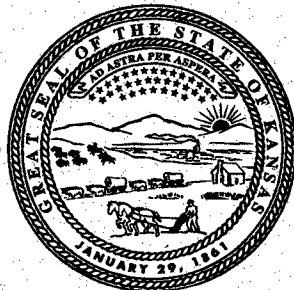

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Friday, April 17, at the Greyhound Hall of Fame, 309 S. Buckeye, Abilene, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission. This 60-day notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission, 3400 Van Buren, Topeka, 66611-2228, (785) 296-5800.

A copy of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statements may be reviewed or obtained at the commission office. The following is a summary of the proposed amendments.

K.A.R. 112-4-23, Conduct. This regulation amendment expands the definition for conduct to include other individuals at the racetrack facility who may not be cussed at or otherwise abused to include licensees extending the courtesy to fellow occupational licensees as well as race officials.

Economic Impact: There are no costs anticipated to the agency or to other governmental agencies or units as a result of this regulation.

K.A.R. 112-16-11, Orders. Subsection (c) was amended to change the automatic stay to a discretionary stay by striking "shall" and replacing it with "may," which will require a request from the respondent that a penalty be stayed pending appeal and a determination by the presiding officer as to whether or not to stay the penalty. This has been an issue in the past because of the shortness of horse meets in particular and the shortness of the time frame involved in dealing with simplified hearings. This amendment will make the regulation uniform and in compliance with K.S.A. 74-8816(h), K.S.A. 77-528 and K.A.R. 112-16-14(a).

Economic Impact: There are no costs anticipated to the agency or to other governmental agencies or units as a result of this regulation. Respondents have the right to be represented by counsel at their own expense. Costs for such representation are impossible to estimate.

Notice of Available Funding

The Juvenile Justice Authority and the Kansas Advisory Group on Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention announce that funds under the Title II program of the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act will soon be available. The purpose of the Title II grant program is to promote improvements in the juvenile justice system and community-based strategies for the reduction of juvenile delinquency and related problems.

Programs

Grants will be made available under several Title II program areas. Priorities for programs and services during the 1998 funding cycle fall under four categories:

- Disproportionate Minority Confinement
- Alternatives to Incarceration/Detention
- Delinquency Prevention
- Serious Crime

All funds will be awarded to applicants who propose programs based on these four categories and who are consistent with the Comprehensive Strategy for Serious, Chronic and Violent Offenders. Priority programs include all those that help to develop a comprehensive continuum of care and accountability-based sanctions, in keeping with reform initiatives.

Eligibility

Under the Title II program, any community-based service provider organization or unit of government is eligible to apply for funds. However, funding of any local private agency is permitted only if such agency requests such funds after it has been denied funding by any unit of general local government or combination thereof. Documentation of denial of local funding is required from private agencies in order to be considered. Multi-jurisdictional projects and other collaborative approaches are encouraged.

Funding

Projects will be awarded for 12 months. Successful applicants may reapply for funding beyond the grant period; however, additional funding is not guaranteed and the same competitive process will be required. For this grant cycle there is \$392,000 available. Grants will be awarded July 1, 1998, for the funding period ending June 30, 1999.

Application Process

Prospective applicants are asked to submit a complete OJJDP grant application to the Juvenile Justice Specialist. Applications require complete information detailing the project proposal, including budget, organizational capability and goals and objectives. The period for receipt of applications will remain open until April 15.

Public Health—Uniform Vital Statistics Act—Copies of Death Certificates. Mack Smith, Executive Secretary, State Board of Mortuary Arts, Topeka, January 5, 1998.

K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-2422d(g) does not prohibit copying of birth or death certificates as long as the copy contains a clear indication on its face that it does not purport to be a reliable copy. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-2422; K.S.A. 65-2434. SP

Opinion No. 98-2

Public Health—Secretary of Health and Environment, Activities; Water Supply and Sewage—Prevention of Water Pollution; Standards; Permits, Confined Animal Feeding Operations. Representative Douglas Johnston, 92nd District, Wichita, January 29, 1998.

The federal requirements of a national pollutant discharge elimination system (NPDES) permit may be enforced by either the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) or the State of Kansas; however, only the state may enforce state requirements of an NPDES permit. Unless expressly defined in an NPDES permit, the word "prevent" would have its ordinary, common meaning. To require the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) to perform testing on wastewater lagoons of privately-owned confined animal feeding operations and to study the cumulative environmental impact of confined animal feeding operations, the Kansas Legislature would need to enact a statute that requires such testing and study and that authorizes KDHE officials to enter privately-owned land, as necessary, to conduct the testing and study.

