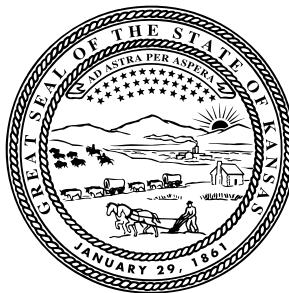

This regulation is proposed for adoption on a permanent basis.

**K.A.R. 7-39-1** would change the filing fee for statements of partnership authority from \$75 to \$20, creating a uniform fee for filing partnership statements. This regulation will have a minimal economic impact on governmental agencies or the general public.

This 60-day notice of public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation. Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday, September 26, in the auditorium of Memorial Hall, 120 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed rules and regulations of the Department of Administration, Division of Facilities Management, on a permanent basis.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Administration, Room 263-E, State Capitol, 300 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Faith Loretto at (785) 296-6000 or TTY (785) 296-4798. An accessible entrance to the Memorial Building is located just east of the main entrance on 10th Avenue. Handicapped parking is located on the east side of the building.

Summaries of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follow.

**K.A.R. 1-45-1.** Article 45 of the Department of Administration regulations addresses the parking of motor vehicles on state-owned and state-operated property in Shawnee County that is under the control of the Secretary of Administration. Article 45 does not apply to parking on the Statehouse grounds, which is addressed under Article 46 of these regulations. K.A.R. 1-45-1 contains general provisions relating to parking, including definitions and a prohibition against parking during certain hours on any state-owned or state-operated property in Shawnee County unless the vehicle displays a permit issued by the secretary. However, the regulation also lists certain property in Shawnee County that is not subject to the provisions of Article 45. Proposed amendments to K.A.R. 1-45-1 update that list. The former Topeka State Hospital is removed from the list, and references to the Kansas Reception and Diagnostic Center and the Youth Center at Topeka are updated to refer to the Department of Corrections and the Juvenile Justice Authority. In addition, a provision requiring a permit to park on the affected property during the hours of 8 a.m. to noon on Saturdays is eliminated.

No economic impact on the Department of Administration, other state agencies, those individuals who park on the state-operated and state-controlled parking facili-

ties covered by Article 45, or the general public is anticipated as a result of these changes. The list of properties that are not covered by the provisions of Article 45 is amended to more accurately reflect changes in the names of the facilities or the agency responsible for control of that property. This update does not affect the application of the regulations in Article 45 to those properties. Elimination of parking restrictions during the morning on Saturdays will not have any identifiable economic impact on either the administration or enforcement of parking regulations, but it may provide greater flexibility for individuals who wish to park near state facilities on Saturday mornings.

**K.A.R. 1-45-7.** This regulation establishes fees for parking permits issued for those state-owned and state-controlled parking facilities in Shawnee County that are covered by the regulations in Article 45 of the Department of Administration regulations. The existing regulation establishes a fee of \$10 per month for state agencies and \$4.62 per biweekly parking fee period for state employees. No fee is presently charged for individuals parking in spaces allotted for visitor parking.

Proposed amendments to K.A.R. 1-45-7 establish a new fee structure for parking in these facilities. State agencies will pay \$25 per month for reserved spaces (spaces with signs limiting use of the space to the identified official or agency) and \$20 per month for nonreserved spaces. State employees will pay an equivalent amount on a biweekly basis: \$11.54 per biweekly fee period for reserved spaces and \$9.24 per biweekly fee period for nonreserved spaces. In addition, an hourly fee of \$.60 will be charged for visitor parking in metered spaces.

These rate changes will provide funding to support improved safety and security measures for state parking facilities. In addition, the additional funding will support ongoing maintenance and repairs. Parking fees have not been increased during the last 15 years; the last fee increase took effect in July 1986. The proposed fees are comparable to or less expensive than other parking facilities in downtown Topeka.

