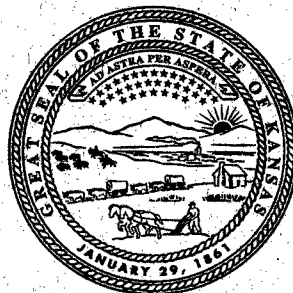

Jackson, Topeka, on the proposal for the Kansas Development Finance Authority to issue its Agricultural Development Revenue Bond for the project numbered below in the respective maximum principal amount. The bond will be issued to assist the respective borrower named below (who will be the owner and operator of the project) to finance the cost in the amount of the bond of acquiring the project or for the purpose of refunding a bond previously issued to finance the project. The project shall be located as shown:

Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Thursday, March 23, at the office of the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts, 235 S. Topeka Blvd., Topeka, to consider the adoption of three proposed amended rules and regulations relating to physicians' assistants.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed amended rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit comments prior to the hearing to the Board of Healing Arts at the address above. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed amended regulations during the hearing. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed amended rules and regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Melissa Kipp at (785) 368-6425. Handicapped parking is located at the west end of the Hutton Building, and the northwest entrance to the building is accessible.

A summary of the proposed amended rules and regulations to be considered for adoption follows:

K.A.R. 100-60-9. Physician request form; content. This regulation states what information shall be contained on the physician request form, which is submitted by the physician's assistant upon initial registration and at any renewal. The form contains information to include the name and license number of the responsible physician, description of the physician's practice and the way in which the PA is to be utilized, practice location(s) of the PA, and who shall routinely provide direction and supervision to the PA in the temporary absence of the responsible physician. Attached to the form is a complete drug prescription protocol specifying categories of drugs, medicines and pharmaceuticals that the PA is allowed to supply or prescribe.

K.A.R. 100-60-10. Supervision and direction; adequacy. This regulation addresses the supervision and direction of the PA by the responsible physician. The regulation also establishes a method for the initial and continuing periodic evaluation of the professional competency of the PA by the responsible physician.

K.A.R. 100-60-13. Prescription-only drugs. This regulation deals with when, how and under what emergency situations prescription-only drugs may be administered or supplied by the PA.

Constitution of the State of Kansas—Corporations—Cities' Power of Home Rule; Charter Ordinances; Filing with Secretary of State. Representative Michael R. O'Neal, 104th District, Hutchinson, December 14, 1999.

Absent a protest petition and referendum, a charter ordinance is effective 60 days after its final publication regardless whether a certified copy is filed with the Secretary of State. Cited herein: K.S.A. 15-201; Kan. Const., Art. 12, § 15. MF

Opinion 99-66

Schools—Organization, Powers and Finances of Boards of Education—Organization Order for Unified School Districts; Funds; Lawsuits. Representative Ralph M. Tanner, 10th District, Baldwin City, December 14, 1999.

A unified school district may pay litigation expenses when it is a named party in a lawsuit. It may also pay the expenses of legal counsel representing a member of the board of education or an officer or employee of the school district if such individual is sued in a situation relating to and arising out of the performance of his or her office or employment. A unified school district is not authorized to contribute funds to pay a portion of the costs of litigation borne by the remaining plaintiffs in a lawsuit once the school district is removed as a plaintiff in the suit. Opinion 99-67

Cities and Municipalities—Buildings, Structures and Grounds; Public Buildings—Methods of Financing Authorized; Issuance of Bonds After Election. Lewis A. Heaven, Jr., Merriam City Attorney, Merriam, December 14, 1999.

An election is required under K.S.A. 12-1736 *et seq.* for a city to finance certain public building projects through the issuance of bonds only where the city is either acquiring or initially constructing the building; an election held to make alterations to an existing structure would be a nonbinding advisory election. Article 1.—ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

108-1-3. School district employee health care benefits plan. (a) Definitions.

(1) "Commission" means the Kansas state employees health care commission.

(2) "Qualified school district" means a public school district, community college, area vocational technical school, or technical college that meets the terms, conditions, limitations, exclusions, and other provisions established by the commission for participation in the school district employee health care benefits component of the health care benefits program and has entered into a written agreement with the commission to participate in the program.

