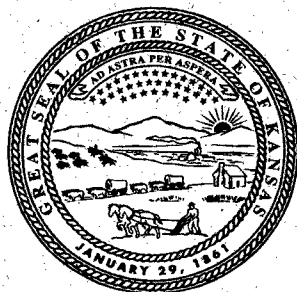

Wastewater Control Facilities: Wastewater will be impounded for subsequent application to agricultural land for beneficial use. Wastewater storage capacity will be provided which meets or exceeds KDHE minimum requirements.

Compliance Schedule: A livestock waste management plan for the facility shall be developed. The plan shall cover, but not be limited to, the following items: handling and disposal equipment for both solid and liquid wastes, land application practices used to protect against runoff and leaching, waste application rates based on crop nutrient utilization, and identification of adequate land areas for application of all wastes. A plan shall be submitted to the department by August 1, 1999. The approved plan will become part of this permit.

Additional dewatering equipment shall be obtained within 60 days after issuance of this permit through purchase, rental or custom application agreement. It shall double the pumping capacity of the existing equipment from 450 gpm to 900 gpm, and shall be capable of dispersing the wastewater over 30 acres of land suitable for waste application. Written verification of the acquisition of the equipment shall be submitted to the department.

Furthermore, the livestock waste management plan to be submitted by August 1, 1999, shall determine and incorporate additional pumping capacity to meet the full irrigation capacity required for dewatering as determined by evaluating the facility needs for disposal of process wastewater and storm water for the design storm event. This additional pumping capacity shall be obtained by October 1, 1999, through purchase, rental or custom application agreement, with written verification of acquisition of the equipment to be submitted to the department.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 2 p.m. Friday, April 2, in the Senate Room of the Jayhawk Tower, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations of the Board of Indigents' Defense Services.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the director of the Board of Indigents' Defense Services, 714 S.W. Jackson, Suite 200, Topeka, 66603. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally in the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Carol Alexander at (785) 296-4505 or (800) 766-3777 (TTY). Handicapped parking is located immediately in front of the building at the corner of 7th and Jackson Streets, and the entrance to the building is accessible to individuals with disabilities.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 105-1-1. This proposed regulation, as amended, clarifies exactly what types of legal representation the agency is required by law to provide.

K.A.R. 105-2-1. This proposed regulation, as amended, reflects the agency's shift from a regional public defender system to a judicial district-based system. Other amendments, including "assigned counsel" and "appointed counsel," have been proposed to reflect current usage and meanings by the board and agency staff.

K.A.R. 105-3-1. This proposed regulation, as amended, permits administrative district court judges to refuse to place attorneys on the appointments panels of their judicial districts if they feel the attorney cannot render effective assistance of counsel to indigent defendants.

K.A.R. 105-3-2. The amendments to this regulation: (1) update language to reflect the enactment of the Kansas Sentencing Guidelines, and (2) set forth qualifications for attorneys in death penalty cases.

K.A.R. 105-3-4. This regulation states panel attorneys have primary responsibility for the cases to which they have been appointed. The board proposes repealing this regulation because neither the board nor board staff believe the regulation serves any useful function. Attorneys' professional responsibilities are adequately set forth in other agency rules and regulations and in the Model Rules of Professional Conduct as adopted by the Supreme Court.

K.A.R. 105-3-5. This proposed regulation, as amended, permits administrative district court judges to remove attorneys from the appointment panels of their judicial districts. The amendment provides that the board may review the decision to determine if the administrative judge abused his or her discretion in removing the attorney from the panel.

K.A.R. 105-3-8. This regulation sets forth when a private attorney may continue to represent a client on appeal. The board proposes repealing this regulation because it is not needed and is not used in practice.

K.A.R. 105-3-9. This proposed regulation details the duties trial counsel must perform in order to protect a client's right to appeal. The amendment was suggested by a district court judge in order to assist the appellate defender in ordering necessary documents and transcripts.

K.A.R. 105-3-11. This proposed regulation sets forth whom district court judges should appoint when a public defender has a conflict of interest. The amendments are made to reflect current agency policy of using private attorneys under contract and public defender conflict offices to handle conflict cases.

K.A.R. 105-3-12. This proposed regulation sets forth the procedure the district court must follow in appointing counsel in death penalty cases. The amendments are purely technical and have been made because the agency no longer has a "capital coordinator."

