K.A.R. 40-1-50. Insurance scoring; definitions; requirements. This regulation governs the use of credit scoring by insurers writing business in Kansas. The primary purpose of the regulation is to clarify the recently enacted Insurance Score Act.

There is little fiscal impact as a result of this regulation on insurance companies since no requirements are imposed other than those currently required by existing statutes. There also is little or no fiscal impact on the Kansas Insurance Department or other government agencies.

K.A.R. 40-2-27. Minimum reserve liabilities and non-forfeiture benefits. This regulation provides tables of select mortality factors and rules for their use in determining liabilities and forfeiture. This regulation adopts by reference Recognition of the 2001 Mortality Table for Use in Determining Reserve Liabilities and Nonforfeiture Benefits. This model replaces the 1958 commissioner's extended term table, which is currently used to as the valuation standard for credit life.

The economic impact on companies is a positive one in that the table adopted in the proposed regulation allows companies to compete more effectively. There is little or no impact on the Kansas Insurance Department and other governmental agencies.

Workforce Investment Board

The Local Area I Workforce Investment Board in Kansas is issuing a request for proposals (RFP) from qualified entities to enter into contracts to accomplish the following services for the Workforce Investment Act (WIA) Program. Bidders may apply for any or all of these contracts:

1. Administrative Entity
2. Paymaster Services
3. Case Management Services (Adult and Dislocated Worker participants)

Local Area I is located in the western and central part of Kansas and is comprised of 62 counties. An Internet link to a map of the area, as it relates to the total size of Kansas, can be found at <http://entkdhhr.state.ks.us/OneStop/ENTMap03.htm>. This area received approximately \$1.2 million for the current program year ending June 30, 2004. The funding available will pay the costs of the administrative entity, paymaster services, participant enrollments and all case management services.

The contract period will be from July 1, 2004 to June 30, 2006. If the bidder selected is other than the current administrative entity, paymaster or case manager, the July 1, 2004, date may be earlier to allow for a transition period.

Eligible entities for the Administrative Entity Contract or Case Management Services Contracts may be the following:

1. Postsecondary educational institution;
2. Private nonprofit organization (includes community-based organizations);
3. Private for-profit entity;
4. Government agency; or
5. Other interested organization or entity (such as local chambers of commerce or other business organizations).

Eligible entities for the Paymaster Services Contract must meet the following requirements:

1. Be an established entity with experience providing paymaster or similar services;
2. Have an accounting system to record and execute transactions and provide auditable reports and accounts;
3. Be able to generate all payments by check;
4. Use generally accepted accounting principles and follow state and WIA policy requirements;
5. Ensure each person acting on behalf of bidder to handle WIA funds be bonded at a minimum of \$150,000 to protect against loss.

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, May 11, in Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed rule and regulation of the Department of Administration, Division of Personnel Services, on a permanent basis.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Administration, 1000 S.W. Jackson, Suite 500, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Faith Loretto at (785) 296-6000 or TTY (785) 296-4798. The north entrance to the Landon State Office Building is accessible. Handicapped parking is located at the south end of the building, across the street from the north entrance to the building, and on Ninth Street just around the corner from the north entrance.

A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 1-9-4. Vacation leave. K.A.R. 1-9-4 establishes limits on the number of vacation leave hours that state employees can accumulate, based on their length of service. In its present form, K.A.R. 1-9-4 provides for up to 20 hours of any accrued vacation leave that exceeds the maximum accumulation of hours at the end of the last payroll period paid in each fiscal year to be converted to sick leave. Proposed amendments to this regulation would increase the amount of excess vacation leave that can be converted to sick leave at the end of the fiscal year from 20 hours to 40 hours.

This proposal would have a positive economic impact on state employees. At the end of FY 2003, 2,364 employees had 26,970 hours of excess vacation leave converted to sick leave. Of those employees, 592 forfeited 13,134 additional hours of excess vacation leave. Had the proposed amendment been in place, these 592 employees each would have had up to 20 additional hours of excess va-

cation leave converted to sick leave. The conversion of this excess vacation leave to sick leave credits would benefit these employees in the form of higher sick leave balances to draw upon as needed or, for those employees who retire from state service and meet the requirements of K.S.A. 75-5517, in the form of a higher pay-out of a portion of the employee's final sick leave balances.

The only cost to the Department of Administration as a result of the proposed changes to this regulation will be in the amount of \$3,520 for programming changes to the SHARP system.

