Notice of Governor's Arts Awards
Nomination Deadline

Nominations for the 2003 Kansas Governor's Arts Awards are being accepted by the Kansas Arts Commission until the deadline of Thursday, May 1. Any Kansas citizen or organization may submit a documented nomination in one of six categories: Individual Artist, Arts Organization, Art Educator, Arts Advocate, Individual Patron or Patron Organization. Individual artists may be in the visual, performing, literary, folk or media arts.

Nominees must be Kansas citizens or Kansas-based organizations with records of outstanding contributions to the excellence, growth and support or availability of the arts in Kansas. Prior honorees, current members of the commission or its staff, and art projects or programs are not eligible.

Nominations either must be received in the Kansas Arts Commission office by 5 p.m. Thursday, May 1, or must bear a U.S. Postal Service postmark that is not later than the deadline date. Metered mail is not acceptable as a postmark. Nominations that are delivered by express mail, overnight delivery or by hand will not be accepted after the deadline time.

All original nominations must be submitted on the official form. Handwritten nominations will not be considered. If more than one nomination is received for the same person or organization, only the first one received will be accepted.

The 2003 Governor's Arts Awards guidelines and nomination form were published in the commission's fiscal year 2004 grant guidelines booklet. These materials also may be downloaded from the commission's Web site at <http://arts.state.ks.us/programs>.

Award recipients will be selected from the eligible nominees by a panel including members of the Kansas Arts Commission, a representative of the Governor, and representatives from various arts disciplines and organizations.

All support materials—including but not limited to photographs, slides, video tapes, audio tapes, letters, clippings, manuscripts or publications—become the property of the commission and will not be returned.

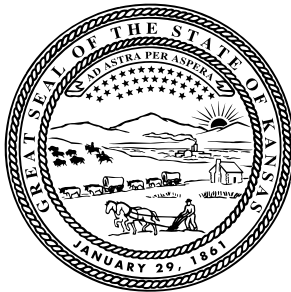

HB 2426, An act making and concerning appropriations for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2004, and June 30, 2005, for state agencies; authorizing certain transfers, capital improvement projects and fees, imposing certain restrictions and limitations, and directing or authorizing certain receipts, disbursements and acts incidental to the foregoing, by Committee on Appropriations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has reviewed an application from Washington County to modify its existing construction and demolition (C&D) landfill by developing a new disposal area in the northeast portion of the county property and to add a yard waste composting facility on the property. The proposed new disposal area is located north and east of the existing C&D cell in the Southwest Quarter of Section 8, Township 3 South, Range 4 East in Washington County, at 1644 Sunflower Road, Washington.

The proposed landfill will cover an additional 4.5 acres on the 40-acre property, which is currently used as a solid waste facility. The proposed yard waste composting facility will occur on about .5 acre at the same site. The proposed landfill is estimated to have capacity for approximately 50,000 cubic yards of C&D waste, with the period of active landfill operation estimated at 16 years. The bottom of the landfill is proposed to be at elevations ranging from 1,340 to 1,343.5 feet (as much as 10 feet below the natural ground surface elevations prior to excavating), and final landfill elevations will be at elevations ranging from 1,354 to 1,360 feet (approximately matching the natural ground surface elevations prior to construction).

Washington County has certified that the application described herein is compatible with surrounding land use. Washington County also has certified that the application is consistent with the solid waste management plan for Washington County. KDHE has reviewed the application and found it to be in conformance with the state solid waste regulations.

KDHE is providing public notice of its intent to issue an amended permit to Washington County for the proposed landfill modification and yard waste composting facility described herein. A copy of the administrative record, including the permit application, engineering drawings, draft permit and other information regarding this permit action, will be available for public review March 21-April 21, during normal business hours, at the following locations:

A public hearing on various administrative regulation adoptions will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday, June 4, in the first floor hearing room of the offices of the State Corporation Commission, 1500 S.W. Arrowhead, Topeka. The regulations under consideration concern proposed revisions of the Kansas gas pipeline safety regulations, **K.A.R. 82-11-1, 82-11-3, 82-11-4, 82-11-8 and 82-11-10.**

The proposed changes to these regulations are amendments that are comprised largely of technical corrections, clarification and updates of adoptions of federal regulations, including the transportation of natural and other gas by pipeline; annual reports, incident reports and safety-related condition reports, found in 49 C.F.R. Part 191; the minimum federal pipeline safety standards found in 49 C.F.R. Part 192; and the drug and alcohol testing requirements of 49 C.F.R. Part 199. In particular, the adoption by reference of 49 C.F.R. Part 191, 49 C.F.R. Part 192 and 49 C.F.R. Part 199 have been updated to the current 2002 federal regulations. One significant change to the regulations is the adoption of 49 C.F.R. Part 192 Subpart N. This federal regulation requires operators of natural gas systems to establish a qualification program for their employees who perform certain tasks dealing with operations and maintenance functions.

