The Secretary of the U.S. Department of Labor is authorized to grant both statutory and regulatory waivers of the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA), Titles I-III, for a period of one program year beginning July 1, 1998. The waivers are intended to increase flexibility to states and local areas in implementing reforms to the workforce development system in exchange for increased state and local accountability for improved performance. It also is an important opportunity for states and localities to begin to organize services into a workforce development system through one-stop career centers, which enhance the training and employment opportunities available to adults and youth.

The Kansas Department of Human Resources has cooperated with local Private Industry Councils, local elected officials and other interested parties to develop a Kansas application for waivers. The purpose of this notice is to obtain public comment on the proposed waivers. The waiver plan contains a summary of the requested JTPA waivers, the legislative and regulatory citation, the barrier which the request addresses and the outcome that will be achieved by the granting of the waivers.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Friday, March 20, in the conference room at the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission office, 3400 Van Buren, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission. This 60-day notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on these proposed regulations.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission, 3400 Van Buren, Topeka, 66611-2228, (785) 296-5800.

A copy of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statements may be reviewed or obtained at the commission office. The following is a summary of the proposed amendments:

K.A.R. 112-4-1, Occupation licenses. Subsection (c) was amended to reflect that employers must comply with the workers compensation act of the State of Kansas. This amendment will ensure that the licensing process will not be delayed if the employer does not have a copy of the

workers compensation insurance rider with them at the time of licensing.

Subsection (d) was amended to allow the trainer to appoint a person to act as an authorized agent and perform duties for the owner or trainer subject to the authorized agent agreement form.

The language in subsection (j) was amended to reflect that a computer check of license records from other racing jurisdictions be run annually on licensees.

In addition, subsection (l) was amended to state that each licensed trainer or assistant trainer at a racetrack facility be 18 years of age.

Economic Impact: The commission bears the expense of running a computer check of license records from other racing jurisdictions on each licensee, which is done on an annual basis. The commission joined the North American Pari-Mutuel Regulators Association (NAPRA), which was incorporated in 1997, and paid \$9,534 for its initial membership and start up fee for 1997. The commission also bears the expense of administrative processing of licenses, validation forms and validation stickers as well as administrative costs for processing fingerprint cards. No additional administrative costs in excess of budgeted amounts are expected.

K.A.R. 112-7-7, Entries. The amendment to this regulation is intended to ensure that no horse entries at a race meeting will be taken from unlicensed persons.

Economic Impact: There are no costs anticipated to the agency or to other governmental agencies or units. The entry fee is paid by the owner. Each licensee will bear the expense of purchasing an occupation license, which ranges anywhere from \$3 to \$75. The licensee also pays a \$41 fee for one set of fingerprint cards.

K.A.R. 112-4-22, Licensing required. The amendment to this regulation grants authority for assistant trainers to apply for a 30-day license on behalf of an absentee horse owner and to pay the required application fees. In addition, the amendment gives the commission the authority to penalize the assistant trainer in addition to the trainer or absentee owner if a permanent horse owner's license is not secured within 30 days. Previous to this amendment only the trainer could apply for a 30-day license.

Economic Impact: There are no costs anticipated to the agency or to other governmental agencies or units. Each licensee will bear the expense of purchasing an occupation license, which ranges anywhere from \$3 to \$75. The licensee also pays a \$41 fee for one set of fingerprint cards. The fee for a temporary license is \$25 plus \$41 for fingerprinting, if required.

K.A.R. 112-4-22a, Registrations required. This is a new regulation that requires registration of horse multiple ownership entities and permits the temporary registration of those entities.

Economic Impact: There are no costs anticipated to the agency or to other governmental agencies or units. No fees are charged for temporary registrations.

Sealed proposals for construction work in Pratt County, Kansas, known as **Landfill Earthwork-Phase 2 Project No. 55-97613-3-179**, will be received at the county clerk's office, Pratt County Courthouse, Pratt, KS 67124, until 10 a.m. February 2, and then publicly opened at 11:30 a.m. The project to be constructed or improved is briefly described as follows:

Construct new roadway involving excavation, embankment, with 8 inch thick bituminous pavement surface 32 feet wide (with 5 foot wide aggregate shoulders each side) and 1,412 feet long, and one 24 inch diameter pipe culvert with 2 end sections (indicated as Road A). Construct new roadway involving excavation, embankment, with 2 inch thick light type surfacing 32 feet wide and 1,016 feet long, and one 18 inch diameter pipe culvert with 2 end sections (indicated as Road B). All roadway embankment compaction to be Modified Proctor (93%). Construct new initial landfill cell and leachate retainage pond involving 181,321 in-place cubic yards, the majority of which will be stockpiled on site, and 28,600 square yards of Modified Proctor compaction (87%) of landfill cell MSW contact surface. All excess clay soil shall be stockpiled west of the initial landfill cell, and all excess topsoil shall be stockpiled north of the initial landfill cell.

