Administrative Regulations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Environment, Bureau of Air and Radiation, will conduct a public hearing at 10 a.m. Tuesday, March 10, in the Johnson County northeast offices, 6000 Lamar, Room C, Mission, to consider the adoption of proposed amendments to existing air quality regulation K.A.R. 28-19-70 and the adoption of proposed new K.A.R. 28-19-564. K.A.R. 28-19-70 applies to gasoline delivery vessels operating in Wyandotte and Johnson counties. Proposed new K.A.R. 28-19-564 applies to certain stationary sources throughout the state that are required to obtain operating permits. A summary of the proposed amended and new regulations and their economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 28-19-70. This regulation establishes controls on emissions of volatile organic compounds (VOCs) from gasoline delivery vessels (GDVs) operating in the previously designated ozone nonattainment areas in Wyandotte and Johnson counties. VOCs are precursors of ozone formation in the lower atmosphere. One requirement of this regulation is that GDVs must be tested annually for leaks of VOCs. The proposed revisions would expand the time period for this testing from May 1 through July 1 of each year to January 1 through May 31 to facilitate compliance. The existing period for testing is too short given the number of GDVs operating in the area relative to the number of testing facilities. Additional changes to the regulation are made to improve grammar, organization, and other elements of the regulation.

K.A.R. 28-19-564. This proposed new regulation establishes a permit option for qualifying stationary sources that do not emit air pollutants at a level greater than specified percentages of the major source threshold, are willing to limit their emissions to a level less than those percentages, and that submit an application pursuant to this regulation. Sources subject to the operating permit requirements that elect to operate under an authorization issued pursuant to this regulation will benefit through reduced paperwork burdens, while limiting emissions to levels having minimal significance for air quality in the state.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulatory action. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Ralph J. Kieffer, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, 66620. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed regulatory action during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to require each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Notice to Private Activity Bond Applicants

Applications for allocation of 1998 Private Activity Bond (PAB) authority are now being accepted for qualified uses, as defined by the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, and amendments thereto.

The State of Kansas currently receives \$150 million of federal authority for the issuance of PABs on an annual basis. Historically, the primary uses of this federal authority have included "qualified small issue bonds" used for construction and equipping of manufacturing facilities and beginning farmer programs; "exempt facility bonds" used by for-profit entities providing a public benefit, i.e., certain waste treatment facilities, qualified residential rental facilities, etc.; and "qualified mortgage bonds" issued to benefit first-time homebuyers. Allocations awarded by the Secretary of Commerce and Housing are subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 74-5060 *et seq.* and the limitations of the state volume cap.

Fees associated with private activity bond application and issuance are as follows:

(1) Application fee—A nonrefundable fee must accompany the application before the request can be processed. The application fee is determined as follows:

- \$250—allocation request up to \$5,000,000
- \$500—allocation request from \$5,000,001 to \$10,000,000
- \$1,000—allocation request of \$10,000,001 and above

(2) Issuance Fee—An issuance fee for allocation amounts utilized, other than "Qualified Mortgage Bonds," shall be due and payable to the Kansas Department of Commerce and Housing at bond closing. Issuance fees shall be determined as follows.

Allocation Used	Fee
• \$0-\$2,000,000	5 basis points (.05%)
• \$2,000,001 and Above	10 basis points (.10%)
• "Qualified Mortgage Bond" programs will be assessed a fee equal to .5% of the mortgage loan amount upon issuance of each mortgage loan assisted through the program.	

Issuance fees shall be remitted within 30 days of bond closing.

Checks for both the application fee and issuance fee should be payable to the Kansas Department of Commerce and Housing Bond Fee Fund.

Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, March 3, in the office of the Kansas Animal Health Department, 708 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed rules and regulations of the Kansas Livestock Commissioner, Animal Health Department.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to George Teagarden, Livestock Commissioner, 708 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66603. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting George Teagarden at (785) 296-2326. There is no designated handicapped parking on the block. Passengers can unload in the loading zone directly in front of the office. The office is at street level and is wheelchair accessible.

Summaries of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follow.

Article 7.—MOVEMENT OF LIVESTOCK INTO
OR THROUGH KANSAS

K.A.R. 9-7-10. Livestock for exhibition purposes. The amendment to K.A.R. 9-7-10 exempts rodeo stock from the normal requirements for livestock moved into the state for exhibition purposes. This regulation primarily addresses animals brought into the state for livestock shows. These animals may be brought in with a health paper showing the animal has met importation requirements for that particular species. Rodeo stock, which move between states, have more stringent entry requirements. The proposed amendment is not expected to have an economic impact on the department, the public or other state agencies.