(3) "School district employee" means any individual who is employed by a qualified school district and who meets the definition of employee under K.S.A. 74-4932(4), and amendments thereto, except that the following employees shall be employed in a position that requires at least 1,000 hours of work per year:

(A) Employees of community colleges; and

(B) employees of area vocational technical schools and technical colleges that are not governed by a unified school district.

For purposes of this definition, a technical college shall be a participating employer under K.S.A. 74-4931, and amendments thereto, in accordance with K.S.A. 72-4471, and amendments thereto.

(4) "School district plan" means the school district employee health care benefits component of the health care benefits program.

(b) Active participants. Subject to the provisions of subsection (c), each school district employee shall be eligible to participate as an active participant in the school district plan. Eligibility and participation shall be subject to terms, conditions, limitations, exclusions, and other provisions established by the commission, including the amount and method of payment for employee and employer contributions.

(c) Waiting periods.

(1) Each school district employee whose first day of work for a qualified school district is on or after the first day on which the employee's qualified school district participates in the school district plan shall become eligible for coverage following completion of a 60-day waiting period beginning with the first day of work for the qualified school district. Each school district employee shall have 31 days after becoming eligible to elect health insurance coverage.

(2) The waiting period established in paragraph (c)(1) shall not apply if all of the following conditions are met:

(A) The person is returning to work for the qualified school district or is transferring from another qualified school district.

(B) Immediately before leaving the prior position, the person was enrolled in the school district plan or was

covered by the health care insurance plan provided by the employee's qualified school district.

(C) The break in service between the prior position and the new position does not exceed the following time periods:

(i) 30 or fewer calendar days; or

(ii) 365 or fewer days, if the person was laid off in accordance with the practices of the qualified school district.

(3) The waiting period established in paragraph (c)(1) may be waived when the chief administrative officer of the qualified school district, or the chief administrative officer's designee, meets the following requirements:

(A) The chief administrative officer or the chief administrative officer's designee shall provide both of the following certifications to the commission, or its designee, in writing:

(i) A potential new school district employee is not entitled to continuation of health benefits available from prior insurance coverage.

(ii) The waiting period poses, or will pose, an obstacle to recruitment.

(B) The chief administrative officer or the chief administrative officer's designee shall submit the request for a waiver before the employee's acceptance of the position.

(4) Each school district employee who is employed by the employee's qualified school district immediately before the first day on which the employee's qualified school district participates in the school district plan shall be subject to transitional provisions established by the commission regarding waiting periods and the date on which the employee becomes eligible to participate in the school district plan.

(5) The waiting period described in this subsection may be waived by the commission if the commission determines that failure to grant a waiver would create a manifest injustice or undue hardship on the school district employee.

(d) Categories of direct bill participants. Subject to the provisions of subsection (e), the classes of persons eligible to participate as members of the school district plan on a direct bill basis shall be those classes of persons listed below:

(1) Any retired school district employee who is receiving state warrants for retirement benefits;

(2) any totally disabled former school district employee who is receiving benefits under K.S.A. 74-4927, and amendments thereto;

(3) any surviving spouse or dependent of a qualifying participant in the school district plan;

(4) any person who is a school district employee and who is on approved leave without pay in accordance with the practices of the qualified school district; and

(5) any individual who was covered by the health care plan offered by the qualified school district on the day immediately before the first day on which the qualified school district participates in the school district plan, except that no individual who is an employee of the qualified school district and who does not meet the definition of school district employee in subsection (a) shall be qualified as a direct bill participant under this paragraph.

(e) Conditions for direct bill participants. Each person who is within a class listed in subsection (d) shall be eligible to participate on a direct bill basis only if the person meets both of the following requirements:

(1) The person was covered by the school district plan or the health care insurance plan offered by the qualified school district on one of the following bases:

(A) Immediately before the date the person ceased to be eligible for coverage, or for any person identified in paragraph (d)(5), immediately before the first day on which the qualified school district participates in the school district plan, the person either was covered as an active participant under subsection (b) or was covered by the health care insurance plan offered by the employee's qualified school district.

(B) The person is a surviving spouse or dependent of a person who was enrolled as a plan participant under subsection (b) or (d) at the time the plan participant died, and the person was enrolled in spouse or dependent coverage under subsection (g) at the time the plan participant died.

