Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Friday, December 11, in Room 108 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a new regulation and proposed changes in existing rules and regulations of the Board of Accountancy.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the executive director of the Board of Accountancy, Suite 556, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties also will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Vickie Boose at (785) 296-2162. Handicapped parking is located at the south end of the Landon State Office Building, and the north entrance to the building is accessible to individuals with disabilities.

The regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the regulations and their economic impact follows.

74-5-2. Definitions. This regulation is being revised to change the terminology of "personal financial planning"

to "financial planning," which does not impact or change the definition. This regulation also is being revised to update existing language and set out the definitions in alphabetical order. There is no economic impact to governmental agencies, the general public or CPAs.

74-5-103. Commissions and referral fees. The revisions to this regulation expand the list of functions performed by a CPA that would prohibit the CPA from accepting or paying a commission or referral fee for the sale of services or products recommended or sold by the CPA to a client. In addition, the requirement for a CPA to obtain a personal financial specialist or other similar designation in order to engage in the practice of financial planning has been eliminated. This regulation also is being revised to update existing language. There is no economic impact to governmental agencies, the general public or CPAs.

74-5-104. Contingent fees. The revisions to this regulation expand the list of functions performed by a CPA for a client that would prohibit the CPA from performing any services for a contingent fee or receiving a contingent fee. This regulation also is being revised to update existing language. There is no economic impact to governmental agencies, the general public or CPAs.

74-5-404. Permit holders employed by non-CPA firms performing or offering to perform non-attest functions to the public. This new regulation allows a permit-holding CPA, who works in a non-CPA firm, to use the CPA designation when providing non-attest functions. There is no economic impact to governmental agencies, the general public or CPAs.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, December 8, in the fifth floor conference room, Mills Building, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider adoption of proposed regulations of the State Conservation Commission.

The 60-day period prior to the public hearing will allow time for written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the State Conservation Commission, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

A complete copy of the regulations and the economic impact statements may be obtained by contacting the State Conservation Commission office.

The following new regulations are proposed:

K.A.R. 11-9-1. Definitions. Terminology used in the "Kansas water quality buffer initiative" is defined.

K.A.R. 11-9-2. Program. Outlines the purpose of the buffer initiative.

K.A.R. 11-9-3. Eligible areas. Defines areas in the state eligible for the buffer initiative.

K.A.R. 11-9-4. Eligible applicants. Defines who is eligible for incentive payments in the buffer initiative.

K.A.R. 11-9-5. Eligible practices. Defines which practices are eligible for payments in the buffer initiative.

K.A.R. 11-9-6. Payments. Defines the level of payment and the maximum amount an eligible applicant may earn.

K.A.R. 11-9-7. Contracts. Sets forth the length of contracts.

K.A.R. 11-9-8. Selection. Outlines possible selection criteria that may be used to select eligible applicants.

K.A.R. 11-9-9. Technical standards. Sets forth technical standards for the initiative.

K.A.R. 11-9-10. Haying and grazing. Sets forth provisions for haying and grazing on land under contract.

K.A.R. 11-9-11. Termination. Sets forth provisions for termination of the contract.

K.A.R. 11-9-12. Review and appeal procedures. Sets forth the time restriction to appeal an adverse decision.

Economic Impact: Implementation of the buffer initiative will have a positive impact on eligible applicants who offer areas for enrollment. They will receive an incentive payment that will supplement funds earned through the federal Conservation Reserve Program. Exact costs cannot be computed because this program is not mandatory and actual costs will not be known until application of the regulation has begun. There will potentially be a positive impact on vendors who will supply grass seed and in some cases trees for planting.

There will be a negative impact on county government as the assessed valuation of land enrolled in the initiative will go from dry cropland to a lesser valuation of either tame grass, native grass or wasteland. The impact will vary depending upon soil classification. Tax reduction for

enrolled acres changing from cropland to grass ranges from \$2.77 to \$9.49 per acre. In one instance, the valuation actually increases the per acre tax by \$0.22 per acre.

Article 7.—APPLICATIONS

K.A.R. 66-7-2. Application for certificate of authorization. This regulation is being modified in order to resolve a conflict between the Kansas State Board of Technical Professions' rules and regulations and K.S.A. 17-7301.

