Request for Grant Applications

The Office of Judicial Administration and the Kansas Supreme Court Advisory Council on Dispute Resolution are seeking Dispute Resolution Fund grant applications for fiscal year 1999 (July 1, 1998 through June 30, 1999). The purpose of the Dispute Resolution Fund is to promote, encourage and facilitate dispute resolution services which are appropriate, affordable and accessible to all Kansas citizens.

Dispute Resolution Fund grant applicants agree to use the funds to advance mediation services in Kansas. The Office of Judicial Administration administers the Dispute Resolution Fund from which a limited number of discretionary grants can be made. The Advisory Council on Dispute Resolution reviews all grant applications and makes recommendations to the Office of Judicial Administration as to the distribution of the fund. This fund is generated from a percentage of civil docket filing fees, dispute resolution training fees, and mediator approval and renewal fees. During fiscal year 1998, grants totaling approximately \$20,000 were awarded.

The original application and three copies must be mailed to: Dispute Resolution Coordinator, Office of Judicial Administration, Kansas Judicial Center, 301 W. 10th, Topeka, 66612.

Applications must be received by the Office of Judicial Administration before 5 p.m. April 10. Applications received after the deadline will not be considered. Requests for application forms should be directed to the Dispute Resolution Coordinator, (785) 296-2256.

Bills/Resolutions introduced February 26-March 4:

House Bills

HB 2996, An act concerning the department of health and environment; relating to qualifications for certain officers; creating the office of epidemiological services; amending K.S.A. 75-5603 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Appropriations.

HB 2997, An act concerning insurance; relating to increased coverage for diabetes; amending K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 40-1909 and 40-19c09 and repealing the existing sections, by Committee on Appropriations.

HB 2998, An act enacting the selective service registration awareness and compliance act, by Committee on Federal and State Affairs.

HB 2999, An act concerning lottery machines; relating to the unlawful sale of lottery tickets; amending K.S.A. 74-8702 and 79-4701 and K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710, 74-8718 and 74-9802 and repealing the existing sections, by Committee on Federal and State Affairs.

HB 3000, An act concerning elections; establishing a bipartisan commission on campaign practices, by Committee on Appropriations.

HB 3001, An act enacting the swine enterprise referendum act; relating to agricultural corporations, restrictions and exceptions; establishment of swine production facilities, feedlots and slaughterhouses, procedure and election; amending K.S.A. 17-5908 and K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 17-5903 and 17-5904 and repealing the existing sections, by Committee on Appropriations.

HB 3002, An act relating to economic development tax incentives; concerning reports of Kansas, Inc. relating thereto; amending K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8017 and repealing the existing section, by Committee on Taxation.

House Concurrent Resolutions

HCR 5047, A proposition to amend section 1 of article 11 of the constitution of the state of Kansas.

HCR 5048, A concurrent resolution urging the United States Environmental Protection Agency to perform uniform assessments of water quality and urging the Congress to modify the Clean Water Act.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The Office of the Consumer Credit Commissioner will conduct a public hearing at 10 a.m. Tuesday, May 12, in Suite 1001, Jayhawk Tower, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, on permanent regulation 75-6-24. All interested parties may present oral or written comments and shall be given reasonable opportunity to present their views or arguments on adoption of this regulation at the hearing.

The regulation proposed for adoption as a permanent regulation is required by K.S.A. 16a-2-401a. This statute requires the designated dollar amounts to be changed on July 1 of each even numbered year if the percentage of change, calculated to the nearest whole percentage point, between the index at the end of the year in which the change in the designated dollar amount last changed is 10 percent or more. The dollar amounts shall change only in multiples of 10 percent of the amounts currently in effect and adjusted to the nearest \$5 increment.

The purpose of the proposed permanent regulation is to adjust the dollar amounts of \$780 and \$2,600 to \$860 and \$2,860, respectively.

