Animal Health Department**Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, May 25, in the office of the Kansas Animal Health Department, 708 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the proposed amendment to K.A.R. 9-29-6.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to George Teagarden, Livestock Commissioner, 708 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66603. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Brenda Schutte at (785) 296-2326. There is no designated handicapped parking on the block. The agency is located on Jackson Street and is handicap accessible.

Copies of the full text of the regulation and the economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting the Animal Health Department. A summary of the proposed amended regulation and the economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 9-29-6, as currently written, requires tuberculosis testing for test-eligible cervidae entering Kansas or changing ownership within Kansas. Cervidae must test negative for tuberculosis within 60 days prior to entering

the state or changing ownership. The proposed amendment creates more stringent testing criteria for the importation of test-eligible cervidae, imported into Kansas, that were captured from the wild. These animals shall test negative twice at least 90 days apart, but not more than 150 days before entry into the state. The proposed regulation is not expected to have an economic impact on the department or other state agencies. Citizens wishing to import cervidae from other states will have to pay slightly more for wild-caught cervidae because of the additional testing requirement. Test prices vary depending on the veterinarian and the number of head tested. The agency estimates costs for testing at \$10 per head per test.

(Editor's Note: A notice of hearing on the following regulation was published in the February 4, 1999 Kansas Register. The hearing date set in that notice has been changed to allow for a longer public comment period on the proposed regulation. An amended hearing notice appears below.)

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Wednesday, May 26, in the third floor conference room, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in an existing rule and regulation.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Rebecca Sanders, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, 66612-1678. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Copies of the full text of the regulation and the economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting Rebecca Sanders. A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 40-4-35. Medicare supplement policies; minimum standards; requirements. The revisions to K.A.R. 40-4-35 were made to reflect changes made to the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' Model Regulation for Medicare Supplement Insurance Minimum Standards. The National Association of Insurance Commissioners made these changes as required by the Balanced Budget Amendment Act of 1997.

Kansas made some changes to its regulation that deviate from the model regulation. These changes were made to be more consumer friendly. For instance, Kansas has expanded the definition of individuals eligible for guaranteed issue or their Medicare supplement policies are guaranteed to be renewed under certain conditions.

Another change was made to provide uniformity to the premium rates charged between insureds under age 65 and insureds over age 65. These proposed changes will have no economic impact upon the Insurance Department.

Opinion 1999-1

Written March 4, 1999, to Jeanette J. Mathias-Morrell, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of February 26, 1999, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

You have explained that you are employed by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) as a Public Health Educator. In that capacity, you have been intimately involved in the implementation of the "Teens as Teachers" tobacco use prevention program. This is a copyrighted program from American Nonsmokers' Rights Foundation (ANRF). You have informed us that you would like to operate a consulting business in which you would offer your expertise to other states regarding the implementation of the "Teens as Teachers" program. You have explained to us in a phone conversation that, although ANRF might refer a state interested in its program to you as a consultant, you would be working for the inquiring state and would only receive your compensation from that state. You would not be working in any manner as an employee, an independent contractor or a subcontractor for ANRF.

Question

Is it a conflict of interest for you to act as a consultant for other states interested in setting up the "Teens as Teachers" program?

Opinion

Two statutes may apply to the question you have raised: K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 46-233(a), which involves participation in the making of contracts, and K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 46-235, which governs restrictions on compensation of state employees. Each of these sections will be ad-

ressed in turn. K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 46-233(a) states in pertinent part:

(a)(1) No state officer or employee shall in the capacity as such officer or employee be substantially involved in the preparation of or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which such officer or employee is employed.

(2) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, whenever any individual has participated as a state officer or employee in the making of any contract with any person or business, such individual shall not accept employment with such person or business as an employee, independent contractor or subcontractor until two years after performance of the contract is completed or until two years after the individual terminates employment as a state officer or employee, whichever is sooner.

