Request for Comments

The Kansas Association of Wheat Growers and Crop Quest, Inc. have requested, on behalf of Kansas wheat growers, a special local need (SLN) registration for use of Tilt® on wheat for control of leaf and glume blotch disease. Pursuant to 7 U.S.C. 136v, Novartis Crop Protection, Inc. has filed with the Kansas Department of Agriculture (KDA) an application for the requested registration action so that Tile® can be applied to later stages of crop development than is currently allowed by the existing U.S. Environmental Protection Agency federal registration. The SLN criteria for this action is defined by the increased likelihood of damaging levels of the leaf and glume blotch disease due to favorable weather conditions and the possibility of declining resistance by some of the most commonly grown wheat varieties in Kansas. No other effective control options exist for management of this disease during later stages of crop development when the need for control measures are most likely to become apparent. This proposed SLN registration is both economically and environmentally beneficial by providing greater efficacy and more flexibility when deciding if and/or when treatment is needed.

The current federal registration for Tile® provides for treatment of wheat up to Feekes Growth Stage 8. A request to amend the registration of the fungicide to allow application through Feekes Growth Stage 10.5 is pending EPA action. All required residue data and risk assessment information for the requested label amendment has been submitted and is under review by the EPA. Efficacy data has been provided to the KDA in support of the SLN registration.

Information submitted by the applicant is on file with the KDA. Written comments, data or other evidence in support of or in opposition to the proposed SLN registration may be submitted by April 20. Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted, in conjunction with the regularly scheduled board meeting, at 9 a.m. Monday, June 8, in the board office conference room, 712 S. Kansas Ave., Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing psychology rules and regulations.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the executive director of the Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board, 712 S. Kansas Ave., Topeka, 66603-3817. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting the Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board at (785) 296-3240.

K.A.R. 102-1-1. Definitions. The definitions in this regulation relate to licensed psychologists. The revisions serve to update the language and to transfer language from the definition section to the education and renewal regulations. New sections to define dual relationship, academic semester hours and direct psychological services have been added.

K.A.R. 102-1-8. Renewal and reinstatement. This regulation is being amended to incorporate language to set forth procedures to reinstate an expired psychology license.

K.A.R. 102-1-12. Educational requirements. This regulation is amended to update the educational requirements by reflecting the current APA accreditation standards.

Economic Impact: The revisions of these three regulations should have minimal economic impact on licensed psychologists, the health care industry or the Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board. Except for some minimal content changes, most of the revisions are for clarity to assist potential applicants and licensed psychologists.

Executive Order No. 98-1 Suspending Non-Essential Operations During Winter Storm Conditions

WHEREAS, a major winter storm affected the State of Kansas on Sunday, March 8 and Monday, March 9, 1998; and

WHEREAS, multiple highways and roads were closed due to the inclement weather, making travel impossible or hazardous; and

WHEREAS, the safety of state employees is a matter of concern to the State; and

WHEREAS, operations in Executive Branch state agencies may need to be modified during adverse weather conditions; and

WHEREAS, through major media outlets throughout the State of Kansas, I directed Executive Branch state agencies to suspend all non-essential operations on Monday March 9, 1998; and

WHEREAS, the correctional institutions under the Secretary of Corrections, the hospitals under the Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services, the educational institutions under the State Board of Regents, the Highway Patrol, the Department of Transportation, the Adjutant General, and many other state agencies and institutions carry out essential operations and, therefore, cannot suspend certain services during inclement weather;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor and Chief Executive of the State of Kansas, I hereby declare that, for Executive Branch state agencies, all non-essential operations suspended on Monday, March 9, 1998, are to be managed in accordance with this Executive Order.

- 1. The agency head of the correctional institutions under the Secretary of Corrections, the hospitals under the Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services, the educational institutions under the State Board of Regents, the Highway Patrol, the Department of Transportation, the Adjutant General and any other state agency with essential operations shall designate those employees who are essential personnel. All other employees shall be considered non-essential personnel for purposes of this Executive Order
- 2. Each non-essential employee who is eligible for benefits and who was scheduled to work on Monday, March 9, 1998, but did not work for all or for some portion of the employee's schedule for that day, shall be given administrative leave with pay for those hours not worked. Any hours worked will be recorded as regular hours.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order 98-1 and shall be effective immediately.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

A summary of the revoked and proposed regulations

and their economic impact follows.

93-3-1 to 93-3-4, inclusive, and 93-4-1. These regulations are being revoked because the authorizing and implementing statutes have been repealed. (No economic

impact.)

93-4-2. Annotation and disposition of real estate sales validation questionnaires; duties of county officials. The required annotation and disposition of real estate sales validation questionnaires by the register of deeds and the county appraiser is prescribed. (No economic impact.)

93-4-3. Split real estate parcel sales; duties of county officials. The county appraiser's duties regarding the processing of real estate sales validation questionnaires pertaining to split real estate parcel sales are prescribed.

(No economic impact.)

93-4-4. Assemblage and entering of sales data; accounting for real estate sales validation questionnaires; duties of county officials. The county appraiser's duties regarding the assemblage and entering of sales data into the county's computer-assisted mass appraisal system from the real estate sales validation questionnaires are prescribed. Also prescribed are the procedures for the county appraiser to account for all real estate sales validation questionnaires. (No economic impact.)

