Board of Nursing**Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 3 p.m. Tuesday, February 10, in Room 106 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the executive administrator of the Board of Nursing, Room 551-S, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for ac-

commodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting the Board of Nursing at (785) 296-5752.

A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 60-9-105. Definitions. The continuing education definitions were revised in response to a 1997 statute change. Most of the changes were to clarify definitions or to delete some that were not needed.

K.A.R. 60-9-106. Continuing nursing education for license renewal. This regulation provides the licensee an expanded explanation of what educational courses may be used for continuing nursing education credit. Guidelines previously used for information for licensees were incorporated into the regulation.

K.A.R. 60-9-107. Approval of continuing nursing education. This regulation was revised to clarify how providerships are to be managed.

K.A.R. 60-3-107, 60-7-110 and 60-11-120. Expiration dates of licenses, applications. These three regulations establish a time limit for the board to maintain licensure applications.

K.A.R. 60-3-106a. Temporary permit. The time for temporary permits was expanded from 90 days to 120 days.

K.A.R. 60-4-101, 60-8-101 and 60-11-119. Payment of fees. A fee for the exempt license or certificate was added.

K.A.R. 60-3-112, 60-7-109 and 60-11-121. Exempt license or certificate. These are new regulations which implement the exempt license or certificate for nurses providing services for charitable health care.

Economic Impact

The additions to the continuing nursing education regulations should provide some flexibility for licensees. Some licensees may save some money in obtaining continuing nursing education credits.

Some nurses who now maintain a license may opt for the exempt license. The exempt license will still allow them to provide volunteer nursing services. The fee for the exempt license is reduced. Maintaining the exempt license does not require continuing nursing education for renewal.

Three regulations set a six-month time period for the agency to hold applications. After that time, the applicant would have to file a new application. This may cost a few individuals an additional application fee between \$45 and \$80 depending on the type of application. There are about 120 abandoned applications per year.

The anticipated changes in these regulations should have minimal economic impact on the Board of Nursing.

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Friday, January 23, at the office of the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts, 235 S. Topeka Blvd., Topeka, to consider the adoption of seven proposed amended rules and regulations and the revocation of one rule and regulation.

The seven proposed amended rules and regulations relate to fees collected by the board for license and registration applications, renewals and other associated fees. The one regulation which the board proposes to be revoked deals with more than one temporary registration for respiratory therapists.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed amended rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit comments prior to the hearing to the Board of Healing Arts at the address above. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed amended regulations during the hearing. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. A summary of the proposed rules and regulations and their respective economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 100-60-1, Fees; K.A.R. 100-55-4, Fees; K.A.R. 100-54-4, Fees; K.A.R. 100-69-5, Fees; K.A.R. 100-49-4, Fees; K.A.R. 100-29-7, Amount; and K.A.R. 100-11-1, Amount. These seven proposed amended rules and regulations deal entirely with fees associated with license and registration application, renewal, temporary permits, and various other fees collected by the board in each profession.

K.A.R. 100-55-10. Temporary registrations. The Board of Healing Arts is requesting that this regulation be revoked. Passage of 1997 Senate Bill 246 did away with the ability of individuals who have applied for registration as a respiratory therapist to receive more than one temporary permit.

Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-65. "Ask for the sale" promotion. (a) During the period beginning December 1, 1997, and ending December 31, 1997, in addition to compensation provided for in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery also offers all Presto Convenience stores located in Kansas an opportunity to participate in a bonus retailer "ask for the sale" incentive promotion of lottery tickets:

(b) On each Wednesday in December 1997, including December 3, 10, 17, 24 and 31, all Presto Convenience stores' personnel selling Kansas lottery tickets will ask every adult customer making a purchase if the customer would like to purchase a lottery ticket. If the employee fails to ask adult customers for the purchase of a lottery ticket and the customer brings it to the clerk's attention before leaving the premises, the retailer shall give the adult customer one \$1.00 instant lottery ticket at no charge.

(c) All retailer employees at each location shall wear promotional buttons and display special point-of-sale materials provided by the lottery each Wednesday from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. during the promotion announcing the promotion to its customers. These promotional materials consist of:

- (1) A tent card to be displayed at the point where tickets are sold.
- (2) A window/monitor banner to be displayed at the front entrance of the business and/or below the lottery information display system monitor.

