A public hearing will be conducted at 8 a.m. Friday, October 20, at the office of the Kansas State Board of Pharmacy, Room 560, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the proposed adoption of K.A.R. 68-16-1 through K.A.R. 68-16-9 as permanent regulations of the Board of Pharmacy. Members of the board may appear at the public hearing via telephone conference.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed adoption of K.A.R. 68-16-1 through K.A.R. 68-16-9. All parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Debra Billingsley, executive director of the Board of Pharmacy, Room 506, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612-1231. All interested parties will be given reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present

their views, it may be necessary to request that each participant limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the regulations and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting the board at the address above, (785) 296-4056. Handicapped parking is located on the west and north sides of the building, and the north entrance to the building is accessible to individuals with disabilities.

K.A.R. 68-16-1 through K.A.R. 68-16-9 are proposed for permanent adoption. A summary of each proposed regulation follows:

K.A.R. 68-16-1. Definitions. This regulation identifies the terms that apply to the cancer drug repository program.

K.A.R. 68-16-2. Requirements for participation by physicians, pharmacies, hospitals, and nonprofit clinics. This regulation specifies the written notification requirements that shall be satisfied by each physician, pharmacy, hospital and nonprofit clinic that elects to participate in the cancer drug repository program.

K.A.R. 68-16-3. Donation of cancer drugs. This regulation identifies the conditions under which a cancer drug may be accepted, where each cancer drug repository shall receive donated drugs and how each donated cancer drug shall be stored.

K.A.R. 68-16-4. Dispensing requirements. This regulation identifies the conditions under which any donated cancer drug shall be dispensed.

K.A.R. 68-16-5. Handling fees. This regulation specifies the handling fee a cancer drug repository may charge the recipient for each cancer drug dispensed.

K.A.R. 68-16-6. Distribution of donated cancer drugs. This regulation outlines the requirements that shall be satisfied when any cancer drug repository distributes a donated drug to another participating cancer drug repository.

K.A.R. 68-16-7. Sale of donated drugs. This regulation prohibits the sale of donated drugs and specifies the penalties that may be imposed for the sale of donated drugs.

K.A.R. 68-16-8. Recordkeeping requirements. This regulation specifies the length of time all cancer drug repository donor forms and cancer drug repository receipt forms shall be maintained and the written record that shall be created and maintained when a cancer drug repository destroys any donated cancer drug.

K.A.R. 68-16-9. Forms. This regulation identifies the information that each cancer drug repository receipt form and each cancer drug repository donor form shall contain.

All bids shall be submitted to the Planning Department customer service staff (main level of City Hall) in sealed envelopes addressed to the City of Lenexa, Kansas, Attention: City Clerk, and marked "Bid for: Rebid of Coon Creek Trail." Copies of plans, specifications, bidding documents and other contract documents are on file at the Public Works Department (lower level), Lenexa City Hall.

Bidders desiring contract documents for use in preparing bids may obtain a set of such documents at the address above upon payment of \$150, which amount is non-refundable.

In submitting a bid, the bidder warrants that it has read the contract documents and is fully familiar therewith and that it has visited the site of the work to fully inform itself as to all existing conditions and limitations, and shall include in its bid a sum to cover the cost of all items of the work as specified in the contract documents.

No oral telegraphic, telephonic proposals or alterations will be considered. Facsimile transmissions will not be accepted.

The following items must be included in the sealed envelope with the bid:

- a. Bid Form;
- b. 5% Bid Security—Bid Bond, Cashier's Check or Certified Check (see below).

Each bidder shall file with its bid a bid bond, a cashier's check or a certified check drawn on an acceptable bank, made payable to the city of Lenexa, Kansas, in an amount equal to 5 percent of the total bid, which shall be retained by the city of Lenexa, Kansas, until a contract for the project has been executed. Bid bonds will be returned to the bidders, with the exception of the best and lowest and second best and second lowest responsible bidders, within 21 days after their bids are rejected. The bid deposit of the lowest and the second lowest responsible bidders will be returned when the performance bond, maintenance bond and statutory bond, each in an amount equal to 100 percent of the contract amount, required insurance certificates and other required documents shall have been furnished and the contract documents have been executed by the successful bidder.