Article 10.—PUBLIC LIVESTOCK MARKETS

K.A.R. 9-10-33 through 9-10-39. Livestock injured, disabled or unfit for sale. Definitions, notice, procedures, diseases or conditions that shall render livestock unfit for sale at public livestock markets, injuries that shall render livestock unfit for sale at public livestock markets, euthanasia and disposal of euthanized carcasses. These regulations implement L. 1997, ch. 129, Sec. 2(e), which requires the livestock commissioner to promulgate rules and regulations necessary to enforce amendments to K.S.A. 47-1008 that prevent the sale of dying, diseased or disabled livestock at livestock markets.

K.A.R. 9-10-33 through 9-10-39 establish guidelines for examining, refusing or euthanizing livestock that are injured, disabled or unfit for sale. The regulations require every operator of a public livestock market to post and maintain signs that provide public notice regarding the examination of injured, disabled or unfit livestock by the market veterinarian and the veterinarian and the owners' responsibilities under the Act. The regulations set out specific diseases and injuries which render livestock unfit for sale at public livestock markets, establish euthanasia guidelines and address disposal of euthanized carcasses. The regulations give the examining veterinarian discretion to decide whether the animal will be sold, removed from the livestock market or euthanized. The veterinarian must make a reasonable attempt to contact the owner by phone or in person to discuss the disposition of the owner. If the owner does not remove the animal within 14 hours, the veterinarian may euthanize the animal.

There will be no cost to the agency, other governmental agencies or consumers. Private citizens who have dead, dying or diseased animals will no longer be able to sell these animals at the livestock markets. They will still be able to ship the animal directly to slaughter, should they wish to do so. Producers with animals that are euthanized will be required to pay for the cost of euthanization and disposal of the animals.

Permanent Administrative
Regulations

Article 2.—DEPOSITORY BANKS

122-2-2. Collateral. (a) Each state bank account shall be fully collateralized at all times based on securities, which may be accepted or rejected by the pooled money investment board, under K.S.A. 75-4201(k), and amendments thereto. Such securities shall be priced on a market value basis. The aggregate market value of the securities shall be sufficient to equal the outstanding amount of state funds deposited, plus accrued interest on the state funds, less federal deposit insurance coverage.

(b) The qualified depository institution shall ensure that deposits and accrued interest are always sufficiently collateralized. Sufficiency of collateral values shall be validated by the treasurer.

(c) Each qualified depository institution depositing securities with a custodial bank shall enter into a written custodial agreement with the custodial bank and the board for the safekeeping of the securities.

(d) Collateral based on corporate surety bonds as provided under K.S.A. 75-4201 shall be subject to the following requirements.

(1) The surety bonds shall be approved by the Kansas commissioner of insurance and shall be in a standard format approved by the treasurer.

(2) The issuer of the surety bond shall be admitted and licensed to issue surety bonds in Kansas.

(3) The treasurer shall be designated as the insured public depositor.

(4) The issuer and the qualified depository institution shall notify the treasurer by certified or registered mail no fewer than 90 days before nonrenewal and no fewer than 45 days before cancellation of a surety bond.

(5) The ability of the issuer to pay claims shall be rated and shall remain rated in the highest rating category of one of the nationally recognized rating agencies, as specified by written policy of the board. Within 48 hours of discovery of a downgrade of an issuer by a rating agency or notice of financial regulatory action by any jurisdiction in which the issuer is licensed, the issuer shall notify the treasurer by certified or registered mail.

(6) The amount of collateral provided in the form of surety bonds by a qualified depository and the amount of total state deposits that may be collateralized in the form of surety bonds shall be limited as provided by written policy of the board.

(7) The issuer shall send quarterly reports to the treasurer, listing all Kansas banks that have purchased a surety bond as collateral for deposits, the insured amount covering deposits of the treasurer, and the total insured amount per qualified depository institution in the state of Kansas, noting the retainage and reinsured amounts for each qualified depository institution.

(e) The following requirements shall apply to collateral based on a letter of credit issued by a United States sponsored enterprise that under federal law may be accepted as security for public funds.

(1) The letter of credit shall be in a format approved by the treasurer.

(2) The treasurer shall be designated as the irrevocable and unconditional beneficiary of the letter of credit.

(3) The issuer and the qualified depository institution shall notify the treasurer by certified or registered mail no fewer than 45 days before cancellation or nonrenewal of a letter of credit.

(4) The securities of the issuer shall be rated, and shall remain rated, in the highest rating category of one of the nationally recognized rating agencies, as specified by written policy of the board. Within 48 hours of discovery of a downgrade of an issuer by a rating agency, the issuer shall give notice to the treasurer by certified or registered mail.

(5) The issuer shall not provide letters of credit for any qualified depository institution in an amount that exceeds 10% of the issuer's capital and surplus. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 75-4232; implementing K.S.A. 75-4201, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 180, §21 and K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 75-4218, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 180, §27; effective, T-122-7-27-95, July 27, 1995; effective Nov. 17, 1995; amended Jan. 24, 1997; amended Jan. 16, 1998.)

