**Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 1 p.m. Wednesday, November 5, in the office of the Director of Property Valuation, fourth floor, Docking State Office Building, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, to consider the adoption of new rules and regulations of the Secretary of Revenue necessary to establish the qualifications for the designation of registered mass appraiser.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments of the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Laura Johnson, Deputy Director of Property Valuation, 4th Floor, Docking State Office Building, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, 66612-1585.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Laura Johnson at (785) 296-4218. Handicapped parking is located in State Parking Lot No. 2, south of the Docking Building facing Harrison Street, and the north, south and east entrances to the Docking Building are accessible.

A summary of the proposed rules and regulations and their economic impact follows.

93-6-1. Prerequisites. A candidate for the registered mass appraisal designation shall be an eligible Kansas appraiser pursuant to K.S.A. 19-432 and amendments thereto. There is no economic impact.

93-6-2. Education requirements. Mandatory courses are prescribed and the source of elective courses is prescribed. There will be a one-time economic impact estimated between \$350 and \$1,805 per candidate. The economic impact will be borne by the candidate, except in those instances where the county elects to pay for the courses.

93-6-3. Continuing education requirements. Continuing education requirements are prescribed. There will be an annual economic impact estimated between \$380 and \$560 per candidate. The economic impact will be borne by the candidate, except in those instances where the county elects to pay for the courses.

93-6-4. Experience requirements. Experience requirements are prescribed. There is no economic impact.

93-6-5. Case study requirements. Two case studies are required. The economic impact to each candidate will be \$100 per case study. The economic impact will be borne by the candidate, except in those instances where the county elects to pay for the case study. The Kansas Department of Revenue estimates that it will incur a cost ranging from \$3,000 to \$10,000 for the development of each case study.

93-6-6. Reciprocity. Reciprocity requirements are prescribed. There is no economic impact.

Copies of the proposed regulations and the associated economic impact statements may be obtained from the Division of Property Valuation.

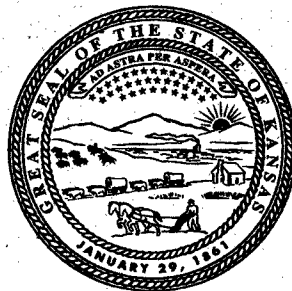

Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct

Advisory Opinion No. 97-36

Written August 12, 1997, to the Honorable Tom Sloan, State Representative, 45th District, Lawrence.

This opinion is in response to your letter of July 12, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a Kansas State Representative. In KCGSC Opinion No. 97-30, this commission denied your request that the commission waive the \$100 honorarium ceiling that legislators may receive for speaking engagements. In that opinion, you were invited to provide additional information to the commission on why you should receive more than this \$100, which you are doing in this opinion request.

You advise us that the \$400 honorarium offered by the School Librarian Media Specialists Summer Institute was not solicited by you, but was offered to another speaker who had to subsequently decline the invitation to speak. You further advise us that as a facilitator of organizations' strategic planning efforts, your fee schedule is \$500 per day for research and \$1,000 per day of actual facilitating. Therefore, you believe the \$400 honorarium is not unreasonable.

You state that your research took more than 10 hours, even with assistance of legislative staff. In addition, you spent several more hours to write and edit the text, develop notes on probable questions and compile a list of resource materials the participants might desire.

Question

Based on the information provided in this request, along with the information provided in KCGSC Opinion No. 97-30, is it permissible for you to accept the \$400 honorarium for delivering the keynote presentation for the School Librarian Media Specialists Summer Institute?

Opinion

K.S.A. 46-237(f) applies to your question. That subsection in pertinent part states:

No state officer or employee shall accept any payment of honoraria for any speaking engagement except that a member of the state legislature . . . shall be allowed to receive reimbursement in the preparation for and the making of a presentation at a speaking engagement in an amount fixed by the Kansas commission on governmental standards and conduct prior to the acceptance of the speaking engagement. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the reimbursement of state officers and employees for reasonable expenses incurred in attending seminars, conferences and other speaking engagements.

In KCGSC Opinion No. 91-21, the commission opined that the amount of honorarium that could be paid to a legislator for the preparation and presentation of materials at a speaking engagement would depend on the following factors: amount of preparation, complexity of issues, qualifications of the presenter and the extent of the presenter's participation in the event. The commission stated that it would ". . . presume a maximum of \$50 for preparation and a maximum of \$50 for presentation. . . ." Anyone seeking an additional amount ". . . will have to request a waiver."

Applying these factors to the information you provided in this request and in KCGSC Opinion No. 97-30, the commission believes that due to the amount of preparation required, the complexity of education issues and the extent of your participation as the keynote presenter, the Institute may pay you the \$400 honorarium for the presentation.

In closing, the commission notes that since you are providing a bona fide speaking service at the seminar, the Institute could pay for all of your reasonable travel expenses.

