Executive Order No. 2000-08

WHEREAS, the Topeka Police Department is investigating a Homicide, Aggravated Burglary and Aggravated Battery that occurred at 1900 SE Washington, Topeka, Kansas, on September 19, 2000, at the home of 82 year old Raymond Aguirre and his wife, 80 year old Mabel Aguirre; and

WHEREAS, the suspect, described as a young black male, late teens to early 20s, 5'8", 160 lbs., with short afro, little or no facial hair, wearing a red sweater with white collar; and

WHEREAS, the suspect, after entering through a window in the bathroom, confronted the victims and asked them for money. When the victims told the suspect they had no money, the suspect became angry and began beating the victims until they were unconscious. The suspect then ransacked the house and stole checks and a gold-plated Seiko watch, and left through the back door of the residence; and

WHEREAS, the victims lay unconscious for many hours in pools of blood until their son found them the next day. Raymond Aguirre died October 14, 2000, as a result of the beating. Mabel Aguirre is now blind in one eye and has difficulty moving as a result of the beating; and

WHEREAS, all investigative leads have failed to develop any information to positively identify the assailant; and

WHEREAS, the offer of a reward will enhance the efforts of the agencies and officers involved in the investigation in this crime;

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of authority vested in me by K.S.A. 75-113, I, Bill Graves, Governor of the State of Kansas, do hereby offer a reward of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the individual who committed the Aggravated Burglary and Aggravated Battery of Raymond and Mabel Aguirre, and the Homicide of Raymond Aguirre.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order 2000-08, and shall become effective immediately.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Friday, January 12, in the lower level conference room at 1100 S.W. Wanamaker, Topeka, to consider the adoption of regulations 117-6-1, 117-6-2, 117-6-3, 117-6-4 and 117-7-1

on a permanent basis.

This 60-day notice of public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Kansas Real Estate Appraisal Board, 1100 S.W. Wanamaker, Suite 104, Topeka, 66604. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Michael Haynes at (785) 271-3373.

Copies of the regulations and their economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting the Kansas Real

Estate Appraisal Board. A summary of the proposed amendments to the regulations and the economic impact follows.

117-6-1. Continuing education; renewal requirements. This regulation is being amended to allow licensed/certified appraisers to receive credit for a course if it was taken in another state and was approved for continuing education credit by the Appraiser Licensing Board of that state. This would eliminate the need for course providers to receive approval from Kansas for courses that Kansas appraisers take in other states. This would have an economic impact to both appraisers and providers of education courses by allowing the provider to eliminate the course approval fee (\$50 per course) and the appraiser the cost of taking additional courses (\$125-\$300).

This regulation also is being amended to allow licensed/certified board members to receive continuing education credit for attending board meetings. This would have some economic impact to the board members by reducing their cost of continuing education (\$125-\$300).

This regulation is being further amended to allow licensed/certified appraisers to keep track of their own continuing education and eliminate the need for them to furnish the board with copies of course completion forms. This would have some economic impact to the board by eliminating the board receiving, logging and filing 3,000-4,000 pieces of paper annually.

117-6-2. Continuing education; approval of courses; requirements. This regulation is being amended to allow some Internet courses to be approved for continuing education credit by the board. This will have an economic impact to appraisers by eliminating the time away from work and any travel or costs associated with travel to attend a course.

117-6-3. Education; obtaining course approval. This regulation is being amended to eliminate the need for course providers of the Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice to furnish this manual to each student. This may have an economic impact on both the student and providers (since most of the providers charge an additional \$25 to the students to cover this cost). This amended regulation also will allow the board to deny or revoke approval of courses. It should have little or no economic impact to other state agencies or the general public.

117-6-4. Education; denial or revocation of course approval. This regulation is added to allow the board to deny or revoke approval of courses. It should have no economic impact to other state agencies, appraisers or the general public.

117-7-1. Fees. The amendments to this regulation increase the annual renewal fee for each licensed/certified appraiser by \$25 annually and would have an economic impact to all licensed/certified appraisers in Kansas.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Tuesday, January 9, in the conference room of the office of the State Bank Commissioner (OSCB), Division of Consumer and Mortgage Lending, Suite 300, Jayhawk Tower, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed revisions to K.A.R. 75-6-9 and the adoption of proposed regulation K.A.R. 75-6-32. These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. The proposed changes were drafted primarily in response to 1999 Substitute for Senate Bill 301 (1999 Kansas Session Laws, Chapter 107), which made substantial revisions to the Uniform Consumer Credit Code (UCCC).

