Request for Proposals

The Kansas Council on Developmental Disabilities (KCDD) is again announcing the availability, pending Congressional action, of developmental disabilities funding totaling \$384,000 to be distributed by state plan activities. Approximate funding amounts available for each competition are listed in the parentheses following the program. Unless indicated, only one grant will be funded.

- I. For state plan goal activities focusing on community living in the following area: Self-Directed Care (\$20,000).
- II. For state plan goal activities which focus on health in the following area: Accessing Medical and Dental Care in Kansas (\$15,000).
- III. For state plan goal activities which focus on employment in the following areas: Small Business Initiative (five projects of up to \$20,000 each); and Social Security Work Incentives (two projects of up to \$7,000 each).
- IV. For state plan goal activities which focus on housing in the following area: Rural Housing Initiatives (three projects of up to \$25,000 each).

General Requirements

Eligible Applicants: State, public, private profit or nonprofit organizations, institutions or agencies.

Project Duration: Except where noted, the projected duration for these projects is one year, beginning October 1, 1997 and ending September 30, 1998.

Council Share of the Project Cost: The maximum council contribution cannot exceed 75 percent of the annual project budget.

Matching Requirement: Successful applicants must contribute at least 25 percent or one-fourth of the actual annual project budget.

Evaluation and Selection

Complete applications will be given a project number, analyzed by a review committee and evaluated based on the following content: narrative, methodology, budget, qualifications of the applicant, and adherence to specific criteria included in the application. Additionally, applicants should be aware that the council and review committee will note whether the application addresses the needs of diverse populations and/or rural Kansans with developmental disabilities.

Grant project awards will depend upon the availability of federal developmental disability funding. Final decisions for grant project awards will be made by the KCDD.

Deadline

Completed applications will be accepted at the KCDD office until 5 p.m. Friday, August 22. No handwritten, faxed or single-spaced documents will be accepted. Completed applications received after the deadline will not be considered nor returned. Applicants will be notified of the KCDD decision by September 19.

Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-60. Quik Trip retailer incentive bonus; all games. (a) Quik Trip lottery retailers in the Kansas City region (chain 1061) certified to sell instant and/or on-line lottery tickets on or before June 9, 1996, through June 15, 1996, are eligible to participate in this Quik Trip retailer incentive bonus program.

(b) Any of the 20 participating Quik Trip retailer locations increasing its total sales by 10 percent or more over the one week period set forth in subsection (a), during the selling period starting June 15, 1997, and ending June 21, 1997, will be entitled to a retailer incentive night at Sandstone. This includes food, soft drink, and two concert tickets. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-7-3-97, June 13, 1997.)

111-2-62. Outstanding sales achievement awards. (a) Beginning with the calendar year starting January 1, and ending December 31, each year the 10 Kansas lottery retailer locations with the highest total lottery ticket sales shall become a member of the "Director's Club." Following the end of each calendar year, qualifying members shall receive the following:

(1) A framed certificate or plaque recognizing the retailer as a member of the "Director's Club."

(2) Lottery promotional watches for employees at the retailer location, up to a maximum of 20 per location.

(3) The retailer will be featured in an issue of the lottery's retailer publication.

(b) All lottery retailer locations in Kansas are eligible for membership in the "Director's Club" on an annual basis which entitles the retailer location and employees to the above awards. Article 4.—INDIVIDUAL GAME RULES
RULES FOR INSTANT GAME NO. 90
"PRAIRIE GOLD"

111-4-1038. Name of game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Prairie Gold" commencing on or after June 15, 1997. The specific rules for the "Prairie Gold" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-1038 through 111-4-1041. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-7-3-97, June 13, 1997.)

111-4-1039. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Prairie Gold" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink in 15 point WGI font with matching captions in WGI Cap font. A game symbol appears in each of the six play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: FREE - \$2.00 - \$5.00 - \$10.00 - 20.00 - \$2500 - \$5000 - symbol of wheat.

(b) "Game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The game symbol caption associated with each game symbol is as follows:

\$2.00	TWO\$
\$5.00	FIVE\$
10.00	TEN\$
20.00	TWENTY

(c) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is an 11-digit number which appears on the front of each instant ticket and is covered by latex.

