Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Thursday, November 18, at the Clubhouse Inn, 924 S.W. Henderson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed rules and regulations of the Kansas State Board of Pharmacy.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Larry Froelich, Executive Secretary, Room 513, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Karen Hollon at (785) 296-6504.

The regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A brief summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 68-2-12a. Minimum requirements. This regulation explains what the board has determined to be the minimum requirements for the operation of a registered pharmacy, except those licensed as a medical care facility pharmacy. The changes within the library section of the requirement allows for computer disks to be accessed as opposed to strictly texts, provided these sources are updated annually.

There is no anticipated economic impact on the Board of Pharmacy, other governmental agencies or the public. Registrants may be able to reduce costs of maintaining a library within the pharmacy.

K.A.R. 68-2-20, Pharmacist's function in filling a prescription; 68-2-22, Electronic prescription transmission; 68-7-12, Responsibility of pharmacist-in-charge in other than a medical care facility pharmacy; 68-20-10, Requirements of registration; 68-20-10a, Electronic prescription transmission of controlled substances; 68-20-15a, Security requirements; 68-20-16, Records and inventories of registrants; 68-20-17, Order forms; 68-20-18, Information concerning prescriptions; 68-20-19, Controlled substances listed in schedule II; and 68-20-21, Controlled substances listed in schedule V. These regulations were changed to reflect that a physician assistant (PA) as well as an advanced registered nurse practitioner (ARNP) will have statutory authority to prescribe controlled substances effective April 1, 2000. Where applicable, practitioner was changed to prescriber to reflect the statutory change.

There is no anticipated economic impact on the Board of Pharmacy or the public. ARNPs and PAs will be required to obtain a Drug Enforcement Administration registration number. The effect on other governmental agencies cannot be determined by the Board of Pharmacy.

K.A.R. 68-7-11, Medical care facility pharmacy. This regulation explains what the board has determined to be the minimum requirements for the operation of a medical care facility pharmacy and what is expected from the pharmacist-in-charge. The changes within the regulation further clarify who is allowed within the pharmacy when a pharmacist is not on the premises. Although historically interpreted by the board to allow only a registered nurse to enter the pharmacy when a pharmacist is not on the premises, the regulation explains that only a registered professional nurse is that individual.

There is no anticipated economic impact on the Board of Pharmacy, other governmental agencies or the public. K.S.A. 65-1648 clearly states registered nurses are to have access to the pharmacy.

Copies of the regulations and the economic impact statements may be obtained from the Board of Pharmacy.

Notice Concerning Quality Enhancement
Wage Pass-Through Program

Up to \$179,335 has been appropriated for the Quality Enhancement Wage Pass-Through program for Class 2 (private) Intermediate Care Facilities for Persons with Mental Retardation (ICFs/MR). ICFs/MR electing to participate in this program can increase salaries or benefits or both for those employees providing direct care and support services to ICF/MR residents. The amount approved shall not exceed \$4 per resident day. Funding for this program is only assured through fiscal year 2000.

Applications will be sent to all ICFs/MR on September 2. ICF/MR providers wishing to participate in the program will submit a complete application to SRS on the prescribed forms.

The applications received by 5 p.m. September 17 will be designated primary applications. If the total dollar amount of all requests from primary applications is below the available funding, all providers will receive 100 percent of the requested funding.

If the total dollar amount of all requests from primary applications is above the available funding, all primary applicants will be funded at a prorated reduction so that the estimated fiscal impact of the program does not exceed the available funding.

All applications received after September 17 will be designated as secondary applications. Secondary applications are only used if step one of the primary applications is used, i.e., all primary applications are funded and there is still available funds remaining. The selection process for the secondary applications is on a first-come, first-served basis. Once the funding is used the process stops.