Advisory Opinion No. 97-37

Written August 12, 1997, to Neal Parrish, Butler County Commissioner, Augusta.

This opinion is in response to your letter of July 17, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the local level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 75-4301a *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 75-4301a *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a Butler County Commissioner. You advise us you also are an independent insurance agent. Several of your clients have business that comes before the county commission.

Question

Is it a conflict of interest for you to sell insurance to the following entities that may have business before the commission:

1. Unified school districts;
2. County townships;
3. Butler County Community College;
4. Cities located in the county;
5. County fire districts; and
6. Businesses that occupy county-owned buildings?

Opinion

K.S.A. 75-4304(a) applies to your questions. That subsection in pertinent part states:

No local governmental officer or employee shall, in the capacity of such as officer or employee, make or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which the officer or employee is employed or in whose business the officer or employee has a substantial interest.

K.S.A. 75-4301a in pertinent part defines "substantial interest" as the following:

(5) If an individual . . . receives compensation which is a portion or percentage of each separate fee or commission paid to a business or combination of businesses, the individual has a substantial interest in any client or customer who pays fees or commission to the business or combination of businesses from which fees or commissions the individual . . . received an aggregate of \$2,000 or more in the preceding calendar year. (See K.S.A. 75-4301a for other situations in which a "substantial interest" is held.)

We first note that K.S.A. 75-4304 does not prohibit you from selling insurance to entities that have business before the county commission, but does prohibit you, as a county commissioner, from making contracts between the county and any "person" or "business" in which you hold a "substantial interest."

This commission has consistently held that a local subdivision of government is not a "person" or "business." Thus, even if you received a fee or commission in excess of \$2,000 from a unified school district, county township, Butler County Community College, city or fire district, you would not be required to abstain from participating in the making of contracts on behalf of the county with these local subdivisions of government.

You would be required to abstain from participating as a county commissioner in the making of contracts between the county and any business, that is not a local subdivision of government, in which you hold a "substantial interest."

Advisory Opinion No. 97-38

Written August 12, 1997, to Janie Kelly, Attorney, Social and Rehabilitation Services, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of June 16, 1997, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule and regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as an attorney for Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS). You advise us that in light of House Bill 2064, which became law on July 1, 1997, several ethics questions have arisen in your agency.

Questions

1. Does HB 2064 prohibit "thank you" gifts such as candy, cookies, flowers or plants for services rendered? These gifts may be given by members of the public or employees in the agency.
2. Does HB 2064 prohibit holiday and special occasion gifts given by members of the public or employees in the agency?
3. How does HB 2064 affect luncheons with personal friends who are also state employees?

Opinion

Section 4 of House Bill 2064 in the 1997 Session Laws of Kansas Chapter 155 prohibits classified employees and unclassified employees whose salaries are subject to approval by the Governor from receiving gifts and free or discounted meals, travel or recreation except under certain circumstances.

In answer to your first two questions, gifts from members of the public may not be accepted unless one of the exceptions found in subsection (b) of that law applies. Food not offered as part of a meal, that is given in a modest amount, may be accepted (see subsection (c)(4)). Employee-to-employee gifts within an agency are permissible so long as the gift is not being given to influence his or her official duties.

Turning to your third question, subsection (c) prohibits the acceptance of free or discounted meals from a "source outside of state government." Thus, state employees are permitted to accept free or discounted meals given by other state employees.

K.S.A. 46-237 applies to unclassified employees whose salaries are not subject to approval by the Governor. Under that law, gifts over \$40 may not be accepted from anyone with a "special interest" as defined by K.S.A. 46-228. Food and beverage given and consumed in the presence of the donor is not subject to this \$40 limitation.

In closing, we note that K.S.A. 46-235 prohibits state officers or employees from receiving "compensation," other than their official state pay, for the performance of their official state duties. (K.S.A. 46-216 defines "compensation" to mean "any money, thing of value, or economic benefit conferred on, or received by, any person in return for services rendered, or to be rendered, by such person or another.") Thus, any "thank you" gifts given from the public should be closely monitored by your agency to ensure this section is not violated.

Each bidder shall file a sworn statement executed by or on behalf of the person, firm, association or corporation submitting the bid, certifying that such person, firm, association or corporation has not, either directly or indirectly, entered into any agreement, participated in any collusion, or otherwise taken any action in restraint of free competitive bidding in connection with the submitted bid. This sworn statement shall be in the form of an affidavit executed and sworn to by the bidder before a person who is authorized by the laws of the state to administer oaths. The required form of the affidavit will be provided by the state to each prospective bidder. Failure to submit the sworn statement as part of the bid approval package will make the bid nonresponsive and not eligible for award consideration.

Plans and specifications for the projects may be examined at the office of the respective county clerk or at the KDOT district office responsible for the work.

