Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 11 a.m. Monday, January 12, in Room 401 of the Kansas Department of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed change in an existing rule and regulation of the Grain Warehouse Program. A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 4-25-16. The proposed regulation establishes fee increases authorized in K.S.A. 34-228. These increases include the fee associated with annual fees for warehouses with a capacity of 700,001 bushels or greater. This also will include increasing the fee associated with amending the license, the fee associated with the hourly rate for additional or special examinations, and the fee associated with the functional unit. The proposed regulation will increase existing fees in the last half of fiscal year 2004 and subsequent fiscal years.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Agriculture,

109 S.W. 9th, 4th Floor, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Establishing the Governor's Office of
Health Planning and Finance**

WHEREAS, health costs are rising rapidly, threatening the ability of Kansans to access affordable health care; and
WHEREAS, over ten percent of Kansas citizens lack health insurance; and

WHEREAS, the health care industry comprises twelve percent of the state's gross product and provides employment to thousands of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, Kansas needs to address the approaching crisis in health care with a comprehensive plan that focuses on the issues of quality, affordability, accessibility and financing.

NOW THEREFORE, I create an Office of Health Planning and Finance with the following purpose and charge:

(1) Serve as the convenor of health policy initiatives that assure coherent, collaborative and cross agency data collection, analysis and policy development.

(2) Serve as coordinator of health and health care policy initiatives brought forth by HHS Cabinet Team members and approved by the Governor.

(3) Bring together providers, advocates, key Cabinet officials, elected officials, and business leaders to plan a comprehensive approach to addressing the key issues of cost, quality and accessibility.

(4) Inform the public about health issues and possible solutions.

(5) At the request of the Governor, develop a multi-year plan to address issues of health and health care that focuses on short, middle and long term solutions to the issues of affordability, accessibility and quality.

(6) Coordinate public purchasing of health care by state agencies in such a way as to improve quality and the cost-effectiveness of health care services.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 03-21 and shall become effective immediately.

WHEREAS, the Director of the Kansas Water Office has informed me, pursuant to K.S.A. 74-2608, of the existence of extreme drought conditions within the state; and

WHEREAS, there is every indication that the present drought conditions will not abate in the near future; and

WHEREAS, the Kansas Emergency Management Act (K.S.A. 48-924) states that the Governor shall be responsible for meeting the dangers to the state and its people from disasters, including drought.

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby:

1. Declare a Drought Emergency for all the counties identified below; and

2. Authorize and direct all agencies under the jurisdiction of the Governor to implement those Drought Emergency-level drought response actions assigned to them in the Operations Plan of the Governor's Drought Response Team.

Drought Emergency Counties by Climate/Crop Reporting District

Northwest: Cheyenne, Decatur, Graham, Norton, Rawlins, Sheridan, Sherman and Thomas.

West Central: Gove, Greeley, Lane, Logan, Ness, Scott, Trego, Wallace and Wichita.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 03-22 and shall become effective immediately.

This Executive Order shall remain in effect for those counties so identified until rescinded by Executive Order or superseded by a subsequent Executive Order revising the drought stage status of those counties affected.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Environment, Bureau of Air and Radiation, will conduct a public hearing at 10 a.m. Tuesday, January 6, in the Prairie Conference Room, third floor, Curtis State Office Building, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed amendment to existing air quality regulation K.A.R. 28-19-202. K.A.R. 28-19-202 applies to the state's annual air emissions fee program. A summary of the proposed amendment and its economic impact follows.

Proposed amendments to K.A.R. 28-19-202: Federal law requires that state air quality permit programs be funded through an annual fee assessed on emissions from regulated air emission sources. The Kansas Air Quality Act authorizes the required fee system at K.S.A. 65-3024. K.A.R. 28-19-202 imposes an annual fee on emissions of air pollutants from certain major stationary sources. The proposed amendments to this regulation increase air emission fees and implement requirements that direct the Secretary of Health and Environment to "periodically increase or decrease such fees consistent with the need to cover the direct and indirect costs" of implementing the air program. The proposed amendment increases the fee from \$20 per ton to \$25 per ton for emissions in the years 2001 and beyond. Total additional fee receipts of approximately \$847,875 for SFY 2004 are expected for the approximately 240 air sources subject to this regulation, based on estimated total emissions of 169,575 tons during the year from these sources. This increase is necessary due to reductions in agency revenues resulting from reductions in emissions, an increase in the assessed indirect costs, and the transfer of fee fund interest to the general fund. Additional changes are made to the rule to clarify the late fee provisions, and deletion of obsolete language is proposed.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a 60-day public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulatory action. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Ralph J. Kieffer, Bureau of Air and Radiation, Suite 310, Curtis State Office Building, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the proposed regulatory action during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to require each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Jackson, Suite 310, Topeka, 66612-1366, not later than the close of business December 8 in order for the Secretary of Health and Environment to consider the request.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has a 45-day review period, which will start concurrently with the 30-day public comment period, within which to object to

