Sealed bids will be received at the office of the city clerk, City Hall, 100 W. Santa Fe, Olathe, until 10 a.m. local time Wednesday, November 10, for the construction of Ridgeview Road (Santa Fe to Kansas City Road), KDOT Project No. 46 N-0120-01, Olathe Project No. 34496.

At said time and place, and promptly thereafter, all bids that have been duly received will be publicly opened and read aloud.

The work consists of the following:

The construction of Ridgeview Road consists of approximately 13,000 cu. m. of compaction of earthwork; 12,000 sq. m. of asphaltic concrete base material; 3,000 m. of concrete curb and gutter; 850 m. of storm sewer; 41 m. of concrete box culvert; 830 m. of waterline relocation; 900 m. of street lighting; and 400 m. of landscape and irrigation, together with all other incidental and related work.

Contract documents, specifications and plans are on file and may be obtained at the office of HNTB Corpo-

ration, 7007 College Blvd., Suite 150, Overland Park, 66211, until October 21. Thereafter, plans may be obtained at HNTB's new office location in the South Creek Business Park at 7450 W. 130th, Suite 400, Overland Park, 66213. Contractors desiring documents, specifications and plans for use in preparing bids will require payment of \$150, which amount is not refundable.

The entire name of the project must appear on the outside of the bid envelope submitted to the city clerk's office.

A satisfactory bid bond executed by the bidder and an acceptable surety, in an amount equal to 5 percent of the total bid for work, shall be submitted with each proposal.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish and pay satisfactory performance and payment bond or bonds.

The City of Olathe reserves the right to reject any or all bids or to waive any informalities in the bidding.

Bids may be held by the City of Olathe for a period not to exceed 60 days from the date of the opening of bids for the purpose of reviewing the bids and investigating the qualifications of bidders, prior to awarding the contract.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Friday, December 17, in the conference room of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission office, 3400 S.W. Van Buren, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations of the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission. This 60-day notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting the Kansas Racing and Gaming Commission, 3400 Van Buren, Topeka, 66611-2228, (785) 296-5800.

A copy of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statements may be reviewed or obtained at the commission office. The following is a summary of the proposed regulations:

K.A.R. 112-7-21. Paddock to post. The amendments to this regulation prohibit the use of any mechanical device applied to a horse's ears at the starting gates and limits the use of a buggy whip, flexible cane, or any similar device to assist the loading of a horse into the starting gates. Any person using such devices in excess shall be subject to disciplinary action at the discretion of the stewards.

Economic Impact: There are no costs anticipated to the agency or other governmental agencies or units.

K.A.R. 112-10-38. Vaccinations. This regulation is designed to safeguard the health of the greyhounds and the safety of their human handlers at racetrack facilities by requiring periodic vaccinations of each greyhound against each disease the animal health officer has determined is communicable to other greyhounds at the racing facility.

Economic Impact: The owners of the greyhounds will bear the expense for the vaccinations of their greyhound(s) prior to their arrival at the racetrack. If the greyhound remains at the racetrack through the expiration date of its shots, then the animal health officer at the racetrack would provide the required vaccinations at cost. It is anticipated that the annual cost to the agency would be less than \$1,000.

K.A.R. 112-18-22. Election and recognition of recognized horsemen's group. This regulation sets out the duties of and the number of persons who will serve as members of each recognized horsemen's group. The procedure to be used by the agency for electing each group also is described in detail, together with the eligibility requirements for those participating in the election. The regulation states that the agency will hold the election pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8802(gg) and amendments thereto. Provisions are made for the filing of a complaint concerning the conduct of an election, in which case the agency shall

commence a hearing in accordance with the Kansas Administrative Procedure Act, K.S.A. 77-501 *et seq.* The amendments to this regulation assign the responsibility to determine how the purse money shall be distributed for horse and greyhound purses and delete the special provisions that were for calendar year 1996 only.

Economic Impact: The agency will bear the expenses incurred during the election process. The costs to the agency for postage, administrative services and staff support are expected to be less than \$1,000.

Sealed bids for 1999 intersection improvements consisting of **Part A (119th St. and Quivira and 119th St. and Switzer)** and **Part B (95th St. and Metcalf Ave.)** will be received by the City of Overland Park, Kansas, at the office of the city clerk, City Hall, 8500 Santa Fe Drive, Overland Park, until 2 p.m. local time Tuesday, November 16. At that time all sealed bids will be transferred to the City Council Chamber, City Hall, where they will be publicly opened and read aloud. Any bid received after the designated closing time will be returned unopened.