Proposals must be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check, or bid bond with a surety licensed in the State of Kansas and acceptable to the county clerk, in an amount to be at least 5 percent of the proposal. Checks are to be made payable to the County Clerk of Pratt County, Kansas, and drawn on a solvent Kansas bank. These checks are to be retained by the county clerk until the contract for the project shall have been awarded and are a guarantee that if awarded the contract, the bidder will enter a contract and give bonds as required.

Notice of Hearing

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Air and Radiation, will conduct a public hearing at 10 a.m. Thursday, February 19, in the Johnson County northeast offices, 6000 Lamar, Room C, Mission, to receive public comment on specific proposed changes to the Kansas State Air Quality Implementation Plan (SIP). The SIP implements the state's air quality program under the federal Clean Air Act to assure and maintain the ambient air quality in the state in compliance with the national ambient air quality standards. That portion of the SIP being revised is the Ozone Maintenance Plan for the Kansas segment of the Kansas City metropolitan area's ozone planning area, which includes Johnson and Wyandotte counties in Kansas.

Under the federal Clean Air Act, national ambient air quality standards for certain pollutants have been promulgated by the federal U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. One of the specific pollutants for which a standard has been promulgated is ozone. Kansas City has experienced problems with ozone levels that have approached and occasionally exceeded the national standard. These past problems have resulted in the state being required to submit specific revisions to the Kansas State Implementation Plan to address the ozone problem. These SIP revisions describe the state strategies for maintaining air quality in compliance with the national ozone standard. Most recently, in 1995, the Kansas City Metropolitan Area experienced a violation of the ozone standard that triggered the requirement to implement additional control measures and to revise the SIP. The proposed changes to the SIP include an update of data for Kansas City metropolitan area; contingency measures

for implementation in the event of additional violations of the standard; and measures to be implemented in Kansas City in response to the exceedances of the ozone standard during the summer of 1995.

A hearing on this proposed SIP revision was held May 20, 1997. Since that public hearing, the Missouri Air Conservation Commission rejected a provision in the SIP presented for hearing by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) related to a motor vehicle emissions control program, and remanded the SIP back to the MDNR for revisions. As a result, the Mid-America Regional Council has recommended changes to the regional ozone strategy to include reformulated gasoline (RFG) as a control measure. In response to those recommendations, KDHE is proposing revisions to the Kansas SIP presented for comment on May 20, 1997, to include RFG as a control measure for implementation via the year 2000 transitional plan prior to the ozone season in year 2001. Revisions also are being proposed to modify the focus of the motor vehicle emissions reduction program being proposed to emphasize the collection of technical data on motor vehicle emissions and public education. This hearing is being held for the purpose of receiving comment on these proposed revisions.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed SIP revisions. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Ralph J. Kieffer, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, 66620. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed SIP changes during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to require each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Article 18.—SIMULCASTING LICENSES

112-18-21. Election and recognition of recognized greyhound owners' group. (a) Each recognized greyhound owners' group for each racetrack facility licensed by the Kansas racing and gaming commission shall be elected pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8802(ee), and amendments thereto.

(b) Each recognized greyhound owners' group shall be duly recognized by the commission before assuming any duties concerning the approval of any simulcast schedule proposed by an organization licensee.

(c) Only one group for greyhound owners as appropriate for each race meeting shall be recognized by the commission for the purpose of serving at each racetrack facility.

(d) Each recognized greyhound owners' group shall be responsible for the following:

(1) negotiating agreements pertaining to simulcast license applications;

(2) signing simulcast license applications pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8836(d)(2), and amendments thereto; and

(3) determining how the 50 percent of the balance of the simulcast takeout remaining after the deduction of taxes and expenses to be used for purses is to be distributed pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8836(g)(3) & (4), and amendments thereto.

(e) Each recognized greyhound owners' group shall consist of five individuals elected in accordance with this regulation.

(f) Elections for recognized greyhound owners' groups shall commence August 1 of each odd-numbered year unless held sooner pursuant to the provisions of subsection (k) of this regulation.

