Notice of Application Deadline for
Kansas Arts on Tour Program Roster

The Kansas Arts Commission announces the application deadline date of Wednesday, July 13, for Kansas performing, visual and literary artists to submit an application to be considered for inclusion in the expanded Kansas Arts on Tour Program Roster (formerly the Kansas Touring Program Roster) for fiscal years 2007-2009 (July 1, 2006 to June 30, 2009).

New this year, Kansas visual and literary artists with eligible arts programming may apply to be included on the touring program. After selection to the Kansas Arts on Tour Roster, artists are available to tour throughout the state in communities outside their home areas.

The Kansas Arts on Tour Program (KATP) replaces the former Kansas Touring Program. The new, expanded version of the artist Roster will make visual and literary artists eligible for inclusion in addition to performing artists. Programming by artists who are selected to be on the Roster will be eligible for Kansas Arts on Tour funding through eligible organizations. Successful grants from the Kansas Arts on Tour Program are funded for 40 percent of the Roster artist fees.

The Kansas Arts Commission accepts applications annually from eligible Kansas artists wishing to be included

on the Kansas Arts on Tour Program Roster. This Roster is published on the commission's Web site at <http://arts.state.ks.us> in January each year along with the annual Kansas Arts Commission grant guidelines.

Applications for inclusion on the Kansas Arts on Tour Program Roster must have an official U.S. Postal Service postmark that is not later than the deadline date of Wednesday, July 13. Hand-delivered applications and applications sent by express mail or sent by overnight delivery will not be accepted later than 5 p.m. on the deadline date.

Applications to the Kansas Arts on Tour Roster will be reviewed by a panel that evaluates each applicant and approves Kansas artists who exhibit high artistic and professional standards and programming. There is no limit to the size of the Roster, but only those applicants meeting panel approval will tour as part of the program. Roster appointments are for three fiscal years. A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Thursday, August 11, in the Kansas Real Estate Commission's conference room, Three Townsite Plaza, Suite 200, 120 S.E. 6th Ave., Topeka, to consider the adoption of a new regulation.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Sherry C. Diel, Executive Director, Kansas Real Estate Commission, Three Townsite Plaza, Suite 200, 120 S.E. 6th Ave., Topeka, 66603-3511. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. The regulation is proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. The following is a summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact:

K.A.R. 86-3-29. Participation of salesperson or associate broker in affiliated business arrangement with title agency. The proposed regulation provides a supervising broker or branch broker with information necessary to adequately supervise the activities of their affiliated licensees. The proposed regulation sets forth notification and acknowledgment requirements for a real estate salesperson or associate broker to obtain a financial interest in an affiliated business arrangement with a title insurer. The regulation also sets forth the procedure for distribution of any compensation derived by the salesperson or associate broker from the affiliated business arrangement.

The commission does not anticipate any fiscal impact will be sustained by the commission, other governmental agencies or members of the public due to the adoption of the proposed regulation. Salespersons and associate brokers may incur mailing costs for sending the required notice by certified mail.

The Kansas Council on Developmental Disabilities (KCDD) announces the availability of federal funds to be invested in State Plan activities outlined below. Projects listed in the notice may be approved for grants for up to one year. Recipients are required to provide a 25 percent nonfederal match for this project. In-kind contributions may be included as part of the 25 percent match. All grant proposals are due by 5 p.m. July 5.

The projects listed below use the outcome approach to funding. Federal programs are required to have performance measures and to report results. To meet these requirements, both the KCDD and its grantees must work together to clearly define results-oriented goals and how to determine if they have been reached.

Call For Investment #1—Self-Employment

The KCDD is interested in funding four or more projects that will provide support to both younger and adult siblings. Funding: A total of \$20,000 for one year among all projects.

Call For Investment # 4—Multicultural Outreach

The KCDD is interested in funding one project that will develop and distribute information, in at least two foreign languages, about the Kansas developmental disabilities service system. Funding: A total of \$30,000 for one project for one year.

A summary of the regulation and its economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 40-4-35. Medicare supplement policies; minimum standards; requirements. This proposed regulation adopts by reference the Kansas Insurance Department's policy and procedure to implement Medicare Supplement Insurance minimum standards dated May 17, 2005. In November of 1999, the United States Congress amended Section 1882 of the Social Security Act, which governs Medicare Supplement Insurance. Since that time, the federal standard in that Act consists of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' Model Regulation governing minimum standards of Medicare Supplement Insurance, which sets the standard for state certification. State regulatory programs are required to meet the requirements equal to or more stringent than the provisions of Section 1882 of the Social Security Act. In December of 2003, Congress amended the law to incorporate the most recent changes to the NAIC model regulation.

