Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Friday, April 30, in Room 108 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in an existing rule and regulation of the Board of Accountancy.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the executive director of the Board of Accountancy, Suite 556, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Shelly Myers at (785) 296-2162. Handicapped parking is located at the south end of Landon State Office Building, and the north entrance to the building is accessible to individuals with disabilities.

The regulation is proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 74-12-1. Fees. Changes in this regulation set fees for initial and reinstated permits. There is no economic impact to governmental agencies or the general public. This change will result in an increase of permit fees to certified public accountants, which will result in an increase of receipts to the Board of Accountancy.

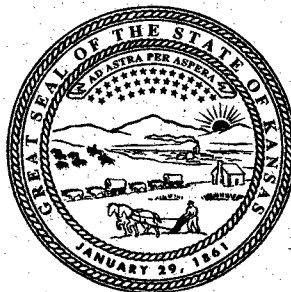

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, April 6, at the office of the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts, 235 S. Topeka Blvd., Topeka, to consider the adoption of one proposed rule and regulation.

The proposed rule and regulation relates to the location of medical records upon termination of the practitioner's active practice. This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit comments prior to the hearing to the Board of Healing Arts at the address above. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. This regulation, if adopted, would require each licensee of the board who terminates the active practice of the healing arts within this state to provide information to the Kansas Board of Healing Arts relating to the location of the medical records of his or her patients.

Subject to the terms and conditions of the complete official notice of bond sale dated February 4, 1999, of Pottawatomie County, Kansas, in connection with the issuance of the county's General Obligation Bonds, Series 1999A, as hereinafter described, sealed, written bids will be received at the office of the county clerk at the Pottawatomie County Administration Building, 207 N. First St., Westmoreland, KS 66549, until 11 a.m. Thursday, February 11, 1999, for the purchase of the bonds. All bids will be publicly opened, read aloud and tabulated on said date and at said time and will thereafter be immediately considered and acted upon by the governing body of the county.

No oral or auction bids for the bond will be considered, and no bids for less than the entire series of bonds will be considered.

Bids will be accepted only on the official bid form that has been prepared for the public bidding on these bonds, which may be obtained from the county clerk. Bids may be submitted by mail or delivered in person, and must be received at the place and not later than the date and time herein specified. Each bid must be accompanied by a good faith deposit in the form of a qualified financial surety bond or certified or cashier's check drawn on a bank located within the United States, each made payable to the order of the county and in an amount equal to 2 percent of the principal amount of the bonds.

Details of the Bonds

The aggregate principal amount of the bonds is \$580,000. The bonds will be dated as of February 1, 1999, and will be issued as fully registered bonds in the denomination of \$5,000, or integral multiples in excess thereof not exceeding the principal amount of bonds maturing in any year. The bonds will bear interest, payable as hereinafter set forth, at the rates specified by the successful bidder for the bonds. Certain of the bonds are subject to redemption prior to their maturities as provided in the complete official notice of bond sale.

Interest on the bonds will be payable semiannually on April 1 and October 1 in each year, commencing April, 2000, and the bonds will mature serially on October 1 in each of the years and principal amounts as follows:

Payment of Principal and Interest

The Kansas State Treasurer will serve as the bond registrar and paying agent for the bonds, and the principal of the bonds will be payable upon surrender at the paying

agent's principal office in the City of Topeka, Kansas. Interest will be paid by the mailing of a check or draft of the paying agent to the registered owners of the bonds.

Security for the Bonds

The bonds and the interest thereon will constitute general obligations of the county, and the full faith, credit and resources for the county will be pledged to the payment thereof. The county is obligated to levy ad valorem taxes without limitation as to rate or amount upon all of the taxable tangible property within the territorial limits of the county for the purpose of paying the bonds and the interest thereon.

Delivery of the Bonds

The bonds, duly printed, executed and registered, will be furnished and delivered at the expense of the county to the successful bidder, or at its direction, on or before February 26, 1999, at such bank or trust company or other qualified depository in the State of Kansas or Kansas City, Missouri, as may be specified by the successful bidder. Delivery elsewhere will be made at the expense of the successful bidder.

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Jonathan P. Small, Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose fees will be paid by the county. Bond counsel's approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder upon delivery of the bonds. Financial Matters

The county's 1998 equalized assessed tangible valuation for computation of bonded debt limitations is \$322,160,790. The county's outstanding general obligation bonded indebtedness as of the date hereof totals the principal amount of \$1,346,829, which includes the bonds described herein and temporary notes in the principal amount of \$450,000, which will be paid off in part from the proceeds of the bonds described herein.

