Individual purchases of notes will be made in book-entry form only. Purchasers will not receive certificates representing their interest in notes purchased. The notes will be dated December 1, 1999, and will become due on June 1, 2000. The notes will bear interest from the dated date at rates to be determined when the notes are sold, and interest will be payable at maturity on June 1, 2000. The city treasurer will be the paying agent and note registrar for the notes.

Good Faith Deposit

Each bid for the notes shall be accompanied by a good faith deposit in the form of a cashier's or certified check or a financial surety bond in the amount of 1 percent of the principal amount of the notes.

Delivery

The city will pay for preparing the notes. The city will deliver the notes in book-entry form only through the facilities of the Depository Trust Company, New York, New York, on or before December 14, 1999.

Assessed Valuation and Indebtedness

The equalized assessed tangible valuation for computation of bonded debt limitations for the year 1998 is \$711,802,583, and for the year 1999 is \$812,181,433. The total general obligation indebtedness of the city as of the date of the notes, including the notes being sold, is \$92,870,000, and the total general obligation indebtedness of the city as of December 31, 1998, for debt limitation purposes was \$39,381,450.

Approval of Notes

The notes will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Gilmore & Bell, P.C., Kansas City, Missouri, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the notes will be furnished and paid for by the city, will accompany the notes and will be delivered to the successful bidder when the notes are delivered.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Health, Bureau of Epidemiology and Disease Prevention, will conduct a public hearing at 11 a.m. Friday, January 14, in Room 1052-South, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of one new regulation and the amendment of two existing regulations concerning disease control. A sum-

mary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 28-1-2 and K.A.R. 28-1-18 deal with diseases reportable to local health departments and the Kansas Department of Health and Environment. K.A.R. 28-1-2 includes the list of diseases reportable by physicians and other health care providers, while K.A.R. 28-1-18 includes the list of additional diseases reportable by laboratories only. Virtually all of these diseases are infectious.

The proposed amendments add some diseases to the list included in K.A.R. 28-1-2 to make it consistent with national recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Council of State and Territorial Epidemiologists. A specific section on reporting suspect bioterrorism acts has been added to K.A.R. 28-1-2. In addition, laboratories will be required to send some specimens to the Kansas Department of Health and Environment laboratory to perform tests of public health importance to identify outbreaks and describe antimicrobial resistance.

K.A.R. 28-1-26 implements a new legislative requirement included in K.S.A. 65-6003 for the Secretary of Health and Environment to adopt rules and regulations to protect confidentiality of HIV surveillance reports. The proposed regulation applies to employees in the Kansas Department of Health and Environment as well as staff in counseling and testing sites funded through the state HIV/AIDS control program. The regulation sets the security and confidentiality standards for the physical environment where records are stored, including rooms, file cabinets and computers. It includes provisions for removing identifiers from the records once the identifiers are no longer necessary for surveillance purposes. It also requires each agency to appoint a confidentiality officer to oversee all HIV record security and confidentiality issues and to adopt a written security policy. Access to confidential information shall be restricted to authorized employees who will receive training in data confidentiality and sign an agreement of confidentiality.

Economic Impact: In general, there will be no added costs to KDHE or other governmental agencies. The number of reports submitted to the Bureau of Epidemiology and Disease Prevention in the Kansas Department of Health and Environment will increase, and will be incorporated into the existing staff workload. The Kansas Health and Environmental Laboratory will have to pay for the cost of additional tests on isolates sent by clinical laboratories. The cost is projected to be less than \$1,000 per year, which will be obtained using the budget already allocated for laboratory supplies.

The number of reports submitted to the HIV/AIDS program will increase as a result of new reporting requirements for CD4 and T-lymphocyte tests by about 2,000. This will require about 500 staff hours for data management and follow-up, the cost for which will be covered through additional federal funds for surveillance secured by the agency.

Physicians, laboratories and hospitals will be required to report more cases of diseases than currently. Most of these diseases are rare, and the overall number of additional cases to be reported is expected to be a few hun-

ded a year. Since all of these individuals and institutions are already reporting thousands of cases every year, the additional cost will be negligible.

It is estimated that about 2,000 more reports for CD4 and T-lymphocyte tests will be sent by laboratories to KDHE every year. Given that most laboratories have computerized data storage systems, the cost of generating and mailing these reports should be around \$0.75 per report, for a total of \$1,500 per year distributed across all the commercial laboratories in the state. It is expected that no one lab would have an increase of more than 200 reports. KDHE also is promoting electronic and confidential fax data transmission from laboratories and other providers, which helps reduce the cost of the transmission of the reports.

Laboratories also will be required to send to the Kansas Health and Environmental Laboratory about 50 more specimens every year. It is estimated that the cost to send one isolate is about \$6.25 (including paperwork, staff time and postage). Therefore, the additional cost of sending isolates for all the commercial laboratories in the state will be about \$300 per year distributed across all the commercial laboratories in the state.

Publicly-funded counseling and testing sites may have to adjust their procedures and upgrade their facilities to comply with K.A.R. 28-1-26. These upgrades are expected to be minimal, for a cost of less than \$ 1,000 for each facility.