The economic impact on the individual consumer, based on the average size consumer loan of \$5,659 as taken from the 1996 annual report of licensed lenders, would result in an increase of \$67.32 of additional interest based on a 36-month loan amortization. There will be no economic impact on this agency. The increased interest charge should help offset increased operational costs incurred by the finance industry since the last adjustment, which was in 1992.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Friday, May 22, in the SRS Staff Development Building, Topeka State Hospital grounds, 300 S.W. Oakley, Topeka, to consider the adoption of amendments to existing rules and regulations on a permanent basis effective July 1, 1998. Telephone conference will not be available.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to or during the public hearing to Hope Burns, Office of the Secretary of SRS, Docking State Office Building, Room 603-N, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views; it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes. The phrase "Federal Mandate" following an item indicates that the change is required by federal policy. Optional changes in regulations related to federal programs are subject to approval by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

Article 4.—PUBLIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

30-4-39. Responsibilities of applicants and recipients. This regulation is being amended by adding a requirement for reporting changes of circumstances within 10 calendar days for persons who are not required to file a monthly status report in accordance with K.A.R. 30-4-55(b).

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernable economic impact.

30-4-50. Assistance eligibility, general. This regulation is being amended regarding the denial of assistance for a person convicted of a felony offense involving the possession, use or distribution of a controlled substance. Ineligibility shall result when the actual offense occurs after August 22, 1996, rather than when the conviction occurs after that date.

Federal Mandate: This change is required by Section 5516 of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-4-52. Act in own behalf. This regulation is being amended by expanding the situations in which a minor can act in own behalf to include situations in which the parents of the minor are institutionalized and there is no caretaker who is willing to assume parental control of the minor.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-4-54. Citizenship, alienage, and residence. This regulation is being amended to include persons who are Cuban or Haitian entrants or admitted as Amerasian immigrants as refugees who meet qualifying alienage criteria for assistance purposes.

Federal Mandate: This change is required by Section 5302 of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-4-55. Cooperation. This regulation is being amended by removing the requirement for filing a monthly status report for all GA persons and for TAF families in which all adults are age 60 or older, disabled according to social security standards, or nonparental caretakers whose needs are excluded from the assistance plan.

Economic Impact: This change is expected to result in decreased expenditures of \$13,277 (\$4,083 in state general funds) on an annual basis through reduced postage costs.

Bearer of Cost: None.

Affected Parties:

1. This change is expected to simplify the ongoing eligibility process and access to benefits for approximately 4,356 families monthly by eliminating the routine of filing a monthly status report. These families infrequently have changes in circumstances to report that affect eligibility.

2. This change will result in the saving of administrative time for SRS staff by simplifying the process of determining ongoing eligibility for these families.

Other methods: Various options for eliminating monthly reporting for differing families were considered. Those options were rejected in favor of this option. This option continues the requirement for families who more frequently have changes that affect eligibility to report and eliminates the requirement for families who do not, thus maintaining program accountability while saving administrative time.

30-4-64. Work program requirements. This regulation is being amended to make a technical change in wording by replacing reference to public assistance with TAF since work program requirements are only applicable to that program.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

This regulation also is being amended by expanding the exemptions from work program requirements to include children who are age 18 and working toward attainment of a high school diploma or its equivalent. This exemption does not apply to a child who is pregnant or who is a parent of a child in the home.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

This regulation also is being amended by further limiting the persons who are exempt from work program

requirements by reason of providing care for a child under age one. The age at which a parent or pregnant woman without a high school diploma or its equivalent can claim this exemption is being increased from 18 to 20.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-4-70. Eligibility factors specific to the TAF program. This regulation is being amended by allowing persons who are temporarily out of the home for reasons of employment to remain eligible for TAF.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-4-110. Income. This regulation is being amended in several places to specify new budgeting methodologies applicable to families based on the method of reporting changes that is required per K.A.R. 30-4-39 and K.A.R. 30-4-55. For families required to file a monthly status report, prospective budgeting shall be applicable for the first two months of assistance. Beginning with the third month of assistance, income shall be retrospectively budgeted or based on an income average eliminating the prospective determination. For families not required to file a monthly status report, income shall be determined prospectively for all months of assistance. A corresponding change is to remove the prospective 185 percent of need total income test for all families.

