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# Department of Health and Environment

#### **Request for Comments**

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. The City of Iola has applied for an air quality construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300. The Iola Municipal Power Plant #1 plans to install one new natural gas-fired internal combustion engine. Emissions of particulate matter less than 10 microns ( $PM_{10}$ ), oxides of sulfur ( $SO_x$ ), oxides of nitrogen ( $NO_x$ ), carbon monoxide (CO), and volatile organic compounds (VOCs) were evaluated in determining the potential-to-emit during the permit review process.

The City of Iola owns and operates the stationary source located at Power Plant #1, 54 West and River, Iola, Allen County, at which the one new natural gas-fired in-

ternal combustion engine is to be installed.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation and all information relied upon during review of the permit application is available for public inspection during normal business hours at the KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes

Field, Topeka, and at the KDHE Southeast District Office, 1500 W. 7th, Chanute. To obtain or review the proposed permit and supporting documentation, contact Alan W. Brooks, (785) 296-6281, at the KDHE central office, or Lynelle Stranghoner, (316) 431-2390, at the KDHE Southeast District Office. The standard departmental cost will be assessed for any copies requested.

Direct written comments or questions regarding the proposed permit to Alan W. Brooks, KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, 66620. In order to be considered in formulating a final permit decision, written comments must be received by

the close of business October 4.

A person may request a public hearing be held on the proposed permit. The request for a public hearing shall be in writing and set forth the basis for the request. The written request must be submitted to Connie Carreno, Bureau of Air and Radiation, not later than the close of business October 4 in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

#### **Kansas Arts Commission**

#### **Notice of Available Grants**

The Kansas Arts Commission is offering grants to underserved communities to fund four artist residencies. Each successful grantee would receive \$6,500, to be matched at least one-to-one, for a residency that would last at least six weeks.

Artist Residencies in Underserved Communities, a commission program funded by the National Endowment for the Arts, was developed with the goal of providing persons in underserved communities with opportunities to:

Participate in arts programs in collaboration with an exemplary artist.

Participate in lifelong learning through the arts.

 Explore and express their community's heritage through the arts.

Participate in intergenerational creative programs that have relevance for and involve the whole community.

Interested organizations should submit a proposal outline of not more than one typewritten (or computer-printed) page. Outliens should briefly describe the proposed residency project; discipline of the resident artist; activities; participants; timeline; and an abbreviated budget. Projects must start not later than January 1, 2000, and be completed by June 30, 2000.

Outlines will be reviewed by commission staff, and an advisory panel will select the four proposals that most closely meet the program goals and provide a model or exemplary program. These organizations will be asked to submit full proposals for consideration, with input from commission staff and panelists.

Only proposals from the following underserved communities will be considered:

#### **Rural Organizations**

Qualified organizations in communities with a population of 25,000 or fewer as determined by the 1990 census.

#### Multicultural or Culturally-Specific Organizations

Qualified organizations that serve the following communities, defined as: African-American, Asian-American, Hispanic or Latino, Native American, Alaskan Natives or Pacific Islanders.

Multicultural or culturally-specific organizations must demonstrate a majority (51 percent or more) of African-American, Asian-American, Hispanic or Latino, Native American, Alaskan Natives, Pacific Islanders or any isolated ethnic community or group representation on the governing boards, membership and/or staff (professional paid or unpaid volunteer).

Community Service Organizations

Qualified organizations that are community-based or public agencies or entities providing arts programs targeted at specific social groups or communities: at-risk youth, persons with disabilities, persons in correctional facilities, persons in hospitals or care facilities, persons without homes, or older Kansans. Organizations must demonstrate representation of these specific social groups on governing boards, membership and/or staff (professional paid or unpaid volunteer).

#### **Notice of Intent to Issue Revenue Bonds**

The Board of Regents of Washburn University of Topeka, Kansas, duly adopted a resolution August 18, 1999, declaring it necessary to authorize the acquisition, equipping, rehabilitation, renovation and furnishing of certain university buildings, including but not limited to dormitories, kitchens, dining halls, student union and parking facilities (collectively the "Living Learning Center Project"), all at an estimated cost of \$19,954,632.

The resolution declares it necessary and authorizes the issuance of revenue bonds under the authority of K.S.A. 76-6a13 to 76-6a25, inclusive, as amended and supplemented, of the university in an amount not to exceed \$16,205,000, such bonds to be used, along with any other lawfully available funds of the university, to pay the costs of the Living Learning Center Project and provide for the related costs of issuance.