In the event the low bidder is unable to execute the contract, for whatever reason, within the time provided

in the notice of award, the city may annul the notice of award and the bid deposit may be forfeited, and the city shall exercise its legal prerogatives, including, but not limited to, enforcement of its rights as to the bid security or specific performance.

The city reserves the right to accept or reject any and all bids and to waive any technicalities or irregularities therein. Bids may be modified or withdrawn by written request of the bidder received in the office of the city clerk prior to the time and date for bid opening.

A public hearing will be conducted by the Wildlife and Parks Commission at 7 p.m. Thursday, October 26, at the Neosho County Community College, 800 W. 14th St., Chanute, to consider the approval and adoption of proposed administrative regulations of the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks.

A workshop meeting on business of the Wildlife and Parks Commission will begin at 1:30 p.m. October 26 at the location listed above. The meeting will recess at 5:30 p.m., then resume at 7 p.m. at the same location for the regulatory hearing. There will be public comment periods at the beginning of the afternoon and evening meetings for any issues not on the agenda, and additional comment periods will be available during the meeting on agenda items. Old and new business also may be discussed at this time. If necessary to complete the hearing or other business matters, the commission will reconvene at 9 a.m. October 27 at the same location.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days in advance of the hearing by contacting Sheila Kemmis,

commission secretary, at (620) 672-5911. Persons with a hearing impairment may call the Kansas Commission for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing at (800) 432-0698 to request special accommodations.

This 60-day notice period prior to the hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed administrative regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the chairman of the commission, Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, 1020 S. Kansas Ave., Suite 200, Topeka, 66612, or to sheilak@wp.state.ks.us if electronically. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for approving, amending and approving, or rejecting the proposed regulations.

The regulations that will be heard during the regulatory hearing portion of the meeting are as follows:

K.A.R. 115-2-1. This permanent regulation sets general fee requirements for various issuances of the department. The proposed amendments include creating a fee for two new permits: the tournament bass pass and the paddle-fish permit.

Economic Impact Summary: The increase of various fees for permit types could result in an increase of \$8,000 annually, all of which would accrue to the wildlife fee fund. Otherwise, the proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-2-2. This permanent regulation provides for motor vehicle entrance fees for the state park system. The proposed amendments include decreasing the cost of all motor vehicle permits by one-half.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed amendments could decrease the park fee fund receipts by \$1,600,000 for the calendar year 2007 but are offset by an appropriation of state general funds in the same amount specifically set aside to reduce park motor vehicle entrance fees. Otherwise, the proposed amendments are not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-2-3a. This permanent regulation sets the fees for cabin use on state property. The proposed amendments include adding several new locations where cabins will be placed in the next calendar year.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-25-6. This exempt regulation sets the spring turkey season bag limits, dates and permit allocations. The proposed amendments would open the spring season on April 1 for an archery equipment-only season leading up to the traditional opening of the firearms season and would expand the boundaries of unit 3.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-20-5. This new permanent regulation sets the primary caging requirements and transportation cag-

ing standards for six species of large felines, all bears and nonnative venomous snakes. The regulation was drafted as a requirement of legislation that passed in the most recent legislative session.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation may have an impact on individuals desiring to possess or possessing a dangerous regulated animal, but any amount would be purely speculative. Otherwise, the proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-20-6. This new permanent regulation sets the requirements to become a registered designated handler for a dangerous regulated animal. The regulation was drafted as a requirement of legislation that passed in the most recent legislative session.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation may have an impact on individuals desiring to become a registered designated handler, but any amount would be purely speculative. Otherwise, the proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-16-5. This permanent regulation sets the operational requirements for wildlife control permits. The proposed amendment would allow the use of a person to assist the permittee as long as the individual assisting is under the constant and direct supervision and in the constant presence of the permittee.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-7-4. This permanent regulation pertains to fish processing and possession. The proposed amendments would require that any person who takes fish from a body of water must leave the head, body and tail fin attached to the fish while on the water.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-18-12. This permanent regulation sets the purposes for which the trout permit is required, other restrictions on the permit and the permit duration. The proposed amendments would require an individual to have a trout permit in order to fish on certain trout fisheries and to have a trout permit only to fish for and possess trout on other trout fisheries.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-18-18. This new permanent regulation creates a permit for hand fishing, sets restrictions on the permit and sets the permit duration. The proposed regulation is a result of requests from members of the public and statewide fisheries meetings.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-18-19. This new permanent regulation creates a permit for paddlefish snagging, sets restrictions on the permit and sets the permit duration. The proposed regulation is part of a larger regulatory package for fish-