(C) The person is a surviving spouse or dependent of a person who was enrolled as a plan participant under the health care insurance plan offered by the participant's qualified school district at the time the participant died, and the person was covered under the same plan at the time the participant died.

(2) The person files a statement of election with the commission's health benefits administrator to continue coverage under the plan. The election to continue coverage shall be submitted on a form prescribed by the commission's health benefits administrator. The form shall be submitted no more than 30 days after the person ceased to be eligible for coverage, or in the case of any individual identified in paragraph (d)(5), no more than 30 days after the first day on which the qualified school district participates in the school district plan.

(f) Continuation of benefits (COBRA) coverage. Any individual with rights to extend coverage under provisions of public law 99-272, as amended, may participate in the school district plan, subject to the provisions of that federal law.

(g) Coverage of spouses and dependents. Any person who is enrolled in the school district plan under subsection (b), (d), or (f) may enroll a spouse and eligible dependent children, subject to the same conditions and limitations that apply to the person enrolled in accordance with this regulation. Article 6.—PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

66-6-4. Rules of professional conduct. (a) For the purposes of this regulation, "licensee" means any architect, geologist, landscape architect, land surveyor, or professional engineer licensed by the board of technical professions.

(b) If any licensee's judgment is overruled under circumstances in which the safety, health, or welfare of the public is endangered, the licensee shall inform the employer or client of the possible consequences, and the licensee shall notify the authority who issued the building permit or otherwise has jurisdiction.

(c) The licensee shall not advertise to perform or undertake to perform any assignment involving a specific technical profession unless licensed and qualified by education and experience in that technical profession, as defined in K.S.A. 74-7003, and amendments thereto.

(d) Any licensee may accept an assignment requiring education or experience outside of the licensee's field of competence, but only to the extent that the services are restricted to those phases of the project in which the licensee is qualified. All other phases of that project shall be performed by licensed associates, licensed consultants, or employees who are otherwise qualified by virtue of their education or experience.

(e) Except as provided in K.S.A. 74-7023 (b), and amendments thereto, a licensee shall not affix a personal signature, seal, or both to any plan or document dealing with subject matter that is outside of the licensee's field of competence by virtue of education or experience. Additionally, a licensee shall not affix a personal signature, seal, or both to any plan or document except after completion of a detailed review and evaluation of the documents.

(f) If the competence of any licensee to perform an assignment in a specific technical field is at issue, the licensee may be required by the board to pass an appropriate examination.

(g) In all professional reports, statements, and testimony, each licensee shall meet the following criteria:

- (1) Be completely objective and truthful; and
- (2) include all relevant and pertinent information.

(h) When serving as an expert or technical witness before any court, commission, or other tribunal, each licensee shall express only opinions founded on the following:

- (1) An adequate knowledge of the facts at issue;
- (2) a background of technical competence in the subject matter; and
- (3) an actual, good-faith belief of the accuracy and propriety of the licensee's testimony.

(i) If a licensee issues any statements, criticisms, or arguments on public policy matters that are inspired or paid for by any interested party or parties, those com-

(continued)

ments shall be prefaced by and include disclosure of the following:

(1) The identities of the party or parties on whose behalf the licensee is speaking; and

(2) the existence of any pecuniary interest of the licensee.

(j) Each licensee shall disclose all known or potential conflicts of interest to employers or clients by promptly informing them of any business association, interest, or any other circumstances that could influence that licensee's judgment or the quality of the licensee's services.

(k) A licensee shall not accept compensation, financial or otherwise, from more than one party for services on the same project or for services pertaining to the same project, unless the circumstances are fully disclosed and agreed to by all interested parties.

(l) A licensee shall not solicit or accept financial or other valuable consideration, directly or indirectly, from either of the following:

(1) Material or equipment suppliers for specifying their products; or

(2) contractors, their agents, or other parties in connection with work for employers or clients for which the licensee is responsible.

(m) A licensee shall not solicit a contract from a governmental body on which a principal or officer of the licensee's organization serves as a member, except upon public disclosure of all pertinent facts and circumstances and consent of the appropriate public authority.

(n) A licensee shall not offer, directly or indirectly, to pay a commission or other consideration or to make a political contribution or other gift in order to secure work, except for payment made to an employment agency for its services.

