No oral telegraphic, telephonic proposals or alterations will be considered. Facsimile transmissions will not be accepted.

The following items must be included in the sealed envelope with the bid:

In the event the low bidder is unable to execute the contract, for whatever reason, within the time provided in the notice of award, the city may annul the notice of award and the bid deposit may be forfeited, and the city shall exercise its legal prerogatives, including, but not limited to, enforcement of its rights as to the bid security or specific performance.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board will conduct a public hearing from 10 to 11 a.m. Monday, April 23, in the board's conference room at 712 S. Kansas Ave., Topeka, to consider the proposed revocation of permanent rules and regulations for psychology, social work, professional counseling, master's level psychology, and marriage and family therapy, and proposed amendments to a permanent rule and regulation for alcohol and other drug abuse counseling.

This 60-day notice of the public hearing constitutes a public comment period for purposes of receiving written public comments on the proposed amendments. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Phyllis Gilmore, Executive Director, Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board, 712 S. Kansas Ave., Topeka, 66603-3817. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally at the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

Any individual with a disability may request accommodation in order to participate in the public hearing and may request the proposed regulations and economic impact statements in an accessible format. There is designated accessible parking on Kansas Avenue, and the front entrance of the board office also is accessible.

The following is a summary of the proposed revocations and amendments and their economic impact statement. The board does not have a less costly or less intrusive method for achieving the stated purpose of each regulation.

K.A.R. 102-1-7, 102-2-10, 102-3-8a, 102-4-8a and 102-5-8 are revocations. The regulations relate to the practice of returning wall certifications when the licensee is no longer licensed. This procedure is no longer used.

Economic impact: There would be no economic impact to any entities.

K.A.R. 102-6-8 also relates to the practice of returning wall certifications when the licensee is no longer licensed. This procedure is no longer used. Therefore, it is being stricken. The procedure for notifying the board office with a change of address remains in effect.

WHEREAS, President George W. Bush has exercised his authority pursuant to §12302 of Title 10 of the United States Code and ordered selected members of the Kansas National Guard to federal active duty for extended periods in support of Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Noble Eagle and Operation Iraqi Freedom.

WHEREAS, thousands of Kansas Army National Guard Soldiers and Kansas Air National Guard Airmen have been ordered to federal active duty since September 11, 2001.

WHEREAS, the State of Kansas should take all necessary and appropriate steps to assist all military members and their families who face potential disruptions caused by being called to active duty in the Nation's ongoing war against terrorism.

WHEREAS, the need for vital statistics information is often required by members of the armed forces due to residence changes or status change.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby declare that, in order to support our military personnel, requests for vital statistic records by all members of the Kansas National Guard who have received an alert notice of pending active duty or have already been placed on Federal active duty for mobilization and their dependents shall be fulfilled without charge.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 06-11 and shall become effective immediately.

Executive Order 06-12

WHEREAS, Kansas public schools have a strong and positive tradition of academically preparing students for their futures; and

WHEREAS, as Kansans engage in 21st century societal issues, there is a growing awareness of the need determining how effective schools are in providing a healthy and prepared learning environment for their school children regardless of geographic location, economic status or social factors; and

WHEREAS, no single Kansas agency has the exclusive responsibility of providing a safe, healthy and prepared learning environment; and

WHEREAS, in the past, on an as needed basis, representatives from selected state agencies met to respond to immediate health or safety issues; and

WHEREAS, as our society and its issues become increasingly complex, there is greater understanding that this past approach will not adequately meet new challenges; and

WHEREAS, our society and especially parents expect their children to be provided with a safe and healthy environment where school officials are prepared to handle unforeseen events that have the potential to blossom into crisis events.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby create the Governor's Commission for Healthy and Prepared Schools ("Commission") with the following purposes and charges:

1. The heads of the following state agencies and instrumentalities, or their designees shall participate on the Commission: Kansas Department of Education, Kansas Highway Patrol, Kansas Adjutant General's Department, Department of Health and Environment, and the Office of the Governor.

2. The Governor shall appoint a representative on the Commission from the following organizations: United School Administrators, Kansas National Educators Association and Local Education Agency.

3. The Governor shall appoint to the Commission a school nurse, a representative of public health, a representative of mental health, a representative of a non-profit

agency, a parent representative, a school resource officer and a representative of local emergency management.

4. The Governor shall appoint the chair of the Council.

5. The Commission shall establish a vision statement, mission statement and guiding principles.

6. The Commission shall conduct a needs assessment to understand the nature of threats to the health and safety of Kansas' school children and staff members.