Each bid for the notes shall be accompanied by a good faith deposit in the form of a cashier's or certified check or a financial surety bond in the amount of 1 percent of the principal amount of the notes. Each bid for the bonds shall be accompanied by a good faith cashier's or certified check or financial surety bond in the amount of 2 percent of the principal amount of the bonds.

Delivery

The city will pay for the preparation of the notes and the bonds. The city will deliver the notes and the bonds in book-entry form only through the facilities of the Depository Trust Company, New York, New York.

Assessed Valuation and Indebtedness

The equalized assessed tangible valuation for computation of bonded debt limitations for the year 1997 is \$446,376,749. The total general obligation indebtedness of the city as of the date of the bonds, including the bonds and notes being sold, is \$59,195,000.

Approval of Bonds

The bonds and notes will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Gilmore & Bell, P.C., Kansas City, Missouri, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds/notes will be furnished and paid for by the city and delivered to the successful bidder as and when the bonds/notes are delivered.

K.A.R. 112-12-2. Kansas horse breeding development fund, stallion eligibility certificate. This regulation contains requirements for obtaining a Kansas-stallion eligibility certificate.

K.A.R. 112-12-5. Classes of Kansas-bred horses. This regulation amendment eliminates classes of horses and simplifies the process to permit any horse foaled in Kansas to participate in the program.

Economic Impact: There are no costs anticipated to the agency or other governmental agencies or units. The cost

to horse owners is a one-time fee for registering foals into the program. The fee is set annually by the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission and differs depending on the age of the foal. The proposed regulation will generate more participation into the Kansas-bred program by allowing nonresident horsemen to participate in the Kansas-bred program. It further provides equal purse opportunity to all foals and allows for full distribution of the Kansas Horse Breeding Development Fund purse money. This will result in higher purses and breed awards for owners. The industry should see an increase in horses being eligible to race, increasing purses and the wagering dollar.

K.A.R. 112-12-6. Kansas horse breeding development fund, registration of Kansas-bred horses. This regulation amendment sets forth the requirements of registering a horse as Kansas-bred for participation in the Kansas Horse Breeding Development Fund.

Economic Impact: There are no costs anticipated to the agency or other governmental agencies or units. The cost to horse owners is a one-time fee for registering foals into the program. The fee is set annually by the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission and differs depending on the age of the foal. The proposed regulation will generate more participation into the Kansas-bred program by allowing nonresident horsemen to participate in Kansas-bred program. It further provides equal purse opportunity to all foals and allows for full distribution of the Kansas Horse Breeding Development Fund purse money. This will result in higher purses and breed awards for owners. The industry should see an increase in horses being eligible to race, increasing purses and the wagering dollar.

K.A.R. 112-12-7. Registration of Kansas-domiciled horses. This regulation amendment sets forth the requirements for the registration of horses as Kansas-domiciled for participation in the Kansas Horse Breeding Development Fund.

Economic Impact: There are no costs anticipated to the agency or other governmental agencies or units. There is a cost to horse owners for registering a Kansas-domiciled mare or stallion, which is set annually by the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission. K.A.R. 112-12-8. Kansas-certified stallion awards. This regulation amendment sets forth the procedures for awarding Kansas-certified stallion awards.

Economic Impact: There are no costs anticipated to the agency or other governmental agencies or units. The industry should see an increase in horses being eligible to race, increasing purses and the wagering dollar.

K.A.R. 112-12-9. Kansas-certified mare awards. This regulation amendment sets forth the procedures for awarding Kansas-certified mare awards.

Article 16.—SIMPLIFIED HEARING PROCEDURES

112-16-6. Participation by and representation of respondents. (a) Whether or not participating in person, any respondent who is a natural person may be represented by an attorney licensed to practice law in the state of Kansas in any evidentiary hearing conducted before the Kansas racing and gaming commission or its designated presiding officer or officers in accordance with the Kansas administrative procedure act, K.S.A. 77-501, et seq., or rules and regulations adopted by the commission pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8816(g) or K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8836(k). The attorney shall represent the respondent at the respondent's own expense.

(b) Each for-profit or not-for-profit corporation, unincorporated association, or other respondent who is a non-natural person shall be represented by an attorney licensed to practice law in the state of Kansas in any evidentiary hearing conducted before the Kansas racing and gaming commission or its designated presiding officer or officers in accordance with the Kansas administrative procedure act, K.S.A. 77-501, et seq., or rules and regulations adopted by the commission pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 784-8816(g) or K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8836(k). The attorney shall represent the respondent at the respondent's own expense. Article 1.—DEFINITIONS

115-1-1. Definitions. (a) The following definitions shall apply to all department regulations.

(1) "Arrow" means a missile shot from a bow or a crossbow.

(2) "Bag limit" means the maximum number of any species, except fish and frogs, that may be taken by a person in a calendar day.