K.A.R. 105-5-2. This proposed regulation sets forth the rate of compensation that attorneys are paid by the agency. The regulation has been amended in order to provide payment for attorneys in death penalty cases and to

clear up a technical distinction between "assigned counsel" and "contract counsel."

K.A.R. 105-5-3. This proposed regulation changes the level of compensation for appellate cases. The regulation has been amended because the average cost per appellate case for the agency exceeds the \$750 level provided for in the regulation.

K.A.R. 105-5-6. This proposed regulation sets forth the level of compensation that attorneys are paid by the agency for nontried cases. The amendments are largely technical. Any additional compensation amounts reflect the current average cost per case.

K.A.R. 105-5-7. This proposed regulation sets forth the level of compensation that attorneys are paid by the agency for tried cases. The amendments are largely technical. The regulation has been amended to clarify that reasonable compensation for a tried off-grid felony is \$5,000.

K.A.R. 105-5-8. This proposed regulation defines the criteria to consider in declaring a case exceptional. The board felt the amendment was needed to clarify that the board is not bound by a district court judge's finding that a case is exceptional.

K.A.R. 105-6-2. This proposed regulation sets forth what expenses the agency will reimburse attorneys. The amendments reflect current board policy and practice.

K.A.R. 105-7-2. This proposed regulation sets forth what procedures investigators and experts should use in order to be paid by the agency. The amendments reflect current board policy and practice. Public defender requests for these services are routed directly to the board's administrative office for approval.

K.A.R. 105-7-4, 105-7-5, 105-7-6, 105-7-7, 105-7-8 and 105-7-9. These proposed regulations set forth what expert services the agency provides payment for and the maximum amounts of compensation that will be paid for investigators, psychiatrists and psychologists, interpreters and other experts. The amendments have been made in order to reflect current costs and to allow the director to approve most requests for compensation in advance. The board believes the amendments will help contain costs and should streamline the payment process for the individuals performing these services.

K.A.R. 105-8-1. This proposed regulation sets forth the procedure to be used for an attorney to obtain a transcript from a court reporter. The regulation has been amended because Supreme Court Rule 3.03 provides that no district court order is needed to obtain a transcript.

K.A.R. 105-8-2. This proposed regulation sets forth what procedures court reporters should use in order to be paid by the agency. The amendment reflects current board policy and practice.

K.A.R. 105-8-3. This proposed regulation sets forth the rate at which court reporters are paid. The amendment reflects that the actual rate is set by Supreme Court Rule.

K.A.R. 105-10-1a. This proposed regulation details the agency's trial level public defender system. The amendments to the regulation reflect the agency's shift from a regional public defender system to a judicial district or county-based system.

K.A.R. 105-10-2. This proposed regulation, as amended, clarifies what cases the state appellate defender can undertake.

K.A.R. 105-10-3. This proposed regulation sets forth the procedures to be followed when the agency changes a defense delivery system. The proposed amendments are designed to eliminate unnecessary paperwork and reflect the board's shift from a regional public defender system to a judicial district or county-based system.

K.A.R. 105-10-5. This proposed regulation sets forth when a public defender office may contract with a private attorney to provide representation to an indigent defendant. The amendment reflects the board's shift from a regional public defender system to a judicial district or county-based system.

K.A.R. 105-21-3. This proposed regulation sets forth the procedure when a public defender office may refuse to accept cases because of excessive caseload demands. The amendment is proposed because in practice the agency's executive director has always established the period in which an office may refuse to accept cases, and this period has always been set based upon the unique circumstances presented.

K.A.R. 105-21-6. This proposed regulation states that public defenders shall keep records as prescribed by the agency's executive director. The amendment is minor in nature and is a reflection of agency practice.

K.A.R. 105-31-4. This regulation states that contract attorneys may be paid additional sums for appellate work. The board proposes repealing this regulation because any contract that is awarded will provide language to this effect. Because of this, the board believes the regulation is unneeded.

Because the amendments to these regulations are either purely technical in nature or codify existing agency practices, and because the amendments do not expand the scope of legal services provided by the agency, there are no anticipated costs to the agency, other state agencies or the public.

**Permanent Administrative
Regulations**

Article 3.—DENTAL HYGIENISTS

71-3-7. Procedures that may be performed under general supervision. Any hygienist licensed in Kansas may perform, under direct or general supervision, any procedure that a hygienist is authorized by the Kansas dental practices act to perform, except the administration of local anesthesia, which shall be performed only under direct supervision. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-1406 and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1456(d), as amended by L. 1998, Ch. 141, Sec. 2; effective Feb. 12, 1999.)

