Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has received and reviewed a permit application from Lloyd's Loads, L.L.C. for a construction/demolition landfill in Crawford County. KDHE is providing public notice of its intent to issue a construction/demolition landfill permit to Lloyd's Loads, L.L.C. The landfill would be located at ½ mile north of U.S. Highway 160 on 190th Street, in the NE ¼ of the SE ¼ of Section 15, Township 31S, Range 24E, approximately 3 miles east of Cherokee. Only construction and demolition waste materials, as defined by state statutes, would be allowed for disposal at this landfill. The total area of the disposal site would be approximately 5 acres with an estimated capacity of 20,000 cubic yards. At this capacity, the landfill would be expected to operate approximately five years.

A copy of the administrative record, which includes the draft permit and all information regarding this permit action, is available for public review until December 16 during normal business hours, Monday through Friday, at the following locations:

Anyone wishing to comment in writing on the draft permit information should submit written statements postmarked not later than December 16 to Stacey Baalman. All comments received during this public comment period shall become a part of the permit record and shall be considered in making a final decision on the proposed permit action.

In conjunction with the public comment period, an informational meeting and public hearing will be held at 6:30 p.m. and 7 p.m. December 16 in Room 224 of the Kelce College of Business, Pittsburg State University, South Broadway and Cleveland Ave., Pittsburg. The informational meeting will provide concerned individuals an informal setting where they can ask KDHE personnel questions regarding the construction/demolition landfill. The hearing will provide a format for individuals to make formal comments that will be recorded by KDHE. KDHE will subsequently respond to all formal comments in writing.

After consideration of all formal comments received at the public hearing and all written comments received during the public comment period, KDHE will make a final decision on whether to issue the permit. Notice of the decision will be given to anyone who submitted written comments during the comment period, to those who commented during the public hearing, and to those who requested notice of the final permit decision.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

(Editor's Note: The following notice of hearing is being republished to clarify the notice that was published in the October 22, 1998, issue of the Kansas Register. That notice contained technical errors that have been corrected in this publication. The date, time and place of the hearing have not changed.)

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Thursday, January 7, at the Clubhouse Inn, 924 S.W. Henderson Road, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed rules and regulations of the Kansas State Board of Pharmacy.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Larry Froelich, Executive Secretary, Room 513, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to

present their view, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Karen Hollon at (785) 296-4056.

The regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A brief summary of the proposed regulations and economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 68-2-22. Electronic prescription transmission. The regulation outlines the requirements that are to be followed for a practitioner to transmit a prescription order to a pharmacy.

There is no anticipated economic impact on the Board of Pharmacy, other governmental agencies, registrants or the public.

K.A.R. 68-11-1. Fees for examination and licensure as a pharmacist. The regulation changes the amount of renewal fees charged for licensure as a pharmacist. The renewal fee is decreased from \$200 to \$150.

The agency will expect a decrease of \$80,000 in fees collected in FY 99 and yearly thereafter. A total of 3,162 active and inactive pharmacists licenses will be affected. Although the agency will experience a decrease in revenues, the expenses of the agency do not exceed amended revenues.

K.A.R. 68-20-10a. Electronic prescription transmission of controlled substances. The regulation is being revised only to update the existing language.

There is no anticipated economic impact on the Board of Pharmacy, other governmental agencies, registrants or the public.

K.A.R. 68-20-15a. Security requirements. The regulation is being revised only to update the existing language.

There is no anticipated economic impact on the Board of Pharmacy, other governmental agencies, registrants or the public.

K.A.R. 68-20-17. Order forms. The regulation is being revised only to update the existing language.

There is no anticipated economic impact on the Board of Pharmacy, other governmental agencies, registrants or the public.

K.A.R. 68-20-19. Controlled substances listed in schedule II. The regulation allows the prescriber seven days to deliver a schedule II controlled substance prescription, as opposed to what was 72 hours.

There is no anticipated economic impact on the Board of Pharmacy, other governmental agencies, registrants or the public.

K.A.R. 65-11-3. Associated advertising. This is an amendment to an existing regulation that adds a Kansas limited liability company formed to practice optometry to the nonlicensed entities that a licensee may use to advertise.

There is no economic impact. This is not an environmental regulation.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Region VII, have received Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) hazardous waste Part A and Part B permit applications from the EPA, the operator, and Robert M. and Emily Modeer, the owners of the facility located at 25 Funston Road, Kansas City, Kansas. The KDHE and the EPA are providing notice of their intent to renew a joint hazardous waste storage permit to the operator and owner of the facility. The facility obtained the hazardous waste storage permit in June 1987 and was assigned the EPA identification number KS7680090001.

In October 1985, the State of Kansas received final authorization from the EPA to implement its own hazardous waste management program in lieu of the federal program except for the portions covered by the Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments of 1984 (HSWA). The KDHE portion of the permit (Part I) will be issued under the authority of K.S.A. 65-3430 *et seq.* and K.A.R. 28-31-9, and the EPA portion of the permit (Part II) will be issued under the authority of sections 3001(g), 3001(h), 3002(b), 3004(d), 3004(u) and (v), 3005 and 6001 of RCRA.