(3) "Bait fish" means a member of the minnow or carp family (*Cyprinidae*), sucker family (*Catostomidae*), top minnows or killifish family (*Cyprinodontidae*), shad family (*Clupeidae*), and sunfish family (*Centrarchidae*), but excluding black basses and crappie. Any fish listed in K.A.R. 115-15-1 or K.A.R. 115-15-2 shall not be considered as bait fish.

(4) "Bird dog" means a dog used to point, flush, or retrieve game birds, migratory birds, or both.

(5) "Bow" means a handheld device with a cord that connects both of its two ends and that is designed to propel an arrow. This includes long, recurve, and compound bows.

(6) "Bridle path" means an established, maintained, and marked pathway for the riding of animals.

(7) "Camping" means an activity involving an overnight stay in association with a camping unit.

(8) "Camping unit" means any vehicle or shelter specifically used for sleeping upon a portion of department lands or waters.

(9) "Cast net" means a circular or conical weighted net designed to be cast mouth downward by hand and withdrawn by lines attached to its margin.

(continued)

(10) "Creel limit" means the maximum total number of any species of fish or frogs that may be taken by a person in a calendar day.

(11) "Crossbow" means a transverse mounted bow with a cord that connects the two ends and that is designed to propel an arrow, including compound crossbows. The arrow is released by a mechanical trigger.

(12) "Department lands and waters" means state parks, state lakes, recreational grounds, wildlife areas, sanctuaries, fish hatcheries, natural areas, historic sites, and other lands, waters, and facilities under the jurisdiction and control of the secretary through ownership, lease, license, cooperative agreement, memorandum of understanding, or other arrangement.

(13) "Depth finder" means an electronic device used to locate fish or determine underwater structures.

(14) "Dip net" means a handheld net with rigid support about the mouth and used to land fish.

(15) "Draft livestock" means horses, mules, donkeys, or oxen used singly or in tandem with other horses, mules, donkeys, or oxen for pulling purposes.

(16) "Drag event" means a competitive event in which hounds pursue a scent trail. The event may involve a caged, pen-raised furbearer that is not released from the cage during the event.

(17) "Dryland set" means any trapping device that is placed or set on land or is not in contact with water.

(18) "Eyass" means a young of the year raptor not yet capable of flight.

(19) "Falconer" means the holder of a falconry permit.

(20) "Falconry" means the taking of wildlife with a trained raptor.

(21) "Field trial event for dogs" means a competitive event involving at least six dogs that are judged on hunting or running ability.

(22) "Firearm" means a rimfire or centerfire rifle, handgun, or shotgun; a muzzleloading shotgun, rifle, or handgun; or a cap-and-ball pistol.

(23) "Firering" means an open-top, man-made, fire-retaining device.

(24) "Fireplace" means an enclosed, man-made, fire-retaining device.

(25) "Fishing line" means any hand-operated string or cord, utilizing hooks that may be used in conjunction with rods, poles, reels, bows, or spearguns.

(26) "Fish trap" means a device for catching fish consisting of a net or other structure that diverts the fish into an enclosure arranged to make escape more difficult than entry.

(27) "Fully automatic firearm" means a rifle or handgun capable of firing more than one cartridge with a single trigger pull.

(28) "Gaff" means a hook attached to a rigid pole.

(29) "Gig" means a hand-operated spear with one or more prongs with or without barbs.

(30) "Haggard" means an adult raptor in mature plumage.

(31) "Hook" means a device with a single shaft and one or more points with or without barbs, used for catching fish and frogs.

(32) "Imping" means the repair of damaged feathers.

(33) "Moorage site" means a location designated for the fastening or securing of a vessel.

(34) "Nonsport fish" means carp, drum, white amur, threadfin and gizzard shad, goldfish, gar, suckers (including carpsuckers and buffalo), eel, sturgeon, goldeye, and bowfin.

(35) "Orthopedic device" means a device that attaches to the body and is required to enable a handicapped person to walk.

(36) "Passage" means an immature raptor on first fall migration still in immature plumage.

(37) "Pen-raised wildlife" means any wildlife raised in captivity.

(38) "Pets" means dogs and cats.

(39) "Possession limit" means the maximum total number of a species that can be retained per person at any one time.

(40) "Raptors" means members of the order falconiformes or strigiforms and specifically falcons, hawks, and owls.

(41) "Running" means the pursuing or chasing of furbearers or rabbits with hounds, but not including the capturing, killing, injuring, or possessing of furbearers or rabbits, or having a firearm or other weapon in possession while running, except during established furbearer or rabbit hunting seasons.

(42) "Sanctioned or licensed coyote field trial" means a competitive event that involves only sight or trail hounds and that has been advertised in one of the national foxhound journals no fewer than 30 days before the event.