Under subsection (a)(1) of this provision, you would be prohibited, as a state employee, from being substantially involved in the preparation of or participation in the making of a contract with the state by which you will be employed as a consultant. Additionally, under subsection (a)(2) you would be prohibited from accepting employment with the other state, if you, as a state employee, had participated in the making of any contract with that state during the preceding two years. Because you will not be working for ANRF, any contractual relationship you may have had with that organization would not be governed by K.S.A. 46-233.

K.S.A. 46-235 states in pertinent part:

No state officer or employee shall accept compensation for performance of official duties, other than that to which such person is entitled for such performance. No person shall pay or offer to pay any state officer or employee any compensation for performance of official duties, except a state officer or employee performing official duties in making payments to state officers and employees . . . The receipt of wages or salary from an individual's non-state employer during a period of service as a state officer or employee shall not be construed as compensation for performance of official duties.

Because neither your agency nor you, in the performance of your official duties, provides this type of service to other states, K.S.A. 46-235 would not prohibit you from accepting compensation for this work.

In conclusion, so long as you, in your official position as a state employee, do not participate in the making of a contract with the state for which you are performing the consulting services, and so long as it is not a part of your official state duties to provide this type of consulting services to the other state, you may act as a consultant for other states interested in setting up the "Teens as Teachers" program.

Opinion 1999-2

Written March 4, 1999, to Linden G. Appel, Deputy Chief Legal Counsel, Kansas Department of Corrections, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter dated December 18, 1998, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the state level governmental ethics law (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction

is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand that you request this opinion in your capacity as Deputy Chief Legal Counsel for the Kansas Department of Corrections. You raise two questions concerning different factual situations in your opinion request. The first question involves Employee Wellness Committees established by the Department of Corrections. You have explained that these committees promote employee health and fitness and are organized by volunteers who are permitted a reasonable amount of work hours to plan and work on the various committee projects. In the past, these committees have sponsored fitness runs and wellness days and even provided weight-lifting equipment for employee exercise/workout rooms. In order to help finance such activities and to provide prizes and awards for participants in such events, the committee members have solicited donations of money or goods from local citizens and merchants.

The second factual scenario involves a discount which has been provided to law enforcement officers, firefighters, and Department of Corrections employees from Dillard's Department Stores in Kansas and Missouri. You have informed us that Dillard's has extended this discount for the last 10 years as an annual holiday discount. This discount is given to both uniformed and non-uniformed personnel, and, according to Dillard's employees, Dillard's views this offer as a means of thanking public safety professionals whose jobs entail a risk of physical harm in the line of duty.

Question

- I. May Department of Corrections personnel solicit donations for Employee Wellness Committee functions?
- II. May Department of Corrections personnel accept the annual holiday discount provided by Dillard's stores?

Opinion

Both of these questions involve substantially the same statutes and may be addressed together. Several statutes apply to your questions and each will be addressed in turn.

K.S.A. 46-237 applies to unclassified employees not subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 46-237a. It states in pertinent part:

(a) No state officer or employee . . . shall accept, or agree to accept any . . . special discount . . . having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year from any one person known to have a special interest, under circumstances where such person knows or should know that a major purpose of the donor is to influence such person in the performance of their official duties or prospective official duties.

(b) No person with a special interest shall offer, pay, give or make any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year to any state officer or employee . . . with a major purpose

of influencing such officer or employee . . . in the performance of official duties or prospective official duties.

K.S.A. 46-228 defines "special interest" in the following manner:

"Special interest" means an interest of any person as herein defined (1) concerning action or non-action by the legislature on any legislative matter affecting such person as distinct from affect upon the people of the state as a whole, or (2) in the action or non-action of any state agency or state officer or employee upon any matter affecting such persons as distinct from affect upon the people of the state as a whole.

Unclassified employees subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 46-237 could accept gifts or discounts having an aggregate value of less than \$40.00 in value in any calendar year, so long as the employee does not know or should not have known that a major purpose of the donor was to influence the employee in the performance of his or her official duties. It should be noted that the wellness committees are not the same as a state agency and, therefore, this situation is distinguishable from that of an employee of the State of Kansas who solicits for donations on behalf of the agency.