It is estimated that the proposed fee increases will provide a total of \$362,500 in additional parking revenue for the support of improved safety and security measures for patrons of the parking facilities and for ongoing parking facility maintenance and repairs. No additional administrative costs are anticipated due to the new fee structure and the collection of fees from metered spaces; any additional work will be absorbed by existing staff. Moreover, the metered visitor parking spaces may facilitate the enforcement of posted limitations on visitor parking.

State agencies and state employees with parking permits will be responsible for paying the increased parking fees. In the case of state employees, the effect of the increase will be offset to some degree through participation in the pretax parking option, which is an Internal Revenue Code Section 125 plan offered by the state to its employees. Visitors to the Capitol Complex also will begin paying parking fees on an hourly basis. However, those rates are equivalent to the City of Topeka's hourly parking fees at city parking garages and for metered spaces on city streets. The use of parking meters may reduce the incidence of misuse of parking spaces by individuals who

exceed posted limits on visitor parking, thereby freeing up additional parking for other visitors to the Capitol Complex. No other economic impact on the general public is anticipated.

**K.A.R. 1-45-7a.** Under an agreement negotiated with the City of Topeka, the Department of Administration will assume responsibility for operating the new parking garage located between Kansas Avenue and Jackson Avenue and between 10th and 11th Streets. Separate fees must be established for the new parking garage to help ensure adequate revenue to meet debt service obligations. Under K.A.R. 1-45-7a, each state employee entering into a contract with the Department of Administration to park in the new garage would pay a biweekly parking fee of \$20.77 through payroll deduction. Additionally, K.A.R. 1-45-7a establishes a fee of \$45 per month for state agencies parking vehicles in the garage. The parking permits will provide for reserved spaces. Beginning with fiscal year 2003, the parking fees for state employees and state agencies will increase by 2 percent annually through fiscal year 2031. These increases reflect annual increases in the debt service schedule to retire the bonds on the parking garage.

It is not anticipated that there will be space available in the parking garage for members of the public. However, in case parking is offered to the general public in the future, K.A.R. 1-45-7a also establishes fees for members of the public. The fee for a member of the public to park in the garage would be \$0.60 per hour and \$5 per day for short-term parking. If parking permits are made available to the public, the monthly rate would be set in the parking permit contract. These rates will not exceed rates charged for monthly permits at city parking garages.

The Department of Administration will incur direct administrative and operational costs for the parking garage facility, which are estimated to be \$179,230 per fiscal year. The FY '02 debt service obligations are at \$531,481.53 and escalate 2 percent annually thereafter. The fees established by the regulation are necessary to recover these administrative and operating costs and to help repay the debt incurred by the Topeka Public Building Commission for the construction of this garage. At full capacity, the proposed fees would generate \$366,120 in the first year. However, the revenues in the first year will be somewhat lower as there is a phased schedule for moving agencies into the building.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Administration, Room 263-E, State Capitol, 300 S.W. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Faith Loretto at (785) 296-6000 or TTY (785) 296-4798. The north entrance to the Landon State Office Building is accessible. Handicapped parking is located at the south end of building, across the street from the north entrance to the building, and on Ninth Street just around the corner from the north entrance.

Summaries of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follow.

**K.A.R. 1-18-1a** prescribes the standards and requirements for reimbursement of expenses incurred when an employee uses a privately-owned conveyance on official business, including the mileage reimbursement rates for several types of vehicles. The amendments to this regulation, which are proposed on a permanent basis, implement the provisions of L. 2001, Ch. 109. Identical temporary amendments to K.A.R. 1-18-1a were previously adopted, effective July 2, 2001. Sections 2 and 3 of L. 2001, Ch. 109 amend K.S.A. 75-3203 and 75-3203a to remove the requirement that the Secretary of Administration fix and publish these mileage reimbursement rates through rules and regulations. Therefore, the amendments to K.A.R. 1-18-1a delete mileage reimbursement rates and instead provide that notification of the mileage reimbursement rates and changes to them will be provided by informational circulars published by the Department of Administration, Division of Accounts and Reports.