Time line for Implementing the Wage Pass-Through:

- August 19, 1999: Notice is published in Kansas Register, all ICFs/MR are individually notified in writing, and public comment period begins.
- August 31, 1999: End of the public comment period.
- September 2, 1999: Notice of final methodology, rate and justification is submitted to Secretary of State for publication in the Kansas Register.
- September 2, 1999: Application packets and state plan provision are mailed to ICFs/MR.

- September 9, 1999: Notice of final methodology, rate and justification is published.
- September 17, 1999: Initial applications for primary group must be received by 5 p.m.
- September 24, 1999: SRS sends out rate notifications to providers.
- October 1, 1999: Earliest date wage pass-through rates take effect.

The earliest that a provider can receive the wage pass-through per diem will be for dates of service beginning October 1, 1999. If the effective date is on or before the 15th of the month, the payment increase will begin on the first of that month. If the effective date is on or after the 16th of the month, the payment increase will begin on the first of the following month.

The following information will be requested on the application form:

- Facility name, address, telephone number and provider number
- Effective date for implementing the wage pass-through program
- The number of Medicaid residents at the time of the application
- Amount of per diem funding requested for the pass-through up to \$4 per resident day
- Current Medicaid rate and private pay rate
- Enhanced Medicaid rate and private pay rate on 10/1/99
- Authorized signature and date

Providers participating in the quality enhancement wage pass-through will be required to submit quarterly reports at a time and on forms specified by SRS.

The following are the eligible position classifications for the quality enhancement wage pass-through per diem: habilitation personnel, restorative-rehabilitation aides, certified nurses aides, certified medication aides, plant operating and maintenance personnel, nonsupervisory dietary personnel, laundry personnel, housekeeping personnel, or nonsupervisory activity staff. The following are the eligible uses for the quality enhancement wage pass-through per diem for the above position classifications: increase salaries, increase benefits, or hire new staff. Quality enhancement wage pass-through may not be used to increase management compensation or facility profits.

The documented quarterly cost for the wage pass-through program shall be divided by total resident days for all payer sources during the reporting period to determine the per diem cost for each resident. The Medicaid portion of the reimbursement of the total costs will be for the Medicaid resident days. The quality enhancement wage pass-through per diem will be added to the calculated Medicaid rate that is in effect from October 1, 1999 through June 30, 2000. The per diem wage pass-through will reimburse facilities while the enhanced costs are being incurred. The pass-through is not subject to cost center limits or the 90 percent minimum occupancy rule for cost reports submitted up to June 30, 2001. When the actual cost for the wage enhancement is reported on a quarterly basis, it will be divided by the actual resident days

to determine the allowable per diem cost. The costs incurred using the pass-through will be included in the Medicaid cost report base. Providers will be held to the lower of the calculated Medicaid rate or the private pay rate in the agency register.

Providers that increase wages, benefits and/or hire new staff on July 1, 1999, but before October 1, 1999, in anticipation of being a successful applicant for the quality enhancement wage pass-through shall be able to use those increases to document the use of the wage enhancement when the rates are effective on October 1, 1999. However, there will not be a retroactive rate increase for those days prior to October 1, 1999, that the wage increases impact. Providers assume the risk of increasing wages, benefits and/or hiring new staff before they know the outcome of the application selection process.

The quarterly reports shall be audited by SRS and KDOA staff to ensure the wage pass-through moneys were used to increase salaries, benefits and/or to hire new staff in the eligible personnel classifications. Expenditures reported for other uses or money used to increase facility profits are not allowable and will be recouped on the final accounting. The final accounting will take place after the report for the quarter ended June 30, 2000, is submitted and reviewed by the agency staff. Providers will not have the wage pass-through per diem lowered or funds recouped following the review of the quarterly audit reports. The reports will be reviewed for accuracy and records will be kept to identify moneys that were not spent in the quarter for which the audit report covered. The final settlement will come after the last quarterly audit report is received for the quarter ended June 30, 2000. If a provider did not use all of the Medicaid moneys received for the wage pass-through enhancements, the moneys not used for the enhancements will be recouped. Providers may voluntarily withdraw from the quality wage enhancement pass-through program by notifying SRS. If a provider terminates, they shall be required to submit an audit report for the last quarter in which they participate. The report may be for a partial quarter. The agency shall recoup funds that were received, but not documented as being used for the intended purpose, from the provider for that period in which they participated.