Part I of the permit will allow the operator and/or owner to store hazardous waste in containers from on-site sources and also from off-site sources, such as Superfund site clean-up actions, and wastes from emergency clean-up activities. The facility will store a total of 17,380 gallons of hazardous waste in three separate storage areas. The materials stored at the facility will include ignitable, corrosive, reactive, toxic, and listed liquid or solid hazardous wastes destined for transport off-site for additional management. All three storage areas comply with 40 CFR Part 264 Subpart I and Part 270 requirements for container storage areas. Emergency equipment is available at the facility and appropriate warning signs are posted on the perimeter fences. The EPA portion (Part II) of the joint permit will address the requirements of HSWA.

To request board approval of a course to meet any education requirement of the act or portion, for each course the sponsor shall perform the following:

(1) Appoint a coordinator, who shall monitor the course and assure compliance with the appropriate statutes and regulations;

(2) submit all information required by the board for course approval at least 60 days before the first scheduled class session, including the following:

(A) A completed application for course registration on a form prescribed by the board;

(B) the procedure for maintaining attendance records;

(C) the proposed dates and times of the course offering;

(D) the total amount of the attendance fee;

(E) the total number of class sessions and the length of time per session;

(F) the total hours in the course and the number of credit hours requested;

(G) if approval of the course is requested pursuant to K.A.R. 117-2-1, 117-3-1, or 117-4-1, the amount of time allotted to the required examination;

(H) a course syllabus, including a detailed course outline and course objectives;

(I) an instructor resume, demonstrating that the instructor meets the qualifications in relation to knowledge of the subject matter and ability to teach;

(J) the methods of instruction or teaching techniques to be used in the course;

(K) a copy of any textbook or manual that will be used; and

(L) a copy of all handout materials that will be used.

(b) Upon notification by the board that the course has been tentatively approved, the sponsor shall submit the fee prescribed by K.A.R. 117-7-1. Written approval of the board shall not be granted until the fee has been received by the board.

(c) For continuing education purposes, each instructor shall demonstrate knowledge of the subject matter as demonstrated by either of the following:

(1) A college degree in an academic area related to the course; or

(2) at least three years of experience in the subject area directly related to the course.

(d) For pre-licensing education or qualifying education purposes, pursuant to 117-2-1, 117-3-1, and 117-4-1, each instructor shall demonstrate knowledge of the subject matter as indicated by the following:

(1) Possessing a current appraiser license or certification pursuant to K.S.A. 58-4109(a)(1), (2), or (3), and amendments thereto; or

(2) holding a current appraiser's license or certification issued by another state; or

(3)(A) Providing evidence of completion of all the required courses pursuant to 117-2-1, 117-3-1, or 117-4-1 within the past five years; and

(B) providing an appraisal log sheet that shows the equivalent of two years of appraiser experience within the past five calendar years in the subject area related to the course. One thousand hours shall constitute one year of appraisal experience.

(e) For purposes of continuing education or pre-licensing education on the "uniform standards of professional appraisal practices," each instructor shall demonstrate knowledge of the subject matter as indicated by the following:

(1) Attending and passing a 15-classroom-hour, board-approved "uniform standards of professional appraisal practice" course within the previous three years; and

(2)(A) Possessing a current appraiser license or certification issued pursuant to K.S.A. 58-4109(a)(1), (2), or (3), and amendments thereto, or by another state; or

(B) providing evidence of completion of all the required courses pursuant to 117-2-1, 117-3-1, or 117-4-1 within the past five calendar years.

(f) For pre-licensing education or qualifying education purposes, pursuant to 117-2-1, 117-3-1, and 117-4-1, the ability to teach effectively shall be demonstrated by one of the following:

(1) Within the preceding two years, completing a board-approved program for instructors that is designed to develop the ability to communicate;

(2) holding a current teaching certificate issued by any state department of education or an equivalent agency;

(3) holding a four-year undergraduate degree in education; or

(4) having experience teaching in schools, seminars, or in an equivalent setting.

(g) Each instructor shall perform the following:

(1) Comply with all laws and regulations pertaining to appraiser continuing education;

(2) provide students with the most current and accurate information. For the "uniform standards of professional appraisal practice" course and "updates of uniform standards of professional appraisal practice" courses, the instructor shall permanently furnish each student with the current edition of the uniform standards of professional appraisal practice as promulgated by the appraisal standards board of the appraisal foundation;

(3) maintain an atmosphere conducive to learning in a classroom; and

(4) provide assistance to the students and respond to questions relating to course material.

(h) Course approvals shall expire on June 30 of each year. By May 1 a notification that includes the necessary forms shall be sent by the board informing each sponsor that an application for renewal is necessary. Course renewal applications and necessary forms shall be received by the board before October 1, or the course approvals shall not be renewed.

(i) The sponsor shall not advertise a course as approved unless written approval has been granted by the board.