(o) In all contacts with prospective or existing clients or employers, each licensee shall accurately represent the licensee's qualifications and the scope of the licensee's responsibility in connection with work for which the licensee is claiming credit.

(p) A licensee shall not be associated with, or permit the use of the licensee's personal name or firm name in, a business venture being performed by any person or firm that the licensee knows, or has reason to believe, is engaging in either of the following:

(1) Business or professional practice of a fraudulent or dishonest nature; or

(2) a violation of K.S.A. 74-7001 *et seq.*, and amendments thereto, or the rules and regulations promulgated and adopted by the board.

(q) Each licensee with knowledge of any alleged violation of K.S.A. 74-7001 *et seq.*, and amendments thereto, or the rules and regulations promulgated and adopted by the board shall perform the following:

(1) Report the alleged violation to the board; and

(2) cooperate with the board in furnishing information or any assistance that may be required.

(r) A licensee shall not assist any person in applying for registration when the licensee knows that person to be unqualified with respect to education, training, experience, or character.

(s) Conviction of a felony or the revocation or suspension of a professional license by another jurisdiction, if

for a cause that in the state of Kansas would constitute a violation of Kansas law or of these regulations, shall be grounds for a charge of violation of these regulations. 66-6-6. Renewal of licenses and certificates of authorization. (a) Each licensee whose last name begins with one of the letters A through L shall renew the license in even-numbered years. Each licensee whose last name begins with one of the letters M through Z shall renew the license in odd-numbered years. A written notice shall be issued by the board to each licensee during the appropriate renewal year, and not later than 30 days before the following expiration dates:

(b) Each corporation holding a certificate of authorization to practice a technical profession shall renew its certificate of authorization in even-numbered years. A written notice shall be issued by the board to each corporation during the appropriate renewal year, and not later than 30 days before the December 31 expiration date.

(c) The notice shall state the amount of the renewal fee fixed by the board, as provided by K.S.A. 74-7025, and amendments thereto. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7025; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992; amended Feb. 22, 1993; amended Feb. 14, 1994; amended March 1, 1996; amended Feb. 4, 2000.)

Article 7.—APPLICATIONS

66-7-2. Application for certificate of authorization.

(a) A separate application shall be submitted for each technical profession for which a corporation wishes to become authorized.

(b) Each application submitted by a foreign corporation shall be accompanied by:

(1) A copy of the articles of incorporation; and

(2) a copy of the certificate of authority to do business in the state of Kansas from the Kansas secretary of state if qualified pursuant to K.S.A. 17-7301 *et seq.*, and amendments thereto.

(c) Each application submitted by a domestic corporation shall be accompanied by a copy of the articles of incorporation. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7036; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992; amended Feb. 5, 1999; amended Feb. 4, 2000.)

Article 8.—EXAMINATIONS

66-8-7. Geology examinations. (a) The examination required of an applicant for geology licensure shall be the national association of state boards of geologists (AS-

BOG) examination, consisting of a geology fundamentals section and a professional geology practice section.

(b) The examination shall be graded by the ASBOG, subject to approval by the board.

(c) Each applicant who has passed any section of a previous registration examination shall be granted transfer credits in accordance with the board's criteria, available upon request.

(d) Each applicant for a professional license shall take and pass the section on geology fundamentals and shall meet the professional geology experience requirements under K.S.A. 74-7041, and amendments thereto, before the applicant may take the section on professional practice. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7017 and K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7041; effective Feb. 4, 2000.)

Article 9.—EDUCATION

66-9-4. Engineering curriculum approved by the board. "A college or university program that is adequate in its preparation of students for the practice of engineering" shall mean a baccalaureate engineering curriculum accredited by the accreditation board for engineering and technology (ABET). Any other baccalaureate engineering curriculum that has not been accredited by ABET but has been evaluated and found to be of an equivalent standard may be reviewed and accepted by the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7021; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992; amended Feb. 22, 1993; amended Feb. 14, 1994; amended Feb. 4, 2000.)

66-9-6. Geology curriculum approved by the board. Graduation from a course of study in geology shall mean successful completion of a baccalaureate curriculum reviewed and accepted by the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7041; effective Feb. 4, 2000.)

