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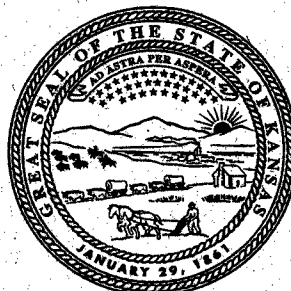

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Thursday, February 24, in the conference room in the offices of Kansas Development Finance Authority, Suite 1000, Jayhawk Tower, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, on the proposal for the Kansas Development Finance Authority to issue its Agricultural Development Revenue Bond for the project numbered below in the respective maximum principal amount. The bond will be issued to assist the respective borrower named below (who will be the owner and operator of the project) to finance the cost in the amount of the bond of acquiring the project or for the purpose of refunding a bond previously issued to finance the project. The project shall be located as shown:

**Project No. 000427, Maximum Principal Amount: \$96,000.** Owner/Operator: Mark L. and Anissa L. Kats. Description: Acquisition of 320 acres of agricultural land and related improvements and equipment to be used by the owner/operator for farming purposes. The project is located at the Southeast Quarter of Section 5, Township 6, Range 19 and the Northeast Quarter of Section 8, Township 6, Range 19, Rooks County, Kansas, approximately 10 miles west of Stockton on Highway 24, then 7.5 miles north on unmarked gravel road.

The bond, when issued, will be a limited obligation of the Kansas Development Finance Authority and will not constitute a general obligation or indebtedness of the State of Kansas or any political subdivision thereof, including the Authority, nor will it be an indebtedness for which the faith and credit and taxing powers of the State of Kansas are pledged. The bond will be payable solely from amounts received from the respective borrower, the obligation of which will be sufficient to pay the principal of, interest and redemption premium, if any, on the bond when it becomes due.

All individuals who appear at the hearing will be given an opportunity to express their views, and all written comments previously filed with the Authority at its offices at Suite 1000, Jayhawk Tower, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66603, will be considered. Additional information regarding the project described above may be obtained by contacting the Authority.

Any individual affected by the above-described project may, at or prior to the hearing, file a written request with the Authority that a local hearing be held on the proposal to issue a bond to finance said project. A local hearing, if requested, would be conducted in the county where the project in question is located.

## Notice of Available Grant Funding

Applications for the Edward Byrne Memorial State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Grant Program are available. This grant program was established by the Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988 and the Crime Control Act of 1990.

The State of Kansas will be awarded funding by the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance, which will be sub-granted to Kansas criminal justice agencies to assist their efforts in combating illicit drug use, violent crime and system improvement needs.

Cities, counties, state agencies and native Indian tribes are eligible to receive grant funding. Program areas for which applicants can apply include prevention, enforcement, treatment, criminal interdiction, adjudication and criminal justice information systems improvement.

Applicants are required to provide at least 25 percent of the total amount requested (local matching funds). The percent of the local matching funds is contingent on the number of years a grant has been funded.

The Byrne grant allows for the possibility of four years of funding in a program area. Program areas are described in the grant application.

Grants operate on a reimbursement basis. Sub-recipients will be reimbursed the federal portion for authorized expenditures. Reimbursements are processed monthly.

The grant award period will be from July 1, 2000 to June 30, 2001. Applications must be postmarked not later than April 28 to the address listed below. Grant awards will be announced before June 30, 2000.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed  
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, April 18, at the office of the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts, 235 S. Topeka Blvd., Topeka, to consider the proposed adoption of one new rule and regulation and nine amended rules and regulations dealing with respiratory therapy.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed respiratory therapy rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit comments prior to the hearing to the Board of Healing Arts at the address above. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed rules and regulations and the economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Melissa Kipp at (785) 368-6425. Handicapped parking is located at the west end of the Hutton Building, and the northwest entrance to the building is accessible.

During the 1999 legislative session, the Legislature passed House Bill No. 2215 that resulted in changing the credentialing status for respiratory therapists from registration to licensure. As a result of the credentialing

change, it has been necessary to change the rules and regulations pertaining to respiratory therapy. A summary of the proposed rules and regulations to be considered for adoption follows:

**K.A.R. 100-55-1. Application.** This regulation states that each applicant for a license shall submit an application on a form provided by the board and identifies what information shall be required.

**K.A.R. 100-55-2. Education requirements.** This regulation indicates that the board shall maintain a list of approved educational programs in respiratory therapy. In determining whether an educational program should be approved, accreditation by the committee on accreditation for respiratory care or its predecessor at the time of applicant's graduation may be considered by the board.

**K.A.R. 100-55-3. Examinations.** This regulation identifies the examinations necessary to practice respiratory therapy and the qualifications necessary to pass the examinations.