The time between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a 60-day public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulatory action. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Dr. Gianfranco Pezzino, Bureau of Epidemiology and Disease Prevention, Room 1051-S, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612-1290. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed regulatory action during the hearings. To give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to require each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Temporary Administrative Regulations

Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-96. "Ask for the sale" promotion. (a) During the period beginning November 1, 1999, and ending November 30, 1999, in addition to compensation provided for in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery also offers all Johnson's General Stores in Kansas an opportunity to participate in a bonus retailer "ask for the sale" incentive promotion of lottery tickets.

(b) On each Friday in November 1999, including November 5, 12, 19, and 26, all Johnson's General Stores personnel selling Kansas lottery tickets will ask every adult customer making a purchase if the customer would like to purchase a lottery ticket. If the employee fails to ask adult customers for the purchase of a lottery ticket and the customer brings it to the clerk's attention before leaving the premises, the retailer shall give the adult customer one \$1.00 instant lottery ticket at no charge.

(c) All retailer employees at each location shall wear promotional buttons and display special point-of-sale materials provided by the lottery each Friday from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. during the promotion announcing the promotion to its customers. These promotional materials consist of:

(1) A tent card to be displayed at the point where tickets are sold.

(2) A window/monitor banner to be displayed at the front entrance of the business and/or below the lottery information display system monitor.

(3) Promotion specific buttons.

(4) One additional instant ticket dispenser with designated instant game per store. These materials must be on display during all hours of the promotion at the times and dates established in subsections (b) and (c) for a store to be eligible for a prize.

(d) The Kansas lottery will provide each location with a credit of \$25. This will be credited to each store's account at the beginning of the promotion.

(e) Any tickets given away above the \$25 allowance representing 25 tickets per location will be the responsibility of the regional Johnson's General Stores.

(f) Each retail location shall maintain a ticket log form to be completed every time a lottery ticket is given away. The log will be picked up by the Kansas lottery district manager servicing the retailer location at the end of the promotion.

(g) At the end of the promotion, the Johnson's General Store with the greatest percentage increase in total sales for the period from November 1, 1999, to November 30, 1999, over the period from November 1, 1998, to November 30, 1998, will win a pack of instant tickets and promotional items. The second and third place stores will receive promotional items provided by the lottery. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710 and K.S.A. 74-8708; effective, T-111-10-19-99, Oct. 18, 1999.)

Article 4.—INSTANT GAME RULES

RULES FOR INSTANT GAME NO. 23
"SUPER DOUBLE BLACKJACK"

111-4-1561. Name of game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Super Double Blackjack" commencing on or after October 18, 1999. The specific rules for the "Super Double Blackjack" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-1561 through 111-4-1565. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-19-99, Oct. 18, 1999.)

111-4-1562. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Super Double Blackjack" instant lottery game:

(a) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the play symbols are printed in black ink with matching captions. A play symbol appears in each of eight play spots within the play area. Each play symbol for this instant game is one of the following: 2 - 3 - 4 - 5 - 6 - 7 - 8 - 9 - 10 - J - Q - K - A - BUST - \$1.00 - \$2.00 - \$4.00 - \$5.00 - \$7.00 - 11.00 - 21.00 - 70.00 - \$110\$ - \$210\$ - \$2100 - \$21000.

(b) "Play symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The play symbol caption associated with each play symbol is as follows:

The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the back of each instant game ticket both above the information form and below the bar code.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a three-letter code printed and appearing in three of eight varying locations among the game symbols. 111-4-1563. Cost of ticket. The price of "Super Double Blackjack" instant tickets sold by a retailer shall be \$2.00 each. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-19-99, Oct. 18, 1999.)

111-4-1564. Determination of instant prize winners. This is a "Beat the Dealer" game. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the table play area to reveal five hands, "HAND 1," "HAND 2," "HAND 3," "HAND 4," and "HAND 5," five prize amounts, and one "DEALER'S HAND." If the total value of a "HAND" is higher than the value of the "DEALER'S HAND," the player wins the prize directly below that "HAND." If the player gets "BLACKJACK" (21) in any "HAND," the player wins double the prize for that "HAND." If the dealer "BUSTS," the player wins all five prizes. (a) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the play symbols are printed in black ink in 15 point WGI font with matching captions in WGI Cap font. A play symbol appears in each of 12 play spots within the play area. (b) "Play symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each play symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the play symbol. The play symbol caption associated with each play symbol is as follows:

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the back of each instant game ticket both above the information form and below the bar code.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify

and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. 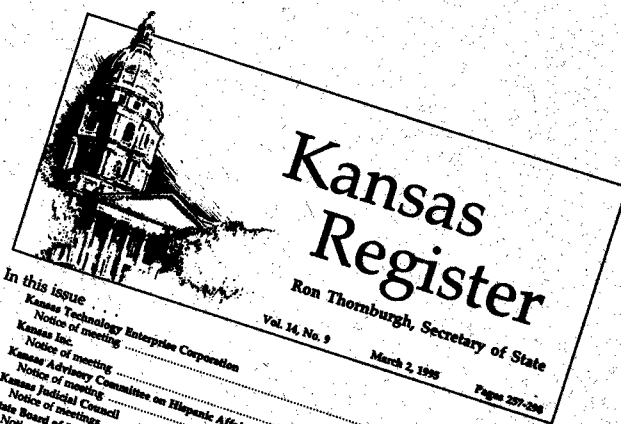
