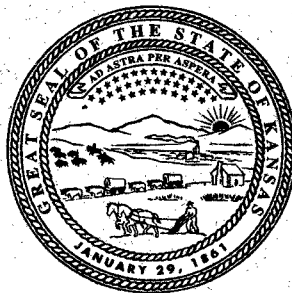

Request for Comments

The Kansas Sorghum Producers Association and the Kansas Corn Growers Association have requested, on behalf of Kansas farmers, a special local need (SLN) registration to allow post-harvest application of Aatrex® 4L on stubble of certain row crops where corn or sorghum is to be planted the following spring. Application of the product as proposed will be allowed any time following harvest up until the ground freezes or December 31. The special local need criteria for this action is defined by the need to minimize surface runoff of row-crop herbicides and decrease the amount of atrazine found in surface waters during the spring planting season, when it is most commonly applied.

Pursuant to 7 U.S.C. 136v, Novartis Crop Protection, Inc. has filed with the Kansas Department of Agriculture (KDA) an application for the requested registration action. An atrazine preplant application of this type is presently not allowed by any existing EPA federal registration. This proposed SLN registration also is economically and environmentally beneficial by providing greater efficacy and more flexibility to growers and commercial applicators who struggle with weather and time constraints during the planting season.

All required residue data and risk assessment information already exists as part of the EPA registration of Aatrex® 4L. Efficacy information has been provided to the KDA in support of the SLN registration.

Information submitted by the applicant is on file with the KDA, and anyone wanting to present written comments, data or other evidence in support of or in opposition to the proposed SLN registration may do so on or before December 12. A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Thursday, December 17, in the conference room in the offices of the Kansas Development Finance Authority, Suite 1000, Jayhawk Tower, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, on the proposal for the Kansas Development Finance Authority to issue its Agricultural Development Revenue Bond for the project numbered below in the respective maximum principal amount. The bond will be issued to assist the respective borrower (who will be the owner and operator of the project) to finance the cost in the amount of the bond of acquiring the project or for the purpose of refunding a bond previously issued to finance the project. The project shall be located as shown:

Project No. 000402, Maximum Principal Amount: \$57,000. Owner/Operator: Perry A. and Paige M. Russell. Description: Acquisition of 59.29 acres of agricultural land and related improvements and equipment to be used by the owner/operator for farming purposes. The project is located at a portion of the Northeast Quarter of Section 18, Township 28 South, Range 23 East of the 6th P.M., Crawford County, Kansas, approximately 6 miles north of Girard, and 5 miles west and ½ mile north on County Road 100.

The bond, when issued, will be a limited obligation of the Kansas Development Finance Authority and will not constitute a general obligation or indebtedness of the State of Kansas or any political subdivision thereof, including the Authority, nor will it be an indebtedness for which the faith and credit and taxing powers of the State of Kansas are pledged. The bond will be payable solely from amounts received from the respective borrower, the obligation of which will be sufficient to pay the principal of, interest and redemption premium, if any, on the bond when it becomes due.

All individuals who appear at the hearing will be given an opportunity to express their views for or against the proposal to issue the bond for the purpose of financing the respective project, and all written comments previously filed with the Authority at its offices at Suite 1000, Jayhawk Tower, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66603, will be considered. Additional information regarding the projects may be obtained by contacting the Authority.

Any individual affected by the above-described project may, at or prior to the hearing, file a written request with the Authority that a local hearing be held on the proposal to issue a bond to finance said project. Opinion No. 1998-30

Written November 19, 1998, to Ron Clifton, Superintendent, U.S.D. 309, Hutchinson.

This opinion is in response to your letter of November 16, 1998, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the local conflict of interest law (K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction concerning your question is limited to the application of K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.* Thus, whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand that you request this opinion in your capacity as superintendent of schools for Unified School District 309. You advise us that the Board of Education (board) has employed a local firm, Architects and Engineering Consultants, to design and supervise the construction of several building improvements and additions. You informed a member of our staff via telephone that the actual contract has not been signed, and that the contract was not and will not be let for competitive bid. This firm would like to hire a member of the board as a subcontractor to perform the engineering work.

Question

May the board member accept employment by this firm while still a member of the Board of Education?

Opinion

K.S.A. 75-4304 applies to your question. That section states:

(a) No local governmental officer or employee shall, in the capacity of such an officer or employee, make or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which the officer or employee is employed or in whose business the officer or employee has a substantial interest.

