Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, December 17, in Room 106 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in eight existing rules and regulations relating to approval of schools of nursing that include definitions, requirements of initial approval, reapproval requirements, faculty and preceptor qualifications, curriculum requirements, clinical resources, educational facilities and annual report. There also will be one existing rule and regulation relating to the scope of practice for a licensed practical nurse performing intravenous fluid therapy.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written comments on the proposed amended rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the executive administrator of the Board of Nursing, Room 551-S, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. Phone comments will be taken by calling (785) 296-0444 at 10 a.m. the day of the hearing. In order to give all persons the opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes. A summary of the proposed regulations and the economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 60-1-104. Approval of schools of nursing definitions. The proposed changes clarify terms used in the regulations for schools of nursing by adding the definition for capstone course, approval, conditional approval, community-based health care, criteria for unscheduled survey visit, distance learning, faculty hire exception and loss of approval. The proposed changes also expand the definition for clinical observational experience.

K.A.R. 60-2-101. Approval of schools of nursing requirements for initial approval. The proposed changes organize the regulation for clarification and also add that the name of each hospital and affiliating agency providing facilities for clinical experience shall be licensed and the list will be submitted with the initial application.

K.A.R. 60-2-102. Approval of schools of nursing reapproval requirements. The proposed changes will increase the resurvey visit from 5 years to 5-10 years. Also proposed is criteria for a resurvey or unannounced site visit and actions the board may take if the school of nursing is found to have deficiencies.

K.A.R. 60-2-103. Approval of schools of nursing faculty and preceptor qualifications. The proposed changes will require the school to have a written plan that includes the method of selection of preceptors, the roles of the faculty members and preceptors, and the method of contact between faculty members and preceptors during the preceptorship. The proposed changes also allow for the school to request a faculty hire exception if faculty meeting the criteria required by regulation is not available.

K.A.R. 60-2-104. Approval of schools of nursing curriculum requirements. The proposed changes update curriculum requirements for nursing content to meet incumbent job analysis and licensure examination test plan. The proposed changes also clarify the process in changing curriculum for nursing programs.

K.A.R. 60-2-105. Approval of schools of nursing clinical resources. The proposed changes clarify the requirements for clinical sites and the ratio of faculty to student for clinical experience for the students. The proposed changes also exclude the capstone course from the total percentage of clinical hours that can be used with preceptors.

K.A.R. 60-2-106. Approval of schools of nursing educational facilities. The proposed changes contain editing changes. There is no major change to this regulation.

K.A.R. 60-2-108. Approval of schools of nursing reports. The proposed change will delete several requirements for the annual report. This proposed change also adds that the annual report shall contain the major and minor curriculum changes, student-faculty clinical ratio, pass rate of the NCLEX exam for each of the last three years, and operating budget.

K.A.R. 60-16-102. Scope of practice for licensed practical nurse performing intravenous fluid therapy. The proposed changes to this regulation clarify the current regulations and also add that a licensed practical nurse may administer by direct intravenous push corticosteroids

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m Tuesday, December 10, in the board room of the State Education Building, 120 S.E. 10th Ave., Topeka, to consider proposed new school accreditation regulations numbered K.A.R. 91-31-31 through 91-31-42 and the revocation of K.A.R. 91-31-16 through 91-31-30. These proposed regulations govern school accreditation, and many of them are required by the new federal No Child Left Behind Act. Also, one of the primary constitutional responsibilities of the State Board of Education is to accredit elementary and secondary schools. These regulations are being adopted to improve the system for accrediting schools, meet the new federal requirements, and improve education for the children of Kansas.

Each proposed new regulation is printed with this notice. Also, a brief summary of each regulation and its economic impact is provided below. A complete economic impact statement for each regulation may be obtained by contacting the secretary of the State Board of Education, 120 S.E. 10th Ave., Topeka, 66612.