Economic Impact: These changes are expected to result in increased expenditures of \$1,264,889 (no state general funds) on an annual basis. Annually, the elimination of the prospective budgeting test for ongoing cases will allow approximately 4,098 families, who begin employment which will result in closure, to continue assistance for one additional month.

Bearer of cost: The cost of these changes will be absorbed by funds from the federal block grant for the TANF program.

Affected parties:

1. These changes are expected to support families in obtaining self-sufficiency. By applying a retrospective-only budgeting methodology to families who have the potential for earnings, an additional one month of assistance will be made available to support a family's transition into an employment environment.

2. These changes will result in the saving of administrative time for SRS staff by simplifying the budgeting process in ongoing casework.

Other methods: Other options for budgeting were considered but rejected, as these methods optimized client benefit, administrative efficiency and agency accountability.

This regulation also is being amended to exempt the earnings of a child age 18 who is working toward attainment of a high school diploma or its equivalent.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

This regulation also is being amended to count income for the first and second retrospectively budgeted months whether or not income from the corresponding prior months is of a continuous nature.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-4-111. Applicable income. This regulation is being amended by increasing the earned income disregard, which is applicable after deducting the first \$90, from 40 percent to 50 percent.

Economic Impact: This change is expected to result in increased expenditures of \$853,366 (no state general funds) on an annual basis.

Bearer of Cost: The cost of this change will be absorbed by funds from the federal block grant for the TANF program.

Affected parties:

1. Approximately 1,611 families will be impacted by the change on a monthly basis. The increased disregard will result in less countable income and a higher net grant for families with earnings. With the change, some families will continue to qualify with a lower grant instead of becoming ineligible as under current policies. This has the effect of using up additional months of receiving TAF which for a lifetime is limited to 60 months per family.

2. This change will have a minimal administrative impact on staff, as the earnings disregard calculation is automated.

Other methods: A 60 percent disregard amount was considered but rejected because of the greater adverse effect of using up even more of a family's limited 60 months per lifetime on TAF. The SRS Legislative Oversight Committee recommended both the 50 percent and 60 percent amounts be considered. In lieu of changing the percentage disregard, increasing the standard \$90 deduction to \$200 was considered. This has the benefit of simplifying the administrative process of calculating grant amounts when earnings are lower, but does not provide the greater incentive for higher earnings amount which a percentage increase method provides. Increasing the standard amount also has the effect of using up additional months of the maximum 60 allowed.

This regulation also is being amended by expanding the situations in which costs of care for dependents can be deducted in determining applicable income. Costs for a dependent in the family group will be allowed as a deduction.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-4-140. Payments. This regulation is being amended by changing the amount that can be withheld from assistance payments to recover an overpayment. For fraud claims the amount shall be the greater of 20 percent of the applicable need standard of \$10 per month. For nonfraud claims, the amount shall be the greater of 10 percent of the applicable need standard or \$10.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

Article 5.—PROVIDER PARTICIPATION, SCOPE OF SERVICES, AND REQUIREMENTS FOR THE MEDICAID (MEDICAL ASSISTANCE) PROGRAM

30-5-88. Scope of physician services. The limitation to a maximum of 12 nonpsychiatric office visits per calendar year per consumer is being eliminated from the regulation. Experience has shown that office visit services are not being inappropriately used and the limitation to

12 visits could potentially be a barrier to access for needed care.

Economic Impact: There will be no cost or savings.

Bearer of Cost: None.

Affected Parties:

1. Medicaid consumers.

Other Methods: There were no other appropriate methods for the desired outcome.