(b) No person or business shall enter into any contract where any local governmental officer or employee, acting in that capacity, is a signatory to or a participant in the making of the contract and is employed by or has a substantial interest in the person or business.

(c) A local governmental officer or employee does not make or participate in the making of a contract if the officer or employee abstains from any action in regard to the contract.

Applying these sections to your situation, the board member may accept employment with the firm as a subcontractor. In this instance, the statutes do not prohibit the board member from participating in and voting on contracts between Architects and Engineering Consultants and the board.

Please note, however, that although it would not be illegal for the board member to participate in and vote on such contracts, such activity would clearly hold the appearance of impropriety. Therefore, if the board member is aware that he or she will materially profit from a contract between the board and this firm, the board member

should avoid all participation in the formation of that contract to avoid the appearance of impropriety.

Opinion No. 1998-31

Written November 19, 1998, to Sonya L. Allen, General Counsel, Office of the State Bank Commissioner, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of October 1, 1998, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand your request this opinion in your capacity as general counsel for office of the State Bank Commissioner (OSBC). You advise in your letter and in communications with this office that a senior official in your agency has family members (specifically parents) who own stock in a holding company regulated by your agency. You further advise us that your agency has, in the past, always shielded this employee from participation in any activities involving this holding company or its affiliated bank.

The parents of this official now wish to make a gift of a substantial portion of this stock to the senior official. You have informed us that this gift in no way relates to the individual's employment status with the OSBC, but is rather a gift from parent to child. Although, as a result of this gift, the senior official would own more than 5 percent of the holding company, the official would not be employed by the holding company and would not be a member of the board of directors or in any other way "hold a position" with the bank or the holding company.

Question

Would a senior official with the office of the State Bank Commissioner violate any state ethical laws by accepting a gift of more than 5 percent of the stock in a holding company regulated by the office of the State Bank Commissioner when the gift is given by the official's parents?

Opinion

K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 46-237 is applicable to your question. That section states in pertinent part:

(c) No person licensed, inspected or regulated by a state agency shall offer, pay, give or make any economic opportunity, gift . . . or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year to such agency or any state officer or employee . . . of that agency.

K.A.R. 19-40-3a is also applicable to this question. It states in part:

(b)(2) Exceptions. For the purposes of K.S.A. [1997] Supp. 46-237, except when a particular course of official action is to be followed as a condition thereon, "gift" does not include:

(F) any bona fide personal or business gift or entertainment.

A "bona fide personal or business gift" is defined by K.A.R. 19-40-3a(a) as:

entertainment or gifts provided to state officers or employees or their spouses which are based solely on a business or personal relationship totally unrelated to the state officer or employee's duties as such.

Because the gift in question is a gift from parent to child and in no way relates to the employee's employment status with the OSBC, it is a bona fide personal gift and the employee will not violate any state ethical laws by accepting it.

Once the employee accepts the stock, however, other ethical laws are implicated. There are two statutes which apply to this situation: K.S.A. 46-286(a), which involves participation in the licensing and regulation of outside organizations; and K.S.A. 46-241, which involves the use of confidential information.

K.S.A. 46-286(a) applies to this situation. It states:

No state officer or employee in the officer's or employee's official capacity, shall participate directly in the licensure, inspection or administration or enforcement of any regulation of or in any contract with any outside organization with which the officer or employee holds a position.

In reviewing the application of K.S.A. 46-286(a) to the situation you have described, the issue is whether an individual who owns a substantial amount of stock in a business can be said to "hold a position" with that organization. This commission has consistently held that an employee of an organization, or a member of the board of directors, can be said to "hold a position." It is our opinion, however, that this language is not specific enough to extend to an individual who owns stock in a corporation. Therefore, pursuant to statute and previous opinion, as long as the employee does not hold a position in the company in which he or she owns the stock, the employee would not be prohibited from participating directly in the licensure, inspection or administration or enforcement of regulations involving that company. The commission has previously decided in Opinion 92-31 that ownership of stock does not constitute "holding a position."

Please note, however, that although it would not be illegal for the employee to participate in the regulation of the holding company, such activity would clearly hold the appearance of impropriety. Therefore, your previous practice of ensuring that the employee is removed from the decision making process in these situations would be an appropriate measure to avoid the appearance of impropriety.

Finally, K.S.A. 46-241 should be considered. It states:

No state officer or employee shall disclose or use confidential information acquired in the course of his or her official duties in order to further his or her own economic interest or those of any other person.