K.A.R. 91-31-31. This regulation provides definitions for terms used in substantive regulations. This regulation is intended to clarify terms used throughout the remainder of the school accreditation regulations. There will be no financial impact upon the State Board of Education, school districts, other governmental entities, or on private businesses or individuals.

K.A.R. 91-31-32. This regulation establishes the criteria by which schools will be accredited. The criteria includes student performance and school quality measures. These criteria are an improvement of the current system of accreditation and are designed to comply with new federal requirements. This regulation will have no financial impact upon the State Board, other governmental entities, or on private, businesses or individuals. New federal requirements may require school districts to expend additional funds to hire different or additional staff. The

cost of hiring each additional certified staff member is estimated at \$30,000. Schools that qualify for federal Title I assistance (660 schools) will receive federal assistance. Schools that do not qualify for Title I (1,000 schools) will not receive any federal assistance under this federal program.

K.A.R. 91-31-33. This regulation is a continuation of an existing regulation. It requires schools to provide data to the State Department of Education. There will be no financial impact upon the State Board, other governmental entities, or on private businesses or individuals. Also, the continuation of these provisions will have no economic impact on school districts.

K.A.R. 91-31-34. This regulation is a continuation of an existing regulation and concerns staff, student credit, records retention and athletics. The matters addressed in this regulation require statewide uniformity. There will be no financial impact upon the State Board, school districts, other governmental entities, or on private businesses or individuals.

K.A.R. 91-31-35. This regulation establishes minimum high school graduation requirements. The total number of credits for graduation (21) is unchanged and fewer electives are required. However, a unit in fine arts and an additional unit in mathematics and in science are required. There will be no economic impact upon the State Board, other governmental entities, or on private businesses or individuals. The costs for school districts to comply with this change in graduation requirements are estimated at from \$15,000 to \$60,000 in order to hire staff for the new required courses.

K.A.R. 91-31-36. This regulation requires each school to appoint an assistance team to assist the school in meeting accreditation criteria. This team is selected by the school. Also, the State Board must appoint a team to assist a school if the school fails to meet accreditation requirements. These support teams are mandated by a new federal law. The State Board will incur expenses in providing assistance teams to local schools as mandated by the new federal law. Federal funding is provided to the state for Title I schools. For this year, \$150,000 is available. Annual costs are estimated at \$20,000 per school, with a potential of 200 schools initially being assigned a state assistance team. The number of schools is expected to increase due to progressively more stringent federal requirements. Each school currently is required to have an on-site accreditation team, so schools should incur no additional costs in regard to their assistance teams.

K.A.R. 91-31-37. This regulation continues the process for assigning an accreditation status to each school. There will be no economic impact upon the State Board, school districts, other governmental entities, or on private businesses or individuals.

K.A.R. 91-31-38. This regulation identifies the types of accreditation status that may be assigned to schools. It requires schools that are conditionally accredited to develop an improvement plan and be assisted by a state-appointed assistance team. There will be no economic impact upon the State Board, other governmental entities, or on private businesses or individuals.

The costs to schools will depend on the accreditation status of the school. If a school is accredited, there will be

no cost to the school. If a school is conditionally accredited, there will be costs to develop and implement an improvement plan. If only minor corrections are needed, the costs will be minimal (\$10,000 or less). However, if major adjustments are needed, such as staffing increases or additional instructional services, the costs could be substantial (up to \$250,000). Federal money will be available to assist those schools that qualify for federal Title I assistance (660 schools). Other schools (1,000) will not have federal assistance available to them.

K.A.R. 91-31-39. This regulation carries forward provisions from a previous regulation and concerns the issuance of rewards to schools that perform well. There will be no economic impact upon school districts, other governmental entities, or on private businesses or individuals. The State Board will incur costs in granting awards. The cost is estimated at not more than \$10,000.