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and

end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the back of each instant game ticket both above the information form and below the bar code.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three letter code printed and appearing in three of six varying locations among the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: FRE = FREE TICKET, TWO = \$2.00; FOR = \$4.00; FIV = \$5.00; TEN = \$10.00; TWY = \$20.00; FRY = \$40.00.

(f) "Bar code" means the 16-digit bar-coded number appearing on the back of each ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-7-3-97, June 13, 1997.)

111-4-1040. Determination of instant prize winners. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal six prize amounts. If three like prize amounts are identical, the player wins that prize amount. If two identical prize amounts and a wheat symbol appear, the player wins double that prize amount. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710(b), (c) and (i); implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710(b), (c) and (i), and K.S.A. 74-8720(b) and (d); effective, T-111-7-3-97, June 13, 1997.)

111-4-1041. Number and value of instant prizes. (a) There will be approximately 1,800,000 tickets ordered for this instant game. The expected number and value of the instant prizes are as follows:

Article 16.—TRAVEL REIMBURSEMENT

1-16-2a. Relocation assistance. (a) The provisions of this regulation shall apply only to employees who are transferred to a new official station that is more than 25 miles from the old station and to new employees who are recruited under the provisions of 1997 SB 104, § 1. However, no subsistence allowance shall be paid under this regulation for expenses incurred within 30 miles of the official station at the time of travel.

(b) For purposes of searching for a new residence, in the 30-day period preceding an employee's transfer or the employee's original appointment date, the employee may be allowed subsistence reimbursement for not more than 15 calendar days at the current prevailing subsistence rates and private car mileage reimbursement for not more than one round trip from the employee's domicile.

(c) To the extent considered necessary and appropriate by the appointing agency head, the agency may pay all or part of the following relocation expenses:

(1) Subsistence expenses for the employee while en route between the old and new official station or, for an employee recruited under 1997 SB 104, § 1, while en route between the old domicile and new domicile; and

(2) a mileage allowance at the rate provided to reimburse state employees for the use of a privately owned conveyance for transporting the employee's immediate family from the old domicile to the new official station. However, such expenses may be allowed for only one one-way trip in connection with each change of official station and domicile of the employee, and for transfers, only in cases in which the new station is over 25 miles from the old station.

(d) On and after the date of the employee's transfer or original appointment, subsistence expenses of the employee may be paid for a period of 30 days while the employee is occupying temporary quarters and trying to locate or waiting to enter a permanent residence. Subsistence expense payments to the employee may be extended for additional 30-day periods when deemed necessary by the agency head, with approval of the secretary of administration, while the employee's residence is in temporary quarters. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-3203, 75-3207, and 1997 SB 104, § 1; effective May 1, 1979; amended, T-1-4-26-93, April 26, 1993; amended July 12, 1993; amended, T-1-7-1-97, July 1, 1997; amended Aug. 8, 1997.)

1-16-2b. Moving expenses. (a) The provisions of this regulation shall apply only when a permanent employee transfers within a state agency or from one agency to another for the convenience or benefit of the employing agency and the official station is more than 25 miles from the old official station, or when an employee has been recruited under the provisions of 1997 SB 104, § 1.

(b) The head of the employing agency may pay reasonable moving expenses to a commercial carrier or may

reimburse the employee as authorized by this regulation, in an amount not to exceed the actual expenses.

(1) The employee may be reimbursed or a commercial carrier may be paid for the expenses of transporting, packing, crating, temporarily storing, draying, unpacking, and obtaining transit insurance for up to 12,000 pounds net weight of household goods and personal effects, excluding any cost for disassembling yard toys, patio equipment window air conditioners, and shelving.

(2) When an employee transports a house trailer or mobile dwelling for use as a residence and the employee otherwise would be entitled to transportation of household goods and personal effects under paragraph (1) of this subsection, the head of the employment agency may pay for the following expenses:

(A) A mileage allowance at the rate provided to reimburse state employees for the use of a privately owned conveyance, including the payment of necessary tolls, charges, and permit fees, if the trailer or dwelling is transported by the employee; or

(B) commercial transportation of the house trailer or mobile dwelling, at agency expense or through reimbursement to the employee, including the payment of necessary tolls, charges, and permit fees, if the trailer or dwelling is not transported by the employee. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-3706 and 1997 SB 104, § 1; effective May 1, 1979; amended May 1, 1981; amended, T-1-4-26-93, April 26, 1993; amended July 12, 1993; amended, T-1-7-1-97, July 1, 1997; amended Aug. 8, 1997.)