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the proposed permit. If the EPA has not objected in writing to the issuance of the permit within the 45-day review period, any person may petition the administrator of the EPA to review the permit. The 60-day public petition period will directly follow the EPA 45-day review period. If the EPA waives its 45-day review period, the 60-day public petition period will start directly after the 30-day public comment period. Interested parties may contact KDHE to determine if the EPA's 45-day review period has been waived.

Any such petition shall be based only on objections to the permit that were raised with reasonable specificity during the public comment period provided for in this notice, unless the petitioner demonstrates that it was impracticable to raise such objections within such period, or unless the grounds for such objection arose after such period. Article 54.—OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

100-54-2. Education requirements. (a) An educational program for licensure as an occupational therapist shall be recognized by the board if the program meets the "standards for an accredited educational program for the occupational therapist," adopted December 1998 by the accreditation council for occupational therapy education and hereby adopted by reference.

(b) An educational program for licensure as an occupational therapy assistant shall be recognized by the board if the program meets the "standards for an accredited educational program for the occupational therapy assistant," adopted December 1998 by the accreditation council for occupational therapy education and hereby adopted by reference. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-5405; implementing K.S.A. 65-5406; effective, T-88-17, July 1, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 15, 1999; amended Nov. 21, 2003.)

100-54-3. Examinations. (a) Each applicant for licensure as an occupational therapist or occupational ther-

apy assistant shall submit proof of having passed a nationally administered, standardized examination. This examination shall be one that is approved by the board and consists of written questions from the following content areas of occupational therapy:

- (1) Human development and performance;
- (2) principles and strategies in the identification and evaluation of strengths and needs;
- (3) principles and strategies in intervention and treatment planning;
- (4) principles and strategies in intervention;
- (5) the nature of the occupation and occupational performance;
- (6) service management; and
- (7) the individual's responsibilities as a professional.

(b) In order to qualify as board-approved, the entry-level certification examination for an occupational therapist administered by the national board for certification in occupational therapy, inc. shall meet the standards for an examination established by the board in subsection (a).

(c) In order to qualify as board-approved, the entry-level certification examination for an occupational therapy assistant administered by the national board for certification in occupational therapy, inc. shall meet the standards for an examination established by the board in subsection (a).

(d) To qualify for a license, each applicant for a license as an occupational therapist and occupational therapy assistant shall obtain a minimum criterion-scaled score of 450 on the required examination. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-5405; implementing K.S.A. 65-5407; effective, T-88-17, July 1, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 15, 1999; amended Nov. 21, 2003.)

100-54-5. Unprofessional conduct; defined. "Unprofessional conduct" means any of the following: (a) Using fraudulent or false advertisements;

(b) engaging in occupational therapy under a false or assumed name, or by impersonating another person licensed by the board as an occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant;

(c) practicing occupational therapy without reasonable skill and safety because of illness; disability, excessive use of alcohol or drugs; illegal use of controlled substances, chemicals, or any other type of material; or as a result of any mental or physical condition;

(d) having an occupational therapy license, registration, or certification revoked, suspended, or limited, or an

application for any of these denied by the proper regulatory authority of another state, territory, District of Columbia, or other country;

(e) cheating or attempting to subvert the validity of the examination required for licensure;

(f) having been found either not guilty by reason of insanity or incompetent to stand trial by a court of competent jurisdiction;

(g) failing to furnish the board, its investigators, or its representatives any information legally requested by the board;

(h) being sanctioned or disciplined by a peer review committee or medical care facility for acts or conduct that would constitute grounds for denial, refusal to renew, suspension, or revocation of a license under K.S.A. 65-5410 and amendments thereto;

