Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, June 3, in the auditorium at the Kansas Bureau of Investigation office, 1620 S.W. Tyler, Topeka, to consider adoption of new rules and regulations of the Kansas Bureau of Investigation in relation to the implementation of changes regarding the missing persons statute found at K.S.A. 75-712b.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Director Larry Welch, c/o Melanie Pfeifer, Assistant Attorney General, Kansas Bureau of Investigation, 1620 S.W. Tyler, Topeka, 66612.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Linda Durand at (913) 296-8211 or the Kansas Relay Center at 1-800-766-3777. Handicapped parking is located on the south end of the KBI building, off of Tyler Street.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the

proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant limit any oral presentation to 10 minutes.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

10-20-2. Forms for reporting. The rules and regulations are being modified to provide that the two reports utilized to report missing persons will be the NCIC report and Kansas Incident Based Reporting form. There is no economic impact.

10-20-3. Procedures for reporting. The procedures for reporting are already in the statutes. There is no economic impact.

10-20-4. Dissemination. Dissemination which required concurrent receipt by the KBI and FBI is no longer needed. This regulation merely allows local law enforcement, public and private agencies or members of the public to request data from the missing persons system. There is no economic impact.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit comments prior to the hearing to the Board of Healing Arts at the address above. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Pamela Dawes at (913) 291-3684. Handicapped parking is located at the west end of the Hutton Building, and the northwest entrance to the building is accessible.

A summary of the proposed rules and regulations to be amended and their economic impact follows.

100-15-1. Expiration date; renewal. This regulation specifies when each license to practice medicine and surgery, osteopathic medicine and surgery and chiropractic will expire.

100-49-5. Expiration of license. This regulation specifies when the license to practice podiatry will expire.

100-60-13. Prescription-only drugs. This regulation specifies the requirements necessary to transmit, by written protocol, prescription-only drugs by physicians' assistants.

The above regulations relate to licensees and registrants regulated by the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts. There is no economic impact on state agencies or the general public.

Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct

Advisory Opinion No. 97-8

Written March 20, 1997, to Anise Gill, Norton.

This opinion is in response to your letter of February 20, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the application of the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-2215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as an employee in the business office of the Norton Correctional Facility. You advise us that the correctional facility currently hires a local shuttle bus to transport inmates to a bus terminal when they are paroled. In your position with the facility, you make the arrangements as to time of departure and write the checks for the inmates'

fares. You are planning to retire in approximately two years and would like to purchase the shuttle bus and transport the inmates for the state.

Question

Is it a conflict of interest for you, upon retirement from state service, to purchase the shuttle bus and transport inmates for the state?

Opinion

Nothing in the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *seq.*) applies to your situation. Therefore, upon retirement you may purchase the shuttle bus and transport the inmates for the state.

Advisory Opinion No. 97-9

Written March 20, 1997, to Jeffrey M. Pfaff, Lathrop & Gage, Kansas City, Missouri.

This opinion is in response to your letter of March 17, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*) and the local level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 75-4301a *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction concerning your question is limited to the application of those particular laws, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as attorney for the Kansas and Missouri Metropolitan Culture District Commission. You advise us that pursuant to K.S.A. 25-1236, the commission is composed of ten individuals from Missouri and Kansas, three of which are included by virtue of being elected to Kansas public office. Members do not receive any compensation other than actual and necessary expenses. The commission is not under the jurisdiction of any state agency.

You further advise us that the statute creating the commission states that the members are subject to the laws that relate to conflicts of interest, and that if any commissioner has a direct or indirect financial interest in any entity, the commissioner shall disclose such interest in writing to the commissioners and abstain from voting on said matter.

You understand that the Kansas elected officials would have to file statements of substantial interests (SSIs) under state law for reasons other than membership on the commission. Your concern is whether or not the other seven members would be required to file SSIs.

Question

Are the members of the commission who do not hold Kansas elective office excluded from the requirement of filing statements of substantial interests as set out in K.S.A. 46-247 and K.S.A. 75-4302a?