Economic Impact: There will be no additional economic impact on either the agency or the industry as a result of this regulation.

Other various changes that are grammatical, appropriate to format, or updated to the most current form of the statute have been made.

**Administrative Interpretation No. 1007
Interest Rates on Mortgage Loans**

This administrative interpretation will modify the previous policy of this agency regarding the Kansas Uniform Consumer Credit Code, specifically K.S.A. 16a-2-401(7) and (8), and the maximum permissible interest rate for first mortgage loans made subject to the code and subordinate mortgage loans.

A first mortgage loan is *only* subject to the code if the parties so agree in *writing* pursuant to K.S.A. 16a-1-109. K.S.A. 16a-2-401(7) provides that the interest rate of these first mortgage loans is governed by K.S.A. 16-207(b) *unless made subject hereto by agreement*.

A second or subordinate mortgage loan, other than one made by the holder of the first mortgage, is automatically subject to the code pursuant to the definition of a "consumer loan" in K.S.A. 16a-1-301(13). K.S.A. 16a-2-401(8) provides that the interest rate of these second or subordinate mortgage loans is governed by K.S.A. 16-207(b) or (h) *unless made subject hereto by agreement*.

It is the opinion of the Acting Consumer Credit Commissioner that for purposes of K.S.A. 16a-2-401(7) and (8), a promissory note or other loan document signed by a borrower, in connection with a first or subordinate mortgage loan as described above, which discloses an interest rate not exceeding the interest rate ceilings established by K.S.A. 16a-2-401(1) or (2), constitutes an "agreement" by

the parties that the loan is made subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 16a-2-401, including the interest rate ceilings.

This issue was considered by the Advisory Council to the Acting Consumer Credit Commissioner on July 21, 1998, and it is expected that the 1999 Kansas Legislature will be asked to consider legislation that will clarify K.S.A. 16a-2-401.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality operating permit. Exxon USA - Olathe Plant has applied for a Class II operating permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-540. Emissions of sulfur oxides, nitrogen oxides, carbon monoxide, volatile organic compounds, particulate matter less than 10 microns and hazardous air pollutants were evaluated during the permit review process. The purpose of a Class II permit is to limit the potential-to-emit for these pollutants to below major source thresholds.

Exxon USA - Olathe Plant owns and operates a grease manufacturing facility located at 1400 S. Harrison, Olathe.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation and all information relied upon during the permit application review process is available for public review during normal business hours at the KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, and at the Johnson County Environmental Department, 11180 Thompson Ave., Lenexa. The written request must be submitted to Connie Carreno, Bureau of Air and Radiation, not later than the close of business November 2 in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 3 p.m. Tuesday, December 8, in Room 106 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the executive administrator of the Board of Nursing, Room 551-S, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 60-3-106. Licensure qualifications. When an individual fails to pass the licensure examination within 24 months from graduation, the board is asking the applicant to petition to retake the examination. The change in this regulation sets out what the individual must submit in the petition. The board also may require the individual to submit a study plan. The elements of the study plan are outlined so the candidate will know what to include.

K.A.R. 60-3-101. Licensure. As a suggestion from the board's assistant attorney general, the board has included in the regulation that an applicant for licensure will pass the examination prepared by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing.

K.A.R. 60-7-101. Licensure. The licensure qualifications for licensed mental health technicians have been updated in the regulation. The board added a section for providing modifications for a person with learning disabilities. The board also includes the requirement for petition and possible study plan for the applicant who has not passed the examination within 24 months.

Economic Impact: (K.A.R. 60-3-106 and 60-7-101) An individual, in completing a required study plan, could utilize resources from nursing libraries without a great deal of cost. However, it could be several hundred to more than \$1,000 if the individual employs tutors, study booklets or exam preparation courses as part of the study plan.

On a positive note, the board hopes the individual will be better prepared when next taking the licensure examination if a study plan is completed. Individuals often work as nursing aides at minimum wage or as licensed practical nurses until the licensure exam is passed. Being able to pass the exam usually means an increase in several dollars an hour in wages. This would be an economic positive for the candidate.

Board members and staff have to review all study plans. There may be some minimal expenses of a few dollars, usually in postage or telephone calls. No added staff is needed to complete the study reviews, as board members volunteer their time. Around 20 study plans are done per year.