Unless an action to contest the legality of the proposed revenue bonds of the university shall be filed in a court of law within 30 days of the date of publication of this notice, the right to contest the legality of any revenue bonds issued in compliance with the aforesaid resolution and other proceedings duly and legally had and taken by the board prior to the date of publication of this notice, and the right to contest the validity of the provisions of such proceedings, shall cease to exist, and no court shall thereafter have the authority to inquire into such matters. After the expiration of said 30 days from the date of publication of this notice, no one shall have any right to commence an action contesting the validity of such revenue bonds or the provisions of such proceedings of the board, all such revenue bonds shall be conclusively presumed to be legal, and no court shall thereafter have the authority to inquire into such matters.

#### Notice of Medicaid State Plan Amendment

An amendment to the Medicaid State Plan attachment 4.19D will be submitted to the Federal Department of Health and Human Services Health Care Financing Administration, changing some of the cost center limits for intermediate care facilities for persons who are mentally retarded (ICFs/MR). Social and Rehabilitation Services, through the Commission of Substance Abuse, Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities (SAMHDD), proposes to increase selected cost center limitations for ICFs/MR effective October 1, 1999. The approved Medicaid State Plan requires that ICF/MR cost center limitations be reviewed before October 1 each year and, if less than 75 percent of all ICFs/MR are reimbursed less than 95 percent of their reported allowable Medicaid costs, cost center limits must be adjusted.

SRS/SAMHDD staff compared the reported allowable costs of all ICFs/MR with the current cost center limits for habilitation and administration, the two cost centers with caps, and determined adjustments in certain cost center limits were justified. The cost center limit adjustments and justifications are as follows:

#### **Habilitation Cost Center Limits**

#### Large facilities with more than 16 beds

No large facility has reported allowable costs exceeding the current habilitation cost center limits. Therefore, no changes in these cost center limits will be made.

#### Medium Facilities with 9 to 15 beds

Level 1: One level 1 medium-sized facility reported an allowable cost that exceeded the habilitation cost center limit but did not meet the 95 percent threshold. Therefore, no changes in this cost center limit will be made.

Level 2: No level 2 medium-sized facility reported allowable costs that exceeded the current habilitation cost center limit. Therefore, no changes in this cost center limit will be made.

Level 3: One level 3 medium-sized facility reported an allowable cost that exceeded the habilitation cost center limit falling below the 95 percent threshold. Therefore, the cost center limit will be increased from \$120 to \$123.

Level 4: Two level 4 medium-sized facilities reported allowable costs that exceeded the habilitation cost center limit, falling below the 95 percent threshold. Therefore, the cost center limit will be increased from \$106 to \$109.

#### Small ICF/MR with 4 to 9 beds

Level 1: Five level 1 small-sized facilities reported allowable costs that exceeded the habilitation cost center limit but did not meet the 95 percent threshold. Therefore, no changes in the cost center limit will be made. Level 2: One level 2 small-sized facility reported allowable costs that exceeded the habilitation cost center limit but did not meet the 95 percent threshold. Therefore, no changes in the cost center limit will be made. Level 3: One level 3 small-sized facility reported allowable costs that exceeded the habilitation cost center limit but did not meet the 95 percent threshold. Therefore, no changes in the cost center limit will be made.

#### **Administrative Cost Center Limits**

The reported allowable administrative costs for largesized facilities did not meet the 95 percent threshold, therefore, no changes in the cost center limit will be made. The medium- and small-sized facilities reported a significant difference between actual costs and the cost center limits. Therefore the following cost center limits changes will be made:

> Small Facility: Medium Facility:

from \$25 to \$25.50 from \$17.50 to \$18

#### **Inflation Factor**

The annual percentage rate for estimated inflation is computed using a projection based on economic forecasts and predictions of reputable and prominent national publications. The projected inflation percentage that will be used to recalculate ICF/MR rates for October 1, 1999, is 3 percent.

#### Financial Impact

It is estimated that the change in ICF/MR cost center limits will result in an increase in budget expenditures of \$720,000. The state general fund portion of this increase is \$288,000.

