Executive Order 99-9

Concerning Grants and Fellowships
of State Agencies

WHEREAS, Article 1, Section 3 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests the supreme executive power of the State in the Governor;

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 75-3739 and K.S.A. 75-37,102 (the State Procurement Statutes) provide certain procedures for acquiring contractual and professional services for state agencies;

WHEREAS, state agencies have previously entered into grants and fellowships as a mechanism for acquiring direct services.

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby direct state agencies under my jurisdiction as follows:

1. The award of a grant or fellowship to an individual or for-profit entity that provides direct services to a state agency shall be subject to the State Procurement Statutes.

2. Prior to the award to an individual or for-profit entity of any grant or fellowship that provides direct services to a state agency and that the state agency considers to be exempt from

the provisions of the State Procurement Statutes, the head of the state agency shall notify the Secretary of Administration, in writing, of the intent to award such grant or fellowship and the basis for the proposed exemption from the State Procurement Statutes.

3. After submitting the notification, but prior to awarding any such grant or fellowship, the head of the state agency and the Secretary of Administration shall consult regarding the exemption from the competitive process in the State Procurement Statutes.

4. After the award of such a grant or fellowship pursuant to an exemption from the State Procurement Statutes, the head of the state agency shall report the award to the Director of Purchases of the Department of Administration. The Director of Purchases shall include such awards in reports required under the State Procurement Statutes.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 99-9 and shall become effective immediately.

Administrative Regulation**

A portion of K.A.R. 109-1-1, section (bb), was inadvertently omitted from publication in the October 28, 1999, Kansas Register. That section is reprinted below:

(bb) "Providers of continuing education" means professional associations, accredited postsecondary educational institutions, permitted ambulance services, fire departments, other officially organized public safety agencies, hospitals, corporations, or emergency medical services regional councils, approved by the administrator to offer continuing education programs on either a long-term provider basis or a single-program provider basis.

The effective date of the regulation remains November 12, 1999.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality operating permit. Norcraft Companies, L.L.C. has applied for a Class I operating permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-510 *et seq.* The purpose of a Class I permit is to identify the sources and types of regulated air pollutants emitted from the facility; the emission limitations, standards and requirements applicable to each source; and the monitoring, record keeping and reporting requirements applicable to each source as of the effective date of permit issuance.

Norcraft Companies, L.L.C., Eagan, Minnesota, owns and operates a wood kitchen cabinet manufacturing facility located at 900 S. Meridian Road, Newton, Kansas.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation, and all information relied upon during the permit application review process is available for public review during normal business hours at the KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, and at the KDHE South Central District Office, 130 S. Market, sixth floor, Wichita. To obtain or review the proposed permit and supporting documentation, contact Rasha Allen, (785) 296-1693, at the KDHE central office, or David Butler, (316) 337-6020, at the KDHE South Central District Office. The standard departmental cost will be assessed for any copies requested.

Direct written comments or questions regarding the proposed permit to Rasha Allen, KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, 66620. In order to be considered in formulating a final permit decision, written comments must be received by the close of business December 27.

A person may request a public hearing be held on the proposed permit. The request for a public hearing shall

be in writing and set forth the basis for the request. The written request must be submitted to Connie Carreno, Bureau of Air and Radiation, not later than the close of business December 27 in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

The United States Environmental Protection Agency has 45 days after receipt of the proposed Class I operating permit within which to object to the proposed permit. If the EPA has not objected in writing to the issuance of the permit within the 45-day review period, any person may petition the administrator of the EPA within 60 days after the expiration of the 45-day review period to review the permit. Any such petition shall be based only on objections to the permit that were raised with reasonable specificity during the public comment period provided for in this notice, unless the petitioner demonstrates that it was impracticable to raise such objections within such period, or unless the grounds for such objection arose after such period. Article 4.—PUBLIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

30-4-64. Work program requirements. Each applicant or recipient of TAF, unless exempted, shall be required to seek and retain employment and, if assigned, participate in one or more components of the work program. Any exempt applicant or recipient may volunteer for participation in the program. The geographic areas in the state and the public assistance programs in which work program requirements are to be enforced shall be designated by the secretary. The administration of the work program shall be within the limits of appropriations. (a) Exemptions. The persons listed below shall be exempt from the work requirements:

(1) Any person who is age 17 or younger or who is age 18 and working toward attainment of a high school diploma or its equivalent. This exemption shall not be claimed by a person who is pregnant or a parent of a child in the home and who has not yet attained a high school diploma or its equivalent;

(2) any person who is 60 years of age or older. This exemption shall not be claimed by a parent under either of the following circumstances:

(A) When two parents are in the home and neither parent is prevented from pursuing employment; or