1-16-2d. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-3207, 75-3219 and 75-3224; effective May 1, 1979; amended, T-1-4-26-93, April 26, 1993; amended July 12, 1993; revoked, T-1-7-1-97, July 1, 1997; revoked Aug. 8, 1997.)

1-16-2e. Bidding required. (a) Moving expenses that may be paid pursuant to K.A.R. 1-16-2b(a) shall not exceed the total cost of moving a comparable household of 12,000 pounds of household furnishings and personal effects by commercial carrier at the tariff rates filed with and approved by the state corporation commission.

(b) Each employee who is eligible for moving expenses shall attempt to obtain three firm rate bids from commercial carriers and shall be responsible for selection of the lowest responsible carrier. Any contractual arrangement shall be between the state employee and the commercial carrier.

(c) The firm rate bid shall include costs of the following services:

- (1) transportation;
- (2) material and labor for packing and unpacking barrels, drums and cartons;
- (3) appliance service;
- (4) piano pick-up and delivery; and
- (5) transit insurance. (Authorized by and implementing 1997 SB 104, § 1; effective May 1, 1979; amended, T-85-46, Dec. 19, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended, T-1-7-1-97, July 1, 1997; amended Aug. 8, 1997.)

1-16-18. Subsistence allowance; rates. (a) General provisions.

(1) Except as otherwise specifically provided by law, subsistence allowances for in-state and out-of-state travel

shall be paid on the basis of a quarter-day rate for meal expenses and the actual cost of lodging expenses incurred, within the lodging expense limits set forth in this regulation. The subsistence rates for meal expenses shall be paid on a per diem basis at the appropriate rate for any fraction of a quarter-day in which the official travel begins and for each full quarter-day thereafter. For purposes of this regulation, a day shall commence at 12:01 a.m. No quarter-day allowance shall be paid for any fractional quarter-day in which the traveler returns to the traveler's official station or domicile. As used in this regulation, "international travel" means travel outside the 50 states and the District of Columbia.

(2) Reimbursement for lodging, or direct payment of lodging expenses to the lodging establishment, shall be made on the basis of actual single-rate lodging expenses incurred, including taxes, and shall be supported by the original official receipt of the lodging place or other suitable documentation. Reimbursement for lodging expenses, or direct payment of lodging expenses to the lodging establishment, shall be limited to the lodging place's lowest available rate for normal single occupancy on the day or days the lodging expense was incurred.

(3) Subject to the approval of the secretary of administration, any city in a state bordering or near Kansas may be designated as a "border city" by the director of accounts and reports. For travel by state personnel to a border city, all meals allowances and lodging expense limitations shall be applied at the appropriate in-state rate.

(b) Meals allowance. The quarter-day meals allowance shall be as follows:

(1) In-state	\$6.50
(2) In-state high cost	\$7.00
(3) Out-of-state	\$7.00
(4) Designated high-cost geographic area— out-of-state	\$7.50
(5) Borough of Manhattan and the District of Columbia	\$10.00
(6) International travel	\$10.00

An exception to the quarter-day meal allowance for international travel may be made at the option of each agency by claiming actual expenses, subject to a daily limitation of \$72 for meals.

(c) Lodging expense limitations. The lodging expense limitations shall be as follows:

(1) In-state, exclusive of designated high-cost geographic areas	\$ 52.00
(2) In-state, designated high cost geographic areas	\$ 65.00
(3) Out-of-state, exclusive of designated high-cost geographic areas	\$ 78.00
(4) Out-of-state, designated high-cost geographic areas	\$113.00
(5) Borough of Manhattan and the District of Columbia	\$124.00
(6) International travel	actual

Specific exceptions to the dollar limitation on lodging expenses may be made pursuant to provisions in K.S.A. 75-3207a and its amendments.