**K.A.R. 100-55-4. Fees.** This regulation specifies the fee amounts to be collected by the board for an application, renewal, late renewal, reinstatement, certified copy of license, special permit and temporary license.

**K.A.R. 100-55-5. Unprofessional conduct; defined.** This regulation defines 24 instances of unprofessional conduct.

**K.A.R. 100-55-6. Licensure; renewal; late renewal and reinstatement.** This regulation states when a license to practice respiratory therapy shall expire. The regulation further explains the requirements for renewal, reinstatement and late renewal.

**K.A.R. 100-55-7. Continuing education; license renewal.** This regulation specifies the continuing education requirements that shall be submitted with a license renewal.

**K.A.R. 100-55-8. Reinstatement; expired and revoked licenses.** This regulation defines the continuing education requirements necessary for reinstatement of an expired and revoked respiratory therapy license.

**K.A.R. 100-55-9. Special permits.** This regulation states who shall hold a special permit and how long the permit is valid. The regulation also specifies what information each student shall provide to the board during October of each year in order to meet the requirements for the special permit.

**K.A.R. 100-55-11. Delegation and supervision.** This regulation identifies when a licensed respiratory therapist may delegate respiratory therapy procedures to an unlicensed person; identifies the criteria that shall be used when delegating those procedures to the unlicensed person; identifies the responsibilities of the licensed respiratory therapist; and identifies what is included in the supervision of an unlicensed person by a licensed respiratory therapist.

**Wildlife and Parks Commission****Notice of Hearing on Proposed  
Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted by the Wildlife and Parks Commission at 7 p.m. Thursday, March 16, at the Holiday Inn Express, 420 Parkview Drive, Pittsburg, to consider the approval and adoption of proposed regulations of the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks.

A workshop meeting on business of the Wildlife and Parks Commission will begin at 1:30 p.m. March 16 at the location listed above. The meeting will recess at 5 p.m., then resume at 7 p.m. at the same location for the regulatory hearing. There will be public comment periods at the beginning of the afternoon and evening meetings for any issues not on the agenda, and additional comment periods will be available during the meeting on agenda items. Old and new business also may be discussed at this time. If necessary to complete the hearing or other business matters, the commission will reconvene at 9 a.m. March 17 at the same location.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Cindy Baugh, commission secretary, at (316) 672-5911. Persons with a hearing impairment may call the TDD service at 1-800-766-3777 to request special accommodations.

This 30-day notice period prior to the hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on proposed exempt regulations.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the chairman of the commission, Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, Suite 502, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable

opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for approving, amending and approving, or rejecting the proposed regulations.

The exempt regulations that will be heard during the regulatory hearing portion of the meeting, in addition to other administrative regulations for which notice was provided in the January 13, 2000 Kansas Register, are as follows:

**K.A.R. 115-25-5.** This proposed exempt regulation establishes hunting unit boundaries, bag limits, application periods and season dates for the 2000 fall firearm and archery wild turkey season. The proposed regulation makes no substantive changes from the 2000 fall turkey seasons.

**Economic Impact Summary:** It is anticipated that a total of 4,000 fall turkey hunting permits of all types will be issued, which would create \$79,800 in revenue. The department estimates over 20,000 days of hunting activity would occur, thus providing economic benefit to businesses providing goods and services.

**K.A.R. 115-25-7.** This proposed exempt regulation establishes hunting units, bag limits, application periods, and season dates for the 2000 firearm and archery antelope seasons. Unlimited archery permits are proposed for the archery unit, and 80 permits are proposed for each of the two firearm units.

**Economic Impact Summary:** It is anticipated that 310 antelope permits may be authorized, which would generate \$11,000 in revenue. Approximately 775 days of hunting activity may occur, thus providing economic benefit to businesses providing goods and services.

**K.A.R. 115-25-9.** This proposed exempt regulation establishes hunting bag limits, application periods and season dates for the 2000 firearm and archery deer seasons. The proposed new changes to the regulation would lengthen the firearms deer season by establishing a 14-day antlerless-only season in January, which would result in more deer being taken by hunters and a higher harvest of female deer. The proposed regulation also would establish a new two-day season on September 30 and October 1 for youth and people with disabilities.

**Economic Impact Summary:** It is anticipated that 180,000 deer hunting permits and game tags will be authorized, with estimated revenue of \$4 million. Approximately 700,000 days of hunting activity by 100,000 hunters are anticipated, which, based on survey estimates, may generate \$51 million of economic benefit to businesses providing goods and services.