K.A.R. 91-31-40. This regulation identifies sanctions that may be imposed on schools that are conditionally accredited or denied accreditation. There will be no economic impact upon the State Board, other governmental entities, or on private businesses or individuals. The economic impact for school districts will depend on the sanctions imposed upon the school. If the sanction requires the hiring of additional staff, the cost would be about \$30,000 for each staff member. Federal funds are available to assist Title I schools. However, other schools are not provided assistance.

K.A.R. 91-31-41. This is a carry-over regulation that requires each school to give notice to the local board, parents, and community of the school's status in the accreditation system. There will be no economic impact upon the State Board, school districts, other governmental entities, or on private businesses or individuals.

K.A.R. 91-31-42. This carry-over regulation provides schools with the opportunity to request a waiver from one or more accreditation requirements. There will be no economic impact upon the State Board, other governmental entities, or on private businesses or individuals. The cost to schools would be primarily for staff time spent in preparing the request for a waiver. An estimated cost for a school would be \$150 per request.

K.A.R. 91-31-16 through 91-31-30. These previous accreditation regulations are being revoked. They are being replaced by the accreditation regulations described above.

All interested persons will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views or arguments, either orally or in writing, in regard to the proposed regulations. In addition, the period of public notice hereby provided constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Such written comments may be submitted to the secretary of the State Board of Education at the above address. The hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures of the State Board of Education.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days

91-31-31. **Definitions.** (a) "Accredited" means the status assigned to a school that meets the minimum performance and quality assurance criteria established by the state board.

(b) "Accredited with recognition" means the status assigned to a school that has a prescribed percentage of students scoring at or above the proficient level on the state assessments and that meets the other performance and quality assurance criteria applicable to the school.

(c) "Accredited with excellence" means the status assigned to a school that has a prescribed percentage of students scoring at or above the proficient level on the state assessments and that meets the other performance and quality assurance criteria applicable to the school.

(d) "Conditionally accredited" means the status assigned to each school that is accredited, accredited with recognition, or accredited with excellence and that, in the second year of the school's next two-year accreditation period, fails to meet one or more of the performance criteria or three or more of the quality assurance criteria established by the state board.

(e) "Conditionally accredited on improvement" means the status assigned to a school that, for two consecutive years, fails to meet one or more of the performance criteria or three or more of the quality assurance criteria

established by the state board.

(f) "Conditionally accredited on warning" means the status assigned to a school that, for four consecutive years, fails to meet one or more of the performance criteria or three or more of the quality assurance criteria established by the state board.

(g) "Curriculum standards" means statements, adopted by the state board, of what students should

know and be able to do in specific content areas.

(h) "External technical assistance team" means a group of persons selected by a school for the purpose of advising school staff on issues of school improvement, curricula and instruction, student performance, and other accreditation matters.

(i) "Local board of education" means the board of education of any unified school district or the governing

body of any nonpublic school.

- (j) "Not accredited" means the status assigned to a school that, for five consecutive years, does not meet one or more of the performance criteria or three or more of the quality assurance criteria established by the state board.
- (k) "On-site visit" means a visit at a school by either the school's external technical assistance team or a state technical assistance team.
- (l) "School" means an organizational unit that, for the purposes of school improvement, constitutes a logical sequence of elements that may be structured as grade levels, developmental levels, or instructional levels.

(m) "School improvement plan" means a plan developed by a school that states specific actions for achieving continuous improvement in student performance.

(n) "Standards of excellence" means the expectations for academic achievement that the state board has set for

Kansas schools.

(o) "State assessments" means the assessments that the state board administers in order to measure student learning within the Kansas curriculum standards for mathematics, reading, science, history and government, and writing.

(p) "State board" means the state board of education.

(q) "State technical assistance team" means a group of persons appointed by the state department of education to assist schools in meeting the performance and quality assurance criteria established by the state board.

