Facility Description: The proposed action is to modify and reissue an existing permit for operation of an existing wastewater treatment facility. This facility is engaged in processing grain into ethanol and high protein feed. About 35,000 gallons/day of process wastewater including evaporator condensate, floor drains, boiler blowdown, domestic wastewater, Epco CO₂ processing plant wastewater and contaminated runoff are directed to Pond #1. Ammonia and phosphate may be added as needed to Pond #1 contents as necessary nutrients prior to treatment in a complete-mix aerated lagoon, a clarifier and two polishing ponds. Effluent is discharged (Outfall 001A) through the second polishing pond (Pond #3) using a floating pump system. Upon construction, discharge through a gravity flow pipe system can be utilized. About 100,000 gpd of reverse osmosis concentrate and cooling tower blowdown is discharged through Pond #4 (Outfall 001B). Outfall 001X is the combined discharge of 001A and 001B to an unnamed tributary of Cowskin Creek via a pipeline. Stormwater runoff is discharged at Outfall 002. Treated effluent also can be irrigated from the final polishing pond upon approval of a land application plan. Waste-activated sludge is incorporated into the ethanol and high protein feed processes or as an alternative can be land applied. The proposed permit includes limits for biochemical oxygen demand, total suspended solids, ammonia, fecal coliform, oil and grease, total residual chlorine, total recoverable copper and pH. Monitoring of chlorides, sulfate, phosphorus, nitrate, nitrite, total Kjeldahl nitrogen, total nitrogen and effluent flow also will be required. The permittee shall be required to perform a chronic whole effluent toxicity (WET) test annually. Contained in the permit is a schedule of compliance requiring the permittee to make upgrades to the facility necessary to meet permit requirements. The permit requirements are pursuant to the Kansas Surface Water Quality Standards, K.A.R. 28-16-28(b-f), and Federal Surface Water Criteria, and are water-quality based.

Opinion No. 2005-08

Written May 23, 2005, to Chris Tilden, Office of Local and Rural Health, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of May 9, 2005, requesting an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the state level conflict of interest laws, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction concerning your question is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement:

You request this opinion in your capacity as interim director for the Office of Local and Rural Health of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE). You have explained that you would like to enter into a contract with Earthtalk Studios, Bozeman, MT (Earthtalk) to perform services for the Rural Emergency Medical Service and Technical Assistance Center (REMSTTAC), operated by Earthtalk. You would provide these services on your own time outside of your normal business hours at KDHE, and you would not utilize KDHE equipment or resources to fulfill your contractual obligations with Earthtalk. Your services for Earthtalk would consist of developing strategies to disseminate information on rural emergency medical services, helping REMSTTAC collaborate with other rural health technical assistance centers, coordinating REMSTTAC activities with its advisory committee, and enhancing the visibility of REMSTTAC by making presentations and participating in meetings. You explain that these services for Earthtalk are unrelated to any of your official job duties with KDHE.

You further explain that Earthtalk has a contractual arrangement with Critical Illness and Trauma Foundation (CIT). CIT is also a subcontractor of Kansas Board of Emergency Medical Services (KSBEMS). The KDHE Office of Local and Rural Health, where you are employed, has a contract with KSBEMS. You were involved in the making of the contract between KDHE and KSBEMS and you also approved two subcontracts between KSBEMS and CIT.

Question:

Are there any state conflict of interest laws that would prohibit you from entering into a contract with Earthtalk to provide services for them while still employed by KDHE?

Opinion:

Several sections of the state conflict of interest laws must be reviewed to answer your question. K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 46-233 prohibits participation by a state employee in the making of certain contracts, K.S.A. 46-286 involves participation in licensure or regulation of a business in which a state employee holds a position, and K.S.A. 46-241 involves the use of confidential information by a state employee. Each will be addressed in turn.

K.S.A. 2004 Supp. 46-233, concerning a state employee's participation in the making of contracts, states in pertinent part:

- (a)(1) No state officer or employee shall in the capacity as such officer or employee be substantially involved in the preparation of or participate in the making of a contract with any person or business by which such officer or employee is employed
- (2) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, whenever any individual has participated as a state officer or employee in the making of any contract with any person or business, such individual shall not accept employment with such person or business as an employee, independent contractor or subcontractor until two years after performance of the contract is completed or until two years after the individual terminates employment as a state officer or employee, whichever is sooner. . .

. . .

(e) . . . (2) "Substantially involved in the preparation or participate in the making of a contract" means having ap-

proved or disapproved a contract or having provided significant factual or specific information or advice or recommendations in relation to the negotiated terms of the contract.