(i) surrendering a license, registration, or certification to practice occupational therapy in another state while disciplinary proceedings are pending for acts or conduct that would constitute grounds for denial, refusal to renew, suspension, or revocation of a registration under K.S.A. 65-5410 and amendments thereto;

(j) being professionally incompetent, as defined in K.S.A. 65-2837 and amendments thereto;

(k) representing to a patient that a manifestly incurable disease, condition, or injury can be permanently cured;

(l) providing occupational therapy to a patient without the consent of the patient or the patient's legal representative;

(m) willfully betraying confidential information;

(n) using any advertisement that is false, misleading, or deceptive in a material respect;

(o) committing conduct likely to deceive, defraud, or harm the public;

(p) making a false or misleading statement regarding the licensee's skill, which shall include providing any form of occupational therapy without appropriate education, training, and knowledge in the specific therapeutic methods used;

(q) committing any act of sexual, psychological, or physical abuse, or exploitation;

(r) obtaining any fee by fraud, deceit, or misrepresentation;

(s) charging an excessive fee for services rendered;

(t) failing to keep written records justifying the course of treatment of the patient; or

(u) delegating occupational therapy to a person who the licensee knows or has reason to know is not qualified by training or experience to perform it. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-5405 and 65-5410; implementing K.S.A. 65-5410; effective, T-88-17, July 1, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 15, 1999; amended Nov. 21, 2003.)

100-54-6. License; temporary license; renewal; late renewal. (a) Each application for licensure shall be considered for approval by the board on April 1 of each year, and each license shall expire on March 31 of the following year.

(b) A temporary license shall be issued by the board to each applicant for licensure who meets the requirements for licensure, pays the temporary license fee, and has not

been guilty of unprofessional conduct. Each temporary license shall expire on March 31. Temporary licenses shall not be renewed.

(c) The license specified in subsection (a) may be renewed annually. Each request for renewal shall be submitted on a form provided by the board and shall be accompanied by the following:

(1) The prescribed license renewal fee; and
(2) proof of satisfactory completion of a program of continuing education as required by the board.

(d) Licenses not renewed by March 31 shall expire but may be renewed for a period of 30 days thereafter, upon request of the licensee. The request for late renewal shall be submitted on the same form as that for a request for renewal and shall be accompanied by the following:

(1) The prescribed license late renewal fee; and
(2) proof of satisfactory completion of a program of continuing education as required by the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-5405; implementing K.S.A. 65-5408 and 65-5412; effective, T-88-17, July 1, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Dec. 27, 1993; amended Jan. 15, 1999; amended Nov. 21, 2003.)

100-54-7. Continuing education; license renewal.

(a) (1) Each licensee shall submit evidence of completing a minimum of 40 contact hours of continuing education during the preceding two calendar years. Evidence of this attainment shall be submitted before or with the application for renewal in each odd-numbered year.

(2) No evidence of continuing education shall be required for license renewal in even-numbered years.

(b) Each licensee initially licensed in an even-numbered year shall submit evidence of completing a minimum of 20 contact hours of continuing education before or with the application for the first renewal.

(c) Any licensee who cannot meet the requirements of paragraph (a)(1) or subsection (b) may request an extension from the board. The request shall include a plan for completion of the continuing education requirements within the requested extension period. An extension of not more than six months may be granted by the board for good cause shown.

(d) A contact hour shall consist of 60 minutes of instruction.

(e) The content of the continuing education classes or literature shall be related to the field of occupational therapy or similar areas.

(f) Each licensee shall acquire continuing education from the classes of education experiences defined in subsection (g). The licensee shall acquire a minimum of 30 contact hours from Class I, Class IV, or Class V. A maximum of eight contact hours may be acquired from Class II. A maximum of two contact hours may be acquired from Class III. A maximum of 30 contact hours may be acquired from Class V. A maximum of 10 contact hours may be acquired from Class VI.

(g) Continuing education experiences shall be classified as follows.

(1) Class I—Attendance at or participation in an education presentation. Class I continuing education experiences shall include the following types of education offerings.

(A) Lectures. A “lecture” means a discourse given for instruction before an audience or through a teleconference.

(B) Panels. A “panel” means the presentation of a number of views by several professional individuals on a given subject, with none of the views considered a final solution.

(C) Workshops. A “workshop” means a series of meetings designed for intensive study, work, or discussion in a specific field of interest.

