Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 11, in the board room of the State Education Building, 120 S.E. 10th Ave., Topeka, to consider proposed amendments to Teacher Licensure Regulations, 91-1-201, 91-1-202 and 91-1-205. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

- (1) Changes to **91-1-201** (type of licensure) and **91-1-202** (endorsements) amend the regulations to expand the early childhood options for licensure. These changes are intended to increase the supply of early childhood teachers prepared by Kansas institutions and to accommodate out-of-state applicants who have completed programs that are not comparable with the existing birth through grade 3 license. Under the proposed changes, available early childhood licenses would be expanded and would include the existing birth through grade 3, birth through kindergarten, and prekindergarten through grade 3. The amendments to the regulation are adjustments to the early childhood license levels in 91-1-201 and to the endorsements in 91-1-202 in order to accommodate these expanded options. While this regulation will increase the number of available teachers, no direct economic impact is anticipated.
- (2) A change to **91-1-201** removes early childhood and early childhood through late childhood as available levels for the restricted teaching license. The restricted license is only available for content endorsement programs at the middle/secondary level. In addition, the amendments clarify that the restricted license is valid for three consecutive school years. There will be no economic impact due to this amendment.
- (3) Changes to 91-1-205 (licensure renewal requirements) amend the conditional license renewal requirements. This regulation limits educators to two conditional licenses regardless of whether they are employed or not. Educators must be employed in order to complete the performance assessment for a professional license. Amendments would provide access to additional conditional licenses to accommodate educators who receive conditional licenses but are not employed full time. In addition, the amendments place limits and restrictions on access to additional conditional licenses for educators who are unsuccessful in passing the performance assessment. These amendments will provide more opportunity to complete the required assessment and qualify for a professional license. Persons who earn the professional license can continue to teach and will benefit economically. There will be no economic impact on others.

All interested persons will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views or arguments, either orally or in writing, in regard to the proposed regulations. In addition, the period of public notice hereby provided constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Such written comments may be

submitted to the secretary of the State Board of Education at the address above. The hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures of the State Board of Education.

- **110-13-4.** Regional business development funds; eligible projects. (a) Each regional foundation shall administer a regional business development fund.

 - (6) technology improvements; and
 - (7) administrative services.

- (e) Any regional foundation may exceed the maximum percentages allowed for one or more eligible projects with the prior approval of the secretary. The scope of services is to evaluate 40 airports that currently have no instrument approach procedures (IAPs) or has IAPs that are reliant on obsolete nondirectional beacon (NDB) equipment being taken out of service by the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). This study will closely examine each airport to determine the feasibility of establishing IAPs based on Global Positioning System (GPS) technology with specific emphasis on determining:

- (1) The preferred/appropriate IAP based on desktop Terminal Instrument Procedures (TERPS) analysis including the final and missed approach segments;
- (2) the controlling and/or limiting obstacles along with viable mitigation strategies;
- (3) the achievable visibility and ceiling minimums for various aircraft categories;
- (4) the level of compliance with FAA facility design standards and the impact on preferred IAPs and minimums;
- (5) the benefit vs. cost of installing any approach lighting system, and Automatic Weather Observation

- System (AWOS) and/or a Ground Communication Outlet (GCO); and
- (6) the most appropriate level of FAA Aeronautical (405) Survey to support the preferred IAPs. Both ends of the primary runway will be evaluated at each study location.

There are currently 37 airports in Kansas with paved runways that have no IAPs and another 11 served only by approaches dependent on obsolete ground equipment. In the past seven years, KDOT has spent \$21 million upgrading the runways at these and other airports to enable access by air ambulances and corporate aircraft to our rural communities. Lack of instrument approach procedures limits accessibility to these airports to visual meteorological conditions only (visibility not less that 3 miles and cloud ceiling not less than 1,000 feet). The ultimate goal is to maximize the number of all-weather airports in the state. Ninety-five percent of the costs for this study will be funded by the FAA through an Airport Improvement Program grant.

It is KDOT's policy to use the following criteria as the basis for selection of the consulting engineering firms:

- 1. Size and professional qualifications;
- 2. experience of staff;
- 3. location of firm with respect to proposed project;