(j) The sponsor shall conduct each course in a classroom or other facility that is adequate to comfortably accommodate the number of students enrolled.

(k) Each sponsor shall maintain, for at least five years, accurate records relating to course offerings, instructors, and student attendance. If a sponsor ceases operations, the coordinator appointed under paragraph (a)(1) above shall be responsible for maintaining the records or providing a custodian acceptable to the board.

(l) Each sponsor shall provide each student with a certificate of completion on a form prescribed by the board within seven days of the date the student completes the course. The sponsor may require payment of course tuition as a condition for completing the course. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 58-4105; effective Jan. 21, 1991; amended, T-117-6-10-91, June 10, 1991; amended Aug. 5, 1991; amended May 3, 1996; amended Jan. 9, 1998; amended Nov. 30, 1998.)

Article 8.—UNIFORM STANDARDS OF PROFESSIONAL APPRAISAL PRACTICE

117-8-2. Confidentiality provisions. An appraiser shall not be considered to violate the provision of the uniform standards of professional appraisal practice that requires an appraiser to protect the confidential nature of the appraiser-client relationship, if the appraiser discloses confidential factual data obtained from a client or the results of an assignment prepared for the client to any of the following:

(a) The client and persons specifically authorized by the client;

(b) any third parties that may be authorized by due process of law;

(c) a duly authorized professional peer review committee; or

(d) the board in relation to a complaint made against another appraiser. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 58-4105; effective Nov. 30, 1998.)

Article 17.—WILDLIFE, COMMERCIAL USES AUTHORIZED

115-17-1. Commercial harvest of fish bait; legal species, harvest seasons, size restrictions, daily limits, and possession limits. (a) The following wildlife may be commercially harvested in Kansas for sale as fishing bait:

- (1) Crayfish—all species;
- (2) amphibians:
 - (A) Tiger salamander;
 - (B) Blanchard's cricket frog;
 - (C) spotted chorus frog;
 - (D) plains leopard frog;
 - (E) plains spadefoot toad;
 - (F) American toad;
 - (G) great plain's toad; and
 - (H) Woodhouse's toad;
- (3) annelids; and
- (4) insects.

(b) The season for commercial harvest of wildlife listed above in subsection (a) shall be year round.

(c) There shall be no minimum or maximum size restrictions for wildlife listed above in subsection (a).

(d) There shall be no maximum daily or possession limits for wildlife listed above in subsection (a).

(e) Wildlife listed in K.A.R. 115-15-1 or K.A.R. 115-15-2 shall not be harvested. (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 32-1002; effective Sept. 10, 1990; amended Nov. 30, 1998.)

115-17-2. Commercial sale of fish bait. (a) The following wildlife may be commercially sold in Kansas for fishing bait:

(1) All species of fish, except that the sale of live specimens shall be restricted to only those species native to or naturalized in Kansas. However, Asian carps, cichlids of the genus *Tilapia*, and rudd shall not be sold as fish bait.

(2) All species of annelids, except that the sale of live specimens shall be restricted to only those species native to or naturalized in the continental United States;

(3) all species of crustaceans, except that the sale of live specimens shall be restricted to only those species native to or naturalized in Kansas;

(4) all species of amphibians, except that the sale of live specimens shall be restricted to only those species native to or naturalized in Kansas; and

(5) all species of insects, except that the sale of live specimens shall be restricted to only those species native to or naturalized in Kansas.

(b) Wildlife listed in K.A.R. 115-15-1 or K.A.R. 115-15-2 or prohibited from importation pursuant to K.S.A. 32-956, and amendments thereto, shall not be sold. (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 32-1002; effective Sept. 10, 1990; amended Nov. 30, 1998.)

(continued)

115-17-4. Commercial harvest of fish bait; legal equipment, taking methods, and general provisions. (a) Legal equipment and taking methods permitted for commercial harvest of wildlife for use as fish bait shall be as follows:

(1) Crayfish and amphibians may be taken by the following methods and means:

(A) By hand;

(B) by trap with ½-inch or smaller mesh size, using the bar measurement, and with two-inch or smaller entrance openings;

(C) by seine with ½-inch or smaller mesh size, using the bar measurement. The seine may be of any length, height, or twine size;

(D) by lift net with ½-inch or smaller mesh size, using the bar measurement;

(E) by dip net with ½-inch or smaller mesh size, using the bar measurement. The dip net may be of any dimension and have any handle configuration; and

(F) by other methods as approved by the secretary.

(2) Annelids and insects may be taken by any method.

(b) General provisions.

(1) Boats with or without mechanical propulsion may be used.

(2) Depth-recording or fish-locating devices may be used.

(3) Holding baskets, holding cages, and holding bags may be used, if the name and permit number of the permittee is attached.

(4) The name and permit number of the permittee shall be attached to each trap and seine while the trap or seine is in use. (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 32-941; implementing K.S.A. 32-807, K.S.A. 32-941 and K.S.A. 32-1002; effective Sept. 10, 1990; amended Nov. 30, 1998.)