7. The Commission shall identify gaps and limitations of current school crisis planning.

8. The Commission shall identify necessary resources to support and equip all schools with a comprehensive all-hazards crisis response plan.

9. The Commission shall explore funding sources (public, private and non-profit) that will sustain the work and recommendation of the Commission.

10. The Commission shall seek ideas to create a multi-agency team that has the authority to establish standards for school crisis plans, training requirements, skills, needed resources and accountability procedures.

11. The Commission shall develop a marketing plan for stakeholders promoting the vision, the needs, the value and obtaining feedback from the Commission's recommendations.

12. The Commission shall improve awareness and communication with local/state response agencies regarding the unique assets and resources of schools.

13. The Commission shall consider ideas of establishing necessary logistics needed to sustain the work and recommendations of the Commission.

14. The Commission shall explore necessary procedures enabling the State of Kansas to pursue funding opportunities from grants, other government agencies, non-profit organizations, for profit businesses and other sources that would support the implementation of enhanced school preparation efforts which are integrated with community plans.

15. The Commission shall report their findings and recommendations to the Governor.

16. The Commission will meet as determined by the chair of the Commission.

17. Members of the Commission shall not receive compensation, subsistence, allowance or associated expenses. Officers or employees of state agencies who are appointed to the Commission as part of their duties shall be authorized to participate on the Commission and may claim subsistence, allowance, mileage or associated expenses as permitted by law.

18. All agencies under the control of the Governor which are on the Commission are directed to render full assistance and cooperation to the Commission.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 06-12 and shall become effective immediately.

Executive Order 06-13

WHEREAS, Article 1, §3 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests the supreme power of the state in the Governor; and

WHEREAS, energy production is one of the core foundations of our state's economy; and

WHEREAS, the production of energy benefits the long term economic and employment health of the state; and

WHEREAS, the formation of public policy is dependent upon accurate and timely information being made available to Kansas policy makers; and

WHEREAS, improved coordination of the state's energy resources is an essential element in improving the quality of services provided to the people of Kansas; and

WHEREAS, policies to encourage renewable energy and energy efficiency, and to extend the life of existing energy resources are required for Kansas to regain its status as an energy exporter and for Kansas' energy future; and

WHEREAS, surrounding states have taken steps to promote or mandate the use of renewable energy resources; and

WHEREAS, after decades of standing as a net energy exporter, Kansas has now become a net importer of energy; and

WHEREAS, Kansas has been ranked first among all states in harnessable renewable energy resources; and

WHEREAS, it is the goal to help ensure that Kansans have low cost, reliable and sustainable energy, produced in-state, to the fullest extent possible.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby reformulate the composition of the Kansas Energy Council ("Council") with the following purposes and charges:

1. The Council shall collect and compile information pertaining to energy resources, including wind and biomass, in the state, as well as the availability, production and use of energy in the state.

2. Based on such data, the Council shall formulate and coordinate a comprehensive state energy plan that includes strategies to:

a. Ensure a low-cost, reliable and sustainable energy supply;

b. Increase energy efficiency and conservation;

c. Develop a balanced renewable energy policy that promotes our state's renewable and alternative energy resources and preserves those natural ecosystems and places of scenic beauty that cannot be replaced;

d. Extend the life of existing energy resources;

e. Enhance energy related research and development; and

f. Ensure an adequate and stable state energy infrastructure.

3. Such a state plan shall include sections corresponding with:

a. Estimates of energy consumption by Kansas residents for the next 12, 36 and 60 months by energy category; and

b. Estimates of energy production by energy source for the next 12, 36, and 60 months by energy category.

4. The Council shall annually review and modify as necessary the state energy plan.

5. The Council shall advise of trends identified in relation to energy production, consumption and any tax or revenue implications.

6. The Council shall recommend:

a. Appropriate means to increase the productive life of Kansas energy resources;

b. Appropriate means to increase the state's self-reliance on its own energy sources through:

i. Increased efficiency in the use of its resources,

ii. Identification of potential energy resources, and

iii. Identification of policy and tax issues that positively or adversely impact self-reliance;

c. Ways to avoid loss of tax revenues and employment opportunities related to energy resource management;

d. Policies to increase the export of energy from Kansas;

e. Policies to encourage renewable energy development;

f. Policies to encourage energy efficiency; and

g. Such other policies or actions related to energy resource management as may be identified.

7. The Council shall study the state's transmission needs for electrical energy.

8. The Council shall determine ways to encourage energy-related production, research and development, and other energy-related economic development in the state.