(r) "Unit of credit" means a measure of credit that may be awarded to a student for satisfactory completion of a particular course or subject. A full unit of credit is credit that is awarded for satisfactory completion of a course or subject that is offered for and generally requires 120 clock-hours to complete. Credit may be awarded in increments based upon the amount of time a course or subject is offered and generally requires to complete. Individual students may be awarded credit based upon demonstrated knowledge of the content of a course or subject, regardless of the amount of time spent by the student in the course or subject.

This regulation shall be effective on and after July 1, 2005. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective P-______)

91-31-32. Performance and quality assurance criteria.
(a) Each school shall be assigned its accreditation status based upon the extent to which the school has met the performance and quality assurance criteria established by the state board in this regulation.

(b) The performance criteria shall be as follows:

- (1) Except as provided in subsection (d) of this regulation, having met the percentage prescribed by the state board of students performing at or above the proficient level on state assessments or having increased overall student achievement by a percentage prescribed by the state board;
- (2) having an attendance rate equal to or greater than that prescribed by the state board; and

(3) for high schools, having a graduation rate equal to or greater than that prescribed by the state board.

(c) The quality assurance criteria shall consist of the following quality assurance measures, which shall be required to be in place at each school:

(1) A school improvement plan that may be for a period of from two to five years and that includes a results-based staff development plan;

(2) an external technical assistance team;

(3) locally determined assessments that are aligned with the state standards;

(4) formal training for teachers regarding the state curriculum standards;

(5) 100% of the teachers assigned to teach in those areas assessed by the state or described as core academic subjects by the United States department of education, and (continued)

95% or more of all other faculty, fully certified for the positions they hold;

(6) policies that meet the requirements of S.B.R. 91-31-

34;

(7) local graduation requirements that include at least

those requirements imposed by the state board;

(8) curricula that allow each student to meet the regent's qualified admissions requirements and the state scholarship program;

(9) if an elementary school, enrollment of 10 or more

students on September 20;

- (10) programs to support student learning and growth at both the elementary and secondary levels, including the following:
 - (A) Computer literacy;

(B) counseling services;

(C) fine arts;

- (D) language arts;
- (E) library services;

(F) mathematics;

(G) physical education, which shall include health and instruction about human sexuality and AIDS;

(H) science;

- (i) services for students with special learning needs; and
- (J) history and government. Each local board of education shall include in its history and government curriculum, within one of the grades seven through 12, a course of instruction in Kansas history and government. The course of instruction shall be offered for at least nine consecutive weeks. The local board of education shall waive this requirement for any student who transfers into the district at a grade level above that in which the course is taught;

(11) programs to support student learning and growth

at the secondary level, including the following:

(A) Business;

(B) family and consumer science;

(C) foreign language; and

(D) industrial and technical education; and

(12) local policies ensuring compliance with other accreditation regulations and state education laws.

(d) If the grade configuration of a school does not include any of the grades included in the state assessment

program, the school shall use a locally determined as-

sessment that is aligned with the state standards.

This regulation shall be effective on and after July 1, 2005. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective P-_____)

91-31-33. Data submission. Each school shall provide to the state department of education information concerning each of the following, upon request:

(a) Qualifications of the school's teachers;

(b) student attendance;

(c) the number of high school students who graduate;

(d) any other data requested by the state board.

This regulation shall be effective on and after July 1, 2005. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective P-______)

91-31-34. Local board of education requirements. (a) General. Each local board of education shall ensure that each school meets the requirements of this regulation.

(b) Staff.

(1) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, in filling positions for which a license or certificate is issued by the state board, each school district shall employ persons who hold licenses or certificates with specific endorsements for the positions held.

(2) If a teacher holding an appropriate license or certificate is not available, the school district shall use a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas teacher or administrator license or certificate at any level or in any field or subject. A school district shall not allow any person holding a Kansas teaching license or certificate to substitute teach for more than 125 days in the same assignment.

(3) If a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas teacher or administrator license or certificate is not available, the school district shall use a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas substitute teaching license or certificate. A school district shall not allow a person holding a substitute teaching license or certificate to teach for more than

90 days in the same assignment.