Since compliance with the significant revisions to the regulations is already mandated by federal law, state adoption of the proposed regulations will not have a significant impact on any other governmental agency, private entity including natural gas companies, any private citizen or consumer of natural gas.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. Temporary Administrative Regulations

Article 6.—GOOD TIME CREDITS AND SERVICE COMPUTATION

44-6-115a. Awarding and withholding good time credits for incarcerated offenders. (a) With the exception of calculation of good time credits affecting the conditional release dates, which are controlled by K.A.R. 44-6-114d, this regulation shall govern the award and withholding of good time credits.

(b) (1) At the conclusion of the initial inmate classification, 100% of the good time credits available from the sentence begins date to the date of the initial good time award shall be awarded, unless there is written documentation of maladjustment before the date of the initial award.

(2) The initial award of good time credits shall be made on the same day of the month on which the sentence was established. If a full month has not elapsed between the computed sentence begins date and the conclusion of the initial classification, good time credits shall not be awarded until the first classification review following the initial classification.

(c) Following the initial award, good time credits may be awarded at each classification review from credits available since the previous classification review.

(d) The following factors shall be considered in determining whether or not an inmate is awarded good time credits:

- (1) The inmate's performance in a work assignment;
- (2) the inmate's performance in a program assignment;
- (3) the inmate's maintenance of an appropriate personal and group living environment;
- (4) the inmate's participation in release planning activities;
- (5) the inmate's disciplinary record; and
- (6) any other factors related to the inmate's general adjustment, performance, behavior, attitude, and overall demonstration of individual responsibility and accountability.

(e) If an inmate refuses to work constructively or participate in assigned programs, 100% of the good time credits available for program classification review periods shall be withheld until the inmate participates in the assigned program at a time that permits the inmate to complete the program, unless the facility health authority determines that the inmate is physically or mentally incapable of working or participating in a particular program or detail.

(f) If an inmate fails to cooperate in the development of an acceptable release plan, the good time credits available for award during the 120-day period immediately before the inmate's projected or scheduled release date shall not be awarded.

(g) Award of good time credits shall be withheld on the basis of an inmate's disciplinary record in the following manner:

(continued)

(1) If a facility disciplinary hearing officer finds the inmate guilty of a class I disciplinary offense, at least 50% of the good time credits available for that classification review period shall be withheld.

(2) If a facility disciplinary hearing officer finds the inmate guilty of a class II disciplinary offense, at least 25% but not more than 50% of the good time credits available for the classification review period shall be withheld. For purposes of this paragraph, summary disciplinary judgments pursuant to K.A.R. 44-13-201b shall not be considered a guilty finding.

(3) If a facility disciplinary hearing officer finds the inmate guilty of a class III disciplinary offense, at least 10% but not more than 25% of the good time credits available for that classification review period shall be withheld. For purposes of this paragraph, summary disciplinary judgments pursuant to K.A.R. 44-13-201b shall not be considered a guilty finding.

(4) If a facility disciplinary hearing officer finds the inmate guilty of multiple disciplinary violations within a single disciplinary report, only the most serious violation shall be used in determining the percentage of good time credits to be withheld.

(h) The percentage of good time credits withheld during a classification review period shall be cumulative but shall not exceed 100% of that available for that classification review period.

(i) Good time credits forfeited as a result of a penalty imposed by a facility disciplinary hearing officer shall not be restored to an inmate. Article 12.—CONDUCT AND PENALTIES

44-12-1002. Violation of published internal management policies and procedures or of published orders. Each violation of any published internal management policies and procedures of the secretary of corrections or any published orders of the warden of the facility shall be an offense of the class stated in the internal management policy and procedure or in the order itself. If no class is stated, the violation shall be a class III offense. Each violation of any internal management policy and procedure shall be subject to the penalties that are prescribed in the internal management policy and procedure. If no penalty is prescribed, then the violation shall be subject to the penalties provided in this article of regulations. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2002 Supp. 75-5210, K.S.A. 75-5251; effective May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1981; amended April 20, 1992; amended Feb. 15, 2002; amended, T-44-3-11-03, March 11, 2003.)