A public hearing will be conducted at 10:30 a.m. Friday, November 5, in Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed regulation of the Kansas State Employees Health Care Commission on a permanent basis.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation prior to the hearing to Dan Stanley, Chair, Health Care Commission, Room 263-E, State Capitol, 300 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612-1572. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 108-1-3 is a new regulation that establishes a school district employee health care benefits component of the state health care benefits program. K.S.A. 75-6506(c) provides that the Kansas State Employees Health Care Commission may designate by rules and regulations entities as qualified to participate in the state health care

benefits program. The regulation defines the term "qualified school district" as "a public school district, community college, area vocational technical school or technical college that meets the terms, conditions, limitations, exclusions and other provisions established by the commission for participation in the school district employee health care benefits component of the health care benefits program and has entered into a written agreement with the commission to participate in the program." The school district employee health care benefits component will provide the State of Kansas health care benefits plan to eligible school district employees through a separate funding pool arrangement.

The regulation defines the term "school district employee" as any individual who meets the definition of employee under K.S.A. 74-4932(4), and amendments thereto, and who is employed by a qualified school district. For purposes of the definition, a technical college is a participating employer under K.S.A. 74-4932, in accordance with K.S.A. 72-4471. The regulation provides that eligible employees who enroll in the school district employee health care benefits component also may enroll a spouse and eligible dependent children under the same terms and conditions. Eligibility for active participants is subject to the terms, conditions, limitations, exclusions and other provisions established by the commission, including the amount and method of payment for employee and employer contributions. A 60-day waiting period for active participants is required for participants who become eligible after the first day of the first plan

K.A.R. 108-1-3 further provides for continuation provisions for eligible "direct bill" participants. The regulation defines "direct bill participants" as any retired school district employee who is receiving state warrants for retirement benefits; any totally disabled former school district employee who is receiving benefits under K.S.A. 74-4927, and amendments thereto; any surviving spouse or dependent of a qualifying participant in the school district plan; and any person who is a school district employee who is on an approved leave without pay in accordance with the practices of the qualified school district. The regulation provides that plan participation must be continuous through the transition from active status to direct bill status. In the case of the death of a participating employee or a direct bill participant, surviving spouse and dependent benefits must be maintained continuously.

Additionally, any participant with rights to extend coverage under the provisions of public law 99-272 (CO-BRA), as amended, may participate in the school district plan, subject to the provisions of that federal law. Currently, each public school district, community college, area vocational technical school or technical college may or may not provide a health benefits plan for its employees. The plans vary in coverage, benefits and premium costs, which have been negotiated individually by the employer, or those individuals with responsibility for negotiating for employer-provided health insurance. K.A.R. 108-1-3 will provide the standard benefit plan design currently available under the State of Kansas health benefits program. Participation in the plan is voluntary.

Based on recent employment figures from KPERS, up to 73,000 school district employees would be eligible for the school employee health benefits component. Additionally, an unknown number of school district employee dependents and retirees also would become eligible. Because the plan is optional, it is not possible to project the actual number of employees and dependents who are likely to enroll in such a plan. However, inclusion of participants in a funding pool should offer an opportunity to provide greater benefit levels, lower premiums, or both, when compared to plans negotiated individually by each school district, especially for smaller, rural school districts

The economic impact as a result of the adoption of the regulation will be felt at the school district level by both the school districts and participating employees. The impact will be dependent on how much the employer and employee contributions are under the school district employee health care benefits component of the Kansas health care benefits plan relative to their current, employer-provided health insurance. The regulation will provide for employer contributions toward the cost of coverage for eligible participants. The employer contribution will be paid by the participating school district. Since more than 70 percent of the State of Kansas health benefits plan is self-insured, it is not possible to calculate the cost of such contributions prior to actual enrollment by the school districts in the plan. However, the commission has extensively surveyed the school districts to determine interest in the plan. Using the interest expressed by school districts in the most recent survey conducted in May/June 1999, an estimated fiscal year 2000 employer contribution is \$220.68 per participant per month. The commission also is offering a "ramp up" provision. Under this scenario, a school district would provide a smaller contribution during the first two years of participation in the plan, reaching full employer contribution by year three. Under this scenario, the employer cost is estimated to be \$77.07 for fiscal year 2000. Until school districts elect to enroll in the plan, the total cost cannot be estimated.

There will be additional administrative resources required in order to administer this component of the State of Kansas health care benefits plan. The 1999 Legislature authorized six additional full-time employees to assist in the administration of the plan. The membership system will not be developed internally; it will be outsourced. Until the program is operational and the number of participating school districts is known, it is not possible to determine whether the \$633,865 will cover all administrative costs related to the plan during fiscal year 2000 or what the ongoing administrative costs will be.

No economic impact on the general public is anticipated.