(g) Except as otherwise provided in this regulation or by commission order, each member of a greyhound owners' group shall serve a term of two years, commencing on October 1 of the year in which the recognized greyhound owners' group is elected, and ending on September 30 of the next odd-numbered year or until the member's successor has been duly elected and recognized by the commission after the commission is presented with a petition in accordance with subsection (k) of this regulation.

(h) To be eligible to vote in the election process at the racetrack facility where the recognized greyhound owners' group is to serve, a voter shall have been a licensed greyhound owner or kennel owner participating as an owner on and after December 1 of the year before the election and through July 31 of the election year, and shall have raced at that racetrack facility on and after January 1 and through July 31 of the election year.

(i) The procedure for conducting an election of a recognized greyhound owners' group shall be as follows.

(1) On August 1 of each odd-numbered year, the commission or its designee, if any, pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8802(ee), and amendments thereto, shall post conspicuously a notice of elections to be held for a recognized greyhound owners' group for the racetrack facility in question. The notice shall be posted throughout each racetrack facility, including the following:

(A) the racing office;

(B) the commission offices; and

(C) any other places greyhound owners are known to congregate. Notice of elections to be held may also be published in one or more greyhound parimutuel industry publications at the commission's direction.

(2) On August 1 of each odd-numbered year, the commission or its designee, if any, pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8802(ee), and amendments thereto, shall mail the notice of elections to be held by depositing the notice in the United States mail, first-class postage prepaid, to each eligible voter at the eligible voter's last known address appearing in the records of the Kansas racing and gaming commission.

(3) The commission or its designee, if any, pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8802(ee), and amendments thereto, shall make available nominating petitions for distribution to any eligible voter upon request in the Kansas racing and gaming commission office. The nominating petitions shall be in a form approved by the commission for the purpose of nominating individuals to stand for election to a recognized greyhound owners' group. The nominating petitions shall contain a statement signed by the nominee that the nominee agrees to these conditions:

(A) to serve as a member of the recognized group for which the nominee is standing for election;

(B) to be reasonably available to attend meetings of the recognized group for which the nominee is standing for election;

(C) to bargain in good faith as a member of the recognized group for which the nominee is standing for election; and

(D) to obtain the signatures of three other eligible voters on the nominating petition.

(4) Nominating petitions for election to a recognized greyhound owners' group shall be returned to the Kansas racing and gaming commission office in Topeka by twelve o'clock noon of the third Friday following the first Monday in August following the posting of the notice of election required by subsection (i)(1) of this regulation.

(5) After the close of the nominating period prescribed in subsection (i)(4) of this regulation, the nominating petitions shall be reviewed by commission staff or its designee, if any, pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8802(ee), and amendments thereto, in accordance with procedures approved by the commission to confirm the following:

(A) that the signatures on the nominating petitions appear on the list of eligible voters in the records of the Kansas racing and gaming commission; and

(B) that the required number of signatures of eligible voters has been received by each nominee.

(6) Once the nominating petitions have been processed by the commission staff or its designee, if any, pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8802(ee), and amendments thereto, a ballot shall be prepared by the commission that shall include the following:

(A) a list of names of the duly nominated persons standing for election to the recognized group;

(B) a serial number;

(C) a statement that the voter shall vote for no more than five nominees;

(D) a statement that the five nominees receiving the highest number of votes from those voting in the election shall be elected to serve as the recognized greyhound owners' group for the racetrack facility at which the election is being conducted for the term provided in subsection (g) of this regulation;

(E) a statement that if one or more of the members elected to the recognized greyhound owners' group resigns or for any other reason fails to complete the term of service as provided in subsection (g) of this regulation, then the member or members shall be replaced by the nominee or nominees having received the next highest number of votes from those voting in the election. The nominee or nominees shall serve out the remainder of the term for any member or members who failed to complete the member's or members' term; and

(F) a statement that proxy voting shall not be permitted.

(7) The commission or its designee, if any, pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-8802(ee), and amendments thereto, shall, on or before September 1 of each odd-numbered year following the preparation of the ballots as prescribed by subsection (i)(6) of this regulation, meet these requirements:

(A) conspicuously post copies of the ballot clearly and indelibly marked "SAMPLE" throughout each racetrack facility, including the following:

(i) the racing office;

(ii) the commission offices; and

(iii) any other places greyhound owners are known to congregate; and

(B) mail official ballots to each voter who is eligible to vote, by depositing the ballot in the United States mail, first-class postage prepaid, to each voter's last known ad-

dress as shown in the records of the Kansas racing and gaming commission.

(8) Ballots shall be returned to the Kansas racing and gaming commission office in Topeka by twelve o'clock noon of the third Friday following the first Monday in September following the posting of the sample ballot as required by subsection (i)(7)(A) of this regulation.