This project consists of two sets of plans and two sets of specifications. A bid must be submitted for both Part A and Part B in order to be considered a complete and valid bid. All bids (both Part A and Part B) shall be submitted in a sealed envelope addressed to the city clerk of Overland Park, Kansas, and marked "Bid for 1999 Intersection Improvements."

Copies of plans, specifications, bid documents and other contract documents are on file at the City of Overland Park, Public Works Department, 8500 Santa Fe Drive, Overland Park, 66212. Contractors desiring the contract documents for use in preparing bids may obtain a set of such documents from the City of Overland Park, Public Works Department upon payment of \$100, which amount includes plans and specifications for both Part A and Part B. This amount is not refundable.

Contractors should read and be fully familiar with all contract documents before submitting a bid. In submitting a bid, the bidder warrants that it has read the contract documents and is fully familiar therewith, and that it has visited the site of the work to fully inform itself as to all existing conditions and limitations and shall include in its bid a sum to cover the cost of all items of the work.

Should a bidder find "defects" as defined in paragraph GC-2 of the General Conditions, it shall follow the procedures outlined in paragraph GC-3 to bring the same to the attention of the city. Changes necessitated thereby shall be in the form of addenda issued by the consulting engineer. All bidders shall verify that they have considered all written addenda. Neither the city nor the consulting engineer shall be responsible for oral instructions. Any written addenda issued during the time of bidding shall be covered and included in the bid. There will be

no clarifications or exceptions allowed on the bid. Bids are for a total bid package, total contract price.

Bids shall be made upon the form provided, in ink or typewritten. Numbers shall be stated both in writing and in figures; the signature shall be long hand; and the complete form shall be without alteration or erasure. On alternate items for which a bid is not submitted, a written indication of "no bid" on the bid form is required.

No oral, telegraphic, facsimile or telephonic bids or alterations will be considered.

The following items must be included in the sealed envelope with the bid:

- a. Bid
- b. 5% Bid Security—Bid Bond, Cashier's Check or Certified Check (see below.)
- c. Signed Documents (KDOT Certifications)
 - Certification—Noncollusion and History of Debarment
 - Certification—Federal Funds for Lobbying
 - Required Contract Provisions—Certification—Contractual Services with Current Legislator or Legislator's Firm
 - Required Contract Provision—DBE Contract Goals

Each bidder shall file with its bid a bid bond, a cashier's check or a certified check drawn on any acceptable bank, made payable to the City of Overland Park, Kansas, in an amount of not less than 5 percent of the total bid, which shall be retained by the City of Overland Park until a contract for the project has been executed. Bid bonds will be returned to the unsuccessful bidders, with the exception of the second qualifying bidder, at such time as their bids are rejected. The bid deposit of the successful bidder and the second qualifying bidder will be returned when satisfactory bonds in an amount equal to 100 percent of the contract amount, required insurance certificates and other required documents shall have been furnished and the contract documents have been executed.

In the event the successful bidder is unable to execute the contract, for whatever reason, the city may exercise its legal prerogatives, including, but not limited to, enforcement of its rights as to the bid security.

The city reserves the right to accept or reject any and all bids and to waive any technicalities or irregularities therein. Bids may be modified or withdrawn by written request of the bidder received in the office of the city clerk, prior to the time and date for bid opening, provided, however, that no bidder may withdraw its bid for a period of 30 days from the date set for the opening thereof. All bidders agree that rejection shall create no liability on the part of the city because of such rejection, and the filing of any bid in response to this invitation shall constitute an agreement of the bidder to these conditions.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality operating permit. National Beef Packing—Dodge City has applied for a Class I operating permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-510 *et seq.* The purpose of a Class I permit is to identify the sources and types of regulated air pollutants emitted from the facility; the emission limitations, standards and requirements applicable to each source; and the monitoring, record keeping and reporting requirements applicable to each source as of the effective date of permit issuance.

National Beef Packing—Dodge City owns and operates a meat packing plant located at 2000 E. Trail, Box 539, Dodge City.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation, and all information relied upon during the permit application review process is available for public review during normal business hours at the KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, and at the KDHE Southwest District Office, 302 W. McArtor Road, Dodge City. To obtain or review the proposed permit and supporting documentation, contact Daizy Dandass, (785) 296-6427, at the KDHE central office, or Wayne Neese, (316) 225-0596, at the KDHE Southwest District Office. The standard departmental cost will be assessed for any copies requested.

Direct written comments or questions regarding the proposed permit to Daizy Dandass, KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, 66620. In order to be considered in formulating a final permit decision, written comments must be received by the close of business November 29.