Article 13.—DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURE

44-13-201b. Summary judgment procedure. (a) In any case involving one or more alleged class II or class III offenses, the reporting officer may offer the inmate the option of resolving the matter through the summary judgment procedure as an alternative to writing a disci-

plinary report that leads to initiation of the formal disciplinary hearing process.

(b) Officers shall carry with them or have immediate access to summary judgment citation forms.

(c) If an officer observes an inmate in the act of committing one or more offenses designated as eligible for summary judgment procedures that the officer believes require more than an undocumented, on-the-spot verbal reprimand, the officer may file a formal disciplinary report against the inmate or offer the inmate summary judgment by issuing a summary judgment citation. If summary judgment is offered to the inmate by the officer, the offer shall not be withdrawn without the commission of additional alleged disciplinary offenses by the inmate.

(1) The summary judgment citation shall be written, notarized, and served on the inmate by the reporting officer within 24 hours of the alleged incident, and shall include the following:

(A) The date and time of each alleged offense;

(B) the date and time the citation is written;

(C) the name and rule number of each alleged offense;

(D) a statement of the facts of the alleged incident, including names of witnesses;

(E) the date and time that the citation is served on the inmate;

(F) the summary judgment sanction; and

(G) the signature of the inmate indicating acceptance or refusal of the summary judgment.

(2) The officer may impose only one of the following summary judgment sanctions regardless of the number of offenses cited:

(A) Restriction from privileges for up to 10 days;

(B) a fine not to exceed \$10.00;

(C) extra work for up to two hours per day, not to exceed five days; or

(D) restitution of up to \$10.00.

(3) The inmate may choose whether to accept the summary judgment or to reject it in favor of the formal disciplinary hearing process. This decision shall be made within one hour of the inmate's receipt of the citation, or it shall be assumed that the inmate refused the summary judgment. The officer may choose to impose a different summary judgment sanction after discussion of the incident with the inmate, and this fact shall be documented on the summary judgment citation if the inmate then accepts the summary judgment.

(A) If the inmate accepts the summary judgment offered, this acceptance shall constitute a waiver of the inmate's right to the benefits of the formal disciplinary hearing process. The waiver of rights established according to K.A.R. 44-13-101a shall be executed by the inmate. Upon the inmate's acceptance of the summary judgment, the sanction shall be immediately imposed, and the shift supervisor shall be notified.

(B) If the inmate refuses the summary judgment offered, the inmate shall receive the applicable hearing process. The summary judgment citation shall be marked and signed by the officer and the inmate to indicate the inmate's refusal. The citation may then be used in lieu of the more formal disciplinary report to initiate the formal disciplinary hearing process. In that event, all normal applicable time limits shall run from the time the inmate

signs the citation indicating refusal of the summary judgment. This shall constitute service of the disciplinary report on the inmate as required by K.A.R. 44-13-201. The requirement contained in K.A.R. 44-13-201 that an attempt be made to ensure that the officer personally serving the report on the inmate not be the same officer who wrote the report shall not apply when summary judgment has been offered.

(C) If an inmate refuses the summary judgment offered, the inmate shall not be charged with a more serious offense or combination of offenses than was alleged in the summary judgment citation.

(D) All evidence shall be confiscated or seized in connection with the issuance of a summary judgment citation, and shall be disposed of in accordance with K.A.R. 44-5-111.

(4) All summary judgment citations accepted by the inmate shall be documented in the inmate's file. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 2002 Supp. 75-5210, K.S.A. 75-5251; effective April 20, 1992; amended July 11, 1994; amended Feb. 15, 2002; amended, T-44-3-11-03, March 11, 2003.)

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 20.—CHEMIGATION

4-20-11. Civil penalties. (a) The process for issuance and processing civil penalties shall follow the procedure established in K.A.R. 4-13-60 through 4-13-65, except for all of the following:

(1) The provision of K.A.R. 4-13-62(b) shall be replaced by the provisions of subsection (b) below.

