A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Friday, May 9, in the Florentine Room of the Jayhawk Tower, first floor, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, on the proposal for the Kansas Development Finance Authority to issue approximately \$4,500,000 principal amount of Health Facilities Revenue Bonds for Rural Health Resources of Jackson County, Inc., doing business as Holton Community Hospital (the developer). The bonds will be issued, pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8901 et seq., to finance costs of constructing and equipping a health facility and related improvements and equipment to be used for public health purposes. The project consists of a new hospital facility, single story building of approximately 26,000+ square feet on a 9+ acre site located at U.S. 75 and the north city limits, Holton, Jackson County, Kansas.

The bonds, when issued, will be a limited obligation of the Kansas Development Finance Authority and will not constitute a general obligation or indebtedness of the State of Kansas or any political subdivision thereof, including the Authority, nor will the bonds constitute an indebtedness for which the faith and credit and taxing powers of the State of Kansas are pledged. The bonds will be payable solely and only from amounts received from the developer, the obligation of which will be sufficient to pay the principal of, interest and redemption premium, if any, on the bonds as and when they shall become due.

All individuals attending the hearing will be given an opportunity to express their views for or against the proposal to issue any specific bonds for the purpose of financing the project, and all written comments previously filed with the Authority at its offices at Suite 1000, Jayhawk Tower, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66603, will be considered. Additional information regarding the project described above may be obtained by contacting the Authority.

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday, June 25, in Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent rules and regulations of the Department of Administration, Division of Personnel Services.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Administration, Room 263-E, State Capitol, 300 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Faith Loretto at (913) 296-6000 or (913) 296-4798 (TTY). Handicapped parking is located at the south end of Landon State Office Building, and the north entrance to the building is accessible.

Summaries of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follow.

In order to decentralize some aspects of the state's hiring process and provide agencies with greater flexibility in selection procedures, the following regulations are proposed for amendment or revocation.

**K.A.R. 1-2-8 (Applicant)** is being revised to expand the definition of applicant to a person who registers and applies with the state. Accordingly, **K.A.R. 1-2-68 (Registrant)** is being revoked because this definition is now incorporated into the applicant definition. Therefore, these changes are primarily in terminology, rather than application procedures.

**K.A.R. 1-2-14 (Candidate)** and **K.A.R. 1-2-35 (Candidate pool)** are being revised to allow the appointing authority of an agency, as well as the Director of Personnel Services, to certify applicants as eligible to be considered for a position. Providing this additional flexibility with respect to the authority to certify is not expected to result in significant operational changes in the process of establishing pools of candidates.

**K.A.R. 1-6-2 (Recruitment)** is being revised to clarify the responsibilities of agencies and the Division of Personnel Services in recruitment procedures. The agency head will continue to determine the scope of the recruitment and to distribute notices within the agency and to those in the reemployment pool, while the Director of Personnel Services will continue distributing notices to other state agencies.

**K.A.R. 1-6-27 (Demotion)** is being revised to reflect the deletion of direct entry hires. Correspondingly, **K.A.R. 1-6-22 (Direct entry hires of unskilled and semi-skilled labor)** is being revoked because there no longer is any need for direct entry hires. Instead, all hires, except temporary hires, will be made from within certified pools of candidates.

There would be no economic impact on the Department of Administration, state employees, other state agencies or applicants due to any of these regulations.

**K.A.R. 1-6-8 (Content of selection instruments)** is being revised to allow agencies to develop, maintain and validate selection instruments without obtaining approval of the Division of Personnel Services prior to their use. The division will still assist agencies if requested, and the director will maintain authority to develop, maintain and validate selection instruments and to periodically review or audit agency selection instruments.

**K.A.R. 1-6-21 (Candidate pools for regular positions)** is being revised to reflect the amendments to the definitions of "candidate" and "candidate pool," which allow the appointing authority, as well as the Director of Personnel Services, to certify applicants. The amendments also permit agencies to correct errors in candidate pools without the director's approval. These amendments will not change how the SHARP system administers the candidate pool. Agencies will continue to process candidates in the same manner. Agencies may still choose to use SHARP or their own approach for forming candidate pools. The Division of Personnel Services will continue to assist agencies who do not have access to SHARP or who request assistance.

The administrative efficiencies in **K.A.R. 1-6-8** and **K.A.R. 1-6-21** are not anticipated to result in any measurable economic impact on the Department of Administration, state employees, other state agencies or applicants. In addition, private citizens would not be affected by the changes to these regulations.

Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed rule and regulation of the Division of Accounts and Reports, Department of Administration. The regulation is proposed on both a permanent and a temporary basis.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Administration, Room 263-E, State Capitol, 300 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

**K.A.R. 1-18-1a, Mileage rates**, prescribes reimbursement rates for use of privately-owned conveyances by state employees on official state business. The proposed amendment increases the reimbursement rate for the use of a privately-owned automobile from \$.30 to \$.31, as well as increasing the reimbursement rate for motorcycles, airplanes and specially equipped vans for the physically handicapped by \$.01.

If all state employees driving private vehicles were to be reimbursed at the rates established by this regulation, it is estimated that, during fiscal year 1998, there would be an increase in mileage reimbursements paid by state agencies of \$182,006 (\$79,724 from the state general fund and \$102,282 from all other funds). However, the privately-owned conveyance reimbursement rate may be paid only when the use of a state vehicle is determined to be more expensive than use of a privately-owned vehicle or when the employee has a disability that requires a specially equipped, privately-owned vehicle. Therefore, the actual economic impact on state agencies is likely to be lower than these estimates. There also would be an indeterminable economic impact on any governmental units within the state that elect to use these rates rather than establishing their own rates. No economic impact on the general public is anticipated.

Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, June 24, in the Conservation Division hearing room, Finney State Office Building, 130 S. Market, Room 2078, Wichita, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations for the conservation of crude oil and natural gas.

The 60-day notice period from the date of this publication to the date of the public hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. Comments may be submitted to John McCannon, Assistant General Counsel, State Corporation Commission, Wichita State Office Building, 130 S. Market, Room 2078, Wichita, 67202.

Any person requiring special accommodations under The American With Disabilities Act needs to give notice to the commission at least 10 days prior to the scheduled hearing date.

Copies of the proposed regulations and the economic impact statements may be obtained at the Wichita address. Persons requesting a copy of the proposed regulations and economic impact statements, in accordance with K.S.A. 45-129, will be required to compensate the commission for the cost of reproduction.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views orally or in writing in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. All written or oral comments submitted by interested parties on or before June 24 will be considered by the commission as a basis for making changes to these proposed permanent regulations.

The following is a brief summary of the proposed regulations and economic impact statements:

**K.A.R. 82-3-103a.**

The amendments to this regulation set out the notice requirements for an application to approve the drilling of a horizontal well. In addition, it allows the commission to grant these applications administratively rather than requiring a hearing in all cases.

**Economic Impact:** Making a hearing on horizontal wells optional with the commission will reduce costs for both the agency and the regulated community. Most of these applications can now be decided administratively by the commission. This will save the regulated industry the cost of a hearing, including the cost of retaining legal counsel and expert witnesses. It will likewise save the agency the cost in staff and commissioner time in holding a hearing for each of this type of application.

**K.A.R. 82-3-120.**

The amendment to this regulation makes compliance with the financial assurance provisions of K.A.R. 82-3-120a part of the operator licensing procedure.

**K.A.R. 82-3-120a.**

This new regulation imposes financial assurance requirements in order for oil and gas operators to obtain

or renew a license. Depending upon the compliance history category of the operator, either a nonrefundable fee, performance bond or other financial assurance is required. The regulation mirrors the requirements of K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 55-155.

**Economic Impact:** K.A.R. 82-3-120 and K.A.R. 82-3-120a will now require that on or after January 1, 1998, oil and gas operators will be required to furnish financial assurance in order to obtain or renew a license. Although exact figures cannot be projected, the agency anticipates that 95 percent of operators will be required to pay a nonrefundable fee of \$50. There are approximately 3,000 operators currently licensed. 2,850 (3,000 x 95%) would pay a \$50 nonrefundable fee. This would be a \$142,500 cost to the regulated industry. Approximately 150 (3,000 x 5%) operators would be required to furnish some other form of financial assurance. Depending on the form of financial assurance that is furnished, the cost could range from zero to \$900, which is the approximate cost of a performance bond at the highest amount required or the cost of paying a nonrefundable fee of 3 percent of the performance bond required. The cost to this segment of the regulated industry would be a maximum of \$135,000. Payment of nonrefundable fees would generate income for the agency; performance bonds purchased to meet the financial assurance requirement would not generate any agency income. The agency estimates that it will require at least one new full-time equivalent position for the program. In addition, since the amount of the financial assurance required is based on the last 36 months compliance with the commission's rules and regulations, the agency expects more appeals of administrative penalty orders which will require increased legal staff time.