93-4-5. Access to county records by the director of property valuation; duties of county officials. The county is required to make its computer-assisted mass appraisal system available to the director of property valuation for the purpose of accessing real estate sales information and is required to prepare and transmit the electronic assessment administration file to the director upon written request. The maintenance of extracted sales files is prescribed. (No economic impact.)

93-4-6. Standards. The real estate standard on ratio studies adopted by the international association of assessing officers in July 1990, with stated exceptions, is adopted as the minimum standard to be used in preparing the real estate ratio study. (No economic impact.).

K.A.R. 115-25-5. This proposed exempt regulation establishes hunting unit boundaries, bag limits, application periods and season dates for the 1998 fall firearm and archery wild turkey season. The proposed regulation makes no substantive changes from the 1997 fall turkey seasons.

Economic Impact Summary: It is anticipated that a total of 3,880 fall turkey hunting permits of all types will be issued, which would create \$72,400 in revenue. The department estimates more than 20,000 days of hunting activity would occur, thus providing economic benefit to businesses providing goods and services.

K.A.R. 115-25-9. This proposed exempt regulation establishes hunting bag limits, application periods and season dates for the 1998 firearm and archery deer seasons. The regulation has already been approved once by the commission in the 1998 calendar year. The proposed new changes to the regulation would involve modifications to the regular firearms deer season, with corresponding changes in the archery and muzzleloader seasons. Other proposed new changes to the regulation would allow the department to comply with proposed legislative changes in the allocation of nonresident deer permits and game tags.

Economic Impact Summary: No new economic impacts from the proposed changes to the regulation are expected. It is anticipated that 112,500 deer hunting permits will be authorized, with estimated revenue of \$2,500,000. Approximately 800,000 days of hunting activity by 85,000 hunters are anticipated, which, based on survey estimates, may generate \$40 million of economic benefit to businesses providing goods and services.

Article 3.—REQUIREMENTS FOR LICENSURE AND STANDARDS OF PRACTICE

60-3-106a. Temporary permit. A temporary permit to practice as a registered professional or licensed practical nurse for a period not to exceed 120 days may be issued to an applicant for any of the following:

(a) Reinstatement of a license to enable the applicant

to complete continuing education requirements;

(b) licensure to enable the board to verify licensure

requirements; or

- (c) a demonstrated need for a temporary permit due to extenuating or unusual circumstances. - 60-3-107. Expiration dates of licenses; applications. (a) The expiration date of licenses for registered professional nurses and licensed practical nurses shall be on the last day of the month in which the licentiate's birthday occurs. The renewal date for licentiates whose year of birth is an odd-numbered year shall be in the oddnumbered year and whose year of birth is an even-numbered year shall be in the even-numbered year.

(b) Applications for initial licensure by examination or endorsement and for reinstatement while awaiting documentation of qualifications shall be active for six

months.

(1) The expiration date of each application shall be

based upon the date of receipt at the agency.

Article 9.—CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR NURSES

60-9-105. Definitions. (a) "Advisory committee" means a group with members knowledgeable about the learning needs of the nurses or licensed mental health technicians for whom continuing nursing education (CNE) is provided.

(b) "Approval" means the act of determining that a providership application or course offering meets applicable standards based on review of either the total pro-

gram or the individual offering.

(c) "Approved provider" means a person, organization, or institution approved by the board, that is respon-

sible for the development, administration, and evaluation of the CNE program or offering.

- (d) "Behavioral objectives" means the intended outcome of instruction stated as measurable learner behaviors.
- (e) "Certificate" means a document that is proof of completion of one or more contact hours.
- (f) "Clinical hours" means learning experiences for the attainment of clinical skills. One contact hour equals three clinical hours.
- (g) "College course" means a course taken through a college and meeting the definition of CNE in K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-1117 and amendments thereto. One college credit hour equals 15 contact hours.

(h) "Computer-based instruction" means a learning application that provides computer control to solve an instructional problem or to facilitate an instructional opportunity.

(i) "Contact hour" means 50 minutes of participation in a learning experience organized by an approved provider.

(j) "Independent study" means a self-paced learning activity managed by an approved or accredited provider recognized by Kansas and may include research, professional papers, and other authorship.

(k) "In-service education and on-the-job training" means learning activities in the work setting designed to assist the individual in fulfilling job responsibilities. Inservice education and on-the-job training shall be eligible for CNE credit.

- (l) "Offering" means a single CNE learning experience designed to enhance knowledge, skills, and attitudes related to nursing. An offering shall consist of at least one contact hour.
- (m) "Orientation" means formal or informal instruction designed to acquaint employees with the institution and the position. Orientation shall not be considered CNE.
- (n) "Program" means an organized effort to achieve overall CNE goals.
- (o) "Refresher course" means a course of study providing review of basic preparation and current developments in nursing practice.

(p) "Teleconference" means an interactive telecommunication offering of CNE.