Notice of Permanent Quarantine Order

The Kansas Department of Agriculture, following a public hearing held on January 21, 2000, has established a Permanent Quarantine Order, effective January 31, 2000, prohibiting the movement of all plants, plant products and nursery stock, as defined by K.S.A. 2-2113 (d) and (e), from property located at 21650 Mission Road, Bucyrus, Kansas, the actual legal description of which is: The North one-half (N 1/2) of the South 106.66 acres of the Northeast Quarter (NE 1/4) of Section 21, Township 15, Range 25, Miami County, Kansas, containing 53 1/2 acres, more or less.

Any person who moves plants, plant products or nursery stock from the property will be in violation of the Permanent Quarantine Order. Violators of the order shall be subject to criminal penalties under the Kansas Plant Pest Act, K.S.A. 2-2113 et seq.

Leonard Rogers operates a nursery business known as Ridgeview Turf and Tree Farm, also known as Mission Road Sod Farm, on this property owned by Tracy L. Cook and her husband Marc Cook. The plants, plant products and nursery stock on this property have been found to be infested with field bindweed, quackgrass, musk thistle and Johnson grass, all of which are weeds that injure plants and plant products. The Permanent Quarantine Order will be in effect until the secretary deems that the property is free of the weeds, or until the order is otherwise modified or rescinded by the secretary.

Notice of Workforce Investment Act  
Service Delivery Area IV 2000-2004  
Local Workforce Investment Plan

The Workforce Investment Act (WIA) of 1998 represents a major reform and restructuring of the nation's federal job training programs. The purpose of this legislation is to enable each state and locality to develop a unified training system that will increase the employment, retention and earnings by participants, and as a result improve the quality of the workforce, reduce welfare dependency and enhance the productivity and competitiveness of the nation. WIA is to be implemented in Kansas on July 1, 2000, with the repeal of the Job Training Partnership Act. In addition to authorizing the development of state and local workforce investment systems, WIA provides funds to states to establish programs that prepare youth, adults and dislocated workers for entry or reentry into the workforce.

Under WIA, each state is divided into workforce investment areas, which in Kansas are known as Service Delivery Areas (SDAs). Within each SDA, a governing structure is established between local elected officials and a local Workforce Investment Board (WIB) that is composed of appointed business and other mandated sector representatives. This governing structure is responsible for setting policy for the portion of the statewide workforce investment system within the SDA. SDA IV is located in south central Kansas and is comprised of Butler, Cowley, Harper, Kingman, Sedgwick and Sumner counties.

Section 118(a) of WIA specifies that each local WIB shall develop and submit to the Governor a comprehensive five-year local plan in partnership with the appropriate

chief elected official. Section 118(c) of the act mandates that prior to the submittal of the plan, the local WIB shall make available copies of the proposed plan to the public, allow members of the public, including representatives of business and labor organizations, to submit comments on the proposed plan, and to include in the plan submittal to the Governor any such comments that represent disagreement with the plan.

## Announcement of Plan Development and Content

In accordance with Sections 118 (a) and (c) of WIA, the local Workforce Investment Board of Service Delivery Area IV hereby gives public notice of its development of a comprehensive five-year plan to establish a workforce development system in SDA IV. This system is designed to increase the employment, retention, earnings and occupational skill attainment of area job seekers. The SDA IV five-year plan includes: (1) an identification of the area's workforce investment needs, the area's current and projected employment opportunities, and the job skills necessary to obtain such employment opportunities; (2) a description of the one-stop delivery system to be established in the area; (3) a description of the measures to be used to assess the performance of the system and providers; (4) a description and assessment of the type and availability of adult and dislocated worker employment and training activities in the area; (5) a description of how the WIB will coordinate area workforce investment activities with statewide rapid response activities; (6) a description and assessment of the type and availability of youth activities in the area; (7) a description of the public comment process; (8) identification of the entity responsible for the disbursement of grant funds; (9) a description of the process used to award grants and contracts in the area; and (10) other information required by the Governor.

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday, April 12, in Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed rule and regulation of the Division of Facilities Management, Department of Administration, on a permanent basis.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Administration, Room 263-E, State Capitol, 300 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

**K.A.R. 1-49-1, Personal conduct limitations and animal restrictions**, establishes standards for personal conduct in a number of state-owned facilities in Shawnee County that are under the control and management of the Secretary of Administration. Two substantive amendments to K.A.R. 1-49-1 are proposed. First, the list of covered, state-owned facilities is being updated by adding the Dillon House, which is located at 404 S.W. 9th. Second, the regulation is amended to prohibit individuals from bringing animals into any of the covered facilities, with two exceptions. Guide dogs, hearing assistance dogs and service dogs are permitted in these facilities for the purpose of assisting disabled persons. In addition, upon the request of a state agency, the Secretary of Administration may permit an individual to bring animals into any of these facilities when doing so will assist the state agency in attaining an objective or goal that bears a valid relationship to powers and functions of the state agency.