A person may request a public hearing be held on the proposed permit. The request for a public hearing shall be in writing and set forth the basis for the request. The written request must be submitted to Connie Carreno, Bureau of Air and Radiation, not later than the close of business November 29 in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency has 45 days after receipt of the proposed Class I operating permit within which to object to the proposed permit. If

the EPA has not objected in writing to the issuance of the permit within the 45-day review period, any person may petition the administrator of the EPA within 60 days after the expiration of the 45-day review period to review the permit. Any such petition shall be based only on objections to the permit that were raised with reasonable specificity during the public comment period provided for in this notice, unless the petitioner demonstrates that it was impracticable to raise such objections within such period, or unless the grounds for such objection arose after such period. Public Notice

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has received a Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) draft closure report for the Open Burn/Open Detonation (OB/OD) Unit (also known as the Solid Waste Management Unit No. 23) from the Sunflower Army Ammunition Plant (SFAAP). SFAAP has the designated EPA Identification No. KS3213820878.

SFAAP is located 4 miles southwest of De Soto, and is bounded on the north by Kansas State Highway 10, on the east by Kill Creek, and on the west by Captain Creek. The installation is an irregular shaped tract of land consisting of approximately 9,065 acres of government-owned property and 479 acres of easements. The OB/OD Unit (the site), currently considered for final closure, is located in the west central portion of SFAAP. The site is located 2,400 feet from the west boundary and 7,800 feet from the south boundary of the property. The burning ground is 730 feet by 950 feet of fenced area.

The site was a miscellaneous hazardous waste thermal treatment unit classified under Subpart X of 40 CFR, Part 265.382. The site has been in operation since 1984, when it replaced the old explosive waste burning ground. The new facility performed the same functions as the old facility, which was the destruction of explosive wastes by open burning. The steel pan containers were constructed in 1984 and the site was operated until 1993. Each pan measured approximately 10 feet long by 3.33 feet wide by 0.33 feet deep. Waste nitroguanidine, guanidine nitrate, C-4 explosive, waste nitrocotton, primers and blasting caps, black ball powder, contaminated materials and other explosives/propellants of various formulations were burned and/or detonated at this site. The burning process involved loading the pans with explosive wastes and a starter charge. The starter charge was connected to an ignition wire and fired from a remote detonator.

The draft closure report described activities that were performed to close the OB/OD unit and summarized the

remedial activities performed in accordance with KDHE's approved Quality Assurance Project Plan (QAPP) dated August 12, 1998. The draft closure report documented the closure protocols and procedures used for ensuring compliance with Title 40, Code of Federal Regulations, 265.112, 265.113, 265.114, 265.118, 265.197, 265.228, 265.258, 265.280, 265.310, 265.351, 265.381 and 265.404. Documentation of the wastes removed from the unit and a detailed description of the methods used during the closure, such as removing, transporting and disposing of all wastes, were submitted.

The site equipment was removed on June 21, 1999. The equipment consisted of 24 metal pans and some railroad ties. Approximately 98,400 gallons of surface water were removed and disposed of at the on-site wastewater treatment plant. Approximately 1,770 tons of soil material were removed from the unit. Excavated soils were disposed at a landfill. A total of nine composite samples, including Quality Assurance and Quality Control (QA/QC) samples, were collected on July 6, 1999, and sent to KDHE-certified laboratories. Results of the closure samples showed that all samples were below Kansas' risk based remedial standards. In addition, SFAAP proposed to backfill the excavated areas. The site will be graded to match the surrounding topography, and six inches of topsoil will be placed over the graded area and seeded with a vegetative cover.

The regulation requires the Secretary of Health and Environment to provide the owner or operator and the public, through a newspaper notice, the opportunity to submit written comments on the closure report not later than 30 days from the date of this notice. The draft closure report will be available for review through November 15 at the following locations during normal business hours:

Article 4.—MASTERS LEVEL PSYCHOLOGISTS

102-4-10a. Continuing education for licensees. (a) Continuing education requirements. Before January 1, 2000, each licensee shall complete 25 clock hours of documented and approved continuing education during each two-year renewal period. After December 31, 1999, each licensee shall complete 60 clock hours of documented and approved continuing education during each two-year renewal period. Continuing education hours accumulated in excess of the requirements shall not be carried over to the next renewal period.

(b) Professional ethics continuing education requirement. During each two-year renewal period and as a part of the required continuing education hours, each licensee shall complete a program on professional ethics consisting of at least three clock hours of formal training in ethics. This program shall meet the definition of continuing education contained in K.A.R. 102-4-1a(f) and focus on ethical issues of the psychology profession.