The 26,970 hours of vacation leave converted to sick leave at the end of FY 2003 had an estimated value of \$451,645 (assuming an average hourly wage of \$14.60, including benefits, except GHI). By increasing the maximum number of hours that can be converted from 20 to 40 hours, many of the additional 13,134 hours of vacation credits that were forfeited also would be converted to sick leave. If all of those hours were converted, they would have an estimated value of \$219,944. However, the actual economic impact on state agencies cannot be quantified. The primary effect would be in lost productivity, to the extent that state employees use the converted sick leave. For those employees who remain in the state service until retirement, there is a potential cost if the additional conversion of 20 hours of vacation leave to sick leave was significant enough to result in higher sick leave payouts to the retiring employees. If this were the case, there is the remote possibility that the assessment that agencies pay for the state leave reserve fund could be increased. However, the impact of the change on sick leave balances is not expected to be substantial enough to affect state leave reserve fund assessments.

The other changes being proposed to this regulation consist of clarifications and other nonsubstantive technical amendments, including one amendment relating to length of service in subsection (b) of the regulation. Language stating that "accrual of vacation leave based on length of service shall not be retroactive" would be removed from this regulation, leaving in place the existing language that states that length of service is to be calculated in accordance with K.A.R. 1-2-46. This change, as well as the other nonsubstantive, technical amendments, will have no economic impact on the Department of Administration, other state agencies or state employees.

No economic impact on the general public is anticipated.

Topeka Blvd., Topeka, to consider adoption of three proposed amended rules and regulations (K.A.R. 100-11-1, 100-54-4, and 100-55-4) dealing with fees for medical doctors, osteopathic doctors, chiropractors, and the professions of occupational therapy and respiratory therapy.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the above-referenced rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit comments prior to the hearing to the Board of Healing Arts, 235 S. Topeka Blvd., Topeka, 66603. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the regulations during the hearing. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the regulations being considered and the economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Tammy Farr at (785) 296-8558 or Betty Johnson at (785) 296-3680. Handicapped parking is located at the west end of the Hutton Building, and the northwest entrance to the building is accessible.

A summary of the proposed amended rules and regulations to be considered at the hearing and the respective economic impact is as follows:

K.A.R. 100-11-1. Amount. This regulation deals entirely with fees collected by the board for medical doctors, osteopathic doctors and chiropractors for license application, reinstatement and renewal. Six new categories have been added to this fee regulation for those licensees who will be renewing their licenses on-line. Each of these three professions will have the option of completing a paper renewal or on-line renewal.

K.A.R. 100-54-4. Fees. This regulation deals entirely with fees collected by the board for occupational therapists (OTs) and occupational therapy assistants (OTAs) for license application, reinstatement and renewal. Two new categories have been added to this fee regulation for those licensees who will be renewing their licenses on-line. Both OTs and OTAs will now have the option of completing a paper renewal or on-line renewal.

K.A.R. 100-55-4. Fees. This regulation deals entirely with fees collected by the board for respiratory therapists for license application, reinstatement and renewal. Two new categories have been added to this fee regulation for those licensees who will be renewing their licenses on-line. Respiratory therapists will now have the option of completing a paper renewal or on-line renewal.

The regulations are not mandated by any federal law.

The on-line renewal and late renewal fees will be less than a paper renewal to accommodate credit card processing and transaction fees so that the final cost to the licensee will be the same as if they had completed a paper renewal. Revenue collected by the Board of Healing Arts will be less by these proposed amended rule and regulations.

Subject to the notice of sale and preliminary official statement, sealed, facsimile and electronic bids for the purchase of \$13,735,000* General Obligation Bonds, Series 2004, of Johnson County Community College, Johnson County, Kansas, will be received (1) in the case of sealed and facsimile bids, by the executive vice president for administrative services at the address and fax number hereinafter set forth, and (2) in the case of electronic bids, through *PARITY* electronic bid submission system, until 10 a.m. Tuesday, March 23, 2004, at which time such bids will be publicly read and will be acted upon by the governing body at its meeting to be held that day. The college and the college's financial advisor shall not be responsible for any failure, misdirection, delay or error in the means of transmission selected by the bidder. No oral or auction bids will be considered. No bid of more than 103.50 percent nor less than 99.75 percent of the principal amount of the bonds and accrued interest thereon to the date of delivery will be considered.

Bond Details

The bonds will consist of fully registered certificated bonds in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. The bonds will initially be registered in the name of Cede & Co., as nominee of the Depository Trust Company, New York, New York, to which payments of principal of and interest on the bonds will be made. Individual purchases of bonds will be made in book-entry form only. Purchasers will not receive certificates representing their interest in bonds purchased. The bonds will be dated April 1, 2004, and will become due annually on August 1 in the years as follows:

The bonds will bear interest from the dated date at rates to be determined when the bonds are sold, which interest will be payable semiannually on February 1 and August 1 in each year, beginning February 1, 2005. UMB Bank, N.A., Overland Park, Kansas, will be the paying agent on the bonds.

No Redemption Prior to Maturity

The bonds will not be subject to redemption prior to their stated maturity.

Pre-Bid Revisions

The college reserves the right to issue a supplemental notice of bond sale not later than 24 hours prior to the sale date via the MUNIFACTS News Service, which may (i) modify the principal amount of the bonds, and/or (ii)

modify such other terms of this notice as the college determines.