115-17-5. Commercial harvest of fish bait; open areas. The following areas shall be open for the commercial harvest of crayfish, amphibians, annelids, and insects:

(a) Crayfish—all waters of the state except departmental lands and waters and federal and state sanctuaries;

(b) amphibians—all lands and waters of the state except departmental lands and waters and federal and state sanctuaries; and

(c) annelids and insects—all lands and waters of the state except departmental lands and waters and federal and state sanctuaries. (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 32-941; implementing K.S.A. 32-807, K.S.A. 32-941 and K.S.A. 32-1002; effective Sept. 10, 1990; amended Nov. 30, 1998.)

115-17-6. Commercial mussel fishing license; license application and requirements, authority, reports, general provisions, and license revocation. (a) A commercial mussel fishing license shall be required for commercial mussel fishing purposes.

(b) Any person may apply to the secretary for a commercial mussel fishing license. The application shall be on forms provided by the department, and each applicant shall provide the following information:

(1) The name of the applicant;

(2) the address and telephone number of the applicant;

(3) the business locations and telephone numbers of the applicant;

(4) the location for mussel storage and processing; and

(5) other information as required by the secretary.

(c) Each licensee shall maintain a current record of activity and shall submit quarterly reports to the department on forms provided by the department. The reports shall be submitted not later than 15 days following the end of the quarter for which the reports are prepared. A license shall not be renewed until all reports due have been received by the department.

(d) The records and reports shall include the following information:

(1) The name of the licensee;

(2) the address and telephone number of the licensee;

(3) the license number of the licensee;

(4) the total weight or total shell weight of each mussel species harvested;

(5) the total weight or total shell weight of each mussel species sold, including the following information:

(A) A separate entry for each sale stating the total weight or total shell weight of each mussel species sold;

(B) the date of each sale;

(C) the name, address, and license number of the person to whom the mussels were sold; and

(D) the name of the state where harvested; and

(6) other information as required by the secretary.

(e) A commercial mussel fishing licensee shall sell mussels only to a person legally authorized to purchase mussels under subsection (f) of this regulation, or pursuant to K.A.R. 115-17-14.

(f) Any person may purchase mussels from a commercial mussel fishing licensee if the mussels are not purchased for use as fish bait, are not purchased for resale, and are not sold.

(g) In addition to other penalties prescribed by law, a commercial mussel fishing application or license may be revoked or not issued by the secretary if any of the following conditions is met:

(1) The application is incomplete or contains false information.

(2) The licensee fails to meet license requirements or violates license conditions.

(3) The licensee violates any provision of law, rules, or regulations related to the commercial use of mussels.

(h) Each commercial mussel fishing license shall expire on December 31 of the year for which the license was issued.

(i) A commercial mussel fishing license shall permit possession of mussels harvested for commercial purposes by that licensee for no more than 48 hours after the close of the mussel season.

(j) A licensee may submit a written request to the secretary to possess mussels for commercial purposes beyond the possession period specified above in subsection (i). Each request shall specify the number of each species of mussels possessed and the applicant's name, address, and commercial mussel fishing license number. Authorization of possession beyond the possession period shall be in writing and shall include a date on which the authorization expires. Any mussel sale during the authorized time period shall be reported to the department within 48 hours of the sale by both the licensee and the purchaser. (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 32-

941; implementing K.S.A. 32-807, K.S.A. 32-941 and K.S.A. 32-1002; effective Jan. 1, 1991; amended June 8, 1992; amended Nov. 30, 1998.)

115-17-14. Commercial mussel dealer permit; permit application and requirements, authority, reports, general provisions, and permit revocation. (a) Any person desiring to purchase wild mussels for resale, for export from the state, or for other commercial use shall make application to the secretary for a commercial mussel dealer permit.

(b) Applications shall be on forms provided by the department, and each applicant shall provide the following information:

- (1) The name of the applicant;
- (2) the address and telephone number of the applicant;
- (3) the business locations and the phone numbers of the applicant;
- (4) the location for mussel storage and processing; and
- (5) other information as required by the secretary.

(c) Each commercial mussel dealer may buy, sell, or trade in those species listed in K.A.R. 115-17-7. A commercial mussel dealer shall not buy, sell, or trade any mussel species for use as fish bait.

(d) Each commercial mussel dealer shall purchase mussels only from sources authorized pursuant to K.A.R. 115-17-6, from a commercial mussel dealer authorized pursuant to this regulation, or from a person authorized by another state to sell mussels.

(e) A commercial mussel dealer shall sell mussels only to the following:

- (1) A commercial mussel dealer authorized pursuant to this regulation; or
- (2) a person legally authorized by another state to purchase mussels.

(f) When a commercial mussel dealer ships, exports, or otherwise sells mussels commercially, the dealer shall provide a bill of lading with each sale. The bill of lading shall be on a form provided by the department and shall include the following information:

- (1) The name, address and telephone number of the commercial mussel dealer;
- (2) the dealer permit number and expiration date;
- (3) the shipping date;
- (4) the name of the recipient;
- (5) the address and telephone number of the recipient; and
- (6) the total weight of each species on shipment.