(4) If a substitute teacher holding a valid Kansas substitute teaching license or certificate is not available, the school district shall use a person who holds a baccalaureate degree and an emergency substitute teaching license or certificate. A school district shall not allow a person who holds a baccalaureate degree and an emergency substitute teaching license or certificate to teach for more than 30 days in the same assignment.

(5) (A) If a person holding a baccalaureate degree and an emergency substitute teaching license or certificate is not available, the school district shall use a person who has been licensed or certified by the state board as an emergency substitute teacher. A school district shall not allow any person who does not hold a baccalaureate degree to teach for more than 15 days in the same assign-

ment or more than 60 days in a semester.

(B) If a local board of education documents that there is an insufficient supply of substitute teachers, the board may appeal to the commissioner of education for authority to allow individuals holding an emergency substitute teaching license or certificate to continue to teach for an additional length of time that shall not exceed a total of 93 days in a school year.

(6) If the state board of education has declared a time of emergency, any person holding a five-year substitute teaching license or certificate or an emergency substitute teaching license or certificate with a baccalaureate degree may teach for the duration of the time of emergency in a position made vacant by reason of the emergency.

(7) Each school shall report the name of each licensed or certified staff member on the personnel report or the supplemental personnel report required by the state board. Each licensed or certified personnel staff change that occurs between September 15 and the end of the school year shall be reported on a form prescribed by the state board within 30 days after the staff change.

(c) Student credit. Each school, through the local board of education, shall have a written policy specifying that the credit of any pupil transferring from an accredited

school shall be accepted.

(d) Records retention. Each school shall permanently retain records relating to each student's academic performance, attendance, and activities.

- (e) Interscholastic athletics.
- (1) A local board of education shall not allow any student below the sixth grade level to participate in interscholastic athletics.
- (2) A local board of education may allow any student at the sixth grade level or higher to participate in interscholastic athletics.
- (3) If a local board of education allows students at the sixth grade level to participate in interscholastic athletics, the local board of education shall comply with the guidelines adopted by the state board.
- (4) A local board of education may join the Kansas state high school activities association and participate under its rules. A local board of education that does not join that association shall comply with guidelines for interscholastic athletics adopted by the state board.
 - (f) Athletic practice.
- (1) Any elementary or middle school that includes any of the grades six through nine may conduct athletic practice during the school day only at times when one or more elective academic courses or a study period is offered to students.
- (2) A high school shall not conduct athletic practice during the school day, and athletic practice shall not be counted for credit or as a part of the school term.
- (3) A school shall neither offer credit for athletic practice nor count athletic practice as a physical education

This regulation shall be effective on and after July 1, 2005. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective P-

91-31-35. Graduation requirements. (a) Each local board of education shall adopt a written policy specifying that pupils are eligible for graduation only upon completion of at least the following requirements:

(1) Four units of English language arts, which shall include reading, writing, literature, communication, and grammar. The building administrator may waive up to one unit of this requirement if the administrator determines that a pupil can profit more by taking another sub-

(2) three units of history and government, which shall include world history, United States history, United States government, including the Constitution of the United States, and, except as otherwise provided in S.B.R. 91-31-32, a course of instruction in Kansas history and government;

(3) three units of science, which shall include physical, biological, and earth and space science and which shall include one unit as a laboratory course;

(4) three units of mathematics, including algebraic and

geometric concepts;

(5) one unit of physical education, which shall include health and which may include safety, first aid, or physiology. This requirement shall be waived if the school district is provided with either of the following:

(A) A statement by a licensed physician that a pupil is mentally or physically incapable of participating in a regular or modified physical education program; or

(b) A minimum of 21 units of credit shall be required

for graduation.

(c) Any local board of education may increase the number of units of credit required for graduation. Any additional requirements of the local board of education that increase the number of units of credit required for graduation shall apply to those students who will enter the ninth grade in the school year following the effective date of the additional requirement.