These materials must be on display during all hours of the promotion at the times and dates established in subsections (b) and (c) for a store to be eligible for a prize.

(d) The Kansas lottery will provide each location with a credit of \$35. This will be credited to each store's account at the beginning of the promotion.

(e) Any tickets given away above the \$35 allowance representing 35 tickets per location will be the responsibility of Presto Oil Company.

(f) Each retail location shall maintain a ticket log form to be completed every time a lottery ticket is given away. The log will be picked up by the Kansas lottery district manager servicing the retailer location at the end of the promotion.

(g) At the end of the promotion, all stores with a 15 percent or more percentage increase in total lottery sales over their base will be entered into a drawing for a chance to win a compact disc player with a car kit. The area supervisor for the store that is drawn will also receive a compact disc player with a car kit. Promotional items will also be awarded to the first, second, and third place stores based on the percentage increase in total lottery sales over the predetermined base. The base sales period for each store shall be the 31 day average sales based upon total lottery sales from August 31, 1997, through October 31, 1997, compared to total sales from December 1, 1997, to December 31, 1997. 111-4-1118. Name of game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Fat Cat" commencing on or after October 20, 1997. The specific rules for the "Fat Cat" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-1118 through 111-4-1121. 111-4-1119. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Fat Cat" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink in 15 point WGI font with matching captions in WGI Cap font. A game symbol appears in each of six play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: FREE - \$2.00 - \$4.00 - 10.00 - 20.00 - 40.00 - \$500\$ - 01¢ - 05¢ - 10¢ - 25¢ - 50¢.

(b) "Game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The game symbol caption associated with each game symbol is as follows:

RegulationsArticle 12.—KANSAS HORSE BREEDING
DEVELOPMENT FUND

112-12-1. Definitions. (a) "Kansas-bred horse" means a horse that meets either of these requirements:

(1) is foaled in Kansas and registered with the official registering agency to participate in the Kansas-bred racing or breeding program; or

(2) was domiciled in Kansas before December 31, 1989 and registered with the official registering agency to participate in the Kansas-bred racing or breeding program.

(b) "Kansas-certified horse" means a mare or stallion that is Kansas-bred or Kansas-domiciled and that is certified by the official registering agency to participate in the Kansas-bred breeding program.

(c) "Kansas-domiciled horse" means a horse that is foaled out-of-state and brought into the state of Kansas and that is registered and certified with the official registering agency to participate in the Kansas-bred breeding program.

(d) "Official registering agency" means the organization with which the commission has contracted for the registration of horses and the distribution of the Kansas horse breeding development fund in accordance with K.S.A. 74-8830(b) and (c).

(e) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1998. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 74-8830; effective March 1, 1993; amended Jan. 1, 1998.)

112-12-2. Kansas horse breeding development fund, stallion eligibility certificate. (a) Each person who intends to stand a stallion for service in Kansas shall file a written application for certification before the stallion is to stand for service if the stallion's foals are to be registered as Kansas-bred horses.

(b) The official registering agency may issue a certificate of eligibility if either of these conditions is met.

(1) The stallion is registered as a Kansas-bred horse.

(2) The stallion is registered as a Kansas-domiciled horse.

(c) Each application shall be completed on a form approved by the commission that shall include the following information:

(1) the name of the stallion;

(2) the name, address, zip code, and tax identification number or social security number of each owner of the stallion;

(3) the location where the stallion will stand for service during the calendar year for which the application is made; and

(4) a statement that the stallion will stand for service within the state of Kansas and will not stand for service anywhere outside the state of Kansas during the calendar year in which the stallion's offspring are conceived.

(d) Each application for an initial certificate of eligibility shall include the following information:

(1) evidence of the right of ownership, including bills of sale, contracts, or other documents that demonstrate proof of ownership and reflect each agreement about breeding rights, repurchase agreements, and any other concession;

(2) an application for Kansas-bred or Kansas-domiciled registration pursuant to K.A.R. 112-12-6 or K.A.R. 112-12-7; and

(3) the official breed certificate issued by the national breed association pursuant to K.A.R. 112-7-6.