(g) Each permittee shall maintain a commercial mussel dealer record book and shall submit a quarterly report to the department. The record book and quarterly report shall be maintained and submitted on forms provided by the department and shall be subject to inspection upon demand by any conservation officer. The report shall be submitted not later than 15 days following the end of the quarter for which the report is prepared. A permit shall not be renewed until all reports have been received by the department.

(h) The record book and report shall include the following information:

- (1) The name of the permittee;
- (2) the address and telephone number of the permittee;
- (3) the permit number of the permittee;
- (4) the total shell weight of each mussel species purchased, including the following information:

- (A) A separate entry for each purchase, stating the total shell weight of each mussel species purchased;
- (B) the date of each purchase;
- (C) the name of the state where harvested; and
- (D) the name, address, and permit number of each person from whom mussels were purchased;
- (5) a copy of each bill of lading accompanying each sale and shipment; and

(6) other information as required by the secretary.

(i) In addition to other penalties prescribed by law, a commercial mussel dealer permit may be revoked or not issued by the secretary if any of these conditions is met:

(1) The application is incomplete or contains false information.

(2) The permittee fails to meet reporting requirements or violates permit conditions.

(3) The permittee violates any provision of law or rule and regulations related to commercial use of mussels.

(j) A commercial mussel dealer permit shall expire on December 31 of the year for which the permit was issued.

(k) Each commercial mussel dealer may possess and sell legally acquired mussels no more than 30 days after the expiration date of the permit. (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 32-941; implementing K.S.A. 32-941 and K.S.A. 32-1002; effective June 8, 1992; amended Nov. 30, 1998.)

Article 20.—MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS

115-20-2. Certain wildlife; legal equipment, taking methods, possession, and license requirement. (a) Subject to federal and state laws and rules and regulations, wildlife listed below in subsection (b) may be taken for personal use on a noncommercial basis.

(b) For purposes of this regulation, wildlife shall include the following, excluding any species listed in K.A.R. 115-15-1 or K.A.R. 115-15-2:

- (1) Prairie dog;
- (2) ground squirrel;
- (3) woodchuck;
- (4) mole;
- (5) gopher;
- (6) kangaroo rat;
- (7) wood rat;
- (8) armadillo;
- (9) porcupine;
- (10) feral pigeon;
- (11) commensal and other rodents, excluding game and furbearing animals;
- (12) invertebrates;
- (13) amphibians; and
- (14) reptiles.

(c) Wildlife listed above in subsection (b) shall be taken only with the following legal equipment or methods:

- (1) Firearms, except fully automatic firearms;
- (2) bow and arrow;
- (3) pellet and BB gun;
- (4) crossbow;
- (5) falconry;
- (6) projectiles hand thrown or propelled by a slingshot;
- (7) trap;
- (8) deadfall;
- (9) snare or noose;
- (10) net or seine;

Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-2e. Enforcement provisions. (a) Enforcement of this provision shall be pursuant to the ADA and KAASA. If it is determined that a lottery retailer is not in compliance with the ADA, KAASA, and this rule, the retailer shall immediately report any notice of non-compliance from the enforcement authority to the lottery.

(b) Upon receipt of such notification of non-compliance, the Kansas lottery shall determine the basis for non-compliance and require that the program offered by the lottery is accessible to individuals with disabilities at the retailer location specified. The lottery retailer may be authorized to continue sales at the cited retail location for up to 30 days to allow it to get into compliance with the requirements of the ADA. If a cited lottery retailer fails to comply with the requirements of the ADA within 60 days, its lottery contract(s) may be suspended or terminated by the executive director.

(c) Starting January 1, 1999, any retailer location which earns an incentive or performance based award, which is in addition to contractual discount or commission earnings, must be in compliance with ADA standards as determined by the Kansas lottery. In the event an award is earned and the retailer location is not in compliance with ADA standards as determined by the lottery, the lottery will withhold payment for up to 90 days to allow the retailer location to become ADA compliant. If, after the 90 days, the retailer location fails to achieve compliance, the non-compliant retailer shall forfeit its incentive or award. Under extenuating circumstances, as determined by the executive director, the time for compliance may be extended. Incentives or awards include those authorized by K.A.R. 111-2-30 and 111-2-62 and any other rule or regulation. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-11-22-95, Nov. 17, 1995; amended, T-111-5-5-98, April 17, 1998; amended, T-111-9-23-98, Sept. 14, 1998; amended, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-2-78. Retailer recruitment promotion. During the month of January 1999, the Kansas lottery is offering a retailer recruitment promotion. Any application and fee to become a Kansas lottery retailer received by the Kansas lottery from January 1, 1999, through January 31, 1999, shall be entitled to a refund of the entire application fee if the application is rejected by the lottery for any reason prior to May 1, 1999. Applicants for this promotion must be rejected by the lottery prior to May 1, 1999, to be eligible for a refund. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 74-8708 and K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-2-79. "Ask for the sale" promotion. (a) During the period beginning December 1, 1998, and ending December 31, 1998, in addition to compensation provided for in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery also offers all Shop Quik stores located in Kansas an opportunity to par-

(d) The open season for the taking of wildlife listed above in subsection (b) shall be year round.