Article 10.—EXPERIENCE

66-10-12. Surveying experience of a character satisfactory to the board. (a) (1) Land surveying experience shall meet the following criteria:

(A) Fall within the definition of "the practice of land surveying" in K.S.A. 74-7003(k), and amendments thereto; and

(B) be under the direct supervision of a licensed land surveyor for work performed after May 1, 1988.

(2) Each applicant shall supply at least three references from licensed land surveyors or professional engineers who are familiar with the applicant's land surveying experience. At least one reference shall be from a licensed land surveyor.

(b) The following guidelines shall be used to assign credit for work experience.

(1) Progressive land surveying experience shall include each of the following elements of professional land surveying:

- (A) Project management;
- (B) research;
- (C) measurements and locations;

- (D) computations and analysis;
- (E) legal principles and reconciliation;
- (F) land planning and design;
- (G) monumentation; and
- (H) documentation and land information systems.

(2) Land surveying experience normally identified with engineering projects, including construction staking, curb and gutter projects, sanitary sewers, and design surveys for highways or bridges other than those that relate to right-of-way surveys, shall not be considered progressive land surveying experience. This experience, however, may be considered by the board as basic land surveying experience.

(3) Teaching experience in land surveying courses in an accredited engineering or land surveying curriculum may be considered as equal to one year of basic land surveying experience.

(4) If the applicant can provide a record of surveying and related technical education courses, including mathematics and drafting, the applicant may be given credit for 0.5 years of experience in basic land surveying for every 15 semester hours of these educational courses. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7022; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992; amended Feb. 22, 1993; amended Feb. 13, 1995; amended Feb. 4, 2000.)

66-10-13. Geology experience of a character that is satisfactory to the board. (a) The work experience required of each applicant shall expose the applicant to all phases of work integral to the discipline of geology in which the applicant claims qualification to practice and shall be verified as set forth in paragraph (b)(2) of this regulation.

(b) Geology experience shall meet these criteria:

(1) Fall within the definition of "the practice of geology" in K.S.A. 74-7003(o), and amendments thereto; and

(2) be directly supervised and verified by a licensed geologist for work performed after July 1, 2000. However, direct supervision of a licensed geologist shall not be required of the employees of any person, firm, or corporation that does not offer services in the technical professions to the public, although verification by the applicant's supervisor shall still be required.

(c) The following guidelines shall be used to assess credit for work experience:

(1) Experience credit shall not be allowed for work performed before graduation, except for experience gained under the provision of K.A.R. 66-10-13(c)(4).

(2) One year of credit toward the experience requirement may be given for a master's degree in geology or in a closely related specialty area acceptable to the board.

(3) Teaching geology in a college or university that offers an approved geology curriculum of four years or more may be considered geology experience.

(4) credit may be given for 50% of the verified work experience obtained through a cooperative geology program approved by a school or university with an accredited geology curriculum. Credit for this work experience shall not exceed one year.

(d) Each applicant shall supply at least three references who are familiar with the applicant's geology experience.

(continued)

One reference may be a licensed professional engineer. An acceptable professional reference shall be any of the following:

- (1) A licensed geologist; or
- (2) an individual certified by any of the following:
 - (A) the American institute of professional geologists (AIPG);
 - (B) the American association of petroleum geologists' division of professional affairs (AAPG); or
 - (C) the society of independent professional earth scientists (SIPES). (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7041; effective Feb. 4, 2000.)

Article 11.—INTERN ENGINEER CERTIFICATION

66-11-4. Admission requirements for fundamentals of geology examination. (a) Each application shall be reviewed by the board to determine whether the requirements for examination have been met. Once the board establishes that the requirements have been met, the applicant shall be allowed to sit for the examination.

(b) The requirements for admission shall be either of the following:

- (1) Senior status in a geology curriculum, as defined in K.A.R. 66-9-6; or
- (2) graduation from an accredited geology curriculum, as defined in K.A.R. 66-9-6. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7041; effective Feb. 4, 2000.)