**K.A.R. 82-3-123.**

The amendment allows commingled gas wells to produce at 25 percent of the combined absolute open flow from all producing zones. It also sets a minimum allowable of 150 mcf/d.

**Economic Impact:** This amendment will increase production allowables for commingled gas wells. The minimum allowable will increase from 65 mcf/d to 150 mcf/d. This will be an economic benefit to the regulated industry and will have no economic impact on the agency.

**K.A.R. 82-3-129.**

This regulation is being repealed. The regulation sets the charges for various commission reports.

**Economic Impact:** Some of the reports listed in this regulation are ordered by few people. Costs change so often that the price listed for these reports is outdated and does not cover the agency's expense to reproduce and mail the reports. The agency will adopt a price list for reports by commission policy rather than through regulation. The cost of the reports will increase to cover the agency's expense of reproducing and mailing.

**K.A.R. 82-3-130.**

This regulation was amended to require that completion reports be filed for recompleted wells in addition to new wells. K.A.R. 82-3-141 already required that completion reports be made to the commission. K.A.R. 82-3-141 will be repealed and reports for both new wells and recompleted wells will be on the same form.



**Economic Impact:** There will be no economic impact associated with this amendment either to the agency or the regulated industry.

**K.A.R. 82-3-136.**

This amendment shifts the responsibility for filing transfer of operator forms from the new operator to the previous operator. It requires that all active and inactive wells on the lease be listed on the transfer form. Transfers can only be made to licensed operators and the new operator will have 90 days from the transfer to post new identification signs on the transferred lease. Failure to file the transfer form as required will result in a penalty of up to \$1,000 for the first violation, \$2,000 for a second violation, and \$3,000 plus license review for a third violation.

**Economic Impact:** The shift of responsibility for filing the transfer of operator form will have no economic effect on the industry as a whole. It will simply shift the filing burden from the buyer to the seller. No specific penalty for not filing was contained in the previous regulation. The penalties contained in the amended regulation will have significant economic impact on the sellers that do not file the change of operator notice with the commission.

**K.A.R. 82-3-141.**

This regulation is being repealed. The substance of the regulation is now contained in K.A.R. 82-3-130.

**Economic Impact:** There is no economic impact associated with repealing this regulation.

**K.A.R. 82-3-304.**

This amendment will exempt certain gas wells from the annual gas well testing requirements.

**Economic Impact:** On those wells that will now be exempt from annual testing, the operator will save approximately \$120-\$150 per well, which is the cost of the test itself. In addition, there will be no lost production from shutting down the well three days for testing, nor restarting costs, and no cost of operator personnel used for the testing process. There will be a slight saving in agency staff time in not having to process the test reports.

**K.A.R. 82-3-308.**

This regulation is being repealed.

**K.A.R. 82-3-309.**

This regulation is being repealed.

**Economic Impact:** The repeal of K.A.R. 82-3-308 and K.A.R. 82-3-309 will have no economic impact on either the industry or the agency. These are both outdated regulations that were not being enforced.

**K.A.R. 82-3-312.**

The amendment to this regulation increases the minimum gas well allowable from 65 mcf/d to 150 mcf/d.

**Economic Impact:** There will be no economic impact to the agency. Industry will benefit from this amendment by allowing some wells to produce more gas. This may make some wells economic when they would otherwise be plugged and abandoned.

**K.A.R. 82-3-313.**

This regulation is being repealed.

**Economic Impact:** There is no economic impact to either industry or the agency. The regulation is being repealed because it is outdated and is not being enforced.

**K.A.R. 82-3-500—K.A.R. 82-3-504.**

This whole series of regulations is being repealed.

**Economic Impact:** There is no economic impact to either industry or the agency. The regulations implemented the state's role in the federal Natural Gas Policy Act of 1978, Public Law 95-621. This act has been repealed by Congress so there is no longer a need for these regulations.

## Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is seeking public comments on the trial burn plan for the Aptus, Inc. incinerator located in Coffeyville, Kansas, in connection with the hazardous waste incinerator operating parameter redemonstration process.

Aptus has been permitted to operate a commercial hazardous waste storage and incineration facility at the Coffeyville industrial park since July 1991. The incinerator is capable of treating hazardous waste in the form of pumpable and containerized liquids, solids and sludges, and bulk solids. The current permit allows Aptus to accept hazardous waste, including dioxin wastes, from off-site sources for storage and incineration.