The proposed amendments to K.A.R. 1-18-1a have no fiscal impact on the Department of Administration, other state agencies, state employees, local units of government or the general public. The amendments do not establish a different mileage reimbursement rate. Rather, the

amendments implement a different method for setting those rates as provided in L. 2001, Ch. 109. State agencies and their employees, and any local governmental units within Kansas electing to use the state rates, will locate the rates for travel in privately-owned conveyances in informational circulars published by the Division of Accounts and Reports, rather than in the *Kansas Administrative Regulations* or the *Kansas Register*. Informational circulars have already served as a readily available supplemental notification source that has tended to be the primary source for most users of the rates.

## Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has received a Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) post-closure plan modification request from Farmland Industries Inc. regarding a closed landfarm at its petroleum terminal located at Route 2, P.O. Box 608, Phillipsburg. This landfarm is defined as a closed Hazardous Waste Land Treatment (HWLT) Unit and is under interim status with respect to RCRA Subtitle C having EPA Identification Number KSD007138605.

In 1980, Farmland Industries submitted Part A of a hazardous waste permit application and attained interim status as a hazardous waste treatment, storage and disposal facility. It operated a hazardous waste treatment facility at its Phillipsburg refinery from 1976 until November 1990. The Closure and Post-Closure Plan was submitted to KDHE as required by Title 40 Code of Federal Regulation (CFR) Part 265 Subpart G.

The proposed modification to the Post-Closure Plan consists of eliminating the requirement for annual soil sampling. The soil sampling requirement for facilities of this type is outlined in 40 CFR Part 265.280 (b) (6). Farmland contends and KDHE agrees that because no contamination of concern has been detected as a result of annual soil sampling from 1993 through 2000, and no additional contaminants are to be applied to this closed unit, this sampling should no longer be required. Semiannual groundwater sampling has been required since 1991, and Farmland does not propose to modify that requirement.

The proposal to modify the plan is based on CFR 265.118(d) in accordance with Kansas Administrative Regulation 28-31-8. Therefore, approval of the plan must follow CFR 265.118(f), which includes notification through a legal newspaper notice with a 30-day public comment period. Depending on the comments received, a public hearing may be held. The revised Post-Closure Plan and accompanying fact sheet are available for public review at the Phillipsburg City Library, 888 4th St., Phillipsburg, and at the Bureau of Waste Management, Building 740, second floor, Forbes Field, Topeka.

Written public comments on the revised plan must be postmarked during the 30-day public comment period, July 27 through August 27. Any request for a public hearing must be received by August 27. Notice of Hearing on Proposed  
Administrative Regulations

The Kansas Board of Emergency Medical Services will conduct a public hearing at 1 p.m. Tuesday, October 2, at the Pozez Education Center, Centennial Room A, 1505 S.W. 8th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of amendments to existing permanent Kansas administrative regulations and one proposed new administrative regulation.

The adoption of these regulations is not required by federal law nor is the board participating in or implementing a federally subsidized or assisted program relating to these proposed regulations changes.

This notice constitutes the initiation of a 60-day public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. Written comments may be submitted to David Lake, Administrator, Kansas Board of EMS, 109 S.W. 6th, Topeka, 66603-3826.

Individuals will be given a reasonable opportunity to orally present their views at the public hearing. A written summary of testimony should be provided. Oral presentations may be limited to five minutes, depending on the number of individuals desiring to provide testimony.

Any individual with a disability may request an accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five days in advance of the hearing by contacting David Lake. Accessible parking and an accessible entrance to the facility are located on the north side of the building.

A complete copy of the proposed rules and regulations and the economic impact statement may be obtained from the Kansas Board of Emergency Medical Services, (785) 296-7296 or TTY (785) 296-6237. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

**K.A.R. 109-9-1 and 109-9-4.** These two permanent regulations define criteria required for training and certification for instructor-coordinator (I-C) and are being presented for modification. The proposed changes to these administrative regulations will grant legal recognition to individuals who have successfully completed equivalent instructor training and credentials. These regulations are not mandated by federal law, and the Board of EMS is not currently involved with any federally subsidized or assisted programs affecting these regulations.