The Kansas Insurance Department is adopting by reference its policy and procedure dated May 17, 2005, which is based primarily on the current NAIC model regulation. Almost all of the amendments being proposed are to bring the Kansas regulation in compliance with the required federal standards. The National Association of Insurance Commissioners has drafted and sent to the states recommended language that incorporates the most recent amendments. This recommended language has been incorporated into these proposed amendments. These proposed amendments are necessary for Kansas to

maintain the certification of the Kansas State Medicare Supplement Insurance Program by the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

The proposed amendment to K.A.R. 40-4-35 should have little or no economic impact. The other amendments are technical and should have no economic impact. Any additional regulatory responsibilities that these amendments could impose on the department can be handled with present staff and budget. There is no economic impact on other state governmental entities or local governmental entities.

(d) "Receptacle" or "drum" means a container in which entry tickets are placed and from which the "Kansas Speedway \$200 Grand Second Chance Drawing" is made. Receptacles or drums may be sealable and shall be capable of being mixed or rotated for the purpose of ensuring random distribution.

(e) "Bare arm technique" means a type of drawing where the person drawing the winning ticket from the receptacle or drum wears a long-sleeved shirt with sleeve rolled up above the elbow, a short-sleeved shirt (sleeve not extending past the elbow) or a non-sleeve shirt which exposes the drawer's bare arm and looks away from the drawing drum or receptacle while drawing. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-5-05, April 20, 2005.)

The contestants may not select the same racers in the same finishing order. In the event both contestants have selected the same racers in the same finishing order, the first of the two contestants whose name was selected shall have the opportunity to retain his or her predictions, or change one or more of the predictions. If that contestant chooses to retain the first selections made, the other contestant must change one or more of his or her predictions. Each person's predictions shall be reduced to writing and signed by the persons making the predictions and delivered to the lottery official. All predictions must be made, reduced to writing, delivered to the lottery official, and signed no less than 20 minutes before the official start of the race.

SENATE Substitute for HOUSE BILL No. 2482

AN ACT making and concerning appropriations for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2005, June 30, 2006, June 30, 2007, June 30, 2008 and June 30, 2009, for state agencies; authorizing certain transfers, capital improvement projects and fees, imposing certain restrictions and limitations, and directing or authorizing certain receipts, disbursements and acts incidental to the foregoing; amending K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 82a-953a, section 150 of 2005 Senate Bill No. 225, and section 187 of 2005 Senate Bill No. 225, and repealing the existing sections; also repealing K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 82a-953a, as amended by section 186 of 2005 Senate Bill No. 225.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) For the fiscal years ending June 30, 2005, June 30, 2006, June 30, 2007, June 30, 2008 and June 30, 2009, appropriations are hereby made, restrictions and limitations are hereby imposed, and transfers, capital improvement projects, fees, receipts, disbursements and acts incidental to the foregoing are hereby directed or authorized as provided in this act.

(b) The agencies named in this act are hereby authorized to initiate and complete the capital improvement projects specified and authorized by this act or for which appropriations are made by this act, subject to the restrictions and limitations imposed by this act.

(c) This act shall be known and may be cited as the omnibus appropriation act of 2005 and shall constitute the omnibus reconciliation

tion spending limit bill for the 2005 regular session of the legislature for purposes of subsection (a) of K.S.A. 75-6702 and amendments thereto.

(d) The appropriations made by this act shall not be subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 46-155 and amendments thereto.

(3) Prior to August 15, 2005, the director of the budget shall determine and certify to the director of accounts and reports:

(A) (i) The amount reappropriated in each account of the state general fund of a state agency, other than any regents agency, from the state general fund that has a specific expenditure limitation prescribed for fiscal year 2006 and that is in excess of the amount authorized under the approved budget of expenditures to be expended from such reappropriated amount for fiscal year 2006;

(ii) the amount reappropriated in each account of the state general fund of a state agency, other than any regents agency, from the state general fund that has no specific expenditure limitation prescribed for the fiscal year, that is in excess of the amount estimated under the approved budget of expenditures to be expended from such reappropriated amount for fiscal year 2006, and that is determined by the director of the budget not to be needed for the purpose for which such amount was originally budgeted, including, but not limited to, actual or projected cost savings as a result of completed, cancelled or modified projects, programs or operations: *Provided*, That, as used in paragraphs (i) and (ii) of this subsection (g)(3)(A), "specific expenditure limitation prescribed for the fiscal year" includes any case in which no expenditures may be made from such reappropriated balance except upon approval by the state finance council;