K.A.R. 75-6-9 is a regulation that defines what the OSBC considers to be the meaning of "additional charges in connection with a consumer credit transaction." The prior language of the regulation stated that only those charges that occurred within one month before or after a consumer credit transaction were considered "in connection with" that transaction. However, various types of charges and, in particular, delinquency charges, may occur at any time during the life of the transaction. The proposed amendment restores logic and consistency to the regulation and places it in harmony with K.S.A. 16a-2-501. Consumers will now be protected by the limitations imposed by the UCCC on additional charges during the entire term of a consumer credit transaction and not just 30 days before and after a consumer credit transaction.

The proposed new regulation dealing with notification, K.A.R. 75-6-32, is to provide clear guidance to creditors about when notification forms should be filed with the State Bank Commissioner.

This 60-day notice of hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving public comments on the proposed regulations. Written comments should be submitted prior to the hearing to Kevin Glendening, administrator of the Kansas Uniform Consumer Credit Code, at the address above. Interested persons will be given reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views and arguments on the adoption of the proposed regulations; however, presentations should be in writing whenever possible.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Rebecca Sanders, Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, 66612-1678. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Rebecca Sanders at (785) 296-7811.

Copies of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting Rebecca Sanders. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

These regulations were not mandated by federal law. The entities most impacted are utilization review organizations and health insurance carriers that perform utilization review activities and consumers of health insurance.

The purpose of the proposed amended and new regulations is to reflect changes made by the American Accreditation Health Commission, a/k/a URAC, which is one of the major entities that accredits utilization review organizations nationally. These amended and new regulations also were proposed after consulting with the Utilization Review Advisory Committee. With the increase of managed care as a mechanism to deliver health care to consumers, many of these requirements are needed to safeguard consumers and ensure that they obtain the care

that they need. The economic impact on those entities that perform utilization review functions is justified in the protection of Kansas consumers.

K.A.R. 40-4-41. Utilization review organizations; application; definitions. The amendments to this particular regulation define the terms that are included in other utilization review regulations and are used in the utilization review process. Some of the definitions require individuals and entities that perform certain utilization review functions to possess certain credentials and be trained in utilization review procedures. These definitions could require the entities that perform utilization functions to hire new personnel who meet these qualifications or to provide additional training to existing personnel. This could result in additional costs.

K.A.R. 40-4-41b. Utilization review organizations; requirements for collecting information. The amendments to this regulation set out the standards and guidelines that utilization review organizations are to follow in collecting information to perform their utilization review functions. This regulation also sets out what information the utilization review organization shall use in making its utilization review decisions. The amendments could result in additional costs to the utilization review organizations in training their personnel in what information is to be collected and used in their decisions. Training personnel in organizing and obtaining the information could be needed so that it meets the requirements of the regulation.

K.A.R. 40-4-41c. Utilization review organizations; written procedures. The amendments to this regulation set out the procedures and deadlines that utilization review organizations are to follow in conducting utilization reviews. This regulation also gives the provider one day to discuss the decision with the peer reviewer after receiving the decision. It also sets out who is to be notified of a utilization review decision and what information should be contained in that decision. These requirements could result in additional costs to the utilization review organizations in designing and implementing these written procedures.

K.A.R. 40-4-41d. Utilization review organizations; appeal procedures. The amendments to this regulation set out the procedures and deadlines that utilization review organizations are to follow in conducting appeals of utilization review decisions. This regulation also gives the provider access to the reviewer who conducted the review a day after receiving the decision to discuss the decision with the reviewer. This regulation also sets out the credentials that reviewers are to have in conducting these appeals. The amendments could result in additional costs to the utilization review organizations in training their personnel in what procedures need to be followed in conducting utilization reviews. Additional costs also could be incurred in having properly credentialed individuals on staff to conduct these appeals.

K.A.R. 40-4-41e. Utilization review organizations; staff requirements. The amendments to this regulation set out what nonclinical staff of utilization review organizations can do and what qualifications and training they should

have. This regulation also sets out the procedures that should be followed by a utilization review organization conducting initial reviews. The regulation further sets out the procedure that should be followed when utilization review organizations perform peer clinical review. The amendments could result in additional costs to the utilization review organizations in training their personnel in what procedures need to be followed in conducting initial clinical reviews and peer clinical review. Additional costs also could be incurred in having properly credentialed individuals on staff to conduct peer clinical reviews and initial clinical reviews. Additional training costs may be incurred for nonclinical staff as to what tasks they should be performing and how they should be performed.