eries and replaces the mandatory checkstation process currently in place.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-18-20. This new permanent regulation creates a tournament bass pass, sets restrictions on the pass and sets the pass duration. The proposed regulation is a result of requests from members of the public and statewide fisheries meetings. The tournament bass pass would allow participants to keep bass meeting the statewide length limit but not a specific length limit for a particular body of water where a bass fishing tournament is being conducted.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-7-1. This permanent regulation sets legal equipment, methods of taking and other provisions for fishing. The proposed changes include adding hand fishing to the authorized methods of taking and deleting provisions related to mandatory paddlefish tagging stations. The proposed regulation is a result of requests from members of the public and statewide fisheries meetings.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-25-14. This exempt regulation sets the creel limit, size limit, possession limit and open seasons for fishing. The proposed changes to the regulation include having two types of trout waters; opening certain waters to hand fishing; and adopting special size limits, creel limits and bait restriction tables by reference document in lieu of the use of secretary's orders and posted notice. The proposed regulation is a result of requests from members of the public and statewide fisheries meetings.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

K.A.R. 115-7-8. This new regulation creates provisions for regulating and permitting certain bass tournaments. The proposed regulation contains provisions for applications, obligations of tournament organizers, obligations for tournament participants and provisions for release of fish taken. The proposed regulation is a result of requests from members of the public and statewide fisheries meetings.

Economic Impact Summary: The proposed regulation is not anticipated to have any appreciable economic impact on the department, other agencies or the public.

Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 1 p.m. Monday, September 18, in Room 900-N, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of amendments to an existing rule and regulation on a permanent basis effective 15 days after publication in the Kansas Register. Telephone conference is not available.

K.S.A. 2005 Supp. 75-7401 through 75-7405 and Section 45 of Chapter 187, 2005 Session Laws of Kansas transferred specific powers, duties and regulatory authority of the Division of Health Policy and Finance (DHPPF) within the Department of Administration to the Kansas Health Policy Authority (KHPA), effective July 1, 2006. The statutes provide that KHPA will be the single state agency for Medicaid, Medikan and HealthWave in Kansas.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the proposed regulation as stated in K.S.A. 2005 Supp. 77-421(a)(3). All interested parties may submit written comments before the hearing to Rita Haverkamp, Kansas Health Policy Authority, Room 900-N, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, 66612-1220, or by e-mail at rszh@srskansas.org. At the hearing, the Kansas Health Policy Authority will give all interested parties a reasonable opportunity to present their views, but it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulation and economic impact statement in an accessible format. Requests for accommodation should be made at least five working days before the hearing by contacting Rita Haverkamp at (785) 296-5107 or by calling the Kansas Relay Center at (800) 766-3777.

Copies of the regulation and the economic impact statement may be obtained by contacting Rita Haverkamp or from the KHPA Web site at www.da.state.ks.us/hpf. A summary of the regulation and the economic impact follows:

Article 5.—PROVIDER PARTICIPATION, SCOPE OF SERVICES, AND REIMBURSEMENTS FOR THE MEDICAID (MEDICAL ASSISTANCE) PROGRAM

129-5-1. Prior authorization. The following changes will be made to K.A.R. 129-5-1 regarding prior authori-

zation of pharmaceutical products: To ensure the most clinically appropriate utilization of these drugs in the most cost-effective manner, the following drugs will require prior authorization. These therapeutic classes of drugs have been evaluated by the Preferred Drug List Advisory Board and found to be clinically equivalent:

- drugs for diabetes: exenatide and pramlintide acetate
- narcotics: buprenorphine/naloxone and buprenorphine

Federal Mandate: This regulation change is not federally mandated.

Economic Impact: It is expected that this change will reduce Medicaid expenditures by \$65,600 SGF and \$98,400 FFP annually.