The other changes in K.A.R. 60-7-101 and the changes in K.A.R. 60-3-101 should have no economic impact on candidates for licensure.

K.A.R. 60-13-116. Analgesia care. Analgesia care is defined in this regulation as applied to registered nurse anesthetists when providing such care when requested by a physician. Medication also is defined as related to analgesia care.

Economic Impact: This regulation should have no economic impact on registered nurse anesthetists, the public or the Board of Nursing.

Copies of the regulations and their economic impact statements can be obtained from the Board of Nursing at the address above, (785) 296-5752.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Article 1.—DISEASES

28-1-4. Registration of disease prevalence. (a) The administrator of each hospital licensed in the state shall report the following diseases to the secretary of health and environment for registration, on forms provided by the department:

- (1) All diseases listed in K.A.R. 28-1-2;
- (2) cancer, as required by K.A.R. 28-70-2;
- (3) congenital malformations in infants under one year of age;
- (4) acquired immune deficiency syndrome; and
- (5) fetal alcohol syndrome.

(b) The administrator of each hospital licensed in the state may designate a person within the hospital to report diseases on behalf of the individuals required by K.S.A. 65-118, and amendments thereto, to report these diseases for cases that these individuals observe while practicing at the hospital. Each report from the designated hospital person shall fulfill all reporting requirements for individuals required by K.S.A. 65-118, and amendments thereto, to report these cases.

(c) All reports pursuant to this regulation shall be confidential medical information. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-101; implementing K.S.A. 65-102 and K.S.A. 65-118; effective May 1, 1982; amended May 1, 1986; amended Jan. 12, 1996; amended Oct. 16, 1998.)

Article 4.—INSTANT GAME RULES

HEARTLAND PARK PARTS AMERICA DRAWINGS

111-4-607. Name of drawings. The Kansas lottery shall conduct a series of drawings, entitled the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings." The "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" shall take place on Sunday, October 4, 1998, at Heartland Park, 7530 Southwest Topeka Boulevard, Topeka, Kansas 66619. Rules applicable are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-607 through 111-4-615. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-8-26-94, Aug. 19, 1994; amended, T-111-10-12-95, Aug. 18, 1995; amended, T-111-8-25-97, Aug. 15, 1997; amended, T-111-9-21-98, Aug. 21, 1998.)

111-4-608. Prerequisites for a drawing. Before the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" may be validly conducted, a location and the receptacle(s) or drum(s) must be approved by the executive director or his designee and the drawing must be open to the public. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-8-26-94, Aug. 19, 1994; amended, T-111-8-25-97, Aug. 15, 1997; amended, T-111-9-21-98, Aug. 21, 1998.)

111-4-609. Prizes. The winners selected at the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" conducted pursuant to the K.A.R. 111-4-607 *et seq.* shall receive prizes as follows.

Twelve tickets shall be drawn consecutively, immediately prior to the finals. Prizes shall be determined by the winning driver's speed in each of the twelve different classes with the winning dollar amount representing the

actual speed of the winning driver with the minimum and maximum dollar amounts as follows:

111-4-610. Entry into drawings. Entry into the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" is accomplished by the process detailed in the following subparagraphs:

(a) Obtain a valid Kansas instant lottery ticket from the lottery's selling location at Heartland Park Topeka;

(b) Determine if the ticket is a winning ticket in accordance with any instant game rules. If the ticket is a winning ticket, it is not eligible for the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings," and shall be redeemed in accordance with the instant game rules;

(c) If the ticket is a valid non-winning ticket purchased at the Heartland Park selling location, the ticket is eligible for winning a drawing and the holder of the ticket may enter the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings."

(d) The holder of the non-winning ticket must complete the information form on the back of the ticket in a legible manner and sign it.

111-4-611. Determination of winners. (a) The receptacle or drum shall be sealed and mixed to ensure random selection.

(b) The executive director shall designate one individual of his choice to participate in the selection process.