(B) the amount equal to 10% of the amount determined by the director of the budget to be the amount (i) that is available to be expended for fiscal year 2006 from each Kansas savings incentive program account in the state general fund or in any special revenue fund of each state agency, other than any regents agency, under the Kansas savings incentive program, and (ii) that is in excess of \$50,000 in such Kansas savings incentive program account;

(C) the aggregate of all unanticipated lapses of moneys which were appropriated or reappropriated from the state general fund for fiscal year 2005 and which were not reappropriated for fiscal year 2006, as determined by the director of the budget after consulting with the director of the legislative research department: *Provided*, That, as used in this subsection (g)(3)(C), "unanticipated lapses of moneys"

shall not include any amount lapsed from the state general fund pursuant to explicit language in an appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature or any amount lapsed from the state general fund for which specific reappropriation language was deliberately not included in any appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature; and

(D) the aggregate of all amounts of unencumbered balances in accounts of the state general fund that were first encumbered during a fiscal year commencing prior to July 1, 2004, that were released during fiscal year 2005, and that were not specifically reappropriated by an appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature.

(4) On August 15, 2005, in accordance with the certification by the director of the budget that is submitted to the director of accounts and reports under subsection (g)(3), the expenditure limitation established for fiscal year 2006 for each special revenue fund account under the Kansas savings incentive program that is appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, by this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature is hereby respectively decreased by the amount equal to the amount certified under subsection (g)(3).

(5) (A) On August 15, 2005, in accordance with the certification by the director of the budget that is submitted to the director of accounts and reports under subsection (g)(3), the appropriation for fiscal year 2006 for each account of the state general fund, state economic development initiatives fund, state water plan fund, children's initiatives fund and Kansas endowment for youth fund that is appropriated or reappropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, by this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature is hereby respectively lapsed by the amount equal to the amount certified under subsection (g)(3).

(B) On August 15, 2005, in accordance with the certification by the director of the budget that is submitted to the director of accounts and reports under subsection (g)(3), the appropriation for fiscal year 2006 for each account of the state general fund, state economic development initiatives fund, state water plan fund, children's initiatives fund and Kansas endowment for youth fund under the Kansas savings incentive program that is appropriated or reappropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, by this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature is hereby respectively lapsed by the amount equal to the amount certified under subsection (g)(3).

(6) At the same time as the director of the budget transmits the certification to the director of accounts and reports pursuant to subsection (g)(3), the director of the budget shall transmit a copy of such certification to the director of the legislative research department.

(7) (A) Prior to August 15, 2005, the state board of regents shall determine and certify to the director of the budget each of the specific amounts from the amounts appropriated from the state general fund or from the moneys appropriated and available in the special revenue funds for each of the regents agencies to be transferred to and debited to the 27th payroll adjustment account of the state general fund by the director of accounts and reports pursuant to this subsection (g): *Provided* That the aggregate of all such amounts certified to the director of the budget shall be an amount that is equal to or more than \$1,184,054. The certification by the state board of regents shall specify the amount in each account of the state general fund or in each special revenue fund, or account thereof, that is designated by the state board of regents pursuant to this subsection for each of the regents agencies to be transferred to and debited to the 27th payroll adjustment account in the state general fund by the director of accounts and reports pursuant to this subsection (g). At the same time as such certification is transmitted to the director of the budget, the state board of regents shall transmit a copy of such certification to the director of the legislative research department.

(B) The director of the budget shall review each such certification from the state board of regents and shall certify a copy of each such certification from the state board of regents to the director of accounts and reports. At the same time as such certification is trans-

mitted to the director of accounts and reports, the director of the budget shall transmit a copy of each such certification to the director of the legislative research department.

(C) On August 15, 2005, in accordance with the certification by the director of the budget that is submitted to the director of accounts and reports under this subsection (g)(7), the appropriation for fiscal year 2006 for each account of the state general fund, state economic development initiatives fund, state water plan fund and children's initiatives fund that is appropriated or reappropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, by this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature is hereby respectively lapsed by the amount equal to the amount certified under this subsection (g)(7).