Next, we must address K.S.A. 46-237a, which applies to the governor, the lieutenant governor, the governor's spouse, all classified employees, and those unclassified employees in the executive branch whose compensation is subject to approval by the governor pursuant to K.S.A. 75-2935b. It states in pertinent part:

(b) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept any gift, economic opportunity, loan, gratuity, special discount or service provided because of such person's official position, except:

(1) A gift having an aggregate value of less than \$40 given at a ceremony or public function where the person is accepting the gift in such person's official capacity;

(2) gifts from relatives or gifts from personal friends when it is obvious to the person that the gift is not being given because of the person's official position; or

(3) anything of value received by the person on behalf of the state that inures to the benefit of the state or that becomes the property of the state; or

(4) contributions solicited on behalf of a nonprofit organization which is exempt from taxation under paragraph (3) of subsection (c) of section 501 of the internal revenue code of 1986, as amended.

Under K.S.A. 46-237a, state employees would be entirely prohibited from soliciting gifts or accepting discounts unless one of the four enumerated exceptions applies.

K.S.A. 46-236 is applicable to your first question regarding whether the Department of Corrections personnel may solicit donations for Employee Wellness Committee functions. It applies to all state employees and provides in pertinent part:

No state officer or employee . . . shall solicit any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service from any person known to have a special interest, under circumstances where such officer [or] employee . . . knows or should know that a major purpose

(continued)

of the donor in granting the same could be to influence the performance of the official duties or prospective official duties of such officer [or] employee.

Under this section, a Department of Corrections employee may not solicit any economic opportunity, gift, special discount, etc. from any person known to have a special interest when the employee knows or should know that a major purpose of the donor in granting that gift or discount could be to influence the employee in the performance of his official duties. Absent the special interest or a major purpose to influence, the employee will be able to solicit gifts for the employee wellness committee, so long as the other statutes are followed.

Finally, K.S.A. 46-235 applies to your second question regarding whether Department of Corrections personnel may accept the annual holiday discount provided by Dillard's stores. It also applies to all state employees and provides in pertinent part:

No state officer or employee shall accept compensation for performance of official duties, other than that to which such person is entitled for such performance. No person shall pay or offer to pay any state officer or employee any compensation for performance of official duties, except a state officer or employee performing official duties in making payments to state officers and employees . . . The receipt of wages or salary from an individual's non-state employer during a period of service as a state officer or employee shall not be construed as compensation for performance of official duties.

Pursuant to this statute, if the discount was being provided to the state employee as a thank you for a job well done, it would be considered compensation for the performance of state duties and, therefore, would be prohibited.

In conclusion:

- (1) Pursuant to K.S.A. 46-237, those unclassified employees whose salaries are not subject to the approval of the governor are prohibited from *accepting* gifts for the wellness committee or discounts from Dillard's which amount to more than \$40 in value in any one calendar year from any person known to have a special interest when the employee knows or should know that a major purpose of the donor in granting that gift or discount could be to influence the employee in the performance of his official duties.
- (2) Pursuant to K.S.A. 46-236, these same employees are prohibited from *soliciting* any economic opportunity, gift, special discount, etc., from any person known to have a special interest when the employee knows or should know that a major purpose of the donor in granting that gift or discount could be to influence the employee in the performance of his official duties.
- (3) Pursuant to K.S.A. 46-237a, all classified employees and those unclassified employees whose salaries are subject to the approval of the governor are prohibited entirely from *soliciting* or *accepting* gifts for the wellness committee or from Dillard's stores.
- (4) Finally, pursuant to K.S.A. 46-235, state employees would be prohibited from accepting the discount

provided by Dillard's, if it is provided as a thank you for a job well done.

Opinion 1999-3

Written March 4, 1999, to Maureen Carroll, Lawrence.