9. The Council shall annually report their findings and recommendations to the Kansas Corporation Commission, the Governor and the legislature no later than January 15th.

10. The Council shall consist of 30 members as follows:

a. The state geologist, or designee;

b. The chairperson of the Kansas Corporation Commission, or designee;

c. The consumer counsel of the Citizens' Utility Ratepayer Board, or designee;

d. 21 appointments by the Governor; including:

i. An energy economist serving on the faculty of a state education institution;

ii. An individual knowledgeable in energy efficiency and conservation;

iii. An individual knowledgeable in tax and revenue issues related to energy use or production;

iv. An individual knowledgeable in energy production issues as they relate to agriculture;

v. An individual knowledgeable in environmental issues related to energy use and production;

vi. An individual knowledgeable in renewable energy resources;

vii. A representative of oil producers;

viii. A representative of natural gas producers;

ix. A representative of refiners of petroleum products;

x. A representative of marketers of petroleum products;

xi. A representative of investor-owned generators of electricity;

xii. A representative of rural electric cooperatives;

xiii. A representative of municipally owned or operated electric utilities;

- xiv. A representative of generators of electricity from renewable energy resources;
 - xv. A representative of Kansas Association of Counties;
 - xvi. A representative of the League of Kansas Municipalities;
 - xvii. The Secretary of Commerce, or designee;
 - xviii. The President of the Kansas Development Finance Authority, or designee;
 - xix. The Secretary of Transportation, or designee;
 - xx. The Secretary of Health and Environment, or designee;
 - xxi. The Secretary of Agriculture, or designee;
- e. Three members of the House of Representatives who have substantial knowledge of energy, agriculture or business development, two to be appointed by the Speaker of the House and one to be appointed by the Minority Leader of the House of Representatives; and
- f. Three members of the Senate who have substantial knowledge of energy, agriculture or business development, two to be appointed by the President of the Senate and one to be appointed by the Minority Leader of the Senate.

11. Of the members first appointed by the Governor subsequent to this order, five shall serve terms of four years, five shall serve terms of three years and six shall serve terms of two years, and thereafter, terms shall be for four years;

12. All other members shall serve terms consistent with their offices, employment or appointment.

13. The Lieutenant Governor shall serve as co-chairperson. The Governor shall annually select a co-chairperson from among the members. The co-chairperson appointed from the membership of the Council shall serve as presiding officer. The Council may elect other officers among its members and may establish any committees deemed necessary to discharge its responsibilities.

14. Members of the Council, with exception of the co-chairperson appointed from the membership of the Council, shall not receive compensation, subsistence, allowance or associated expenses. Officers or employees of state agencies who are appointed to the Council as part of their duties shall be authorized to participate on the Council and may claim subsistence, allowance, mileage or associated expenses as permitted by law.

15. Plans, reports, or recommendations of any nature adopted by the Council shall be considered advice to the Governor and legislature and shall not be construed as official policy, position or interpretation of laws or rules and regulation by the State Corporation Commission or the Department of Health and Environment nor shall they be bound in any manner to consider any such advice when conducting their advisory and regulatory responsibilities.

This order supersedes Executive Order No. 06-06. This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 06-13 and shall become effective immediately.

Executive Order 07-01

WHEREAS, Article 1, §3 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests the supreme power of the state in the Governor; and

WHEREAS, Homeland Security Presidential Directive 9 has tasked the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security to coordinate "countermeasure research and development of new methods for detection, prevention technologies, agent characterization, and dose response relationships for high-consequence agents;" and

WHEREAS, at present there are no facilities in the United States that have adequate containment, security, equipment and infrastructure to meet the requirements identified in Presidential Directive 9; and

WHEREAS, to meet this need, the Department of Homeland Security ("DHS") and its federal partners initiated plans for a National Bio and Agrodefense Facility ("NBAF"); and

WHEREAS, the NBAF will enhance protection from both natural and intentional threats by modernizing and integrating high-security facilities, thus enhancing our nation's capacity to assess potential threats to humans and animals alike; and

WHEREAS, the DHS is seeking a location to build the \$451 million, 500,000 square foot NBAF facility; and

WHEREAS, Kansas is the ideal location for the NBAF. Kansas is a world leader in bioscience, especially in the areas of animal health, infectious diseases, vaccines and food safety and an exceptionally well qualified workforce; and

WHEREAS, two sites in Kansas, Manhattan and Leavenworth, are actively under consideration to site the NBAF facility; and

WHEREAS, NBAF represents a seminal opportunity to secure a federal laboratory in Kansas; and