The proposed amendments to K.A.R. 1-49-1 are not anticipated to result in any economic impact on the Department of Administration, other state agencies or the general public, except that it may provide some savings in resources and staff time required for maintenance and repair of facilities damaged or soiled by animals brought into the buildings.

A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 11, in the MTAA conference room in the Air Terminal at Forbes Field, 6700 S. Topeka Blvd., Topeka, to consider the adoption of new regulations related to household hazardous waste (HHW) facilities.

The proposed new regulations will standardize facility design and operating requirements so that every HHW facility in Kansas is regulated in the same manner. HHW facilities are currently operating according to permits issued by the department. These permits are specifically written for each facility. Under the proposed new regulations, HHW facilities will continue to be permitted by the department but the new regulations will allow HHW managers more latitude in the day-to-day management of their facilities.

The regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulations follows.

**K.A.R. 28-29-1100. Household hazardous waste. General.** This proposed new regulation contains general requirements, definitions, small quantity generator waste requirements, provisions for collection of hazardous waste in emergency circumstances, and requirements for temporary collection events.

**K.A.R. 28-29-1101. Household hazardous waste facility design.** This proposed new regulation contains the requirements for HHW facility design.

**K.A.R. 28-29-1102. Household hazardous waste facility operations.** This proposed new regulation contains the requirements for handling nonhazardous household waste and household hazardous waste. It also contains requirements for storage, signs and training for HHW facility managers, employees and volunteers.

**K.A.R. 28-29-1103. Mobile HHW collection units.** This proposed new regulation contains requirements for each permitted facility that transports HHW from a temporary collection site or a satellite HHW facility to a permitted HHW facility.

**K.A.R. 28-29-1104. Satellite HHW facilities.** This proposed new regulation contains the requirements for permanent HHW collection sites that are located away from the central permitted HHW facilities.

**K.A.R. 28-29-1105. HHW reporting and recordkeeping.** This proposed new regulation contains the HHW reporting and record keeping requirements.

**K.A.R. 28-29-1106. HHW facility closure.** This proposed new regulation contains the HHW facility closure requirements.

**K.A.R. 28-29-1107. HHW permits.** This proposed new regulation contains the HHW permit application and permit modifications requirements.

The intent of these proposed HHW regulations is to prevent household hazardous waste from being disposed of in municipal solid waste landfills or improperly incinerated.

Fifty-three of the 68 HHW facilities that were contacted stated their HHW facilities would incur no additional expenses as a result of the proposed new HHW regulations. Fifteen HHW facilities stated they would have one-time and/or annual expenses due to the proposed new regulations. The average one-time expense for the 15 facilities was \$671.60, for a total one-time cost of \$10,074. The average annual expenditure for these 15 facilities was \$2,658.33, for a total annual cost of \$39,875.

The time period between publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing serves as the required public comment period of at least 60 days for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of new permanent regulations concerning the Kansas Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention Program - Pre-Renovation Education Rule. A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows.

The new regulations affect contractors, property managers and others who perform renovations for compensation in housing built before 1978. Renovators are required to distribute a renovation notice and a lead pamphlet to housing owners and occupants before renovation activities occur. Renovators also must obtain a confirmation of receipt of the lead pamphlet from the owner and occupants or a certificate of mailing from the post office. Finally, renovators must retain their records for three years.

**28-72-51. Definitions.** Defines key terms and words used in the regulations.

**28-72-52. Applicability.** Provides requirements for contractors and what activities are covered by this regulation.

**28-72-53. Confidential business information.** Provides information on safeguard of information by contractors.

**28-72-54. Information distribution requirements.** Provides requirements for contractors to distribute information to target housing owners and occupants.

**28-72-55. Recordkeeping requirements.** Provides minimum recordkeeping requirements for renovators.

Congress passed the Residential Lead-based Paint Hazard Act of 1992 and the EPA published the implementing regulations in the Federal Register (40 CFR), August 29, 1996, which gives individual states and Indian tribes the opportunity to establish and operate lead-based paint pre-renovation education rule programs for contractors involved in remodeling and renovation activities in target housing. K.S.A 1999 Supp. 65-1,202(e) authorizes the secretary to adopt rules and regulations regarding the distribution of lead hazard information to owners and occupants of housing prior to conducting renovation activities in housing. If Kansas does not establish this program, the EPA will administer a federal program within the state. If the EPA would administer the lead-based paint pre-renovation education program, Kansas will be subject to the following issues:

(a) An estimated \$50,000 a year in grant funds will be retained by the EPA; and

(b) Kansas remodeling and renovation contractors would be inspected by the EPA under federal rules.