K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-171d(e)(1) concerns pollution from oil and gas activities. The state confined animal feeding operation waste program regulates animal wastes as "sewage" rather than "refuse" under K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-171d(e)(1). The secretary of KDHE, the director of the Division of Environment of KDHE, the Attorney General, county attorneys and county boards of health have certain statutory duties and powers as discussed herein with respect to the contamination of soil or water caused by a confined animal feeding operation. When the provisions of an NPDES permit are violated, KDHE must exercise the remedies set forth in the Kansas NPDES permit program approved by the EPA under 33 U.S.C. § 1342. Wastewater treatment lagoons of confined animal feeding operations operating under an NPDES permit are precluded from regulation under the federal Solid Waste Disposal Act to the extent such regulation is inconsistent with the requirements of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act. monies by Municipal Judge; Disposition of Honorarium. Terry J. Solander, Garnett City Attorney, Garnett, January 29, 1998.

A municipal court judge may retain marriage honorariums received during times when the judge is not hearing cases. Moreover, K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 12-4118 is part of the Kansas Code of Procedure for Municipal Courts, which is nonuniform and, therefore, is subject to charter ordinance. Minors—Kansas Code for Care of Children—Child Under 18 Taken Into Custody by Law Enforcement; Duties of Law Enforcement and SRS. John Badger, Chief Counsel, Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, Topeka, January 29, 1998.

Kansas statutes do not grant law enforcement officers the power to place custody of children who appear to be in need of care with the secretary of the Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services; delivering children to persons or facilities designated by the secretary does not mean that the secretary has custody of those children. Moreover, a standing court order that automatically places all children taken into police custody in the custody of the secretary would violate K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 38-1528. Finally, if it is not possible for a court to issue an order immediately awarding custody of a child to the secretary in accordance with the requirements of K.S.A. 38-1542 and K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 38-1543, the court may issue a brief order that awards custody to the secretary with a more detailed order issued at a later date which contains the findings required by K.S.A. 38-1542 and K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 38-1543. Routine information submitted to the office of the State Bank Commissioner by state chartered banks notifying the commissioner of formation of a subsidiary is not information generated in making an investigation or examination and is not confidential information pursuant to K.S.A. 9-1712. Because no other exemption to the Kansas Open Records Act applies, such information is mandatorily open to the public. Notice of Available Funding

Applications for the Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Grant Program are currently available. This grant program was established by the Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988 and the Crime Control Act of 1990.

The State of Kansas will be awarded approximately \$5.414 million by the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance. These funds will be subgranted to Kansas criminal justice agencies to assist their efforts in combating illicit drug use and violent crime.

Cities, counties, state agencies, nonprofit organizations and Native American tribes are eligible to receive grant funding. Program areas for which applicants can apply include prevention, law enforcement, treatment, criminal interdiction, and criminal justice information systems improvement.

Applicants are required to provide at least 25 percent of the total amount requested (local matching funds). The percent of the local matching funds is contingent on the number of years a grant has been funded.

The Byrne grant allows for the possibility of four years of funding in a program area. Program areas are described in the grant application.

Grants operate on a reimbursement basis. The Kansas Criminal Justice Coordinating Council will reimburse subrecipients the federal portion for authorized expenditures. Reimbursements are processed monthly.

The grant award period will be from July 1, 1998 to June 30, 1999.

The deadline for application submission is 5 p.m. April 30 to the address listed below. Grant awards will be announced before June 30.

Article 52.—MEDICAL CARE FACILITIES

28-52-2. Incident reporting. (a) Each medical care facility shall identify a written form on which employees and health care providers shall report clinical care concerns to the risk manager, chief of staff, or administrator. The original or complete copy of the incident report shall be sent directly to the risk manager, chief of staff, or administrator, as authorized in the facility's risk management plan.

(b) The risk manager, chief of staff, or administrator shall acknowledge the receipt of each incident report in writing. This acknowledgment may be made in the following manner:

- (1) file stamping each report;
- (2) maintaining a chronological risk management reporting log;
- (3) signing or initialing each report in a consistent fashion; or
- (4) entering pertinent information into a computer database.

(c) Incident reports, investigational tools, minutes of risk management committees, and other documentation of clinical analysis for each reported incident shall be maintained by the facility for not less than one year following completion of the investigation. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-4922; effective Feb. 27, 1998.)

28-52-3. Risk management committee. (a) Each medical care facility shall designate one or more executive committees responsible for making and documenting standard-of-care determinations with respect to each incident report, pursuant to K.A.R. 28-52-2. The jurisdiction of each risk management committee shall be clearly delineated in the facility's risk management plan, as approved by the facility's governing body.