(D) Seminars. A “seminar” means directed advanced study or discussion in a specific field of interest.

(E) Symposiums. A “symposium” means a conference of more than a single session organized for the purpose of discussing a specific subject from various viewpoints and presented by various speakers.

(F) College or university courses. Ten contact hours shall be given for each college credit hour with a grade of at least “C” or a “pass” in a pass/fail course.

(G) Other courses. An “other course” means a home study, correspondence, audio, video, or internet course for which the provider furnishes documentation of successful completion.

(2) Class II—In-service training. A maximum of four contact hours may be given for attending in-service training. A maximum of four contact hours may be given for instructing the in-service training, but no additional hours shall be acquired for attending that particular in-service training.

(3) Class III—Professional reading. A maximum of two contact hours may be given for reading professional literature, whether printed or provided by audiotapes, videotapes, or electronic media.

(4) Class IV—Professional publication. The maximum number of contact hours that may be given for professional publication shall be as follows:

(A) 30 hours for publication of a book or original paper; and

(B) 15 hours for a review paper, case report, abstract, or book review.

(5) Class V—Instructor preparation of Class I programs. Each licensee who presents a Class I continuing education program or its equivalent shall receive three Class V contact hours for each hour of presentation. No credit shall be granted for any subsequent presentations on the same subject matter.

(6) Class VI—Fieldwork supervision of level II students. Five contact hours may be given for supervising a level II student’s full-time fieldwork for at least a six-week period or its equivalent. Ten contact hours may be given for supervising fieldwork for at least a 12-week period or its equivalent.

(h) Each licensee shall submit documented evidence of attendance at, participation in, or presentation to Class I and Class II continuing education activities. Each licensee shall submit personal verification for Class III activities. Copies of publications shall be submitted for verification of Class IV activities. Verification of Class VI fieldwork supervision shall be submitted by the licensee’s employer.

(i) Instructional staff shall be competent in the subject matter and in the methodology of instruction and learn-

ing processes as evidenced by experience, education or publication. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-5405; implementing K.S.A. 65-5412; effective, T-88-17, July 1, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Feb. 14, 1997; amended Nov. 21, 2003.)

100-54-8. Reinstatement; expired and revoked licenses. (a) Any person may renew a license within 30 days following the date of license expiration upon payment of the license late renewal fee.

(b) For purposes of this regulation, "reinstatement" shall mean late renewal after 30 days, but five years or less, after the expiration date of a license.

(c) Any person may request reinstatement of a license. The request for reinstatement shall be submitted on a form provided by the board and shall be accompanied by the following:

(1) The prescribed license reinstatement fee; and

(2) proof of satisfactory completion of a program of continuing education as required by the board.

(d)(1) If the time since the license expired has been one year or less, no continuing education in addition to that which would have been necessary had the license been renewed before expiration shall be required.

(2) If the time since the license expired has been more than one year but fewer than three years, the applicant shall complete a minimum of 20 contact hours.

(3) If the time since the license expired has been at least three years but not more than five years, the applicant shall complete or provide one of the following:

(A) A minimum of 20 contact hours for each year or portion of a year since the date the license expired;

(B) proof that the applicant has passed the examination required under K.A.R. 100-54-3 within the past six months; or

(C) an educational program related to continued competency approved by the board.

(4) If the applicant has been in active practice in another state or the District of Columbia since the date on which the registration or certificate expired, the applicant shall submit proof of current license, registration, or certification, and proof of compliance with the continuing education requirements of that jurisdiction.

(e) Each occupational therapist and occupational therapy assistant whose license has been reinstated within two years of a license date in an odd-numbered year shall complete a minimum of 10 contact hours of continuing education for every six-month period from the date of reinstatement to the end of the next even-numbered calendar year. An occupational therapist or occupational therapy assistant whose license was reinstated after July 1 in an even-numbered year shall not be required to obtain continuing education for the first renewal in an odd-numbered year.

(f) Each applicant seeking reinstatement of a revoked license shall successfully complete a program approved by the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-5405; implementing K.S.A. 65-5412; effective, T-88-17, July 1, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Jan. 15, 1999; amended Nov. 21, 2003.)