Article 6.—MEDICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM— CLIENT'S ELIGIBILITY FOR PARTICIPATION

30-6-52. Act in own behalf. This regulation is being amended by expanding the situations in which a minor can act in own behalf to include situations in which the parents of the minor are institutionalized and there is no caretaker who is willing to assume parental control of the minor.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-6-54. Citizenship, alienage, and residence. This regulation is being amended to include persons who are Cuban or Haitian entrants or admitted as Amerasian immigrants as refugees who meet qualifying alienage criteria for assistance purposes.

Federal Mandate: This change is required by Section 5302 of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-6-65. Automatic eligibles. This regulation is being amended to provide medical assistance to persons who are eligible for Temporary Assistance for Families (TAF) cash assistance but do not wish to receive the cash benefits. Other changes have been incorporated to include this coverage group in the qualifications for four month automatic medical assistance of subsection (a)(6) and the 12 month automatic medical assistance of subsection (a)(14) of this regulation.

Federal Mandate: This change is required by Section 1931 of the Social Security Act.

Economic Impact: This change is expected to result in increased expenditures of \$734,666 (\$293,866 in state general funds) on an annual basis.

Bearer of Cost: None.

Affected Parties:

1. This change will have a moderate administrative impact on staff, as it will result in a small increase in medical caseloads.

2. This change will benefit approximately 870 adults by providing access to medical coverage without the need for accepting cash benefits and being subject to the 60-month maximum time limit.

Other Methods: No other methods were considered as this is a federal mandate.

30-6-70. Medicaid determined eligibles; eligibility factors specific to temporary assistance for families (TAF). This regulation is being amended to clarify that an 18-year-old in secondary school or working towards the attainment of a GED is eligible for medical assistance under this regulation.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-6-77. Poverty level pregnant women and children; determined eligibles. This regulation is being amended to require that eligibility for children age 18 shall be determined based only on the needs of the child.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-6-103. Determined eligibles; protected income levels. This regulation is being amended to increase the income level for determining eligibility for low income Medicare beneficiaries under the provisions of K.A.R. 30-6-86 to 135 percent of the official federal poverty income guidelines.

Federal Mandate: This change is required by Section 4732 of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997.

Economic Impact: This expanded coverage is federally funded at 100 percent and the state allotment for FFY 1998 will total \$2,094,000 (no state general fund expenditures).

Bearer of Cost: None.

Affected Parties:

1. This change will have a moderate impact on SRS staff, as it will increase caseloads over the course of the coming year.

2. This change will benefit over 1,000 potential consumers by providing coverage of their Medicare Part B premium.

Other Methods: No other methods were considered, as this change is federally mandated.

30-6-111. Applicable income. This regulation is being amended to allow a child care deduction for dependents who are included in the family group rather than in the actual assistance plan. Other technical changes also have been incorporated.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-6-112. Income exempt from consideration as income and as a cash asset. This regulation is being amended to exempt payments made from any fund established pursuant to a class settlement in the case of *Susan Walker v. Bayer Corporation* except for interest or other investment income earned on such payments.

Federal Mandate: This change is required by Section 4735 of the Balanced Budget Act of 1997.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

Article 10.—ADULT CARE HOME PROGRAM

30-10-2. Standards for participation; nursing facilities and nursing facilities for mental health. This regulation change decreases the number of days for submission of initial assessments to the Kansas Department on Aging from 14 days to 22 days. This allows for the use of computer software packages by providers and assures that KDOA regulations match federal guidelines.

Economic Impact: This regulation provision will not result in a cost or savings.

Bearer of Cost: None.

Affected Parties:

1. Nursing facilities.

Other Methods: No other method was appropriate for the desired outcome.

Permanent Administrative
Regulations

Article 4.—MASTERS LEVEL PSYCHOLOGISTS

102-4-7a. Postgraduate supervised work experience requirements. To qualify for licensure as a master's level psychologist, each applicant shall have satisfied all of the following experiential requirements.

