Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Tuesday, September 29, in the third floor conference room, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in an existing rule and regulation.

The 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Rebecca Sanders, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, 66612-1678. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Rebecca Sanders at (785) 296-7811.

A copy of the full text of the regulation and the economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting the Kansas Insurance Department. A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 40-5-10. Credit insurance; fire and extended coverage; insurance for single indivisible premium; requirements. The purpose of the revision to this regu-

lation is to increase the maximum amount of insurance permitted under credit insurance and fire and extended coverage. There will be no economic impact on the Kansas Insurance Department. The economic impact on insurance companies would be minimal. The economic impact would be to focus resources necessary to change policies or other necessary documents to enable them to offer this increased amount of insurance.

A public hearing will be conducted at 1 p.m. Monday, September 28, in Rooms B and C of the Staff Development Building, Topeka State Hospital grounds, 300 S.W. Oakley, Topeka, to consider the adoption of new rules and regulations and amendments to existing rules and regulations on a permanent basis effective November 1, 1998.

Telephone conference will not be available.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to or during the public hearing to Hope Burns, Office of the Secretary for SRS, Room 603-N, Docking State Office Building, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views; it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes. The phrase "Federal Mandate" following an item indicates that the change is required by federal policy. Optional changes in regulations related to federal programs are subject to approval by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows.

Article 6.—MEDICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM— CLIENTS' ELIGIBILITY FOR PARTICIPATION

30-6-35. Application process. This regulation is being amended to eliminate the requirement for face-to-face interviews and allow for applications to be submitted by either mail or fax.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have

any discernable economic impact.

30-6-36. Redetermination of eligibility process. This regulation is being amended to eliminate the requirement for face-to face interviews and allow for redetermination forms to be submitted by either mail or fax.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have

any discernable economic impact.

30-6-41. Assistance planning. This regulation is being amended to require that the assistance plan for non-SSI children consist of all children in the family group and the legally responsible relatives for the children, if living together. Children not living with a legally responsible relative shall have a separate assistance plan which shall also include any siblings of the child if in the family group.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have

any discernable economic impact.

30-6-77. Poverty level pregnant women and children; determined eligibles. This regulation is being amended to require that if a child is living with a parent, the needs of the child, all other siblings of the child in the family group, and the legally responsible relatives for the children shall be considered. If the child does not live with a parent and is under age 18, only the needs of the child and other siblings of the child in the family group shall be considered. If the child is age 18 and not living with a parent, only the needs of the child shall be considered.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have

any discernable economic impact.

This regulation also is being amended to provide 12 months of continuous eligibility to any child who becomes eligible under this regulation without regard to any future changes in the family's income.

Economic Impact: This change is expected to increase medical expenditures by approximately \$1,735,046

(\$699,224 state general funds) on a yearly basis.

Bearer of Cost: The taxpayers of the State of Kansas will bear the additional costs of this change through appropriated state and federal funds.

Affected Parties:

1. This change will have a moderate impact on SRS staff and will result in a small increase in caseloads as children retain benefits for a longer period of time.

2. This change will benefit an average of 332 children each month by continuing medical coverage for up to 12 months that might have otherwise been terminated due

to changes in family income.

3. This change also will benefit medical providers serving children throughout the state by providing better access to health care coverage for meeting medical expenses as well as coverage of longer duration.

Other Methods: Other methods for achieving the results of this change were reviewed, but this method was

(continued

chosen as it parallels the continuous eligibility provisions to be adopted in the HealthWave program as specified in Article 14 of these regulations and is a permissable practice under current Medicaid regulations. It also supports the managed care process by providing a longer period of coverage, and therefore enrollment, in the managed care plan.

3-6-111. Applicable income. This regulation is being amended to adopt a standard \$200 monthly earned in-

come deduction of each employed person.

Economic Impact: This change is expected to result in an increase in Medicaid expenditures of \$672,883 (\$79,602 state general funds) on a yearly basis.

Bearer of Cost: The taxpayers of the State of Kansas will bear the additional costs of this change through appropriated state and feel and

priated state and federal funds.

Affected Parties:

1. This change will have a minimal impact on SRS staff and will result in only a small increase in caseloads.

2. This change is expected to benefit approximately 72 children who will now gain eligibility for Medicaid cov-

erage

Other Methods: Other methods for achieving the results of this change were reviewed, but this method was chosen as it parallels the income deduction to be used to determine eligibility in the HealthWave program and therefore maintains seamless access between the two programs.

Article 14.—CHILDREN'S HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM

30-14-1, 30-14-2, 30-14-3, 30-14-20 through 30-14-31, and 30-14-50. These are new regulations that require the secretary of SRS to establish and administer a health insurance program under Title XXI of the Social Security Act, 42 U.S.C. § 1397aa for children who are residents of Kansas and who are eligible under these regulations. The program shall be known as HealthWave, and coverage will begin January 1, 1999. HealthWave is directed toward targeted low-income children who do not have health insurance and who are not eligible for Medicaid. Targeted children are those in families with an income at or below 200 percent of the federal poverty guidelines. There are approximately 60,000 uninsured children in Kansas.

The Federal Balanced Budget Act of 1997 established Title XXI of the Social Security Act, which makes child health block grants available to states. The Kansas Legislature has passed and the Governor has signed legislation that provides for the establishment of this children's health insurance program in Kansas.

Economic Impact: HealthWave will cost approximately \$43 million per year. Of this amount, \$12 million would be state matching funds and the balance of \$31 million

would be federal funds.

Bearer of Cost: Taxpayers of Kansas and the United States.