Adjustment of Issue Size

The college reserves the right on the date of the award to, in its sole discretion, increase or decrease the total principal amount of the bonds and/or to increase or decrease individual principal maturities, depending on the interest rates bid and the issue price specified, in order to properly structure the bond issue.

Good Faith Deposit

Each bid for the bonds shall be accompanied by a good faith deposit in the form of a certified or cashier's check or a financial surety bond in the amount of 2 percent of the principal amount of the bonds, payable to the order of the college.

Delivery

The college will pay for preparing the bonds. The bonds will be delivered in book-entry form only through the facilities of the Depository Trust Company, New York, New York, on or about April 13, 2004.

Approval of Bonds

The bonds will be sold subject to the approving legal opinion of Gilmore & Bell, P.C., Kansas City, Missouri, bond counsel, which opinion will be furnished and paid for by the college, will accompany the bonds and will be delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. The opinion also will include the opinion of bond counsel relating to the exclusion of the interest on the bonds from gross income for federal income tax purposes and from computation of Kansas adjusted gross income. Reference is made to the preliminary official statement for further discussion of federal and Kansas income tax matters relating to the interest on the bonds.

Assessed Valuation and Bonded Indebtedness

The total assessed valuation of the taxable tangible property within the college for the year 2003 is \$7,197,776,874. The total general obligation indebtedness of the college as of the date of the bonds, including the bonds, is \$13,735,000 (preliminary, subject to change).

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has reviewed an application from Champlin Tire Recycling, Inc. to increase the capacity of its existing waste tire monofill (WTM) and to transfer the monofill permit from the company's president to the company. The WTM is located in the Southwest Quarter of Section 34, Township 5 South, Range 2 West, approximately 5 miles east from the city of Concordia on the south side of State Highway 9. The existing waste tire monofill permit was issued to Ronald W. Champlin January 19, 1991. The WTM is operated by Champlin Tire Recycling, Inc.

The 120-acre property includes a waste tire transporter and processing facility, two past disposal cells (2.41 and 5.69 acres; 66,945 and 95,750 cubic yards), an active disposal cell (6.00 acres; 195,000 cubic yards), and a proposed future disposal cell (6.81 acres; 220,000 cubic yards). The active cell has an estimated useful life of 1.3 years and the proposed future cell has an estimated useful life of six years, at projected disposal rates. The bottom of the future cell is proposed at an elevation of 1,348 feet, which ranges from 4 feet above to 18 feet below the existing ground surface. The completed surface of the future cell (including the final cover) is proposed at elevations ranging from 1,348 feet to 1,384 feet, representing fill depths up to 20 feet above the existing ground surface. The final cover on the WTM is proposed to consist of at least 30 inches of soil with native grasses established on the surface. Cloud County has certified that the application described herein is consistent with the county's solid waste management plan and compatible with the surrounding land use. KDHE has reviewed the application and found it to be in conformance with the state solid waste statutes and regulations.

KDHE is providing public notice of its intent to issue a permit to Champlin Tire Recycling, Inc. allowing the modifications described above. **Article 15.—APPLICATION FOR PERMITS;
 DOMESTIC WATER SUPPLY**

28-15-35. Conditions of accreditation. (a) Definitions.

(1) "Accreditation" means the issuance of a document by the secretary attesting to the fact that a laboratory meets the minimum requirements specified in K.A.R. 28-15-35, 28-15-36, 28-15-36a, and 28-15-37. For the purposes of this article, the terms "accreditation" and "certification" are equivalent.

(2) "Accredited," when used to describe a laboratory, means that the laboratory meets all of the requirements

for accreditation as specified in K.A.R. 28-15-35, 28-15-36, 28-15-36a, and 28-15-37.

(3) "Accrediting authority" means a territorial, state, federal, or international governmental agency that has responsibility and accountability for environmental laboratory accreditation and that grants accreditation.

(4) "Analyst" means a person who performs the analytical methods and associated techniques and who is responsible for applying required laboratory practices and other pertinent quality controls to meet the required level of quality.

(5) "Clean water act" and "CWA" mean U.S. public law 92-500, as amended by public law 92-217, public law 95-576, public law 96-483, and public law 97-117, and 33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq., as in effect on February 4, 1987, which governs water pollution control programs.

(6) "Denial" means the department's refusal to accredit a laboratory after submission of an application.

(7) "Department" means the Kansas department of health and environment.

(8) "EPA" means the U.S. environmental protection agency.

(9) "Field laboratory" means any Kansas environmental laboratory performing compliance analyses limited to one or more of the following parameters:

- (A) Chlorine;
- (B) dissolved oxygen;
- (C) hydrogen ion (pH);
- (D) sulfite;
- (E) temperature; or
- (F) turbidity.