(b) The activities of each risk management committee shall be documented in its minutes at least quarterly, and this documentation shall demonstrate that the committee is exercising overall responsibility for standard-of-care determinations delegated by the committee to individual

clinical reviewers and subordinate committees. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-4922; effective Feb. 27, 1998.)

28-52-4. Standard-of-care determinations. (a) Each facility shall assure that analysis of patient care incidents complies with the definition of a "reportable incident" set forth at K.S.A. 65-4921. Each facility shall use categories to record its analysis of each incident, and those categories shall be in substantially the following form:

- (1) Standards of care met;
- (2) standards of care not met, but with no reasonable probability of causing injury;
- (3) standards of care not met, with injury occurring or reasonably probable; or
- (4) possible grounds for disciplinary action by the appropriate licensing agency.

(b) Each reported incident shall be assigned an appropriate standard-of-care determination under the jurisdiction of a designated risk management committee. Separate standard-of-care determinations shall be made for each involved provider and each clinical issue reasonably presented by the facts. Any incident determined by the designated risk management committee to meet category (a)(3) or (a)(4) shall be considered a "reportable incident" and reported to the appropriate licensing agency in accordance with K.S.A. 65-4923.

(c) Each standard-of-care determination shall be dated and signed by an appropriately credentialed clinician authorized to review patient care incidents on behalf of the designated committee. In those cases in which documented primary review by individual clinicians or subordinate committees does not occur, standard-of-care determinations shall be documented in the minutes of the designated committee on a case-specific basis. Standard-of-care determinations made by individual clinicians and subordinate committees shall be approved by the designated risk management committee on at least a statistical basis. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-4922; effective Feb. 27, 1998.)

Article 70.—CANCER REGISTRY

28-70-1. Definitions. (a) "Health care institution" means any of the following:

- (1) A hospital;
- (2) an outpatient surgery center;
- (3) a pathology laboratory; or
- (4) a radiation oncology center.

(b) "Individual provider" means a person licensed to practice medicine or surgery or a person licensed to practice dentistry.

(c) "Registry" means the cancer registry of the state of Kansas, as established by L. 1997, Ch. 110, Sec. 2 (a). (Authorized by and implementing L. 1997, Ch. 110, Sec. 2; effective Feb. 27, 1998.)

28-70-2. Reporting requirements. (a) Each health care institution shall, within six months of the date of diagnosis, report to the registry each case of cancer diagnosed or treated, unless exempted under subsection (c) of this regulation.

(1) Each report shall provide all required information available in the medical records that are under the direct

control of the reporting health care institution. A health care institution shall not be required to contact the patient, the patient's family, an individual provider, or another health care institution to obtain additional information not contained in the medical record.

(2) Any health care institution that has medical records of a cancer patient, but has not diagnosed or treated the cancer, shall provide information regarding that patient upon receipt of a written request from the registry.

(3) Each health care institution shall provide annual follow-up information regarding the outcome and status of each patient receiving cancer diagnostic or therapeutic services, upon receipt of a written request from the registry.

(4) Any pathology laboratory may submit a pathological report of each cancer to fulfill the laboratory's reporting equipment.

(b) Upon receipt of a request for information from the registry regarding a patient, each individual provider shall provide the requested information that is contained in medical records under the direct control of the provider.

(1) An individual provider shall not be required to report cancer cases, unless it receives a request for information from the registry regarding a specific patient.

(2) An individual provider shall not be required to contact the patient, the patient's family, a health care institution, or another individual provider to obtain additional information not contained in the medical record that is in the direct control of the provider.

(3) Each individual provider shall fulfill reporting requirements by completing any one of the following actions:

(A) Reporting to the registry the name of the hospital, outpatient surgery center, or radiation oncology center where the patient received cancer-related care;

(B) submitting, to the registry, copies of outpatient records, including surgical reports, cancer diagnostic reports, tumor histologic reports, and patient identification forms; or

(C) submitting a short form, supplied by the registry, that requests demographics, tumor histology and staging, patient identifiers, and names of treating institutions.

(c) Reports are not required for the following cancers:

(1) Squamous cell carcinoma of the skin, unless located on a lip of the face or in the genital area, or unless spread beyond local tissues at diagnosis;

(2) basal cell carcinoma of the skin, unless located on a lip of the face or in the genital areas, or unless spread beyond local tissues at diagnosis; and

(3) carcinoma in situ of the uterine cervix.