(2) Any reference to the terms "state and federal pesticide laws" or "pesticide law" contained in K.A.R. 4-13-60 through 4-13-65 shall be replaced by the term "the Kansas chemigation safety law," as the context requires.

(3) All references to the term "pesticide business licensee" shall be replaced by the term "person" or "swine facility," as the context requires.

(b) The amount proposed for each civil penalty shall be within the ranges listed below:

(1) For each violation of K.S.A. 2-3305, and amendments thereto, the proposed civil penalty shall be not less than \$100 and not more than \$5,000.

(2) For each violation of K.S.A. 2-3308(a)(2), (a)(3), or (a)(4), and amendments thereto, the proposed civil penalty shall be not less than \$100 and not more than \$5,000.

(3) For each violation of K.S.A. 2-3313(a) or (b) or of K.S.A. 2-3313(f) or (i), and amendments thereto, the proposed civil penalty shall be not less than \$100 and not more than \$5,000.

(4) For each violation of K.S.A. 2-3308, and amendments thereto, not covered in paragraph (b)(2) above, the

proposed civil penalty shall be not less than \$100 and not more than \$1,000.

(5) For each violation of K.S.A. 2-3313 not covered in paragraph (b)(3) above, the proposed civil penalty shall be not less than \$100 and not more than \$1,000.

(6) For each application of waste in violation of K.S.A. 2-3318, and amendments thereto, the proposed civil penalty shall be not less than \$100 and not more than \$5,000.

(c) For the second or any subsequent occurrence of a violation for which a civil penalty has been assessed within a three-year period, the civil penalty assessed for the second or subsequent violation shall be the maximum amount for the category listed. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-3305 and K.S.A. 2-3309; implementing K.S.A. 2-3308 and 2-3317; effective March 26, 1990; amended, T-4-12-29-98, Jan. 1, 1999; amended April 23, 1999; amended April 4, 2003.)

4-20-15. Agronomic application rates. The agronomic application rate for swine waste shall be the amount of waste required for plant nutrition and for the nutrient-holding capacity of the surfaces or soils to which swine waste is applied, as determined by sound agronomic methods. Sound agronomic application rates shall be determined in consultation with Kansas state university. Sound agronomic methods may include the rate derived from the calculations from the form prescribed by the secretary of agriculture in K.A.R. 4-21-1 and K.A.R. 4-21-7. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-3305, K.S.A. 2-3309; implementing K.S.A. 2-3318, as amended by L. 2002, ch. 181, sec. 14 and K.S.A. 2001 Supp. 65-1,182; effective, T-4-12-29-98, Jan. 1, 1999; effective April 23, 1999; amended April 4, 2003.)

Article 21.—NUTRIENT UTILIZATION PLANS

4-21-1. "Nutrient utilization plan" defined; amendments to the plan; exceptions. (a) A confined feeding facility for swine under Kansas law that has an animal unit capacity of 1,000 or more and whose waste is applied to land shall prepare a nutrient utilization plan for review by the secretary of agriculture. The plan shall be on a form prescribed by the secretary and shall be a plan that forecasts nutrient management from the date of submission through the next five years. The plan shall be updated annually, maintained at the office of the swine facility, along with the three previous years' versions of the records, and made available to the secretary of agriculture upon request.

(b) Whenever the term "waste" is referred to in article 21 of these regulations, it shall mean swine manure, swine wastewater, or swine manure and swine wastewater mixed together.

(c) Changes in conditions that warrant amendments requiring the secretary's approval to a facility's nutrient utilization plan shall include any of the following:

(1) A swine facility's permit is no longer valid, but the facility plans to seek a new permit.

(2) Additional land to which waste will be applied is not described in an approved plan.

(3) A procedure for waste application will be used that is not described in an approved plan.

(continued)

(4) Land included in an approved nutrient utilization plan is no longer available for application as provided for in the approved nutrient utilization plan because legal authorization for land application no longer exists for that land.

(5) A phosphorus soil analysis result exceeds the phosphorus-holding capacity of the soil in a field as prescribed by K.A.R. 4-21-7.

(d) Swine facilities required by law to prepare nutrient utilization plans shall submit any other amendments necessary to facilitate approval as requested by the secretary of agriculture.

(e) Any amendment described in subsection (c) or subsection (d) of this regulation to the plan shall be submitted to the secretary of agriculture and approved by the secretary before the application of waste.

