Request for Comments

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is announcing its intent to issue an air quality construction permit to Great Plains Power for installation of a proposed electrical generation facility. The proposed facility is to be located 3 miles southwest of the City of Paola. The proposed construction permit authorizes Great Plains Power to install and operate eight simple-cycle combustion turbine generators, eight gas preheaters, eight evaporative coolers, two 1,000,000 gallon fuel oil storage tanks, one 1,000,000 gallon water storage tank, a carbon dioxide fire protection system and necessary ancillary equipment. The proposed plant is to have a nominal electric generating capacity of 640 megawatts.

The proposed permit is to be issued in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-17, prevention of significant deterioration (PSD), which adopt the federal standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. These air quality regulations apply to major stationary emission sources located in areas designated as "attainment" under the federal Clean Air Act (CAA). Attainment areas are areas where the air quality meets or

is better than the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS).

The PSD regulations require evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each pollutant for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level. The purpose of BACT is to effect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the proposed Great Plains Power facility indicates that the emission rate of oxides of nitrogen, sulfur dioxide, carbon monoxide, particulate matter and sulfuric acid mist all exceed the significance levels. Great Plains Power conducted the required BACT analyses. The department has reviewed Great Plains Power's BACT analyses and concurs with its findings that dry low NOx burners, good combustion practices, use of natural gas and low (0.05% by weight) sulfur No. 2 fuel oil is the BACT for these turbines as pollution control.

The PSD regulations also require an evaluation of the impacts, if any, that emissions from the proposed modifications may have on the ambient air quality, visibility, vegetation and soils. Great Plains Power has conducted the required analyses in accordance with methods approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. The results of the analyses conclude that there should be no significant impacts on the ambient air quality, visibility, local vegetation or soils.

A public comment period has been established until January 7 to allow citizens the opportunity to express any concerns or comments they may have about this permitting action. All comments should be submitted in writing to Connie Carreno, Bureau of Air and Radiation, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, 66612-1366. A public hearing may be requested on this permitting action. The request for a public hearing should be submitted in writing and should identify the reasons why a public hearing is being requested.

Notice Concerning Proposed RCRA Permit

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, Region 7, are providing notice of intent to issue a Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) permit to Farmland Industries Inc. to perform post-closure care and remediation at the nitrogen plant located near Dodge City. Farmland is responsible under RCRA for the continued remediation and monitoring at this facility, located at 11559 U.S. 50, Dodge City.

The facility obtained interim status as a hazardous waste treatment and storage facility in November 1980 and was assigned the following EPA identification number: KSD044625010. The RCRA permit requires Farmland to perform post-closure care and remediation for the Chromium Destruct Unit and to implement the corrective action requirements. During the term of this permit, Farmland is subject to inspection by the KDHE and the EPA to determine compliance with the requirements of the permit.

In October 1985, the State of Kansas received final authorization from the EPA to implement its own hazardous waste management program in lieu of the federal program, except for the portions covered by the 1984 Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments (HSWA). The KDHE portion of the permit (Part I) will be issued under the authority of Kansas Statutes Annotated 65-3431 (i) and 65-3431 (s). The EPA portion of the permit (Part II) will be issued under the authority of sections 3002 (b), 3004 (u) and (v), and 3005 of the RCRA.

Part I of the permit will require Farmland to perform post-closure care for the Chromium Destruct Unit, for the facility located near Dodge City, in accordance with the conditions of the permit. The EPA portion (Part II) of the joint permit will address the corrective action requirements of HSWA.

Revocation of K.A.R. 92-5-4 and 92-5-11. K.A.R. 92-5-4 concerns cigarette tax meter machines and the proce-

dures for using them, and K.A.R. 92-5-11 allows banks to be agents for tax meters and describes requirements for the bank to follow. The State of Kansas no longer uses tax meter machines, which makes these regulations unnecessary.

Economic Impact: No impact on the public, the department or other agencies is anticipated.