Article 13.—RETAIL LIQUOR DEALER

14-13-9. Transactions prohibited, agreements and deliveries by retailer for sale or resale off licensed premises, registration of vehicle. (a) Any retailer may sell and deliver alcoholic liquor to a club, drinking establishment, or caterer if all of the following conditions are met:

(1) All deliveries of alcoholic liquor are made to the licensed premises of a club or drinking establishment and to the principal place of business of a caterer.

(2) All deliveries are made by a registered employee of the retailer.

(3) All deliveries are made in a registered vehicle of the retailer.

(4) The retailer provides a sales slip or voucher for each item delivered as required by K.A.R. 14-13-10.

(5) The retailer receives payment for all deliveries before or at the time of the deliveries.

(6) The retailer has first obtained a federal wholesale basic permit and displays a sign on the licensed premises stating that the retailer is a "Wholesale Liquor Dealer Under Federal Law."

(7) All deliveries of alcoholic liquor are made on those days and during those hours that a retailer may sell alcoholic liquor as provided in K.S.A. 41-712, and amendments thereto.

(8) All deliveries originate from the licensed premises of the retailer.

(b) Each retailer who desires to transport alcoholic liquor shall register each vehicle to be used for the transportation of alcoholic liquor with the director, upon forms provided by the director, and shall maintain in each vehicle an identification card issued by the director. Each registered delivery vehicle shall display the retail licensee's business name and address in plain block lettering on the front door panels of the delivery vehicle.

(c) Any retailer may sell alcoholic liquor to a temporary permit holder if all of the following conditions are met:

(1) Sales are made only upon the licensed premises of the retailer.

(2) No deliveries are made to a temporary permit holder or an event sponsor.

(3) The retailer provides a sales slip or voucher as required by K.A.R. 14-13-10.

(d) Retailers shall not sell or deliver any alcoholic liquor to any person with knowledge of, or with reasonable cause to believe, that the person to whom the liquor is sold or delivered has acquired the alcoholic liquor for the purpose of peddling or reselling the alcoholic liquor in violation of article 13 of these regulations, the Kansas liquor control act, or the club and drinking establishment act.

(e) All alcoholic liquor of a retail licensee shall be stored upon the licensed premises of the licensee. Alcoholic liquor shall not be stored upon the licensed premises after the sale. (Authorized by K.S.A. 41-210; implementing K.S.A. 41-210, K.S.A. 41-308, and K.S.A. 41-717; effective May 1, 1988; amended Aug. 6, 1990; amended July 1, 1991; amended Nov. 21, 2003.)

Article 1.—DEFINITIONS

115-1-1. Definitions. (a) Except as specified in subsection (b), the following definitions shall apply to all of the department's regulations.

(1) "Arrow" means a missile shot from a bow or a crossbow.

(2) "Bag limit" means the maximum number of any species, except fish and frogs, that may be taken by a person in a calendar day.

(3) "Bait fish" means a member of the minnow or carp family (*Cyprinidae*), sucker family (*Catostomidae*), top minnows or killifish family (*Cyprinodontidae*), shad family (*Clupeidae*), and sunfish family (*Centrarchidae*), but excluding black basses and crappie. The fish listed in K.A.R. 115-15-1 and in K.A.R. 115-15-2 shall not be considered as bait fish.

(4) "Bird dog" means a dog used to point, flush, or retrieve game birds, migratory birds, or both.

(5) "Bow" means a handheld device with a cord that connects both of its two ends and that is designed to propel an arrow. This term shall include long, recurve, and compound bows.

(6) "Bridle path" means an established, maintained, and marked pathway for the riding of animals.

(7) "Camping" means erecting a shelter or arranging bedding, or both, or parking a recreation vehicle or other vehicle for the purpose of remaining overnight.

(8) "Camping unit" means any vehicle or shelter specifically used for sleeping upon a portion of department lands or waters.

(9) "Cast net" means a circular or conical weighted net designed to be cast mouth-downward by hand and withdrawn by lines attached to its margin.

(10) "Creel limit" means the maximum total number of any species of fish or frogs that may be taken by a person in a calendar day.

(11) "Crossbow" means a transverse-mounted bow with a cord that connects the two ends and that is designed to propel an arrow, including compound crossbows. The arrow is released by a mechanical trigger.

(12) "Culling" means replacing one live fish held by an angler for another live fish of the same species if the daily creel limit for the species of fish has not been met.