(e) There shall be no maximum daily bag or possession limit for wildlife listed above in subsection (b), except no more than five of any one species of amphibian, reptile, or mussel may be possessed.

(f) Legally taken wildlife listed above in subsection (b) may be possessed without limit in time.

(g) A hunting license shall not be required to take invertebrates. (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 32-807, K.S.A. 32-919, K.S.A. 32-1002 and K.S.A. 32-1003; effective Sept. 10, 1990; amended Nov. 30, 1998.)

Article 35.—LOCAL GOVERNMENT OUTDOOR RECREATION GRANT PROGRAM

115-35-1. Local government outdoor recreation grant program; application and criteria. (a) Any local government desiring to receive a local government outdoor recreation grant shall apply to the secretary, using a form provided by the department. An application that is incomplete or contains false information may be denied consideration by the secretary.

(b) Grant applications shall be evaluated according to the parameters established by L. 1998, Ch. 70, §2 and §3. In addition, grant applications shall be further evaluated based on the following criteria:

(1) The application demonstrates a local need for the proposed project and a strong likelihood of ongoing local involvement and support.

(2) The proposed project would provide new outdoor recreational opportunities to a significant population or geographic area, or the proposed project would enhance existing outdoor recreation facilities and would improve facilities for users with a wide range of physical abilities, or both.

(3) The applicant's matching funds are available to the applicant at the time of the grant award.

(4) The proposed project has a likelihood of completion within one year from the time of award.

(5) The grant request would not constitute more than 25% of funds appropriated for the grant program in a given fiscal year.

(6) The proposed project would meet applicable environmental standards and would be compatible with existing land use capabilities and surrounding uses.

(7) The application is consistent with "focus 2002: a plan for Kansas wildlife and parks," as published by the department. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1998, Ch. 70, §1, §2, and §3; effective Nov. 30, 1998.)

(b) On each Thursday in December 1998, including December 3, 10, 17, 24 and 31, all Shop Quik stores' personnel selling Kansas lottery tickets will ask every adult customer making a purchase if the customer would like to purchase a lottery ticket. If the employee fails to ask adult customers for the purchase of a lottery ticket and the customer brings it to the clerk's attention before leaving the premises, the retailer shall give the adult customer one \$1.00 instant lottery ticket at no charge.

(c) All retailer employees at each location shall wear promotional buttons and display special point-of-sale materials provided by the lottery each Thursday from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. during the promotion announcing the promotion to its customers. These promotional materials consist of:

(1) A tent card to be displayed at the point where tickets are sold.

(2) A window/monitor banner to be displayed at the front entrance of the business and/or below the lottery information display system monitor. These materials must be on display during all hours of the promotion at the times and dates established in subsections (b) and (c) for a store to be eligible for a prize.

(d) The Kansas lottery will provide each location with a credit of \$35. This will be credited to each store's account at the beginning of the promotion.

(e) Any tickets given away above the \$35 allowance representing 35 tickets per location will be the responsibility of Shop Quik, Inc.

(f) Each retail location shall maintain a ticket log form to be completed every time a lottery ticket is given away. The log will be picked up by the Kansas lottery district manager servicing the retailer location at the end of the promotion.

(g) At the end of the promotion, one store will win one pack of instant tickets selected by the lottery. The pack will be awarded with the winner being determined by a drawing. With each five percent increase in total lottery sales during the sales period over the base period, the store will receive an entry into the drawing. Promotional items will also be awarded to the first, second, and third place stores based on the percentage increase in total lottery sales over the predetermined base. The base sales period for each store shall be the 31 day average sales based upon total lottery sales from August 31, 1998, through October 31, 1998, compared to total sales from December 1, 1998, to December 31, 1998. The drawing will be conducted at lottery headquarters as soon as possible after sales increases are determined following the promotion. 111-4-607. Name of drawings. The Kansas lottery shall conduct a series of drawings, entitled the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings." The "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" shall take place on Sat-

urday, October 17, 1998, at Heartland Park, 7530 Southwest Topeka Boulevard, Topeka, Kansas 66619. Rules applicable are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-607 through 111-4-615. 111-4-610. Entry into drawings. Entry into the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" is accomplished by the process detailed in the following subparagraphs:

(a) Obtain a valid Kansas instant lottery ticket from the lottery's selling location at Heartland Park Topeka;

(b) Determine if the ticket is a winning ticket in accordance with any instant game rules. If the ticket is a winning ticket, it is not eligible for the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings," and shall be redeemed in accordance with the instant game rules;

(c) If the ticket is a valid non-winning ticket purchased at the Heartland Park selling location, the ticket is eligible for winning a drawing and the holder of the ticket may enter the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings."

(d) The holder of the non-winning ticket must complete the information form on the back of the ticket in a legible manner and sign it.