Amendments to K.A.R. 92-5-5, 92-5-6, 92-5-7, 92-5-8, 92-5-9, 92-5-10, 92-5-12 and 92-5-13. These regulations encompass transportation of cigarettes, wholesalers receiving stamped cigarettes, wholesalers with multiple locations, salespersons, redemption of unused stamps, cigarettes unfit for sale, bonds and bond cancellations, and purchasing stamps on credit. The amendments to these regulations are to remove outdated language and to conform with statutory changes of the past few years.

Article 17.—TOBACCO PRODUCTS

Amendments to K.A.R. 92-17-1, 92-17-2, 92-17-3, 92-17-4, 92-17-5 and 92-17-6. The listed regulations encompass terms concerning distributors and retailers, imposition of tax, applications/forms, distributor's bond and bond cancellation, and refunds or credits of tax-exempt tobacco products. The amendments to these regulations are to remove outdated language and to conform with statutory changes of the past few years.

Article 24.—RETAIL LIQUOR EXCISE TAX

Economic Impact: No economic impact on the public, the department or other agencies is anticipated.

Amendments to K.A.R. 92-14-7. This regulation, in its current form, discusses special farm users permits. A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, February 5, in the conference room of the Office of the State Bank Commissioner, Suite 300, 700 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed Kansas Administrative Regulation 17-24-3. The regulation proposed is for adoption on a permanent basis.

The Kansas Legislature recently passed House Bill 2481, which made substantial changes to the Kansas Mortgage Business Act (K.S.A. 9-2201 et seq.). Section 10 of House Bill 2481 amended K.S.A. 2000 Supp. 9-2209 (commissioner, powers and duties) by granting the commissioner the authority to require any licensee or registrant to complete a minimum number of continuing education hours annually as a condition of license or registration renewal. Proposed K.A.R. 17-24-3 is necessary to establish and implement such continuing education requirements. Since 1996, when the Office of the State Bank Commissioner assumed regulatory authority over persons engaged in mortgage business in Kansas, the industry has grown dramatically. Continuing professional education (CPE) will assist the mortgage business industry in providing competent and professional services to Kansas citizens.

K.A.R. 17-24-3, as proposed, establishes annual continuing education requirements for individuals required to register with the Office of the State Bank Commissioner (OSBC) as loan originators, pursuant to the Kansas Mortgage Business Act (K.S.A. 9-2201 et seq.). Loan originators will be required to complete at least eight hours of approved CPE annually as a condition of registration renewal. The OSBC will approve all CPE courses, which must focus on issues of mortgage business or related industry topics. The OSBC will review and consider any type of CPE course for credit, including correspondence courses, Internet courses and college courses. Generally, a CPE hour will consist of at least 50 minutes of instruction. Evidence of satisfactory completion of approved CPE courses will be submitted to the OSBC by the individual loan originator completing the CPE course or the CPE course sponsor. The OSBC may forgive CPE requirements under certain circumstances that prevent successful completion of CPE.

The cost of implementing CPE requirements will be borne, primarily, by those individuals registered with the OSBC as loan originators and required to comply with CPE requirements. Loan originators will be individually responsible for paying the costs associated with attendance at approved CPE courses. The cost to loan originators for attending approved CPE courses will be determined by each CPE course sponsor. The OSBC will incur costs associated with reviewing and processing requests for CPE course approval and tracking CPE course completion for all loan originators. The OSBC, however, anticipated and accounted for such costs when it recently amended K.A.R. 17-24-2 (mortgage business fees). The fees established by K.A.R. 17-24-2, as amended, include

annual registration fees for all loan originators, which were designed to offset the cost to the OSBC for supervising a CPE program.