The economic impact of the proposed changes to the Board of EMS is staff time to review and verify equivalency. This review and verification also may create additional telephone and mailing costs. There is no anticipated economic impact to any other state agency.

Counties, cities and taxing districts will realize a savings in costs incurred for training, travel and subsistence to train an individual I-C provided the individual meets the legal recognition requirements.

Training programs that have an individual qualified to take advantage of the I-C legal recognition proposal will

realize decreased expenses in time away from work and for training, travel and subsistence to achieve final I-C certification. In the event that these costs must be assumed by individuals themselves, they also would realize decreased expenses for training, travel and subsistence for subsequent I-C certification. There is no other anticipated economic impact created because of the proposed changes to these two administrative regulations.

**K.A.R. 109-10-1.** This permanent administrative regulation defines curricula that must be taught for various levels of attendant and instructor initial courses. This regulation is not mandated by federal law, and the Board of EMS is not currently involved with any federally subsidized or assisted programs affecting this regulation. One of the proposed changes to this regulation will allow the endotracheal intubation portion of the required EMT-Intermediate course to be optional instead of mandated. This change is being made because some agencies do not desire to allow their people to perform endotracheal intubation. This portion of the course is time consuming and requires travel for some training programs to obtain this portion of training for their students. Additionally, the availability of this procedure in the clinical environment is becoming less prevalent. Many anesthesiologists are using less invasive techniques whenever possible.

The other proposed change to this regulation will adopt an abbreviated EMT-Basic course for individuals who are already certified first responders. There are portions of the first responder curriculum that is repeated in the full EMT-Basic course. This proposed abbreviated EMT-Basic curriculum will minimize the amount of redundancy between the two curricula.

The economic impact to the Board of EMS includes training I-Cs and board staff as to the differences and requirements of the proposed abbreviated course. Additional costs to the Board of EMS will be those associated with development of necessary forms and other course approval documents.

An economic impact of similar nature as that to the Board of EMS will be realized by the Board of Regents. Many of these courses will be offered by post-secondary educational institutions that will be desirous of gaining Board of Regents approval for college credit hours.

The economic impact to counties, cities, taxing districts, emergency service providers and individual first responders will be a reduction in costs for time away from work and reduced training costs to take the EMT-Basic training.

The economic impact to I-Cs and training programs include a day away from work, travel and subsistence to obtain the necessary update of the abbreviated course. The economic impact to the students of the course will be an actual savings in time to complete the training and costs to take the course.

Training programs also will see a benefit from the creation of this abbreviated course because of the ability to provide a new course. There is no other anticipated economic impact because of the changes to this permanent administrative regulation.

**K.A.R. 109-11-10.** This is a proposed new regulation that defines the requirements for training programs to obtain Board of EMS approval of the bridge course discussed under 109-10-1 above. This regulation follows the model already defined in regulations that address first responder courses and the full EMT-Basic courses.

The economic impact to the Board of EMS, other governmental agencies and individuals is anticipated to be the same as those described above under K.A.R. 109-10-1.

#### Article 52.—MOTOR VEHICLE DRIVERS' LICENSES

92-52-9a. **Moving violations; suspension or restriction of driving privileges.** (a) If a person commits three moving violations on separate occasions within a 12-month period, excluding the violations specified in K.S.A. 8-254, K.S.A. 8-285, and K.S.A. 8-291, and amendments thereto, then a warning notice shall be mailed by the division to the person advising the person that an additional violation may result in restricted driving privileges.

(b) If a person commits four moving violations on separate occasions within a 12-month period, excluding the violations specified in K.S.A. 8-254, K.S.A. 8-285, and K.S.A. 8-291, and amendments thereto, then the person's license shall be restricted by the division for 30 days to driving under the circumstances provided in K.S.A. 8-292, and amendments thereto. The person shall be advised by the division that an additional violation may result in suspended driving privileges.