(d) Unless more stringent requirements are specified by existing local policy, the graduation requirements established by this regulation shall apply to those students who enter the ninth grade in the school year following the effective date of this regulation and to each subse-

quent class of students.

- (h) If a school is not accredited, sanctions shall be applied.

Article 4.—MOTOR CARRIERS OF PERSONS AND PROPERTY

- **82-4-22.** Insurance requirements. (a) (1) Before the commission issues a certificate, permit, or license to an applicant, the following types of applicant carriers shall obtain and keep in force a public liability and property damage insurance policy pursuant to K.S.A. 66-1,128, and amendments thereto:
- (A) Public motor carriers of property, household goods, or passengers;
- (B) contract motor carriers of property, household goods, or passengers; and

(C) private motor carriers of property or household goods.

(2) The applicant shall submit proof of the required policy by filing the uniform standard insurance form as required by K.A.R. 82-4-24a. This policy shall be issued by an insurance company or association meeting the requirements of K.S.A. 66-1,128, and amendments thereto.

(3) The insurance policy shall bind the obligors to pay

compensation for the following:

(A) Injuries or death to persons, except injury to the insured's employees while engaged in the course of their employment; and

(B) loss of, or damage to, property of others, not including property usually designated as cargo, resulting

from the negligent operation of the carrier.

(4) Each carrier shall file proof of insurance in amounts not less than those required in K.S.A 66-1,128, and amendments thereto. In special cases and for good cause shown, a carrier may be required by order of the commission to file insurance in additional amounts.

(b) Each public and contract motor carrier of property and household goods that conducts intrastate business shall keep in force a cargo insurance policy in a minimum amount of \$3,000. The motor carrier shall submit proof of the required policy by filing the uniform standard insurance form established in 49 C.F.R. Part 387 and adopted in K.A.R. 82-4-3. This policy shall be issued by an insurance company or association meeting the requirements of K.S.A. 66-1,128, and amendments thereto.

(c) If a motor carrier is unable to provide the uniform standard insurance form required in subsection (a) or (b), the original or a certified copy of the policy with all endorsements attached may be temporarily accepted by the commission for a period of 30 days. The motor carrier shall then file the form required in subsection (a) or (b)

within the 30-day period.

(d) Before the expiration date or cancellation date of an insurance policy filed in compliance with the law and the regulations of the commission, either the motor carrier shall file with the commission a new policy for the vehicle, or the vehicle shall immediately be withdrawn from service and notification of the action shall be given to the commission.

(e) Operation by a motor carrier without compliance with this regulation shall result in emergency proceedings pursuant to K.S.A. 77-536, and amendments thereto, to suspend the certificate, permit, or license issued to the carrier. Each emergency order issued by the commission shall be followed by a notice and a hearing to cancel the certificate, permit, or license, pursuant to K.S.A. 77-536, and amendments thereto. Article 1.—GENERAL

40-1-49. Stop loss or excess loss insurance; policy standards. (a) As used in these regulations, these terms shall have the following meanings:

(1) "Aggregate attachment point" means the dollar amount per plan beyond which the carrier issuing the policy assumes some or all of the plan's liability for pay-

ment of covered services or benefits.

(2) "Expected claims" means the amount of covered claims under the plan that is projected to be incurred by

a policyholder under the plan.

(3) "Specific attachment point" means the dollar amount per person or participant, for each policy year beyond which the carrier issuing the insurance coverage assumes some or all of the plan's liability for payment of covered services or benefits.

(b) Each insurer or other entity licensed to sell insurance in this state shall comply with the following requirements for stop loss or excess loss insurance issued to a small employer as defined by K.S.A. 40-2209d(u), and amendments thereto:

(1) Each stop loss or excess loss policy shall be issued to and shall insure the plan or the plan's sponsor, not the

individual participants.