- (q) "Total program evaluation" means a systematic process by which an approved provider analyzes outcomes of the overall continuing nursing education program in order to make subsequent decisions. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-1117, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 146, Sec. 1, K.S.A. 65-1119, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 146, Sec. 2, and K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-4205, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 146, Sec. 3; effective Sept. 2, 1991; amended March 9, 1992; amended April 26, 1993; amended April 3, 1998.)
- **60-9-106.** Continuing nursing education for license renewal. (a) At the time of license renewal, a licensee shall submit proof of completion of 30 contact hours of approved continuing nursing education CNE. This proof shall be documented as specified on the renewal notice and shall include the following:

(1) Name of CNE offering or college course;

- (2) provider name or name of accrediting organization;
- (3) provider number or number of accrediting organization, if applicable;
 - (4) offering date; and
 - (5) number of contact hours.
- (b) The required 30 contact hours of approved CNE shall have been completed during the most recent prior licensing period. Contact hours accumulated in excess of the 30-hour requirement shall not be carried over to the next renewal period.

(c) Acceptable continuing nursing education may in-

clude any of the following:

(1) An offering presented by an approved long-term or single provider;

(2) an offering as designated in K.S.A. 65-1119(e)(5);

- (3) an offering meeting the definition of CNE but not presented by an approved provider or other acceptable approving body. Before licensure renewal, the licensee may submit an application for individual offering approval (IOA) for the board, accompanied by the following:
- (A) Behavioral objectives describing learning outcomes; and
- (B) agenda or documentation of the number of contact hours.
- (4) a maximum of 15 contact hours for the first-time preparation and presentation as an instructor of an approved offering to licensed nurses or mental health technicians. Two contact hours of instructor credit shall be granted for each hour of presentation;

(5) an offering utilizing a board-approved curriculum developed by the American heart association, emergency nurses association, or Mandt, which may include the fol-

lowing:

(A) Advanced cardiac life support;

- (B) emergency nursing pediatric course;
- (C) pediatric advanced life support;
- (D) trauma nurse core course;
- (E) neonatal resuscitation program; or
- (F) Mandt program.
- (6) independent study for either of the following:
- (A) A maximum of 15 contact hours in a renewal period; or
- (B) all or part of the required 30 contact hours of CNE for license renewal if approved after a request to the board if the individual meets either of these criteria:
- (i) Resides in a foreign country for the entire two-year renewal period; or
- (ii) demonstrates a need due to extenuating circumstances.
- (7) approved offerings, including computer-based instruction and teleconference; or
 - (8) a board-approved refresher course.
- (d) Fractions of contact hours over one contact hour shall be accepted.
- (e) Contact hours shall not be recognized by the board for any of the following:
- (1) Identical offerings completed within a renewal period;

(continued)

- (2) offerings containing the same content as courses that are part of basic preparation at the level of current licensure or certification;
- (3) in-service education, on-the-job training, orientation, and institution-specific courses; or
- (4) an incomplete or failed college course. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-1117, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 146, Sec. 1, K.S.A. 65-1119, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 146, Sec. 2, and K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 65-4205, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 146, Sec. 3; effective Sept. 2, 1991; amended April 3, 1998.)

60-9-107. Approval of continuing nursing education. (a) Offerings of approved providers shall be recognized by the board.

- (b) A completed application for approval as a long-term provider or five-year renewal for a long-term continuing nursing education providership shall be submitted at least 45 days before a scheduled board meeting.
- (c) The application shall include the following information:
- (1) Identification by name and address of the following:
- (A) Administration, including parent organization;
- (B) CNE department, if applicable;
- (C) program coordinator; and
- (D) advisory committee.
- (2) description of plan for management of program with copies of policies and procedures, including the following:
 - (A) Registration;
 - (B) attendance;
 - (C) partial credit;
 - (D) offering announcements;
 - (E) certificate;
 - (F) coordinator qualifications;
 - (G) advisory committee functions;
 - (H) instructor selection criteria;
 - (I) records;
 - (J) roster; and
- (K) notice of change of coordinator or required policies.
- (3) syllabi of two proposed offerings for the initial long-term provider applications; and
 - (4) copy of the total program evaluation plan.
- (d) Each prospective coordinator who has submitted an application for a long-term CNE providership that has been reviewed once and found deficient, or has approval pending, shall submit all materials required by this regulation two weeks before the next board meeting. If the application does not meet all of the requirements or the prospective coordinator does not contact the board for an extension on or before this deadline, the application process shall be considered abandoned. A new application and fee shall be submitted if a providership is still desired.
 - (e) Application for approval of a single CNE offering.
- (1) The application for a single CNE offering shall be submitted at least 30 days before the anticipated date of the first offering.
- (2) The application shall include the following infor-
- (A) Identification by name and address of the following:

- (i) Administration;
- (ii) offering coordinator;
- (iii) advisory committee; and
- (iv) nurse or licensed mental health technician consultant, if applicable;
- (B) description of plan for management with copies of policies and procedures, including the following:
 - (i) Registration;
 - (ii) attendance;
 - (iii) partial credit;
 - (iv) announcements;
 - (v) certificate;
 - (vi) advisory committee functions;
 - (vii) records; and
 - viii) roster; and
 - (C) offering syllabus.
- (3) If the application for a single offering has been reviewed and found deficient, or has approval pending, the CNE coordinator may submit all materials required by this regulation before the date of offering. If the application does not meet requirements before the offering deadline, the application shall be considered abandoned. There shall be no retroactive approval of single offerings.
- (4) Each approved single CNE provider shall submit a roster of individuals who have satisfactorily completed an offering to the board within 15 working days of completion. The roster shall contain the information required in paragraph (o)(1).
- (f) Each approved long-term provider shall designate a program coordinator responsible for CNE. Each newly assigned individual responsible for CNE shall meet these requirements:
 - (1) Be licensed to practice nursing;
 - (2) have three years of clinical experience;
- (3) have one year of experience in developing and implementing offerings; and
- (4) have a baccalaureate degree, except those individuals exempted under K.S.A. 65-1119(e)(3).
- (g) The program coordinator shall submit in writing any change of the individual responsible for the long-term provider to the board within 30 days.
- (h) Each approved long-term provider shall pay a fee for the upcoming year and submit an annual report for the period of July 1 through June 30 of the previous year on or before the designated deadline. The annual report shall contain the following:
- (1) An evaluation of all the components of the providership based on the total program evaluation plan;
 - (2) a statistical summary report; and
- (3) for each of the first two years of the providership, the following information:
 - (A) A syllabus of one offering;
 - (B) the advisory committee names and credentials; and
 - (C) advisory committee minutes.
- (i) If approved for the first time after January 1, a new long-term provider shall submit only the statistical summary report and shall not be required to submit the annual fee.
- (j) Each approved provider shall prominently display on all promotional material this statement: "(Name of Provider) is approved as a provider of continuing nursing education by the Kansas State Board of Nursing. This course offering is approved for _____ contact hours ap-

plicable for RN, LPN, or LMHT relicensure. Kansas State Board of Nursing Approved Provider Number: _____"
The approved provider shall identify each independent study course.

(k) Certificates of attendance shall not be awarded for

less than one contact hour.

(l) An approved provider may award any of the following:

(1) Partial credit or the contact hours for actual time attended to a participant, for one or more contact hours;

(2) credit for fractions of hours over one contact hour;

(3) instructor credit, which shall be two contact hours for each hour of first-time preparation and presentation

of an approved or accredited offering.

- (m) The approved provider shall award certificates of attendance to participants after completion of an offering. Certificates shall be complete before distribution to participants. Each certificate shall contain the following information:
- (1) The provider's name, address, and provider number;
 - (2) the title of the course;

(3) the dates of attendance;

(4) the number of contact hours awarded;

(5) the name of the individual responsible for the providership;

(6) the name and license number of the participant;

and

(7) the number of independent study or instructor contact hours awarded.

(n) Each providership shall require participants to sign

a daily roster when attending a CNE offering.

- (o) Each approved provider shall maintain a roster of individuals who have satisfactorily completed an offering.
 - (1) The roster shall contain the following information:
- (A) The provider's name, address, and provider number;
 - (B) the title of the course;
 - (C) the dates of attendance;
 - (D) the number of contact hours awarded;
- (E) the name of the individual responsible for the providership;
- (F) an alphabetized list of names and license numbers of the participants; and
- (G) identification of independent study or instructor
- (2) If the long-term provider does not renew the providership, then the provider shall notify the board in writing of the location at which the rosters, syllabi, faculty files, and evaluation data will be accessible to the board for two years.

(p) For each offering, the approved provider shall retain the following for two years:

- (1) The syllabus;
- (2) faculty file;
- (3) attendance roster; and

(4) evaluation data of the offering.

(q) If the provider does not continue to meet the criteria for current approval established by regulation or if there is a material misrepresentation of any fact with the information submitted to the board by an approved pro-

vider, approval may be withdrawn or conditions relating to the providership may be applied by the board after giving the approved provider notice and an opportunity to be heard. These proceedings shall be conducted in accordance with provisions of the Kansas administrative procedures act.

(r) Approved providers who have voluntarily relinquished their providership or who have had their providership withdrawn by the board may reapply as a long-term provider. The application shall be submitted on forms supplied by the board and accompanied by the designated, nonrefundable fee as scheduled in K.A.R. 60-4-103(a)(3). 60-11-121. Exempt certificate. (a) An exempt certificate shall be granted only to an advanced registered nurse practitioner who meets these requirements:

(1) Is not regularly engaged in advanced registered nurse practice in Kansas, but is a charitable health care provider as defined by K.S.A. 75-6102 and amendments thereto; and

(2) has been certified in Kansas for the five years previous to applying for an exempt certificate.

(b) The expiration date of the exempt certificate shall

be in accordance with K.A.R. 60-3-107.

(c) All applications for renewal of an exempt certificate shall be submitted upon forms furnished by the board and shall be accompanied by the fee in accordance with K.A.R. 60-11-119. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1131, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 158, Sec. 6; effective April 3, 1998.)

Article 3.—PRODUCTION AND CONSERVATION OF OIL AND GAS

82-3-800. Licensing. Each person operating any gas-gathering system within the state of Kansas shall be licensed by the commission. Any person claiming an exemption from reporting under L. 1997, Ch. 132, § 22 shall be licensed. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 55-155; effective April 3, 1998.)