Opinion

We first note that K.S.A. 75-4302a requires individuals who are candidates for local office, or are appointed to

fill an elective local office, to file statements of substantial interests. Therefore, since membership to the commission is not based on election to local office, this statute would not require the members to file.

Turning to the state level conflict of interest laws, K.S.A. 46-247 and K.S.A. 46-221 may apply to your question. K.S.A. 46-247 states:

The following individuals shall file written statements of substantial interests, as provided in K.S.A. 46-248 to K.S.A. 46-252, inclusive, and amendments thereto:

- (a) Legislators and candidates for nomination or election to the legislature;
- (b) individuals holding an elected office in the executive branch of this state, and candidates for nomination or election to any such office;
- (c) state officers, employees and members of boards, councils and commissions under the jurisdiction of the head of any state agency who are listed as designees by the head of a state agency pursuant to K.S.A. 46-285, and amendments thereto;
- (d) individuals whose appointment to office is subject to confirmation by the senate whether or not such individual is a state officer or employee;
- (e) general counsels for state agencies irrespective of how compensated;
- (f) the administrator or executive director of the education commission of the states, the interstate compact on agricultural grain marketing, the Mo-Kan metropolitan development district and agency compact, the Kansas City area transportation district and authority compact, the midwest nuclear compact, the central interstate low-level radioactive waste compact, the multistate tax compact, the Kansas-Oklahoma Arkansas river basin compact, the Kansas-Nebraska Big Blue river compact, and the multistate lottery.
- (g) private consultants under contract with any agency of the state of Kansas to evaluate bids for public contracts or to award public contracts.

K.S.A. 46-221, which defines "state officer or employee," in pertinent part states:

... state officer or employee does not include any appointed member of an advisory council, commission or board, who serves without compensation other than amounts for expense allowances or reimbursement of expenses as provided for in subsection (e) of K.S.A. 75-3223 and amendments thereto. . . .

In applying K.S.A. 46-247 to your question, the commission members would not be required to file an SSI unless they are "state officers or employees." K.S.A. 46-221 specifically exempts those individuals who do not receive any compensation other than actual and necessary expenses from the definition of "state officer or employee." Therefore, the members would not be required to file SSIs due to their membership on the commission.

In closing, we do note that this opinion does not affect the duty to comply with the provisions of K.S.A. 12-2536, Article V(f).

**Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations.**

A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, June 11, in Room 107 of the Saline County Courthouse, 300 W. Ash, Salina, to consider the adoption of proposed revisions to existing regulations of the Department of Health and Environment, Division of Environment.

These amended regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. Kansas administrative regulations 28-5-1 through 28-5-9 govern the disposal of domestic wastewater from private sewage systems. The objectives of these regulations are protection of water resources and prevention of public health hazards. A summary of the proposed regulations and their environmental and economic impacts follows.

K.A.R. 28-5-2. Location of private wastewater systems. The title of this regulation has been changed to eliminate the reference to seepage pits, which are no longer approved systems due to the revoking of K.A.R. 28-5-8 in May 1996. It also is amended to eliminate the reference to seepage pits within the regulation and to clarify the applicability of the regulation.

K.A.R. 28-5-6. Discharge of domestic waste. This regulation has been revised to eliminate the reference to bulletin 4-2 and to establish the approved method of discharge of domestic waste, which is either to a public or a private wastewater treatment system. Clarification of regulatory authority is provided and the reference to septic tanks has been moved to K.A.R. 28-5-7, which addresses only private systems.

K.A.R. 28-5-7. Discharge of septic tank effluent. This regulation has been amended to be consistent with the revoking of K.A.R. 28-5-8 in May 1996. It also has been amended to reference the newly revised bulletin 4-2 for the "Minimum Standards for the Location, Design and Operation of Private Sewer Systems" in counties with no sanitary code. It includes a statement that local sanitary codes adopted before July 1997 establish minimum standards in counties having such codes. Bulletin 4-2 was last revised in 1982. It provided limited options for the on-site disposal of domestic wastewater. The 1997 edition being adopted provides additional options or alternatives and more detailed construction guidelines in addition to minimum standards for materials used in the systems.