The original hazardous waste permit was issued to Aptus on July 27, 1991, for a term of 10 years. The permit allowed the incineration of dioxin coded hazardous wastes (EPA waste codes F020, F021, F022, F023, F026, F027 and/or F028) upon demonstration of a 99.9999 percent destruction and removal efficiency (DRE) on selected difficult to destroy principal organic hazardous constituents (POHCs). Conditions in the original permit were established from demonstrated operating conditions in a trial burn conducted in August 1990. On April 27, 1993, modified permit pages were issued to allow incineration of dioxin waste, based on operating parameters demonstrated in a trial burn conducted in November 1991.

The hazardous waste permit requires that the incinerator operating parameters be demonstrated at five-year intervals, beginning with the effective date of the original permit (July 27, 1991). KDHE provided Aptus with an extension of one year to the originally scheduled date of July 27, 1996, for incinerator redemonstration. The extension was based on Aptus' willingness to install a technologically advanced carbon injection system (CIS) for further reduction in emissions. Although this system is not completely ready, Aptus will conduct demonstration runs for the CIS during this trial burn.

The purpose of this trial burn is to demonstrate that the incinerator continues to achieve each of the incineration operating parameters specified in the permit that cannot be monitored on a continuous basis; namely, the DRE and

metals removal efficiency. Conducting DRE testing demonstrates the incinerator's ability to achieve 99.9999 percent destruction and removal efficiency for KDHE selected surrogate and difficult to destroy principal organic hazardous constituents (POHCs). The metals' system removal efficiency is used to demonstrate compliance with the metal emission rate limitations specified in the permit.

### **Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct**

#### **Advisory Opinion No. 97-10**

Written April 10, 1997, to Laura Johnson, Deputy Director, Department of Revenue, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of March 24, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction concerning your question is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

#### **Factual Statement**

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as the deputy director for the Division of Property Valuation within the Department of Revenue, and on behalf of a member of your staff. You advise us that your division is responsible for assuring the administration of a uniform and accurate property tax. The property tax primarily funds local services, including local subdivisions of government. The counties value the property, compute the mill levy and collect the tax. Your division assists and supervises the counties by educating county officials as well as the taxpayers.

You further advise us that a staff member of your division has been offered a free seminar registration by a county. The seminar relates to mapping, which is part of the overall appraisal process. The staff member is currently responsible for writing mapping course material for the counties, teaching mapping classes and providing support to the counties. This person is not involved in any substantial compliance reviews of the county.

You advised our staff by telephone that the seminar will be held in California and the registration fee is \$895.00. You also advised our staff that the Department of Revenue would pay for all the travel and lodging expenses involved, and that your agency felt it was important for the member to attend the seminar.

#### **Question**

Is it permissible, under the state level conflict of interest laws, for a staff member of the Division of Property Valuation to receive a complimentary seminar registration from a county?

#### **Opinion**

K.S.A. 46-237(a) applies to your question. That subsection states:

No state officer or employee, candidate for state office or state officer elect shall accept, or agree to accept any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year from any one person known to have a special interest, under circumstances where such person knows or should know that a major purpose of the donor is to influence such person in the

(continued)



performance of their official duties or prospective official duties.

K.S.A. 46-228 in pertinent part defines "special interest" to mean:

... an interest of any person ... in the action or non-action of any state agency or state officer or employee upon any matter affecting such person. ...

In applying these sections to your question, we first note that the county would hold a "special interest" in the staff member, and as a general rule the staff member could not receive a gift in excess of \$40 from the county. However, this commission has consistently held that in situations where the state agency authorizes and is willing to pay for the costs of attending the seminar, and the seminar serves a valid state interest, the state is being benefitted rather than the individual employee.

Therefore, so long as your agency authorizes and is willing to pay for the trip, the staff member may accept the complimentary registration to attend the seminar.

#### Advisory Opinion No. 97-11

Written April 10, 1997, to Eric Hayashi, Executive Director, Kansas Arts Commission, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of March 28, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

#### Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as executive director of the Kansas Arts Commission. You advise us that when members of the commission serve as board members for organizations that apply for funding from the commission, the commissioners abstain from voting.

#### Question

When a member of the Kansas Arts Commission abstains from voting on awarding grants to organizations on which he or she serves as a board member, is the commissioner complying with the provisions of the state level conflict of interest laws?