(B) when the other parent is in the home and exempt for another reason, and is available and capable of providing care for the child or children;

(3) any person who is needed in the household because another member of the household requires the person's presence due to illness or incapacity and no other appropriate member of the household is available to provide the needed care;

(4) any parent or other caretaker who is personally providing care for a child under age one. Only one person in a case may be exempt on the basis of providing care for a child under age one. This exemption shall not be claimed under any of the following circumstances:

(A) When a custodial parent or pregnant woman under age 20 does not possess a high school diploma or its equivalent;

(B) when the other parent, stepparent, or caretaker in the home is exempt from the work program requirements for another reason and is available and capable of providing child care; or

(C) when both parents of the child are present, except as noted in paragraph (a)(4)(B) of this regulation.

(b) Participation requirements. Each applicant or recipient shall seek and retain employment and, if assigned, shall participate in one or more components of an agency-approved, work-related program directed toward a plan of self-sufficiency. The work program may include the following components:

(1) Job search. Each assigned person shall participate in job search activities, which may include agency-approved job clubs and supervised and unsupervised job search activities.

(2) Work experience. Each assigned person shall participate in work experience activities, which may include the opportunity to regain work skills, learn new skills, test interests and skills on the job, gain a work history, and obtain a work reference.

(3) Education and training. Each assigned person shall participate in education and training activities that are aimed at facilitating a person's movement toward self-sufficiency and employment retention. Education and training activities may include vocational training, adult basic education, literacy training, general educational development, and postsecondary education and training.

(4) Work supplementation. Each assigned person shall participate in a work supplementation program in which an employer receives a wage subsidy from money diverted from public assistance grants for employing participants.

(5) Job readiness. Each assigned person shall participate in job readiness activities, which may include employment counseling and life skills.

(6) Community service. Each assigned person shall participate in community service activities.

(c) Support costs. Payment of support costs shall be provided to participants. Support costs may include the following:

(1) Transportation expenses for each person participating in a work program activity in accordance with an agency-approved plan;

(2) day care expenses, as necessary for the person to participate in a work program activity in accordance with an agency-approved plan; and

(3) education and training costs for each participant based on an agency-approved plan, which may include tuition, books, and fees.

(d) Transitional expenses. Payment for transitional expenses may be provided to each participant who loses eligibility for TAF due to the participant's employment. Transitional expenses may include the following:

(1) Transportation expenses necessary for the participant to continue employment in accordance with an agency-approved plan; and

(2) child care expenses necessary for the participant to continue employment in accordance with an agency-approved plan.

(e) Penalty.

(1) A person who is required to participate in the work program shall be ineligible for assistance if one of the following circumstances occurs in any assistance program administered by the secretary in which work program participation is required:

(A) If the person fails without good cause to participate in the program;

(B) if the person refuses without good cause a bona fide referral for or offer of employment;

(C) if the person terminates employment without good cause;

(D) if the person is terminated from employment by voluntarily making oneself unacceptable without good cause; or

(E) if the person reduces earnings without good cause.

(2) The period of ineligibility shall be as follows:

(A) For the first instance, until the person cooperates; and

(B) for any subsequent instance, two months or until the person cooperates, whichever is longer.

If the person is an adult, the mandatory filing unit of which the person is a member shall also be ineligible.

(f) Good cause. Each individual who presents verification that the individual meets one or more of the following criteria shall be determined to have good cause for failing to participate in the work program:

(1) The individual is exempt from participation in the program.

(2) The individual was incapable of performing the activity.

(3) Performance of the activity was so dangerous or hazardous according to occupational safety and health administration (OSHA) standards as to make a refusal to perform the activity or termination of the activity a reasonable one.

(4) Child care or day care for an incapacitated individual living in the same home is necessary for an individual to participate or continue to participate in the program, and the care is not available.

(5) The total daily commuting time to and from home to the activity to which the individual is assigned exceeds two hours, not including the transporting of a child to and from a child care facility. If a longer commuting distance is generally accepted in the community, the round trip commuting time shall not exceed the generally accepted community standards.

(6) The failure occurred in the month the individual's pregnancy was terminated or the two following months.

(7) A single custodial parent has demonstrated the inability to obtain needed child care for a child under six, because of one or more of the following reasons:

(A) Unavailability of appropriate child care within a reasonable distance from the individual's home or work site;

(B) unavailability or unsuitability of informal child care. "Informal child care" means care which is legally exempt from regulation; or

(C) unavailability of appropriate and affordable formal child care arrangements.

(8) The individual was a victim of domestic violence, and compliance with program requirements would increase the risk of harm for the individual or any children in the individual's care.