(e) Each stallion certified as required by the provisions of this regulation shall be available for inspection at all times by representatives of the official registering agency.

(f) The owner, agent, or lessee shall notify the official registering agency if a stallion certified as required by the provisions of this regulation leaves the state of Kansas during the year for which the stallion is certified in the Kansas-bred program.

(g) Any foal from a mare bred to a certified stallion before revocation of an eligibility certificate may be registered as a Kansas-bred horse under the provisions of K.A.R. 112-12-5.

(h) If the majority ownership changes and the new owner desires to certify the stallion for eligibility in the Kansas-bred program, the new owner shall, within 30 days of the date of the sale, submit an application for a stallion eligibility certificate accompanied by a copy of the proof of sale or other document and observe the requirements of these regulations. Certification under this subsection (h) shall be effective from the date of sale after complying with subsection (h).

(i) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1998. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8829 and K.S.A. 74-8830; effective, T-112-2-23-89, Feb. 23, 1989; effective, T-112-6-22-89, June 22, 1989; effective Sept. 4, 1989; amended March 19, 1990; amended March 1, 1993; amended Feb. 13, 1995; amended Jan. 1, 1998.)

112-12-4. Kansas horse breeding development fund, mare eligibility certificate. (a) Each person who intends to breed, or foal, or both, a mare certified in the Kansas-bred program shall file a written application for certification before foaling.

(b) The official registering agency may issue a certificate of eligibility if these conditions are met:

(1) the mare is determined to be a Kansas-bred mare as required by K.A.R. 112-12-12; and

(continued)

(2)(A) the mare is registered as a Kansas-bred horse; or

(B) the mare is registered as a Kansas-domiciled horse.

(c) Each application shall be completed on a form approved by the commission and shall include the following information:

(1) the name of the mare; and

(2) the name, address, zip code, and tax identification number or social security number of each owner of the mare.

(d) Each application for an initial breeding certification shall be accompanied by the following applicable documentation:

(1) evidence of the right of ownership, including bills of sale, contracts, or other documents that demonstrate proof of ownership and reflect each agreement about breeding rights, repurchase agreements, and each other concession;

(2) the application for Kansas-bred or Kansas-domiciled registration as provided in K.A.R. 112-12-6 or K.A.R. 112-12-7; and

(3) the official breed registration certificate as defined by K.A.R. 112-7-6.

(e) Each mare certified as required by this regulation shall be available for inspection at all times by representatives of the official registering agency.

(f) If the majority ownership of a mare certified with the official registering agency changes, the official registering agency shall revoke the eligibility certificate.

(g) The new owner shall recertify such mare in order for that mare certification and breed award status to be uninterrupted, and once a mare is certified, the mare shall remain certified until the mare dies or its certification is revoked for ownership changes.

(h) A mare's offspring shall be eligible for registration in the Kansas-bred program if the mare is in the state of Kansas at the time of foaling and all rules and regulations have been met.

(i) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1998. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8829 and K.S.A. 74-8830; effective, T-112-2-23-89, Feb. 23, 1989; effective, T-112-6-22-89, June 22, 1989; effective Sept. 4, 1989; amended March 19, 1990; amended March 1, 1993; amended Feb. 13, 1995; amended Jan. 1, 1998.)

112-12-5. Classes of Kansas-bred horses. In order to be eligible to be registered as Kansas-bred, a foal shall be foaled in Kansas. This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1998. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 74-8830; effective, T-112-2-23-89, Feb. 23, 1989; effective, T-112-6-22-89, June 22, 1989; effective Sept. 4, 1989; amended March 1, 1993; amended Feb. 13, 1995; amended Jan. 1, 1998.)

112-12-6. Kansas horse breeding development fund, registration of Kansas-bred horses. (a) Each owner, agent, or lessee who intends to register a foal as a Kansas-bred foal shall file a verified application for registration with the official registering agency by December 31 of the year of foaling to avoid monetary penalty to be set by the commission.

(b) Each applicant shall completely answer all inquiries on the application form approved by the commission, including the following:

(1) the name of the dam and her Kansas registration status;

(2) the name of the sire and his Kansas registration status;

(3) the date and location where the foal was dropped;

(4) the color, sex, and markings of the foal; and

(5) the name, address, zip code, and tax identification number or social security number of each owner of the foal.