(d) If the cost of meals is included within the cost of registration fees or other fees and charges paid by the agency or supplied without cost by another party, the meal expenses shall be reduced as follows:

Article 18.—MAXIMUM ALLOWANCE FOR MILEAGE FOR USE OF A PRIVATELY OWNED CONVEYANCE FOR PUBLIC PURPOSES

1-18-1a. Mileage rates. (a) Subject to the provisions of subsection (d), each employee who has been authorized to use a privately owned conveyance to engage in official business for an agency shall be entitled to reimbursement for use of that conveyance at the following rates:

- (1) 15¢ per mile for the use of a privately owned motorcycle;
- (2) 31¢ per mile for the use of a privately owned automobile;
- (3) 43¢ per mile for the use of a privately owned airplane; or
- (4) 43¢ per mile for the use of a specially equipped vehicle for the physically handicapped.

(b) In addition to the mileage allowance authorized under subsection (a) of this regulation, the employee may be reimbursed for the following expenses:

- (1) parking fees when on an official trip;
- (2) toll road and toll bridge costs; and
- (3) airplane landing and tie-down fees.

(c) When an employee travels by privately owned airplane, reimbursement may be made for one round trip in a privately owned automobile or for a taxi fare charged in travel under these conditions:

- (1) between the official station or domicile and the airport in the city in which the official station or domicile is located; and

(2) between the airport in the destination city and the place of official business.

(d) Exceptions to the mileage rates prescribed in subsection (a) shall be as follows.

(1) When a mode of transportation is available and is less costly than transportation by privately owned conveyance, mileage payments for use of a privately owned conveyance shall be limited to the cost of that other mode of transportation.

(2) An agency may pay a specified mileage rate that is lower than prescribed by subsection (a) when an employee's travel is not required by the agency and the employee is informed of the specified rate in advance of the travel.

(3) For employees of the state of Kansas only, any state employee choosing to use a privately owned automobile when a state-owned or leased vehicle, as defined by K.A.R. 1-17-1, is available for use shall be reimbursed at the central motor pool rate for compact cars, except under the following conditions:

(A) The employee's agency head or the agency head's designee determines that the use of a state-owned or leased vehicle would be more expensive than the use of the employee's privately owned automobile.

(B) The employee has a disability that requires the use of a privately owned vehicle that is specially equipped. Advisory Opinion No. 97-20

Written July 8, 1997, to Michael B. Rees, Chief Counsel, Kansas Department of Transportation, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of June 23, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215

et seq., and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as chief counsel for the Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT). You advise us that in light of House Bill 2064, which became law on July 1, 1997, several ethics questions have arisen in your agency.

Question

Based on House Bill 2064, you ask the commission a series of questions that will be answered individually.

Opinion

We first note that House Bill 2064, which became law on July 1, 1997, applies to all classified employees and those unclassified employees whose salary is subject to approval by the Governor, and all members of boards, commissions and authorities of the executive branch. Those unclassified employees whose salaries are not subject to approval by the Governor fall under the provisions of K.S.A. 46-237. The first part of this opinion will apply House Bill 2064 to your questions, and the second part will address the application of K.S.A. 46-237.

House Bill 2064, Section 4, states in pertinent part:

... (b) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept any gift, economic opportunity, loan, gratuity, special discount or service provided because of such person's official position, except:

- (1) A gift having an aggregate value of less than \$40 given at a ceremony or public function where the person is accepting the gift in such person's official capacity; or
- (2) gifts from relatives or gifts from personal friends when it is obvious to the person that the gift is not being given because of the person's official position; or
- (3) anything of value received by the person on behalf of the state that inures to the benefit of the state or that becomes the property of the state; or
- (4) contributions solicited on behalf of a nonprofit organization which is exempt from taxation under paragraph (3) of subsection (c) of section 501 of the internal revenue code of 1986, as amended.

(c) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept free or special discount meals from a source outside of state government, except:

- (1) Meals, the provision of which is motivated by a personal or family relationship or provided at events that are widely attended. An occasion is "widely attended" when it is obvious to the person accepting the meal that the reason for providing the meal is not a pretext for exclusive or nearly exclusive access to the person;
- (2) meals provided at public events in which the person is attending in an official capacity;
- (3) meals provided to a person subject to this act when it is obvious such meals are not being provided because of the person's official position; and
- (4) food such as soft drinks, coffee or snack foods not offered as part of a meal.

(d) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept free or special discount travel or related expenses from a source outside state government, except:

(1) When it is obvious to the person accepting the same that the free or special discount travel and related expenses are not being provided because of the person's official position; or

(2) when the person's presence at a meeting, seminar or event serves a legitimate state purpose or interest and the person's agency authorizes or would authorize payment for such travel and expenses.