This section is self-explanatory. Confidential information obtained during the employee's official duties may not be used for that employee's financial gain or that of another and, therefore, may not be transmitted to the holding company or its affiliated bank.

In conclusion, it is our opinion that, under the factual situation you have presented, it is not a violation of the state governmental ethics laws for this employee to accept a gift of stock in a holding company which the OSBC

regulates when that stock is from that employee's parents.

K.S.A. 46-286(a) does not prohibit the employee from participating in the regulation of that holding company and its affiliated bank, although he or she should be shielded from those decisions in order to avoid the appearances of impropriety. Finally, confidential information obtained during the employee's official duties may not be used for that employee's financial gain and, therefore, may not be transmitted to the holding company or its affiliated bank.

Opinion No. 1998-32

Written November 19, 1998, to Susan K. Duffy, Associate Director, Kansas State Historical Society, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter dated November 2, 1998, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the state level governmental ethics laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand that you request this opinion in your capacity as associate director of the Kansas State Historical Society. You have informed us that the Historical Society has in the past provided legislative members and their staff a 25 percent discount on the sale of merchandise through the tourist information center. You have also informed us that this discount is not made available to the general public.

Question

1. May the Kansas State Historical Society provide legislators and their staff a discount on the sale of merchandise from the tourist information center when that discount is not made available to the general public?

Opinion

K.S.A. 46-237, K.S.A. 46-228 and K.S.A. 46-223 apply to your question. K.S.A. 46-237 states in pertinent part:

(a) No state officer or employee . . . shall accept, or agree to accept any . . . special discount . . . having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year from any one person known to have a special interest, under circumstances where such person knows or should know that a major purpose of the donor is to influence such person in the performance of their official duties or prospective official duties."

(b) No person with a special interest shall offer, pay, give or make any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year to any state officer or employee . . . with a major purpose of influencing such officer or employee . . . in the performance of official duties or prospective official duties.

K.S.A. 46-228 defines "special interest" in the following manner:

"Special interest" means an interest of any person as herein defined (1) concerning action or non-action by the legislature on any legislative matter affecting such person as distinct from affect upon the people of the state as a whole, or (2) in the action or non-action of any state

agency or state officer or employee upon any matter affecting such person as distinct from affect upon the people of the state as a whole.

K.S.A. 46-223 defines "person" in pertinent part as:

"Person" means . . . a governmental agency . . .

Pursuant to K.S.A. 46-228, each state agency has a "special interest" in members of the legislature. Therefore, in applying the language of these statutes to your question, the Historical Society may provide to state legislators and their staff a discount on the sale of merchandise from the tourist information center, but the aggregate value of the discounts given to any one legislator or a member of his or her staff may not exceed \$40 in any calendar year, if a major purpose of the Historical Society in giving the discount is to influence such legislator in the performance of his or her official duties or prospective official duties.

Opinion No. 1998-33

Written November 19, 1998, to Gary Simnitt, Leonardville.

This opinion is in response to your letter dated October 30, 1998, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the state level governmental ethics laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand that you request this opinion in your capacity as a General Maintenance Repair Technician II for the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks at Tuttle Creek State Park in Manhattan, Kansas. Your job description indicates that you primarily supervise employees who repair and provide upkeep for the buildings, grounds and equipment at Tuttle Creek State Park. In addition, you perform general maintenance to the facilities and a sewage treatment plant. You are interested in obtaining a Kansas Guide Permit and performing freelance guide services on your off duty hours. You have informed us that in order to obtain this permit, you must complete a test, take a CPR course and pay an annual \$50 registration fee. Once you obtain this permit, people will be able to hire you to take them on hunting and fishing trips.

Question

1. May you obtain a Kansas Guide Permit and work as a freelance guide on your off duty hours while maintaining your employment as a General Maintenance Repair Technician II for the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks?

Opinion

You advise that your state duties do not involve guide activities or similar type services. You have also informed a member of our staff that you do not participate in the licensure, regulation or inspection of guides.

With the above understanding regarding the facts, it is our opinion that nothing in K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* prohibits the situation you have described.

RegulationsArticle 1.—CERTIFICATION OF
PSYCHOLOGISTS

102-1-1. Definitions. (a) An "intern or resident" means a person who is actively enrolled in a program as defined by K.A.R. 102-1-12 and who is attaining pre-doctoral supervised experience necessary for licensure as a psychologist.