(c) Each official breed registration certificate as defined in K.A.R. 112-7-6 shall be delivered to the official registering agency before the foal will be registered as Kansas-bred.

(d) If the foal meets all of the requirements for registration, the official registering agency shall affix its official seal, including the registration number for the foal, on the face of the official breed registration certificate as defined in K.A.R. 112-7-6 and return the certificate to the owner by certified mail within 30 days of the date of official registration.

(e) Each foal registered as required by this regulation shall be available at any time for inspection by representatives of the official registering agency.

(f) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1998. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 74-8830; effective, T-112-2-23-89, Feb. 23, 1989; effective, T-112-6-22-89, June 22, 1989; effective Sept. 4, 1989; amended March 1, 1993; amended Feb. 13, 1995; amended Jan. 1, 1998.)

112-12-7. Registration of Kansas-domiciled horses.

(a) Any owner, agent, or lessee of a horse that does not qualify as Kansas-bred as outlined by these regulations may obtain a Kansas-domiciled registration if the official registering agency determines, under guidelines approved by the Kansas racing commission, that the horse may enhance the quality of Kansas-bred breeding stock.

(b) Each Kansas-domiciled horse shall be domiciled within Kansas before application for registration.

(c) Each owner, agent, or lessee who intends to register a Kansas-domiciled horse shall meet these requirements:

(1) provide verified answers to inquiries on an application approved by the commission; and

(2) except as stated in this regulation, comply with these racing regulations.

(d) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1998. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 74-8830; effective, T-112-2-23-89, Feb. 23, 1989; effective, T-112-6-22-89, June 22, 1989; effective Sept. 4, 1989; amended March 1, 1993; amended Feb. 13, 1995; amended Jan. 1, 1998.)

112-12-8. Kansas-certified stallion awards. (a) Any owner, agent, or lessee of a certified Kansas-bred or certified Kansas-domiciled stallion may be eligible to participate in the Kansas-certified stallion awards if both of these criteria are met.

(1) Any foal of the Kansas-certified stallion is registered as a Kansas-bred horse with the official registering agency.

(2) The foal of the Kansas-certified stallion wins, places, or shows in a race that has been designated for the award.

(b) Each Kansas-certified stallion award shall be paid as follows.

(1) For registered foals conceived before December 31, 1992, the award shall be paid to the stallion's owner, agent, or lessee of record at the time the foal was conceived.

(2) For registered foals conceived after December 31, 1992, the award shall be paid to the stallion's owner, agent, or lessee of record at the time the foal was conceived only if the Kansas-certified stallion was certified as eligible in accordance with K.A.R. 112-12-2 before the foal was conceived.

(3) A change of ownership of a stallion, by itself, shall not preclude the stallion from receiving breed awards.

(c) The official registering agency shall solicit information from the various breed owners to aid it in recommending races, qualifications for races, and amounts and types of awards to the commission.

(d) Races, qualifications for races, and amounts and types of awards shall be designated by the commission.

(e) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1998. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8829 and K.S.A. 74-8830; effective, T-112-2-23-89, Feb. 23, 1989; effective, T-112-6-22-89, June 22, 1989; effective Sept. 4, 1989; amended March 1, 1993; amended Feb. 13, 1995; amended Jan. 1, 1998.)

112-12-10. Kansas-bred or Kansas-foaled or -owned races. (a) Each organization licensee shall in good faith offer at least one race limited to Kansas-bred or Kansas-foaled or -owned horses on each racing day and shall make a good faith attempt to conduct an average of one Kansas-bred or Kansas-owned race per day. Kansas-bred horses shall be preferred entries. Awards and monies shall be paid only to the owners of Kansas-bred horses. If there are seven Kansas-bred entries, a Kansas-bred only race shall be run. If there are fewer than seven Kansas-bred entries and there are Kansas-foaled or -owned entries, a Kansas-bred and Kansas-foaled or -owned race shall be run.

(b) The organization licensee shall file, with the commission and the official registering agency two official programs, an affidavit verifying that the registry regulations have been followed and other requested information, including the following:

(1) the value of the purses offered by the organization licensee;

(2) the name and address of each owner who is to share in the total purses and awards and the amount in which each owner is to share; and

(3) any other information the commission or registry may require.