Article 6.—DENTAL AUXILIARIES

71-6-1. Definitions. As used in these regulations, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

(a) "Approved instruction course" means a course of instruction that the board has found to meet the requirements listed in K.A.R. 71-6-3.

(b) "Coronal" means the portion of a tooth or tooth replacement visible above the gum line.

(c) "Coronal polish teeth" means to remove soft accretions and stains from coronal surfaces of teeth or tooth replacements.

(d) "Coronal scale teeth" means to remove hard deposits and accretions from the coronal surfaces of teeth or tooth replacements.

(e) "Direct supervision" means that the dentist is in the dental office, personally diagnoses the condition to be treated, personally authorizes the procedure, and, before dismissal of the patient, evaluates the performance. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-1406 and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1423(h)(5), as amended by L. 1998, Ch. 141, Sec. 1; effective Feb. 12, 1999.)

71-6-2. Acts restricted. (a)(1) A nonlicensed person shall not perform coronal scaling as part of a prophylaxis without first obtaining a certificate demonstrating successful completion of an approved course of instruction.

(2) The supervising dentist shall not permit a nonlicensed person to perform coronal scaling as part of a prophylaxis until that person's certificate, demonstrating successful completion of an approved course of instruction, is prominently posted at the location where the coronal scaling will be performed.

(b) A nonlicensed person shall not perform coronal scaling as a part of a prophylaxis on a patient who is under local or general anesthesia.

(c) A nonlicensed person may perform coronal scaling only under the direct supervision of a supervising dentist licensed and practicing in Kansas. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-1406 and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1423(h)(5), as amended by L. 1998, Ch. 141, Sec. 1; effective Feb. 12, 1999.)

71-6-3. Approved instruction course. (a) Each private or public educational entity seeking approval by the board, pursuant to L. 1998, Ch. 141, Sec. 1, of an instruction course shall demonstrate that the course meets the following minimum requirements:

(1) Has a student-instructor ratio consistent with the American dental association accreditation standards for dental assisting programs;

(2) encourages enrollment by a geographically diverse population of prospective students;

(3) includes the following course topics:

(A) Dental and gingival anatomy and morphology;

(B) periodontal disease, including recognition and treatment;

(C) dental plaque, stain, and calculus formation;

(D) sterilization and infection control;

(E) oral hygiene, with an emphasis on technique, products, and devices;

(F) topical fluoride application;

(G) the use of instruments, including technique, position, and sharpening;

(H) coronal scaling, including laboratory experience with mechanical and ultrasonic devices; and

(I) coronal polishing, including laboratory experience;

(4) is a minimum of 90 hours;

(5) includes one or more outcome assessment examinations that demonstrate that the student has obtained technical and clinical competency in the coronal scaling of teeth; and

(6) upon successful completion of the course, issuance by the offering educational entity of a certificate identifying the student and the date of successful completion.

(b) Before any proposed changes are made to the required elements of an approved instruction course, the changes shall be approved by the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-1406 and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1423(h)(5), as amended by L. 1998, Ch. 141, Sec. 1; effective Feb. 12, 1999.)

71-6-4. Subgingival scaling. Whenever coronal scaling is performed as part of a prophylaxis by a nonlicensed person who has a certificate from an educational entity demonstrating successful completion of an approved course of instruction, all subgingival scaling shall be performed by a hygienist or dentist licensed in Kansas. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-1406 and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1423(h)(5), as amended by L. 1998, Ch. 141, Sec. 1; effective Feb. 12, 1999.)

71-6-5. Duty to notify board. Each nonlicensed person who has received a certificate from an educational entity demonstrating successful completion of an approved course of instruction shall notify the board, within 30 days of employment or change in employment, of the names and business addresses of all dentists who are employing or supervising the nonlicensed person. Each of these nonlicensed persons shall also provide the same information to the board within 30 days of any change in the identity or business location of any dentist employing or supervising the nonlicensed person. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-1406 and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1423(h)(5), as amended by L. 1998, Ch. 141, Sec. 1; effective Feb. 12, 1999.)

71-6-6. Coronal polishing. Any dentist licensed and practicing in Kansas may delegate to a nonlicensed person the coronal polishing of teeth if the dentist provides that person with direct supervision and has provided that person with the appropriate training in polishing techniques. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-1406 and implementing K.S.A. 1997 Supp. 65-1423(h)(5), as amended by L. 1998, Ch. 141, Sec. 1; effective Feb. 12, 1999.)
