Administrative Regulations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Environment, Bureau of Air and Radiation, will conduct a public hearing at 1 p.m. Wednesday, August 4, in the Airport Terminal conference room, Metropolitan Topeka Airport Authority, Forbes Field, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed amendments to existing asbestos control regulations K.A.R. 28-50-1, 28-50-2, 28-50-5, 28-50-6, 28-50-8, 28-50-9, 28-50-10 and 28-50-14, and revocations to K.A.R. 28-50-4 and 28-50-7. A summary of the proposed amendments and revocations follows.

K.A.R. 28-50-1. The definitions used in the asbestos control regulations are found in K.A.R. 28-50-1. Several definitions are being revised for consistency with the federal regulations. The proposed changes include: (1) extending EPA training requirements to include abatement projects conducted in public and commercial buildings; (2) amending the definition for a demolition project to exempt abatement in residences unless the properties are subject to the EPA asbestos regulations; (3) increasing the existing amount, 3 lineal or 3 square feet or less, of asbestos-containing materials that would be subject to the regulations to 25 lineal or 10 square feet or less, which coincides with OSHA regulatory requirements; (4) implementing recent changes made by the National Institute of Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH), U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, regarding certification of respirators and filters; (5) a proposed new definition that clarifies the types of abatement projects that will be subject to the regulations; and (6) changes to accomplish certain technical and grammatical corrections to meet administrative regulation requirements.

K.A.R. 28-50-2 implements the asbestos licensing requirements for any business entity planning on engaging in asbestos removal and encapsulation activities in the state. Proposed amendments include making changes to the regulation that describe when such abatement ac-

tivities are subject to the licensing requirements and amending the subsection that references the acceptable type of respirators and the approval of such devices.

K.A.R. 28-50-4 currently provides an exemption from complying with the Kansas asbestos control regulations for those business entities that use their own employees to remove or encapsulate asbestos for the purpose of renovating, maintaining and repairing its own facility. With the amendments to K.S.A. 65-5302 and OSHA adopting comprehensive regulations applicable to facilities using their own employees to perform asbestos abatement projects, the department is proposing to revoke this regulation.

K.A.R. 28-50-5 implements the procedures and requirements for individuals pursuing certification as an asbestos worker in the state. Since OSHA regulations now require an annual medical exam for workers and with the amendments to K.S.A. 65-5306, the department is proposing to delete the requirements for persons to be examined by a licensed physician. With K.A.R. 28-50-7 being revoked, any reference to this regulation also is being deleted. To adequately fund the workers' certification process, the department is proposing to increase the asbestos class I worker certification from \$15 to \$20 annually, and class II (supervisor) certification from \$30 to \$40 annually. Other proposed changes include making certain technical and grammatical corrections to meet administrative regulation requirements.

K.A.R. 28-50-6 implements the requirements that a training provider must meet in order to present worker and supervisory level training in the state. When Congress reauthorized the Asbestos School Hazard Abatement Reauthorization Act (ASHARA) in 1992, the EPA was mandated to amend the Asbestos Model Accreditation Plan (MAP), which sets forth the training and accreditation requirements for asbestos worker and supervisor level training courses. In the revised MAP, the length of the initial training course was extended by one day, with the worker level now being a four-day course and the supervisor level being a five-day course. Also, the EPA has increased course content and extended the training requirements to include using accredited workers when performing asbestos abatement in public and commercial buildings. Lastly, the provision stipulating that the training provider shall reimburse the department of expenses for auditing a training course is being deleted, and language is added limiting the location of where the initial course can be presented, which will allow a department representative to attend and evaluate such training course.

K.A.R. 28-50-7 currently requires written examinations for individuals seeking initial certification for the Kansas Class II supervisory level worker. Asbestos training providers are now required by EPA regulations to administer an exam at the completion of each training course and the attendee is required to pass the exam with a score of 70% or better. With this requirement placed upon the training providers, the department-administered exam becomes duplication of effort for those individuals desiring certification, and, therefore, the department is proposing to revoke this regulation.