(43) "Sanctioned or licensed furbearer field trial" means a competitive event in which dogs pursue unrestrained furbearers and that is sanctioned or licensed by any of the national kennel or field dog organizations for the express purpose of improving the quality of the breed through the awarding of points or credits toward specific class championships or other national recognition.

(44) "Seine" means a net with a float line and lead line designed to be pulled through the water for the purpose of catching fish.

(45) "Set line" means a string or cord anchored at one point, with not more than two hooks and not associated with a hand-operated mechanical reel.

(46) "Sight hound" means a dog used to pursue furbearers, rabbits, hares, or coyotes by sight.

(47) "Skin and scuba diving" means to swim or dive equipped with a face mask or goggles, allowing underwater vision and possibly involving an underwater breathing apparatus.

(48) "Snagging" means the hooking of a fish in any part of its anatomy other than the inside of the mouth.

(49) "Speargun" means a device used to propel a spear through the water by mechanical means or compressed gas.

(50) "Sport fish" means northern pike, walleye, saug-eye, sauger, yellow perch, striped bass, white bass, black bass (largemouth, spotted, and smallmouth), striped bass hybrid, trout, muskellunge, tiger muskie, channel catfish, blue catfish, flathead catfish, paddlefish, and panfish (bullhead, black and white crappie, bluegill, redear sunfish, green sunfish, warmouth, and rock bass).

(51) "State fishing lake" means a department facility that contains the words "state fishing lake" in the name of the area.

(52) "Tip-up" means an ice fishing device designed to signal the strike of a fish.

(53) "Total fish length" means the length as measured from the tip of the snout to the end of the tail, with the mouth closed and the tail lobes pressed together.

(54) "Trail hound" means a dog used to trail furbearers, rabbits, hares, or coyotes by scent.

(55) "Transfer," as it applies to licenses, permits, and other issues of the department, means to reassign, to exchange between individuals, or for one individual to carry another individual's license or permit on the former individual's person when the latter individual is not present.

(56) "Trot line" means a string or cord anchored at one or more points with not more than 25 hooks and not associated with a hand-operated mechanical reel.

(57) "Turkey" means wild turkey.

(58) "Unattended fishing line" means any fishing line set to catch fish that is not marked or tagged as required by K.A.R. 115-7-2 or K.A.R. 115-17-11 and not immediately attended by the operator of the fishing line.

(59) "Wake" means the waves thrown by a vessel moving on water.

(60) "Water race" means a competitive event in which hounds pursue a scent device or a caged, pen-raised furbearer through water. The furbearer is not released during the event.

(61) "Water set" means any trapping device that has the gripping portion placed or set in flowing or pooled water and remains in contact with the flowing or pooled water.

(b) Exceptions to the above definitions include when the context requires otherwise or is specifically defined otherwise within the regulations. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 32-807; effective Dec. 26, 1989; amended June 8, 1992; amended Sept. 19, 1997.)

Article 2.—FEES, REGISTRATIONS AND OTHER CHARGES

115-2-3. Other fees and charges. (a) The following fees and charges shall be in effect for state parks and for other designated areas for which fees and charges are required:

(b) Each overnight camping permit and youth group camping permit shall be valid only for the state park or other area for which it is purchased.

(c) Each annual camping permit and fourteen-day camping permit shall expire on December 31 of the year for which it is issued.

(d) Each 30-day camping permit, private boat dock rental, private cabin site rental, and club or organizational cabin site rental shall expire on the date specified in the permit.

(e) Each overnight camping permit, youth group camping permit, and cabin camping permit shall expire at noon on the day following its effective date; however, an overnight camping permit, youth group camping permit, or cabin camping permit shall expire at 2:00 p.m. on Sundays and on Memorial Day, Independence Day, and Labor Day when the Sunday or the listed holiday is the day following its effective date.

(f) Camping and utility fees are due at the time of camp site occupancy and by noon of any subsequent days of camp site occupancy.

(g) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1998. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 32-988; effective Jan. 22, 1990; amended Jan. 28, 1991; amended June 8, 1992; amended Oct. 12, 1992; amended Aug. 21, 1995; amended Sept. 19, 1997.)

Article 3.—SMALL GAME

115-3-2. Rabbits, hares, and squirrels; legal equipment, taking methods, and possession. (a) Legal hunting equipment for rabbits, hares, and squirrels shall consist of the following:

- (1) firearms:
 - (A) centerfire and rimfire rifles and handguns, except fully automatic rifles and handguns;
 - (B) shotguns and muzzleloading shotguns not larger than 10 gauge and using only shot;
 - (C) muzzleloading rifles and pistols;
 - (D) cap-and-ball pistols; and
 - (E) pellet and BB guns;
 - (2) bow and arrow;
 - (3) crossbow;
 - (4) falconry equipment; and
 - (5) projectiles hand thrown or propelled by a slingshot.
- (b) Rabbits may be taken by box traps during established hunting seasons.

