Counties and County Officers—Sanitation Controls—Sanitary Codes in Certain Counties; County Authority to Regulate Water Wells.

Waters and Watercourses—Groundwater Exploration and Protection—Abandoned Holes; Plugging; County Authority to Regulate Abandoned Water Wells. Philip E. Winter, Lyon County Counselor, Emporia, November 6, 2003.

Acting pursuant to K.S.A. 19-3701 *et seq.*, K.S.A. 65-159, and K.S.A. 82a-1201 *et seq.*, both the Kansas Department of Health and Environment and Lyon County have authority to adopt regulations or codes that require the plugging of abandoned water wells, insofar as such regulations or codes are designed and used to protect the health and safety of the general public. County or state health regulations that require an unsanitary water well to be plugged in order to protect public health are not an inappropriate, unauthorized, or illegal taking of a water right. Intoxicating Liquors and Beverages—Licensure and Regulation of Sale of Liquor by the Drink—Revocation or Suspension of License; Grounds for Disciplinary Action for Any Crime Involving a “Morals Charge”; Necessity of Indictment, Information or Complaint. Joan Wagon, Secretary, Kansas Department of Revenue, Topeka, November 6, 2003.

In accordance with agency interpretations of K.S.A. 41-2611(f), the Director of the Division of Alcoholic Beverage Control can take disciplinary action against a licensee for a crime involving gambling or one of the other enumerated crimes listed in K.S.A. 41-2601(n) only if an indictment, information, or complaint has been filed. However, a conviction is not necessary to commence disciplinary action. Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Uniform Commercial Driver’s Act—Definitions; “Driver.” Charles A. Peckham, Rawlins County Attorney, Atwood; Gary E. Rebenstorf, Director of Law and City Attorney for the City of Wichita, Wichita, November 20, 2003.

The term “driver,” as used in the Kansas Uniform Commercial Drivers’ License Act, means any person who drives, operates or is in physical control of a commercial motor vehicle, in any place open to the general public for purposes of vehicular traffic, or who is required to hold a commercial driver’s license; the term does not include a person who merely holds a commercial driver’s license but does not otherwise fall within that definition. Diversion for driving under the influence of alcohol offenses is precluded for commercial “drivers,” even though a diversion would appear on the driver’s record. Plea negotiations or charging amendments that result in convictions for lesser or fewer traffic infractions or offenses than originally charged are not precluded. Schools—Teachers’ Certificates—Cancellation of Teachers’ Certificates; Grounds; Restrictions on Issuance and Renewal of Certificates; Reports Required; Obligation of Local Board of Education. Gregory P. Goheen, Legal Counsel, and Deryl W. Wynn, Legal Counsel, Unified School District No. 500, Kansas City, Kansas, November 20, 2003.

K.S.A. 72-1383, K.S.A. 72-1397 and K.A.R. 91-22-1a establish the grounds and circumstances under which a Kansas teacher’s license may be suspended or revoked by the State Board of Education. K.S.A. 72-1383 and K.A.R. 91-22-1a provide for discretionary authority. K.S.A. 72-1397 is applicable only upon conviction or when a person has entered into a diversion agreement after the filing of criminal charges. While these statutory and regulatory provisions certainly *allow* the State Board of Education to take action against a teacher’s license when the Board determines that the teacher has committed an act that harms the health or welfare of a minor through physical or social abuse or exploitation, they do not *require* the State Board to revoke or suspend a Kansas teacher’s license upon a probable cause finding of the Division of Family Services of the Department of Social Services for the State of Missouri. Additionally, Kansas law does not currently require officials of a unified school district to report to the State Board any knowledge they may possess regarding probable cause findings of the Missouri Division of Family Services. Constitution of the State of Kansas—Finance and Taxation—Object of Tax; Schools; Capital Outlay Levy; Transfer to General Fund.

Schools—Capital Outlay Levy, Fund and Bonds—Capital Outlay Levy, Use of Proceeds; Procedure; Protest; Petition and Election; Transfer to General Fund. Representative Jim Yonally, 16th District, Overland Park, November 20, 2003.