(10) "Interim accreditation" means accreditation issued for either of the following:

(A) An additional parameter utilizing a technology not previously inspected by the laboratory accreditation officer and for which the laboratory meets all other accreditation requirements including acceptable proficiency testing studies, if available; or

(B) a field laboratory before inspection.

(11) "Laboratory" means a legally identifiable facility performing environmental analyses in a controlled and scientific manner.

(12) "Laboratory accreditation officer" means any person determined by the secretary to have adequate credentials to evaluate laboratories supplemented by successful completion of the EPA drinking water laboratory accreditation officers' training course, nationally approved assessor training courses, and refresher training courses.

(13) "Laboratory technical director" means a person whose functions are to direct technical personnel and evaluate the quality of test procedures performed in the laboratory.

(14) "Parameter" means any chemical or physical substance for which analysis is performed.

(15) "Parametric group" means organic compounds for which analysis is performed by utilizing a single method.

(16) "Proficiency testing sample" and "PT" mean a sample the composition of which is unknown to the analyst. The PT samples are used to test whether or not the

laboratory can produce analytical results within specific performance limits.

(17) "Reciprocity" means the secretary's recognition of the validity of the accreditation granted by another accrediting authority, in order to issue Kansas accreditation based upon the evaluation conducted by that accrediting authority.

(18) "Resource conservation and recovery act" and "RCRA" mean 42 U.S.C. 6921, as amended by the solid waste disposal act of 1980, public law 94-482, as in effect on October 21, 1980, and as amended by the hazardous and solid waste act of 1984, public law 96-616, as in effect on November 8, 1984, which governs solid and hazardous waste programs.

(19) "Revocation" means the withdrawal of a laboratory's accreditation.

(20) "Safe drinking water act" and "SDWA" mean 42 U.S.C. §300f et seq., as in effect on August 6, 1996, which governs drinking water programs.

(21) "Secretary" means the secretary of the Kansas department of health and environment.

(22) "Suspension" means the temporary removal of a laboratory's accreditation for a period of time that shall not exceed six months.

(23) "Supplemental accreditation" means accreditation based upon state-of-the-art technology for which the EPA has not given method approval and for which monitoring is required by the department.

(b) The requirements for applying for and maintaining accreditation shall be as follows:

(1) A complete application shall be submitted on forms provided by the department.

(2) Each laboratory, to maintain uninterrupted accreditation, shall file an application for renewal at least 60 calendar days before the current accreditation expires.

(3) Each applicant shall be subject to the payment of fees as specified in K.A.R. 28-15-37.

(4) When applications are submitted by accredited laboratories requesting accreditation for additional parameters, the expiration date for the additional accreditation shall be the same date indicated on the certificate currently in effect for that laboratory. Additional fees shall be assessed for each additional parameter or parametric group as specified in K.A.R. 28-15-37.

(c) Scope of accreditation. Laboratories may be accredited for any of the following:

(1) Drinking water (SDWA);

(2) wastewater (CWA);

(3) solid and hazardous waste (RCRA); or

(4) field laboratory. Accreditation of field laboratories shall be limited to the parameters specified in paragraph (a)(9) of this regulation.

(d) On-site assessment.

(1) Each on-site assessment of a laboratory shall be conducted by a laboratory accreditation officer at least once every two years. Each on-site assessment shall be conducted to determine whether the laboratory meets the minimum requirements for accreditation as specified in K.A.R. 28-15-35 and 28-15-36.

(2) Each on-site assessment of a field laboratory shall be conducted by a laboratory accreditation officer at least once every three years. On-site assessments shall be con-

ducted to determine whether the laboratory meets the minimum requirements for accreditation as specified in K.A.R. 28-15-35 and 28-15-36a.

(3) Additional on-site assessments may also be performed to resolve problems indicated by deficiencies from proficiency testing, deficiencies from prior on-site assessments, or changes that an accredited laboratory makes in location, personnel, or methodology. Other on-site assessments may be conducted to resolve complaints.

(4) If deficiencies are identified during the on-site assessment, a deficiency report shall be submitted to the laboratory by the department. The laboratory shall respond to the deficiency report with corrective action within 30 days of receiving the deficiency report. If corrective action is considered not acceptable by the laboratory accreditation officer, the laboratory shall have an additional 30 days after notification of nonacceptance to submit a revised plan for corrective action. Failure to comply with this requirement shall result in denial or suspension of accreditation as established in paragraphs (g)(1), (g)(2), and (g)(3) of this regulation.

(e) Proficiency testing. For initial and continuing accreditation, each laboratory, excluding field laboratories, shall participate in proficiency testing studies obtained from a nationally accredited proficiency test provider. Each laboratory shall demonstrate the successful performance of each test method for each parameter for which the laboratory seeks or maintains accreditation. Laboratories shall be permitted to report multiple results for the same parameter from one PT sample by using more than one method.