(c) The use of dogs shall be permitted while hunting.
 (d) The use of horses and mules shall be permitted while hunting, but no person shall shoot while mounted on a horse or mule.

(e) Legal hours for the hunting and taking of rabbits, hares, and squirrels shall be from ½ hour before sunrise to sunset.

(f) Legal hours for the running of rabbits shall be 24 hours per day during established hunting seasons. Oth-

erwise, the running of rabbits shall be legal from ½ hour before sunrise to sunset.

(g) Management units for the running of rabbits shall be as follows.

(1) The eastern management unit shall be that part of Kansas east of and including Smith, Osborne, Russell, Ellsworth, Rice, Reno, Pratt, and Barber counties.

(2) The western management unit shall be that part of Kansas west of the eastern unit.

(h) Any type of apparel may be worn while hunting or running rabbits.

(i) Legally taken rabbits, hares, and squirrels may be possessed without limit in time and may be given to another if accompanied by a written notice containing the donor's name and address.

(j) Other equipment and methods of taking shall be legal as allowed by permit. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 32-1002; effective, T-115-7-27-89, July 27, 1989; effective Sept. 18, 1989; amended, T-115-12-28-89, Dec. 28, 1989; amended Jan. 22, 1990; amended Sept. 19, 1997.)

Article 9.—LICENSES, PERMITS, STAMPS, AND OTHER DEPARTMENT ISSUES

115-9-5. Hunting, fishing and furharvester licenses; state park permits; effective dates. (a) Any individual may purchase an annual hunting, fishing, or furharvester license, state park annual permit, or annual trail pass for the next calendar year on and after a mid-December date determined annually by the secretary.

(b) Any hunting, fishing, or furharvester license, state park annual permit, or annual trail pass purchased on or after the determined date shall be valid from the date purchased through the expiration date as stated on the license, permit, or pass. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 32-807, K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 32-906, K.S.A. 32-911 and K.S.A. 32-919; effective Dec. 4, 1989; amended Aug. 15, 1994; amended Sept. 19, 1997.)

Article 18.—SPECIAL PERMITS

115-18-13. Dark geese; management units, permits, and restrictions. (a) Dark geese shall include Canada geese, white-fronted geese, and black brant.

(b) The following dark goose management units are established for the taking of dark geese under special restrictions.

(1) Marais des Cygnes Valley; unit 1: that part of Kansas bounded by a line from the Kansas-Missouri state line west on state highway K-68 to its junction with federal highway US-169, then southwest on federal highway US-169 to its junction with state highway K-7, then south on state highway K-7 to its junction with state highway K-31, then east on state highway K-31 to its junction with federal highway US-69, then north on federal highway US-69 to its junction with state highway K-239, then east on state highway K-239 to its junction with the Kansas-Missouri state line, then north on the Kansas-Missouri state line to its junction with state highway K-68, except federal and state sanctuaries.

(2) Southeast; unit 2: that part of Kansas bounded by a line from the Kansas-Missouri state line east on federal highway US-160 to its junction with federal highway US-69, then north on federal highway US-69 to its junction

with state highway K-39, then west on state highway K-39 to its junction with federal highway US-169, then south on federal highway US-169 to its junction with the Kansas-Oklahoma state line, then east on the Kansas-Oklahoma state line to its junction with the Kansas-Missouri state line, then north on the Kansas-Missouri state line to its junction with federal highway US-160, except federal and state sanctuaries.

(3) Flint Hills; unit 3: that part of Kansas bounded by a line from the junction of interstate highway I-35 and state highway K-57, then south and east on state highway K-57 to its junction with federal highway US-75, then south on federal highway US-75 to its junction with state highway K-39, then south and west on state highway K-39 to its junction with state highway K-96, then west on state highway K-96 to its junction with federal highway US-77, then north on federal highway US-77 to its junction with interstate highway I-70, then east on interstate highway I-70 to its junction with federal highway US-75, then south on federal highway US-75 to its junction with interstate highway I-35, then west on interstate highway I-35 to its junction with state highway K-57, except federal and state sanctuaries.

(c) Dark goose hunting in the dark goose management units shall be by permit only.

(1) Each dark goose permit shall be valid only in the management unit for which the permit is issued. An individual may purchase only one permit per dark goose management unit.

(2) Each dark goose permit shall be nontransferable, and each permit shall be signed and dated by the permittee in order to be valid.

(3) Each dark goose permit shall expire on June 30 following the date of issuance.

(d) Dark goose hunting in management units 1 and 2 shall require the possession of a state-issued carcass tag in addition to a dark goose permit.

(1) The permittee shall attach the carcass tag to the leg of the goose immediately following the kill and before moving the carcass from the site of the kill. The carcass tag shall remain attached to the carcass until processed for consumption.