Monies derived from a property tax and currently on hand in a school district's capital outlay fund were raised for those purposes set out in K.S.A. 72-8804. These monies may not now be used for other purposes. Any attempt by the Legislature or the electors of a unified school district to provide expenditure of those monies for any other purpose violates Section 5 of Article 11 of the Kansas Constitution. The Legislature may amend a statute such that the monies derived from the capital outlay levy authorized by the statute may be expended on newly added purposes. The amendment must include a formula that designates the portions of the assessment that should be allocated to the various purposes authorized by the statute. The allocation is applicable only to the monies that are raised after enactment of the amendment. Those monies that are not derived from a property tax and that are transferred from the general fund to the capital outlay fund are not subject to the prohibition set forth in Article 11, Section 5. The Legislature, therefore, may provide for the return of the non-property tax monies back to the general fund. Probate Code—Care and Treatment for Mentally Ill Persons—Care and Treatment Act for Mentally Ill Persons; Voluntary Admission to Treatment Facility; Voluntary Out-Patient Treatment of Minors. Phyllis Gilmore, Executive Director, Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board, Topeka, December 30, 2003.

A *mature* minor has the legal capacity to consent to out-patient mental health services. Such consent must be an informed consent in relation to the potential risks and benefits of the type of mental health treatment provided. In this context, "maturity" means having the intellectual capacity, experience, and knowledge necessary to substantially understand the situation at hand and the consequences of the choices that can be made. The risk to a therapist if a parent were to disapprove of their unemancipated minor accessing out-patient mental health services would be potential liability in a civil law suit, the outcome of which would turn on the court's evaluation of whether the minor child was sufficiently mature to consent to treatment and whether the consent was sufficiently informed. State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Regulation of Psychologists—Grounds for Suspension, Limitation, Revocation or Refusal to Issue or Renew License; Unprofessional Conduct; Psychologist's Records When Practice Sold. Phyllis Gilmore, Executive Director, Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board, Topeka, December 30, 2003.

The sale of a psychologist's practice may legitimately include client records. Once such a sale has occurred, the selling psychologist is no longer the owner or custodian of client records and thus is no longer bound by the Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board's regulation that requires the owner or custodian to retain those client records. Under regulations adopted pursuant to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA), a psychologist may use or disclose protected health information for "health care operations," which includes the sale of a practice to another covered entity, without client authorization. It is our opinion that K.S.A. 2002 Supp. 44-550b does not close portions of "Paid Loss Reporting Forms" and that the Kansas Department of Human Resources, Workers Compensation Division, cannot properly rely upon K.S.A. 2002 Supp. 45-221 to close portions of such forms. A city may use tax increment revenues, or the proceeds of bonds or notes issued under K.S.A. 12-1770 *et seq.*, to reimburse qualified redevelopment project costs incurred prior to the time the city completed the statutory procedure for creating the redevelopment district and adopting the redevelopment plan. KDHE is proposing to issue the amended permit, in accordance with prevention of significant deterioration (PSD) provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-350, which adopts the standards, procedures and requirements of 40 CFR 52.21 by reference. The amended permit authorizes an extension of 18 months for the construction permit initially issued on October 8, 2004, for Sand Sage Power, LLC (Sand Sage) to begin construction on a 660 MW pulverized coal-fired boiler; one natural gas auxil-

inary boiler; a new cooling tower; and changes to the coal, lime and ash handling equipment at the Sunflower Electric Cooperative's Holcomb Station in Holcomb. The facility is owned by Sand Sage Power, LLC, 301 W. 13th St., Hays.

The Holcomb area is designated as an attainment area under the Clean Air Act, which means that the air quality meets or exceeds the national ambient air quality standards (NAAQS). Any major source or major modification to a major source has to undergo a preconstruction review as required by the PSD regulations.