(13) "Department lands and waters" means state parks, state lakes, recreational grounds, wildlife areas, sanctuaries, fish hatcheries, natural areas, historic sites, and other lands, waters, and facilities under the jurisdiction and control of the secretary through ownership, lease, license, cooperative agreement, memorandum of understanding, or other arrangement.

(14) "Depth finder" means an electronic device used to locate fish or determine underwater structures.

(15) "Dip net" means a handheld net that has rigid support about the mouth and used to land fish.

(16) "Draft livestock" means horses, mules, donkeys, and oxen used singly or in tandem with other horses, mules, donkeys, and oxen for pulling purposes.

(17) "Drag event" means a competitive event in which hounds pursue a scent trail. The event may involve a caged, pen-raised furbearer that is not released from the cage during the event.

(18) "Dryland set" means any trapping device that is placed or set on land or is not in contact with water.

(19) "Eyass" means a young of the year raptor not yet capable of flight.

(20) "Falconer" means the holder of a falconry permit.

(21) "Falconry" means the taking of wildlife with a trained raptor.

(22) "Field trial event for dogs" means a competitive event involving at least six dogs that are judged on hunting or running ability.

(23) "Firearm" means a rimfire or centerfire rifle, handgun, or shotgun; a muzzleloading shotgun, rifle, or handgun; or a cap-and-ball pistol.

(24) "Fire ring" means an open-topped, man-made, fire-retaining device.

(25) "Fireplace" means an enclosed, man-made, fire-retaining device.

(26) "Fishing line" means any hand-operated string or cord, utilizing hooks that may be used in conjunction with rods, poles, reels, bows, or spearguns.

(27) "Fish trap" means a device for catching fish consisting of a net or other structure that diverts the fish into an enclosure arranged to make escape more difficult than entry.

(28) "Fully automatic firearm" means a firearm capable of firing more than one round with a single trigger pull.

(29) "Gaff" means a hook attached to a rigid pole.

(30) "Gig" means a hand-operated spear with one or more prongs with or without barbs.

(31) "Group camping area" means any area within a state park designated by posted notice for camping by organized groups.

(32) "Haggard" means an adult raptor in mature plumage.

(33) "Hook" means a device with a single shaft and one or more points with or without barbs, used for catching fish and frogs.

(34) "Imping" means the repair of damaged feathers.

(35) "Kill site" means the location of the wildlife carcass as positioned in the field immediately after being harvested.

(36) "Length limit" means the minimum length of a fish allowed in order to take it and not release it to the

waters immediately. For the purpose of this paragraph, the length of the fish shall be measured from the tip of the snout to the end of the tail, with the mouth closed and the tail lobes pressed together.

(37) "Moorage site" means a location designated for the fastening or securing of a vessel.

(38) "Nonsport fish" means carp, drum, white amur, threadfin and gizzard shad, goldfish, gar, suckers including carsuckers and buffalo, eel, sturgeon, goldeye, white perch, and bowfin.

(39) "Orthopedic device" means a device that attaches to the body and is required to enable a handicapped person to walk.

(40) "Overflow camping area" means an area in a state park that is separate from the designated overnight camping area and that may be used for a maximum of 24 continuous hours of camping if no alternative camping facilities are available within reasonable driving distances.

(41) "Passage" means an immature raptor on first fall migration still in immature plumage.

(42) "Pen-raised wildlife" means any wildlife raised in captivity.

(43) "Pets" means domesticated wildlife, including dogs and cats.

(44) "Possession limit" means the maximum total number of a species that can be retained per person at any one time.

(45) "Prime camping site" means any site within a state park so designated by posted notice of the secretary and subject to an additional charge.

(46) "Raptors" means members of the order falconiformes or Strigiformes and specifically falcons, hawks, and owls.

(47) "Raw pelt" means the undressed skin of an animal with its hair, wool, or fur in its natural state, without having undergone any chemical preservation converting the skin to a leather condition.

(48) "Recreational vehicle" means a vehicle or trailer unit that contains sleeping or housekeeping accommodations, or both.

(49) "Running" means the pursuing or chasing of furbearers or rabbits with hounds. This term shall not include the capturing, killing, injuring, or possessing of furbearers or rabbits, or having a firearm or other weapon in possession while running, except during established furbearer or rabbit hunting seasons.

