance or life and health insurance license classifications.

(2) Courses of the following types shall not meet the basic criteria for approvable courses described in paragraph (1) of this section:

(A) courses designed to prepare students for a license examination;

(B) courses in mechanical office or business skills, including typing, speed reading, or use of calculators or other machines or equipment;

(C) courses in sales promotion, including meetings held in conjunction with the general business of the licensee; and

(D) courses which are primarily intended to impart knowledge of specific products of specific companies if the courses relate to the sales promotion or marketing of one or more of the products discussed.

(3)(A) A licensee shall attend a course in its entirety in order to receive full credit.

(B) Upon completion of approved courses, a student shall receive credit for the number of hours approved for the course which will generally be equivalent to one hour of credit for each hour of instruction.

(C) If the number of credit hours for which a course is approved is fewer than the total number of hours of the course presentation, the student shall attend the entire course in order to receive credit for the number of approved hours.

(D) The number of approved hours shall not include time spent on introductions, breaks, or other activities not directly related to approved educational information or material.

(E) Neither a student nor an instructor shall earn full credit for attending or instructing any subsequent offering of the same course in the current biennium after attending or teaching such course.

(4) Course examinations shall not be required for approval of continuing education courses except correspondence courses.

(5) Each provider shall submit proposed courses to the commissioner or the commissioner's designee for pre-approval at least 30 days before the date on which the course is to be held, except as provided in K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 40-240f(f)(6).

(6) An advertisement shall not state or imply that a course has been approved by the commissioner or the commissioner's designee unless written confirmation of such approval has been received by the provider.

(7) If approval has been granted for the initial offering of a course, approval for subsequent offerings not disclosed in the initial submission may be granted by providing written notification to the commissioner or the commissioner's designee at least 30 days before the date the program is to be held indicating that no change has been made in the course and specifying the additional times and places the course will be presented.

(8) The provider shall submit all fees required for individual course approval with the course submission. If the provider elects to pay the prescribed fee for all courses, the provider shall pay the fee annually and shall submit the fee with the first course submission each year. Subsequent course submissions shall include documentation of prior fee payment.

(9) Each course of study, except correspondence courses, shall be conducted in a classroom or other facility which is comfortably accommodates the faculty and the number of students enrolled. The provider may limit the number of students enrolled in a course.

(10)(A) Each successfully completed course leading to a nationally or regionally recognized designation shall receive credit as approved by the commissioner or the commissioner's designee. A listing of all courses approved as nationally or regionally recognized insurance education programs or otherwise including approved credit hours shall be available to the public upon request.

(B) Any agent attending at least 80 but less than 100 percent of regularly scheduled classroom sessions for any single course may receive full educational credit if the course is filed as a formal classroom course. Such credit may be earned to the extent that adequate records are

(continued)

maintained and appropriate certification of such attendance is provided by the course instructor.

(11)(A) The amount of credit received by an agent for a correspondence course shall be based upon successful completion of the course and an independently monitored examination subject to the number of hours assigned by the commissioner or the commissioner's designee.

(B) Examination monitors shall not be affiliated in any way with the providing organization or the licensee and shall be subject to approval by the commissioner or the commissioner's designee. Any examinations utilized or to be utilized shall be included in the material submitted for course approval. No examination shall be approved unless the commissioner or the commissioner's designee is satisfied that security procedures protecting the integrity of the examination can be maintained. If security is compromised no credit shall be granted.

(C) Any provider of correspondence courses shall clearly disclose to any agent wishing to receive credit in Kansas the number of hours for which that particular course has been approved by the commissioner or the commissioner's designee.

(c) Any licensee or provider found to have falsified a continuing education report to the commissioner shall be subject to suspension or revocation of the licensee's or provider's insurance license in accordance with K.S.A. 40-246, or a penalty as prescribed in K.S.A. 40-254, or termination of approval as a provider.

(d) Course requirements.

(1) Each course of study shall have a coordinator who is responsible for supervising the course and assuring compliance with the statutes and regulations governing the offering of insurance continuing education courses.