(a) Supervised postgraduate work experience requirements. Each applicant shall have satisfactorily completed the following requirements:

(1) a minimum of 1,500 clock hours of supervised postgraduate work experience that meets the requirements as provided in subsections (c), (d), and (e), unless the applicant has completed a 750-hour practicum pursuant to K.S.A. 74-5363(b)(3) and its amendments; and

(2) a minimum of 2,000 clock hours of supervised postgraduate work experience as provided in subsections (c), (d), and (e).

(b) Temporary permit. An applicant who at the time of application has not completed the postgraduate supervised work experience requirements may apply for a temporary permit as provided in K.A.R. 102-4-4a.

(c) Qualifying postgraduate work experience. In order to be approved by the board, the applicant's postgraduate work experience shall meet all of the following standards.

(1) The applicant's supervised work experience occurred after the applicant's completion of the course work requirements provided in K.A.R. 102-4-3a and after the applicant's receipt of the graduate psychology degree that qualifies the applicant for licensure as a master's level psychologist.

(2) The applicant's official title, role qualifications, and formally established practice functions within the supervised work setting clearly demonstrate to the board's satisfaction that the applicant was engaged in the supervised practice of psychology.

(3) The applicant's supervised postgraduate work experience occurred in an organized setting, agency, institution, or organization that, by its nature and function, clearly provided the applicant with experience in the following areas:

- (A) diagnosis;
- (B) remediation techniques;
- (C) measuring and testing personality, intelligence, aptitudes, attitudes, and skills;
- (D) interdisciplinary collaboration and consultation; and

(E) practice activities with a client population presenting a diverse set of problems and backgrounds.

(4) The applicant's postgraduate work experience was supervised by an individual who qualified as a supervisor as provided in subsection (d).

(5) The applicant's postgraduate work experience was supervised as provided in subsection (e).

(d) Supervisory qualifications. In order to be approved by the board, the applicant's postgraduate work experience shall be supervised by a licensed psychologist or by a currently licensed master's level psychologist with no

fewer than three years of postgraduate professional experience.

(1) The applicant received a master's degree in psychology or clinical psychology and met the course work, program and college or university requirements provided in K.A.R. 102-4-3a before completing the doctoral practicum hours.

(2) The applicant's doctoral level practicum fully met the requirements provided in subsections (c), (d), and (e). (Authorized by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-7507; implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 74-5363 and 74-5367; effective March 27, 1998.)

Administrative Regulations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Environmental Remediation, will conduct public hearings at 1 p.m. Thursday, May 14, in the Salina Public Library, Prescott Room, 301 W. Elm, Salina; and at 10 a.m. Friday, May 15, in the Metropolitan Topeka Airport, conference room, Forbes Field, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed regulations for the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Program. These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 28-71-1 through K.A.R. 28-71-12. The purpose of the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Act is to allow voluntary cleanups of contaminated properties with department oversight to promote the transfer, redevelopment and reuse of contaminated properties and protect public health and the environment. The purpose of these proposed regulations is to implement the Act and describe the procedures to allow voluntary parties to address contaminated property in an expedited manner. The Act and these regulations are entirely voluntary, meaning that public and private entities intentionally elect to participate in the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Program.

KDHE does not anticipate a negative economic impact on other governmental agencies. Local governmental agencies may see a positive economic impact since undervalued, underused contaminated properties in their community can be addressed through the Act and these regulations. Properties that receive "no further action" determinations from KDHE may become prime properties for redevelopment and increase in value, which should result in an increased tax base for the community.

KDHE does not anticipate a negative economic impact on private citizens or businesses. Private citizens or businesses may see a positive economic impact since undervalued, underused contaminated properties that they own, want to lease, or purchase can be addressed through the Act and these regulations. Properties that receive "no further action" determinations from KDHE may become prime properties for redevelopment and increase in value. Increases in the tax base may create lower property taxes to private citizens or to other businesses and promote the creation of new jobs.