(b) A "year of supervised experience" means a minimum of 1,800 supervised clock hours pursuant to K.A.R. 102-1-5.

(c) A "client or patient" means a person who is a direct recipient of psychological services, whether or not these services are therapeutic or diagnostic in nature.

(d) A "therapeutic relationship" means a relationship between a psychologist and client or patient that is initiated by mutual consent or pursuant to law. The assessment of a client, or expert consultation regarding a client, by a psychologist for a third party, for purposes of diagnosis and assessment alone shall not be considered a therapeutic relationship.

(e) "Therapeutic treatment" means the use of psychotherapy or other psychological remedial measures that are applied to persons individually or in groups with the intent of assisting the person or persons in modifying attitudes and behavior that are cognitively, physically, socially, or emotionally maladaptive.

(f) "Termination of a therapeutic relationship or therapeutic treatment," for purposes of unprofessional conduct, means termination by any of the following:

- (1) the mutual consent of the psychologist and the client or clients;
 - (2) the completion of treatment;
 - (3) dismissal or discontinuation of the psychologist by the client or clients;
 - (4) dismissal of the client or clients by the psychologist;
- or
- (5) the referral of the client to another professional with belief that treatment will continue. For purposes of unprofessional conduct, termination shall be deemed to take place after 24 months of the date of the last professional contact.

(g) "Psychological assessment" means the use, in any manner, of established psychological tests, procedures, and techniques with the intent of diagnosing adjustment, functional, mental, vocational, or emotional problems or recommending treatment methods for persons having these problems.

(h) A "psychologist supervisor," for supervision of unlicensed assistants, means an individual licensed at the doctoral level in that person's state or jurisdiction to engage in the practice of psychology, and who has, in full or in part, legal, administrative, and professional authority over and responsibility for the supervisee furnishing psychological services.

(i) "Consultant" means an individual who provides professional guidance, information, or advice, but who

has no legal, administrative, or professional authority over or responsibility for the professional functioning of the recipient.

(j) A "non-resident psychologist" means a psychologist duly licensed by another state or jurisdiction that has licensing standards that guarantee substantial equivalence to those in the state of Kansas or with which the board has entered into a reciprocity agreement.

(k) "Continuing education" means programs or activities designed to enhance the psychologist's level of knowledge, skill, and ability to practice psychology. Such programs shall have content clearly related to enhancement of psychology practice, values and knowledge. Continuing education credits shall not be used as a substitute for basic professional education preparation as defined in K.A.R. 102-1-12.

(l) "Unlicensed assistant" means a person who is employed by a person, association, partnership, or corporation furnishing psychological services to assist a licensed psychologist in providing psychological services and who is under the licensed psychologist's direct supervision.

(m) "Dual relationship" means a professional relationship between a psychologist and that individual's client, patient, student, or supervisee when the objectivity or competency of the psychologist is impaired because of the following present or previous relationship of the licensee to the client;

- (1) familial;
- (2) sexual;
- (3) emotional;
- (4) financial;
- (5) supervisory; or
- (6) administrative.

(n) "Supervision" means the formal relationship between the supervisor and supervisee that promotes the development of responsibility, skill, knowledge, attitudes, and ethical standards in the practice of psychology.

(o) "Quarter semester credit hour" is equivalent to a semester hour at a ratio of two-thirds of the semester hour. The breakdown is as follows:

- (1) one quarter hour equals .7 semester hours;
- (2) two quarter hours equal 1.3 semester hours;
- (3) three quarter hours equal 2.0 semester hours;
- (4) four quarter hours equal 2.7 semester hours; and
- (5) five quarter hours equal 3.3 semester hours.

(p) "Trimester credit hour" is equivalent to a semester hour as indicated on the transcript.

(q) "Direct psychological services" means applying established principles of learning, motivation, perception, thinking, and emotional relationships to problems of behavior adjustment, group relations, and behavior modification, by persons trained in psychology. Applying such principles includes the following:

- (1) providing psychological assessment and therapeutic treatment to individuals or groups with the intent of modifying attitudes, emotions and behaviors that are intellectually, physically, socially or emotionally maladaptive; and
- (2) other application of psychological principles as approved by the board.