#### Opinion

K.S.A. 46-233(a) applies to your situation. That subsection in pertinent part states:

No state officer or employee shall in the capacity as such officer or employee be substantially involved in the preparation of or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which such officer or employee is employed or in whose business such officer or employee or any member of such officer's or employee's immediate family has a substantial interest. ...

K.S.A. 46-229(d) defines "substantial interest" in part to mean:

If an individual or an individual's spouse holds the position of officer, director, associate, partner or proprietor

of any business, the individual has a substantial interest in that business, irrespective of the amount of compensation received by the individual or individual's spouse.

In applying these sections to your question, any commissioner that serves, or whose spouse serves, as a board member of an organization holds a "substantial interest" in that organization (see K.S.A. 46-229 for other situations in which a "substantial interest" is held). Therefore, the commissioner would be prohibited from voting on awarding grants to that organization. Thus, by abstaining from voting in these situations, the commissioner has complied with the state level conflict of interest laws.

In closing, we note that in these situations the commissioner must completely abstain from participating in the awarding of the grant and refrain from discussing, in any manner, the awarding of the grant with other commissioners.

#### Advisory Opinion No. 97-12

Written April 10, 1997, to Kurt Shobe, Osage City.

This opinion is in response to your letter of March 19, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

#### Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as an environmental geologist with the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. You advise us that you work with municipal solid waste landfills and hazardous landfills to assure these facilities are in compliance with Kansas regulations. You are responsible for review of groundwater monitoring systems, field work plans, sampling and analysis plans and statistical methods used to measure changes in the chemical composition of groundwater moving underneath the facilities. Your unit has a staff of seven geologists, each with a certain number of facilities for which he or she is a project manager.

You further advise us that you are contemplating the establishment of a consulting business in which you would assist facilities, or consultants hired by facilities, in designing and implementing the statistical methodology used to measure chemical composition changes in groundwater. This would consist of presenting seminars on the statistical options, design and implementation of the system and completion of status reports regarding statistical results.

It is conceivable that a facility that wants to contract with your private business may be assigned to you as the project manager. If such a situation were to arise, it would be possible for another staff geologist to act as the project manager to review the facility. In addition, all correspondence with the facility must be reviewed and approved by your unit leader and section chief.

#### Question

Is it permissible, under the state level conflict of interest laws, for a state employee to oversee a facility that contracts with the employee's private business?



**Opinion**

We have reviewed the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*) in their entirety, and two sections may apply to your question. K.S.A. 46-235 states:

No state officer or employee shall accept compensation for performance of official duties, other than that to which such person is entitled for such performance. No person shall pay or offer to pay any state officer or employee any compensation for performance of official duties, except a state officer or employee performing official duties in making payments to state officers and employees. The receipt of wages or salary from an individual's non-state employer during a period of service as a state officer or employee shall not be construed as compensation for performance of official duties.

K.S.A. 46-286(a) states:

No state officer or employee, in the officer's or employee's official capacity, shall participate directly in the licensure, inspection or administration or enforcement of any regulation of or in any contract with any outside organization with which the officer or employee holds a position.

In applying K.S.A. 46-235 to your question, if it is part of your official state duties to present seminars on the statistical methodology used by the facilities, then you would be prohibited from receiving any compensation from the facilities for doing these seminars during off-duty hours.

Whether or not K.S.A. 46-235 applies to your question, K.S.A. 46-286 would prohibit you from acting as the project manager for any facility that contracts with your private business. However, it would be permissible for a different environmental geologist to act as the project manager in such a situation. While it would be permissible for another staff member to act as project manager for any such facility, you could not, in any manner, participate in the oversight of the facility.

In closing, we do note that even if K.S.A. 46-235 does not apply, K.S.A. 46-238 would prohibit you from charging the facilities compensation substantially in excess of what other consultants would charge, and that K.S.A. 46-241 would prohibit you from using confidential information acquired in the course of your official state duties for personal economic gain.

**Advisory Opinion No. 97-13**

Written April 10, 1997, to Laura Johnson, Deputy Director, Department of Revenue, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of March 24, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

**Factual Statement**

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as the deputy director for the Division of Property Valuation within the Department of Revenue, and on behalf of staff members of your division. You advise us that

some employees of your agency teach appraisal and property tax courses as part of their official state duties. The employees want to take on additional teaching assignments, and would then be compensated by organizations other than the Department of Revenue.

**Question**

Is it permissible for a state employee, who as part of his or her official state duties teaches certain courses, to be compensated for teaching these courses during off-duty hours by organizations other than his or her own agency?