(c) Continuing education requirements by category. Before January 1, 2000, the continuing education credit counting toward the required 25 hours shall be distributed over the following categories so that at least two categories are represented, with a maximum of 15 hours in category one, a maximum of 10 hours in category two, and a maximum of 10 hours in category three. Effective on and after January 1, 2000, the continuing education credit counting toward the required 60 hours shall be distributed over the following categories so that at least two categories are represented, with a maximum of 45 hours in category one, a maximum of 24 hours in category two, and a maximum of 24 hours in category three.

(d) Counting continuing education credits. Credit for approved programs shall be awarded on the basis of one credit hour for each 50 minutes actually spent in attendance at instructional activities. One-quarter credit hour shall be awarded for attendance of at least 15 but fewer than 30 minutes. Credit shall not be granted for fractional units of fewer than 15 minutes.

(e) Category one continuing education credits and subcategory limits. Category one continuing education activities countable during each renewal period shall not exceed 45 credit hours. Category one credits and any limits by subcategory shall include the following:

(1) Activities that are sponsored, accredited, or conducted by educational institutions, by professional associations, or by private institutions that are nationally or regionally accredited for education or training;

(2) activities conducted by agencies, groups, and continuing education providers that do not meet the requirements of national or regional accreditation, if the content is clearly related to the enhancement of psychology practice, skills, knowledge, values, or ethics;

(3) academic psychology courses that are either taken for academic credit or audited. For courses taken for academic credit, 15 continuing education hours shall be

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granted for each academic credit hour that is successfully completed. For academic courses that are audited, one continuing education hour shall be granted for each hour of actual classroom attendance and participation;

(4) seminars, institutes, workshops, or mini-courses that are oriented to the enhancement of psychology practice, values, skills, ethics, or knowledge;

(5) cross-disciplinary offerings from medicine, law, the behavioral sciences, or any other discipline, if the offerings are clearly related to the enhancement of a master's level psychologist's practice, values, skills, ethics, or knowledge;

(6) approved-provider programs or approved single-program provider programs, as long as these programs are oriented toward the enhancement of a master's level psychologist's practice, values, skills, ethics, or knowledge; and

(7) cross-disciplinary offerings in foreign or sign languages, computer science, professional or technical writing skills, business administration, or management sciences, if these offerings are clearly related to the enhancement of psychology practice, values, skills, ethics, or knowledge. A maximum total of 10 clock hours of credit per each two-year renewal period may be approved in this subcategory.

(f) Category two continuing education credits and subcategory limits. Category two continuing education activities countable during each renewal period shall not exceed 24 credit hours. Category two credits and any limits by subcategory shall include the following:

(1) First-time presentation of courses, workshops, or other formal training activities, if the content is clearly related to the enhancement of psychology practice, values, skills, ethics, or knowledge. For each first-time presentation, a maximum of 10 clock hours of credit may be approved in this subcategory. If more than one master's level psychologist or other professional gave the presentation, the continuing education credit shall be prorated among the presenters;

(2) first-time publication of a psychology article in a juried professional journal or first-time publication of a book chapter in a psychology text. For each first-time publication, a maximum of 10 clock hours of credit may be approved in this subcategory. If more than one master's level psychologist or other professional authored the article or book chapter, the continuing education credit shall be prorated among the authors; and

(3) supervision of undergraduate or graduate practicum or intern students, applicants for licensure as master's level psychologists, or other professional mental health practitioners. A maximum total of 20 continuing education credits may be approved in this subcategory per each two-year renewal period. Continuing education credit for providing this supervision shall not exceed a total of five hours per semester.

(g) Category three continuing education credits and subcategory limits. Category three continuing education activities countable during each renewal period shall not exceed 24 credit hours. Category three credits and any limits by subcategory shall include the following:

(1) Self-directed professional reading. A maximum total of five continuing education credits per each two-year renewal period may be approved in this subcategory;

(2) self-directed learning projects preapproved by the board. A maximum total of 20 continuing education credits per each two-year renewal period may be approved in this subcategory;

(3) computerized interactive learning modules, telecasts, audiotapes, or videotapes oriented to the enhancement of psychology practice, knowledge, values, ethics, or skills. A maximum total of five continuing education credits per each two-year renewal period may be approved in this subcategory;