This opinion is in response to your letter of January 14, 1999, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the state level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

You have explained that on December 4, 1998, you accepted a position as an administrative/research assistant for the Center for the Study of Family, Neighborhood, and Community Policy (Center for Study), which is a University of Kansas Affiliated Program funded through CRINK. You further advise us that prior to this employment, you worked for the Kansas Human Rights Commission (KHRC), where you served as an Education Specialist. As an Education Specialist for the KHRC, you gave education workshops regarding civil rights issues.

You now wish to join a group of professionals in a private business or create a non-profit entity devoted to research, consultation, education, and training of diversity and civil rights compliance matters. You would receive compensation for these services. Your letter does not indicate whether you do perform this type of research or consultation in your current position with the Center for Study and whether or not you plan to leave state employment when you join this private business.

Question

Is it a conflict of interest for you to perform this type of research or provide these types of consultation services?

Opinion

Two statutes apply to the question you have raised: K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 46-233(a), which involves participation in the making of contracts, and K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 46-235, which governs restrictions on compensation of state employees. Each of these sections will be addressed in turn. K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 46-233(a) states in pertinent part:

(a)(1) No state officer or employee shall in the capacity as such officer or employee be substantially involved in the preparation of or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which such officer or employee is employed.

(2) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, whenever any individual has participated as a state officer or employee in the making of any contract with any person or business, such individual shall not accept employment with such person or business as an employee, independent contractor or subcontractor until two years after performance of the contract is completed or until two years after the individual terminates employment as a state officer or employee, whichever is sooner.

Under subsection (a)(1) of this provision, you would be prohibited, as a state employee, from being substantially

involved in the preparation of or the participation in the making of a contract with the business in which you will be employed. Additionally, under subsection (a)(2) you would be prohibited from accepting employment with the private business if you, as a state employee, had participated in the making of any contract with that business during the preceding two years.

K.S.A. 46-235 states in pertinent part:

No state officer or employee shall accept compensation for performance of official duties, other than that to which such person is entitled for such performance. No person shall pay or offer to pay any state officer or employee any compensation for performance of official duties, except a state officer or employee performing official duties in making payments to state officers and employees . . . The receipt of wages or salary from an individual's non-state employer during a period of service as a state officer or employee shall not be construed as compensation for performance of official duties.

Pursuant to this statute, while you remain employed by the State of Kansas, so long as it is not part of your current state duties to perform the type of work you would be performing in the anticipated venture, K.S.A. 46-235 would not prohibit you from accepting compensation for this work.

In conclusion, K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 46-233(a)(1) does not prohibit you from researching or providing this type of consultation, so long as you do not, in your capacity as a state employee, participate in the making of any contracts between the state and your new part-time employer. In addition, pursuant to K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 46-233(a)(2), you would be prohibited from accepting employment with the private business if you, as a state employee, had participated in the making of any contract with that business during the preceding two years. Finally, pursuant to K.S.A. 46-235, as long as it is not part of your current state duties to perform this type of work, you would not be prohibited from accepting compensation for this work.

Opinion 1999-4

Written March 4, 1999, to Thomas R. Powell, Hinkle, Eberhart & Elkouri, L.L.C., Wichita.

This opinion is in response to your letter of February 8, 1999, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the local conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement

We understand that you request this opinion in your capacity as attorney for the Wichita Unified School District No. 259 (U.S.D. 259). You have informed us that the Edison Project, L.P. (Edison) currently operates two elementary schools and one middle school in this district. There have been discussions between Edison and U.S.D. 259 regarding Edison operating a high school in this district. Edison has approached U.S.D. 259 with a proposal that several U.S.D. 259 Board Members and district ad-

ministrators visit the Edison corporate headquarters in New York City for the purposes of further discussions of Edison's operation of a high school. This would be a fact-finding trip for U.S.D. 259 officials. Edison has offered to pay for the airline tickets, lodging and meals of the five individuals. The costs for the tickets, lodging, and meals will exceed \$500 per person. U.S.D. 259 would be willing to pay for the cost of the trip if Edison had not offered to pay.