(c) If a person commits five moving violations on separate occasions within a 12-month period, excluding the violations specified in K.S.A. 8-254, K.S.A. 8-285, and K.S.A. 8-291, and amendments thereto, then the person's license shall be suspended by the division for 90 days.

(d) If a person commits six or more moving violations on separate occasions within a 12-month period, excluding the violations specified in K.S.A. 8-254, K.S.A. 8-285, and K.S.A. 8-291, and amendments thereto, then an order suspending the person's license for one year shall be issued by the division. #### Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

111-2-128. **"Race to the Speedway" retailer incentive.** (a) During the period beginning July 1, 2001, through the end of the business day on August 25, 2001, in addition to compensation provided for in K.A.R. 111-2-4, the Kansas lottery shall also offer for all Kansas lottery retailers the "Race to the Speedway" retailer incentive promotion. It will be held in conjunction with the Kansas lottery's "Kansas Speedway" game (K.A.R. 111-4-1839) as follows:

(b) With each book of "Kansas Speedway" instant tickets activated, a retailer will automatically be entitled to one entry card. Entry cards for each eligible book of tickets will be completed by the lottery based upon computer records identifying the activation of each book of "Kansas Speedway" tickets by a retailer, and entered into the random drawing. Only "Kansas Speedway" books activated by the end of the business day on August 25, 2001, will be eligible for the drawing. All entries shall be separated into the three Kansas lottery retailer state regions applicable to each retailer.

(c) The drawing will be held at approximately 10:00 a.m. on Friday, August 31, 2001, at lottery headquarters. The first card drawn from all cards entered from each Kansas lottery region will entitle the retailer named thereon to win the following prize: a "Kansas Speedway Racing Weekend Prize" which includes two upper grandstand reserved seats for the NASCAR Busch Series Kansas 300 on September 29, 2001, and the NASCAR Winston Cup Series Kansas 400 on September 30, 2001, weekend races at the Kansas Speedway in Kansas City, Kansas; access for two persons to the Kansas lottery hospitality chalet at the Kansas Speedway including free food and beverages at the chalet; a double occupancy single hotel room for the evenings of September 28 and 29, 2001; and ground transportation to and from the hotel to the Kansas Speedway on September 29 and 30, 2001. One entry will be drawn from each of the respective regional entries, Topeka, Wichita, and Great Bend, thereby guaranteeing one winner from each region.

(d) The following restrictions shall apply to the "Kansas Speedway Racing Weekend Prize":

(1) The Kansas lottery is not responsible for any losses caused by delay or cancellation of said automobile race.

(2) Prizes are transferable one time, but cannot be redeemed for cash.

(3) The lottery shall choose and reserve all hotel rooms.

(4) The lottery shall provide transportation to and from the Kansas Speedway on a scheduled basis. All other transportation is the responsibility of the prize winners.

(5) Prize winners will receive notification of their prize, but the actual prize will be delivered at a time and place to be announced by the lottery.

(6) Any meals, drinks, gratuities, taxes, and other expenses that are not specifically mentioned are not included.

(7) The hotel may require winners to produce a major credit card at the time of check-in. Winners are responsible for all hotel charges incurred in excess of the room charge.

(8) All prizes are subject to lottery validation, set-offs and deductions authorized by law. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2000 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 74-8708 and K.S.A. 2000 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-7-13-01, June 20, 2001.)

**Article 3.—INSTANT GENERIC GAME RULES**

111-3-35. **Return of unsold tickets.** (a) Commencing July 1, 2001, a retailer may return consigned books of unsold tickets until 60 days after the announced end of game date designated by the executive director. Unless specifically approved by the executive director, no tickets shall be consigned to a retailer after the end-of-game date announced by the executive director, and no consigned packs shall be activated after 30 days from the end-of-game date.