(50) "Sanctioned or licensed coyote field trial" means a competitive event that involves only sight or trail hounds and that has been advertised in one of the national foxhound journals no fewer than 30 days before the event.

(51) "Sanctioned or licensed furbearer field trial" means a competitive event in which dogs pursue unrestrained furbearers and that is sanctioned or licensed by any of the national kennel or field dog organizations for the express purpose of improving the quality of the breed through the awarding of points or credits toward specific class championships or other national recognition.

(52) "Seine" means a net with a float line and lead line designed to be pulled through the water for the purpose of catching fish.

(53) "Set line" means a string or cord anchored at one point, with not more than two hooks and is not associated with a hand-operated mechanical reel.

(54) "Sight hound" means a dog used to pursue furbearers, rabbits, hares, or coyotes by sight.

(55) "Skin and scuba diving" means swimming or diving while equipped with a face mask or goggles, allowing underwater vision and possibly involving an underwater breathing apparatus.

(56) "Snagging" means the hooking of a fish in any part of its anatomy other than the inside of the mouth.

(57) "Speargun" means a device used to propel a spear through the water by mechanical means or compressed gas.

(58) "Sport fish" means northern pike, walleye, saugeye, sauger, yellow perch, striped bass, white bass, black bass including largemouth, spotted, and smallmouth bass, striped bass hybrid, trout, muskellunge, tiger muskie, channel catfish, blue catfish, flathead catfish, paddlefish, and panfish including bullhead, black and white crappie, bluegill, redear sunfish, green sunfish, warmouth, and rock bass.

(59) "State fishing lake" means a department facility that contains the words "state fishing lake" in the name of the area.

(60) "Tip-up" means an ice fishing device designed to signal the strike of a fish.

(61) "Trail hound" means a dog used to trail furbearers, rabbits, hares, or coyotes by scent.

(62) "Transfer," means any of the following:

(A) To reassign one's license, permit, or other issue of the department to another individual;

(B) to exchange and license, permit, or other issue of the department between individuals; or

(C) to carry another individual's license, permit, or other issue of the department when that individual is not present.

(63) "Trot line" means a string or cord anchored at one or more points that does not have more than 25 hooks and is not associated with a hand-operated mechanical reel.

(64) "Turkey" means wild turkey.

(65) "Unattended fishing line" means any fishing line set to catch fish that is not marked or tagged as required by K.A.R. 115-7-2 or K.A.R. 115-17-11 and not immediately attended by the operator of the fishing line.

(66) "Wake" means the waves thrown by a vessel moving on water.

(67) "Water race" means a competitive event in which hounds pursue a scent device or a caged, pen-raised furbearer through water. The furbearer is not released during the event.

(68) "Water set" means any trapping device that has the gripping portion placed or set in flowing or pooled water and remains in contact with the flowing or pooled water.

(b) Exceptions to the definitions in this regulation shall include the following:

(1) The context requires a different definition.

(2) The defined term is specifically defined differently within the departments's other regulations. (Authorized

5-23-4. Safe yield: high plains aquifer. (a) Except as set forth in subsection (b), the approval of all applications for a permit to appropriate water from the high plains aquifer, and the approval of all applications for a change in the point of diversion if the diversion works have not been completed under the original approved application, shall be processed in accordance with K.A.R. 5-3-9, K.A.R. 5-3-10, and K.A.R. 5-3-11. For the purpose of applying K.A.R. 5-3-11 (d)(3) within the boundaries of the district, the percentages of the calculated recharge that shall be considered to be available for appropriation shall be determined using the following table:

- (3) wells authorized by term permits of fewer than five years;

(4) an application to appropriate 15 acre-feet of water or less if all of the following conditions are met:

(A) The safe yield has been exceeded but the sum of the annual quantity requested by the proposed appropriation and the total quantities authorized by prior permits because of this exemption does not exceed 15 acre-feet in a circle with a radius of ½ mile surrounding the proposed point of diversion.

(B) Well spacing criteria have been met.

(C) Approval of the application will not authorize an additional quantity of water out of an existing well authorized by a nondomestic approval of application or water right, which would result in a total combined annual quantity of water authorized from that well in excess of 15 acre-feet.

(D) All other criteria for processing a new application have been met.