KDHE has determined that a re-evaluation of emission reduction techniques to identify the best available control technology (BACT) for each pollutant for which the emission rate exceeds the PSD significant level is appropriate in granting the extension. The purpose of BACT is to effect the maximum degree of reduction achievable, taking into account energy, environmental and economic impacts for each pollutant under review. Evaluation of the estimated emissions for the proposed Sand Sage facility indicates that the emission rate of nitrogen oxides (NOx), sulfur dioxide (SO₂), carbon monoxide (CO), volatile organic compounds (VOCs), particulate matter (PM) and particulate matter less than 10 microns (PM₁₀) all exceed the significance levels. Sand Sage conducted the required BACT re-analyses. The department has reviewed Sand Sage's BACT analyses and concurs with its findings that the initial BACT in the October 8, 2002, construction permit of low NOx burners and overfire air with selective catalytic reduction is BACT for NOx, dry flue gas desulfurization (dry FGD) is BACT for SO₂, and fabric filters are BACT for PM and PM₁₀ are still applicable.

Article 23.—SOUTHWEST KANSAS
GROUNDWATER MANAGEMENT DISTRICT NO. 3

5-23-1. Definitions. As used in these regulations, by the southwest Kansas groundwater management district in the implementation of the groundwater management district act, and by the division of water resources in the administration of the Kansas water appropriation act and the groundwater management district act, unless the context clearly requires otherwise, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this regulation. (a) "Confined aquifer" means an aquifer overlain and underlain by impermeable layers. Groundwater in a confined aquifer is normally under pressure greater than atmospheric pressure.

(b) "High plains aquifer" means the aquifer comprised of the undifferentiated Pleistocene-age deposits, Quaternary loess, alluvium, dune sand, the Ogallala formation, and deeper aquifers that are in vertical or horizontal hydraulic contact with the Ogallala formation.

(c) "Hydraulic contact" means the absence of an impermeable layer between aquifers.

(d) "Theis analysis" means the Theis non-equilibrium equation analysis described in pp. 108-113 in "ground water and wells: a reference book for the water-well industry," published in 1966 by Edward E. Johnson, Inc. The pages specified in this subsection are hereby adopted by reference.

(e) "Unconfined aquifer" means an aquifer in which the groundwater is exposed to the atmosphere through openings in the overlying materials. The upper surface of an unconfined aquifer is the water table.

(f) "Well" means any artificial excavation that is drilled, cored, bored, washed, driven, dug, or otherwise constructed when the intended use of the excavation is for the acquisition, diversion, or artificial recharge of groundwater. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-706a and K.S.A. 2002 Supp. 82a-1028(o); implementing K.S.A. 82a-706a and K.S.A. 2002 Supp. 82a-1028; effective May 1, 1981; amended May 1, 1985; amended Sept. 22, 2000; amended Feb. 27, 2004.)

5-23-3. Minimum well spacing requirements: high plains aquifer. (a) (1) The minimum horizontal distance between each proposed nontemporary, nondomestic well and all other senior nontemporary, nondomestic wells diverting water from the high plains aquifer shall be determined from the following schedule.

Quantity per well (acre-feet per year)	Minimum well spacing requirement
15 or less	660 feet
16 - 200	1,300 feet
201 - 300	1,600 feet
301 - 400	1,900 feet
401 - 500	2,100 feet
more than 500	2,300 feet

(2) The minimum well spacing requirement shall be based on the maximum annual quantity of water. The required well spacing shall be the greater of either of the following:

(A) The minimum spacing for the total authorized and requested quantity of water for the proposed well; or

(B) the total authorized and requested annual quantity of water for the nontemporary, nondomestic well against which the spacing is being measured that is senior to the date on which the application was filed. If the quantity of water applied for includes a fraction of an acre-foot, the quantity of water shall be rounded down to the next whole number of acre-feet for the purpose of applying the table in this subsection.

(b) The location of a well or wells on an application for approval to change the point of diversion under an existing water right shall be no more than 2,640 feet from the currently authorized and completed point of diversion.