(4) professional psychology home-study continuing education activities that include a proficiency examination and are sponsored, endorsed, or approved by an academic institution or professional membership organization acceptable to the board. A maximum total of five continuing education credits per each two-year renewal period may be approved in this subcategory;

(5) participation in quality care activities that may include client diagnosis review conferences, client staffings, treatment utilization review, peer or supervisory reviews, case consultations with other professional staff, or participation in formal quality-assurance activities. A maximum total of five continuing education credits per each two-year renewal period may be approved in this subcategory;

(6) holding office or serving on a committee in a professional organization, if the organization's goals are clearly related to the enhancement of psychology practice, values, skills, ethics, or knowledge. A maximum total of 15 continuing education credits per each two-year renewal period may be approved in this subcategory; and

(7) receiving personal psychotherapy from a licensed, registered, or certified mental health provider. A maximum total of five continuing education credits per each two-year renewal period may be approved in this subcategory.

(h) In determining whether or not a claimed continuing education activity shall be allowed, the master's level psychologist may be required by the board to satisfactorily demonstrate that the content was clearly related to psychology, or to provide verification of the master's level psychologist's participation in any claimed or reported activity. If a master's level psychologist fails to comply with this requirement, the claimed credit may be disallowed by the board.

(i) Continuing education approval shall not be granted for any of the following activities:

(1) first aid, infection control, or occupational health and safety courses;

(2) in-service training if the training is for job orientation or job training, or is specific to the employing agency; or

(3) any activity for which the licensee cannot demonstrate to the board's satisfaction that the program's goals and objectives are to enhance the licensee's psychology practice, values, skills, ethics, or knowledge.

(j) Each licensee shall maintain individual continuing education records. Continuing education records shall document the licensee's continuing education activity attendance, participation, or completion as defined by K.A.R. 102-4-11a. These records may be required to be

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submitted to the board at least 30 days before the expiration date of each current licensure period. Article 16.—INTRAVENOUS FLUID THERAPY FOR LICENSED PRACTICAL NURSE

60-16-101. Definitions. (a) "Administration of intravenous fluid therapy" means utilization of the nursing process to deliver the therapeutic infusion or injection of substances through the venous system.

(b) "Admixing" means the addition of a diluent to a medication or a medication to an intravenous solution.

(c) "Calculating" means the mathematical determination of the flow rate and medication dosages.

(d) "Competency examination" means a written examination and demonstration of mastery of clinical components of intravenous fluid therapy.

(e) "Discontinuing" means stopping the intravenous flow, removing the intravenous access device, or both, based on an authorized order or nursing assessment.

(f) "Evaluating" means ongoing analysis of the monitored patient response to the prescribed intravenous therapy for determination of the appropriate patient outcomes.

(g) "Initiating" means the starting of intravenous therapy based on an authorized order by a licensed individual. Initiating shall include the following:

- (1) The patient assessment;
- (2) selection and preparation of materials;
- (3) calculation; and
- (4) insertion and stabilization of the cannula.

(h) "Maintaining" means adjusting the control device for continuance of the prescribed intravenous therapy administration rate.

(i) "Monitoring" means the ongoing assessment, observation, and communication of each patient's response to prescribed intravenous therapy. The infusion equipment, site, and flow rate shall be included in the monitoring process.

(j) "Titration of medication" means an adjustment of the dosage of a medication to the amount required to bring about a given reaction in the individual receiving the medication. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 65-1136; effective Nov. 21, 1994; amended June 12, 1998; amended Oct. 29, 1999.)

60-16-102. Scope of practice for licensed practical nurse and intravenous fluid therapy. (a) A licensed practical nurse under the supervision of a registered professional nurse may engage in a limited scope of intravenous fluid treatment, including the following:

- (1) Monitoring;
- (2) maintaining;
- (3) discontinuing intravenous flow and an intravenous access device not exceeding three inches in length in peripheral sites only; and
- (4) changing dressings for intravenous access devices not exceeding three inches in length in peripheral sites only.

(b) Any licensed practical nurse who has met one of the requirements under K.S.A. 65-1136 subsection (c), and amendments thereto, may perform, in addition to the functions set out in subsection (a) of this regulation, the following procedures relating to the expanded administration of intravenous fluid therapy under the supervision of a registered professional nurse:

- (1) Calculating;
- (2) adding parenteral solutions to existing patent intravenous access devices or administration sets;
- (3) changing administration sets;
- (4) inserting intravenous access devices that meet these conditions:

- (A) Do not exceed three inches in length; and
- (B) are located in peripheral sites only;
- (5) adding designated premixed medications to existing patent intravenous access devices or administration sets either by continuous or intermittent methods;

(6) maintaining the patency of intravenous access devices and administration sets with heparin or normal saline;

(7) administering continuous intravenous drip analgesics and antibiotics; and

(8) performing the following procedures in any facility having continuous on-site registered professional nurse supervision:

- (A) Admixing intravenous medications; and
- (B) administering by direct intravenous push analgesics, antibiotics, antiemetics, and diuretics.