(f) "Swine facility" or "facility," as used in article 21 of these regulations, shall mean a confined feeding facility for swine under Kansas law that has an animal unit capacity of 1,000 or more and that applies manure or wastewater to land. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-3309; implementing K.S.A. 2-3302, K.S.A. 2002 Supp. 2-3318 and K.S.A. 65-1,182; effective, T-4-12-29-98, Jan. 1, 1999; effective April 23, 1999; amended April 4, 2003.)

4-21-3. Soil samples. (a) (1) The soil nutrient values may be determined either by analysis of a single composite of representative samples from a field or from the mathematical average of all the results from grid samples. Grid soil sampling is defined as a systematic method of sampling that separates the field into identified subunits with each subunit sampled separately. Each composite sample shall be representative, at the time it is taken, of the soils and of the nutrient values in the field from which the sample is taken.

(2) Each field where waste is to be applied shall be sampled before the application unless the field has been sampled in the preceding 12 months, but sampling shall not be required more frequently than annually unless required by the department due to elevated nutrient levels. The sampling shall consist of a representative number of soil cores from each field and shall be collected by either of the following methods:

(A) Two composite samples shall be collected from each field by separating the top six inches of each core collected from the bottom of the core sample. If multiple cores are taken, all samples from the top six inches of soil shall be mixed together. This composite sample shall be tested for phosphorous, zinc, copper, nitrate-N, and chloride. The bottom segment of each soil core sample from six through 24 inches shall then be mixed together, and this composite sample shall be tested for nitrate-N and chloride.

(B) Two composite samples shall be collected by obtaining individual core samples. A composite sample to be tested for phosphorous, copper, and zinc shall be collected from the top six inches of the soil and mixed if multiple cores are collected. The second composite sample shall be tested for nitrate-N and chloride, and shall be collected by taking a core sample from the soil surface to a soil depth of 24 inches. If multiple cores are taken, the samples shall be mixed before testing.

(b) The owner or operator of each swine facility shall sample the soil within 60 days following any application of waste if the application is the result of an emergency waste disposal. Each individual who collects any soil sample to comply with these regulations shall certify the location and number of representative cores collected from the field.

(c) A copy of the certification of each field and the laboratory analysis of composite or grid soil sample shall be maintained in the office of the swine facility and made available to the secretary of agriculture or designee upon request. The certification required by this regulation shall be submitted on a form prescribed by the secretary.

(d) Samples shall be taken by the secretary of agriculture or designee if, at that individual's discretion, an inspection requires a sample. Each composite soil sample taken by the secretary of agriculture or designee shall be taken in the manner required by this regulation and by K.A.R. 4-21-4. A composite soil sample taken by the secretary of agriculture or designee shall be presumed to be representative of the field. Whether a sample is representative shall be within the sole discretion of the secretary of agriculture, and the secretary's determination of whether a sample is representative shall be final. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-3305 and K.S.A. 2-3309; implementing K.S.A. 2-3318, as amended by L. 2002, ch. 181, sec. 14 and K.S.A. 2001 Supp. 65-1,182; effective, T-4-12-29-98, Jan. 1, 1999; effective April 23, 1999; amended April 4, 2003.)

4-21-4. Soil tests. The composite soil samples from each field shall be analyzed for the nutrients specified in subsection (a) in the manner prescribed by this regulation.

(a) The analyses listed in this subsection shall follow the directions on the specified pages that are hereby adopted by reference from the north central regional research publication no. 221, "recommended chemical soil test procedures for the north central region," revised January 1998, as follows:

(1) The analysis for nitrate-N shall follow the directions on pages 17 through 19.

(2) The analysis for phosphorus shall follow the directions on pages 21 through 26. Calcareous soils shall follow the directions for the Olsen phosphorus test on pages 25 through 26. For noncalcareous soils, the analysis shall follow the directions for either the Bray and Kurtz P-1 analysis, on pages 21 through 22, or the Mehlich 3 analysis, on pages 23-24. Calcareous soil is defined as soil having a pH above 7.0 that effervesces when a solution of 3N (three normal) hydrochloric acid is added drop-wise to the sample.

(3) The analysis for copper shall follow the directions for diethylenetriaminepentaacetic acid (DTPA) extraction on pages 41 through 42.

(4) The analysis for chlorides shall follow the directions for the mercury (II) thiocyanate method on pages 49 through 50.