Article 4.—ACCIDENT AND HEALTH INSURANCE

40-4-34. Accident and health insurance; coordination of benefits; guidelines. Sections 3 through 9, including appendices A and B of the national association of insurance commissioners' "group coordination of benefits model regulation," January 1996 edition, are hereby adopted by reference subject to the following exceptions:

(a) Section 3(A)(1)(c) is not adopted and shall be replaced with the following language: "If a person is covered by two (2) or more plans that provide benefits or services on the basis of negotiated fees, or if one plan calculates its benefits or services on the basis of usual and customary fees and another plan provides its benefits or services on the basis of negotiated fees, any amount in excess of the highest of the fees is not an allowable expense."

(b) Section 3(A)(1)(d) is not adopted.

(c) Section (H)(3)(g) is not adopted.

(d) Section 3(H)(4)(k) is new and shall read as follows: "Plan shall not include group or group-type accident-only coverages."

(e) Section 3(H)(4)(f) is not adopted.

(f) Sections 8(B)(2) and (3) and (C) are not adopted and shall be replaced with the following language: "If the Noncomplying Plan reduces its benefits so that the employee, subscriber, or member receives less in benefits than he or she would have received had the Complying Plan paid or provided its benefits as the Secondary Plan and the Noncomplying Plan paid or provided its benefits as the Primary Plan, then the Complying Plan shall advance to or on behalf of the employee, subscriber, or member an amount equal to such difference. However, in no event shall the Complying Plan advance more than the Complying Plan would have paid had it been the Primary Plan less any amount it previously paid."

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer.

In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three-letter code printed and appearing in three of eight varying locations among the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: FRE = Free Ticket; ONE = \$1.00; TWO = \$2.00; THR = \$3.00; TEN = \$10.00; FTN = \$15.00; TWY = \$20.00; TRY = \$30.00; SXY = \$60.00; HUN = \$100.00; and FHN = \$500.00.

(f) "Bar code" means the 16-digit bar-coded number appearing on the back of each ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-1-21-99, Jan. 15, 1999.)

111-4-1411. Determination of instant prize winners. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the six prize amounts or the five prize amounts and a "\$\$\$" tripler. This ticket will feature two chances to win. "Game 1" is a "match three of six" dollar amount or a "match two" dollar amounts plus a "\$\$\$" tripler symbol to win triple the dollar amount. If the player matches three like prize amounts, the player wins that prize amount. If the player matches two like prize amounts plus a "\$\$\$" tripler symbol, the player wins triple the prize amount. "Game 2" is a "BONUS" game. The player will remove the latex covering over the play area. If a prize is revealed, the player wins that prize amount. The player may win up to two times on a single ticket. (d) Additional ticket orders shall have the same prize structure, the same number of prizes per prize pool of 300,000 tickets and the same odds as were contained in the initial ticket order. Article 5.—POWERBALL

111-5-24. Game description; retail sale of tickets.

(a) "Powerball" is a five out of 49 plus one out of 42 on-line lottery game which pays the grand prize, at the election of the player made in accordance with the rules or by a default election made in accordance with these rules at the time of play purchase, either on an annuitized parimutuel basis, or as a cash lump sum payment of the total cash held for this prize on a parimutuel basis. Except as provided in these rules, all other prizes are paid on a set cash basis. To play "Powerball" a player shall select five different numbers between one and 49 and one additional number between one and 42 for input into a terminal. The additional number may be the same as one of the first five numbers selected by the player.

(b) A "Powerball" game ticket shall sell for one dollar.

(c) Tickets shall not be sold to any person under the age of 18 years. Each retailer may require a person purchasing tickets to produce proof of age.

(d) Each ticket shall be purchased from a terminal operated by a retailer. The player may select a set of five numbers and one additional number by:

- (1) communicating the six numbers to the retailer;
 - (2) marking six numbered squares in any one game board on a play slip and submitting the play slip to the retailer; or
 - (3) requesting a "computer pick" from the retailer.
- The retailer shall then issue a ticket from the terminal containing the selected set or sets of numbers, each of which constitutes a game play.

(e) A validated ticket shall be the only proof of a game play or plays. The only method of claiming a prize or prizes shall be the submission of the winning ticket to and receipt of the ticket by the lottery or its authorized agent. A play slip shall have no pecuniary or prize value and shall not be used as evidence of a ticket purchase or of numbers selected.

(f) A ticket shall not be voided or cancelled by returning the ticket to the selling retailer, including tickets that are printed in error.