Entities who are affected by, or are subject to, the Act and the regulations are voluntary parties who have elected to participate in the program. If they elect to participate in the program, they are responsible for the costs associated with investigation and cleanup of contaminated properties in addition to oversight costs to the department. These parties can terminate their participation in the program at any time, as long as conditions at the property are not negatively impacted by actions taken by the applicant.

A summary of individual proposed regulations follows.

K.A.R. 28-71-1. Definitions. The proposed regulation provides definitions for key terms within the set of regulations.

K.A.R. 28-71-2. Applicant. The proposed regulation provides the criteria that must be met for a person to be an applicant to the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Program.

K.A.R. 28-71-3. Eligibility determination. The proposed regulation provides the criteria for properties to be eligible to participate in the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Program.

K.A.R. 28-71-4. Application process. The proposed regulation provides the procedure that an applicant must follow to apply to the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Program. This regulation also establishes the process the department will follow to notify applicants of approval or denial of an application and provides that the department must approve or deny an application within 60 days of receipt.

K.A.R. 28-71-5. Classification determination. The proposed regulation provides the department's procedure and criteria to follow to classify eligible properties into one of four contamination classes. Classes of contamination will be used by the department to determine the type of activity needed at the property.

K.A.R. 28-71-6. Voluntary agreement. The proposed regulation provides a procedure for applicants and the department to enter into an agreement to conduct voluntary activities at an eligible property.

K.A.R. 28-71-7. Initial deposit and reimbursement. The proposed regulation provides a matrix for initial deposits based on the classification of the eligible property. The regulation also describes the oversight role of the department in the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Program.

K.A.R. 28-71-8. Environmental assessments. The proposed regulation describes the information required for environmental assessments accepted by the department in the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Program.

K.A.R. 28-71-9. Voluntary cleanup work plans and reports. The proposed regulation provides the procedures and process to determine if work plans and reports are needed and to approve or disapprove such work plans and reports. The proposed regulation establishes criteria for the development and completion of work plans and reports. The proposed regulation describes a verification sampling program to confirm the success of activities completed by the voluntary party.

K.A.R. 28-71-10. "No further action" determination. The proposed regulation provides the procedures and criteria to allow the department to issue "no further action" determinations to properties addressed in the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Program.

K.A.R. 28-71-11. Remedial standards and remedial actions. The proposed regulation provides criteria, procedures and standards to address properties in the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Program. The proposed regulation allows the voluntary party to select and the department to approve an approach to determine the cleanup standards for the property. The regulation

allows for the use of institutional controls when approved by the department.

K.A.R. 28-71-12. Public notification and participation. The proposed regulation provides the procedures and time frames to notify and allow public participation in the cleanup process.

This 60-day notice of the public hearings shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearings to Rick Bean, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Environmental Remediation, Forbes Field, Building 740, Topeka, 66620. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearings. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present

their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes. Copies of the regulations and their regulatory impact statements may be obtained from the Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Environmental Remediation, Remedial Section, Attention: Linda South, Building 740, Forbes Field, Topeka, 66620-0001, (785) 291-3253.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearings and may request the proposed regulations and the regulatory impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearings by contacting Rick Bean.

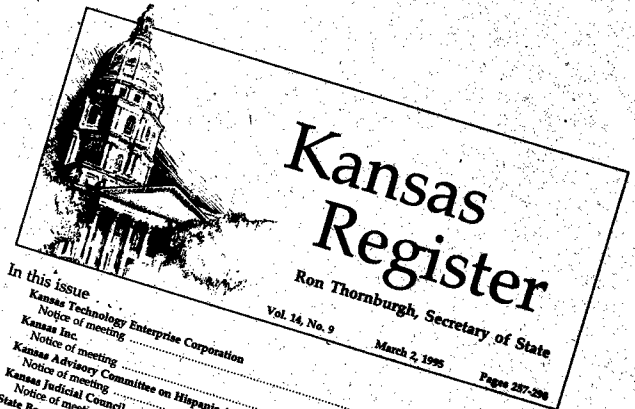
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