Question

Under local governmental ethics laws, may U.S.D. 259 officials travel to Edison corporate headquarters in New York at Edison expense?

Opinion

U.S.D. 259 is governed by the local level conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*). Two sections of the local conflict of interests law must be reviewed to answer your question. K.S.A. 75-4304 prohibits a local official from participating in the making of contracts in which that official has a substantial interest. It states in pertinent part:

(a) No local governmental officer or employee shall, in the capacity of such an officer or employee, make or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which the officer or employee is employed or in whose business the officer or employee has a substantial interest.

(c) A local governmental officer or employee does not make or participate in the making of a contract if the officer or employee abstains from any action in regard to the contract.

(d) This section shall not apply to the following:

(1) Contracts let after competitive bidding has been advertised for by published notice; and

(2) contracts for property or services for which the price or rate is fixed by law.

K.S.A. 75-4301a(a)(3) defines a substantial interest, in part, as:

If an individual or an individual's spouse, either individually or collectively, has received in the preceding 12 months, without reasonable and valuable consideration, goods or services having an aggregate value of \$500 or more from a business or combination of business, the individual has a substantial interest in that businesses or combination of businesses.

If U.S.D. 259 would be willing to pay for the costs of the trip, and the trip would benefit a valid local school board interest, the school board and not the board member will receive the benefit and, therefore, there will be no financial gain by the school board member. Consequently, the board member would not have a substantial interest in Edison, and may vote on the contract between Edison and U.S.D. 259. It should be noted that if U.S.D. 259 were to pay for the trip expenses and then be reimbursed by the Edison Corporation, the local member would have no substantial interest in Edison.

Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

(b) On each day starting Thursday, June 17, 1999, and ending Saturday, June 19, 1999, Heartland Park will offer every person 18 years of age or older holding an entry ticket for each day's racing events one \$1 annuity Powerball ticket free. To receive a free Powerball ticket, a person holding a valid entry ticket for the date on the face of the ticket must present that ticket to the lottery sales location at Heartland Park. Each entry ticket redeemed for a free Powerball ticket shall be defaced upon presentation for the free ticket. An entry ticket which has been defaced by personnel at the lottery sales location shall not be eligible for an additional free Powerball ticket.

(c) Heartland Park shall be responsible for all free Powerball tickets given out during this event and will provide promotional announcements by means of the track announcer. It will display a printed banner on the daily race cards to include Powerball jackpot amounts.

(d) The day of the event the Kansas lottery will provide staffing for the lottery sales location at Heartland Park and will provide one full page advertisement promoting the event in the Heartland Park program. Article 3.—INSTANT GENERIC GAME RULES

111-3-14. Payment of prizes. The procedures for payment of instant monetary prizes to the winners of the instant games are as follows:

(a) The executive director or his designee shall award the designated prize to the appropriate person as soon as it is determined that all laws, regulations, and rules have been adhered to.

(b) Low-tier instant game prizes shall be paid as follows:

(1) Present the ticket to any retailer. Upon receipt and computer validation of the ticket, the retailer shall immediately make payment for the prize to the claimant. A retailer choosing not to make the payment shall not computer validate the ticket, and the claimant may claim the prize at another retailer location or may claim the prize in another manner prescribed in these rules. If the retailer cannot validate the claim, the claimant shall fill out a claim form provided by the retailer and personally present or mail the completed form together with the ticket to Kansas lottery headquarters. If the claim is received and validated at lottery headquarters, then payment shall be made to the claimant by mail.

(2) Bring the ticket to any regional office of the Kansas lottery during the hours that such office is open to the public for business. Upon receipt and verification of the claim, payment for such claim shall be made to the winner in the following manner:

(A) The prize for a validated free ticket winner redeemed in this manner shall be the purchase price of the ticket redeemed.