(2)(A) As required by K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 40-240f(5), providing organizations shall maintain accurate records relating to course offerings, instructors and student attendance. If the coordinator leaves the employ of the provider or otherwise ceases to monitor continuing education offerings, the records shall be transferred to the replacement coordinator or an officer of the provider. If a provider ceases operations, the coordinator shall maintain the records or provide a custodian of the records acceptable to the commissioner. In order to be acceptable, a custodian shall agree to make copies of student records available to students free of charge or at a reasonable fee. The commissioner shall not act as custodian of the records under any circumstances.

(B) Each provider shall provide students with course completion certificates, on a form prescribed or approved by the commissioner within 30 days after completion of the course. A provider may require payment of the course tuition as a condition for receiving the course completion certificate.

(3) Each instructor shall possess at least one of the following qualifications:

(A) Three years of recent experience in the subject area being taught;

(B) a college degree related to the subject area being taught;

(C) two years of recent experience in the subject area being taught and 60 classroom hours of acceptable course work in the subject area being taught; or

(D) an appropriate professional designation in the area being taught.

(4) Each instructor shall:

(A) Comply with all laws and regulations pertaining to insurance continuing education;

(B) provide students with current and accurate information;

(C) maintain an atmosphere conducive to learning in a classroom; and

(D) provide assistance to the students and respond to questions relating to course material.

(5) Each provider, coordinator and instructor shall notify the commissioner within 10 days after the occurrence of any of the following:

(A) A felony or misdemeanor conviction or disciplinary action taken against a provider or against an insurance or other occupational license held by the coordinator or instructor; and

(B) any change of information contained in an application for course approval.

(e) Licensee reporting requirement.

(1) Continuing education credit shall be reported by the licensee on forms and in a manner prescribed by the commissioner. Each course shall be completed or attended during the reporting period for which the credit hours are to be applied.

(2) Any request for an extension permitted by K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 40-240f(e)(6) shall be submitted in writing not later than the reporting deadline and shall include an explanation and independent verification of the hardship. (Authorized by K.S.A. 40-103; implementing K.S.A. 1995 Supp. 40-240f; effective May 15, 1989; amended, T-40-8-28-90, Aug. 30, 1990; amended Oct. 15, 1990; amended Feb. 8, 1993; amended April 11, 1997.)

**40-7-21. Agents; examination fee; amount.** On and after May 1, 1989, each person attempting to pass the examination shall pay the following fees for each attempt to pass the examination:

(a) \$62 for each single line examination of 100 items or limited line examination of up to 50 items; or

(b) \$85 for each combination examination of 130 items or more covering two or more lines of coverage included in two different classes of insurance as prescribed K.A.R. 40-7-13. ## HOUSE BILL No. 2015

AN ACT concerning community colleges; relating to residence of students for determination of state aid entitlements; amending K.S.A. 71-401 and K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 71-406, 71-602, 71-603, 71-607 and 71-619 and repealing the existing sections.

## Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 71-401 is hereby amended to read as follows: 71-401. Persons enrolling in a community college who, if adults, have not been, or if minors, whose parents have not been residents of the county in which is located the principal campus of such the community college for at least six (6) months prior to enrollment for any term or session are nonresidents of such the community college district for the purpose of determining liability of counties for payment of out-district state aid entitlement; out-district tuition and fee purposes.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 71-406 is hereby amended to read as follows: 71-406. (a) Subject to the provisions of section 3, and amendments thereto, persons enrolling in a community college who, if adults, have not been, or if minors, whose parents have not been residents of the state of Kansas for at least six months prior to enrollment for any term or session are nonresidents of the state for the purpose of determining state aid entitlements. Subject to the foregoing

(b) For the purpose of determining the residence of persons enrolling as a student in a community college, residence of minors shall be determined as provided in K.S.A. 72-1046, and amendments thereto, and of adults as provided in subpart Twenty-third of K.S.A. 77-201, and amendments thereto. The state board of education may adopt rules and regulations governing the determination of residence of students.