First, we must consider your past participation in the making of contracts on behalf of KDHE in determining whether you can provide services for Earthtalk. You may not accept employment with Earthtalk while employed by KDHE if you have participated as a state employee in making a contract with Earthtalk until two years after performance of that contract is complete. Although you have explained a complex set of facts concerning various contractual relationships, according to the facts that you have presented, KDHE has not contracted with Earthtalk. You indicate that you were involved in the making of a contract between KDHE and KSBEMS and that you approved a subcontract between KSBEMS and CIT. CIT has a contract with Earthtalk, but that contract is totally unrelated to KDHE. Because you have not participated as a state employee in the making of any contract with Earthtalk, you may enter into a contract with Earthtalk to provide services for them without violating this statute. You must abstain from any future participation on behalf of KDHE in making a negotiated contract with Earthtalk while you are performing services for Earthtalk.

K.S.A. 46-286 is another statute that may apply to your question. It states in pertinent part:

(a) No state officer or employee, in the officer's or employee's official capacity, shall participate directly in the licensure, inspection or administration or enforcement of any regulation of or in any contract with any outside organization with which the officer or employee holds a position.

You do not indicate whether KDHE licenses, inspects or regulates Earthtalk. In order to comply with this statute, in your capacity as a KDHE employee, you must recuse yourself from participating in any licensure, inspection or enforcement of any regulations relating to Earthtalk. This statute also prohibits you from participating in your capacity as a KDHE employee in any contract between the State and Earthtalk while you are employed by Earthtalk.

Finally, K.S.A. 46-241, provides that:

No state officer or employee shall disclose or use confidential information acquired in the course of his or her official duties in order to further his or her own economic interest or those of any other person.

This statute prohibits you from using any confidential knowledge obtained in your employment with KDHE for your financial gain or for the financial gain of any other person, which would include Earthtalk.

In conclusion, the conflict of interest laws do not prohibit you from entering into a contract with Earthtalk to provide services for them while you are still employed by KDHE as long as you do not, in your capacity as a KDHE employee, participate in the regulation of Earthtalk, participate in the making of a negotiated contract between the State and Earthtalk, or misuse confidential information.

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday, August 10, in Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed regulation of the Kansas State Employees Health Care Commission on a permanent basis.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Linda DeCoursey, Health Benefits Administrator, Department of Administration, Room 920-N, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612-1251, or at Linda.DeCoursey@da.state.ks.us. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be

necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Faith Loretto at (785) 296-6006, TTY 1-800-296-4798, or faith.loretto@da.state.ks.us. The north entrance to the Landon State Office Building is accessible, and handicapped parking is located across the street from the north entrance to the building.

A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 108-1-1 provides the eligibility requirements for participants in the state of Kansas health care benefits program established by the Kansas State Employees Health Care Commission, including the following categories of participants: (1) active participants; (2) direct bill participants; (3) COBRA participants; and (4) eligible dependent participants. Effective with the beginning of the 2006 plan year (January 1, 2006), proposed amendments would alter the definition of "eligible dependent child" in paragraph (h)(3) of the regulation to reflect federal law changes enacted through the Working Families Tax Relief Act of 2004, P.L. 108-311 (WFTRA). Among other things, WFTRA provides a new definition of "dependent" in 26 U.S.C. §152 for purposes of both federal income tax and cafeteria benefit plans. Health insurance benefits paid for with pretax premiums as part of a cafeteria plan under 26 U.S.C. §105 can only be provided to qualified dependents who meet this new test.

A review of the new definition of dependent in 26 U.S.C. §152 indicated that there are a few, narrow instances in which the existing definition of eligible dependent child in K.A.R. 108-1-1 is broader than the new federal definition of dependent. The proposed amendment to the definition of dependent in K.A.R. 108-1-1 adopts by reference the federal definition of dependent in 26 USC §152, as amended by §201 of WFTRA, to make sure that all dependents covered by the state health benefits plan are "qualified dependents" for federal income tax purposes. Therefore, the amendment ensures that all premiums continue to be qualified to be paid on a pretax basis under the state's cafeteria benefits plan.

The proposed amendment to K.A.R. 108-1-1 adds the new federal definition as a new layer of requirements in addition to the regulation's existing eligibility criteria for dependents. Under the new federal definition, those children who could be claimed as someone else's "qualified child" under 26 U.S.C. §152 because they live with their grandmother, grandfather, aunt, uncle, brother, or sister for six or more months of the year will no longer be eligible for coverage by their parent (or for coverage by their grandparent if the grandparent meets the current requirements in K.A.R. 108-1-1 (h)(2)(E)), even if the parent or grandparent who is the primary participant provides more than one-half of that child's support. In addition, this amendment also will affect the eligibility criteria for dependents under K.A.R. 108-1-2, student health care benefits plan; K.A.R. 108-1-3, school district employee health care benefits plan; and K.A.R. 108-1-4, local unit of government employee health care benefits plan.