(c) Each program and affidavit shall be filed with the commission and the official registering agency within seven days after the date of the Kansas-bred or Kansas-foaled or -owned race conducted by the organization licensee.

(d) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1998. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8804; im-

plementing K.S.A. 74-8812 and 74-8830; effective, T-112-2-23-89, Feb. 23, 1989; amended, T-112-6-22-89, June 22, 1989; effective Sept. 4, 1989; amended March 1, 1993; amended Jan. 18, 1994; amended Aug. 25, 1995; amended Jan. 1, 1998.)

112-12-13. Administration of the Kansas horse breeding development fund by the official registering agency. (a) The official registering agency may deny the application for registration of a Kansas-bred or Kansas-domiciled horse or certificate of eligibility of a stallion or a mare if either of these conditions is met.

(1) Information has been omitted, altered, or falsified within the application.

(2) Documentation required by these regulations is not provided or is altered or falsified.

(b) The official registering agency may immediately revoke the eligibility certificate of any stallion if the stallion stands for service outside the state of Kansas during the calendar year when the stallion is certified to stand for service in the state of Kansas.

(c) The official registering agency may deny or revoke the registration of any foal if the owner of the foal's sire or dam fails to comply with any of the provisions of K.A.R. 112-12-2, 112-12-4, or 112-12-5.

(d) This regulation shall take effect on and after January 1, 1998. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8829 and K.S.A. 74-8830; effective, T-112-2-23-89, Feb. 23, 1989; effective, T-112-6-22-89, June 22, 1989; effective Sept. 4, 1989; amended Feb. 13, 1995; amended Jan. 1, 1998.)

112-12-14. Registration of Arabian, Appaloosa, Paint and Standardbred horses. (a) Any Arabian, Appaloosa, Paint or Standardbred horse may be registered into the Kansas-bred program if the horse is registered with the national breed association.

(b) Each person who intends to register a horse under this regulation shall meet these requirements:

(1) file an application for registration with the official registering agency on forms approved by the commission;

(2) file with the official registering agency evidence of ownership, including the following:

(A) bills of sale;

(B) the official breed registration certificate issued by the national breed association; and

(C) contracts or other documents that demonstrate proof of ownership and reflect all agreements concerning breeding rights, repurchase, and any other terms and conditions;

(3) pay the \$50.00 fee for registering each horse under this regulation; and

(4) make each horse registered under this regulation available at any reasonable time for inspection by representatives of the official registering agency.

Article 6.—REGISTERED MASS APPRAISER

93-6-1. Prerequisites. A candidate for the registered mass appraisal (RMA) designation shall be an eligible Kansas appraiser pursuant to K.S.A. 19-432, and amendments thereto. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 19-430, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 126, § 33; effective, T-93-8-29-97, Aug. 29, 1997; effective Dec. 5, 1997.)

93-6-2. Education requirements. (a) A candidate for the RMA designation shall complete 180 hours of courses. "Hour," as used in this regulation, shall mean one clock hour of not less than 50 minutes.

(b) Mandatory courses shall consist of the following:

International association of assessing of- ficers (IAAO) course I or equivalent course approved by the secretary of rev- enue	30 hours
IAAO course II or equivalent course ap- proved by the secretary of revenue	30 hours
IAAO standards and ethics course or equivalent course approved by the sec- retary of revenue	15 hours
IAAO course 300, 311, or 312 or equiva- lent course approved by the secretary of revenue	30 hours
Kansas property tax law course ap- proved by the secretary of revenue	30 hours
Personal property course approved by the secretary of revenue	15 hours
Total mandatory course hours	150 hours

A candidate may substitute successfully completed appraisal courses with an emphasis on mass appraisal approved by the real estate appraisal board appointed by the governor pursuant to K.S.A. 58-4104, and amendments thereto, except that no course substitution shall be permitted for the Kansas property tax law course and the personal property course. Course substitution shall be subject to the approval of the secretary of revenue.