Article 12.—MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR THE PRACTICE OF LAND SURVEYING

66-12-1. Minimum standards for the practice of land surveying. The board hereby adopts by reference the following:

- (a) The "minimum standard detail requirements for ALTA/ACSM land title surveys," published in 1997;
- (b) the "classifications of ALTA/ACSM land title surveys for ALTA/ACSM land title surveys," published in 1997; and
- (c) the "Kansas minimum standards for boundary surveys and mortgagee title inspections standards of practice #1" adopted by the Kansas society of land surveyors, and last amended on October 23, 1998, except that the preface and scope sections shall be deleted. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7037; effective May 4, 1992; amended Feb. 14, 1994; amended Feb. 13, 1995; amended March 1, 1996; amended Feb. 4, 2000.)

Article 14.—CONTINUING EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

66-14-1. Requirements. (a)(1) Beginning with applications for renewal of licenses that expire on March 31, 1998, each land surveyor shall have completed 30 professional development hours (PDH) units of acceptable continuing education requirements during the two-year period immediately preceding the biennial renewal date as a condition for license renewal as defined in K.A.R. 66-6-6. If the licensee exceeds the requirement in any renewal

period, the licensee may carry a maximum of 30 PDH units forward into the subsequent renewal period.

(2) Beginning with applications for renewal of licenses that expire on April 30, 2000, each professional engineer, architect, and landscape architect shall have completed 30 PDH units of acceptable continuing education requirements during the two-year period immediately preceding each biennial renewal date as a condition for license renewal as defined in K.A.R. 66-6-6. If a licensee exceeds the requirement in any renewal period, the licensee may carry a maximum of 30 PDH units forward into the subsequent renewal period.

(3) Beginning with applications for renewal of licenses that expire on June 30, 2003, each geologist shall have completed 30 PDH units of acceptable continuing education requirements during the two-year period immediately preceding each biennial renewal date as a condition for license renewal as defined in K.A.R. 66-6-6. If a licensee exceeds the requirement in any renewal period, the licensee may carry a maximum of 30 PDH units forward into the subsequent renewal period.

(b) Continuing education obtained by the licensee shall meet either of the following criteria:

- (1) Maintain, improve, or expand technical professional skills and knowledge obtained before initial licensure; or
- (2) develop new and relevant technical professional skills and knowledge. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013 and 74-7025; effective March 1, 1996; amended Feb. 4, 2000.)

66-14-6. Exemptions. A licensee may be exempt, upon board review and approval, from continuing education requirements in any of the following situations:

- (a) The new licensee's first renewal period is less than two years from the original date of licensure.
- (b) A licensee is called to active duty in the armed forces of the United States for a period of time exceeding 120 consecutive days in a calendar year. This individual may be exempt from obtaining the 15 professional development hours (PDH) required only during that year.
- (c) A licensee experiences physical disability, illness, or other extenuating circumstances. The licensee shall provide supporting documentation for the board's review and approval. If the licensee elects to return to practice, the licensee shall earn professional development hours for each year exempted, not to exceed 30 PDH.

(d) A licensee lists the licensee's occupation as retired on the board-approved renewal form and certifies that the licensee is not currently practicing a technical profession. If the licensee elects to return to practice, the licensee shall earn professional development hours for each year exempted, not to exceed 30 PDH. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 1998 Supp. 74-7013 and 74-7025; effective March 1, 1996; amended Feb. 4, 2000.)