**Opinion**

K.S.A. 46-235 applies to your question. That section states:

No state officer or employee shall accept compensation for performance of official duties, other than that to which such person is entitled for such performance. No person shall pay or offer to pay any state officer or employee any compensation for performance of official duties, except a state officer or employee performing official duties in making payments to state officers and employees. The receipt of wages or salary from an individual's non-state employer during a period of service as a state officer or employee shall not be construed as compensation for performance of official duties.

K.S.A. 46-216 defines "compensation" as the following:

Any money, thing of value, or economic benefit conferred on, or received by, any person in return for services rendered, or to be rendered, by such person or another.

In applying these sections to your question, the employees would be prohibited from receiving "compensation" from anyone other than the Department of Revenue for the performance of their official state duties. Thus, since it is part of the employees' official state duties to teach these courses, they would be prohibited from receiving "compensation" for teaching the courses from anyone other than the state.

**Advisory Opinion No. 97-14**

Written April 10, 1997, to Kevin Steele, Employment Preparations Chief, Social and Rehabilitation Services, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of April 2, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

**Factual Statement**

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as the Employment Preparation Services Chief for the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS), and on behalf of an employee of your division. You advise us that your division has a program for cash assistance recipients to receive work experience. In this program, participants are assigned to various public and

private work sites to gain employment experience. SRS employment preparation services (EPS) assign the participants to the work sites. The public or private employers act as work site supervisors interviewing and helping in the selection process.

An EPS worker in your division is also a private business owner. He would like to make his business available as a work experience site for SRS clients. The EPS worker would not be involved with the SRS cases of the participants who may be assigned to the work site.

#### Question

Based on this factual statement, we understand you ask us the following questions:

1. Would it be permissible under the conflict of interest laws for SRS to develop a work site at the EPS worker's private business?
2. If a work site placement is permissible, would it also be permissible for the EPS worker to act as the work site supervisor in the interview and selection process?

#### Opinion

We have reviewed the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*) in their entirety, and two sections may apply to your questions. K.S.A. 46-233(a) in pertinent part states:

No state officer or employee shall in the capacity as such officer or employee be substantially involved in the preparation of or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which such officer or employee is employed or in whose business such officer or employee or any member of such officer's or employee's immediate family has a substantial interest.

K.S.A. 46-286(a) states:

No state officer or employee, in the officer's or employee's official capacity, shall participate directly in the licensure, inspection or administration or enforcement of any regulation of or in any contract with any outside organization with which the officer or employee holds a position.

These sections prohibit a state employee, in that capacity, from participating in the making of a contract with a private business in which he or she is employed or holds a "substantial interest," and from licensing, inspecting or regulating an organization in which he or she holds a position.

Therefore, while SRS could develop a work site at the EPS worker's private business, the EPS worker could not, as a state employee, participate at all in the development of the site. In addition, as a state employee he could not license, inspect or regulate his private business.

The EPS worker, as a private business person, could act as the work site supervisor so long as he was not involved, in any manner as a state employee, with the participants who were assigned to his work site. This prohibition would include all of his current and future SRS clients.

#### Advisory Opinion No. 97-15

Written April 10, 1997, to Charles A. Peckham, Atwood City Attorney, Atwood.

This opinion is in response to your letter of April 9, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the application of the local level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 75-4301a *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 75-4301a *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

#### Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion as the Atwood City Attorney. You advise us that as well as being the city attorney, you are a partner in a private law firm. The compensation you receive as city attorney is paid to you directly, and deposited in your personal account. The firm is reimbursed by you for any supplies you use for city business. You further advise us that your partner will become a member of the Atwood City Council. He has indicated he will not take part in any discussion or decision concerning the city attorney position, and will not be present in the room for any such discussion.

#### Question

Is it permissible for a member of the city council, who is a partner in a law firm with the city attorney who receives compensation for this position privately rather than through the firm, to discuss and vote on matters affecting the city attorney position?

#### Opinion

K.S.A. 75-4304(a) might apply to your question. That subsection states:

No local governmental officer or employee shall, in the capacity of such an officer or employee, make or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which the officer or employee is employed or in whose business the officer or employee has a substantial interest.

In applying this subsection to your question, the city council member could not participate in the making of a contract with any "person" or "business" in which he holds a "substantial interest." Therefore, the council member could not, as a local governmental official, participate in the making of contracts between the city and the law firm. However, the situation you describe would be a contract between the city and you, rather than between the city and the partnership. Thus, the council member could participate in discussions and votes affecting your position as city attorney.