K.A.R. 40-4-41f. Utilization review organizations; review requirements. The amendments to this particular regulation add a requirement that utilization review organizations shall have a quality management program and what should be included in that quality management program. The amendments could result in additional costs to the utilization review organizations in implementing the quality management program.

K.A.R. 40-4-41g. Utilization review organizations; access to review staff. This regulation sets out the guidelines of the amount of access utilization review organizations should give to health care providers. The amendments add the requirement that, if requested, the utilization review organization shall verbally inform patients, hospitals and other health professionals of utilization review requirements and the general type of criteria used by the reviewing agent and the review procedures. This could result in some additional cost to utilization review organizations in training their personnel in this requirement and the time spent by personnel in fulfilling this requirement.

K.A.R. 40-4-41h. Utilization review organizations; subcontracting and delegation. This regulation sets out the criteria that need to be followed when utilization review organizations subcontract or delegate any of their functions. This could result in some additional cost to utilization review organizations in meeting those criteria when delegating or subcontracting their functions.

K.A.R. 40-4-41i. Utilization review organizations; program qualifications. This regulation sets out the criteria that scripted clinical screening or explicit clinical review criteria should meet if used by utilization review organizations. This could result in some additional cost to utilization review organizations in ensuring that, if they use explicit clinical review criteria or scripted clinical screening, it meets these criteria.

K.A.R. 40-4-41j. Utilization review organizations; written procedures to maintain confidentiality. This regulation requires that utilization review organizations have written polices and procedures to maintain confidentiality of patient-specific information and what criteria those written policies and procedure should contain. This could result in some additional cost to utilization review organizations in establishing and maintaining these procedures.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 14.—WHOLESALE DISTRIBUTORS

68-14-8. Wholesale distributors transaction. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of these regulations under article 14, a wholesale distributor, duly registered with the board, may sell or deliver to a layperson responsible for the control of an animal, a prescription-only drug to be administered to the animal only if a licensed veterinarian practitioner has issued, before the sale or delivery, a lawful written prescription or order for the prescription-only drug in the course of an existing, valid veterinarian-client-patient relationship as defined in K.S.A. 47-816 and amendments thereto. As used in these regulations under article 14, "wholesale distribution" shall include this transaction.

(1) Except as otherwise provided in this regulation, at the time the prescription-only drug leaves the registered location of the wholesale distributor, the wholesale distributor shall possess, at the registered location, a copy of the written prescription or order for the drug. (2) Except as otherwise provided in this regulation, at the time the prescription-only drug is delivered to the layperson, the person making the delivery shall possess a copy of the written prescription or order for the drug.

(3) The wholesale distributor shall retain, for a period of five years, a copy of the written prescription or order in a manner that makes it readily available for review by

a board representative.

(b) In lieu of receiving a written prescription or order from a licensed veterinarian practitioner before a prescription-only drug leaves the registered location, the wholesale distributor may accept a verbal order from a licensed veterinarian practitioner if all of the following conditions are met:

- (1) The licensed veterinarian practitioner has created a written prescription or order, but advised the wholesale distributor that, under the circumstances, it is not reasonably possible for the licensed veterinarian practitioner to provide the written prescription or order to the wholesale distributor before the prescription-only drug leaves the registered location.
- (2) The licensed veterinarian practitioner provides to the wholesale distributor all of the information required by K.A.R. 70-7-1(n) to be included in a written order for a prescription of legend drugs.

(3) The verbal order is received in a communication directly with the licensed veterinarian practitioner.

- (4) The wholesale distributor makes, at the time the verbal order is received, a written confirmation of the information provided by the licensed veterinarian practitioner and records the following information:
 - (A) The name of the licensed veterinarian practitioner;
- (B) the date and time the verbal order was received; and
- (C) the name of the person making the written confirmation.
- (5) At the time of receiving the verbal order, the wholesale distributor requests that the licensed veterinarian practitioner send a written prescription for the prescription-only drugs so that it is received by the wholesale distributor within 72 hours of receipt of the verbal order and, if it is not received, advises the Kansas board of veterinary examiners of this in writing.

(6) At the time the prescription-only drug leaves the registered location of the wholesale distributor, the wholesale distributor possesses, at the registered location,

the original written confirmation.

(7) At the time the prescription-only drug is delivered to the layperson responsible for the control of the animal, the person making the delivery possesses a copy of the written confirmation.

(8) The original written confirmation is maintained by the wholesale distributor for five years in a manner that makes it readily available for review by a board representative. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1630; implementing K.S.A. 1999 Supp. 65-1635(d); effective July 23, 1999; amended Nov. 27, 2000.)