K.A.R. 28-5-9. Variance. This regulation provides for variances to previous regulations (K.A.R. 28-5-2 through 28-5-7) in order to provide flexibility in achieving the goal of water quality protection from pollution by domestic wastewater. This regulation has been amended to more clearly articulate the procedure for applying for and receiving a variance.

K.S.A. 65-101(a) states that the Secretary of Health and Environment shall exercise general supervision of health and welfare of the people of the state and may take action to prevent the introduction of infectious or contagious disease into this state and to prevent the spread of infec-

tious or contagious disease within the state. K.S.A. 65-171(d) states that for purposes of preventing surface and subsurface water pollution, the Secretary of Health and Environment shall make rules and regulations necessary to control the disposal, discharge or escape of sewage. These standards are published as bulletin 4-2.

Bulletin 4-2 was last revised in 1982. The 1997 revision being adopted has the environmental benefit of offering options for disposal of on-site wastewater that will perform in a greater variety of conditions. A higher level of protection of water resources and lower level of public health risk will result because more detailed information is given about constructing on-site systems where site conditions are restrictive.

All Kansas residents owning a private wastewater system are currently subject to these regulations. The revised regulations will not result in additional cost to the regulated community. Savings may be realized due to fewer failing systems that eventually have to be replaced at the expense of the homeowner. Costs to local government also may be reduced because there will be fewer complaints and less need for enforcement and prosecution.

In the absence of minimum standards, the homeowner has no knowledge of what constitutes an adequate on-site wastewater system. In addition, reputable installers have no means of defending their cost estimates against unscrupulous installers who will install an inadequate system. Failing on-site wastewater systems result in a reduction in property values, not only on the site with the failing system, but on neighboring properties.

The time period between publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing serves as the required public comment period of at least 60 days for the purpose of receiving written public comments of the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Debra Baker, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Water, Forbes Field, Building 283, Topeka, 66620. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their view, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and regulatory impact statement in an accessible format. SENATE BILL No. 121

AN ACT concerning the compliance advisory panel for the small business assistance program under the Kansas air quality act; amending K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-3027 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-3027 is hereby amended to read as follows: 65-3027. (a) There is hereby created the small business stationary source technical and environmental compliance assistance program, to be administered by the secretary. The program shall include each of the following:

(1) Adequate mechanisms for developing, collecting and coordinating information concerning compliance methods and technologies for small business stationary sources and programs to encourage lawful cooperation among such sources and other persons to further compliance with this act.

(2) Adequate mechanisms for assisting small business stationary sources with pollution prevention and accidental release detection and prevention, including providing information concerning alternative technologies, process changes, products and methods of operation that help reduce air pollution.

(3) A designated office within the Kansas department of health and environment, reporting directly to the secretary, to serve as ombudsman for small business stationary sources in connection with implementation of this act.

(4) A compliance assistance program for small business stationary sources which assists, small business stationary sources in determining applicable requirements and in receiving permits under this act in a timely and efficient manner.

(5) Adequate mechanisms to assure that small business stationary sources receive notice of their rights under this act in such manner and form as to assure reasonably adequate time for such sources to evaluate compliance methods and any relevant or applicable proposed or final rule and regulation or standard adopted under this act.

(6) Adequate mechanisms for informing small business stationary sources of their obligations under this act, including mechanisms for referring such sources to qualified auditors or for providing audits of the operations of such sources to determine compliance with this act.

(7) Procedures for consideration of requests from a small business stationary source for modification of: (A) Any work practice or technological method of compliance; or (B) the schedule of milestones for implementing such work practice or method of compliance preceding any applicable compliance date, based on the technological and financial capability of any such small business stationary source. No such modification may be granted unless it is in compliance with the applicable requirement of this act and rules and regulations promulgated hereunder.

(b) "Small business stationary source" means a stationary air contaminant emission source that:

(1) Is owned or operated by a person that employs 100 or fewer individuals;

(2) is a small business concern as defined in the federal small business act;

(3) is not a major stationary source;

(4) does not emit 50 tons or more per year of any regulated air contaminant; and

(5) emits less than 75 tons per year of all regulated air contaminants.