In closing, we note that while not legally required, the council member's abstention in discussions affecting your position as city attorney eliminates any appearance of impropriety.

## Article 1.—ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

**10B-1-1. Eligibility.** (a) (1) "Commission" means Kansas state employees health care commission.

(2) "Health care benefit program" means the state of Kansas health care benefits program established by the commission.

(b) Subject to the provisions of subsection (c), the classes of persons eligible to participate as active participants in the health care benefits program shall be those classes of persons listed below:

(1) Any elected official of the state;

(2) any other officer or employee of a state agency who is:

(A) working in one or more positions which together require at least 1,000 hours of work per year; and

(B) in a position that is not temporary. An employee who works under employment customs at any regents institution requiring less than a full calendar year of service shall not be considered temporary;

(3) any person engaged in a postgraduate residency training program in medicine at the university of Kansas medical center, but not including student employees of a state institution of higher learning;

(4) any person elected to a board position which requires less than 1,000 hours of work per year;

(5) any person serving with the foster grandparent program;

(6) persons participating under reduced service agreements outlined in K.S.A. 76-746; and

(7) any other class of individuals approved by the Kansas state employees health care commission, within the limitations set out in K.S.A. 75-6501, *et seq.*

(c) (1) Each person who is within a class listed in paragraphs (1), (2), (3), (4), or (5) of subsection (b) shall become eligible for group health insurance coverage following completion of a 60-day waiting period beginning with the first day of work for the state of Kansas. Each person shall have 31 days after becoming eligible to elect health insurance coverage.

(2) The waiting period established in paragraph (c)(1) shall not apply under the following circumstances:

(A) the person is returning to work for the state of Kansas;

(B) the person was enrolled in group health insurance in the prior position; and

(C) the break in service between the prior position and the new position:

(i) is 30 calendar days or less; or

(ii) is 365 days or less, if the person was laid off, as defined under K.S.A. 75-2948, on or after January 1, 1996.

(3) The waiting period established in paragraph (c)(1) may be waived when the agency head, or the agency head's designee meets the following requirements.

(A) The agency head or designee shall certify to the commission, or its designee, in writing that:

(i) A potential new employee is not entitled to continuation of health benefits available from prior insurance coverage; and

(ii) the waiting period poses, or will pose, an obstacle to recruitment.

(B) The agency head or designee shall submit the request for waiver prior to the employee's acceptance of the position.

(4) The waiting period described in paragraph (c)(1) may be waived by the commission under extraordinary circumstances.

(d) Subject to the provisions of subsection (e), the classes of persons eligible to participate as members of the health care benefits program on a direct bill basis shall be those classes of persons listed below:

(1) any former elected state official;

(2) any retired state officer or employee who is receiving retirement benefits under K.S.A. 74-4925;

(3) any totally disabled former state officer or employee who is receiving benefits under K.S.A. 74-4927;

(4) any surviving spouse or dependent of a qualifying participant in the health care benefits program;

(5) any person who is in a class listed in paragraph (b)(1), (2), (3), (4), or (5) and who is lawfully on leave without pay; and

(6) any blind person licensed to operate a vending facility as defined in K.S.A. 75-3338.

(e) Each person who is within a class listed in paragraphs (1), (4), or (5) of subsection (d) shall be eligible to participate on a direct bill basis only if:

(1) (A) the person was covered as an active participant under subsection (b) immediately before the date such person ceased to be eligible for such coverage; or

(B) the person is the surviving spouse or dependent of a person who was enrolled as a plan participant under subsection (b) or (d) immediately before the date of death of the plan participant; and

(2) the person files a statement of election with the secretary of administration to continue coverage under the plan. The election to continue coverage shall be submitted on a form in a manner and at a time prescribed by the secretary of administration.

(f) Subject to the provisions thereof, any individual with rights to extend coverage under provisions of public law 99-272 as amended may participate in the health care benefits program.

(g) Any person enrolled in the health care benefits program under subsection (b) or (d) may enroll a spouse and eligible dependent children subject to the same conditions and limitations that apply to the person enrolled under subsections (b) and (d). TREATMENT OF OBESITY

**100-23-1. Short term treatment of obesity.** Amphetamines and sympathomimetic amines listed on schedule III and IV under the Uniform Controlled Substances Act shall not be dispensed or prescribed for the short-term treatment of obesity, except in conformity with the following minimal requirements. (a) The treating physician shall take a complete history of the patient and shall give a complete physical examination. The physical examination shall include checking the blood pressure and pulse, examining the heart and lungs, recording weight and height, and administering any other appropriate diagnostic tests. The history and examination shall be sufficient to determine if the patient has previously been drug dependent, to determine if the cause of the obesity is one that indicates the drugs are inappropriate and to determine if other contraindications to use of the drugs exist. The treating physician shall enter each of those findings in the patient's record.