(1) For initial accreditation, the laboratory shall meet the following requirements:

(A) Successfully complete two proficiency testing studies out of the three most recent rounds attempted; and

(B) schedule proficiency testing studies at least 15 days after the closing date of the previous study analyzed by the laboratory. The most recent three rounds attempted shall have occurred within 18 months of the date the laboratory submitted an application for accreditation. A result shall be considered unacceptable if the laboratory reports values for a parameter outside of the acceptance limits.

(2)(A) For continuing accreditation, the laboratory shall meet the following requirements:

(i) Participate in a proficiency testing study twice per year. The completion dates of successive PT studies shall be approximately six months apart; and

(ii) maintain a performance history of at least two acceptable proficiency testing studies out of the three most recent studies. A result shall be considered unacceptable when either the laboratory reports values outside of the acceptance limits or the laboratory fails to participate in a study.

(B) Failure to maintain the acceptable performance history as specified in paragraph (e)(2)(A)(ii) shall result in suspension of the method related to the affected parameter.

(C) A laboratory may elect to analyze a remedial proficiency testing sample after obtaining unacceptable results. The remedial sample shall be scheduled at least 15

days after the closing date of the previous study analyzed by the laboratory. The remedial sample shall be considered part of the laboratory's corrective action. The result shall count as part of the historical two-out-of-three performance criteria. If the result from the remedial sample is unacceptable, the laboratory shall be subject to suspension of the method related to the affected parameter.

(3) After loss of accreditation of a parameter due to nonacceptable performance, the laboratory shall complete two acceptable proficiency testing studies out of the three most recent studies attempted for the failed parameter before accreditation may be reinstated. Each study shall be scheduled at least 15 days after the closing date of the previous study analyzed by the laboratory.

(4) Proficiency test providers shall report laboratory results for proficiency test samples in the format listed in "proficiency testing electronic data formats," published April 2003 by the department and hereby adopted by reference.

(f) Notification of accreditation. A certificate shall be issued by the secretary to each laboratory satisfactorily meeting all requirements of K.A.R. 28-15-35, 28-15-36, 28-15-36a, and 28-15-37. The parameters or parametric groups for which the laboratory is accredited shall be noted. An accreditation number shall be assigned to each accredited laboratory and shall be included on the certificate. The certificate shall be issued for a 12-month period. The accreditation period may vary from the 12-month period for administrative reasons.

(g) Denial, suspension, or revocation of accreditation.

(1) Denial of accreditation. Laboratory accreditation shall be denied in part or in total for any of the following reasons:

(A) Failure to submit a complete application;

(B) failure to meet the personnel requirements as specified in K.A.R. 28-15-36 and K.A.R. 28-15-36a;

(C) failure to successfully analyze and report proficiency testing samples as required in subsection (e) of this regulation;

(D) failure to demonstrate to the laboratory accreditation officer that the laboratory meets the required standards for accreditation, based upon an on-site assessment;

(E) failure to respond to the deficiency report with acceptable corrective action after an on-site assessment within the time period established in paragraph (d)(4) of this regulation;

(F) failure to implement corrective action;

(G) misrepresentation or omission of material facts;

(H) denial of entry during normal business hours for an on-site assessment;

(I) failure to pay the required fees as established in K.A.R. 28-15-37;

(J) failure to ensure that essential laboratory personnel are available for participation, as needed, for the satisfactory completion of an on-site assessment;

(K) any prior sustained charges of administrative violations of state or federal laws and regulations related to the provision of environmental laboratory services or reimbursement for these services, against the owner or owners or laboratory technical director or directors, in-

dividually or jointly, or against any laboratory owned or directed by these individuals; or

(L) conviction for a crime that is related to environmental laboratory services and involves theft or fraud.

(2) Accreditation after denial.

(A) Accreditation shall not be granted until a laboratory has demonstrated to the laboratory accreditation officer that the deficiencies that caused the denial have been corrected.

(B) If the laboratory is not successful in correcting the deficiencies that caused the denial, the laboratory shall wait six months before submitting a new application.

(C) After denial of accreditation in part, the laboratory shall reapply for accreditation of the affected parameters. After denial of accreditation in total, the laboratory shall submit a complete application to the department.

(3) Suspension of accreditation. Any accredited laboratory's accreditation may be suspended in part or in total for any of the following reasons:

(A) Failure to notify the laboratory accreditation officer in writing within 30 days of changes in ownership, laboratory personnel, laboratory location, or methods that involve a change in technology or instrumentation;

(B) failure to successfully analyze and report proficiency testing samples as required in subsection (e) of this regulation;

(C) failure to respond to the deficiency report with acceptable corrective action after an on-site assessment;

(D) failure to respond to the deficiency report after an on-site assessment within the time period established in paragraph (d)(4) of this regulation; or

(E) failure to implement corrective action after an on-site assessment.

(4) Accreditation after suspension.