30-4-64. Work program requirements. This regulation is being amended to make several changes. First, a clarification is included for the exemption of a parent or other caretaker providing care for a child under age one to note that this exemption may be claimed only for a total of 12 months. Second, the definitions for work program components have been modified to reflect that such activities must be supervised. Lastly, the provisions regarding ineligibility for benefits for failure to cooperate have been changed to include cooperation with the work assessment process and allow for a penalty to continue until the person cooperates. Other technical changes also have been made to this regulation.

Federal Mandate: Changes in this regulation are a result of the Deficit Reduction Act of 2006, which reauthorized the federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program.

Economic Impact: The changes contained in this regulation are not expected to have any discernable economic impact.

Article 16.—MEAT AND MEAT PRODUCTS INSPECTION

(9) "Official establishment" and "establishment" shall mean any permanently located building or adjacent premises that are registered pursuant to this act, where livestock, as defined in K.S.A. 65-6a18(aa) and amendments thereto, domestic rabbits, or meat food products capable of use as human food are prepared, as defined by K.S.A. 65-6a18(k) and amendments thereto.

(10) "Program," "food safety and inspection service," "inspection service," "service," "department," and "FSIS" shall mean the meat and poultry inspection program of the Kansas department of agriculture.

(11) "Secretary," "national supervisor," "area supervisor," "circuit supervisor," and "station supervisor" shall mean the secretary of the department of agriculture or the secretary's designee.

(12) "U.S." and "the United States" shall mean Kansas or the state of Kansas, as appropriate.

(13) "U.S. inspected" and "government inspected" shall mean inspected by the Kansas department of agriculture.

4-16-3a. Exemptions. (a) Notwithstanding the requirements for the exemption as a "custom slaughterer" as set forth in 9 C.F.R. 303.1(a) and (b) adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-16-1c, both the custom slaughtering

of dead or dying animals by any person and the custom processing of the carcasses of dead or dying animals by any person shall be prohibited.

(b)(1) The custom slaughtering of diseased or disabled animals by any person and the custom processing of the carcasses of diseased or disabled animals by any person may be allowed if both of the following requirements are met:

(A) The animal shall be examined by a licensed veterinarian on the day of slaughter.

(B) The animal shall be accompanied by a health certificate that meets the following requirements:

(i) Is issued on the day of slaughter by that veterinarian. This health certificate shall be valid only on the date of issuance;

(ii) includes a record of the animal's body temperature, taken at the time of the veterinary examination;

(iii) for cattle, states that the animal was ambulatory when examined;

(iv) includes a description of the condition of the animal; and

(v) states that the animal is free of any visible signs of infection or contagious disease.

(2) Notwithstanding the slaughter of an apparently healthy animal or an animal for which a health certificate has been issued, an establishment shall not custom process any carcass of an animal so infected that consumption of the resulting products of the animal could pose a health risk. This prohibition shall include all carcasses showing signs of any of the following:

(A) Acute inflammation of the lungs, pleura, pericardium, peritoneum, or meninges;

(B) septicemia or pyemia, whether puerperal, traumatic, or without any evident cause;

(C) gangrenous or severe hemorrhagic enteritis or gastritis;

(D) acute, diffuse metritis or mammitis;

(E) phlebitis of the umbilical veins;

(F) septic or purulent traumatic pericarditis;

(G) any of the following conditions or similar conditions, either singly or in combination:

(i) Any acute inflammation, abscess, or suppurating sore, if associated with acute nephritis;

(ii) fatty and degenerated liver;

(iii) swollen, soft spleen;

(iv) marked pulmonary hyperemia;

(v) general swelling of lymph nodes;

(vi) diffuse redness of the skin;

(vii) cachexia; or

(viii) icteric discoloration of the carcass; or

(H) salmonellosis.

(3) The department shall not be responsible for the costs associated with obtaining a health certificate.

(4)(A) An establishment may lose the privilege of custom slaughtering and custom processing diseased or disabled animals if any of the following occurs at the establishment:

(i) Custom slaughter, custom processing, or both, without the required health certificate;

(ii) custom slaughtering, custom processing, or both, with an inaccurate, incomplete, or falsified health certificate. Evidence of the falsification of any health certificate

shall be forwarded to USDA-APHIS and to the Kansas board of veterinary medical examiners;

(iii) custom slaughtering, custom processing, or both, of an animal that is so infected that consumption of the resulting products from that animal could pose a health risk; or

(iv) any other violation of this act or any regulations adopted pursuant to this act.