(c) A licensed practical nurse shall not perform any of the following:

- (1) Administer any of the following:
 - (A) Blood and blood products, including albumin;
 - (B) investigational medications;
 - (C) anesthetics, antianxiety agents, biological therapy, serums, hemostatics, immunosuppressants, muscle relaxants, human plasma fractions, oxytocics, sedatives, tocolytics, thrombolytics, anticonvulsants, cardiovascular preparations, antineoplastics agents, hematopoietics, autonomic drugs, and respiratory stimulants;

(D) intravenous fluid therapy in the home health setting, with the exception of the approved scope of practice authorized in subsection (a); or

(E) intravenous fluid therapy to any patient under the age of 12 or any patient weighing less than 80 pounds, with the exception of the approved scope of practice authorized in subsection (a);

- (2) initiate total parenteral nutrition or lipids;
- (3) titrate medications;
- (4) draw blood from a central intravenous access device;

(5) remove a central intravenous access device or any intravenous access device exceeding three inches in length; or

(6) access implantable ports for any purpose.

(d) Licensed practical nurses qualified by the board before June 1, 2000 may perform those activities listed in subsection (a) and paragraph (b)(8)(A) regardless of their intravenous therapy course content on admixing.

(e) This regulation shall limit the scope of licensed practical nurse practice only with respect to intravenous fluid therapy and shall not restrict a licensed practical

nurse's authority to care for patients receiving this therapy. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 65-1136; effective Nov. 21, 1994; amended Dec. 13, 1996; amended June 12, 1998; amended Oct. 29, 1999.)

60-16-104. Standards for course; competency examination. (a) The purpose of the intravenous fluid therapy course shall be to prepare licensed practical nurses to perform safely and competently the activities as defined in K.A.R. 60-16-102 (b). The course shall be based on the nursing process and current intravenous nursing standards of practice.

(b) The course shall meet all of these conditions:

- (1) Consist of at least 40 classroom hours of instruction;
- (2) require a minimum of eight hours of clinical practice, not to include testing time; and

(3) take place in a laboratory and clinical setting with patients under the supervision of faculty.

(c) To be eligible to enroll in an intravenous fluid therapy course, the individual shall be a nurse with a current license. If the individual is a licensed practical nurse, the individual shall also have one year of clinical experience.

(d) Course coordinator qualifications. The intravenous therapy course coordinator shall meet the following conditions:

- (1) Be licensed as a registered professional nurse;
- (2) be responsible for the development and implementation of the intravenous fluid therapy course; and
- (3) have experience in intravenous fluid therapy and knowledge of the intravenous therapy standards.

(e) Faculty qualifications.

(1) Each primary faculty member shall meet the following conditions:

(A) Be currently licensed to practice as a registered professional nurse in Kansas;

(B) have clinical experience within the past five years that includes intravenous fluid therapy; and

(C) maintain competency in intravenous fluid therapy.

(2) Each guest lecturer shall have professional preparation and qualifications for the specific subject area in which that individual instructs.

(f) Clinical facility.

(1) Each classroom shall contain sufficient space, equipment, and teaching aids to meet the course objectives.

(2) The facility in which clinical practice and the competency examination are conducted shall allow students and faculty access to the intravenous fluid therapy equipment and intravenous fluid therapy recipients, and to the pertinent records for purpose of documentation.

(3) There shall be a signed written agreement between the provider and a cooperating health care facility that specifies the roles, responsibilities, and liabilities of each party. This written agreement shall not be required if the only health care facility to be used is also the provider.