(b) The treating physician shall prescribe a diet for weight loss and record the diet on the patient record.

(c) The treating physician shall prescribe a daily dosage that does not exceed the dosage recommended in the manufacturer's prescribing information for the drug prescribed or dispensed.

(d) The treating physician shall not dispense or prescribe more than a 30-day supply for a patient on the first visit. Thereafter, not more than a 30-day supply shall be dispensed or prescribed at the time of each visit. The patient shall be weighed at each visit prior to dispensing or prescribing an additional supply of the drug and the weight shall be entered in the patient's record. If the patient is found not to have achieved a significant weight loss since the last patient visit, the treating physician shall not prescribe or dispense any additional drug for that patient.

(e) At the time of each return patient visit, the treating physician shall monitor progress of the patient. The patient's weight, blood pressure, pulse, heart, and lungs shall be checked. The findings shall be entered in the patient's record.

(f) Except as otherwise provided by this regulation, Schedule III or IV amphetamines or sympathomimetic amines shall not be dispensed or prescribed for a patient for obesity for a period longer than 90 days. However, the treating physician may extend therapy beyond 90 days under the following conditions:

(1) when amphetamines or sympathomimetic amines are indicated for treatment of diseases other than obesity; and

(2) when in the physician's professional judgement, the treating physician is observing and recording significant progress or benefit from the drugs and no adverse effects occur that are related to the treatment. These observations shall be documented in the patient's record.

(g) The treating physician may prescribe or dispense dexfenfluramine hydrochloride for a patient for treat-

ment of obesity for a period of 360 days in a two-year period. Any such dispensing or prescription order shall comply with the indications and usage instructions and the dosage and administration instructions as stated in the manufacturer's package insert, as approved by the federal drug administration and as in effect October 24, 1996, which is hereby adopted by reference. ## HOUSE BILL No. 2329

AN ACT concerning the changing of the domicile of foreign insurance companies.

*Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:*

Section 1. (a) An insurer organized under the laws of any other state and admitted to do business in this state for the purpose of writing insurance may become a domestic insurer by complying with all of the requirements of law relative to the organization and licensing of a domestic insurer of the same type and by designating the insurer's principal place of business at a place in this state. The domestic insurer will be entitled to like certificates and licenses to transact business in this state, and shall be subject to the authority and jurisdiction of this state.

(b) A domestic insurer, upon the approval of the commissioner of insurance, may transfer the insurer's domicile to any other state in which it is admitted to transact the business of insurance, and upon such a transfer shall cease to be a domestic insurer, and shall be admitted to this state if qualified as a foreign insurer. The commissioner of insurance shall approve the proposed transfer unless the commissioner determines the transfer is not in the interest of the policyholders of this state.

(c) The certificate of authority, agents' appointments and licenses, rates and other items which the commissioner allows, in the commissioner's discretion, that are in existence at the time an insurer licensed to transact the business of insurance in this state transfers the insurer's corporate domicile to this or any other state by merger, consolidation or any other lawful method shall continue in full force and effect upon transfer if the insurer remains duly qualified to transact the business of insurance in this state. All outstanding policies of a transferring insurer shall remain in full force and effect and need not be endorsed as to the new name of the company or the company's new location unless so ordered by the commissioner. A transferring insurer shall file new policy forms with the commissioner on or before the effective date of the transfer, but may use existing policy forms with appropriate endorsements if allowed by, and under such conditions as approved by, the commissioner. However, every transferring insurer shall notify the commissioner of the details of the proposed transfer and shall file promptly any resulting amendments to corporate documents filed or required to be filed with the commissioner.

(d) The commissioner may promulgate rules and regulations to carry out the purposes of this act.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

(b) The director of accounts and reports shall secure prior to the payment of any amount to any claimant, other than amounts authorized to be paid pursuant to section 2 as motor-vehicle fuel tax refunds or as transactions between state agencies as provided by this act, a written release and satisfaction of all claims and rights against the state of Kansas and any agencies, officers and employees of the state of Kansas regarding their respective claims.

Sec. 21. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.