(5) The analysis for zinc shall follow the directions for DTPA extraction on pages 41 through 42.

(b) An analysis different from any analysis specified in this regulation may be used if the analysis is based on

generally recognized sound agronomic interpretations and laboratory methods and is approved by the secretary of agriculture.

(c) The authorized representative for the laboratory at which the sample was analyzed shall certify that the sample was analyzed according to the applicable procedure set forth in this regulation and that the results of the analysis are an accurate analysis of the sample. The laboratory's certification shall show the date the sample was received, the date the sample was analyzed, the signature of the laboratory's authorized representative, and the results of the analysis for each chemical in each sample analyzed. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-3305 and K.S.A. 2-3309; implementing K.S.A. 2-3318, as amended by L. 2002, ch. 181, sec. 14 and K.S.A. 2001 Supp. 65-1,182; effective, T-4-12-29-98, Jan. 1, 1999; effective April 23, 1999; amended April 4, 2003.)

4-21-5. Agreements to apply waste. Each agreement for the application of waste on land owned by a person or persons other than the swine facility that is required to prepare a nutrient utilization plan shall be in writing. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-3305 and K.S.A. 2-3309; implementing K.S.A. 2-3318, as amended by L. 2002, ch. 181, sec. 14 and K.S.A. 2001 Supp. 65-1,182; effective, T-4-12-29-98, Jan. 1, 1999; effective April 23, 1999; amended April 4, 2003.)

4-21-6. Recordkeeping. (a) Each swine facility that is required to prepare a nutrient utilization plan shall keep records required by the law for the five years immediately preceding the date of the then-current inspection or for the years the swine facility operates after January 1, 1999. The swine facility shall not be required to keep records required by these regulations for more than five years from the date of approval.

(b) Actual nutrient values of waste may be used if the analysis used to determine the values is based on generally recognized sound agronomic interpretations and laboratory methods. Book values that are generally recognized as based on sound agronomic calculations may be substituted for actual values in preparing a nutrient utilization plan except for soil nutrient contents that require assay.

(c) Only actual soil analysis values shall be used in the preparation of nutrient utilization plans.

(d) Each facility shall maintain the records required for that facility by K.A.R. 4-21-1 through K.A.R. 4-21-7, and K.A.R. 4-20-15 at the facility's site office. All records re-

quired to be kept by K.A.R. 4-21-1 through K.A.R. 4-21-7, and K.A.R. 4-20-15 shall be made available to the secretary of agriculture upon request. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-3305 and K.S.A. 2-3309; implementing K.S.A. 2-3318, as amended by L. 2002, ch. 181, sec. 14 and K.S.A. 2001 Supp. 65-1,182; effective, T-4-12-29-98, Jan. 1, 1999; effective April 23, 1999; amended April 4, 2003.)

4-21-7. Exceeding the agronomic rate for phosphorus-holding capacity. A phosphorus soil analysis, as required by the secretary, shall be deemed to exceed the agronomic rate for phosphorus-holding capacity of the soil in a field if any of the following conditions is met: (a) The average annual rainfall is less than or equal to 22 inches, all of the field has a slope of five percent or less, and the soil analysis result using the Bray and Kurtz P-1 or the Mehlich 3 analysis method for phosphorus ("P") for the field exceeds 200 ppm or exceeds 76 ppm of "P" using the Olsen analysis method, as adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-21-4.

(b) The average annual rainfall is less than or equal to 22 inches, any part of the field has a slope of greater than five percent, and the soil analysis result using the Bray and Kurtz P-1 or the Mehlich 3 analysis method for "P" exceeds 150 ppm or exceeds 57 ppm of "P" using the Olsen analysis method.

(c) The average annual rainfall is greater than 22 inches but less than 30 inches, the slope for all of the field is less than five percent, and the soil analysis result using the Bray and Kurtz P-1 or Mehlich 3 analysis method for "P" for the field exceeds 150 ppm or exceeds 57 ppm of "P" using the Olsen analysis method.

(d) The average annual rainfall is greater than 22 inches but less than or equal to 30 inches, the slope of any part of the field is greater than five percent, and the soil analysis result using the Bray and Kurtz P-1 or Mehlich 3 analysis method for "P" for the field exceeds 100 ppm or exceeds 38 ppm of "P" using the Olsen analysis method.