(8) In determining the amounts to be certified to the director of accounts and reports in accordance with this subsection (g), the director of the budget and the state board of regents shall consider any changed circumstances and unanticipated reductions in expenditures or unanticipated and required expenditures by the state agencies for fiscal year 2006.

(9) (A) On or before September 1, 2005, after receipt of each certification by the director of the budget pursuant to this subsection (g), the director of accounts and reports shall transfer and debit to the 27th payroll adjustment account of the state general fund, which is hereby established in the state general fund, by an amount equal to the aggregate of the amounts certified by the director of the budget pursuant to subsection (g)(3) and subsection (g)(7) in accordance with such certifications.

(B) On September 1, 2005, the director of accounts and reports shall transfer the balance of the 27th payroll adjustment account of the state general fund to the master account of the state general fund: *Provided, however,* That the amount transferred shall not exceed the amount of the then outstanding balance of the state treasurer's receivables for the state general fund.

The state treasurer shall enter all such amounts debited and credited and shall make reductions and adjustments thereto on the books and records kept and maintained for the state general fund by the state treasurer in accordance with the notice thereof.

(10) As used in this subsection (g), "regents agency" means the state board of regents, Fort Hays state university, Kansas state university, Kansas state university extension systems and agriculture research programs, Kansas state university veterinary medical center, Emporia state university, Pittsburg state university, university of Kansas, university of Kansas medical center, and Wichita state university.

(11) The provisions of this subsection (g) shall not apply to:

(A) The health care stabilization fund of the health care stabilization fund board of governors;

(B) any moneys held in trust in a trust fund or held in trust in any other special revenue fund of any state agency;

(C) any moneys received from any agency or authority of the federal government or from any other federal source, other than any

such federal moneys that are credited to or may be received and credited to special revenue funds of a regents agency and that are determined by the state board of regents to be federal moneys that may be transferred to and debited to the 27th payroll adjustment account of the state general fund by the director of accounts and reports pursuant to this subsection (g); or

(D) any account of the Kansas educational building fund or the state institutions building fund.

(12) Each amount transferred from any special revenue fund of any state agency, including any regents agency, to the state general fund pursuant to this subsection (g), is transferred to reimburse the state general fund for accounting, auditing, budgeting, legal, payroll, personnel and purchasing services and any other governmental services which are performed on behalf of the state agency involved by other state agencies which receive appropriations from the state general fund to provide such services.

(13) On or after July 1, 2006, notwithstanding the provisions of K.S.A. 75-4209 and amendments thereto or any other statute, upon specific authorization in an appropriation act of the legislature, the pooled money investment board is authorized and directed to loan an amount of not more than \$6,000,000 to the state general fund to provide financing for any additional amounts required above the moneys otherwise provided by law to repay amounts provided by law to finance the cost of the 27th payroll chargeable to the fiscal year 2006 and to provide for an adequate reserve in the 27th payroll adjustment account. The pooled money investment board is authorized and directed to use any moneys in the operating accounts, investment accounts or other investments of the state of Kansas to provide the funds for such loan. Such loan shall not bear interest and shall not be deemed to be an indebtedness or debt of the state of Kansas within the meaning of section 6 of article 11 of the constitution of the state of Kansas.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, all moneys which are lawfully credited to and available in any bond special revenue fund, which are not otherwise specifically appropriated or limited by this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature, are hereby appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, for the state agency for which the bond special revenue fund was established for the purposes authorized by law for expenditures from such bond special revenue fund. As used in this section, "bond special revenue fund" means any special revenue fund or account thereof established in the state treasury prior to or on or after the effective date of this act for the deposit of the proceeds of bonds issued by the Kansas development finance authority, for the payment of debt service for bonds issued by the Kansas development finance authority, or for any related purpose in accordance with applicable bond covenants.

Sec. 97. *Federal grants.* (a) During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, each federal grant or other federal receipt which is received by a state agency named in this act and which is not otherwise appropriated to that state agency by this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature, is hereby appropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, for that state agency for the

purpose set forth in such federal grant or receipt, except that no expenditure shall be made from and no obligation shall be incurred against any such federal grant or other federal receipt, which has not been previously appropriated or reappropriated or approved for expenditure by the governor, until the governor has authorized the state agency to make expenditures therefrom.