(B) The slaughtering of diseased or disabled animals on a custom basis without the required health certificate may result in the revocation of the custom exemption.

(c) Except as specified in this subsection, the following animals with any of these conditions shall not be eligible for slaughter or processing for human food on a custom basis at any establishment and shall not be issued a health certificate:

(1) Livestock that are known to have reacted to the tuberculin test;

(2) any swine having a temperature of 106° F or higher and any cattle, sheep, or goats having a temperature of 105° F or higher;

(3) any animal found in a comatose or semicomatose condition;

(4) nonambulatory disabled cattle, which shall mean cattle that cannot rise from a recumbent position and that cannot walk, including those cattle with broken appendages, severed tendons or ligaments, nerve paralysis, fractured vertebral column, or metabolic conditions;

(5) all livestock showing symptoms of anaplasmosis, ketosis, leptospirosis, listeriosis, parturient paresis, pseudorabies, rabies, scrapie, tetanus, grass tetany, transport tetany, strangles, purpura hemorrhagica, azoturia, infectious equine encephalomyelitis, toxic encephalomyelitis (forage poisoning), dourine, acute influenza, generalized osteoporosis, glanders (farcy), acute inflammatory lameness, or extensive fistula;

(6) all swine found to be affected with hog cholera;

(7) all swine that are of lots in which one or more animals have been found to be affected with hog cholera;

(8) any animal found to be affected with epithelioma of the eye;

(9) any animal found to be affected with anthrax;

(10) any animal of a lot in which anthrax is found, until it has been determined by a veterinary inspection that no anthrax-infected livestock remain in the lot;

(11) all cattle found, upon veterinary inspection, to be affected with anasarca in an advanced stage and characterized by an extensive and generalized edema;

(12) any hog showing that it is affected with acute swine erysipelas;

(13) any animal showing signs of the onset of parturition, until after parturition and passage of the placenta;

(14) any goat that has reacted to a test for brucellosis; or

(15) any animal suspected of having been treated with or exposed to any substance that could impart a biological residue that would make the edible tissues unfit for human food or otherwise adulterated.

(d) Only those requirements of the act relating to sanitation and adulteration shall apply to the slaughtering or processing, or both, of healthy rabbits by any person if either of the following conditions is met:

(1) The rabbits are raised by that person and are for the exclusion use or consumption by that person, members of that person's household, former members of that person's household, or that person's nonpaying guests and employees.

(2)(A) That person slaughters not more than 250 rabbits in a calendar year;

(B) the rabbits are for distribution directly to household consumers from that person's own premises; and

117-2-2. Licensed classification; experience requirement. (a) Each applicant for the licensed classification shall have the equivalent of two years of appraisal experience. One thousand hours shall constitute one year of appraisal experience. Any applicant may accumulate experience hours over more than one calendar year and may receive credit for more than 1,000 hours within any one calendar year.

(b)(1) In order for the board to determine whether or not the experience requirements have been satisfied, each applicant shall submit appraisal experience log sheets, in a format prescribed by the board, listing the appraisal reports completed by the applicant within the five-year period preceding the date of application. Each appraisal report shall be signed by the applicant or the preparer of the report who supervised the applicant. If the applicant does not sign the appraisal report, the preparer shall indicate whether or not the applicant provided significant professional assistance in the appraisal process.

(2) If an applicant has not maintained a record of the actual number of hours involved in completing an appraisal, the applicant may estimate the number of hours as follows:

(A) Residential appraisal. To estimate the number of hours for each residential appraisal, the following calculation shall be used:

(i) Multiply the number of approaches taken by two; and

(ii) to the figure computed in paragraph (b)(2)(A)(i), add one of the following numbers according to the type of appraisal report generated: six for self-contained, four for summary, or zero for restricted use.

(B) Commercial or agricultural appraisal. To estimate the number of hours for each commercial or agricultural appraisal, the following calculation shall be used:

(i) Multiply the number of approaches taken by eight; and

(ii) to the figure computed in paragraph (b)(2)(B)(i), add one of the following numbers according to the type of appraisal report generated: 16 for self-contained, eight for summary, or zero for restricted use.