K.A.R. 28-50-8. The requirements for submittal of asbestos abatement project notifications and applicable evaluation fees are prescribed in K.A.R. 28-50-8. In the amendments, the department is proposing to reduce the asbestos project notification evaluation fee from 1.0 percent to 0.5 percent for notified projects where more than 160 square feet or 260 lineal feet of friable asbestos-containing materials are to be removed. Also, the current regulation requires notification of asbestos abatement projects beginning with 3 linear or 3 square feet, whereby the proposed revisions to the definitions of asbestos related abatement projects, the regulated minimum reportable quantity will be increased to 10 square feet or more, or 25 lineal feet or more. These proposed changes will align the collection of fees with the amount of revenue necessary for proper administration of the program.

K.A.R. 28-50-9 establishes the work practice procedures that are to be followed when removing friable asbestos-containing materials. The proposed amendments include incorporating the federal asbestos requirements into the state regulations, which will eliminate conflict and confusion that currently exist. Other proposed changes include making certain technical and grammatical corrections to meet administrative regulation requirements.

K.A.R. 28-50-10 implements the work practice procedures when encapsulating friable asbestos-containing materials. The proposed amendments include deleting the existing work practices and referencing the federal OSHA requirements when performing an asbestos related encapsulation project in the state.

K.A.R. 28-50-14 implements the waste disposal requirements when disposing of friable asbestos-containing materials within the state. Proposed amendments include deleting the requirements that the waste generator must obtain authorization from the department prior to disposing of friable asbestos-containing materials in state licensed landfills. With the EPA regulations requiring that waste shipment records be maintained during transporting of asbestos waste materials to the disposal site, the department is proposing to eliminate this provision, which currently creates a duplication of effort for the regulated community.

Economic Impact

The proposed amendments impose no new capital costs to the implementing agency, the public, or those subject to the regulations. The amendments will result in reduced costs for most building owners and contractors for reportable asbestos abatement projects. The new exemptions with the amendments will eliminate fees for many projects, including some industrial, residences and projects smaller than the minimum quantity regulated by the state. It is projected that by reducing the project evaluation fee from 1.0 percent to 0.5 percent and eliminating fees associated with proposed exempted projects, the department will experience an approximate 50 percent reduction in total project evaluation fees based on FY 97 and FY 98 revenues. It is estimated that for the first year of enactment of this proposal there will be an approximate \$75,000 reduction in revenue from collected fees.

Fees for certifications of class I and class II asbestos workers are being increased \$5 and \$10 respectfully. These fees are being increased to offset the costs associated with certifying the approximate 1,100 asbestos workers. These modest and equitable increases to the level of \$20 (class I worker level) and \$40 (class II supervisory level) are the first increases since 1987.

The proposed amendments will impose no new costs or paperwork burdens of implementing and enforcing upon state agencies, other governmental agencies or other persons. If the proposed amendments are not implemented, the regulated community will be subject to more restrictive regulatory requirements than those contained in the federal regulations, which could lead to higher abatement costs for building and property owners in instances where friable asbestos-containing materials must be removed. Also, by reducing the project evaluation fee and raising the reportable quantities subject to the asbestos notification provisions, the regulated community will see an overall reduction in project evaluation fees by implementing these amendments. The proposed fees will be in line to monies needed to implement the program.

The time period between publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing serves as the required public comment period of at least 60 days for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Russell Brichacek, Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Forbes Field, Building 283, Topeka, 66620. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

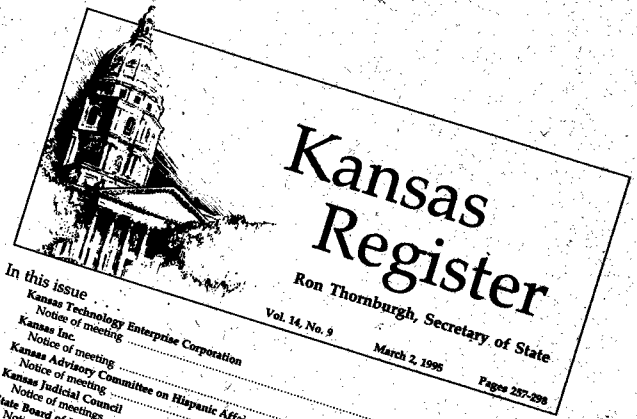