(c) The selection of the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" winners shall be accomplished by the individual designated by the executive director, using a bare arm technique, removing only one ticket at a time from the contents of the receptacle(s) or drum(s) for each of the 12 drawings. Four additional entries will be drawn after the twelfth ticket is drawn to serve as alternate winners in the event any of the original 12 winners cannot be located or notified. The same certification by security will be performed as for the original 12 drawn entries. Lottery security shall review the selected ticket to determine if the ticket is a valid non-winning ticket, the name is determined to be legible and the ticket was purchased at Heartland Park Topeka. If these requirements are met, the name of the ticket holder shall be announced to the audience.

(d) The named person need not be present at a drawing, but must in any event provide proper identification in order to claim the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" prize.

111-4-614. Co-sponsor drawings. Co-sponsors of the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" may hold co-sponsor drawings in conjunction with local retailers, businesses and organizations at a drawing event. In no instance shall these drawings take place prior to the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings." Such drawings, if conducted, shall be a part of the lottery "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" and prizes, in addition to cash prizes presented by the lottery, may be donated by the co-sponsor(s). The person drawing tickets for the lottery may draw additional tickets for the co-sponsor(s) prizes. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-8-26-94, Aug. 19, 1994; amended, T-111-9-21-98, Aug. 21, 1998.)

111-4-615. Cancellation of race/drawing. (a) If any "Heartland Park Parts America Drawing" is not held due to the Heartland Park race being cancelled because of rain out, power failure or any other unforeseen circumstance beyond the control of the Kansas lottery and Heartland Park after entries have been placed in the receptacle(s) or drum(s), it will be rescheduled. Any rescheduled drawing will be held as soon as practicable and at a location and time determined by the executive director or the person designated by the executive director and the minimum prizes identified in K.A.R. 111-4-609 will be awarded for each prize class which is rescheduled.

(b) Lottery security personnel or designated security personnel will, upon cancellation of any "Heartland Park Parts America Drawing" which is rescheduled, take possession of and secure the receptacle(s) or drum(s) containing all entries for the cancelled "Heartland Park Parts America Drawing" and hold all ticket entries contained therein until the rescheduled drawing.

111-7-129. Prize. The first prize winner selected in the "QuikTrip—Big 40 Promotion" shall receive a trip for two to Denver for three days and two nights, including hotel and air fare from KCI in Kansas City, two tickets to the Kansas City Chiefs versus Denver Broncos football

game on December 6, 1998, and \$20.00 worth of QuikTrip gasoline. The next 24 prize winners selected in the "QuikTrip—Big 40 Promotion" shall receive \$20 worth of gasoline from QuikTrip and a \$20 coupon prize pack from the Kansas lottery including \$3 each for Powerball, Kansas Cash, Cash 4 Life, Pick 3 and Keno tickets, and \$5 for instant tickets. 111-7-130. Method of entry. Entry into the "QuikTrip—Big 40 Promotion" to be conducted on October 17, 1998, shall be accomplished as follows:

(a) A player may obtain a valid "QuikTrip—Big 40 Promotion" entry form which is issued following every twelfth wager transaction involving the on-line games Powerball, Kansas Cash, Cash 4 Life and Pick 3 games offered by the Kansas lottery that occur among the 57 QuikTrip locations. The promotion will run from 6:00 a.m. beginning September 1, 1998, through September 30, 1998, at the close of business as defined by subsection (p) of K.A.R. 111-6-1 at all QuikTrips in Kansas. Only valid entry forms issued during September 1998 by QuikTrips in Kansas which are mailed pursuant to subsection (d) and received by the time specified in subsection (g) shall be eligible for the drawing.

(c) Each individual entry form shall constitute one entry.

(d) Place only one valid entry form into an envelope no larger than four and three-fourths inches by 11 inches and mail to: "Kansas Lottery," post office box 3000, Great Bend, Kansas 67530. The mailing address shall also be printed on each entry form issued.

(e) The holder of the entry form must complete the information on each entry form in a legible manner. Only one name shall appear on entry forms on any one entry.

(f) There is no limit on the number of entries a person may make.

(g) All entry forms which are received at the lottery's Great Bend post office box by the morning of Tuesday, October 13, 1998, and picked up by the lottery at approximately noon on Tuesday, October 13, 1998, shall be entered into the drawing.

(i) Completing the information on the entry form and entering the form into the drawing constitutes authorization to publicly identify the person whose entry is drawn.