It is not possible to determine how many (if any) individuals would no longer qualify as an eligible dependent child under K.A.R 108-1-1 when the criteria for dependents in 26 USC §152 are applied, but it is not expected to affect a large number of currently covered dependents. COBRA coverage would be available for a period of time for any individuals who are no longer eligible for coverage as eligible dependent children.

The proposed amendment to K.A.R. 108-1-1 will not have any economic impact on the HCC, Department of Administration, other state agencies or other nonstate employers participating in the state health care benefits plan. Instead, the amendment will allow the Department of Administration and these other nonstate employers to avoid administrative costs associated with payroll withholding on a posttax basis for any portion of the premium attributable to any nonqualified dependents, which would be necessary if the existing definition of eligible dependent child is retained. There is no economic impact on the general public.

Temporary Administrative Regulations

Article 11.—eSCRATCH GENERIC GAME RULES

111-11-1. Definitions. (a) The following definitions apply to the Kansas lottery eScratch game, along with all definitions contained in the Kansas lottery act (K.S.A. 74-8701 *et seq.*) and amendments thereto, and in lottery regulations adopted pursuant to the Kansas lottery act, which are hereby incorporated by reference.

(b) "eScratch game" or "game" means an online lottery game in which a player purchases one or more tickets in increments established for each game in the denomination of play(s) available for that game. Denominations of play may be in such amounts as set by rules for each eScratch game. In return for paying the appropriate amount, the player receives a randomly computer-generated ticket containing the corresponding number of reveals selected from a set pool of reveals established by the rules for each eScratch game. Each ticket holder whose valid ticket includes a winning combination shall be instantly entitled to a prize if the ticket and, if applicable, a valid claim form are submitted within the specified time period. In addition, until such time as a ticket is validated or win-checked, all prize(s) won on a ticket, if any, shall be capable of being revealed by entering cer-

tain information onto an Internet web site and playing a variety of computer-generated games. The prize(s) to which an eScratch ticket is entitled shall be determined at the time of purchase, and shall not be dependent upon revealing the prize(s) by playing the internet game(s), whether in whole or in part.

- (c) "eScratch ticket retailer" or "retailer" means a person or business authorized by the Lottery to sell eScratch game tickets.
- (d) "eScratch lottery terminal" or "terminal" means the computer hardware by which an eScratch ticket retailer or player enters the combination selected by the player and by which eScratch tickets are generated and claims are validated.
- (e) "eScratch ticket" or "ticket" means a computer-generated ticket issued by an eScratch ticket terminal to a player containing the selections and plays purchased by the player. That ticket shall be the only acceptable evidence of the selections and play purchased.
 - (f) Prize tiers:
- (1) "high-tier prize" means an eScratch ticket game prize of not less than \$600;
- (2) "low-tier prize" means an eScratch ticket game prize of less than \$600.
- (g) "Validation" means the process of determining whether an eScratch ticket presented for payment is a winning ticket.
- (h) "Ticket holder" or "holder" means the person who has possession of an unsigned eScratch ticket or the person whose written name, signature or mark appears on the back of the ticket.
- (i) "Executive director" means the executive director of the Kansas lottery or the person designated by the executive director.
- (j) "Reveal" or "play" means each individual computer-generated animation or other graphic displayed by the eScratch internet site to the player indicating the win(s) or loss(es) to which each eScratch ticket is entitled.
- (k) "Pool" means each set of reveals that contains a predetermined number of winning and losing reveals, and the value of each such reveal, as determined by the rules for each eScratch game. Each eScratch game may contain multiple numbers of pools.
- (l) "Problem ticket" means any eScratch ticket erroneously produced either by terminal malfunction or by miscommunication between a player and a retailer.
- (m) "Receptacle" or "drum" means a container in which non-winning tickets or entry forms are placed and from which drawings are made. Receptacles or drums may be sealable and drums shall be capable of being mixed or rotated for the purpose of ensuring random distribution
- (n) "Day," "business day," or "operations day," when referring to an eScratch game, means the 20-hour period starting at 5:00 a.m. and ending at 1:00 a.m., the following day, unless specified otherwise in individual game rules.
- (o) "Win-check" means the act of electronically determining whether an eScratch ticket is entitled to win a prize by scanning the eScratch ticket on a retailer lottery terminal or on a player-activated device provided for said purpose, but without validating the ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-

21-04, April 22, 2004; amended, T-111-7-2-04, June 17, 2004; amended, T-111-5-23-05, May 12, 2005.)