(e) The holder of the ticket need not be present to win at the time of the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings."

(f) There is no limit to the number of entries a participant may make.

(g) For the racing events occurring on October 1, 2, 3, and 14, 1998, the receptacle(s) or drum(s) shall be open during lottery selling hours. Should the racing events be postponed for any reason on October 17, 1998, the scheduled racing events and drawings will be conducted on Sunday, October 18, 1998.

(h) The holder of a non-winning ticket must take each non-winning ticket with the information form on the back completed, to the location of the receptacle(s) or drum(s) at the "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings" and place it in the receptacle(s) or drum(s) provided by the lottery.

(i) On Sunday, October 4, 1998, the Kansas lottery will sponsor its "Heartland Park Parts America Drawings." Players enter the drawings by placing non-winning tickets purchased at Heartland Park Topeka into the receptacle(s) or drum(s) located near the lottery's selling location in the pit area next to the souvenir shop. Twelve tickets will be drawn from the contents of the receptacle(s) or drum(s). Following validation by lottery security personnel, the winners' names shall be announced.

(j) Drawings shall be held by the lottery selling location on the east side of the track in the pit area next to the souvenir shop.

111-4-1325. Name of game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Double Doubler" commencing on or after October 19, 1998. The specific rules for the "Double Doubler" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-1325 through 111-4-1328. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-4-1326. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Double Doubler" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink with matching captions. A game symbol appears in each of seven play spots within the play area. (d) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three-letter code printed and appearing in three of six varying locations among the game symbols in each of the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: TWO = \$2.00; FIV = \$5.00; TEN = \$10.00; TWY = \$20.00; HUN = \$100.00; FHN = \$500.00.

(e) "Bar code" means the 16-digit bar-coded number appearing on the back of each ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-4-1344. Cost of ticket. The price of "Crossword" instant tickets sold by a retailer shall be \$2.00 each. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-4-1345. Determination of instant prize winners. (a) The game "Crossword" consists of two play areas. In the "YOUR LETTERS" play area located in the

upper part of the ticket, there are 18 letters located under the latex. In the lower part of the ticket, there is a crossword puzzle grid that is 11 spaces high and 11 spaces wide covered by transparent latex. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material labeled "YOUR LETTERS" to reveal 18 letters. The player then removes the transparent latex material from the crossword puzzle grid below the "YOUR LETTERS" play area that match the "YOUR LETTERS" revealed. 111-4-1346. Number and value of instant prizes.

(a) There will be approximately 1,200,000 tickets ordered initially for this instant game. The expected number and value of the instant prizes are as follows:

**RULES FOR INSTANT GAME NO. 78
"BLACKJACK"**

111-4-1347. Name of game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Blackjack" commencing on or after October 19, 1998. The specific rules for the "Blackjack" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-1347 through 111-4-1350. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-4-1348. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Blackjack" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink with matching captions. A game symbol appears in each of eight play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: 2 - 3 - 4 - 5 - 6 - 7 - 8 - 9 - 10 - J - Q - K - A - BUST - \$1.00 - \$2.00 - \$3.00 - \$4.00 - \$6.00 - \$8.00 - 12.00 - 24.00 - 50.00 - 70.00 - \$210\$ - \$700\$ - \$2100.

(b) "Game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The game symbol caption associated with each game symbol is as follows:

(c) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is an 11-digit number which appears on the front of each instant ticket and will be covered by latex.

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the back of each instant game ticket both above the information form and below the bar code.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three-letter code printed and appearing in three of six varying locations among the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: ONE = \$1.00; TWO = \$2.00; FOR = \$4.00; SIX = \$6.00; EGT = \$8.00; TWL = \$12.00; TFO = \$24.00; FTY = \$50.00; and THT = \$210.00.

(f) "Bar code" means the 16-digit bar-coded number appearing on the back of each ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-4-1349. Determination of instant prize winners. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the eight game symbols and captions. This is a "Beat the Dealer" game. The player will remove the scratch-off material covering the table play area to reveal three hands, "HAND 1," "HAND 2," and "HAND 3," three prize amounts and one "DEALER'S HAND." If the total value of a "HAND" is higher than the value of the "DEALER'S HAND," the player wins the prize directly below that "HAND." If the player gets "BLACKJACK" (21) in any "HAND," the player wins double the prize for that "HAND." If the dealer "BUSTS," the player wins all three prizes. "KANSAS CASH \$25,000 HOLIDAY GIVEAWAY DRAWING"

111-7-135. Name of drawing. The Kansas lottery shall conduct a drawing entitled "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing." The drawing will be held at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, December 11, 1998, at lottery headquarters located at 128 North Kansas Avenue, Topeka, Kansas. Rules applicable to the "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing" are contained in K.A.R. 111-7-135 through 111-7-140 and K.A.R. 111-6-1 et seq. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-7-136. Prize. The first 25 prize winners selected in the "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing" shall receive \$1,000 each. The prizes are subject to lottery validation, set-offs and deductions authorized by law. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-7-137. Method of entry. Entry into the "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing" to be conducted on December 11, 1998, shall be accomplished as follows:

(a) Obtain a valid entry form by purchasing a single Kansas Cash ticket costing \$5.00 or more between November 1, 1998, and December 5, 1998. Entry forms will automatically be issued by the terminal at any on-line Kansas retailer location upon making such a purchase. Only valid entry forms issued between the above dates

which are mailed pursuant to subsection (d) and received by the time specified in subsection (g) shall be eligible for the drawing.