(c) Each application filed to request a well within the area described in subsection (e) shall include a driller's log, an electric log, and a laboratory analysis from a state-certified laboratory of the chloride concentrations in samples taken from whatever depths are necessary to determine the vertical location where the chloride concentrations exceed 250 milligrams per liter (mg/l). The samples shall be taken from a well located within a 300-foot radius of the proposed well. A state-certified laboratory analysis shall be used to determine the vertical location of the chloride concentrations exceeding 250 mg/l.

(d) Each well constructed in the area described in subsection (e) shall be constructed in a manner that prevents the movement of water containing 250 mg/l of chlorides beyond its naturally occurring condition.

(e) The level of chlorides may exceed 250 mg/l in the following areas:

(1) The west ½ of townships 33, 34, and 35 south, range 28 west in Meade County, Kansas;

(2) the east ½ of township 33 south, range 29 west in Meade County, Kansas;

(3) all of townships 34 and 35 south, ranges 29 and 30 west in Meade County, Kansas; and

(4) all of townships 34 and 35 south, ranges 31 and 32 west and the east ½ of townships 34 and 35 south, range 33 west in Seward County, Kansas. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-706a and 82a-1028; implementing K.S.A. 82a-706a, K.S.A. 2002 Supp. 82a-711, and K.S.A. 2002 Supp. 82a-1028; effective May 1, 1981; amended May 1, 1986; amended Aug. 28, 1989; amended Sept. 22, 2000; amended Nov. 21, 2003.)

5-23-4a. Criteria for closing townships to new appropriations. (a) Entire townships shall be closed to further appropriation of water for beneficial use from the high plains aquifer if at least one of the following conditions exists:

(1) The entire township is fully appropriated.

(A) A township shall be considered to be fully appropriated if the aquifer within the township would be depleted by 40 percent or more in 25 years if current vested rights and appropriations are fully exercised and all limitation clauses listed on permits to appropriate water and certificates are in force.

(B) Aquifer depletion shall be calculated using the allowable annual appropriation formula described in subsection (b) with the area of consideration equal to the number of acres within sections of land containing saturated thickness within the township.

(2) The average saturated thickness of the aquifer within the township is 50 feet or less, as set forth in K.A.R. 5-23-15.

(3) The aquifer has been depleted by 20 percent or more since 1950. Depletion since 1950 shall be determined from maps or data, or both, recommended by the board and adopted by the chief engineer by regulation.

(4) Groundwater pumping has lowered the water level of the high plains aquifer, which has diminished the base-flow from the aquifer to the stream and impaired senior domestic surface water rights and other senior surface water rights.

(5) Groundwater pumping in an area has lowered the water level of the freshwater to the point that the issuance of additional approvals of applications will induce water in excess of 250 milligrams per liter chlorides to mix with overlying freshwater, causing contamination of the overlying freshwater.

(b) Except for the types of wells listed in subsection (c), the proposed appropriation, when added to the vested rights, prior appropriation rights, and earlier priority applications, shall not exceed, in 25 years, a calculated rate of depletion of 40 percent of the saturated thickness underlying the area of consideration. For the purpose of

analysis, all vested rights, appropriation rights, approvals of applications, and prior unapproved applications shall be considered to be fully exercised, and all limitation clauses on approvals of application and certificates shall be considered to be in force. The allowable annual appropriation shall be calculated using the following formula:

Allowable Aquifer Yield = (0.40AMS / 25) + (AR / 12)

Allowable aquifer yield = the amount of water, measured in acre-feet, available annually for appropriation from a proposed point of diversion (well).

A = the "area of consideration" shall be equal to the number of acres within sections containing saturated thickness within the township and within the district.

M = the number of feet of average saturated thickness of the high plains aquifer within the township as set forth in K.A.R. 5-23-15.

S = the storage coefficient or a specific yield of 15 percent.

R = average annual recharge and return flow, which shall be one inch per year.

(c) The calculation specified in subsection (b) shall not include the following types of wells:

- (1) Wells for domestic use;
(2) wells authorized by temporary permits; and
(3) wells authorized by term permits of fewer than five years. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-706a and 82a-1028(o); implementing K.S.A. 82a-1028(n); effective Sept. 30, 1991; amended Sept. 22, 2000; amended Nov. 21, 2003.)

(C) Approval of the application will not authorize an additional quantity of water out of an existing well authorized by a nondomestic approval of application or water right that would result in a total combined annual quantity of water authorized from that well in excess of 15 acre-feet.