(e) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept free or special discount tickets or access to entertainment or sporting events or activities such as plays, concerts, games, golf, exclusive swimming, hunting or fishing or other recreational activities when the free or special discount tickets or access are provided because of the person's official position. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to persons whose official position requires or obliges them to be present at such events or activities.

1. Is a can of popcorn received at Christmas a gift or snack food? Does it make any difference if the can is opened in the office for all to share?

Popcorn received at Christmas in a modest amount is considered a snack food. Snack foods are exempt under subsection (c) (4). However, popcorn given in a larger amount could be, under certain circumstances, considered a gift unless one of the exceptions in subsection (b) applies.

It may make a difference on whether the popcorn can is opened at the office because it may have a bearing on whether it is a modest amount.

2. At Christmas, certain offices receive a substantial number of gift packages from organizations under contract with the state. These items are often foodstuffs. The package is addressed to the office head but are uniformly shared with the office. Is the acceptance of these items prohibited?

The question of the employee accepting foodstuffs can be answered the same as question number one above. Those items that are not foodstuffs could not be accepted by the employee unless one of the exceptions in subsection (b) applies. We cannot answer the question of whether or not these gifts that are shared with everyone in the agency "inure to the benefit of the state" without further factual information.

3. Can people at Thacher, a leased facility housing KDOT employees, receive their annual Christmas apple from the landlord?

The answer to this question is the same as question number one set out above.

4. Can employees receive a calendar from the firm with the deferred compensation contract for the state?

Unless one of the exceptions in subsection (b) applies, employees could not receive this type of gift.

5. If an employee attends a seminar, can he or she accept a complimentary package containing small items at the time of registration? The employees are informed that the package is at no cost, having been covered by the registration fee.

If the registration fee covered the costs of the items, then the receipt of the package is not truly a "gift" and, therefore, could be accepted by the employees.

(continued)

6. Can employees accept inconsequential items such as pens, mouse pads, key chains and coffee cups from a vendor that are passed out at trade shows?

Subsection (b) prohibits the acceptance of gifts by a state employee "provided because of such person's official position." Thus, the answer to your question depends upon the audience at the trade show, and the purpose of the vendor in giving the items. If the trade show is only for state employees who are in a position to make contracts on behalf of the state, then the gifts could not be accepted. This would also be true if the items were given because the vendor knew the person was a state employee and that the employee was in a position to benefit the vendor. If the trade show is open to the public, and the items are distributed randomly, or not just given to the state employee because of his or her official position, the employee could receive these types of items.

7. Can employees accept gifts such as t-shirts, coffee cups or small amounts of money provided by vendors for completing surveys or performing informal evaluations of their products?

These types of gifts are being provided to the state employee "because of such person's official position," and thus could not be accepted. We also note that under K.S.A. 46-235, state employees may not receive any compensation from any source other than the state for performance of their state duties.

8. Does the \$40 gift limit apply to gifts? One sentence says that state employees cannot accept anything, and the other says they can accept up to \$40 if done as part of state duties.

As a general rule, state employees subject to the provisions of House Bill 2064 cannot accept gifts of any value. However, under subsection (b) (1), they may accept gifts under \$40 given at a ceremony or public function and accepted in the capacity as a state employee.

9. Can an employee accept a government discount on motel/hotel rates? Does the same rule apply to an employee traveling on other than state business?

Subsection (d) (1) allows state employees to accept free or discounted travel and related expenses when such items are not being provided because of the person's official position. The commission believes that because the rate applies to all governmental officials, and is not given to any one particular state employee because of his or her position, that state employees may accept discounted motel/hotel rates. In answer to your second question, so long as the employee is not receiving the discounted rate because of his or her official position, the employee could receive a discounted rate even while not on state business.

10. Can an employee who is involved in the oversight of a construction contract, although not a party to the making of the contract, travel at no cost in a construction company's vehicle to study, review or observe a construction project or material usage?

Under subsection (d) (2), so long as the employee's presence served a legitimate state purpose, and the employee's agency authorized or would have authorized payment for such travel and expenses, the employee could accept the travel and all related expenses.

11. Can an employee accept or be reimbursed by an association for travel, registration and lodging when at-

tending an industry meeting to make a presentation or view products used by the agency or its contractors?