If a facility receiving the wage pass-through has a change of provider, the new provider shall be responsible for notifying the agency that they want to be terminated from the program. Otherwise, the new provider shall be required to submit the quarterly audit reports to document the use of the funds for the intended purpose and shall be responsible for the final settlement. If the new provider decides to terminate participation, the old provider shall be responsible for any overpayment unless the 60-day notice of change of provider was not given. If the 60-day notice is not given, the new provider assumes the responsibility of any overpayment to the old provider.

(a) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the play symbols are printed in black ink with matching captions. A play symbol appears in each of seven play spots within the play area. Each play symbol for this instant game is one of the following: \$1.00 - \$2.00 - \$5.00 - 20.00 - 40.00 - \$2500 - \$5000 - SINGLE PRIZE - DOUBLE PRIZE - DOUBLE DOUBLER.

(b) "Play symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each play symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the play symbol. The play symbol caption associated with each play symbol is as follows:

(c) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is an 11-digit number which appears on the front of each instant ticket and will be covered by latex.

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the back of each instant game ticket both above the information form and below the bar code.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three-letter code printed and appearing in three of eight varying locations among the play symbols. The codes and

their meanings are as follows: ONE = \$1.00; TWO = \$2.00; FOR = \$4.00; FIV = \$5.00; TEN = \$10.00; TWY = \$20.00; FRY = \$40.00; and ETY = \$80.00.

(f) "Bar code" means the 16-digit bar-coded number appearing on the back of each ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-8-27-99, July 16, 1999.)

111-4-1503. Determination of instant prize winners. Article 3.—RETAIL DEALER'S PERMIT

68-3-5. Retail dealer permit required. A retail dealer may engage in the selling in Kansas of nonprescription drugs that are prepackaged, fully prepared by the manufacturer or distributor for use by the consumer, and labeled in accordance with the requirements of the state and federal food, drug, and cosmetic acts only if the retail dealer has obtained a permit to do so from the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1630; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 65-1643; effective Sept. 24, 1999.)

68-3-6. Minimum required information for permit. (a) Each retail dealer shall provide the board with the following minimum information as part of the application for the permit required by K.S.A. 65-1643(f), and amendments thereto, and as part of any renewal of this permit:

(1) The name, full business address, and telephone number of the permit holder;

(2) each trade or business name used by the permit holder; and

(3) the address, telephone number, and name of the contact person for each facility used by the permit holder for the storage, handling, and distribution of drugs.

(b) Each permit holder shall submit all revised information required by subsection (a) within 30 days after any change in that information. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1630; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 65-1643; effective Sept. 24, 1999.)

Article 15.—NONPRESCRIPTION WHOLESALE
DISTRIBUTORS

68-15-2. Nonprescription wholesale distributor registration required. A nonprescription wholesale distributor may engage in the distribution of nonprescription drugs to persons or entities, other than a consumer or patient in Kansas, if both of the following conditions are met:

(a) The drugs are prepackaged, fully prepared by the manufacturer or distributor for use by a consumer, and appropriately labeled.

(b) The distributor has first obtained a registration to do so from the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1630; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 65-1643(c) and K.S.A. 65-1634; effective Sept. 24, 1999.)

68-15-4. Minimum requirements for storage. All drugs shall be stored at appropriate temperatures and under appropriate conditions in accordance with any requirements in the labeling or packaging of the drugs, or with any requirements in the United States pharmacopeia: the national formulary (USP/NF), as in effect on March 15, 1999 and published January 1, 1995. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1630; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 65-1643(c) and K.S.A. 65-1634; effective Sept. 24, 1999.)