(g) This regulation shall take effect on and after December 1, 1999. Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 5.—FURBEARERS

115-5-2. Furbearers and coyotes; possession, disposal, and general provisions. (a) Raw furs, pelts, or skins of furbearers may be possessed for the shorter of the following time periods:

(1) Not more than 30 days following the closing of the season in which that species of furbearer may legally be taken; or

(2) until the day before the beginning of the running season in which that species of furbearer may legally be run.

(b) Requests to possess raw furs, pelts, or skins beyond the possession period as specified in subsection (a) shall be submitted to the department and, if granted, shall be authorized in writing by the secretary. Each request shall specify the number of each species of furbearers possessed and the applicant's name, address, and furharvester license number.

(c) Live furbearers legally taken during a furbearer season may be possessed only through the last day of the season in which taken.

(d) Unskinned carcasses of furbearers may be possessed for not more than 48 hours following the closing of the season in which that species of furbearer may legally be taken. Skinned carcasses and meat of furbearers may be possessed without limit in time. Legally acquired skinned carcasses and meat of furbearers may be sold or given to and possessed by another, if a written notice that includes the seller's or donor's name, address, and furharvester license number accompanies the carcass or meat.

(e) Legally taken raw furs, pelts, skins, or carcasses of coyotes or legally taken live coyotes may be possessed without limit in time except as provided in K.A.R. 28-1-14.

(f) Any person in lawful possession of raw furbearing animal or coyote furs, pelts, skins, or carcasses may sell or ship or offer for sale or shipment the same to licensed fur dealers or any person legally authorized to purchase raw furbearing animal or coyote furs, pelts, skins, or carcasses.

(g) Any bobcat or swift fox pelt legally taken in Kansas may be sold to any fur dealer or shipped from the state for the purpose of selling if an export tag provided by the department has been affixed to the pelt.

(1) The pelt of any bobcat or swift fox taken in Kansas shall be presented to the department for tagging within seven days following closure of the bobcat or swift fox hunting and trapping season.

(2) A pelt presented for tagging shall be accompanied by the furharvester license number under which the pelt was taken.

(h) Bobcat or swift fox pelts tagged by the department may be possessed without limit in time.

(continued)

(i) Properly licensed persons may legally salvage furbearing animals and coyotes found dead during the established open seasons for hunting or trapping of furbearers or coyotes. Salvaged furbearing animals and coyotes may be possessed or disposed of as authorized by this regulation.

(j) The raw fur, pelt, skin, carcass, or meat of any furbearing animal, except spotted skunk or river otter, taken as a result of animal damage control activities outside of an established season for that species of furbearer, may be possessed and disposed of as authorized by this regulation, if both of the following conditions are met:

(1) The furharvester license requirements of K.S.A. 32-911 and amendments thereto are met.

(2) A permit authorizing the possession and disposal has been issued by the department. (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 32-1002; effective March 19, 1990; amended Oct. 17, 1994; amended Nov. 29, 1999.)

Article 8.—DEPARTMENT LANDS AND WATERS

115-8-6. Fishing, fish bait, and seining. Fishing and the taking of fishing bait shall be allowed on department lands and waters, subject to the following general restrictions:

(a) Fishing shall be prohibited at boat ramps and boat docks closed to fishing by posted notice.

(b) Fishing shall be prohibited at swimming areas, and swimming beaches posted as swimming areas or swimming beaches and delineated by buoys or other markers.

(c) Minnows and other fishing bait may be taken for use as fishing bait only on a noncommercial basis and may be used only in the department-managed water where taken.

(d) Seining in department-managed waters shall be prohibited.

(e) The cleaning of fish in state parks shall occur only at designated fish cleaning stations or other locations as established by the department.

(f) The use of trot lines and set lines shall be prohibited in the waters of Crawford state park, Meade state park, Scott state park, and all department-managed impoundments under 500 surface acres in size.

(g) Additional restrictions may be established by posted notice. (Authorized by K.S.A. 32-807; implementing K.S.A. 32-807 and K.S.A. 32-1015; effective Dec. 4, 1989; amended Dec. 28, 1992; amended Nov. 29, 1999.)

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is soliciting comments regarding a proposed air quality construction permit. Tower Metal Products has applied for a construction permit in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-300. Tower Metal Products plans to construct a new secondary aluminum production facility in Prescott. Emissions of particulate matter (PM), particulate matter less than 10 microns (PM₁₀), oxides of sulfur (SO_x), oxides of nitrogen (NO_x), carbon monoxide (CO) and volatile organic compounds (VOC) were evaluated in determining the potential-to-emit during the permit review process.

Tower Metal Products, Fort Scott, owns the property located at 4008 Vernon Road, Prescott, Linn County, at which the new secondary aluminum production facility is to be constructed.