82-3-801. Report furnished by persons offering gas-gathering services; penalty. (a) Each person offering gas-gathering services shall file with the commission the following data on forms prescribed by the commission:

(1) data on rates paid for natural gas purchased at the wellhead on each gas-gathering system or part thereof if purchased by the gatherer;

(2) data on contract rates charged for gas-gathering services on each gas-gathering system or part thereof;

(3) any special contract terms relating to the volume and characteristics of the gas that will be purchased or transported by the person offering gas-gathering services;

(4) the number of wells connected to the gas-gathering

system or part thereof;

(5) a legible map showing the location of the gas-gathering system drawn to a scale of .5 inch equals one mile and clearly indicating section, township, and range; and

- (6) other related data that may be required by the commission.
- (b) The reports shall contain information current as of the first day of January, April, July, and October and shall be filed within sixty days of these dates. Maps shall be filed annually at the time of license renewal. If any due date falls on a legal holiday or weekend, the report shall be due on the next business day. If no change has been made to reported data from the prior filing, the operator may note this on the reporting form.

(c) Any person claiming an exemption pursuant to L. 1997, Ch. 132, § 22 shall provide a verified, detailed written explanation in support of the exemption.

(d) The report filed with the commission shall be sub-

ject to the Kansas open records act.

(e) The report filed with the commission shall not be used by the commission to order a change in any rate except in a proceeding pursuant to K.A.R. 82-3-802.

(f) Any person claiming an exemption pursuant to L. 1997, Ch. 132, § 22 who no longer qualifies for the exemption shall file the necessary gas-gathering report pursuant to K.A.R. 82-3-801 within 10 days from the date on which the exemption expires.

(g) Failure to materially complete the form shall constitute noncompliance with this regulation, and the operator may be subject to the penalty provisions set forth

in subsection (h).

(h) Upon notice and opportunity to be heard, a penalty may be imposed by the commission on any person, not to exceed \$10,000.00 per day up to an aggregate maxi-

mum amount of \$250,000.00, for failure to file the report

required by subsection (a).

(i) Notice of any substantive change to the reporting form occurring after July 1, 1998, shall be published in the Kansas register at least 30 days before adoption. Additional notice may be provided by the Kansas corporation commission to interested parties and the public generally. An opportunity to comment and a hearing shall be conducted as to the proposed form. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1997, Ch. 132, § 23; effective April 3, 1998.)

82-3-802. Gas-gathering services and access, complaint, hearing. (a) Each person offering any gas-gathering services or facilities essential to providing these services shall do so in a manner that is just, reasonable, not unjustly discriminatory, and not unduly preferential to persons seeking services or access to facilities.

(b) Each person performing gas-gathering services shall engage in practices and charge fees for such services that are just, reasonable, not unjustly discriminatory, and

not unduly preferential.

(c) Any consumer of gas-gathering services, any person seeking direct purchase of natural gas at the well-head, any royalty owner, or any natural gas producer may request that the commission investigate and initiate proceedings to review a fee, term, or practice being used by a person offering gas-gathering services.

(d) As a condition to commission action, the person under subsection (c) requesting the action shall file a com-

plaint that includes the following:

(1) A statement that the complainant has presented the complaint, in writing, to the person offering gas-gathering services and has requested a meeting to discuss the complaint. A copy of this document shall accompany the complaint;

(2) a statement that the requested meeting took place and no resolution was reached or that the person offering

gas-gathering services refused to meet;

(3) a detailed factual statement alleging how the fee,

term or practice violates subsections (a) or (b);

- (4) a statement of the precise remedy being requested that will make the fee, term, or practice consistent with the standards established in this section;
- (5) if the complainant is a producer of natural gas, a copy of the analysis of the complainant's gas, including the nitrogen, carbon dioxide, hydrogen sulfide, water and other contaminant content; the volume; the Btu; and the pressure at the wellhead;

(6) if available, a map showing the location of the affected wells and all known gas-gathering systems in the

area; and

- (7) proof of service of the complaint on the gas gatherer.
- (e) Upon the filing of a complaint, the parties to the complaint shall be contacted by the commission staff, and resolution of the matter shall be attempted by the commission staff through the use of informal procedures, including one or more of the following:

(1) A meeting with the complainant, the person offering gas-gathering services, and commission staff.

(2) A mediation conference conducted under the following procedures:

(A) Upon the request of any party and acceptance of the other party, the commission shall schedule a mediation conference. The purpose of the mediation shall be to assist the parties in reaching agreement on any disputed issues by the intervention of a third party who has no decision-making authority, is impartial to the issues being discussed, assists the parties in defining the issues in dispute, facilitates communication between the parties, and assists the parties in reaching resolution.

(B) Mediation conferences shall be conducted by mediators appointed by the commission who are qualified as mediators pursuant to the dispute resolution act, K.S.A. 5-501 et seq., and amendments thereto, and any relevant rules of the Kansas supreme court as authorized pursuant to K.S.A. 5-510, and amendments thereto.

(C) Persons with final settlement authority for each party shall be present, in person, at the mediation con-

ference.

(D) All mediation conferences shall be conducted by a mediator in accordance with the dispute resolution act.

- (E) The confidentiality and privilege provisions of K.S.A. 60-452(a) shall apply to all mediation conferences to assure that all verbal or written information transmitted between any party to a dispute and the mediator shall be treated as confidential information and that no admission, representation, or statement made in the mediation conference shall be admissible as evidence or subject to discovery.
- (F) The costs of mediation shall be shared equally among all parties.
- (G) The commission shall disseminate information about the mediation conference procedure.