#### **Permanent Administrative Regulations**

#### Article 1.—EXAMINATION AND REGISTRATION

86-1-11. Minimum curricula and standards for course. (a) Each school offering a course approved by the commission under subsection (a) of K.S.A. 58-3046a, and amendments thereto, shall use a course outline provided by the commission and shall register the course under the title "principles of real estate."

(b) Each school offering a course approved by the commission under subsection (b) of K.S.A. 58-3046a, and amendments thereto, shall use a course outline provided by the commission and shall register the course under the

title "broker pre-license course.

(c) The 12 hours of additional instruction required by subsection (c), paragraph (d)(2), paragraph (e)(2), paragraph (f)(2), and paragraph (f)(3) of K.S.A. 58-3046a, and amendments thereto, shall consist of courses approved by the commission.

(1) The hours required for each renewal of a salesperson's license after January 1, 1999 shall consist of at least three hours designated as mandatory core hours and not more than nine hours designated as elective hours.

(2) The hours required for each renewal of a broker's license after January 1, 1999 shall consist of at least six hours designated as mandatory core hours and not more than six hours designated as elective hours.

(3) Each course approved by the commission shall be designated, at the discretion of the commission, as either

mandatory core hours or elective hours

(4) On and after January 1, 2000, the following courses may be approved by the commission as mandatory core

(A) A course registered under the title "required salesperson and broker core." Each school offering the course shall use a course outline limited to the topics of brokerage relationships and misrepresentation; and

(B) a course registered under the title "required broker core." Each school offering the course shall use a course outline limited to one or more of the following topics:

) Procedures manuals;

(ii) trust accounts;

(iii) management, including all facets of supervising a

real estate company;

(iv) common violations of the real estate brokers' and salespersons' license act and the brokerage relationships in real estate transactions act;

(v) commercial sales and leasing issues; or

(vi) farm and ranch issues.

(5) In any advertising of a course entitled "required broker core," the school shall identify each topic listed in paragraphs (c)(4)(B)(i) through (vi) above that is covered by the course

(6) Each salesperson shall meet the mandatory core requirement pursuant to paragraph (c)(1) above by taking

either of the following

(A) A course entitled "required salesperson core" or "required broker core," approved by the commission and completed before January 1, 2000; or

(B) a course entitled "required salesperson and broker core," approved by the commission and completed after

January 1, 2000.

(7) Each broker shall meet the mandatory core requirement pursuant to paragraph (c)(2) above by taking either of the following:

(A) A course entitled "required broker core," approved by the commission and completed before January

(B) a course entitled "required salesperson and broker core" and a course entitled "required broker core," both approved by the commission and completed after Janu-

(8) Credit given to any licensee for a course submitted by the licensee pursuant to subsection (j) of K.S.A. 58-3046a, and amendments thereto, shall be designated by the commission either as meeting a mandatory core re-

quirement or as elective hours.

(9) A nonresident of Kansas may receive elective-hour credit for courses approved by the commission of the nonresident's state of residence. A nonresident may receive credit for a mandatory core requirement only for courses approved by the commission pursuant to this regulation.

(10) Each approved course shall have a total instruc-

tion time of no fewer than three hours.

(11) Any licensee may receive a maximum of three hours of credit during any renewal period for real estate appraisal courses designated as such by the commission.

(d) Instruction required by paragraph (d)(1) of K.S.A. 58-3046a, and amendments thereto, shall include 30 hours of instruction designated by the commission as required hours and 20 hours elected by the licensee from courses approved by the commission pursuant to subsection (c) of this regulation.

(e) The 30 hours of instruction designated as required hours under subsection (d) of this regulation and the 30 hours of instruction required by paragraph (e)(1) and paragraph (f)(1) of K.S.A. 58-3046a, and amendments thereto,

shall consist of either of the following:

(1) A course registered under the title "salesperson's post-license course." Any school offering the course shall use a course outline provided by the commission; or

(2) 30 hours of commercial courses approved by the commission. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-4202(b); implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 58-3046a; effective, T-86-31, Sept. 24, 1985; effective May 1, 1986; amended, T-87-32, Nov. 19, 1986; amended May 1, 1987; amended May 1, 1988; amended Sept. 26, 1988; amended Nov. 18, 1991; amended Dec. 20, 1993; amended Dec. 29, 1995; amended Jan. 1, 1997; amended, T-86-10-1-97, Oct. 1, 1997; amended Oct. 24, 1997; amended Sept. 17, 1999.)