(B) The prize for other validated low-tier winners redeemed in this manner shall be paid by the lottery.

(3) Mail the ticket with a completed claim form in any envelope to Kansas lottery headquarters. Claim forms can be obtained from any lottery instant game retailer or any office of the Kansas lottery. Upon receipt and verification of the claim, the payment for such claim shall be made to the winner in the following manner:

(A) The prize for a validated free ticket winner redeemed in this manner shall be the purchase price of the ticket redeemed.

(B) The prizes for other validated low-tier winners redeemed in this manner shall be paid by the lottery.

(c) High tier instant game prizes in excess of \$599.00 shall be paid by any one of the following methods:

(1) Bring the ticket to any office of the Kansas lottery during the hours that such office is open to the public for business. Upon receipt and validation of the ticket, the payment shall be made to the claimant by the executive director by any means deemed appropriate. On all high-tier claims, the winning ticket should be validated by requesting any Kansas lottery retailer to validate the ticket through the lottery's on-line central computer system. Although the ticket is validated, no authorization numbers will be provided the retailer since retailer cannot pay a high-tier claim.

(2) Mail the ticket with a completed claim form in any envelope to Kansas lottery headquarters. Claim forms may be obtained from any lottery instant game retailer or any office of the Kansas lottery. Upon receipt and validation of the ticket, the payment shall be made to the claimant by the executive director by any means deemed appropriate.

(d) Tickets submitted for payment of a prize shall become property of the lottery and shall not be returned to claimant. 111-3-21. Certification of drawings. (a) All instant ticket drawings except as otherwise specified by individual game rules shall be personally observed by a member of the Kansas lottery division of security designated by the executive director and by an employee of the Kansas lottery designated by the executive director as drawing manager.

(b) Upon completion of the drawing, the designated lottery security person shall issue a report certifying that the ticket selected is valid and that to the best of his or her knowledge the procedures required by these rules were followed in conducting the drawing. Tickets drawn and certified shall be secured by the designated lottery security person and retained until ready for disposal. 111-3-22. Selection of participants. The following process shall be used for the selection of participants in all drawings conducted pursuant to K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* unless otherwise specified by individual game rules:

(a) Kansas lottery personnel shall pick up all entries mailed to the lottery's post office box.

(b) Lottery personnel shall transport the tickets to a secure area where they will be held until the time designated by the executive director for the drawing for which they are entered. Lottery security personnel shall then be responsible for transporting the tickets and placing them in the receptacle(s) or drum(s) to be used for the drawing.

(c) The selection process shall be held at the date and time specified in individual game rules. All draws shall be held in a place accessible to the public and be open for public attendance and with lottery security personnel present. All draws shall be video and audio taped.

(d) An individual designated by the executive director shall pick at random the number of tickets specified by the rules and regulations of the drawing from the receptacle(s) or drum(s) using the bare-arm technique. Should the designated individual draw tickets belonging to that designated individual, the tickets shall be disqualified.

(e) The contents of the receptacle(s) or drum(s) shall be mixed thoroughly with a shovel or other means, or rotated a minimum of 10 times to ensure random selection.

(f) If the tickets drawn are determined to be ineligible, they shall be discarded, the receptacle(s) or drum(s) resealed, and another drawn. This procedure will be repeated until valid selections are obtained.

(g) All tickets remaining in the receptacle(s) or drum(s) after valid entries have been selected shall be destroyed.

(h) Valid entries shall be certified and secured in accordance with K.A.R. 111-3-21. RULES FOR INSTANT GAME NO. 25 "WILD BINGO"

111-4-1413. Name of game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Wild Bingo" commencing on or after February 22, 1999. The specific rules for the "Wild Bingo" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.*, and 111-4-1413 through 111-4-1417. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-1-99, Feb. 19, 1999.)