New Sec. 3. (a) The following persons, or any class or classes thereof, and their spouses and dependents, may be considered residents of the state of Kansas by the state board for the purpose of determining state aid entitlements of community colleges in the 1997 fiscal year and in fiscal years thereafter: (1) Persons who are in active military service of the United States; (2) persons who are domiciliary residents of the state, who were in active military service prior to becoming domiciliary residents of the state, who were present in the state for a period of not less than two years during their tenure in active military service, whose domiciliary residence was established in the state within 30 days of discharge or retirement from active military service under honorable conditions, but whose domiciliary residence was not timely enough established to meet the residence duration requirement of K.S.A. 71-406, and amendments thereto; (3) persons who are employees of a community college; (4) persons having special domestic relations circumstances; (5) persons who have lost their resident status within six months of enrollment; (6) persons who are not domiciliary residents of the state, who have graduated from a high school accredited by the state board of education within six months of enrollment at a community college, who were domiciliary residents of the state at the time of graduation from high school or within 12 months prior to graduation from high school, and who are entitled to admission at a state educational institution pursuant to K.S.A. 72-116, and amendments thereto; and (7) persons who are domiciliary residents of the state, whose domiciliary residence was established in the state for the purpose of accepting, upon recruitment by an employer, or retaining, upon transfer required by an employer, a position of full-time employment at a place of employment in Kansas, but the domiciliary residence of whom was not timely enough established to meet the residence duration requirement of K.S.A. 71-406, and amendments thereto.

(b) As used in this section:

(1) "Domiciliary resident" means a person who has present and fixed

residence in Kansas where the person intends to remain for an indefinite period and to which the person intends to return following absence.

(2) "Full-time employment" means employment requiring at least 1,500 hours of work per year.

(c) The state board shall prescribe criteria and guidelines for determination of the eligibility of persons specified in subsection (a) to be considered residents of the state and shall specify the evidence necessary to be submitted by such persons as proof of eligibility. Evidence submitted by a person as proof of eligibility claimed under subsection (a)(7) must include, but not by way of limitation, certification of the claim by the employer of the person.

Sec. 4. K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 71-602 is hereby amended to read as follows: 71-602. (a) Each community college is entitled to receive credit hour state aid. The basis for payments of credit hour state aid for community colleges for each credit hour of each duly enrolled student shall be: (1) For each credit hour in any subject or course which is not part of a vocational education program approved by the state board under the provisions of article 44 of chapter 72 of Kansas Statutes Annotated, an amount which shall be provided for by the legislature in acts making appropriations for the credit hour state aid entitlement of community colleges; and (2) for each credit hour in any subject or course which is part of a vocational education program approved by the state board under the provisions of article 44 of chapter 72 of Kansas Statutes Annotated, an amount which shall be determined by the state board by multiplying by 1½ the amount provided for by the legislature under (1), except that the amount provided for by the legislature under (1) for each credit hour of each student shall be multiplied by two if the credit hour is in any subject or course which is part of an approved vocational education program which is offered in a community college which is also officially designated as an area vocational school by the state board or if the credit hour is in any subject or course which is part of an approved vocational education program transferred to a community college in accordance with an agreement made and entered into under authority of K.S.A. 71-1507, and amendments thereto.

(b) Credit hour state aid payments shall be made only for credit hours of duly enrolled students if such students, as determined by the state board, are residents of the state of Kansas or are considered residents of the state of Kansas pursuant to the provisions of section 3, and amendments thereto.

(c) The determination of credit hours of duly enrolled students shall be made at times prescribed by the state board of education.

Sec. 5. K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 71-603 is hereby amended to read as follows: 71-603. (a) On or before November 1 and on or before March 1 of each year, the chief administrative officer of each community college shall certify under oath to the state board the total number of duly enrolled credit hours of students of the community college during the current school session who meet the state residence requirement or who are considered residents of the state pursuant to the provisions of section 3, and amendments thereto. Each November 1 and March 1, certification for payment shall set forth separately the credit hour enrollment for preceding sessions and for the current fall session. The state board may require the community college to furnish any additional information deemed necessary by it to carry out the provisions of this act, and shall prescribe such forms and policies as may be necessary for making such reports.

(b) In November of each year, the county clerk of each county shall certify to the state board with respect to each community college district in the county, the current assessed valuation of taxable tangible property within each such district. As used in this subsection, the term "taxable tangible property" means all real and tangible personal property which is subject to general ad valorem taxation.