(A) Accreditation after suspension shall not be granted until a laboratory has demonstrated to the laboratory accreditation officer that the deficiencies that caused suspension have been corrected.

(B) After suspension of accreditation in part, the laboratory shall reapply for accreditation of the affected parameters. After suspension of accreditation in total, the laboratory shall submit a complete application to the department.

(C) If the laboratory does not correct the deficiencies that caused the suspension within six months, the laboratory accreditation shall be revoked in part or in total.

(5) Revocation of accreditation.

(A) An accreditation may be revoked in part or in total if it is determined that there has been any of the following:

(i) Failure to maintain compliance with K.A.R. 28-15-35, 28-15-36, 28-15-36a, and 28-15-37;

(ii) reporting, as official compliance data, any parameter or analytical result for which accreditation has not been obtained;

(iii) failure to respond to the deficiency report with acceptable corrective action after an on-site assessment;

(iv) failure to respond to the deficiency report after an on-site assessment within the time period established in paragraph (d)(4) of this regulation; or

(v) failure to implement corrective action after an on-site assessment.

(B) An accreditation may be revoked in total if it is determined that there has been any of the following:

(i) Misrepresentation or omission of material facts;

(ii) failure to participate in proficiency testing studies as required in subsection (e) of this regulation;

(iii) denying entry to a laboratory accreditation officer during the laboratory's working hours;

(iv) failure to ensure that essential laboratory personnel are available for participation, as needed, for the satisfactory completion of an on-site assessment;

(v) any prior sustained charges of administrative violations of state or federal laws and regulations related to the provision of environmental laboratory services or reimbursement for such services, against the owner or owners or laboratory technical director or directors, individually or jointly, or against any laboratory owned or directed by these individuals; or

(vi) conviction for a crime that is related to environmental laboratory services and involves theft or fraud.

(6) Accreditation after revocation.

(A) After revocation, accreditation shall not be granted until a laboratory has corrected the reason for revocation and has met all the requirements of the revocation order.

(B) After revocation of accreditation in part, the laboratory shall reapply for accreditation of the affected parameters. After revocation of accreditation in total, the laboratory shall submit a complete application to the department.

(h) Analytical results obtained after an accreditation has been suspended or revoked shall not be submitted to the department as official compliance data.

(i) Reciprocity.

(1) Establishment of reciprocity for the accreditation of laboratories located outside of the state of Kansas. Laboratories located outside of the state of Kansas may be accredited by the department, if the laboratory is accredited by a national environmental laboratory accrediting authority that the secretary recognizes as having standards equivalent to those standards established in this regulation and K.A.R. 28-15-36.

(2) Each out-of-state laboratory shall submit an application to the department with a copy of the current certificate issued by the primary accrediting authority or authorities, and the accreditation fees specified in K.A.R. 28-15-37.

(3) Laboratories located outside of Kansas shall not be approved as field laboratories.

(4) The laboratory shall be accredited only for the requested parameters for which it holds accreditation from its primary accrediting authority or authorities. The laboratory shall be accredited by the department for only parameters and methods included in the Kansas scope of accreditation.

(5) In lieu of reciprocity, any out-of-state laboratory may apply for and receive accreditation from the department if all of the following criteria are met:

(A) The laboratory is located within 25 miles of the Kansas border.

(B) The laboratory is performing laboratory services for its own company facility located within the state of Kansas.

(C) The laboratory meets all other requirements for accreditation as specified in this regulation.

(j) Laboratory withdrawal of accreditation. Any laboratory may withdraw its application for accreditation at any time during the accreditation process. Any laboratory may withdraw from accreditation at any time during the accreditation period. In both cases, each laboratory shall notify the department in writing. The fees submitted to the department up to the time of the notification shall not be refunded, as specified in K.A.R. 28-15-37.

(k) The change in legal status, ownership, or location of an accredited laboratory.

(1) Each accredited laboratory shall notify the department, in writing, of any change in legal status, ownership or location, or any combination of these, within 30 calendar days of the change.

(2) Accreditation shall be transferred if the change in legal status or ownership of the accredited laboratory does not affect the laboratory's staff, equipment, and organization.

(3) Accreditation shall not be transferred if the change in legal status or ownership of the accredited laboratory affects the laboratory's staff, equipment, and organization. The laboratory shall be required to apply for accreditation as specified in subsection (b) of this regulation.

(4) Any change in the legal status, ownership, or location, or any combination of these, may require an on-site assessment of the laboratory by a laboratory accreditation officer.

(5) If a change in ownership occurs, all records and analyses that have been performed and that pertain to accreditation shall be retained for a minimum of five years and shall be subject to inspection by the department during this period without prior notification to the laboratory. (a) At least five minutes before closing of the drawing, a lottery drawing official designated by the executive director shall announce to the audience that the winner selection process will begin. Any persons wishing to enter the drawing who have not yet done so, shall immediately place their tickets into the receptacle or drum at this time.