(9) On the Wednesday following the deadline set out in subsection (i)(8) above, the commission chairman, executive director, and general counsel shall convene an open meeting at the commission offices and count the ballots.

(10) In the event of a tie in the number of votes received by one or more nominees, lots shall be cast to settle the election results.

(11) Ten days following the counting of the ballots or as soon thereafter as the commission meeting schedule will permit, the commission shall execute a certificate of election to each of the five nominees receiving the highest number of votes designating those nominees as duly elected members of a recognized greyhound owners' group having been elected in accordance with this regulation.

(j) Within 10 days following the counting of the ballots in any election held pursuant to this regulation, any commission staff member, nominee, or eligible voter may file a sworn complaint with the commission concerning the conduct in any election held pursuant to this regulation. The commission shall, upon the receipt of a complaint, commence a hearing in accordance with the Kansas administrative procedure act, K.S.A. 77-501 et seq. The filing of a complaint with the commission concerning the conduct in an election held pursuant to this regulation shall not impair or inhibit the duly elected recognized group from functioning, pending resolution of the complaint.

(k) No election for a recognized greyhound owners' group that is conducted within 24 months of a prior election shall be recognized by the commission, except upon the filing of a petition with the commission to conduct a new election signed by at least 30 percent of the number of eligible voters that actually voted in the preceding election.

(l) Upon receipt of a petition for a new election signed by the required number of voters set out in subsection (k) above, an election for a new recognized greyhound owners' group shall be conducted by the commission as soon as practicable in accordance with this regulation.

(m) The terms of members of a recognized greyhound owners' group elected in calendar year 1996 shall expire in accordance with the provisions of subsection (g) of this regulation, and the commission shall commence election proceedings in accordance with the provisions of subsection (f), which shall not be subject to the provisions of subsection (k) above. Constitution of the State of Kansas—Education—State Board of Education; Local Public Schools; General Supervision; Maintenance, Development and Operation of Local Schools; Edison Project; Constitutionality. Senator Anthony Hensley, 19th District, Topeka, December 3, 1997.

The State Board of Education (state board) is authorized pursuant to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Kansas Constitution to provide general supervision of public schools, educational institutions, and all the educational interests of the state, except educational functions delegated by law to the State Board of Regents. The term "general supervision" means something more than to advise and confer with, but something less than to control. Under the concept set forth in the agreement between Unified School District No. 259 and Edison Project, L.P., the state board would continue to be in a position in which the state board would be able to provide general supervision of the schools operated on behalf of U.S.D. 259 by Edison. A unified school district would be deemed to be operating public schools within the school district in accordance with Section 5 of Article 6 of the Kansas Constitution when it has entered into an agreement whereby another entity would tend to the performance of functions necessary for conducting the school district's educational program. The concept set forth in the agreement between U.S.D. 259 and Edison, as expressed herein, would not violate Section 5 of Article 6 of the Kansas Constitution. Cited herein: Kan. Const., Art. 2, § 16; Kan. Const., Art. 6, §§ 2, 5. RDS.

Public Health—Secretary of Health and Environment, Activities; Laboratory Testing—Employer Drug Testing; Approved Laboratory. Senator Sandy Praeger, 2nd District, Lawrence, December 3, 1997.

An employer who uses on-site drug testing kits to test for controlled substances for employee management purposes is not a "person" or "laboratory" within the meaning of K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-1,108. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-1,107; 65-1,108; L. 1988, Ch. 233, § 2; L. 1947, Ch. 330, § 4; K.A.R. 28-33-12. DMV

Opinion No. 97-97

Taxation—Property Valuation, Equalizing Assessments, Appraisers and Assessment of Property—Clas-

sification of Certain Commercial and Industrial Machinery and Equipment; Personal Property That, Once Installed or Constructed, Will be Commercial and Industrial Machinery or Equipment. Mark S. Beck, Director, Division of Property Valuation, Department of Revenue, Topeka, December 9, 1997.

K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 79-1439c does not impose a use requirement for classification of property as commercial and industrial machinery and equipment, but merely clarifies that portion of Article 11, Section 1(a), Class 2(5) which specifies how such property is to be valued and assessed when it has depreciated below 20 percent of its retail cost when new. Thus, commercial and industrial equipment that otherwise meets the criteria for classification as such does not become "other" property to be valued at fair market and assessed at a different rate merely because it is not yet in operation. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 79-1439c; Kan. Const., Art. 11, § 1. JLM

State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Public Employees Retirement Systems; Kansas Police and Firemen's Retirement System—Definitions; Eligible Employers; Applications to Affiliate, Resolution, Employees Covered. Meredith Williams, Executive Secretary, Kansas Public Employees Retirement System, Topeka, December 11, 1997.