(d) Reports from health care institutions shall include the following information, if available:

(1) Patient demographics;

(2) diagnostic results and treatment;

(3) outcome, recurrence, and date of death, if applicable;

(4) cancer site, histology, and stage;

(5) confidential patient identifiers, including the following:

(A) Full name;

(B) alias;

(C) maiden name;

(D) name of spouse;

(E) medical record number;

(F) social security number;

(G) street address at the time of diagnosis;

(H) current street address; and

(I) current telephone number;

(6) confidential provider information, including names and address of health care institutions and individual providers of health care;

(7) history of abortion; and

(8) other variables identified as necessary by the registry director and approved by the secretary.

(e) Reports to the registry shall be in one of the following formats:

(1) American standard code for information interchange (ASCII) file in the North American association of central cancer registries (NAACCR) format;

(2) paper forms provided by the registry;

(3) a copy of the pathology laboratory report, if received from a pathology laboratory; or

(4) other formats identified as acceptable by the registry director.

(f) Any data transferred to the registry shall be secure and confidential.

(1) All paper data transferred to the registry shall be sealed in an envelope marked "CONFIDENTIAL" and addressed to the registry director.

(2) Electronic data transfer may be made by one of the following methods:

(A) Diskette mailed in a sealed envelope marked "CONFIDENTIAL" and addressed to the registry director; or

(B) electronic transmission, if encrypted, according to prior instructions from the registry director. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1997, Ch. 110, Sec. 2; effective Feb. 27, 1998.)

28-70-3. Use and access. (a) For purposes of ascertaining accuracy and completeness of cancer data, a person representing the registry may review the medical diagnosis of each person cared for by any individual provider or any health care institution, and may review the medical records of any person with cancer. Review shall be by prearrangement with the individual provider or health care institution.

(b) Any person who requests access to confidential registry data shall submit the request to a review panel, as established by L. 1997, ch. 110, Sec. 6, and amendments thereto. When the requestor demonstrates to the satisfaction of the review panel that the request complies with one or more of the conditions as defined in L. 1997, Ch. 110, Sec. 5, subsections (c) to (f), and amendments thereto, confidential data may be released by the panel. (Authorized by L. 1997, ch. 110, Sec. 2; implementing L. 1997, Ch. 110, Sec. 4 and Sec. 5; effective Feb. 27, 1998.)

Article 7.—MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

68-7-12. Responsibility of pharmacist-in-charge in other than a medical care facility pharmacy. Each pharmacist-in-charge for premises having a pharmacy registration, other than a medical care facility pharmacy, shall be responsible for the following functions.

(a) Each pharmacist-in-charge shall develop, supervise, and coordinate all pharmaceutical services carried on within the pharmacy.

(b) Each pharmacist-in-charge shall be personally available to the extent required to insure comprehensive pharmaceutical services within the pharmacy and to develop a staff of additional licensed pharmacists and supportive personnel as needed to serve the needs of the pharmacy.

(1) Subject to the provisions of K.A.R. 68-1-1 et seq. regarding the filling of a prescription, the pharmacist-in-charge shall carry out these duties:

(A) be responsible for staff pharmacists' supervision of all personnel; and

(B) confine the activities of pharmacy technicians and supportive personnel to nonjudgmental functions.

(2) Each pharmacist-in-charge shall maintain records in the pharmacy describing the training and education regarding work functions performed by all pharmacy personnel. Each pharmacist-in-charge shall maintain in the pharmacy written procedures that address the following areas:

(A) designate the person or persons functioning as pharmacy technicians and supportive personnel;

(B) describe the functions of all personnel; and

(C) document the procedural steps taken by the pharmacist-in-charge to limit the functions of all personnel to their respective pharmacy work functions.

(c) Each pharmacist-in-charge shall develop written policies and procedures for the pharmacy in order to insure adequate accountability and control of drugs in compliance with state and federal law and rules and regulations.

(d) Each pharmacist-in-charge shall develop written policies and procedures for the pharmacy to document any incident that may occur as a result of an alleged or real error in filling or dispensing a prescription or medication order.

(1) Each pharmacist or pharmacy staff member shall inform the pharmacist-in-charge of the alleged or real error and shall promptly document in writing all pertinent information relating to the alleged or real incident. The pharmacist-in-charge shall be responsible for the written report and shall document all relevant information. The report shall be signed by all involved personnel as soon as possible after discovery of the incident. The report shall be kept on the premises at the pharmacy and shall be available for inspection by the board or one or more agents of the board for purposes of subsequent remedial

measures. The report shall contain the following information:

(A) the complainant's name, address, age, and phone number, if available;

(B) the name of each licensee involved and each licensee's registration number;

(C) the date of the incident and the date of the report;

(D) a description of the incident giving rise to the complaint;

(E) the prescribing practitioner's name and whether or not the practitioner was contacted; and

(F) a description of the actions taken and preventive steps to prevent a recurrence.