111-7-132. Selection of winners. The following process shall be used for the selection of winners in the "QuikTrip—Big 40 Promotion" drawing:

(a) Kansas lottery personnel shall pick up all mail containing "QuikTrip—Big 40 Promotion" envelopes at the United States post office in Great Bend, Kansas.

(b) Lottery personnel shall transport the mail to the mail room where the entries will be secured by lottery security personnel. On or before the day of the drawing, lottery personnel will transfer the entries to Overland Park for the drawing.

(c) The drawing shall be held at the QuikTrip No. 157 located at 7400 West 63rd Street in Overland Park, Kansas, in a place accessible to the public and open for public attendance with lottery security personnel present, or at the QuikTrip corporate office located at 6300 West 51st Street, Mission, Kansas, in the event the lottery determines that because of weather or other conditions that the drawing location should be changed. The drawing shall be audio and video taped.

(d) Prior to the drawing, the drum or receptacle shall be sealed and the contents mixed by rotating the drum five times, if a drum is used, or by mixing the contents with a shovel or by other means for at least three minutes if another type receptacle is used.

Starting on September 1, 1998, and ending at the close of business on September 30, 1998, as defined in subsection (p) of K.A.R. 111-6-1, for every Keno ticket purchase of \$5.00 or more, a player will receive a \$1.00 "4-spot" Keno quick pick play free. Lottery terminals will automatically dispense a "4-spot" Keno play, starting at 6:00 a.m., September 1, 1998, for every single \$5.00 Keno ticket purchase whether for a single draw or multiple draws during the month of September 1998. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-9-21-98, Aug. 21, 1998.)

Article 9.—INDIVIDUAL PULL-TAB GAME RULES

RULES FOR PULL-TAB GAME NO. 14 "WILD JOKERS"

111-9-91. Name of game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct a pull-tab game entitled "Wild Jokers" starting on or after September 7, 1998. The specific rules for the "Wild Jokers" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-9-91 through 111-9-96. Other applicable rules for the game may be found in K.A.R. 111-8-1 *et seq.* (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-9-21-98, Aug. 21, 1998.)

111-9-92. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Wild Jokers" pull-tab lottery game.

(a) "Ticket" or "card" means a Kansas lottery pull-tab game "Wild Jokers" ticket.

(b) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols or pictures printed on the front and under each tab on the back of each pull-tab ticket which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this pull-tab game, the play symbols consist of images of a classic red joker, a yellow joker, a horseshoe, a king, a joker, a black and white joker, a blue profile joker, a seven, a clown joker, a lime, and a lemon. Various combinations of these play symbols appear under each of the five tabs on the back of each ticket.

(c) "Carton" or "sleeve" means a package of pull-tab tickets containing 624 tickets.

(d) "Carton serial number" is the 9-digit number appearing on the front of the ticket. (Authorized by and

implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-9-21-98, Aug. 21, 1998.)

111-9-93. Determination of instant prize winners. Each tab on the back of the ticket is to be pulled open. If two classic red jokers plus a yellow joker, a horseshoe, a king joker, a black and white joker, a profile joker, a seven or a clown joker appear horizontally, vertically, or diagonally with a blue arrow running through all three symbols, the player wins the prize which corresponds to the symbols appearing on the front of the ticket. On winning combinations, the total amount won will appear under a tab. The prize amounts are as follows:

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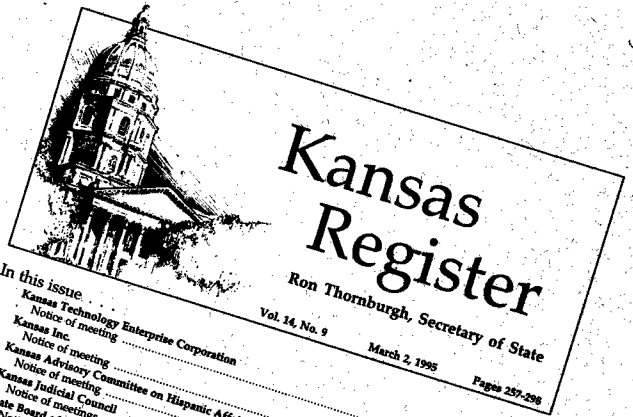
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