The estimated costs for lead activity professionals is an additional \$2 to \$4 per transaction. These costs include the distribution of the lead pamphlet, *Protect Your Family from Lead in Your Home*. The maximum cost per pamphlet is \$.25. These costs also include familiarization, information disclosure and obtaining required signatures, record

keeping and materials cost. The transaction costs transferred from the lead activity professionals to the consumer are estimated to average \$4 per unit. It is impossible to estimate how many units would be affected by this rule at this time.

The time period between publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing serves as the required public comment period of at least 60 days for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Barry Brooks, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Bureau of Consumer Health, Mills Building, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka, 66612, (785) 296-5606. Complete copies of the regulations and the economic impact statement also may be obtained by contacting Barry Brooks.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five days in advance of the hearing by contacting Barry Brooks.

to purchase a lottery ticket. If the employee fails to ask adult customers for the purchase of a lottery ticket and the customer brings it to the clerk's attention before leaving the premises, the retailer shall give the adult customer one \$1.00 instant lottery ticket at no charge.

(c) All retailer employees at each location shall wear promotional buttons and display special point-of-sale materials provided by the lottery each Wednesday from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. during the promotion announcing the promotion to its customers. These promotional materials consist of:

(1) A tent card to be displayed at the point where tickets are sold.

(2) A window/monitor banner to be displayed at the front entrance of the business and/or below the lottery information display system monitor.

(3) Promotion specific buttons.

These materials must be on display during all hours of the promotion at the times and dates established in subsections (b) and (c) for a store to be eligible for a prize.

(d) The Kansas lottery will provide each location with a credit of \$25. This will be credited to each store's account at the end of the promotion after each location has complied with all requirements of the promotion.

(e) Any tickets given away above the \$25 allowance representing 25 tickets per location will be the responsibility of Coastal stores.

(f) Each retail location shall maintain a ticket log form to be completed every time a lottery ticket is given away. The log will be picked up by the Kansas lottery district manager servicing the retailer location at the end of the promotion.

(g) At the end of the promotion, the store with the greatest percentage increase in total lottery ticket sales for the period from March 1, 2000, through March 31, 2000, over the base sales period will win credit for one pack of instant lottery tickets valued at \$285. Promotional items will also be awarded to the first, second, and third place stores based on the percentage increase in total lottery sales over the base sales period. The base sales period for each store shall be total sales from March 1, 1999, through March 31, 1999. **111-2-107. "Ask for the sale" promotion.** (a) During the period beginning March 1, 2000, and ending March 31, 2000, in addition to compensation provided for in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery also offers all Pumpmart stores located in Kansas an opportunity to participate in a bonus retailer "ask for the sale" incentive promotion of lottery tickets.

(b) On each Wednesday in March 2000, including March 1, 8, 15, 22 and 29, all Pumpmart store personnel selling Kansas lottery tickets will ask every adult customer making a purchase if the customer would like to purchase a lottery ticket. If the employee fails to ask adult customers for the purchase of a lottery ticket and the customer brings it to the clerk's attention before leaving the premises, the retailer shall give the adult customer one \$1.00 instant lottery ticket at no charge.

(c) All retailer employees at each location shall wear promotional buttons and display special point-of-sale

materials provided by the lottery each Wednesday from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. during the promotion announcing the promotion to its customers. These promotional materials consist of:

(1) A tent card to be displayed at the point where tickets are sold.

(2) A window/monitor banner to be displayed at the front entrance of the business and/or below the lottery information display system monitor.

(3) Promotion specific buttons.

These materials must be on display during all hours of the promotion at the times and dates established in subsections (b) and (c) for a store to be eligible for a prize.

(d) The Kansas lottery will provide each location with a credit of \$25. This will be credited to each store's account at the end of the promotion after each location has complied with all requirements of the promotion.

(e) Any tickets given away above the \$25 allowance representing 25 tickets per location will be the responsibility of Pumpmart stores.

(f) Each retail location shall maintain a ticket log form to be completed every time a lottery ticket is given away. The log will be picked up by the Kansas lottery district manager servicing the retailer location at the end of the promotion.

(g) At the end of the promotion, the store with the greatest percentage increase in total lottery ticket sales for the period from March 1, 2000, through March 31, 2000, over the base sales period will receive credit for one pack of instant lottery tickets valued at \$285. Promotional items will also be awarded to the first, second, and third place stores based on the percentage increase in total lottery sales over the base sales period. (b) The winner awareness sales promotion will commence at 6:00 a.m. on Wednesday, March 1, 2000, and end at the end of the business day as defined at K.A.R. 111-6-1 on Friday, March 31, 2000.