111-4-1414. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Wild Bingo" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink. A 10-point game symbol appears in each of the 25 play spots within each of the "GAME CARD" play areas. Each 10-point game symbol for this instant game is one of the following:

(b) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is an 11-digit number which appears below the game symbols under the removable covering in the play area on the front of each instant ticket.

(c) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 149. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the back of each instant game ticket both above the information form and below the bar code.

(d) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three-letter code printed and appearing in three of eight locations on the "CALLER'S CARD." The codes and their meanings are as follows: TWO = \$2.00; FOR = \$4.00; FIV = \$5.00; TEN = \$10.00; STN = \$17.00; NTN = \$19.00; TWY = \$20.00; FTY = \$50.00; HUN = \$100.00; HFY = \$150.00; THN = \$200.00; THY = \$250.00; FHN = \$500.00.

(e) "Bar code" means the 16-digit bar-coded number appearing on the back of each ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-1-99, Feb. 19, 1999.)

111-4-1415. Cost of ticket. The price of "Wild Bingo" instant tickets sold by a retailer shall be \$2.00 each. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-1-99, Feb. 19, 1999.)

111-4-1416. Determination of instant prize winners. This game is played similarly to the traditional "BINGO" game and includes bonus numbers. WILD BINGO is a two-part game.

The first part consists of the "CALLERS CARD" and the "BONUS NUMBERS." The "CALLERS CARD" contains 24 draw numbers covered by opaque latex. The "BONUS NUMBERS" consist of six draw numbers covered by opaque latex.

The second part consists of four "GAME CARDS" each containing 24 numbers and a FREE space in the center of each "GAME CARD." The "GAME CARDS" are each covered by translucent blue scratch-off.

The player removes the scratch-off material on the areas of the ticket indicated as the "CALLER'S CARD" and "BONUS NUMBERS" to reveal 30 "Bingo" letter/number combinations, respectively. The player then checks to see if any of the letter/number combinations on the "CALLER'S CARD" match the letter/number combinations on any of the four "GAME CARDS." The player may then mark matching combinations by scratching or marking the matched spot on the "GAME CARDS."

If the player gets a "BINGO" by matching all the letter/number combinations on one of the four "GAME CARDS" in any horizontal, vertical, or diagonal line, or in an "X" pattern consisting of eight numbers plus "FREE" center block, or all four corners on a single "GAME CARD," the player wins the prize amount indicated in the prize legend of the respective "GAME CARD."

A player may reveal a "WILD" symbol in the "CALLERS CARD" and use it one time as an additional "FREE" spot on any one of the four "GAME CARDS" to complete a winning pattern.

A player can win up to four times on this ticket, but can win only one way on any of the four "GAME CARDS" on each ticket. There will only be one winning pattern per "GAME CARD." (b) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols or pictures printed on the front and under each tab on the back of each pull-tab ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. (e) The ticket must pass all validation requirements as specified in K.A.R. 111-8-6.

(f) Each ticket will have a feature which automatically calculates and prints the total prize amount under the pull tabs on every winning ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-1-99, Feb. 19, 1999.)

111-9-102. Price. The retail price of the tickets is 50¢ per ticket. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-1-99, Feb. 19, 1999.)

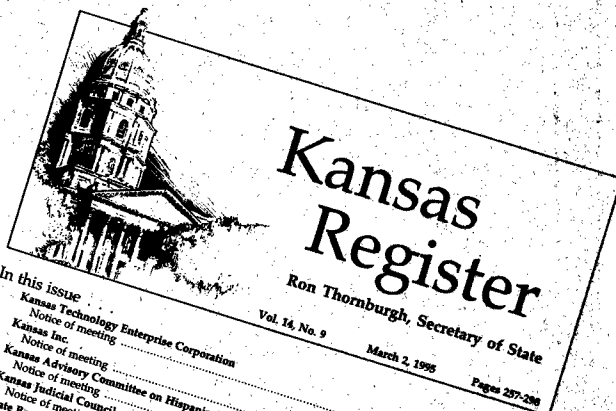