(b) Whether or not the \$5.00 Kansas Cash ticket itself is a winning ticket, the entry form is eligible for the "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing" if entered as specified by subsection (d).

(c) Each individual entry form shall constitute one entry.

(d) Place one or more entry forms, not the Kansas Cash ticket itself, into an envelope no larger than four and three-fourths inches by 11 inches and mail it to: "Kansas Lottery," Box 7777, Lawrence, Kansas 66044-7777. The mailing address shall also be printed on each entry form issued. Entries in envelopes of a larger size and envelopes containing more than one Kansas Cash entry form shall be destroyed by lottery security.

(e) The holder of the entry form must complete the information on each entry form in a legible manner. Only one name shall appear on entry forms on any one entry.

(f) There is no limit on the number of entries a person may make.

(g) All entry forms which are mailed and received by the morning mail pickup by the lottery at approximately noon on Wednesday, December 9, 1998, shall be entered into the "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing."

(h) Eligible entrants must be 18 years of age or older.

(i) Completing the information on the entry form and entering the form into the drawing constitutes authorization to publicly identify the person whose entry is drawn. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-7-138. Certification of the drawing. (a) The "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing" shall be personally observed by a member of the Kansas lottery division of security and the promotion coordinator.

(b) Upon completion of the drawing, the security official and the promotion coordinator shall issue a report to the executive director, certifying that the name of the prize winner is correct, and that to the best of their knowledge the procedures required by these rules were followed in selecting the prize winner. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710(b); effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-7-139. Selection of winners. The following process shall be used for the selection of winners in the "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing":

(a) Kansas lottery personnel shall pick up all mail containing "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Draw-

ing" envelopes at the United States Post Office in Lawrence, Kansas.

(b) The drawing shall be held at lottery headquarters located at 128 North Kansas, Topeka, Kansas. The drawing shall be audio and video taped.

(c) Prior to the drawing, the drum or receptacle shall be sealed and the contents mixed by rotating the drum five times, if a drum is used, or by mixing the contents with a shovel or by other means for at least three minutes if another type receptacle is used.

(d) The designated individual shall then unseal the drum or receptacle, and using the bare-arm technique, remove 25 entry forms from the drum or receptacle and hand them to lottery security personnel for validation.

(e) After the first 25 entries have been drawn and certified valid by lottery security, 10 more entries will be drawn, one at a time, to serve as alternate entries. The alternate entries will be marked in order drawn, 1A, 2A, 3A, 4A, 5A, 6A, 7A, 8A, 9A and 10A. The alternate entry forms will be used only if the original winners cannot be located or declared ineligible.

(f) The Kansas lottery security official present shall review each entry drawn to determine the validity of the entry into the "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing" in accordance with these regulations. If it is a valid entry form and the name is legible, the draw manager and the security person shall record the name of the winner and the winner shall be promptly notified.

(g) If an entry form is determined to be ineligible, it shall be discarded by the security person present and another entry form will be drawn. This procedure will be repeated until valid selections are obtained.

(h) The person whose name appears on each entry form on the entry drawn shall win the prize identified in K.A.R. 111-7-136, subject to validation by the lottery as set forth in these rules.

(i) All "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing" forms remaining in the drum or receptacle on December 11, 1998, after the winners have been selected and certified shall be destroyed. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710(b); effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

111-7-140. Rights of participants. Any Kansas Cash entry form entered into the "Kansas Cash \$25,000 Holiday Giveaway Drawing" is disqualified from any other Kansas lottery prize or eligibility for which that entry form may have been redeemable. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-8710(d); effective, T-111-10-30-98, Oct. 16, 1998.)

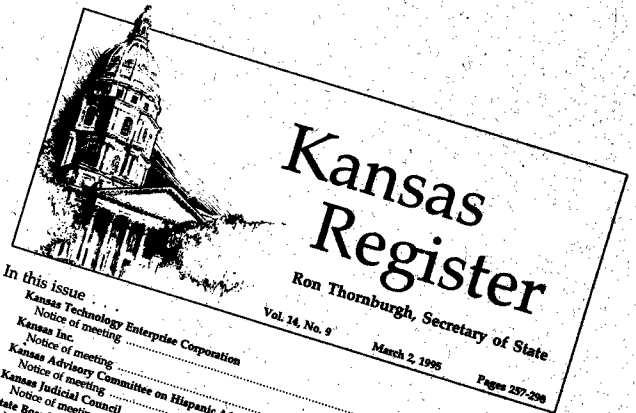