(c) Upon petition by a source, the secretary, after notice and opportunity for public comment, may include as a small business stationary

source for purposes of this section any stationary source which does not meet the criteria of subsection (b)(3), (4) or (5) but which does not emit more than 100 tons per year of all regulated air contaminants.

(d) The secretary may exclude from the small business stationary source definition any category or subcategory of sources that the administrator of the United States environmental protection agency determines to have sufficient technical and financial capabilities to meet the requirements of the federal clean air act without the application of this program, as provided by section 507(c)(3)(A) of the 1990 amendments to the federal clean air act.

(e) The secretary, in consultation with the administrator of the United States environmental protection agency and the administrator of the United States small business administration and after providing notice and the opportunity for public hearing, may exclude from the small business stationary source definition any category or subcategory of sources that the secretary determines to have sufficient technical and financial capabilities to meet the requirements of the act without the application of this section.

(f) There is hereby created a compliance advisory panel composed of seven individuals. The compliance advisory panel shall:

(1) Render advisory opinions concerning the effectiveness of the small business stationary source technical and environmental compliance assistance program, difficulties encountered and degree and severity of enforcement;

(2) make periodic reports to the administrator of the United States environmental protection agency concerning compliance of the small business stationary source technical and environmental compliance assistance program with the requirements of the federal paperwork reduction act, the regulatory flexibility act and the equal access to justice act;

(3) review information for small business stationary sources to assure such information is understandable by the layperson; and

(4) have the small business stationary source technical and environmental compliance assistance program serve as the secretariat for the development and dissemination of such reports and advisory opinions.

(g) The compliance advisory panel shall consist of:

(1) Two members who are not owners, or representatives of owners, of small business stationary sources, appointed by the governor to represent the general public;

(2) two members who are owners, or who represent owners, of small business stationary sources, one appointed by the speaker and one appointed by the minority leader of the Kansas house of representatives;

(3) two members who are owners, or who represent owners, of small business stationary sources, one appointed by the president and one appointed by the minority leader of the Kansas senate; and

(4) one member appointed by the secretary to represent the department of health and environment.

(h) Members of the compliance advisory panel shall serve for terms of two years serving on the effective date of this act by appointment by the governor; the speaker of the house of representatives or the president of the senate shall serve for terms ending June 30, 1998; members serving on the effective date of this act by appointment by the minority leader of the house of representatives, the minority leader of the senate or the secretary of health and environment shall serve for terms ending June 30, 1997. Upon expiration of such terms, the term of each member appointed to a vacancy created by expiration of a term shall be two years commencing on July 1 immediately following expiration of the term of the member's predecessor. Any vacancy in the office of an appointed member occurring on the panel shall be filled for the unexpired term by appointment by the original appointing authority.

(i) A chairperson shall be elected annually by the members of the compliance advisory panel. A vice-chairperson shall be designated by the chairperson to serve in the absence of the chairperson.

(j) The secretary may reduce any fee required by this act for any classification of small business sources to take into account the financial resources of such classification.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-3027 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

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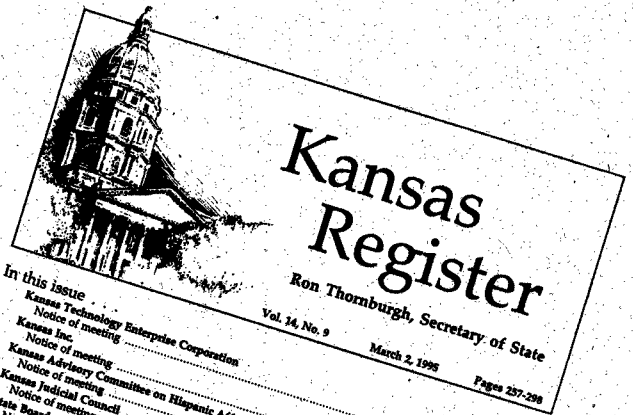
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