(2) Payment by the insurer shall be made to the plan's sponsor or the policyholder, not the employees, members, participants, or providers.

(3) The specific attachment point for stop loss or excess loss coverage shall be no less than \$10,000 per covered

person or individual participant.

(4) The aggregate attachment point for stop loss or excess loss coverage shall be no less than 120 percent of expected claims.

(5) Each stop loss or excess loss policy shall contain a provision that the bankruptcy or insolvency of the plan or plan's sponsor does not relieve the stop loss or excess loss insurer from its obligation to pay claims under the stop loss or excess loss policy.

(6) In the case of incurred basis stop loss or excess loss coverage, the claims settlement period shall be no less favorable than a period in which claims are incurred in

12 months and paid in 13 months.

(c) Any stop loss or excess loss insurance policy not in compliance with this regulation shall be disapproved for sale or issue in this state. (Authorized by K.S.A. 40-103 and 40-2201(b); implementing K.S.A. 40-2201(b); effective Oct. 18, 2002.)

(c) For any search of the files necessary for preparing an amendment to a standard birth, fetal death, marriage, or divorce certificate or abstract already on file, the fee shall be \$11.00. For any search of the files necessary for preparing an amendment to a death certificate or abstract

already on file, the fee shall be \$12.00.

(d) For non-certified copies or abstracts of certificates or parts of certificates requested for statistical research purposes, the fee and manner in which the fee is to be paid shall be determined by the state registrar on the basis of the costs for providing those services. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-2126, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 13 and K.S.A. 2-2129, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 15; implementing K.S.A. 2-2129, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 15; effective Oct. 18, 2002.)
- 4-15-7. Live plant dealer licensing exemptions. Each live plant dealer whose annual live plant retail sales are less than \$10,000 shall be exempt from the licensing fee requirements, but shall be subject to all other licensing requirements, including the pest freedom standards established in K.A.R. 4-15-10 and the emergency response fee fund established by K.A.R. 4-15-6. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-2126, as amended by L. 2002, Ch. 91, § 13; effective Oct. 18, 2002.)
- 4-15-8. Fees for the inspection of live plants, plants and plant products, bees, beekeeping equipment, and regulated articles. (a) Whenever any person who owns or possesses live plants, plants and plant products, bees, beekeeping equipment, or regulated articles requests an inspection for any reason, that person shall pay an inspection fee of \$30 per hour plus mileage expenses.

(b) The inspection fee for the time of the inspection shall be calculated from the inspector's time of arrival at the inspection site. A minimum of one hour of inspection time shall be charged. Each inspection that is longer than one hour shall be rounded to the nearest quarter hour. Lunch and break periods shall be excluded from the in-

spection fee.

(c) Each person requesting an inspection shall pay the mileage fee calculated to the inspection site from one of the following locations, whichever distance is the short-

(1) The inspector's official station;

(2) the last location at which a requested inspection was conducted: or

(3) the last location at which the inspector incurred sub-

sistence or lodging expenses.

- (d) The person for which the last requested inspection is performed on any day shall be charged for the mileage for the return trip to the inspector's official station or to the location at which the inspector incurs subsistence or lodging expenses, whichever is closer.
- (e) Mileage shall be calculated by using either the actual miles driven by the inspector or the appropriate number from the Kansas department of transportation's official distance chart, whichever is less. The rate per mile shall be the amount authorized for the type of vehicle used by the inspector on the day on which the inspection was performed.
- (f) Each person requesting a seed wash analysis for bunt and smut fungi shall pay a fee of \$50 per sample. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-2118, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 7; effective Oct. 18, 2002.)
- 4-15-9. Fees for the certification of live plants, plants and plant products, bees, beekeeping equipment, and regulated articles. If a certificate is required for the entry of an inspected article into another state or foreign country, the person needing certification shall pay one or more of the following, as applicable: (a) \$20 for a certificate for a commodity or article certified for domestic shipment;

(b) \$50 for a certificate for a commodity or article cer-

tified for international shipment; or

- (c) 15 cents for each bale tag provided to satisfy a weedfree forage requirement. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-2126, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 13; effective Oct. 18, 2002.)
- 4-15-10. Pest freedom standards. (a) As used in this regulation, "incidence" shall mean the prevalence of a plant pest on a group of plants, expressed as the percentage of plants affected. For insects and arachnids, the incidence tolerance limit shall include all visible life stages. The word "damage" shall mean the degree of harm to a plant part caused by a plant pest, expressed as the percentage of plant tissue damaged.