(g) Ticket sales will end at approximately 8:59 p.m. central time on Wednesdays and Saturdays and will resume at approximately 9:05 p.m.

(h) Drawings will be conducted twice weekly, on Wednesdays and Saturdays at approximately 9:58 p.m. central time (CT), after the game is closed at approximately 8:59 p.m. central time (CT) and the external auditor has verified that the game is closed, under conditions and procedures promulgated by the executive director of the lottery.

(i) Each player shall be responsible for verifying the accuracy of the game play or plays and other data printed

on the ticket. The placing of plays is done at the player's own risk through the on-line retailer who is deemed to be acting on behalf of the player in entering the play or plays. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8718; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992; amended, T-111-3-24-92, March 20, 1992; amended, T-111-5-21-92, May 15, 1992; amended, T-111-10-27-97, Sept. 12, 1997; amended, T-111-1-21-99, Jan. 15, 1999.)

111-5-28. Prize payments; annuitized and cash prizes.

(a) Grand prizes shall be paid, at the election of the player made no later than 60 days after the player becomes entitled to a prize with either a per winner annuity or cash payment. If the payment election is not made at the time of purchase and is not made by the player within 60 days after the player becomes entitled to the prize, then the prize shall be paid as an annuity prize. An election for an annuity payment made by a player before ticket purchase or by system default or design may be changed to a cash payment at the election of the player until the expiration of 60 days after the player becomes entitled to the prize. The election to take the cash payment may be made at the time of the prize claim or within 60 days after the player becomes entitled to the prize. An election made after the winner becomes entitled to the prize is final and cannot be revoked, withdrawn or otherwise changed. Shares of the grand prize shall be determined by dividing the cash available in the grand prize pool equally among all winners of the grand prize. Winner(s) who elected a cash payment shall be paid their share(s) in a single cash payment. The annuitized option prize shall be determined by multiplying a winner's share of the grand prize pool by the MUSL annuity factor. The MUSL annuity factor is determined by the best total securities price obtained through a competitive bid of qualified, pre-approved brokers made after it is determined that the prize is to be paid as an annuity prize or after the expiration of 60 days after the winner becomes entitled to the prize. Neither MUSL nor the party lotteries shall be responsible or liable for changes in the advertised or estimated annuity prize amount and the actual amount purchased after the prize payment method is actually known to MUSL. In certain instances announced by the product group, the grand prize shall be a guaranteed amount and shall be determined pursuant to subsection (f) of K.A.R. 111-5-28. If individual shares of the cash held to fund an annuity are less than \$250,000, the product group, in its sole discretion, may elect to pay the winners their share of the cash held in the grand prize pool of the annuity. All annuitized prizes shall be paid annually in 25 equal payments with the initial payment being made in cash, to be followed by 24 payments funded by the annuity. Funds for the initial payment of an annuitized prize shall be made available by MUSL for payment by a party lottery by the fifteenth calendar day following the drawing. A state may elect to make the initial payment from its own funds after validation, with notice to MUSL.

(b) In the event of the death of a lottery winner during the annuity payment period, the product group, in its sole discretion, upon the petition of the estate of the lottery winner to the Kansas lottery, may accelerate the payment

of all of the remaining lottery proceeds to the estate. If the product group makes such a determination, then securities and/or cash held to fund the deceased lottery winner's annuitized prize, may be distributed to the estate. The identification of the securities to fund the annuitized prize shall be at the sole discretion of the product group.

(c) All low tier cash prizes, which are all prizes except the grand prize, shall be paid in cash through the party lottery which sold the winning ticket(s). A party lottery may begin paying low-tier cash prizes after receiving authorization to pay from the MUSL central office.

(d) Annuitized payments of the grand prize or a share of the grand prize may be rounded to facilitate the purchase of an appropriate funding mechanism. Breakage on an annuitized grand prize win shall be added to the first cash payment to the winner or winners. Prizes other than the grand prize, which, under these rules, may become single-payment, pari-mutuel prizes, may be rounded down so that prizes can be paid in multiples of whole dollars. Breakage resulting from rounding these prizes shall be carried forward to the prize pool for the next drawing.

(e) If the grand prize is not won in a drawing, the prize money allocated for the grand prize shall roll over and be added to the grand prize pool for the following drawing.