A copy of the proposed permit, permit application, all supporting documentation and all information relied upon during review of the permit application is available for public inspection during normal business hours at the KDHE, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Building 283, Forbes Field, Topeka, and at the KDHE Southeast District Office, 1500 W. 7th, Chanute. The written request must be submitted to Connie Carreno, Bureau of Air and Radiation, not later than the close of business December 13 in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 5.—LICENSES

65-5-10. Glaucoma licenses. (a) Each applicant for a glaucoma license shall file a completed application with the secretary-treasurer on a form prescribed by the board and shall submit the following information with the application:

- (1) Proof that the applicant maintains professional liability insurance in an amount of \$1,000,000.00;
- (2) proof that the applicant has completed an approved course of glaucoma instruction;
- (3) evidence that the applicant has completed a comanagement period of at least 24 months; and
- (4) evidence that the applicant has comanaged no fewer than 20 diagnoses of suspected or confirmed glaucoma, of which no fewer than 10 are confirmed diagnoses of glaucoma.

(b) For the purposes of this article, an "approved course of glaucoma instruction" shall be the 24-hour course in glaucoma management offered by the University of Missouri—Saint Louis School of Optometry, as that course existed on May 9, 1996, and any course that has been determined by the board to have a comparable content.

(c) Comanagement.

(1) Each participating licensee shall file with the board a comanagement treatment plan report, on a form prescribed by the board, as soon as reasonably practical after a diagnosis of suspected or confirmed adult open angle glaucoma is made. For the purposes of this regulation, "participating licensee" means a licensee who participates in comanagement, as defined by K.S.A. 65-1501a(r)

and amendments thereto, during a comanagement period, as defined by K.S.A. 65-1501a(s) and amendments thereto.

(2) Each participating licensee's comanagement period shall begin on the day the board receives the participating licensee's first comanagement treatment plan report.

(3) During the comanagement period, any participating licensee may prescribe topical ocular pharmaceuticals for treatment of adult open angle glaucoma only in accordance with an approved treatment plan that is signed by the comanaging ophthalmologist.

(4) On or before May 31 of each year, each participating licensee shall file a completed annual report on a form approved by the board providing all information required by the board regarding each comanaged case.

(5) All documents and information filed with or provided to the board or an interprofessional advisory committee created by the board in connection with comanagement shall be subject to the peer review privilege. Disclosure of comanagement documents and information to the board or an interprofessional advisory committee created by the board shall not operate as a waiver of the optometrist-patient or physician-patient privilege.

(d) The requirement of the comanagement period set forth in subsection (c) above and in K.S.A. 65-1505(d), and amendments thereto, and the requirement of comanaging suspected or confirmed glaucoma cases set forth in paragraph (a)(4) above and in K.S.A. 65-1505(d), and amendments thereto, shall not apply to applicants for glaucoma licensure graduating after July 1, 1998 from approved optometric schools or colleges. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-1504(a)(6); implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 65-1501, K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 65-1501a, K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 65-1505, K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 65-4915(b), and K.S.A. 65-1525; effective Feb. 28, 1997; amended Nov. 29, 1999.)

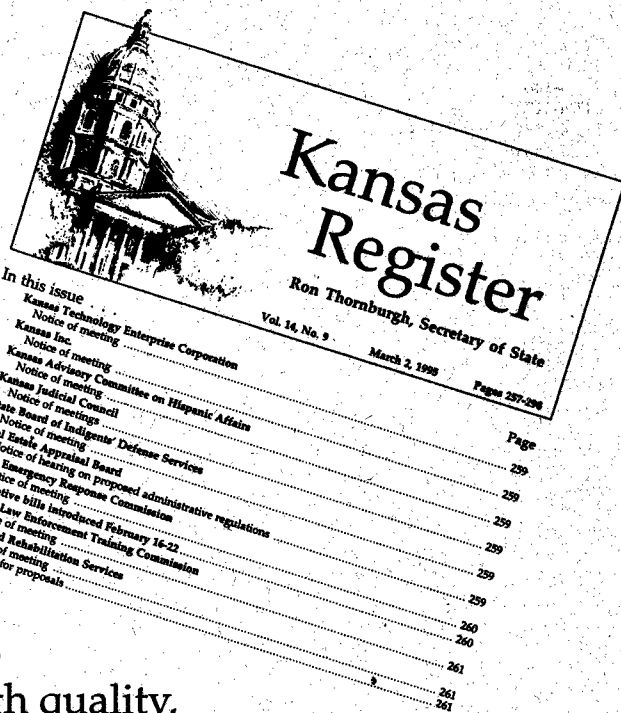