(continued)

(r) "Academically eligible" means having a doctoral degree in psychology from an institution of higher education that meets the standards identified in K.A.R. 102-1-12(a)(1). (Authorized by K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-7507; implementing K.S.A. 74-5302, K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-5310, K.S.A. 74-5314, 74-5316, K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-5344, K.S.A. 74-5345, and K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-7507; effective May 1, 1982; amended May 1, 1984; amended, T-85-35, Dec. 19, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended May 1, 1987; amended Aug. 4, 1995; amended Dec. 18, 1998.)

102-1-8. Renewal and reinstatement. (a) Each licensed psychologist shall renew that individual's licensure pursuant to K.S.A. 74-5319, and its amendments, by submitting the following to the board:

(1) the renewal form approved and provided by the board;

(2) the renewal fee required by K.S.A. 74-5319 and its amendments, as set forth in K.A.R. 102-1-13(a)(3); and

(3) evidence satisfactory to the board that the psychologist has completed 100 continuing education hours as defined in 102-1-15.

(b) To be considered for reinstatement of a revoked or suspended psychology license for reasons other than incapacity of the psychologist, the applicant shall submit the following items to the board:

(1) the reinstatement form provided by the board;

(2) the reinstatement fee equal to the renewal fee as set forth in K.A.R. 102-1-13(a)(3);

(3) if the applicant is required to take an examination, the examination fee as set forth in K.A.R. 102-1-13(a)(4);

(4) proof satisfactory to the board of compliance with any term specified by an order of the board as a condition of reinstatement of the license;

(5) any materials, information, evaluation or examination reports, or other documentation that the board may request that will enable it to satisfactorily evaluate and determine whether or not the license should be reinstated. In determining whether or not the license should be reinstated, factors including the following shall be considered by the board:

(A) the extent to which the individual presently merits the public trust;

(B) the individual's demonstrated understanding of the wrongful conduct that resulted in the license suspension or revocation. This understanding may be demonstrated either by successfully completing an oral interview with the board or by preparing a professional paper that is reviewed and approved by the board or the board's designee;

(C) the extent of the individual's remediation and rehabilitation in regard to the wrongful conduct that resulted in the license suspension or revocation;

(D) the nature and seriousness of the original misconduct;

(E) the individual's conduct after the license suspension or revocation;

(F) the time elapsed since the license suspension or revocation; and

(G) the individual's present competence in psychological knowledge and skills;

(6) verification acceptable to the board that the applicant has completed, during the immediate 24-month period, 100 continuing education hours as defined in K.A.R. 102-1-15; and

(7) evidence satisfactory to the board that the applicant has not practiced independently as or held that individual out to the public as being a psychologist.

(c) To be considered for renewal of an expired psychology license, the applicant shall submit the following items to the board:

(1) the renewal form approved and provided by the board;

(2) the renewal fee as set forth in K.A.R. 102-1-13(a)(3);

(3) the late renewal fee equal to the renewal fee as set forth in K.A.R. 102-1-13(a)(3);

(4) if the applicant has been credentialed in a state other than Kansas, verification of the status of the applicant's credential in that state;

(5) verification acceptable to the board that the applicant has completed, during the immediate 24-month period, 100 continuing education hours as defined in K.A.R. 102-1-15; and

(6) evidence satisfactory to the board that, after November 1 following the expiration of the license, the applicant has not practiced independently as or held out that individual as a psychologist. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-7507; implementing K.S.A. 74-5318, K.S.A. 74-5319, K.S.A. 74-5339, K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-7507, K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-5320, and K.S.A. 74-5321; effective May 1, 1982; amended May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1986; amended May 1, 1987; amended Dec. 18, 1998.)

102-1-12. Educational requirements. (a) A graduate applicant for psychology licensure shall be deemed to have received a doctoral degree based on a program of studies in content primarily psychological as set forth in K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 74-5310(a)(3) and amendments thereto, or the substantial equivalent of such program, in both subject matter and extent of training if this doctoral degree program is or was accredited by the American psychological association at the time the applicant graduated. If not so accredited, the doctoral degree program from which the applicant was granted the degree shall meet all of the following criteria.

(1) The doctoral program is offered by an institution of higher education that is regionally accredited by an accrediting agency substantially equivalent to the accrediting agencies that accredit the universities in Kansas.

(2) The program offers doctoral education and training in psychology, one goal of which is to prepare students for the practice of psychology.

(3) The program stands as a recognized, coherent organizational entity within a university or college.

(4) There is a clear administrative authority with primary responsibility within the program for the substantive content areas as set forth in K.A.R. 102-1-12(a)(12), and in the emphasis areas of psychology.