Article 5.—PROVIDER PARTICIPATION, SCOPE OF SERVICES, AND REIMBURSEMENTS FOR THE MEDICAID (MEDICAL ASSISTANCE) PROGRAM

30-5-76. Scope of coverage and reimbursement for services for qualified medicare beneficiaries. The scope of coverage for QMBs shall be the reimbursement of medicare premiums and coinsurance under part A and part B of medicare, for covered and noncovered medicaid/medikan services. The reimbursement rates shall be based upon the methodologies specified in this article, and the combination of medicare and medicaid payments shall not exceed payments at the current medicaid/medikan reimbursement rates. If the medicare payment exceeds the payment at the current medicaid/medikan reimbursement rate, no further payment shall be made. Reimbursement rates for services not otherwise covered by medicaid/medikan shall not exceed 80 percent of the current medicare allowable reimbursement rates or shall be determined by the secretary. This regulation shall be effective on and after January 1, 2002. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 39-708c; effective July 1, 1989; amended Jan. 1, 2002.)

30-5-100. Scope of dental services. (a) Dental services shall be covered for recipients receiving a Kan Be Healthy dental screening.

- (1) Both a Kan Be Healthy medical screening and a Kan Be Healthy dental screening shall be required for coverage of limited orthodontia services, with the exception of emergency services.
- (2) Prior authorization shall be required for designated services.
- (3) Prior authorization shall be required for dental treatment plans estimated to exceed, during a calendar year, the range maximum established by the secretary.
- (b) Dental services for medicaid recipients not participating in the Kan Be Healthy program shall be limited to the following treatments:
 - (1) Orcantral fistula closure;
 - (2) unilateral radical antrotomy;
 - (3) biopsy of oral tissue;
 - (4) radical excision of lesion;
 - (5) excision of tumors;
 - (6) removal of cysts and neoplasms;
 - (7) partial ostectomy;
 - (8) surgical incision and drainage of abscess;
- (9) removal of foreign bodies, skin, subcutaneous areolar tissue;
 - (10) sequestrectomy for osteomyelitis;
- (11) maxillary sinusotomy for removal of tooth fragment or foreign body;
 - (12) treatment of fractures;
- (13) closed reduction of dislocation and related injections;
 - (14) limitation of motion and related injections;
 - (15) sutures;
 - (16) oral skin grafts;
 - (17) frenulectomy;
 - (18) excision of pericoronal gingiva;
 - (19) sialalithotomy;
 - (20) excision of salivary gland;
 - (21) sialodochoplasty;
 - (22) closure of salivary fistula;
 - (23) emergency tracheotomy;
 - (24) general anesthesia: first 30 minutes;

Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Brenda Schutte at (785) 296-2326. There is no designated handicapped parking on the block. The building entrance on Jackson Street is handicap accessible.

Copies of the regulations and the economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting Brenda Schutte. A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 9-18-1 sets license fees for the Kansas Pet Animal Act, which is established by K.S.A. 47-1701 *et seq.* The proposed amendment lowers the \$200 pound and shelter fee for three new subcategories of pounds and shelters. Fees for these subcategories range from \$20 to \$75. The proposed amendment also modifies the fee for closing a facility.

Proposed regulations K.A.R. 9-22-4 through 9-22-6 create exceptions to current pound and shelter licensing requirements. These regulations allow the department to separately license "foster homes," which provide temporary care and housing for animals owned by a state licensed pound and shelter; "rescue homes," which are generally purebred rescues; and "group foster homes," which is a type of pound or shelter consisting of the premises of two or more individuals who have joined together to accept pet animals for the purpose of providing permanent adoptive homes. The regulations establish the procedure and requirements for licensing under each category and place limitations on the number of homes a pound and shelter can use, the number of fostered or rescued adult animals placed in each home and the amount of time an animal can remain in foster care. The regulations further specify that an individual operating one of these facilities may not accept stray animals. The regulations require these licensees to follow pound and shelter regulations.

The proposed regulations should result in savings for licensees. Under the current fee schedule, a licensee would be required to pay \$200 for each premise housing animals. The proposed fees are lowered to \$20 to \$75 depending on the activity. The agency estimates an additional cost of \$2,500 to regulate these entities.