(2) Records related to the report shall be confidential, shall not be made available to the public, and shall be maintained for purposes of subsequent remedial measures. The report shall be kept for five years at the pharmacy.

(3) Disciplinary proceedings may be initiated by the board against any licensee who fails to make the required report and against any registrant or licensee who fails to provide the report to the board or its agent or agents when requested in writing.

(e) Each pharmacist-in-charge shall determine specifications of all drugs procured by the pharmacy.

(f) Each pharmacist-in-charge shall develop written procedures for maintaining records of the pharmacy's dispensing, prepackaging, and bulk compounding actions and shall assure that prepackaged medication is packaged in suitable containers and properly labeled. In accordance with K.A.R. 68-7-16, each label for prepackaged medication shall include the following information:

(1) the brand or corresponding generic name of the drug;

(2) the strength and quantity;

(3) the lot number and date prepackaged;

(4) the name of the manufacturer or distributor of the medication or a reasonable abbreviation;

(5) the name or initials of the individual performing the prepackaging; and

(6) the expiration date.

(g) Each pharmacist-in-charge shall maintain a drug information reference library in accordance with K.A.R. 68-2-12a.

(h) Each pharmacist-in-charge shall supervise all pharmacist personnel, to insure full compliance with the pharmacy act of the state of Kansas and applicable regulations, the uniform controlled substances act of the state of Kansas and applicable regulations, and federal drug laws and applicable regulations. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1630 and K.S.A. 65-1643, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 184, Sec. 2; implementing K.S.A. 65-1626(r), as amended by L. 1996, Ch. 229, Sec. 118 and K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-1637; effective, E-77-39, July 22, 1976; effective Feb. 15, 1977; amended May 1, 1978; amended May 1, 1989; amended Nov. 30, 1992; amended Feb. 27, 1998.)

Article 7.—MILK AND DAIRY PRODUCTS

4-7-213. Adoption by reference. Except for sections 1 through 6, inclusive of subpart A, the definitions found in subparagraphs (a), (b), (t) and (u) of section 2 of subpart B, and sections 2.1 through 2.6, inclusive, of subpart F, in the United States department of agriculture recommended requirements regarding "milk for manufacturing purposes and its production and processing," as published in the federal register on April 7, 1972, and revised on August 27, 1985, are hereby adopted by reference. Portions of the federal register dated April 7, 1972 and revised on August 27, 1985 and adopted by reference are replaced as identified in K.A.R. 4-7-213a. Wherever the portions of the federal register of April 7, 1972 or August 27, 1985 refer to the standards or counts for milk for manufacturing purposes or for commingled milk in storage tanks, those standards or counts shall be substituted and superceded by the standards or counts identified in K.A.R. 4-7-213a. Copies of the pertinent portions of this regulation shall be available from the Kansas department of agriculture. (Authorized by K.S.A. 75-1401 and K.S.A. 65-720n; implementing K.S.A. 65-701 and K.S.A. 65-720n; effective, E-81-24, Aug. 27, 1981; effective May 1, 1981; amended May 1, 1986; amended, T-87-21, Aug. 21, 1986; amended May 1, 1987; amended Jan. 14, 1991; amended Feb. 27, 1998.)

4-7-213a. Milk for manufacturing purposes: bacterial and somatic cell count. (a) The following sentence shall replace paragraphs (c) and (d) of Section C 4 in the material adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-7-213.

"(c) Milk for manufacturing purposes shall not contain more than 500,000 bacteria per milliliter."

(b) The following sentence shall replace subparagraphs (a) (5) and (6) of Section C 11 in the material adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-7-213.

"(5) Milk for manufacturing purposes shall not contain more than 750,000 somatic cells per milliliter for cow milk or 1,000,000 somatic cells per milliliter for goat milk."

(c) The following sentence shall replace Section E 1.8 (b) in the material adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-7-213.

"(b) The bacteriological estimate of commingled milk in storage tanks shall be 1,000,000 per milliliter or lower."

(d) Wherever the portions of the Federal Register of April 7, 1972 or August 27, 1985 that are adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-7-213 refer to the standards or counts for milk for manufacturing purposes or for commingled milk in storage tanks, those standards or counts shall be substituted and superceded by the standards or counts identified in this regulation.

(e) This regulation shall be effective on and after Feb. 27, 1998. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-720n, 75-1401; implementing K.S.A. 65-701, 65-720n; effective, T-4-10-30-97, Oct. 30, 1997; effective Feb. 27, 1998.)