- **111-11-4. eScratch games criteria.** (a) The purchase price of an eScratch ticket shall be in the amounts established by the rules of each eScratch game except to the extent of discounts specifically authorized by regulation of the commission.
- (b) No person may sell a ticket at a price other than that established in accordance with these rules.
- (c) For each purchase, the eScratch ticket shall issue to the player a ticket containing plays in the denomination and dollar amount selected by the player. Multiple dollar purchases made at the same time shall be issued on a single ticket, up to the maximum dollar amount allowed per the rules for each eScratch game. Only one denomination of play shall be issued on each ticket.
- (d) Each ticket shall be issued by the eScratch ticket terminal out of only one ticket pool, with each pool having such odds and percentages of payout as determined by the rules for each eScratch game.
- (e) A ticket bearer entitled to a prize shall submit the winning ticket as specified by K.A.R. 111-11-5. The winning ticket must be validated by the lottery or an eScratch ticket retailer through use of the eScratch ticket terminal or any other means as specified by the executive director. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-21-04, April 22, 2004; amended, T-111-5-23-05, May 12, 2005.)
- **111-11-5. Payment of prizes.** (a) Prior to the payment of any prize, the claimant shall present the winning eScratch ticket to any retailer, or any Kansas lottery office for validation.
- (b) The procedure for payment of a prize on any single game ticket which totals less than \$600.00 is as follows:
- (1) The holder of the ticket may present it to any retailer. Upon validation of the ticket, the retailer shall immediately pay the holder of the ticket. If the retailer cannot validate the ticket, the claimant must obtain and complete a claim form and submit it with the ticket to any Kansas lottery office by mail or in person.
- (2) Prizes payable by retailers shall be paid during all normal business hours of the retailer, provided the e-Scratch system is operational and tickets can be validated.
- (3) A retailer may pay prizes in cash or by business check, certified check, or money order, or any combination thereof.
- (4) A winning ticket offering a free ticket or tickets may be claimed at any retailer location or at any Kansas lottery office. A player claiming a free ticket prize at the lottery may be issued either a free ticket or a prize payment in the face amount of the free ticket at the discretion of the executive director.
- (c) To claim a prize of \$600 or more, the claimant shall obtain and complete a claim form and submit it with the winning ticket to any Kansas lottery office by mail or in person. Although claims may be submitted to any Kansas lottery office, such prizes can only be paid from the lottery's headquarters in Topeka. Upon determination that the ticket is a winning ticket and receipt of a completed claim form, the lottery shall process for payment the amount due, less any withholding required by state and

federal laws. If the ticket is determined to be a non-winning ticket, the claim shall be denied and the claimant shall be promptly notified.

- (d) If the claim is presented to a lottery regional office or to lottery headquarters, the claimant must complete a claim form regardless of the prize amount and submit it with the winning ticket, either by mail or in person. Upon determination that the ticket is a winning ticket and receipt of a completed claim form, the lottery shall present or mail a check to the claimant in payment of the amount due, less any withholding required by state and federal laws.
- (e) All prizes must be claimed within 365 days of the date the ticket was printed, including the day the ticket was printed. To claim a prize at lottery headquarters, the holder of the winning ticket must present or mail the winning ticket and claim form to the Kansas lottery, and the lottery must actually receive it within the above time period. Any prizes not claimed within the specified period shall be added to the prize pools of subsequent Kansas lottery games.
- (f) If the ticket is determined to be a non-winning ticket, the claim shall be denied and the claimant shall be promptly notified. Non-winning tickets will not be returned to the claimant.
- (g) A validated ticket shall be the only proof of a game play or plays, and the submission of a winning ticket to and receipt of the ticket by the lottery or its authorized retailer shall be the sole method of claiming a prize.
- (h) Claims in excess of \$600 or more shall not be paid by lottery retailers. The lottery has no obligation to reimburse retailers paying claims of \$600 or more. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-21-04, April 22, 2004; amended, T-111-5-23-05, May 12, 2005.)

111-11-11. Buy a minimum dollar amount of lottery online or electronic tickets, get one \$1 eScratch quick pick free. The lottery may conduct one or more special free quick pick promotions whereby for every single Kansas lottery online or electronic ticket purchase of a minimum predetermined dollar amount ("qualifying purchase"), a player shall receive at no additional charge an eScratch quick pick ticket in such dollar amount and denomination as determined by the lottery. The period of each promotion shall begin on a day determined by the executive director, and shall end on the last day of each period as determined by the executive director at the close of business as defined in subsection (p) of K.A.R. 111-6-1. During each such promotion, lottery terminals shall automatically dispense the free quick pick ticket. If the qualifying purchase is for an online or electronic ticket that is capable of being cancelled, cancellation of such qualifying purchase tickets shall be suspended during the period of any such promotion.