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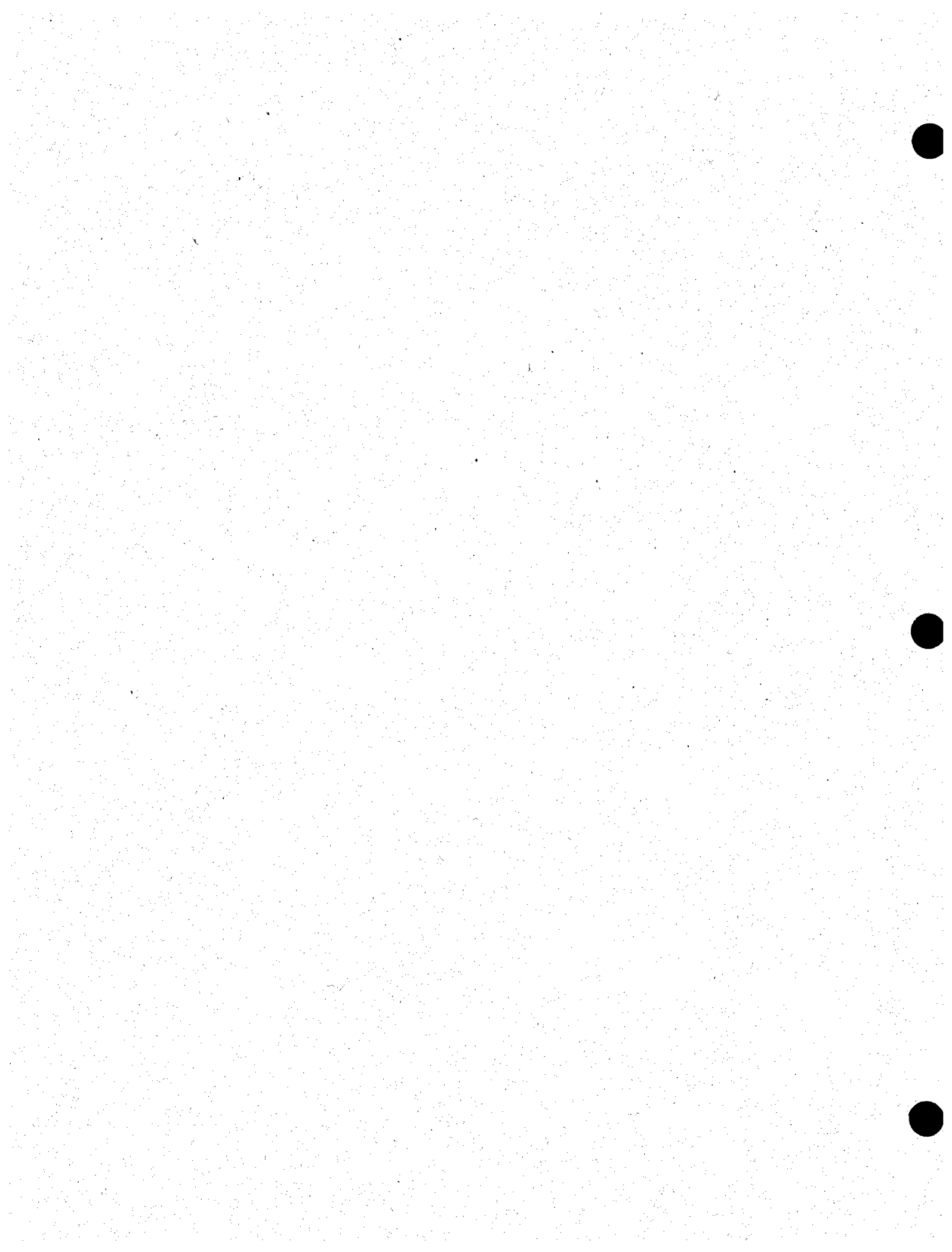
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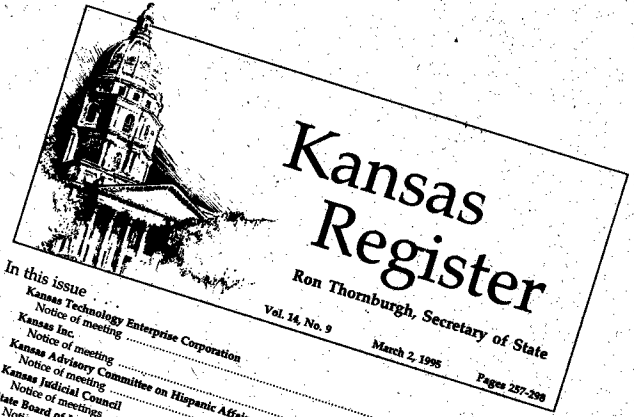
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