Affected Parties: Low-income children without health insurance who are not eligible for Medicaid.

Notice of 1998 Sales Tax Changes and Exemptions

The following is a summary of this year's sales tax legislation that became law July 1, 1998.

Aircraft Sales

Certified and licensed air carriers are currently exempt from sales tax on their purchases of aircraft, aircraft replacement parts, and aircraft repair and modification services, when the aircraft being sold or serviced is for use in interstate or foreign commerce. This exemption is expanded to exempt these sales when they are made through an authorized agent of the air carrier for the carrier's eventual use in interstate or foreign commerce. K.S.A. 79-3606(g).

Churches and Religious Organizations

Sales of tangible personal property and services purchased by nonprofit 501(c)(3) religious organizations are exempt from sales tax if the property or services are used exclusively for religious purposes. This exemption does not apply to sales made to contractors who purchase materials to perform work on property owned by these organizations. However, any sale of materials will be exempt if made directly to the exempt church or other religious organization. K.S.A. 79-3606(aaa).

Direct Payment Authority

Certain large businesses are now eligible to apply to the department to make sales and use tax payments directly to the state. Businesses granted this direct payment authority may present their permit to their vendors to claim exemption and pay any sales or use tax due directly to the department. K.S.A. 79-3619.

Educational Institutions

Schools and educational institutions are exempt from sales tax. The 1998 Legislature defined an "educational institution" as a nonprofit school, college or university that offers educational courses at a level above the 12th grade and meets certain requirements fixed by statute. The new definition also includes:

• Nonprofit endowment associations and foundations that operate exclusively for the support and benefit of an educational institution;

 Nonprofit entities whose principal purpose is to hold receipts from intercollegiate sporting events and to disburse these receipts, as well as grants and gifts, for the sole benefit of the athletic programs of an educational institution;

 Nonprofit research organizations whose primary purpose is to pursue scholarly investigation and research for the sole benefit of an educational institu-

ion; and

 A group of educational institutions that operate exclusively for an educational purpose, such as the NCAA.

Educational institutions are eligible to obtain a project exemption when constructing, equipping, reconstructing, maintaining, repairing, enlarging, furnishing or remodeling buildings other than dormitories, and when they make other improvements to property. K.S.A. 79-3602(s).

Equipment Used in Certain Types of Broadcasting

The Legislature exempted sales of equipment that is used directly and primarily to generate broadcast signals for over-the-air free access radio and television stations. The electricity the station uses to power the equipment that generates its signal also is exempt. K.S.A. 79-3606(zz).

Manufacturing Machinery and Equipment

The sales tax exemption for manufacturing machinery and equipment is now broadened to exempt repair and replacement parts and accessories. Exempt parts include, but are not limited to: belts, drill bits, grinding wheels, cutting bars, saws, dies, jigs and molds. Refractory items used in production also are exempt. K.S.A. 79-3606(kk).

Membership Dues and Fees

The 1998 Legislature exempted membership dues and recreational activity fees that are paid to certain nonprofit community service organizations. For this exemption to apply, the organization must qualify for exemption from property tax under the Ninth paragraph of K.S.A. 79-201. These organizations may include, but are not limited to: the American Red Cross, Big Brothers & Big Sisters, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, YMCA, YWCA, community health centers, local community organizations and social services organizations. K.S.A. 79-3603(m).

Also exempted are the membership dues paid to military veterans organizations, such as the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion, and their auxiliaries. These dues were previously taxed when payment allowed members to use the organization's facilities for recreation or entertainment. K.S.A. 79-3603(n).

Nonprofit Zoos

Purchases by a nonprofit 501(c)(3) zoo, or purchases made on behalf of the zoo by a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization that operates the zoo, are now exempt from sales tax. Nonprofit zoos, like political subdivisions and schools, are eligible to receive project exemption certificates to exempt contractor purchases of materials and supplies used to improve their facilities. Membership dues charged by such nonprofit organizations whose sole purpose is to support a nonprofit zoo also are exempt from sales tax. K.S.A. 79-3606(xx); K.S.A. 79-3603(n).

Other Nonprofit Organizations

Sales of food for human consumption are now exempt when made by a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization under

a food distribution program that sells the food below cost in exchange for community service. K.S.A. 79-3606(bbb).

Sales of tangible personal property made by or on behalf of a nonprofit organization for nonsectarian multidiscipline youth development programs are now exempt from sales tax. This includes Girl Scout cookie sales and Boy Scout popcorn sales. K.S.A. 79-3606(ii).

Parent-Teacher Associations

Parent-teacher associations and organizations are now exempt from paying sales tax on their purchases. Parent-teacher associations and organizations also are relieved of the responsibility of collecting sales tax on fund raising sales they make on behalf of the association. K.S.A. 79-3606(yy).

Prepaid Telephone Calling Cards

Prepaid telephone calling cards, which are denominated in minutes, are now taxable at the time of sale as the retail sale of tangible personal property. Since tax is paid at the time the card is purchased, calls debited to the card are no longer subject to sales tax. Charges for prepaid authorization numbers and for the recharge of a calling card are taxed in the same way as the sale of the calling card itself. K.S.A. 79-3602(f); K.S.A. 79-3603(b).

Residential Labor Services

Labor services performed on or after July 1, 1998, to remodel, reconstruct, restore, renovate, repair or replace a residence are exempt. A "residence" is defined as "only those enclosures within which individuals customarily live." Sales of materials and supplies for use in residential or commercial construction projects remain taxable. The exemption for original construction also remains. K.S.A. 79-3603(p).