(g) An intravenous fluid therapy curriculum shall include the following information:

(1) The Kansas nurse practice act, including current regulations;

(2) the intravenous fluid therapy policies and procedures of the clinical agency where clinical instruction is given;

(continued)

(3) the structure of the circulatory system, including the site and function of the veins used for venipuncture;

(4) the relationship between intravenous fluid treatment administration and the body's homeostatic and regulatory functions, with attention to the clinical manifestations of fluid and electrolyte imbalance and cellular physiology;

(5) the principles of infection control in intravenous fluid therapy administration;

(6) the various types of equipment used in intravenous fluid therapy administration with content related to criteria for use of each piece of equipment and means of trouble-shooting for malfunctions;

(7) the principles of compatibility and incompatibility of drugs and solutions;

(8) the nursing management of special intravenous fluid therapy administration procedures that are commonly used in the clinical setting;

(9) the procedures for venipuncture, including the following:

(A) Psychological preparation;

(B) site selections;

(C) skin preparation;

(D) initiating;

(E) stabilization; and

(F) documentation;

(10) maintenance of an intravenous fluid therapy administration system, to include the following:

(A) Discontinuing intravenous fluid therapy administration;

(B) monitoring infusion;

(C) changing administration sets and intravenous solution containers; and

(D) care of the site;

(11) nursing management of the patient receiving the drug therapy identified in K.A.R. 60-16-102 (b), including the following:

(A) Actions;

(B) interactions;

(C) adverse reactions;

(D) methods of administration; and

(E) admixing;

(12) the signs and symptoms of local and systemic complications in the delivery of fluids and medications and the preventive and treatment measures for those complications; and

(13) calculation of intravenous flow rate and medication dosage.

(h) Competency examination standards.

(1) The written examination shall be constructed based on a test plan that shall contain the components as listed in subsection (g) of this regulation.

(2) The test plan shall be reviewed by the advisory committee and approved by the board.

(3) The final written competency examination shall require a passing grade of 80 percent or above.

(4) The final clinical competency examination shall require a passing score of 100 percent.

(i) Records.

(1) The faculty shall complete the final record sheet, which shall include competencies and scores.

(2) The intravenous fluid therapy course coordinator shall perform the following:

(A) Award a certificate to each licensed nurse documenting successful completion;

(B) submit to the board, within 60 days, the name and license number of each individual who has successfully completed the course and the date of completion;

(C) maintain the records of each individual who has successfully completed the course for a period of at least five years; and

(D) submit to the board an annual report for the period of July 1 through June 30 of the respective year that includes the total number of licensees taking the intravenous fluid therapy course, the number passing the course, and the number of courses held. Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-94. Bowling establishment retailer incentive. (a) For the period starting at 6:00 a.m. on November 1, 1999, and ending at the close of the business day as defined at K.A.R. 111-6-1 on November 30, 1999, in addition to compensation provided for in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery shall also offer for all participating bowling establishment retailers a retailer incentive promotion. It will be held in conjunction with the Kansas lottery's bowling establishment promotion specified at K.A.R. 111-7-141, as follows:

(1) With every single \$5 Keno purchase during this period, a player receives a free Pick 3 ticket. On every twelfth \$5 Keno purchase made by participating bowling establishment retailers pursuant to this promotion, the retailer shall receive a coupon which is automatically issued by the on-line terminal. Each coupon may be mailed to Kansas lottery bowling promotion, P.O. Box 3000, Great Bend, Kansas 67530 for entry into a drawing for prizes.

(2) The drawing will be held at 10:00 a.m. on Friday, December 3, 1999, at the Great Bend regional office, 3007 West 10th, Great Bend, Kansas. The first coupon entry drawn from those entered will entitle the retailer named thereon to win the first prize, a television set. The next three entries drawn will entitle each of those three winners to a radio. The final five entries drawn will entitle each of those five winners to \$25 instant ticket credit.

(b) A retailer may win more than one prize if more than one of the nine entries drawn identifies the same retailer. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 74-8708 and K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-4-99, Sept. 30, 1999.)