(c) Beginning March 1, 2000, and concluding March 31, 2000, the lottery will conduct a "Starburst" promotion at the Felts Oil corporate stores listed in subsection (a). The stores must place a starburst decal on a visible wall or counter for every winning instant or on-line ticket that is redeemed at that retailer which wins \$10 or more. Each starburst placed should contain, where possible, the name of the winner, the amount won, and the ticket itself.

(d) For every 10 winning starbursts placed in a visible location at the retail establishment, the retailer will receive the lottery's choice of a lottery t-shirt or hat, with a maximum of 10 items per store. For every 25 winning starbursts placed in a visible location at the retail establishment, that retailer will be entered into a drawing for a prize from the lottery. The grand prize is credit for a pack of instant tickets, second prize is credit for \$50 of instant tickets, and third prize is credit for \$25 in instant tickets. (b) The winner awareness sales promotion will commence at 6:00 a.m. on Wednesday, March 1, 2000, and end at the end of the business day as defined at K.A.R. 111-6-1 on Friday, March 31, 2000.

(c) Beginning March 1, 2000, and concluding March 31, 2000, the lottery will conduct a "Starburst" promotion at all the T&E Oil Pump & Pantry corporate stores. The stores must place a starburst decal on a visible wall or counter for every winning instant or on-line ticket that is redeemed at that retailer which wins \$10 or more. Each starburst placed should contain, where possible, the name of the winner, the amount won, and the ticket itself.

(d) For every 10 winning starbursts placed in a visible location at the retail establishment, the retailer will receive the lottery's choice of a lottery t-shirt or hat, with a maximum of 10 items per store. For every 25 winning starbursts placed in a visible location at the retail establishment, that retailer will be entered into a drawing for a prize from the lottery. The grand prize is credit for a pack of instant tickets, second prize is credit for \$50 of instant tickets, and third prize is credit for \$25 in instant tickets. ### Article 3.—INSTANT GENERIC GAME RULES

**111-3-1. Definitions.** The following definitions apply to all instant ticket games: (a) "Bare arm technique" means a type of drawing in which the person drawing the winning ticket from the receptacle or drum wears a short-sleeved (sleeve not extending past the elbow) or a no-sleeve shirt which exposes the drawer's bare arm, or a long-sleeved shirt rolled up past the elbow and looks away from the drawing drum or receptacle while drawing.

(b) "Book" means a pack of fanfolded instant game tickets which are attached to each other by perforations, which perforations the retailer tears when selling a ticket from the book.

(c) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. The book-ticket number is a number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the ticket below the bar code and above the space for the player's name and address.

(d) "Claimant" means a holder of a ticket who presents it for payment of a prize, whether or not the holder may have an obligation to share the prize.

(e) "Co-sponsor drawings" are the acts of drawing for prizes which may be held subsequent to the lottery drawings.

(f) "Co-sponsor(s)" means the person, retailer or organization designated by the executive director to assist in organizing and participating in the lottery drawings.

(g) "Drawings" are the acts of drawing prizes conducted by the Kansas lottery.

(h) "Drum" means a container which can be sealed and rotated for the purpose of mixing, and into which instant tickets are placed for the purpose of drawing preliminary and/or final drawing winners.

(i) "Executive director" means the executive director of the Kansas lottery, or the person designated by the executive director.

(j) "Instant game" means a lottery game in which a ticket is purchased by a player and the player can immediately determine whether he or she has won a prize by removing the removable covering on the ticket and comparing the exposed play numbers or symbols with those specified as winners in the published game rules for that instant game.

(k) "Lottery retailer" or "retailer" means a person or business authorized by the lottery to sell lottery tickets.

(l) "Lottery security" means the lottery security officer or a certified law enforcement officer(s) designated by the executive director or the person designated by the executive director.

(m) "Non-winning ticket" means any valid Kansas instant game lottery ticket not eligible to win a prize under any specific instant game rules, but which may be eligible for a lottery drawing.

(n) "Participant" means any person, player, or contestant participating in a lottery game and anyone designated by a prize winner to appear on his or her behalf for

any lottery game including any lottery drawing or televised draw show. In the event the prize winner or his or her designee fails to appear for a drawing or televised draw show, the executive director may designate an adult who may be a member of his staff to participate on behalf of the non-appearing prize winner. Any prize won by a participant appearing through a designee shall be payable to and delivered to the prize winner as provided by these rules and regulations.