Under subsection (d) (2), so long as the employee's presence at the meeting serves a legitimate state service, and the employee's agency authorized or would have authorized payment for such travel and expenses, the employee could accept the travel and all related expenses for attending the meeting.

12. In the subsections on "gifts" and "travel," the exceptions to the restrictions were all "or" phrases. In the section on "meals," "and" is used to link the exceptions. Does this difference in wording affect the application of these sections?

In the commission's opinion, given the language of subsections (c) (3) and (c) (4), the "and" could have been drafted as either an "and" or an "or" and does not change the application of these subsections.

We note that K.S.A. 46-237 applies to unclassified employees whose salaries are not subject to approval by the Governor. The provisions of K.S.A. 46-237 are different that the provisions of House Bill 2064. K.S.A. 46-237 in pertinent part states:

(a) No state officer or employee . . . shall accept, or agree to accept any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year from any one person known to have a special interest, under circumstances where such person knows or should know that a major purpose of the donor is to influence such person in the performance of their official duties or prospective official duties.

(d) Hospitality in the form of recreation, food and beverages are presumed not to be given to influence a state officer or employee . . . in the performance of such officer's or employee's official duties or prospective official duties.

K.A.R. 19-40-3a (c) provides:

Hospitality. "Hospitality in the form of recreation, food and beverage" means the provision of recreation and consumption of food and beverage in the company of the donor or the donor's authorized agent. The provision of recreation, food and beverage in any other manner constitutes a gift.

K.S.A. 46-228 defines "special interest" in pertinent part as:

. . . an interest of any person . . . in the action or non-action of any state agency or state officer or employee upon any matter affecting such person. . . .

Turning to your questions, for those employees subject to K.S.A. 46-237, they may not accept a gift in excess of \$40 from anyone with a "special interest." They may accept free or discounted meals without any monetary limitation so long as the meal is provided and consumed in the presence of the donor. If the meal is not provided and consumed in the presence of the donor, then the \$40 gift limitation applies. The answers given above concerning travel by state employees are also applicable under K.S.A. 46-237.

In closing, we note that House Bill 2064 and K.S.A. 46-237 create two different gift and meal limitations, and that this difference will create some confusion. We

suggest that whenever possible, employees contact the commission for guidance prior to accepting a gift or meal. In addition, given the penalties involved for violations of either of these laws, we suggest that if guidance is needed, but cannot be sought before the gift or meal is offered, that the employee decline acceptance.

Advisory Opinion No. 97-21

Written July 8, 1997, to Alice A. Devine, Secretary, Department of Agriculture, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of June 19, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as the secretary for the Kansas Department of Agriculture. You advise us that in light of House Bill 2064, which became law on July 1, 1997, staff of your agency has several ethics questions that they are confronted with during routine work assignments.

Question

You ask the commission a series of questions that will be answered individually below.

Opinion

We first note that House Bill 2064, which became law on July 1, 1997, applies to all classified employees and those unclassified employees whose salary is subject to approval by the Governor, and all members of boards, commissions and authorities of the executive branch. Those unclassified employees whose salaries are not subject to approval by the Governor fall under the provisions of K.S.A. 46-237. The first part of this opinion will apply House Bill 2064 to your questions, and the second part will address the application of K.S.A. 46-237.

House Bill 2064, Section 4, states in pertinent part:

... (b) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept any gift, economic opportunity, loan, gratuity, special discount or service provided because of such person's official position, except:

- (1) A gift having an aggregate value of less than \$40 given at a ceremony or public function where the person is accepting the gift in such person's official capacity; or
- (2) gifts from relatives or gifts from personal friends when it is obvious to the person that the gift is not being given because of the person's official position; or
- (3) anything of value received by the person on behalf of the state that inures to the benefit of the state or that becomes the property of the state; or
- (4) contributions solicited on behalf of a nonprofit organization which is exempt from taxation under para-

graph (3) of subsection (c) of section 501 of the internal revenue code of 1986, as amended.

(c) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept free or special discount meals from a source outside of state government, except:

(1) Meals, the provision of which is motivated by a personal or family relationship or provided at events that are widely attended. An occasion is 'widely attended' when it is obvious to the person accepting the meal that the reason for providing the meal is not a pretext for exclusive or nearly exclusive access to the person;

(2) meals provided at public events in which the person is attending in an official capacity;

(3) meals provided to a person subject to this act when it is obvious such meals are not being provided because of the person's official position; and

(4) food such as soft drinks, coffee or snack foods not offered as part of a meal.