Sec. 6. K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 71-607 is hereby amended to read as follows: 71-607. (a) Each community college is entitled to receive out-district state aid payments in amounts determined as provided in this section. From reports and information provided by each community college, and from such additional audits and investigations as are conducted by the state department of education, the state board shall determine the amount of out-district tuition each community college is entitled to bill to counties each year, and the entitlement to out-district state aid of each community college shall be an amount equal thereto plus (1) an amount equal to the amount of out-district tuition disallowed under the provisions of K.S.A. 71-304, and amendments thereto, and (2) an amount equal to the amount of out-district tuition disallowed under the provisions of sub-

section (c) of K.S.A. 71-609, and amendments thereto, and (3) an amount equal to the number of duly enrolled students considered residents of the state pursuant to the provisions of section 3, and amendments thereto, times the amount specified in subsection (c) of K.S.A. 71-301; and amendments thereto, for each credit hour of each such duly enrolled student.

(b) (1) Out-district state aid payments shall be made only for credit hours of students specified in provision (3) of subsection (a) if such students, as determined by the state board, have not more than 64 credit hours from any institution of postsecondary education or the students have not more than 72 credit hours and are enrolled in terminal type nursing courses or freshman-sophomore level preengineering courses.

(2) The credit hour limitations prescribed by provision (1) of this subsection do not apply to credit hours of students if such students, as determined by the state board, are enrolled in an approved vocational education program at a community college for the purpose of receiving vocational or technical training or retraining in preparation for gainful employment.

Sec. 7. K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 71-619 is hereby amended to read as follows: 71-619. (a) Each community college is entitled to receive general state aid payments in amounts determined by the state board as provided in this section.

(b) In each fiscal year, the state board shall:

(1) Determine full-time equivalent enrollment of each community college and total full-time equivalent enrollment of all community colleges.

(2) Determine the assessed valuation of each community college.

(3) Compute the assessed valuation per student of each community college by dividing its assessed valuation by its full-time equivalent enrollment. The quotient is the assessed valuation per student of the community college.

(4) Determine the median assessed valuation per student of all community colleges by ranking the community colleges from high to low on the basis of assessed valuation per student of each community college and identify the community college which is located at the median. The median assessed valuation per student of all community colleges is the assessed valuation per student of the community college identified as being located at the median.

(5) Compute the wealth factor of each community college by dividing the median assessed valuation per student of all community colleges by the assessed valuation per student of the community college. The quotient is the wealth factor of the community college.

(6) Determine on the basis of total full-time equivalent enrollment of all community colleges a per student guarantee by computing the amount thereof which is required to distribute to the community colleges the total amount of the appropriation from the state general fund for general state aid for the fiscal year.

(7) Multiply the per student guarantee determined in provision (6) by the full-time equivalent enrollment of the community college.

(8) Multiply the product obtained in provision (7) by the wealth factor of the community college. The product is the amount of general state aid to which the community college is entitled.

(c) As used in this section:

(1) "Assessed valuation of a community college" means the assessed valuation of the taxable tangible property within the community college district.

(2) "Taxable tangible property" means all real and tangible personal property which is subject to general ad valorem taxation.

(3) "Full-time equivalent enrollment" means the quotient obtained by dividing by 15 the total credit hour enrollment of students of a community college who on September 15 are residents of the state of Kansas on September 15 or are considered residents of the state of Kansas pursuant to the provisions of section 3, and amendments thereto, plus the total credit hour enrollment of such students of the community college for courses taught in the summer term and for courses approved to be conducted as of September 15, the beginning dates of which courses are after September 15 but prior to December 1.

Sec. 8. K.S.A. 71-401 and K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 71-406, 71-602, 71-603, 71-607 and 71-619 are hereby repealed.