(c) The remaining course hours may be selected from courses offered by an appraisal sponsor of the appraisal foundation or the director of property valuation. Appraisal foundation means the appraisal foundation established on November 30, 1987, as a not-for-profit corporation under the laws of Illinois. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 19-430, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 126, § 33; effective, T-93-8-29-97, Aug. 29, 1997; effective Dec. 5, 1997.)

93-6-3. Continuing education requirements. (a)(1) In order to retain the RMA designation, the RMA shall successfully complete a minimum of 120 hours of continuing education every four years. "Hour," as used in this regulation, shall mean one clock hour of not less than 50 minutes.

(2) No fewer than 90 hours of continuing education shall be completed during the relevant four-year period. No more than 30 hours may be carried forward from one four-year period to the next four-year period.

(b) The continuing education hours shall be the same as those established by the director of property valuation for an eligible Kansas appraiser under the provisions of K.S.A. 19-432, and amendments thereto; however, it shall be mandatory that the RMA complete the IAAO standards and ethics course or equivalent course approved by the secretary of revenue and the Kansas property tax law course once every four years. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 19-430, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 126, § 33; effective, T-93-8-29-97, Aug. 29, 1997; effective Dec. 5, 1997.)

93-6-4. Experience requirements. (a) A candidate for the RMA certification shall have 6,000 hours of mass appraisal experience. "Hour," as used in this regulation, shall mean 60 minutes.

(b) Of the required 6,000 hours of mass appraisal experience, the candidate shall document a minimum of 2,000 hours of experience in establishing values on property for ad valorem taxation purposes, of which no more than 400 hours may be obtained from establishing values on personal property. The experience may include neighborhood analysis, land valuation, model building and testing, sales validation, income validation, and final review. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 19-430, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 126, § 33; effective, T-93-8-29-97, Aug. 29, 1997; effective Dec. 5, 1997.)

93-6-5. Case study requirements. A candidate for the RMA designation shall successfully complete both a residential case study and a commercial case study, each of which shall have a four-hour time limit. A candidate may attempt to successfully complete each case study twice within a six-month time period. If a candidate fails in two attempts to complete either or both case studies, the candidate shall wait six months after the date of each failed retake before attempting to complete each failed case study again. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 19-430, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 126, § 33; effective, T-93-8-29-97, Aug. 29, 1997; effective Dec. 5, 1997.)

93-6-6. Reciprocity. A candidate for the RMA designation who has completed one or more case studies as a prerequisite for obtaining a professional designation from an appraisal sponsor of the appraisal foundation may file an application with the secretary of revenue to waive either or both of the case study requirements of K.A.R. 93-6-5. Either or both of the case study requirements of K.A.R. 93-6-5 may be waived by the secretary of revenue upon finding that the candidate has completed a case study that is comparable to the case study sought to be waived. 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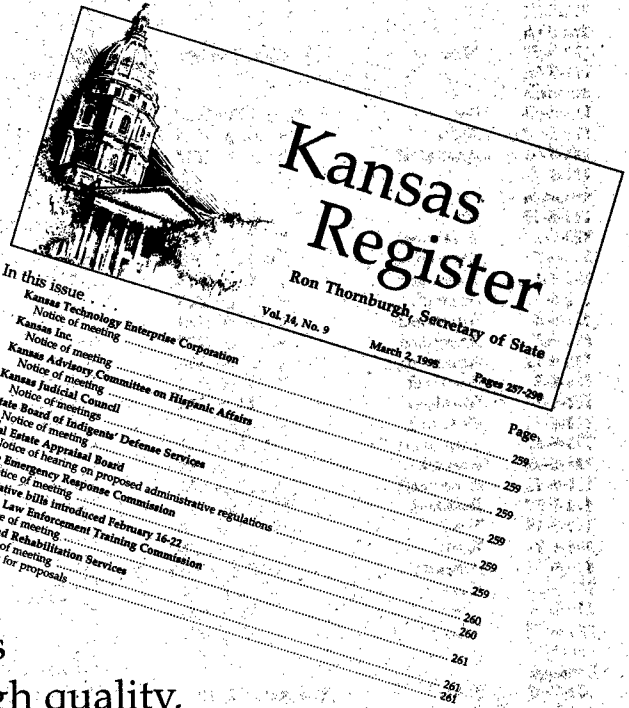