(d) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept free or special discount travel or related expenses from a source outside state government, except:

(1) When it is obvious to the person accepting the same that the free or special discount travel and related expenses are not being provided because of the person's official position; or

(2) when the person's presence at a meeting, seminar or event serves a legitimate state purpose or interest and the person's agency authorizes or would authorize payment for such travel and expenses.

(e) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept free or special discount tickets or access to entertainment or sporting events or activities such as plays, concerts, games, golf, exclusive swimming, hunting or fishing or other recreational activities when the free or special discount tickets or access are provided because of the person's official position. The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to persons whose official position requires or obliges them to be present at such events or activities.

1. Can an employee receive a meal from a regulated industry representative at a weekend social event if that representative has become a personal friend?

Subsection (c) (1) permits state officers and employees to receive meals that are motivated by a personal relationship. Thus, if there truly exists a personal relationship and that relationship is the motivating factor, then the employee can accept the meal. K.A.R. 19-40-3a(a) sets out the factors to be looked at in determining whether a gift is being provided based on a personal relationship. We believe that regulation can also be applied to meals provided to those state officers and employees who fall under House Bill 2064.

2. Can employees accept transportation to meetings or conferences with someone from a regulated industry going to the same event?

Subsection (d) (2) allows a state employee to accept free or discount travel from sources outside of state government when the employee's presence at the conference serves a legitimate state purpose and the employee's agency authorizes or would authorize payment for such travel.

(continued)

3. Can an employee receive dollars from a vendor for returning a survey about an agency program? If so, may the dollars be deposited into the agency fund for program use?

Employees would be prohibited from personally receiving money for filling out a survey. However, the money could be accepted and used for agency programs. We do note that under K.S.A. 46-237(c), any person licensed, inspected or regulated by your agency could not give more than \$40 in a calendar year to your agency.

4. Can employees accept small items from an industry such as hats, pens or pads of paper?

Employees would be prohibited from receiving these types of gifts unless one of the exceptions as set out in subsection (b) applies. We suggest that any employee who is uncertain whether or not an exception applies, contact the commission before accepting any gift.

5. Can an employee who has been asked to give a speech or moderate a meeting accept travel to and from the event?

Subsection (d) (2) allows a state employee to receive travel and all related expenses when the employee's presence at the meeting, seminar or event serves a legitimate state purpose and the employee's agency authorizes or would authorize such payment.

6. Can employees accept complimentary registrations to conferences?

This question has been asked of the commission under K.S.A. 46-237. The commission has held that so long as the conference served a legitimate state purpose and the employee's agency would have authorized payment of the registration fee, then the gift was not received by the employee, but inured to the benefit of the state. We believe that subsection (b) (3) should apply to such situations, and thus the employee could receive the registration provided the conference serves a legitimate state purpose, and his or her agency would have authorized payment.

7. Can employees accept coffee, pop or other snack items from industries during meetings or inspection visits?

Subsection (c) (4) allows state employees to receive food such as soft drinks, coffee or snack foods not offered as part of a meal.

8. Can employees accept gifts such as tins of popcorn, trays of cookies or other food items?

Popcorn, trays of cookies or other food items received in a modest amount is considered a snack food. Snack foods are exempt under subsection (c) (4). However, popcorn, trays of cookies or other food items given in a larger amount could be, under certain circumstances, considered a gift unless one of the exceptions in subsection (b) applies.

9. Can an employee accept a complimentary banquet ticket to attend a particular function during a trade association or other industry event? If the employee is a guest speaker at the event, can he or she accept the ticket?

The commission cannot answer this question without more specific information such as the nature of the banquet and if the banquet is taking place during the initial

event when the ticket is given. We suggest that you write for an opinion on this question and provide greater factual detail in your request.

10. Can a consultant or contractor pay for a working meal, even if the employee deducts the meal as provided on his or her travel voucher?

Subsection (c) prohibits a state employee from receiving a free or discounted meal unless one of the exceptions set out in that subsection applies. Based on this question, it appears that none of the exceptions would apply, and the employee could not receive the free meal.