(3) Other informal mediation procedures as may be

agreed to by all parties.

- (f) The commission may at any time review a fee, term, or practice. Upon notice and opportunity for hearing in accordance with the Kansas administrative procedures act, the authority to order the remediation of any violation of L. 1997, Ch. 132, § 24 shall rest with the commission.
- (g) A formal hearing shall be scheduled by the commission if the complaint is not resolved by informal procedures within 60 days of its filing or upon notice that no party wishes to utilize any informal procedure. A scheduling order providing notice to the affected parties of the date of hearing and setting forth any additional conditions as the commission deems appropriate shall be issued by the commission.
- (h) The hearing shall be conducted in accordance with the Kansas administrative procedure act, K.S.A. 77-501 et seq., and with the commission's rules of practice and procedure, K.A.R. 82-3-201 et seq.
- (i) The costs of a proceeding may be assessed to a party or parties based on the findings of the commission.
- (j) In determining whether or not to grant access to a system, factors including the following may be considered by the commission:
- (1) whether or not the natural gas can be reasonably carried by a gatherer;
- (2) whether or not construction of a new system would be feasible;

(3) whether or not a material extension or expansion of facilities would be required;

(4) whether or not there is another gatherer of natural gas who is willing to gather or can more conveniently gather gas:

(5) whether or not the gathering of gas can reasonably be expected to have a materially adverse effect on safety or on service to existing customers or on the operation of or recovery of any processing facility;

(6) whether or not the gas satisfies minimum standards for quality, energy or recoverable hydrocarbon content consistently applied by the gatherer of that system;

(7) whether or not the gas gatherer is gathering gas from an affiliated marketer or producer;

(8) the fiscal impact to all parties; or

- (9) any other matters that the commission determines to be relevant.
- (k) In evaluating or establishing a fee, term, or practice for a gathering service, whether or not the fee, term, or practice is a just, reasonable, not unjustly discriminatory, and not unduly preferential fee that would result from good faith negotiations in a competitive market shall be determined by the commission. In evaluating or establishing a fee, term, or practice, all economically relevant factors including the following may be considered by the commission:
- (1) the fees or terms that the gatherer receives from other shippers;
- (2) the fees or terms charged by other gatherers within a relevant area determined by the commission;
 - (3) the financial risks of installing a gathering system;
 - (4) the financial risks of operating a gathering system;
- (5) the capital, operating and maintenance costs of a gathering system;
 - (6) the existing gas contract or contracts;
 - (7) the fiscal impact to all parties;
- (8) the fees, terms, or practices that the gas gatherer offers to an affiliated producer or marketer; or
- (9) other factors that the commission determines to be relevant, provided that a fee shall not be required to be computed on a utility rate-of-return basis. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1997, Ch. 132, § 24 and L. 1997, Ch. 132, § 25; effective April 3, 1998.)
- **82-3-803.** Abuse of complaint procedure. No person shall abuse the complaint process in any manner, including causing a delay in the proceedings that may damage a party's ability to pursue or defend the complaint. Any action deemed necessary to protect the rights of a party against abuse of the complaint process may be taken by the commission. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1997, Ch. 132, § 25; effective April 3, 1998.)
- **82-3-804.** Notice of termination. A public utility providing service from a gas-gathering system shall provide written notice to the executive director of the commission at its Topeka office and to the person receiving service, not later than November 1 preceding the calendar year of service, that it cannot serve the needs of the person receiving service. The utility shall explain in detail any reasons it is unable to perform the service. Investigation of the proposed termination and reporting to the com-

mission shall be made by the utilities division with the assistance of the conservation division of the commission. Any further action taken by the commission shall be conducted under chapter 66. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1997, Ch. 132, § 30; effective April 3, 1998.)

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 7.—MOVEMENT OF LIVESTOCK INTO OR THROUGH KANSAS

9-7-10. Livestock for exhibition purposes. Except for rodeo stock, livestock may be moved into Kansas for exhibition purposes, if accompanied by a health certificate or a certificate of veterinary inspection signed by a licensed veterinarian. The certificate shall be on a form approved by the livestock commissioner and shall show that such livestock met regular Kansas interstate health requirements, as established for the particular species, before the date of entry into Kansas. (Authorized by K.S.A. 47-607d, 47-610; implementing K.S.A. 47-610; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended April 3, 1998.)

Article 10.—PUBLIC LIVESTOCK MARKETS

9-10-33. Livestock injured, disabled or unfit for sale. Definitions. As used in this act, these definitions shall apply.