(2) Each carcass tag shall be non-transferable.

(3) Each carcass tag shall be valid for only one dark goose per carcass tag and shall expire on June 30 following the date of issuance.

(e) The statewide daily bag and possession limit for dark geese shall apply throughout the state, including dark goose management units.

(f) In addition to other penalties prescribed by law, each dark goose permit or carcass tag shall be invalid from the date of issuance if obtained by an individual through misrepresentation or unauthorized application. Each dark goose permit or carcass tag obtained by an individual in excess of the number of dark goose permits or carcass tags authorized shall be invalid from the date of issuance. Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-61. "Ask for the sale" promotion. (a) During the period beginning August 1, 1997, and ending August 31, 1997, in addition to compensation provided for in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery also offers all participating R & C Petroleum stores located in Kansas an opportunity to participate in a bonus retailer "ask for the sale" incentive promotion of instant tickets as follows:

(b) On each Wednesday, August 6, 13, 20, and 27, 1997, from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., all R & C Petroleum store personnel selling Kansas lottery tickets will ask every adult customer making a purchase if the customer would like to purchase a lottery ticket. If the employee fails to ask adult customers making a purchase whether they want to purchase a lottery ticket before leaving the premises, and the customer brings it to the clerk's attention, the retailer shall give the adult customer one \$1.00 instant ticket at no charge.

(c) The retailer at each location shall display special point-of-sale materials provided by the lottery each Wednesday during the promotion announcing the promotion to its customers. These materials consist of:

(1) A tent card to be displayed at the point where tickets are sold.

(2) A window/monitor banner to be displayed at the front entrance of the business and/or below the lottery information display system monitor.

(3) Promotion specific buttons.

These materials must be on display during all hours of the promotion on the times and dates established in subsection (b) for a store to be eligible for a prize.

(d) The Kansas lottery will provide each location with a \$25 credit to its account at the beginning of the promotion. If a store increases its total sales over its predetermined base by 20 percent or more, an additional \$10 will be credited to its account.

(e) Any tickets given away above the \$25 allowance representing 25 tickets or the \$35 allowance representing 35 tickets per location will be R & C Petroleum's responsibility.

(f) Each retail location shall maintain a ticket log form to be completed every time an instant ticket is given away because an employee forgot to ask for the sale. The log will be picked up by the Kansas lottery district manager servicing the retailer location at the end of the promotion.

(g) At the end of the promotion, the R & C Petroleum store with the greatest percentage increase in total sales for the 31 day period from August 1, 1997, through August 31, 1997, over an average based upon a 62 day period from March 31, 1997, through May 31, 1997, will win a portable compact disc player. 111-4-1057. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Wild Doubler" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink in 15 point WGI font with matching captions in WGI Cap font. A game symbol appears in each of six play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: \$1.⁰⁰ - \$2.⁰⁰ - \$4.⁰⁰ - \$5.⁰⁰ - 10.⁰⁰ - 20.⁰⁰ - 40.⁰⁰ - \$2500 - \$5000 - WILD.

(b) "Game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The game symbol caption associated with each game symbol is as follows:

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the back of each instant game ticket both above the information form and below the bar code.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three letter code printed and appearing in three of six varying locations among the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: ONE = \$1.00; TWO = \$2.00; FOR = \$4.00; FIV = \$5.00; TEN = \$10.00 TWY = \$20.00; FRY = \$40.00.

(f) "Bar code" means the 16-digit bar-coded number appearing on the back of each ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-8-11-97, July 18, 1997.)

111-4-1058. Determination of instant prize winners. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the six game symbols and captions. If three like symbols are revealed, the player wins that amount. If two like prize symbols and a doubler symbol are revealed, the player wins double that prize amount. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710(b), (c) and (i); implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710(b), (c) and (i), and K.S.A. 74-8720(b) and (d); effective, T-111-8-11-97, July 18, 1997.)

This is done by marking one of the multi-draw boxes designated by 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 or 10 on the play slip. The additional draw period(s) for which the ticket is valid will then appear on the computer generated ticket given to the player by the retailer.

(b) A player must pay an additional \$1.00 per play for each additional drawing in which he or she wishes to play.

(d) A player may purchase only the same numbers on the same boards for multiple drawings.

(e) Multi-draw tickets for Powerball drawings conducted after the September 13, 1997, business day shall not be available for purchase prior to the business day beginning September 14, 1997. A business day for the purposes of this game shall be defined at subsection (p) of K.A.R. 111-6-1. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992; amended, T-111-8-11-97, July 18, 1997.)