(f) The product group may offer guaranteed minimum grand prize amounts or minimum increases in the grand prize amount between drawings or make other changes in the allocation of prize money where the product group finds that it would be in the best interest of the game. If a minimum grand prize amount or a minimum increase in the grand prize amount between drawings is offered by the product group, then the grand prize shares shall be determined as follows. If there are multiple grand prize winners during a single drawing, each selecting the annuitized option prize, then a winner's share of the guaranteed annuitized grand prize shall be determined by dividing the guaranteed annuitized grand prize by the number of winners. If there are multiple grand prize winners during a single drawing and at least one of the grand prize winners has elected the annuitized option prize, then the best bid submitted by MUSL's pre-approved qualified brokers shall determine the cash pool needed to fund the guaranteed annuitized grand prize. If no winner of the grand prize during a single drawing has elected the annuitized option prize, then the amount of cash in the grand prize pool shall be an amount equal to the guaranteed annuitized amount divided by the average annuity factor of the most recent three best quotes provided by MUSL's pre-approved qualified brokers submitting quotes. In no case, shall quotes be used which are more than two weeks old and if less than three quotes are submitted, then MUSL shall use the average of all quotes submitted. Changes in the allocation of prize money shall be designed to retain approximately the same prize allocation percentages, over a year's time, set out in these rules. Minimum guaranteed prizes or increases may be waived if the alternate funding mechanism set out in K.A.R. 111-5-26 becomes necessary.

(g) The holder of a winning ticket may win only one prize per board in connection with the winning numbers drawn, and shall be entitled only to the prize won by those numbers in the highest matching prize category.

(h) All prizes must be claimed within 365 days of the day of the drawing in which the prize was won. In the event the final day of the 365-day period falls on a Saturday, a Sunday or a state holiday, the claim period will be extended to 5:00 p.m. on the next business day. Temporary Administrative Regulations

Article 1.—GENERAL ADMINISTRATION

44-1-103. Public or educational visits and tours.

(a)(1) As part of an overall program of crime prevention and aversion, any institution or facility warden may develop a program, in cooperation with the courts and other agencies, to educate the public concerning the consequences of felony conviction and incarceration.

(2) Request for participation in this program may be made by the court or court services, school districts, state and local governmental agencies, criminal justice agencies, service organizations, and religious denominations. Participation by citizens may be by a group or by an individual. Adults and juveniles 10 years of age or older may participate in this educational program. The number of participants in any group and the conditions and time of the program shall be at the discretion of the institutional or facility warden. Sponsoring agencies shall apply to the warden at least 10 days before the desired date of participation.

(3) No recordings by video or audio methods, including film and videotape, shall be made without the approval of the warden and the written consent of any person who is identifiable in the recording.

(b) The general public, groups, or individuals may tour an institution or facility only while escorted by appointed personnel. Tours shall be conducted only at times convenient for the staff and conducive to efficient operation of the institution or facility, and to the safety and security of the staff, inmates, and general public.

(c) No group or individual shall be permitted in the institution without the approval of the institutional or facility warden. While on the premises, the visitors shall be subject to the regulations of the secretary of corrections and the orders of the warden. All visitors shall be subject to search and fingerprinting at the discretion of the warden. This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Rebecca Sanders, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, 66612-1678. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Rebecca Sanders at (785) 296-7811.

A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 40-4-35. Medicare supplement policies; minimum standards; requirements. The revisions to K.A.R. 40-4-35 were made to reflect changes made to the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' Model Regulation for Medicare Supplement Insurance Minimum Standards. The National Association of Insurance Commissioners made these changes as required by the Balanced Budget Amendment Act of 1997.

Kansas made some changes to its regulation that deviate from the model regulation. These changes were made to be more consumer friendly. For instance, Kansas has expanded the definition of individuals eligible for guaranteed issue or their Medicare supplement policies are guaranteed to be renewed under certain conditions.

Another change was made to provide uniformity to the premium rates charged between insureds under age 65 and insureds over age 65. These proposed changes will have no economic impact upon the Insurance Department.

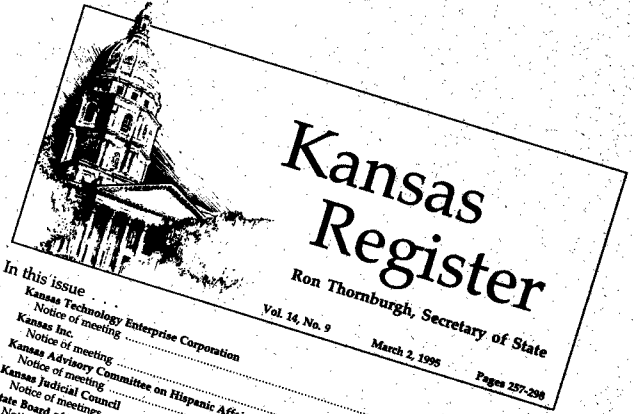