(b) Commencing April 1, 2001, a retailer may return partial packs of tickets to the lottery until 60 days following the announced end-of-game date designated by the executive director. Unless specifically approved by the executive director, no credit will be allowed for any partial packs not returned within 60 days of the end-of-game date.

(c) In the event the executive director announces the termination of an instant game and cessation of sales to the public by retailers on a specific date, the lottery may reimburse retailers for activated books of unsold tickets for that specific game.

(d) Should a retailer contract be terminated or the retailer prohibited from selling instant tickets prior to the expiration of the game, the lottery may reimburse that specific retailer for all activated books of tickets of each active game.

(e) In any situation in which the lottery will reimburse a retailer for returned books of tickets, the amount of credit shall be based upon the actual price paid for the tickets by the retailer, multiplied by the number of returned books and/or tickets as counted by the lottery.

(f) Upon return of any tickets, the lottery shall provide the retailer with a receipt for the tickets returned. The retailer shall retain a copy of the receipt and shall be required to produce the receipt in the event of any claims the retailer may make regarding the tickets returned. **Executive Order No. 2001-04**

**Establishing the Governor's Council  
on Work Force Training and Investment  
to be known as the IMPACT Review Panel**

WHEREAS, Article 1, § 3 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests the supreme executive power of the state in the Governor; and

WHEREAS, Article 1, § 4 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests in the Governor, the power to require information from the officers of the executive department, upon any subject related to their respective duties; and

WHEREAS, K.S.A. 74-50,102 et seq. known as the Kansas Investments in Major Projects and Comprehensive Training Act or the IMPACT Act requires the approval of the Governor's Council on Work Force Training and Investment for each project under the IMPACT Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, there is hereby established the Governor's Council on Work Force Training and Investment.

(1) The Council shall be composed of ten (10) members, as follows:

- (a) The Governor, or designee;
- (b) The Secretary of the Department of Commerce and Housing, or designee;
- (c) The Secretary of Administration, or designee;
- (d) The Secretary of Human Resources, or designee;

- (e) The Secretary of Revenue, or designee;
- (f) The Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services, or designee;
- (g) The President of the Kansas Development Finance Authority, or designee;
- (h) The Director of the Budget, or designee;
- (i) The Commissioner of Education, or designee;
- (j) The Executive Director of the Board of Regents, or designee.

(2) The Chairman of the Council shall be appointed by the Governor from the membership of the council and shall serve for one year.

(3) The Council will meet as frequently as necessary for the purpose of reviewing and considering for approval all proposed IMPACT program agreements. Specifically, the Council will study agreements among an employer, an educational institution and the Department of Commerce and Housing to determine eligibility and compliance with statutory requirements and the environmental and economic impact of the proposed agreements. Such review shall include, but not be limited to, the following criteria:

- (a) Does the employer qualify as a Kansas basic enterprise?
- (b) Are the "new jobs" involved documented?
- (c) Are all "program costs" allowable?
- (d) Are all "program services" allowable and service providers and payment amounts identified?

(e) Do the total program costs in the agreement exceed 90% of the expected ten year withholding on the new jobs? Is program funding identified as to amounts to be paid from bond proceeds, the IMPACT program services fund, tuition and other educational institutions charges, and grants and donations?

(4) The Council shall act in an advisory role as to all other aspects concerning the proper functioning of the IMPACT Act including, but not limited to, the following:

- (a) Recommendations as to any changes to the IMPACT Act.
- (b) Recommendations for changes to proposed or enacted regulations adopted pursuant to the IMPACT Act.
- (c) Recommendations as to limitations on bonds to be issued and the timing on the issuance of bonds to assure the availability of revenues for cash flow purposes of the State General Fund and the IMPACT program.
- (d) Recommendations as to the rates at which money is credited to the IMPACT program repayment fund and IMPACT program services fund.
- (e) Recommendations for the time period within which bonds issued under the IMPACT Act are to be retired.

This order shall supersede Executive Order No. 96-8 which is hereby rescinded.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 01-04 and shall be effective immediately.