(b) During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2007, each federal grant or other federal receipt which is received by a state agency named in section 79 of 2005 Senate Bill No. 225 and which is not otherwise appropriated to that state agency for fiscal year 2007 by this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature, is hereby appropriated for fiscal year 2007 for that state agency for the purpose set forth in such federal grant or receipt, except that no expenditure shall be made from and no obligation shall be incurred against any such federal grant or other federal receipt, which has not been previously appropriated or reappropriated or approved for expenditure by the governor, for fiscal year 2007, until the governor has authorized the state agency to make expenditures from such federal grant or other federal receipt for fiscal year 2007.

(c) In addition to the other purposes for which expenditures may be made by any state agency which is named in this act and which is not otherwise authorized by law to apply for and receive federal grants, expenditures may be made by such state agency from moneys appropriated for fiscal year 2006 by chapter 123 or chapter 184 of the 2004 Session Laws of Kansas or by this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature to apply for and receive federal grants during fiscal year 2006, which federal grants are hereby authorized to be applied for and received by such state agencies: *Provided*, That no expenditure shall be made from and no obligation shall be incurred against any such federal grant or other federal receipt, which has not been previously appropriated or reappropriated or approved for expenditure by the governor, until the governor has authorized the state agency to make expenditures therefrom.

Sec. 98. (a) Any correctional institutions building fund appropriation heretofore appropriated to any state agency named in this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature, and having an unencumbered balance as of June 30, 2005, in excess of \$100 is hereby reappropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, for the same uses and purposes as originally appropriated unless specific provision is made for lapsing such appropriation.

(b) This section shall not apply to the unencumbered balance in any account of the correctional institutions building fund that was encumbered for any fiscal year commencing prior to July 1, 2004.

Sec. 99. (a) Any Kansas educational building fund appropriation heretofore appropriated to any institution named in this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature and having an unencumbered balance as of June 30, 2005, in excess of \$100 is hereby reappropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, for the same use and purpose as originally appropriated, unless specific provision is made for lapsing such appropriation.

(b) This section shall not apply to the unencumbered balance in any account of the Kansas educational building fund that was encumbered for any fiscal year commencing prior to July 1, 2004.

Sec. 100. (a) Any state institutions building fund appropriation heretofore appropriated to any state agency named in this or other appropriation act of the 2005 regular session of the legislature and having an unencumbered balance as of June 30, 2005, in excess of \$100 is hereby reappropriated for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, for the same use and purpose as originally appropriated, unless specific provision is made for lapsing such appropriation.

(b) This section shall not apply to the unencumbered balance in any account of the state institutions building fund that was encumbered for any fiscal year commencing prior to July 1, 2004.

Sec. 101. Any transfers of money during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, from any special revenue fund of any state agency named in this act to the audit services fund of the division of post audit under K.S.A. 46-1121 and amendments thereto shall be in addition to any expenditure limitation imposed on any such fund for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006.

Sec. 102. During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, each state agency named in this act that has a cost reduction for which an employee suggestion bonus is paid pursuant to subsection (f) of K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 75-37,105, and amendments thereto, shall transfer (1) from each state general fund appropriation or reappropriation account for fiscal year 2006 from which all or part of such cost reduction has been realized to the state general fund, in accordance with subsection (f) of K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 75-37,105, and amendments thereto, the amount equal to 80% of the cost reduction which is attributed to such account, and (2) from each special revenue fund, excluding federal funds, for fiscal year 2006 from which all or part of such cost reduction has been realized to the state general fund, in accordance with subsection (f) of K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 75-37,105, and amendments thereto, the amount equal to 80% of the cost reduction which is attributed to such special revenue fund, excluding federal funds.

Sec. 103. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

Message from the Governor

Pursuant to Article 2, Section 14 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas, I hereby return Senate Substitute for House Bill No. 2482 with my signature approving the bill, except for the items enumerated below.

Social and Rehabilitative Services

Section 9(p) that reads as follows has been line-item vetoed:

“During the fiscal year ending June 30, 2006, no moneys paid by the department of social and rehabilitation services from the mental health and retardation services aid and assistance of the state general fund shall be expended by the entity receiving such moneys to pay membership dues and fees to any entity that does not provide the department of social and rehabilitation services, the legislative division of post audit, or another state agency with access to its financial records upon request for such access.”

I veto Section 9(p) of Senate Substitute for House Bill 2482. This proviso would prohibit moneys paid from the mental health and retardation services aid and assistance account from being used to pay membership dues or fees to any entity, unless that entity opened its financial records to the state upon request. This proviso represents an unreasonable government intrusion into the finances of private organizations, and it would expose these organizations' financial records in their entirety, not just those that pertain to state business. Such a requirement goes well beyond any reasonable use of government power.