(5) The program is an organized sequence of study designed to provide an integrated educational experience.

(6) There is an identifiable full-time faculty, and the person responsible for the program is licensed or academically eligible at the doctoral level to engage in the practice of psychology.

(7) The student's major advisor is a member of the psychology faculty.

(8) The program has an identifiable body of students who are matriculated in the program for a degree.

(9) The program publicly states an explicit philosophy of training by which it intends to prepare students for the practice of psychology. The program's philosophy, educational model, and curriculum plan are substantially consistent with the mission and goals of the program's sponsor institution and are consistent with the following principles of the discipline.

(A) Psychological practice is based on the science of psychology, which, in turn, is influenced by the professional practice of psychology.

(B) Training for practice is sequential, cumulative, graded in complexity, and designed to prepare students for further organized training.

(10) The program, except for industrial/organizational, requires an internship that meets the following requirements:

(A) consists of at least 1,800 hours over one year of full-time training or two consecutive years of half-time training;

(B) accepts as interns only applicants enrolled in the doctoral program;

(C) is directed by an individual who is certified, licensed, or academically qualified for licensure or certification at the doctoral level to engage in the practice of psychology;

(D) provides training and close supervision in a wide range of professional activities that include diagnosis, remediation techniques, interdisciplinary relationships, consultation, and experience with a population of clients or patients presenting a diverse set of problems and backgrounds;

(E) is taken after completion of graduate courses and practica in the area of emphasis or after completion of program pre-internship training requirements;

(F) provides the intern with a minimum of four hours of supervision for every 40 hours of training, at least two hours of which shall be individual supervision;

(G) provides supervision by psychologists who meet the qualifications and responsibilities as established in K.A.R. 102-1-5a(b) and (c);

(H) stands as a distinct and organized program clearly recognizable within an institution or agency as a training program for psychologists;

(I) identifies interns as being in training and not as staff;

(J) has an identifiable psychology training staff; and

(K) is an integrated and conceptually organized, not an after-the-fact tabulation of experience.

(11) The program requires each student to complete a minimum of three full-time academic years of graduate study, or the equivalent thereof, and to complete an internship before awarding the doctoral degree. At least two of the three academic training years, or the equivalent thereof, shall be completed at the institution from which the doctoral degree is granted, and at least one year shall be in full-time residence, or the equivalent thereof, at the same institution. The program's course work shall also include the skill courses appropriate for the applicant's major or area of emphasis.

(12) The program has and implements a clear and coherent curriculum plan that provides the means whereby all students can acquire and demonstrate substantial understanding of and competency in the current body of knowledge in the following three substantive areas.

(A) The breadth of scientific psychology, its history of thought and development, its research methods, and its applications. Students shall have completed, in one semester, a three credit-hour semester course or the equivalent quarter or trimester credit hours, in each of the following six areas:

(i) biological aspects of behavior, including such courses as clinical neuropsychology and biological foundations of psychopathology;

(ii) cognitive and affective aspects of behavior, including such courses as theories of perception, human learning and memory, cognitive development, and theories and research in human learning;

(iii) social aspects of behavior, including such courses as advanced social psychology, social psychology, theories, research, and clinical applications;

(iv) history and systems of psychology, including such courses as history of psychology and theories of personality;

(v) psychological measurement, including such courses as introduction to mathematical methods in psychology, educational measurement methods in psychological research, and research methods in clinical psychology; and

(vi) research methodology and techniques of data analysis, including such courses as statistical methods in psychology, research design in education, multivariate analysis, and multivariate statistical methods.

(B) The scientific, methodological and theoretical foundations of practice. Students shall have completed, in one semester, a three credit-hour semester course or the equivalent quarter or trimester credit hours, in each of the following four areas:

(i) individual differences in behavior, including such courses as basis and nature of individuality, intelligence and cognition, and cross-cultural counseling;

(ii) human development, including such courses as advanced child behavior and development, behavioral analysis of child development, psychology of adult personality, gerontology, and counseling with adults;

(iii) dysfunctional behavior or psychopathology, including such a course as advanced psychopathology; and

(iv) professional, ethical, legal, and quality assurance principles and standards, including such courses as professional and ethical problems in clinical psychology, and legal, ethical and professional issues in counseling.