Article 31.—ACCREDITATION

(Editor's Note: K.A.R. 91-31-19, as published in the August 12, 1999 Kansas Register, contained the wrong version of subsection (e). The final regulation actually adopted by the Kansas State Board of Education is published below. The effective date of the regulation is September 24, 1999.)

91-31-19. Board of education requirements. (a) General. Each local board of education shall assure that each school meets the requirements of this regulation.

(b) Staff.

(1) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, in filling positions for which a certificate is issued by the state board, each district shall employ persons who hold certificates with specific endorsements for the positions held.

(2) If a teacher holding an appropriate certificate is not available, a school district shall use a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas teacher or administrator certificate at any level or in any field or subject. A school district shall not allow any person holding a Kansas teaching certificate to substitute teach for more than 125 days in the same assignment.

(3) If a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas teacher or administrator certificate is not available, a school district shall use a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas substitute teaching certificate. A school district shall not allow a person holding a substitute teaching certificate to teach for more than 90 days in the same assignment.

(4) If a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas substitute teaching certificate is not available, a school district shall use a person who holds a baccalaureate degree and an emergency substitute teacher certificate. A school district shall not allow a person who holds a baccalaureate degree and an emergency substitute teacher certificate to teach for more than 30 days in the same assignment.

(5)(A) If a person holding a baccalaureate degree and an emergency substitute teacher certificate is not available, a school district shall use a person who has been certified by the state board as an emergency substitute teacher. A school district shall not allow any person who does not hold a baccalaureate degree to teach for more than 15 days in the same assignment or more than 60 days in a semester.

(B) If a local school board can demonstrate, in writing, an insufficient supply of substitute teachers, the board may appeal to the commissioner of education for authority to allow individuals holding an emergency substitute teaching certificate to continue to teach for an additional length of time not exceeding a total of 93 days in a school year.

(6) If the state board of education has declared a time of emergency, any person holding a five-year substitute teaching certificate or an emergency substitute teacher certificate with a baccalaureate degree may teach for the

duration of the time of emergency in a position made vacant by reason of the emergency.

(7) Each school shall report the names of each certified staff member on the certified personnel report or the supplemental certified personnel report required by the state board. Each certified personnel staff change that occurs between September 15 and the end of the school year shall be reported on a form prescribed by the state board within 30 days after the staff change.

(c) Student credit. Each school, through the local board of education, shall have a written policy specifying that the credit of any pupil transferring from an accredited school shall be accepted.

(d) Records retention. Each school shall permanently retain records relating to each student's academic performance, attendance, and activities.

(e) Athletic practice.

(1) Any elementary or middle school that includes any of the grades six through nine may conduct athletic practice during the school day only at times when one or more elective academic courses or a study period is offered to students.

(2) A high school shall not conduct athletic practice during the school day, and practice shall not be counted for credit or as a part of the school term.

(3) A school shall neither offer credit for athletic practice nor count athletic practice as a physical education course. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Dec. 27, 1996; amended Sept. 24, 1999.)

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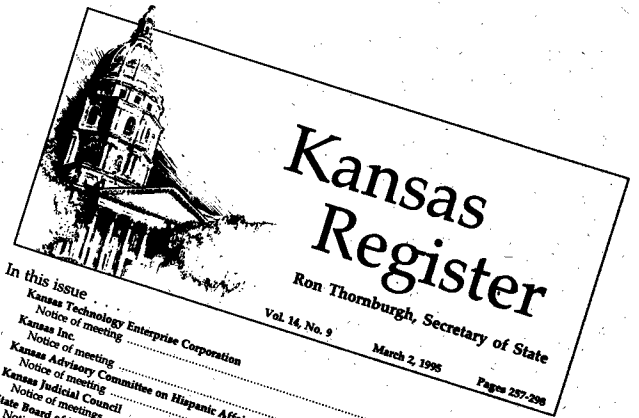