(c) A well shall be exempt from the minimum well spacing requirements of this regulation if the well meets either of the following conditions:

(1) The well is being replaced within 300 feet of the currently authorized point of diversion.

(2) The proposed replacement well location improves the spacing to all other wells for which the spacing requirement was not met on the date on which the application for a change in point of diversion was filed and continues to meet requirements for spacing to all wells for which the spacing requirement was met at the time the application for change in point of diversion was filed.

(d) No application for approval to change the point of diversion under an approved application for which the original well has not been drilled shall be approved if the location of the proposed point of diversion decreases the distance from the approved location to any other existing wells to less than the spacing requirement for new applications.

(e) Each nondomestic, nontemporary well shall be located a minimum of 660 feet from all domestic wells with a priority earlier than the date on which the change application was filed, unless all of the following conditions are met:

(1) The domestic well is owned by the applicant.

(2) The applicant signs a written request to waive the requirements for spacing to the domestic well.

(3) The applicant submits information documenting the location and depth of the domestic well and any other information necessary for the chief engineer to determine whether the domestic well is likely to be impaired.

(4) A Theis analysis or other hydraulic analysis shows that the domestic well is not likely to be impaired by the proposed well.

(f) In the case of a battery of wells, as defined in K.A.R. 5-1-1, the minimum horizontal distance shall be measured from the geographic center of the wells comprising the battery.

(g) The total annual quantity per well shall be the sum of all of the quantities authorized or requested by any water rights, permits, or applications requesting or authorizing that well as a point of diversion. (Authorized

Quantity per well (acre-feet per year)	Minimum well spacing requirement	Required distance from hydraulic contact point
15 or less	660 feet	2,640 feet
16 to 25	2,300 feet	1 mile
26 to 100	5,280 feet	2 miles
More than 100	10,560 feet	5 miles

(2) The minimum well spacing requirement shall be based on the authorized maximum annual quantity of water. The well spacing requirement shall be the greater of either of the following:

(A) The minimum spacing for the total authorized and requested annual quantity of water of the proposed well; or

(B) the total authorized and requested quantity of water for nontemporary, nondomestic well against which spacing is being measured that is senior to the date on which the application was filed.

The total annual quantity of water per well shall be the sum of all of the quantities authorized or requested by any water rights, approvals of applications, or applications requesting or authorizing that well as a point of diversion.

If the quantity of water applied for includes a fraction of an acre-foot, the quantity of water shall be rounded down to the next whole number of acre-feet for the purpose of applying the table in this subsection.

(b) In the case of a battery of wells, as defined in K.A.R. 5-1-1, the minimum horizontal distance shall be measured from the geographic center of the wells comprising the battery.

(c) A well penetrating both a confined and unconfined aquifer shall be constructed to prevent the vertical migration of water between the aquifers. A well diverting water from the Dakota aquifer system shall be constructed to prevent the vertical migration of water between the Dakota aquifer system and all other freshwater aquifers.

(d) The location of a well or wells on an application for approval to change the point of diversion under an existing water right shall be no more than 2,640 feet from the currently authorized and completed point of diversion.

(e) A well shall be exempt from the minimum well spacing requirements of this regulation if the well meets either of the following conditions:

(1) The well is being replaced within 300 feet of the currently authorized point of diversion.

(2) The proposed replacement well location improves the spacing to all other wells for which the spacing requirement was not met on the date on which the application for a change in point of diversion was filed and continues to meet requirements for spacing to all wells for which the spacing requirement was met at the time the application for change in point of diversion was filed.

(f) No application for approval to change the point of diversion under an approval of application for which the original well has not been drilled shall be approved if the location of the proposed point of diversion decreases the distance from the approved location to any other existing wells to less than the spacing requirements for a new application.

(2) The applicant signs a written request to waive the requirements for spacing to the domestic well.

(3) The applicant submits information documenting the location and depth of the domestic well and any other information necessary for the chief engineer to determine whether the domestic well is likely to be impaired.

(4) A Theis analysis or other hydraulic analysis shows that the domestic well is not likely to be impaired by the proposed well.