Sec. 9. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

### SENATE BILL No. 135

AN ACT concerning electronic filing of business records; amending K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 75-443 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 75-443 is hereby amended to read as follows: 75-443. The secretary of state, the secretary of revenue and the secretary of human resources may adopt rules and regulations for the purpose of authorizing the electronic filing of reports, certificates or other documents which businesses may be required by law to file with such agencies pursuant to chapters 17, 44 and 56 and 79 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 75-443 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

### HOUSE BILL No. 2183

AN ACT concerning the department of health and environment; licensed speech language pathologists and audiologists continuing education sponsors; amending K.S.A. 65-6501 and 65-6512 and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 65-6501 is hereby amended to read as follows: 65-6501. As used in this act, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them in this section:

(a) "Secretary" means the secretary of health and environment.

(b) "Speech-language pathology" means the application of principles, methods and procedures related to the development and disorders of human communication. Disorders include any and all conditions, whether of organic or nonorganic origin, that impede the normal process of human communication including disorders and related disorders of speech, articulation, fluency, voice, verbal and written language, auditory comprehension, cognition/communication, and oral pharyngeal or laryngeal sensorimotor competencies, or both. Speech-language pathology does not mean diagnosis or treatment of medical conditions as defined by K.S.A. 65-2869 and amendments thereto.

(c) "Practice of speech-language pathology" means:

(1) Rendering or offering to render to individuals or groups of individuals who have or are suspected of having disorders of communication, any service in speech-language pathology including prevention, identification, evaluation, consultation, habilitation and rehabilitation;

(2) determining the need for personal augmentative communication systems, recommending such systems and providing training in utilization of such systems; and

(3) planning, directing, conducting or supervising such services.

(d) "Speech-language pathologist" means a person who engages in the practice of speech-language pathology and who meets the qualifications set forth in this act.

(e) "Audiology" means the application of principles, methods and procedures related to hearing and the disorders of hearing and to related language and speech disorders. Disorders include any and all conditions, whether of organic or nonorganic origin, peripheral or central, that impede the normal process of human communication including, but not limited to, disorders of auditory sensitivity, acuity, function or processing. Audiology does not mean diagnosis or treatment of medical conditions as defined by K.S.A. 65-2869 and amendments thereto.

(f) "Practice of audiology" means:

(1) Rendering or offering to render to individuals or groups of individuals who have or are suspected of having disorders of hearing, any service in audiology, including prevention, identification, evaluation, consultation and habilitation or rehabilitation (other than hearing aid or other assistive listening device dispensing);

(2) participating in hearing conservation;

(3) providing auditory training and speech reading;

(4) conducting tests of vestibular function;

(5) evaluating tinnitus; and

(6) planning, directing, conducting or supervising services.

(g) "Audiologist" means any person who engages in the practice of audiology and who meets the qualifications set forth in this act.



(h) "Speech-language pathology assistant" means an individual who meets minimum qualifications established by the secretary which are less than those established by this act as necessary for licensing as a speech-language pathologist; does not act independently; and works under the direction and supervision of a speech-language pathologist licensed under this act.

(i) "Audiology assistant" means an individual who meets minimum qualifications established by the secretary, which are less than those established by this act as necessary for licensing as an audiologist; does not

act independently; and works under the direction and supervision of an audiologist licensed under this act.

(j) "Sponsor" means entities approved by the secretary of health and environment to provide continuing education programs or courses on an ongoing basis under this act and in accordance with any rules and regulations promulgated by the secretary in accordance with this act.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 65-6512 is hereby amended to read as follows: 65-6512. The secretary shall fix by rules and regulations the licensure fee,

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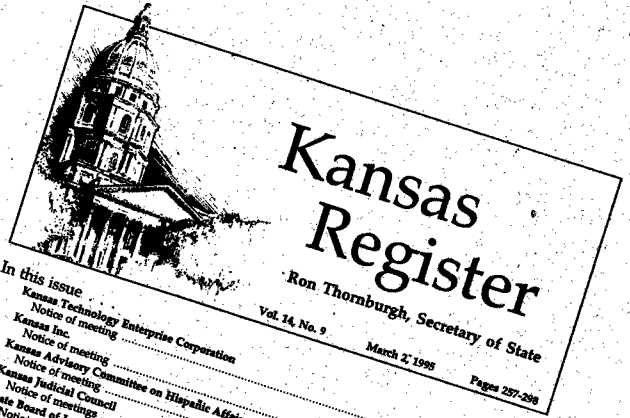
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