(c) Upon request of the board, each applicant shall submit a minimum of three appraisal reports selected by the board from the applicant's log sheet and one appraisal report selected by the applicant from the log sheet. The selected appraisal reports shall be reviewed in accordance with standard rule 3 by the board or the board's designee for competency, within the scope of practice of the appraisal work authorized for the licensed classification, by using the criteria specified in K.S.A. 58-4109(d) and amendments thereto, and in particular, standards 1 and 2 of the edition of the uniform standards of professional

appraisal practice (USPAP) in effect at the time the appraisal was performed. Approval of an applicant's experience hours shall be subject to board approval of the requisite number of experience hours and board approval of the selected appraisal reports.

(d) Acceptable appraisal experience shall include a minimum of 1,500 experience hours of real property appraisal experience.

(e) Acceptable appraisal experience may include an aggregate maximum of 25% of the total number of experience hours in the following appraisal categories:

- (1) Ad valorem tax appraisal;
- (2) review appraisal;
- (3) real estate consulting;
- (4) highest and best use analysis;
- (5) feasibility analysis study;
- (6) drive-by appraisals; and

(7) restricted appraisal reports. Article 3.—QUALIFICATIONS CRITERIA—

117-3-2. General classification; experience requirement. (a) Each applicant for the general classification shall have 3,000 hours of appraisal experience obtained continually over a period of no fewer than 30 months.

(b) At least 1,500 hours of appraisal experience shall have been nonresidential appraisal work. For purposes of this regulation, "residential" shall be defined as one to four residential units.

(c)(1) In order for the board to determine whether or not the experience requirements have been satisfied, each applicant shall submit appraisal experience log sheets, in a format prescribed by the board, listing the appraisal reports completed by the applicant within the five-year period preceding the date of application. Each appraisal report shall be signed by the applicant or the preparer of the report who supervised the applicant. If the applicant does not sign the appraisal report, the preparer shall indicate whether or not the applicant provided significant professional assistance in the appraisal process.

(2) If an applicant has not maintained a record of the actual number of hours involved in completing an appraisal, the applicant may estimate the number of hours as follows:

(A) Residential appraisal. To estimate the number of hours for each residential appraisal, the following calculation shall be used:

(i) Multiply the number of approaches taken by two; and

(ii) to the figure computed in paragraph (c)(2)(A)(i), add one of the following numbers according to the type of appraisal report generated: six for self-contained, four for summary, or zero for restricted use.

(B) Commercial or agricultural appraisal. To estimate the number of hours for each commercial or agricultural appraisal, the following calculation shall be used:

(i) Multiply the number of approaches taken by eight; and

(ii) to the figure computed in paragraph (c)(2)(B)(i), add one of the following numbers according to the type of appraisal report generated: 16 for self-contained, eight for summary, or zero for restricted use.

(d) Upon request of the board, each applicant shall submit a minimum of three appraisal reports selected by the board from the applicant's log sheet and one appraisal report selected by the applicant from the log sheet. The selected appraisal reports shall be reviewed by the board or the board's designee, in accordance with standard rule 3, for competency within the scope of practice of the appraisal work authorized for the general classification, by using the criteria specified in K.S.A. 58-4109(d) and amendments thereto, and in particular, standard rules 1 and 2 of the edition of the uniform standards of professional appraisal practice (USPAP) in effect at the time the appraisal was performed. Approval of an applicant's experience hours shall be subject to board approval of the requisite number of experience hours and board approval of the selected appraisal reports.

(e) Acceptable appraisal experience shall include a minimum of 2,500 experience hours of real property appraisal experience.

(f) Acceptable appraisal experience may include an aggregate maximum of 25% of the total number of experience hours in the following appraisal categories:

- (1) Ad valorem tax appraisal;
- (2) review appraisal;
- (3) real estate consulting;

117-4-2. Residential classification; experience requirement. (a) Each applicant for the residential classification shall have 2,500 hours of appraisal experience obtained continually over a period of no fewer than 24 months.

(b)(1) In order for the board to determine whether or not the experience requirements have been satisfied, each applicant shall submit appraisal experience log sheets, in a format prescribed by the board, listing the appraisal reports completed by the applicant within the five-year period preceding the date of application. Each appraisal report shall be signed by the applicant or the preparer of the report who supervised the applicant. If the applicant

does not sign the appraisal report, the preparer shall indicate whether or not the applicant provided significant professional assistance in the appraisal process.