(b) The drawing official shall announce that entries into the drawing are closed. No further entries will be accepted.

(c) The receptacle or drum shall be sealed and capable of being thoroughly mixed with a shovel or by other means or rotated a minimum of 10 times to ensure random selection.

(d) The drawing official shall designate one individual of his or her choice to participate in the selection process.

(e) The selection of two grand prize drawing winners shall be accomplished by the individual designated by the drawing official, using a bare arm technique, removing one ticket from the drawing receptacle or drum. A designated drawing official and a person representing Kansas lottery security, shall review the selected ticket to determine if the information completed by the player located on the back of the selected ticket is legible. Unless elevated to a higher place prize as set forth in subsection (g) herein, the first five valid entries drawn shall entitle the winner to a second place prize of access for two persons to what is known as "Victory Lane" at the Kansas Speedway, and the second five valid entries drawn shall entitle the winner to a third place prize consisting of rides in the Kansas Speedway's official pace car. The Kansas Speedway shall provide the Victory Lane and pace car rides as sponsor prizes. The last entries drawn shall serve as alternate winners. A person may win only one prize in this drawing.

(g) If any grand prize winner fails to present himself or herself at the time and place announced, is declared ineligible, or fails to timely present a fully-executed claim form to lottery headquarters, the next selected entry of the 13 drawn pursuant to subsection (f) herein shall be announced as the winner, subject to the same grand prize procedure as set forth in these rules. This alternate winner process shall be repeated until two valid grand prize winners are selected or until such time as no other winners remain, whichever occurs first.

(h) In the event any entry is elevated to win a grand prize, all subsequently drawn entries will be elevated in the order drawn to the next higher position.

(i) Immediately after the winning and alternate entries have been selected, a lottery official or person designated by the lottery official shall announce to the audience via the public address system at the Kansas Speedway the names on the first two entries drawn, the location at the racetrack the persons are to appear to make their predictions of the outcome of the race, and the amount of time they have to arrive at the location. If any winner fails to appear at the designated location by the announced time, that person shall no longer be eligible to participate in the contest, and the name of the first elevated winner, the location where the elevated winner is to appear, and the amount of time allowed for arrival at the location shall be announced in the same manner as the first announce-

ment. This process shall be repeated until two grand prize winners have properly presented themselves. The lottery official shall satisfy himself or herself that the persons who present themselves are the persons named on each entry.

(j) The lottery official shall determine and give each contestant an equal amount of time to predict in correct order the official first, second, and third place finishers of that day's ARCA RE/MAX race or as said race may be postponed or continued from time to time. The contestants may not select the same racers in the same finishing order. In the event both contestants have selected the same racers in the same finishing order, the first of the two contestants whose name was selected shall have the opportunity to retain his or her predictions, or change one or more of the predictions. If that contestant chooses to retain the first selections made, the other contestant must change one or more of his or her predictions. Each person's predictions shall be reduced to writing and signed by the persons making the predictions and delivered to the lottery official. The Kansas lottery shall conduct a drawing entitled "Buy \$3 Get an Entry Free Drawing 2004" and will accept entries starting February 29, 2004, for the drawing to be conducted on Friday, May 28, 2004. Rules applicable to the "Buy \$3 Get an Entry Free Drawing 2004" are contained in K.A.R. 111-7-188 through 111-7-192 and K.A.R. 111-6-1 *et seq.* (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-20-04, Feb. 18, 2004.)

111-7-189. Prize. The 48 prize winners selected in the "Buy \$3 Get an Entry Free Drawing 2004" on the date specified in K.A.R. 111-7-188 shall receive two tickets for each day of the races conducted at the Kansas Speedway in Kansas City, Kansas, on July 3, 2004, and July 4, 2004, one double occupancy hotel room and room taxes at the Great Wolf Lodge in Kansas City, Kansas, for the evenings of July 2, 2004, and July 3, 2004, transportation between the hotel and speedway, food and other amenities at the Kansas lottery hospitality chalet located at the Kansas Speedway, and \$300 cash. The following restrictions shall apply to the prize packages:

(a) The Kansas lottery is not responsible for any losses caused by delay or cancellation of said automobile race.

(b) Prize packages, except cash, are transferable one time, but cannot be redeemed for cash.

(f) Any meals, drinks, gratuities, taxes, and other expenses that are not specifically mentioned are not included.

(g) The hotel may require winners to produce a major credit card at the time of check-in. Winners are responsible for all hotel charges incurred in excess of the room charge, and parking.

(h) All prizes are subject to lottery validation, set-offs and deductions authorized by law.

(i) No later than 5:00 p.m. on the fourteenth calendar day following the drawing, the winner of a prize as the result of this drawing shall return to the lottery a completed claim form as provided by the lottery or the person named on the entry drawn will no longer be eligible for the prize. In such an event, the first eligible alternate entry drawn pursuant to subsection (e) of K.A.R. 111-7-192 shall be declared the winner. All alternate winners shall then be subject to the same rules of eligibility as original winners.