(o) "Play area" is the portion of the front of each instant game ticket where the play or game symbols appear. It is covered by a removable layer of material which is intended to be removed ("scratched off") by the player to reveal the play or game symbols.

(p) "Play symbols" or "game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket holder is entitled to a prize.

(q) "Play symbol captions" or "game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words printed beneath each play or game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the play or game symbol. The play or game symbol caption associated with each play or game symbol is designated by the rules of the game.

(r) Prize tiers:

(1) "Low-tier prize" means a lottery instant game prize not exceeding \$599.00.

(2) "High-tier prize" means a lottery instant game prize in excess of \$599.00.

(s) "Receptacle" means a container in which non-winning Kansas instant game lottery tickets are placed and from which the drawings are made. Receptacles may be sealable and capable of being mixed.

(t) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer may use this code to confirm winners which are validated through the terminal and to be paid by the retailer.

(u) "Special event" means a drawing or other method of awarding an additional prize or prizes within a group of lottery instant game winners as defined by the rules for a particular instant game.

(v) "Ticket holder" or "holder" means the person who has possession of an unsigned ticket or the person whose signature appears in the area upon a ticket designated for signature.

(w) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. The ticket validation number appears under the removable covering on the front of each instant ticket.

(x) "Activated book" means book or pack of instant tickets activated on the lottery's computer system, which is available for sale to the public by a lottery retailer.

(y) "Consigned book" or "consigned pack" means a full book or pack of instant tickets sealed in shrink wrap and delivered to a certified Kansas lottery retailer, which is designated on the lottery's computer system as consigned and has not been made available to the public.

(z) "Partial pack" means a book or pack of instant tickets which has been activated, whether or not any of the tickets from the pack have been sold and whether or not

the pack has been settled, or a pack not yet activated but upon which the shrink wrap or other seal has been broken or damaged.

(aa) "End-of-game date" means the date announced by the executive director as the last date for consignment of tickets, which date shall be 180 days prior to the expiration date of the game unless otherwise specified by the executive director.

(bb) "Expiration date" means the last date an instant ticket may be validated and eligible to win a prize, which date shall be 180 days following the end-of-game date as announced by the executive director, unless otherwise specified by the executive director. **111-3-35. Return of unsold tickets.** (a) A retailer may return consigned books of unsold tickets anytime during the game and up until 180 days after the announced end of game date designated by the executive director. No tickets shall be consigned to a retailer after the end-of-game date announced by the executive director, and no consigned packs shall be activated after 30 days from the end-of-game date.

(b) A retailer may not return partial packs of tickets to the lottery until 30 days after the end-of-game date. A retailer shall make a good faith effort to have all unsold partial packs and unsold individual tickets for that game returned to the lottery no later than 60 days following the announced end-of-game date.

(c) In the event the executive director announces the termination of an instant game and cessation of sales to the public by retailers on a specific date, the lottery may reimburse retailers for activated books of unsold tickets for that specific game.

(d) Should a retailer contract be terminated or the retailer prohibited from selling instant tickets prior to the expiration of the game, the lottery may reimburse that specific retailer for all activated books of tickets of each active game.

(e) In any situation in which the lottery will reimburse a retailer for returned books of tickets, the amount of credit shall be based upon the actual price paid for the tickets by the retailer, multiplied by the number of returned books and/or tickets as counted by the lottery.

(f) Upon return of any tickets, the lottery shall provide the retailer with a receipt for the tickets returned. The retailer shall retain a copy of the receipt and shall be required to produce the receipt in the event of any claims the retailer may make regarding the tickets returned. **111-4-1622. Definitions.** The following definitions shall apply to the "Joker's Wild" instant lottery game:

(a) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the play symbols are printed in black ink with matching captions. A play symbol appears in each of six play spots within the play area. Each play symbol for this instant game is one of the following: \$1.<sup>00</sup> - \$2.<sup>00</sup> - \$4.<sup>00</sup> - \$8.<sup>00</sup> - \$12.<sup>00</sup> - \$20.<sup>00</sup> - \$50.<sup>00</sup> - \$1000 - 3 - 4 - 5 - 6 - 7 - 8 - 9 - 10 - J - Q - K - A - symbol of a joker.

Determination of instant prize winners.** An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal two "DRAW CARDS" and four "YOUR CARDS" play symbols and captions. If any of the "YOUR CARDS" match either of the "DRAW CARDS," the player wins the prize shown. If a "JOKER" is revealed in any of the "YOUR CARDS," the player wins all four prizes shown. ## SENATE BILL No. 39

The provisions of this subsection shall not apply to the appropriation for the department of education for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2000,

made by section 57(a) of chapter 132 of the 1999 Session Laws of Kansas from the state general fund in the KPERS—employer contributions account.