(2) If an applicant has not maintained a record of the actual number of hours involved in completing an appraisal, the applicant may estimate the number of hours as follows:

(A) Residential appraisal. To estimate the number of hours for each residential appraisal, the following calculation shall be used:

(i) Multiply the number of approaches taken by two; and

(ii) to the figure computed in paragraph (b)(2)(A)(i), add one of the following numbers according to the type of appraisal report generated: six for self-contained, four for summary, or zero for restricted use.

(B) Commercial or agricultural appraisal. To estimate the number of hours for each commercial or agricultural appraisal, the following calculation shall be used:

(i) Multiply the number of approaches taken by eight; and

(ii) to the figure computed in paragraph (b)(2)(B)(i), add one of the following numbers according to the type of appraisal report generated: 16 for self-contained, eight for summary, or zero for restricted use.

(c) Upon request of the board, each applicant shall submit a minimum of three appraisal reports selected by the board from the applicant's log sheet and one appraisal report selected by the applicant from the log sheet. The selected appraisal reports shall be reviewed by the board or the board's designee, in accordance with standard rule 3 for competency within the scope of practice of the appraisal work authorized for the residential classification, by using the criteria specified in K.S.A. 58-4109(d) and amendments thereto, and in particular, standard rules 1 and 2 of the edition of the uniform standards of professional appraisal practice (USPAP) in effect at the time the appraisal was performed. Approval of an applicant's experience hours shall be subject to board approval of the requisite number of experience hours and board approval of the selected appraisal reports.

(d) Acceptable appraisal experience shall include a minimum of 2,000 experience hours of real property appraisal experience.

(e) Acceptable appraisal experience may include an aggregate maximum of 25% of the total number of experience hours in the following appraisal categories:

- (1) Ad valorem tax appraisal;
- (2) review appraisal;
- (3) real estate consulting;
- (4) highest and best use analysis;
- (5) feasibility analysis study;
- (6) drive-by appraisals; and

(7) restricted appraisal reports. Article 5.—PROVISIONAL CLASSIFICATION

117-5-1. Provisional classification; education requirements. In order to be eligible for the provisional classification, each applicant shall complete the education requirements listed in K.A.R. 117-2-1, K.A.R. 117-4-1, or K.A.R. 117-3-1. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 58-4109; effective Aug. 15, 1994; amended April 24, 1998; amended Sept. 1, 2006.)

Article 6.—CONTINUING EDUCATION

117-6-1. Continuing education; renewal requirements. (a)(1) The continuing education requirement for renewal of a license or certificate for the provisional, licensed, residential, and general classifications shall be the equivalent of 14 classroom hours of instruction. A two-year total of 28 hours of continuing education hours may be averaged over each two-year period as defined in paragraph (a)(2) and as provided in paragraphs (a)(3) and (a)(4). Each course for which credit is requested shall have received the approval of the board or approval of the appraisal licensing agency of the state in which the course was held for renewal of the applicable classification before the completion of the course.

(2) For persons certified or licensed before July 1, 2003, the two-year period shall begin on July 1, 2003 and shall continue biennially thereafter. For persons certified or licensed on and after July 1, 2003, the first two-year period shall end on June 30, 2005 and shall continue biennially thereafter.

(3) For persons certified or licensed before July 1, 2003, within two years after July 1, 2003 and within every subsequent two-year period, each certified or licensed appraiser shall attend a seven-classroom-hour national uniform standards of professional appraisal practice update course, or its equivalent.

(4) For persons certified or licensed on and after July 1, 2003, within the two-year period ending June 30, 2005 and every subsequent two-year period, each certified or licensed appraiser shall attend a seven-classroom-hour national uniform standards of professional appraisal practice update course, or its equivalent.

(b) An appraiser shall not receive continuing education credit for a course for which the appraiser received credit toward the original classroom hour requirement specified in K.A.R. 117-2-1, 117-3-1, or 117-4-1, except for the course on the uniform standards of professional appraisal practice and updates of the course. However, if a licensed or certified appraiser receives credit for a course to apply toward a higher classification, the appraiser may also receive continuing education credit for the course if it is approved by the board or by the appraisal licensing agency of the state in which the course was held for continuing education credit.