11. Is it acceptable for another governmental entity to pay for meals for a state employee during a working lunch? Can a state employee pay for the lunch of a government official and be reimbursed?

Subsection (c) applies only to free or discounted meals from sources outside of state government. Therefore, state employees may receive meals from other state governmental entities. The issue of a state employee paying for the working lunch of another state governmental official and being reimbursed is not covered by House Bill 2064 and is beyond the jurisdiction of the commission.

12. Can an employee accept refreshments during meeting breaks at sales seminars?

Subsection (c) (4) allows state employees to accept food such as soft drinks, coffee or snack foods not offered as part of a meal.

13. Can an employee accept payment for a meal from the board of an association if he or she has been asked to attend to provide information for the board?

Subsection (c) prohibits a state employee from receiving a free or discounted meal unless one of the exceptions set out in that subsection applies. The commission believes that the situation you describe is not "widely attended" nor is it a "public function." Thus the free meal could not be accepted.

14. When is it acceptable for an employee to accept a gift from a foreign visitor and what procedure should your agency follow to make the gift become state property?

The only time it is acceptable for a state employee subject to the provisions of House Bill 2064 to accept a gift from a foreign visitor is if one of the exceptions in subsection (b) applies. The procedures to determine when a gift becomes state property are not within the jurisdiction of this commission. We suggest you contact the Department of Administration or the Attorney General's Office for guidance.

15. Can equipment that is no longer usable or functional be donated to a private entity or individual?

This issue of donating state property to a private entity or individual is beyond the jurisdiction of the commission. We suggest that you contact the Department of Administration or the Attorney General's Office for guidance.

16. Can an employee receive travel expense from a national organization, which is in part funded by federal dollars, to be part of a research project or work team? Membership of the organization includes corporate organizations regulated by your agency.

The employee could receive the travel expense so long as the provisions of subsection (d) (2) applied.

17. Do the same ethics laws followed by state employees pertain to other cooperator employees of local government?

The state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*) apply only to state officers and employees as those terms are defined by K.S.A. 46-221. House Bill 2064, while part of the state level conflict of interest laws, has greater application. It applies to members of boards, commissions and authorities of the executive branch of state government, whether or not they are defined as state officers or employees. Local government officers and employees are subject to the provisions of the local level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 75-4301a *et seq.*), and would not be under the state level conflict of interest laws or House Bill 2064 unless they were also state employees or on a board, commission or authority of the executive branch of the state.

We note that K.S.A. 46-237 applies to unclassified employees whose salaries are not subject to approval by the Governor. The provisions of K.S.A. 46-237 are different than the provisions of House Bill 2064. K.S.A. 46-237 in pertinent part states:

(a) No state officer or employee . . . shall accept, or agree to accept any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year from any one person known to have a special interest, under circumstances where such person knows or should know that a major purpose of the donor is to influence such person in the performance of their official duties or prospective official duties.

(d) Hospitality in the form of recreation, food and beverages are presumed not to be given to influence a state officer or employee . . . in the performance of such officer's or employee's official duties or prospective official duties. . . .

K.A.R. 19-40-3a (c) provides:

Hospitality. "Hospitality in the form of recreation, food and beverage" means the provision of recreation and consumption of food and beverage in the company of the donor or the donor's authorized agent. The provision of recreation, food and beverage in any other manner constitutes a gift.

K.S.A. 46-228 defines "special interest" in pertinent part as:

. . . an interest of any person . . . in the action or non-action of any state agency or state officer or employee upon any matter affecting such person. . . .

Turning to your questions, for those employees subject to K.S.A. 46-237, they may not accept a gift in excess of \$40 from anyone with a "special interest." They may accept free or discounted meals without any monetary limitation so long as the meal is provided and consumed in the presence of the donor. If the meal is not provided and consumed in the presence of the donor, then the \$40 gift limitation applies. Under this statute, they may also accept gifts from foreign governments and nations under \$100; gifts in excess of this amount must be accepted on behalf of the state.

In closing, we note that House Bill 2064 and K.S.A. 46-237 create two different gift and meal limitations, and that this difference will create some confusion. We suggest that whenever possible, state officers and employees contact the commission for guidance prior to accepting a gift or meal. In addition, given the penalties involved for violations of either of these laws, we suggest that if guidance is needed, but cannot be sought before the gift or meal is offered, that the state officer or employee decline acceptance.