(c) On the effective date of this act, of the \$91,696,756 appropriated for the department of education for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2000, made by section 57(a) of chapter 132 of the 1999 Session Laws of Kansas from the state general fund in the KPERS—employer contributions account, there is hereby lapsed the amount equal to the total of (1) the amount that is budgeted for the payment of the cost of the plan of death and long-term disability benefits under subsection (4) of K.S.A. 74-4927 and amendments thereto, as would normally be determined on or before March 31, 2000, for payment by transfer normally on or after April 1, 2000, from the KPERS—employer contributions account of the state general fund to the Kansas public employees retirement fund in accordance with K.S.A. 74-4939 and amendments thereto, with adjustments for prior payments by transfer, and (2) the amount that is budgeted for the payment of the cost of the plan of death and long-term disability benefits under subsection (4) of K.S.A. 74-4927 and amendments thereto, as would normally be determined on or before June 30, 2000, for payment by transfer normally on or after July 1, 2000, from the KPERS—employer contributions account of the state general fund to the Kansas public employees retirement fund, in accordance with K.S.A. 74-4939 and amendments thereto, with adjustments for prior payments by transfer. The amount lapsed by this subsection shall be determined by the director of the budget, in consultation with the staff of the department of education and the staff of the Kansas public employees retirement system, and shall be certified by the director of the budget to the director of accounts and reports.

(a) On the effective date of this act, all positions of officers or employees of each state agency named in chapter 132 of the 1999 Session Laws of Kansas that are vacant as of January 1, 2000, and that have been vacant for a continuous period of 48 months or more, as determined by the director of the budget in consultation with the director of personnel services, are hereby abolished and no moneys appropriated for any such state agency for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2000, from the state general fund or any special revenue fund by chapter 132 or 160 of the 1999 Session Laws of Kansas or by this or other appropriation act of the 2000 regular session of the legislature, shall be expended for any such abolished position.

(3) On July 1, 2002, and quarterly thereafter, the secretary of revenue shall certify to the director of accounts and reports the amount equal to 11% of the total revenues received by the secretary from the taxes imposed under the Kansas retailers' sales tax act and deposited in the state treasury and credited to the state general fund during the preceding three calendar months.

(4) On July 1, 2003, and quarterly thereafter, the secretary of revenue shall certify to the director of accounts and reports the amount equal to 11.25% of the total revenues received by the secretary from the taxes imposed under the Kansas retailers' sales tax act and deposited in the

state treasury and credited to the state general fund during the preceding three calendar months.

(5) On July 1, 2004, and quarterly thereafter, the secretary of revenue shall certify to the director of accounts and reports the amount equal to 12% of the total revenues received by the secretary from the taxes imposed under the Kansas retailers' sales tax act and deposited in the state treasury and credited to the state general fund during the preceding three calendar months.

(b) Upon receipt of each certification under subsection (a), the director of accounts and reports shall transfer from the state general fund to the state highway fund an amount equal to the amount so certified, on each July 1, October 1, January 1 and April 1, except that (1)(A) the amount of the transfer on each such date during state fiscal year 2000 shall not exceed the amount equal to 101.7% of the amount of the transfer on each such date during state fiscal year 1999 and (B) the aggregate amount of all such transfers during state fiscal year 2000 shall not exceed \$62,240,428; and (2) the amount of the transfer on each such date during state fiscal year 2001 shall not exceed the amount equal to 101.7% of the amount transferred on the same date during state fiscal year 2000. All transfers made pursuant to this section are subject to reduction under K.S.A. 75-6704, and amendments thereto.

(c) All transfers made in accordance with the provisions of this section

shall be considered to be demand transfers from the state general fund.

Sec. 74. *Appeals to exceed position limitations.* (a) The limitations imposed by this act on the number of full-time and regular part-time positions equated to full-time, excluding seasonal and temporary positions, paid from appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2000, made in this act or in any appropriation act of the 1999 regular session of the legislature or in any other appropriation act of the 2000 regular session of the legislature may be exceeded upon approval of the state finance council.

(b) The limitations imposed by this act on the number of full-time and regular part-time positions equated to full-time, excluding seasonal and temporary positions, paid from appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2001, made in this act or in any other appropriation act of the 2000 regular session of the legislature may be exceeded upon approval of the state finance council.

Sec. 75. *Appeals to exceed limitations.* Upon written application to the governor and approval of the state finance council, expenditures from special revenue funds may exceed the amounts specified in this act.

Sec. 76. K.S.A. 1999 Supp. 79-34,147 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 77. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.