111-2-95. New retailer survey incentive. All retailers filing applications to become a Kansas lottery retailer on and after May 1, 1999, and subsequently become a Kansas lottery retailer who complete a Kansas lottery informational form and send it to the lottery shall be entitled to one pack of instant tickets selected by the lottery. 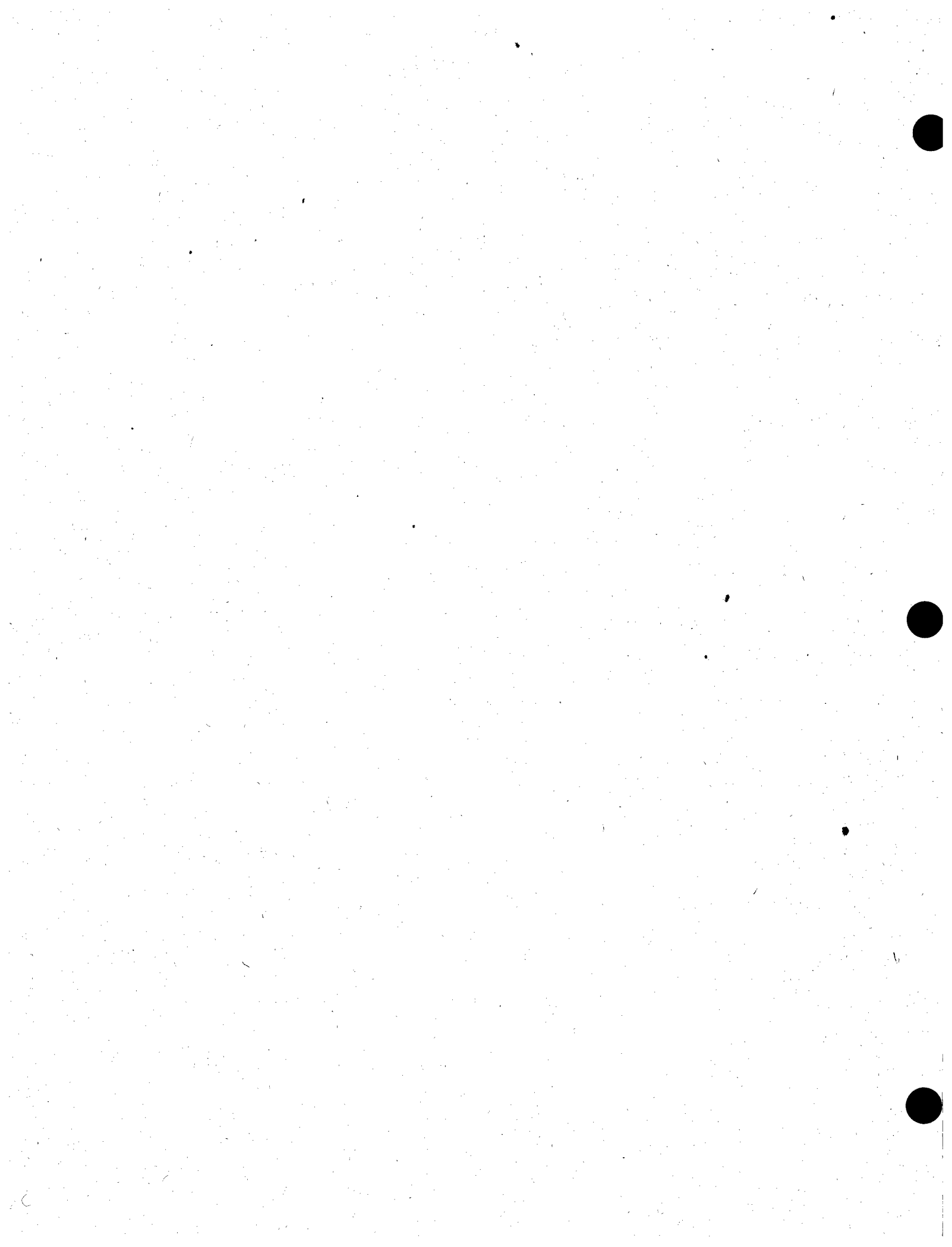

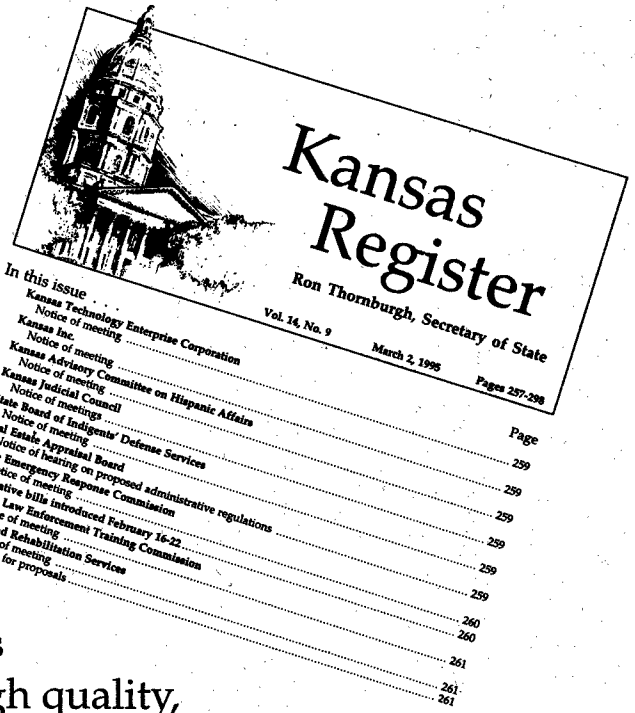