Article 7.—ON LINE GAMES

111-7-75. Multi-draw. (a) In addition to a single play involving a wager of \$.50 or \$1.00, a player may also have his or her selections entered in multiple drawings. Multi-draw tickets must be purchased for consecutive drawings beginning with the next drawing. This is done by marking one of the multi-draw boxes designated by 2, 3, 4, 5 or 6 on the play slip. The additional draw period(s) for which the ticket is valid will then appear on the computer generated ticket given the player by the retailer.

(b) A player must pay an additional \$.50 or \$1.00 per play depending on the amount he or she wishes to wager for each additional drawing in which he or she wishes to play.

(c) Unless one of the multi-draw boxes is marked and the additional amount paid, the play will only be eligible for the current drawing up to the end of ticket sales the day of the drawing.

(d) A player may purchase only the same numbers on the same boards for multiple drawings.

(e) Multi-draw tickets for Pick 3 drawings conducted after the September 13, 1997, business day shall not be available for purchase prior to the business day beginning September 14, 1997. A business day for the purposes of this game shall be defined at subsection (p) of K.A.R. 111-6-1. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-12-18-91, Dec. 13, 1991; amended, T-111-7-22-96, July 19, 1996; amended, T-111-8-11-97, July 18, 1997.)

111-7-78. Game description; retail sale of tickets.

(a) "Keno" is a 10 of 20 of 80 lottery game with fixed prize amounts. For each game, a player may select from one to 10 spots. The lottery then selects 20 winning numbers from one to 80. Prizes are awarded based on the total amount of winning numbers matched by a player for the number of spots played for that game.

(b) To play, a player must use a game slip.

(c) The player must mark the amount of spots to be played. A player can pick from one to 10 spots per game slip.

(d) The player must mark the number of dollars to be wagered per game: \$1, \$2, \$3, \$4 or \$5.

(e) The player may then select the spots to be played by one of two methods. The player may mark the player's own selections on the game slip; if this method is used, the number of spots marked on the game slip must equal the number of spots which were selected to play. The other method of play is to select "quick pick," in which the number of spots randomly generated by the computer will match the number of spots indicated by the player.

(f) The player shall indicate the number of consecutive games to be played: 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 10, 20, 50 or 100.

(g) The player shall present the completed game slip to the retailer. The cost of the ticket equals the amount wagered per game times the number of consecutive games indicated by the player.

(h) The minimum wager shall be \$1.00 per game; the maximum wager shall be \$5.00 per game. The maximum wager per game slip is \$100. Any game slip with a wager greater than \$100 shall be rejected.

(i) Multi-draw tickets for Keno drawings conducted after the September 13, 1997, business day shall not be available for purchase prior to the business day beginning September 14, 1997. A business day for the purposes of this game shall be defined at subsection (p) of K.A.R. 111-6-1. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-9-1-92, Aug. 28, 1992; amended, T-111-7-22-96, July 19, 1996; amended, T-111-8-11-97, July 18, 1997.)

111-7-127. Multi-draw. (a) In addition to a single play involving two boards for each \$1.00, a player may also have his or her selections in multiple drawings. Multi-draw tickets must be purchased for consecutive drawings beginning with the next drawing. This is done by marking one of the multi-draw boxes designated by 2, 3, 6, 9, 12, or 15 draws on the play slip. The additional draw period(s) for which the ticket is valid will then appear on the computer generated ticket given to the player by the retailer.

(b) A player must pay an additional \$1.00 per two (2) boards for each additional drawing in which he or she wishes to play.

(c) Unless one of the multi-draw boxes is marked and the additional amount paid, the play will only be eligible for the current drawing up to approximately 8:59 p.m. the day of the drawing.

(d) When purchasing a multiple drawing ticket, a player must purchase the same numbers on the same boards for the duration of the multiple drawings.

(e) Multi-draw tickets for Kansas Cash drawings conducted after the September 13, 1997, business day shall not be available for purchase prior to the business day beginning September 14, 1997. A business day for the purposes of this game shall be defined at subsection (p) of K.A.R. 111-6-1. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-7-22-96, July 19, 1996; amended, T-111-8-11-97, July 18, 1997.)

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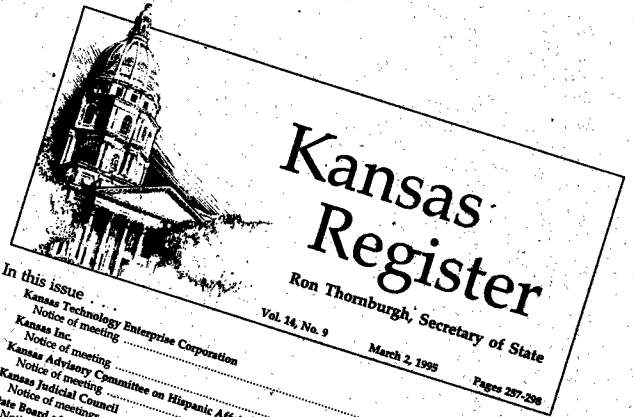