(j) A total of 48 prize packages shall be awarded. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-20-04, Feb. 18, 2004.)

111-7-190. Method of entry. (a) Entry into the "Buy \$3 Get an Entry Free Drawing 2004" shall be accomplished as follows:

(continued)

(1) With every single purchase of \$3 or more for the Kansas lottery "Super Kansas Cash" game from February 29, 2004, through May 22, 2004, the purchaser shall receive one entry form for this drawing.

(2) The purchaser must complete the information on the entry form in a legible manner. Only one name shall appear on each entry form.

(3) Place one or more entry form(s) into an envelope with proper postage and mail it to: "Buy \$3 Get an Entry Free Drawing," c/o Kansas lottery, P. O. Box 4526, Topeka, Kansas 66604-0526. Mailed entries must be received by morning mail pickup on Tuesday, May 25, 2004.

(4) The holder of the ticket is not required to personally attend the drawing or be present at the time of the drawing to be determined a winner.

(5) Forty-eight entries and 10 alternate entries will be drawn.

(6) Entry forms obtained during the stated period of time may be entered in the drawing.

(b) There is no limit on the number of entries a person may make, but a person may only win one time during the entire promotion.

(c) All eligible entry forms which are mailed and received by the morning mail pickup in Topeka, Kansas, on Tuesday, May 25, 2004, shall be entered into the drawing to be conducted on Friday, May 28, 2004.

(d) Eligible entrants in this drawing must be 18 years of age or older.

(e) Completing the information form on the entry form and entering the ticket into any drawing constitutes authorization to publicly identify the person whose entry is drawn. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-20-04, Feb. 18, 2004.)

111-7-191. Certification of drawing. (a) The "Buy \$3 Get an Entry Free Drawing 2004" shall all be personally observed by a member of the Kansas lottery security department and a member of the Kansas lottery marketing department or other person or persons designated by the executive director of the lottery (hereinafter "event manager").

(b) Upon completion of the drawing, the security official and the event manager shall issue a report to the executive director, certifying that the name of each prize winner is correct, and that to the best of their knowledge the procedures required by these rules were followed in selecting each prize winner. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-20-04, Feb. 18, 2004.)

111-7-192. Selection of winners. The following process shall be used for the selection of winners in the "Buy \$3 Get an Entry Free Drawing 2004":

(a) Kansas lottery personnel shall pick up all mail containing entries for this drawing at the United States Post Office in Topeka, Kansas, with final pick up for the draw-

ing after the morning mail delivery on Tuesday, May 25, 2004, prior to the drawing on Friday, May 28, 2004.

(b) Lottery personnel shall transport the mail to the Kansas lottery mail room where the envelopes will be opened and emptied into the drawing receptacle or drum.

(c) The drawing shall be held at the lottery headquarters in a place accessible to the public and open for public attendance with lottery security personnel present. The drawing shall be audio and video taped.

(d) At the start of the drawing, lottery security personnel shall present the receptacle or drum to the person designated by the executive director to perform the drawing. The receptacle or drum for the drawing shall contain all entries eligible for the drawing. The drum shall be rotated 10 times or receptacle mixed thoroughly as may be applicable. The designated individual shall then unseal the receptacle or drum, and using the bare-arm technique, while looking away, remove 48 valid entries, one at a time, from the receptacle or drum and mark them in order drawn from one through and including 48. The person whose name appears on each of the entries shall be the winner of the prize identified in K.A.R. 111-7-189, subject to validation by the lottery as set forth in these rules.

(e) After 48 entries have been drawn and verified as valid by lottery security, 10 more entries will be drawn, one at a time, to serve as alternate entries. The alternate entries will be marked in order drawn, 1A, 2A, 3A, 4A, 5A, 6A, 7A, 8A, 9A, and 10A. The alternate ticket entries will be used only if one or more of the original winners cannot be located or are declared ineligible, or fail to present a fully-executed claim form to lottery headquarters as required by K.A.R. 111-7-189(i). The alternates will be used, if necessary, in the order drawn.

(f) The Kansas lottery security official present shall review each entry drawn to determine the validity of the entry into the drawing in accordance with these regulations. If it is a valid entry and the name is legible, the event manager and the security person present shall record the name of the winner. Each winner shall be given or sent a prize claim form to be completed and returned to the lottery within 14 calendar days of the drawing.

(g) If the entry is determined to be ineligible, it shall be discarded by the security person present and another entry drawn. This procedure will be repeated until valid selections are obtained.

(h) All entries remaining in the drum or receptacle after the winners have been selected and certified and all entries not received in compliance with these rules shall be destroyed pursuant to K.A.R. 111-3-34. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-20-04, Feb. 18, 2004.)