(b) All plant pests shall be prohibited entry into Kansas except as follows. Infestation levels for the pests listed below shall not exceed the tolerance limits shown for each

- (c) The standards published by the national plant board on September 5, 2000 and titled "U. S. domestic Japanese beetle harmonization plan" are hereby adopted by reference. A copy of this plan shall be available from the plant protection and weed control program of the Kansas department of agriculture. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-2117, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 6; effective Oct. 18, 2002.)
- **4-15-11.** Civil penalty; complaint. A document titled a "complaint" shall initiate each proceeding for the assessment of a civil penalty. Each complaint shall include the following: (a) A general statement of the facts and the law at issue;
- (b) the amount of the civil penalty that is proposed to be assessed; and
- (c) notice of the respondent's right to a hearing before assessment of a civil penalty. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-2126, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 13; implementing K.S.A. 2-2125, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 12; effective Oct. 18, 2002.)
- **4-15-12.** Answer to the complaint. (a) Any party responding to a complaint may file a written answer. The answer shall clearly and directly admit or deny each of the factual allegations contained in the complaint. If the respondent has no knowledge of a particular factual allegation and so states, the allegation shall be deemed denied. The answer shall also state any facts or arguments that are alleged to constitute a defense and any facts that the respondent disputes and intends to place at issue.
- (b) The respondent may request a prehearing conference before the presiding officer, before the actual hearing. The presiding officer may require the parties to exchange evidence or brief the legal issues. The presiding officer may impose other procedural requirements in conjunction with a prehearing conference. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-2126, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 13; implementing K.S.A. 2-2125(b), as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 12; effective Oct. 18, 2002.)
- **4-15-13.** Criteria to determine dollar amount of proposed civil penalty. (a) A civil penalty of at least \$100.00 but not more than \$1,000.00 per offense may be assessed by the secretary for each violation of article 21 of chapter 2 of the Kansas statutes annotated, and amendments thereto.

- (b) In determining the amount of any proposed civil penalty, the gravity of the violation shall be considered by the secretary or the secretary's designee. Factors to be considered shall include the following:
- (1) The potential of the act to injure, endanger, or harm the health of any consumer, the general public, cultivated or native plant resources, or the environment;
 - (2) the severity of actual or potential harm or injuries;
- (3) the respondent's history of compliance with K.S.A. 2-2112 through K.S.A. 2-2129, and amendments thereto, and the regulations adopted thereunder;
- (4) any action taken by respondent to remedy the specific violation or to mitigate any adverse effects of the violation on public health, cultivated or native plant resources, or the environment as a result of the violation;
- (5) any misrepresentation or fraud involved in the violation; and
- (6) any history of violations, as identified in subsection (c) of this regulation.
- (c) For each second or subsequent occurrence of a violation for which a civil penalty has been assessed within a three-year period, the civil penalty assessed for the subsequent violation shall be the maximum amount allowed by law. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-2126, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 13; implementing K.S.A. 2-2125, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 12; effective Oct. 18, 2002.)
- **4-15-14.** Informal settlement. (a) The respondent may request a settlement conference at any time during an administrative proceeding.
- (b) The parties, upon reaching a proposed settlement, shall reduce the settlement proposal to writing and present it to the secretary in the form of a consent order. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2-2126, as amended by 2002 SB 437, § 13; effective Oct. 18, 2002.)