(c)(1) Continuing education credit may also be granted for participation, other than as a student, in appraisal educational processes and programs. Activities for which credit may be granted shall include any of the following:

- (A) Teaching;
- (B) program development;
- (C) authorship of textbooks; or

(D) similar activities that are determined by the board to be equivalent to obtaining continuing education.

(2) Each appraiser seeking credit for attendance at or participation in an educational activity that was not previously accredited shall submit to the board a request for credit, which shall include the following information:

- (A) A description of the activity;
- (B) the date or dates of the activity;
- (C) the subject or subjects covered;
- (D) the name of each instructor and the instructor's qualifications;
- (E) the number of credit hours requested, which shall not exceed the required minimum of 14 hours per renewal; and

(F) any other relevant information required by the board. Within 30 days after receipt of this request, the appraiser shall be advised by the board in writing whether credit is granted and what amount of continuing education credit will be allowed. Either the sponsor or appraiser shall submit a separate request for approval of each continuing education activity.

(3) Board members who actively serve on the board may receive continuing education credit for attending a state board meeting once during each two-year continuing education cycle, if the meeting is at least two hours in length.

(d) It shall be the appraiser's responsibility to keep track of that individual's continuing education credit. At the time of renewal of a license or certificate, the appraiser shall provide verification of completion of continuing education by affidavit to the board.

(1) The affidavit shall contain a statement of continuing education courses completed by the appraiser.

(2) The appraiser shall list all courses completed on the affidavit.

(3) The appraiser shall retain all course completion certificates for five years and shall make the certificates available to the board for review upon request.

(e) If any appraiser requests credit according to subsection (c) of this regulation, the appraiser shall submit a detailed description of the activities with the application for renewal on a form obtained from the board.

(f) Any nonresident of Kansas may receive credit for courses approved by the state of residence by submitting certificates of completion and evidence that each course for which credit is requested was approved by the state of residence. Evidence of renewal of an equivalent license or certificate by a nonresident's state of residence may be recognized by the board as meeting the education requirement for renewal of the nonresident's Kansas license or certificate. 117-6-2. Continuing education; approval of courses; requirements. (a) Each sponsor of a continuing education course approved by the board shall ensure that

each appraiser participates in a program that maintains and increases the appraiser's skill, knowledge, and competency in real estate appraising.

(b) Courses approved by the board for renewal of a license or certificate shall cover real estate-related appraisal topics that may include the following:

- (1) Ad valorem taxation;
- (2) arbitration;
- (3) business courses related to the practice of real estate appraisal;
- (4) development cost estimating;
- (5) ethics and standards of professional practice;
- (6) land use planning, zoning, and taxation;
- (7) management, leasing, brokerage, and time-sharing;
- (8) property development;
- (9) real estate appraisal;
- (10) real estate law;
- (11) real estate litigation;
- (12) real estate financing and investment;
- (13) real estate appraisal-related computer applications;
- (14) real estate securities and syndication; and
- (15) real property exchange.

(c) The length of each course approved for continuing education credit shall be at least two classroom hours.

(d) Any distance education course may be approved for continuing education credit if one of the following conditions is met:

(1) The course is presented by an accredited college or university that offers distance education programs in other disciplines, and either of the following conditions is met:

(A) The student successfully completes a written examination administered by an official approved by the college or university or by the sponsoring organization, consistent with the requirements of the course accreditation.

(B) If a written examination is not required for accreditation, the student successfully completes the course components required for accreditation that demonstrate mastery and fluency.

(2) The course is presented to an organized group in an instructional setting with a person qualified and available to answer questions, provide information, and monitor student attendance.

(3) The course has received approval of the international distance education certification center (IDECC) for the course design and delivery mechanism, and either of the following conditions is met:

(A) The student successfully completes a written examination administered by an official approved by the college or university or by the sponsoring organization consistent with the requirements of the course accreditation.

(B) If a written examination is not required for accreditation, the student successfully completes the course components required for accreditation that demonstrate mastery and fluency.

(e) To receive credit for a course, each applicant shall attend all classroom hours, even when the number of credit hours for which a course is approved is less than the total number of hours of the course presentation.

(f) The only course students or instructors may receive credit for attending or instructing any subsequent offering of the same course for one year after attending or teaching the course shall be any update of the ethics and standards of professional practice course.