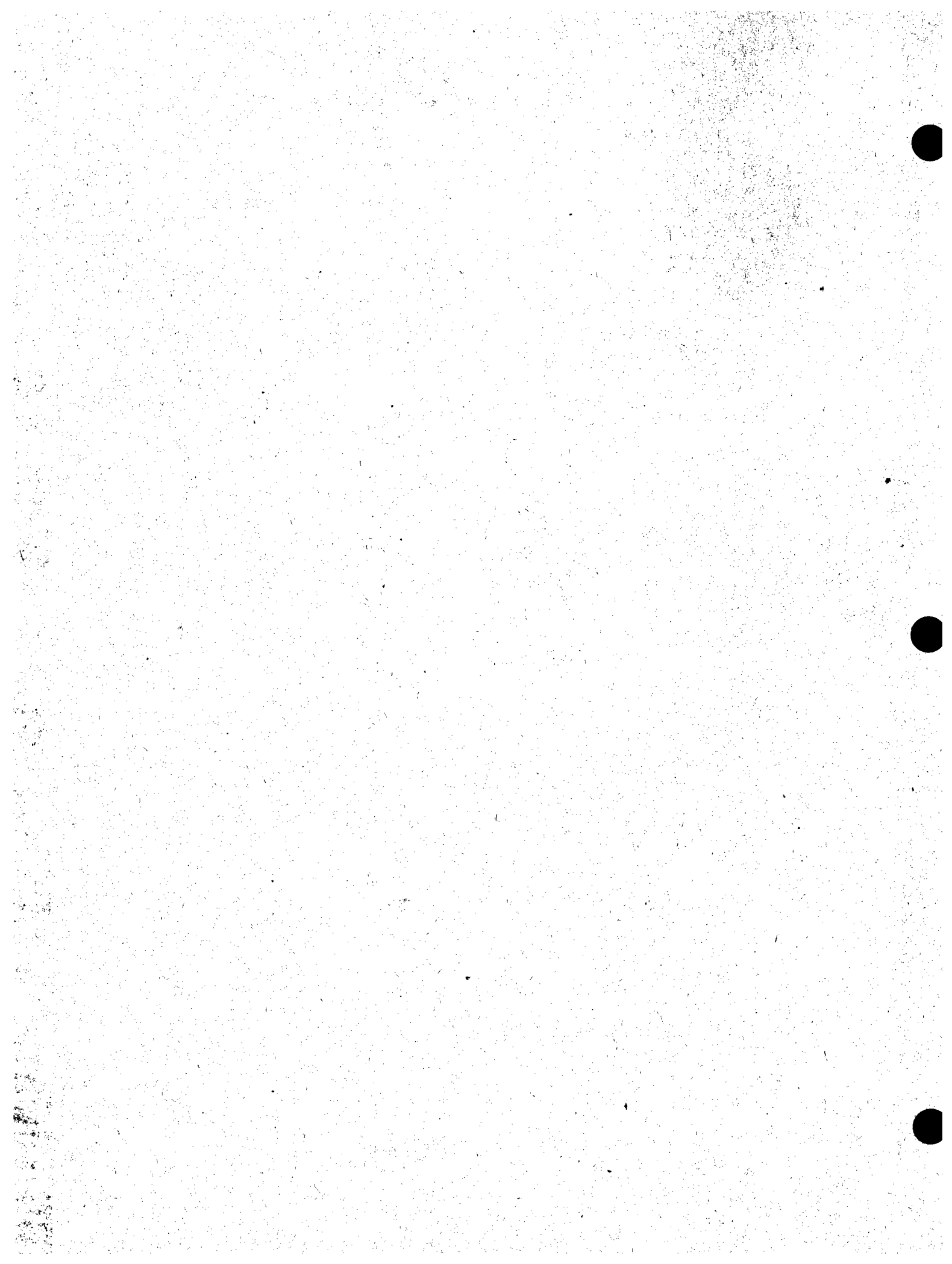

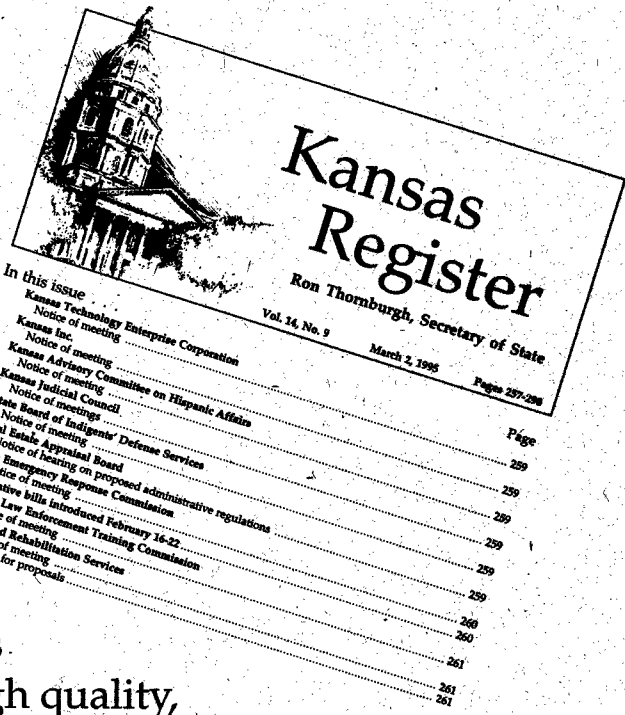