(C) Methods of diagnosing or defining problems through psychological assessment, measurement, strategies, and techniques of therapeutic intervention or remediation. A minimum of 24 semester credit hours or the equivalent quarter or trimester credit hours is required, distributed between the following two areas:

(i) nine semester credit hours or the equivalent quarter or trimester credit hours in assessment. Assessment hours shall include theories and methods of assessment and diagnosis, including such courses as intelligence testing, behavioral and personality assessment in children, theory and construction of personality tests and techniques, and psychodiagnostic assessment; and

(continued)

(ii) fifteen semester credit hours or the equivalent quarter or trimester credit hours in techniques of therapeutic interventions, effective therapeutic intervention, consultation, and supervision, including such courses as counseling and interviewing skills, theories of group counseling, psychological clinic, clinical psychotherapy, group therapeutic techniques, and psychotherapy with families.

(13) The program requires at least 90 semester credit hours or the equivalent quarter or trimester credit hours of formal graduate study in the psychology program, of which at least 60 semester credit hours or the equivalent quarter or trimester credit hours are distributed among the content areas specified in subsection (12).

(14) At least 60 semester credit hours or the equivalent quarter or trimester hours of the course work for the doctoral program are clearly designated on the transcript as graduate-level courses in the program, exclusive of practica, internship, and dissertation credits. The number of program extension credits shall not exceed 10 semester credit hours or the equivalent quarter or trimester credit hours. The number of postdoctoral credit hours from a regionally accredited university or college to meet licensure requirements shall not exceed 10 semester credit hours or the equivalent quarter or trimester credit hours.

(15) When the program has an applied emphasis, including clinical psychology, counseling psychology, or school psychology, the training shall also include a minimum of at least two semesters of coordinated practica. The practica in the application of skills related to areas of emphasis shall be performed in an organized setting necessary to qualify for professional experiences as required by K.A.R. 102-1-5.

(16) The program advertises in official documents, including course catalogues and announcements of program standards and descriptions, admission requirements that are in part or in full based on objective, standardized achievement tests and measures.

(17) The program includes ongoing objective review and evaluation of student learning and progress, and reports this evaluation in the official transcript.

(18) The program includes a comprehensive examination, or the equivalent as identified by the program, and requires that the applicant pass this requirement before awarding the doctoral degree.

(19) Each student is required to initiate, prepare, conduct, and report original research or an equivalent project as determined by the program and as part of the graduation requirements.

(20) The institution offering the graduate program has equipment and resources available, including suitable scientific and practica facilities, and a library that are adequate for the size of the student body and the scope of the program offered.

Article 5.—DRIVER AND TRAFFIC SAFETY EDUCATION COURSES

91-5-1. Definitions. (a) "Approved program" means an approved driver education program or approved motorcycle safety program.

(b) "Driver education program" means a course designed to teach students the components of basic automobile operation, including rules of the road and safety.

(c) "Hour" means a class period of no fewer than 50 minutes.

(d) "Motorcycle safety program" or "Driver education II" means a course designed to teach students the components of motorcycle operation, including safety.

(e) "State board" means the state board of education. (Authorized by K.S.A. 72-7514; implementing K.S.A. 8-272; effective May 1, 1980; amended, T-84-2, Feb. 10, 1983; amended May 1, 1984; amended Dec. 18, 1998.)

91-5-1a. Program approval. (a) To be eligible for program approval, a school shall be accredited by the state board as a public secondary school, nonpublic secondary school, or community college. Each school shall make application to the state board for approval of its driver education program or motorcycle safety program before the initiation of instruction.

(b) Each application for approval of a driver education program shall include the following:

(1) A detailed description of the proposed program;

(2) a statement of the specific goals and objectives of the program;

(3) a description of the procedures to be used to evaluate the program;

(4) an assurance that each instructor will meet the requirements of the state board for teaching driver education; and

(5) any other information required by the state board.

(c) A driver education program shall not be approved unless it requires that each enrolled student demonstrates proficiency in both of the following areas:

(1) Rules of the road; and

(2) proper operation and control of a vehicle while driving in varying conditions affecting vehicle operation.

(d) Due to the time required to adequately assess skills acquisition, a driver education program shall not be approved if the program is designed to be completed in fewer than seven days.

(e) (1) Each application for approval of a motorcycle safety program shall include information indicating that the proposed program complies with the requirements of K.A.R. 91-5-14 and amendments thereto.

(2) A motorcycle safety program shall not be approved if the program is designed to be completed in fewer than three days.