- (a) "Actinomycosis" means the disease commonly known as lump jaw.
- (b) "Livestock" or "animal" means animals as defined by K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1001(b), and amendments thereto
- (c) "Commissioner" means the Kansas livestock commissioner or a designated employee of the Kansas animal health department, or a designated employee of the United States department of agriculture veterinary services.
- (d) "Department" means the Kansas animal health department.
- (e) "Euthanasia" or "euthanize" refers to accomplishing the humane death of an animal by a method appropriate for the species and the location.
- (f) "Metastatic" or "metastasis" means the invasion or infiltration of other structures or tissue by a neoplasm.
- (g) "Neoplasia," "neoplasm," or "neoplastic" means new, abnormal tissue growth deleterious to the animal's health. Tumors and cancer are neoplasias.
- (h) "Nonambulatory" means that the animal is unable to rise to its feet and walk with minimal stimulus.
- (i) "Owner" means the actual owner of the livestock or the person who consigned the livestock for sale, or the owner's or consignor's agent.
- (j) "Urinary calculi" means the condition commonly known as water belly.
- (k) "Market veterinarian" means an accredited veterinarian licensed to practice in Kansas and appointed by the commissioner to perform the duties of a veterinarian at a specific livestock market. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1008, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 19, Sec. 2; effective April 3, 1998.)
- **9-10-34.** Notice. (a) Every operator of a public live-stock market in Kansas shall post and maintain signs at the livestock market that state the following notice specified in subsection (b). Such signs shall be placed in a clearly visible location at the check-in dock, in the sale ring, and in the market office area available for public access. The notice specified in subsection (b) shall appear on the sign in black letters, and each letter shall be a minimum of one inch in height.
- (b) The signs required in subsection (a) shall contain the following notice:

NOTICE

To: All livestock owners, consignors, or agents. Any animal that is injured, disabled, or deemed unfit for sale shall be examined by the market veterinarian. After examination of the animal, the market veterinarian has sole discretion to determine whether the animal will be sold, removed from the livestock market, or euthanized in accordance with K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1008, and amendments thereto.

A copy of the statute and its regulations is available at the market office or from the Kansas Animal Health Department, 708 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, Kansas 66603. The statute and regulations are enforced by the Kansas Livestock Commissioner and not the livestock market.

(c) By consigning the animal to a public livestock market, the owner, consignor or agent consents to the following:

- (1) to have the animal examined;
- (2) to abide by the market veterinarian's determination of the disposition of the animal;
- (3) to pay any cost incurred for the removal of the animal from the livestock market; and
- (4) to pay any costs incurred for euthanasia and disposal of the animal. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1008, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 129, Sec. 2; effective April 3, 1998.)
- **9-10-35. Procedures.** (a) Each animal presented to the livestock market for public sale shall be inspected by the market veterinarian.
- (b) Veterinary inspection shall occur before sale, with a determination made by the market veterinarian as to whether or not the animal presented possesses any of the diseases or injuries specified in K.A.R. 9-10-36 or K.A.R. 9-10-37.
- (c) After examination of the animal, the market veterinarian shall have sole discretion to determine whether the animal will be sold, removed from the livestock market, or euthanized in accordance with K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1008, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 129, Sec. 2 and amendments thereto.
- (d) If the market veterinarian determines that a disease or injury identified in K.A.R. 9-10-36 or K.A.R. 9-10-37 exists, the market veterinarian shall make a reasonable effort to contact the owner by phone or in person to discuss the disposition of the animal.
- (e) Within 12 hours after notification, the owner may remove from the livestock market any animal identified by the market veterinarian pursuant to K.A.R. 9-10-36 and K.A.R. 9-10-37 or may direct the market veterinarian to euthanize this animal.
- (f) Animals deemed not fit for sale and removed live from the market shall be accompanied by a United States department of agriculture VS1-27 form.
- (g) If the market veterinarian is unsuccessful in contacting the owner, the market veterinarian shall have sole discretion in determining whether or not the animal identified pursuant to K.A.R. 9-10-36 and K.A.R. 9-10-37 should be euthanized to prevent further pain or suffering.
- (h) Any animal identified by the market veterinarian pursuant to K.A.R. 9-10-36 and K.A.R. 9-10-37 that is not removed from the livestock market 14 hours after the initial veterinary inspection may be euthanized, at the sole discretion of the market veterinarian.
- (i) All costs associated with removal or euthanasia of the animal shall be paid by the owner. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1008, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 129, Sec. 2; effective April 3, 1998.)
- **9-10-36.** Diseases or conditions that shall render livestock unfit for sale at public livestock markets. The following diseases or conditions shall render an animal unfit for sale at a public livestock market:
- (a) Ocular neoplasia, which is commonly known as "cancer eye," unless the neoplasitc lesions show no signs of metastasis and have not destroyed the eye or the eyelid. Livestock with cancer eye will be deemed unfit for sale if any of these conditions is met:

- (1) the neoplastic lesions affect the eye, eyelids, or both and have destroyed the affected organ to the point that the affected area cannot be surgically removed;
- (2) the neoplastic lesions show signs of local metastatic invasion from the primary site to the bone of the orbit; or
- (3) there are marked signs of swelling, discoloration, draining necrotic lesions, deformation of tissue, or odor;
- (b) any animal displaying other forms of neoplasia, regardless of tissue origin, which exhibit significant involvement, including swelling, discoloration, draining necrotic lesions, tissue deformation, or odor;
- (c) any disease process, including actinomycosis, pneumonia, and urinary calculi, that, in the judgment of the market veterinarian, is unlikely to respond to treatment and has resulted in emaciation of the animal; and
- (d) any disease process that has resulted in the presentation of a nonambulatory animal. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1008, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 129, Sec. 2; effective April 3, 1998.)
- **9-10-37.** Injuries that shall render livestock unfit for sale at public livestock markets. Injuries rendering livestock unfit for sale at public markets shall include any of the following:
- (a) A fracture of the long bone, open fractures, or other fractures or dislocations of a joint that render the animal unable to bear weight on the affected limb without that limb collapsing;
- (b) any injury that has not responded to treatment and has resulted in emaciation of the animal; or
- (c) any injury resulting in the presentation of a non-ambulatory animal. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1008, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 129, Sec. 2; effective April 3, 1998.)
- **9-10-38.** Euthanasia. (a) Euthanasia shall be accomplished by or under the direction of the public market veterinarian.
- (b) The cost of the euthanasia shall be posted at the livestock market and the commissioner notified of the cost at each market. The cost of euthanasia shall be paid by the owner.
- (c) For each animal euthanized in accordance with K.A.R. 9-10-34 through K.A.R. 9-10-38, the market veterinarian shall provide written notice to the owner of the animal, indicating the reason for the euthanasia and the cost of the euthanasia. A copy of this notice shall be sent to the commissioner. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1008, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 129, Sec. 2; effective April 3, 1998.)
- **9-10-39.** Disposal of euthanized carcasses. (a) The owner may request the return of the carcass and may retrieve the carcass within six hours after euthanasia occurs.
- (b) If the owner does not retrieve the carcass within six hours after euthanasia, the carcass shall be disposed of pursuant to K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1219, and amendments thereto. Any disposal fee shall be paid by the owner. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1996 Supp. 47-1008, as amended by L. 1997, Ch. 129, Sec. 2; effective April 3, 1998.)

HOUSE BILL No. 2613

An ACT authorizing the governor to convey by quitclaim deed all rights, title and interest to certain described real estate in the city of Concordia, Cloud county, Kansas.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) The governor, for and on behalf of the state of Kansas, is hereby authorized and empowered to convey to C.A.R.E.S., Inc., a not-for-profit corporation, by quitclaim deed without consideration, all rights, title and interest of the state of Kansas in the following described real property with improvements thereon and easements, in Cloud county, Kansas: Lots Eight (8), Nine (9), Ten (10), Eleven (11), Twelve (12), and Thirteen (13), in Block One Hundred Twelve (112); All in the City of Concordia, Cloud County, Kansas, according to the recorded Plat thereof.

(b) Conveyance of such rights, title and interest in such real estate, improvements thereon and easements, shall be executed in the name of the state of Kansas by the governor. No conveyance of real estate, improvements thereon and easements, authorized by this section shall be made by the state of Kansas until the deeds and conveyances have been reviewed and approved by the attorney general.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

HOUSE BILL No. 2637

AN ACT concerning the changing of the domicile of foreign insurance companies; amending K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 40-2,162 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 40-2,162 is hereby amended to read as follows: 40-2,162. (a) An insurer organized under the laws of any other state and admitted to do business in this state for the purpose of writing insurance may become a domestic insurer by complying with all of the requirements of law relative to the organization and licensing of a domestic insurer of the same type and by designating the insurer's principal place of business at a place in this state. The domestic insurer will be entitled to like certificates and licenses to transact business in this state, and shall be subject to the authority and jurisdiction of this state.

(b) A domestic insurer, upon the approval of the commissioner of insurance, may transfer the insurer's domicile to any other state in which it is admitted to transact the business of insurance, and upon such a transfer shall cease to be a domestic insurer, and shall be admitted to this state if qualified as a foreign insurer. The commissioner of insurance shall approve the proposed transfer unless the commissioner determines the transfer is not in the interest of the policyholders of this state.

(c) The certificate of authority, agents' appointments and licenses, rates and other items which the commissioner allows, in the commissioner's discretion, that are in existence at the time an insurer licensed to transact the business of insurance in this state transfers the insurer's corporate domicile to this or any other state by merger, consolidation or any other lawful method shall continue in full force and effect upon transfer if the insurer remains duly qualified to transact the business of insurance in this state. For purposes of existing authorizations and all other corporate purposes, the insurer is deemed the same entity as it was prior to the transfer of its domicile. All outstanding policies of a transferring insurer shall remain in full force and effect and need not be endorsed as to the new name of the company or the company's new location unless so ordered by the commissioner. A transferring insurer shall file new policy forms with the commissioner on or before the effective date of the transfer, but may use existing policy forms with appropriate endorsements if allowed by, and under such conditions as approved by, the commissioner. However, every transferring insurer shall notify the commissioner of the details of the proposed transfer and shall file promptly any resulting amendments to corporate documents filed or required to be filed with the commissioner.

(d) The commissioner may promulgate rules and regulations to carry out the purposes of this act.

New Sec. 2. A foreign insurer shall file restated articles of incorporation and a certificate of domestication with the secretary of state in a form prescribed by the secretary of state and approved by the insurance commissioner, to transfer to this state. A domestic insurer shall file with the secretary of state a certificate or order issued by the insurance commissioner approving the transfer to another state. An insurer who has transferred to this state prior to the effective date of this subsection, with the approval of the insurance commissioner pursuant to this act, shall be deemed in compliance with the provisions of this act.

Sec. 3. K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 40-2,162 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.