Because Shawnee County has already affiliated with the Kansas Police and Firemen's Retirement System (KP&F) for its eligible policemen, employees of the Shawnee County Department of Corrections could become KP&F members only if the Board of County Commissioners adds them to the county's group of participating policemen by officially designating them as being in support of law enforcement. The statutes do not provide for the ability of the county to make a separate application for affiliation to bring employees of its Department of Corrections under KP&F. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-4952; K.S.A. 74-4954. DMV

Consumer Credit Code—Finance Charges and Related Provisions; Consumer Loans; Maximum Finance Charges—Rates Not Applicable to Certain Real Estate Mortgages.

Contracts and Promises—Interest and Charges—Contract Rate; Application to Real Estate Mortgages. William F. Caton, Commissioner, Office of the Consumer Credit Commissioner, Topeka, December 19, 1997.

The interest rate applicable to second and subordinate mortgage loans made by a lender who is not the first mortgagee is governed by K.S.A. 16-207 unless the parties provide in the loan agreement that the Uniform Consumer Credit Code (code) interest rates apply. For first mortgage lenders who are not subject to the code but who want to avail themselves of the higher code interest rates, the loan agreement should state that the loan transaction is subject to the provisions of the code and the code interest rates. Citing specifically to K.S.A. 16a-2-401 is recommended but is not required provided the loan agree-

ment is clear that the code interest rates apply. Cited herein: K.S.A. 16-207; 16a-1-109; K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 16a-1-301; K.S.A. 16a-2-401. MF

Schools—School Unification Acts—School District Expenditures Over \$10,000; Requirements Relating to Bids and Bidders. Representative Tim Shallenburger, 1st District, Baxter Springs, December 19, 1997.

A unified school district may not conditionally accept the bid of the lowest responsible bidder submitting a sealed proposal for an expenditure exceeding \$10,000 for a construction project, and then negotiate with the lowest responsible bidder in an attempt to bring the construction project within the school district's estimated budget for the building project. Cited herein: K.S.A. 72-6760. RDS

Criminal Procedure; Kansas Code of Criminal Procedure—Sex Offender Registration—Kansas Offender Registration Act; Registration of Juveniles.

Criminal Procedure; Kansas Code of Criminal Procedure—Criminal History Record Information—Extended Jurisdiction Juvenile Prosecution.

Minors—Kansas Juvenile Offenders Code—Juvenile Offender Information System; Extended Jurisdiction Juvenile Prosecution. Larry Welch, Director, Kansas Bureau of Investigation, Topeka, December 31, 1997.

When a juvenile offender is required by a diversion agreement or probation order to register under the Kansas Offender Registration Act, the registration information is open to the public. Further, a juvenile who is found guilty in an extended jurisdiction juvenile prosecution has a conviction that must be recorded in the criminal justice information system central repository because a conviction is a reportable event pursuant to K.S.A. 22-4705(a)(5). The Kansas Offender Registration Act requires persons who are "offenders" as defined by the Act to comply with its provisions. "Offender" is defined to include any person who is convicted of the offenses listed in the Act. A juvenile who is found guilty in an extended jurisdiction juvenile prosecution proceeding has a conviction for the offense charged and if, as a result of the

conviction, the juvenile falls within the parameters of the Kansas Offender Registration Act, the juvenile must comply with its provisions. A juvenile who is required to comply with the Kansas Offender Registration Act must provide information that includes offenses committed and, if the juvenile was convicted of the offense(s), the juvenile must include the dates of any convictions. 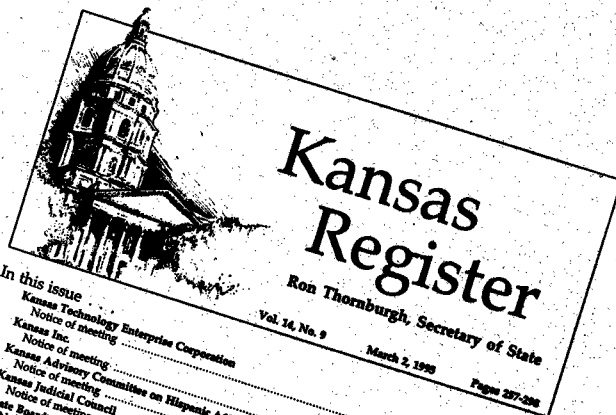