WHEREAS, Kansas has long supported national infrastructure, such as the Biosecurity Research Institute, to address our state's and nation's efforts to protect human and animal health from both naturally occurring and intentionally introduced disease threats; and

WHEREAS, NBAF will be a biotechnology magnet for private biotechnology companies, professionals and support infrastructure and will help anchor Kansas' existing strengths in animal health and plant sciences; and

WHEREAS, Kansas is competing with 13 other states to site NBAF and must develop an aggressive advocacy plan led by prominent public and private leaders in order to be successful.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby create the Kansas National Bio and Agrodefense Facility Task Force ("Task Force") with the following purposes and charges:

1. The task force shall be composed of no more than 50 members appointed by the Governor. The Governor will designate co-chairs, vice chairs and honorary chairs. The task force may elect other officers among its members and

(continued)

may establish any committees deemed necessary to discharge its responsibilities.

2. Members of the task force shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor and shall meet upon the call of the co-chairs as necessary to carry out the duties outlined in the this executive order.

3. One member each shall be appointed by the President of the Kansas Senate; Speaker of the Kansas House of Representatives; Minority Leader of the Kansas Senate; and Minority Leader of the Kansas House of Representatives.

4. Members of the Kansas Congressional Delegation, or their designees, shall serve as ex-officio members of the task force.

5. Members of the task force shall not receive compensation, subsistence, allowance or associated expenses. Officers or employees of state agencies who are appointed to the Commission as part of their duties shall be authorized to participate on the Commission and may claim subsistence, allowance, mileage or associated expenses as permitted by law.

6. The Kansas Bioscience Authority shall provide primary support and assistance to the task force.

7. The task force shall develop a compelling case for siting NBAF at one of the two sites the DHS has "down-selected," namely Manhattan and Leavenworth.

8. The task force shall coordinate community outreach and advocacy for the siting of NBAF in Kansas, and serve as a point for public input on the siting of NBAF in Kansas. The task force shall develop specific short-term and long-term plans to coordinate community outreach and advocacy for the siting of NBAF in Kansas.

9. The task force shall assist the DHS in the National Environmental Policy Act process to conduct an Environmental Impact Statement on the proposed sites in Kansas (e.g., assist DHS in coordinating community outreach meetings and educating the public on what DHS proposes to do with the facility).

10. The task force shall engage private industry to support locating the NBAF in Kansas. The task force shall develop specific short-term and long-term plans to engage and inform the private industry as to the advantages of siting NBAF in Kansas.

11. The task force shall engage the affected agriculture stakeholder community to support locating the NBAF in Kansas. The task force shall develop specific short-term and long-term plans to engage and inform the local, state and national agriculture stakeholder community.

12. The task force shall develop and implement, as necessary, a federal advocacy strategy to communicate the efficiency, value and synergies of siting NBAF in Kansas.

13. The task force shall brief the Kansas Congressional Delegation on the importance of siting NBAF in Kansas.

14. The task force shall advocate the siting of NBAF in Kansas to the DHS.

15. The task force shall advocate for NBAF as a critical facility to address national bioterrorism and high-impact agricultural disease concerns.

16. The task force shall host any planned DHS site evaluation visit.

17. The task force shall take such other actions as may be necessary to better position Kansas to locate this unique facility.

18. Plans, reports, or recommendations of any nature adopted by the task force shall be considered advice to the Governor and legislature and shall not be construed as official policy, position or interpretation of laws or rules and regulations by the State Corporation Commission, the Department of Health and Environment, the Department of Agriculture, or the Department of Animal Health nor shall they be bound in any manner to consider any such advice when conducting their advisory and regulatory responsibilities.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 07-01 and shall become effective immediately.

Opinion No. 2007-01

Written January 17, 2007, to the Honorable Jerry D. Williams, State Representative, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter dated December 8, 2006, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the Campaign Finance Act (K.S.A. 25-4142 *et seq.*). We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction concerning your questions is limited to the application of K.S.A. 25-4142 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement:

We understand that you are asking for this opinion in your capacity as State Representative. Your question involves the use of campaign funds for the purchase of a vehicle. You state that you know of several members of the Kansas Legislature who have old vehicles that they use for activities such as parades, county fairs, chamber of commerce events, and other events.

Question:

May campaign funds be used to purchase a vehicle for a candidate or office holder to use in their activities in the district they represent?

Opinion:

K.S.A. 25-4157a, which limits the use of campaign funds, states in pertinent part as follows:

(a) No moneys received by any candidate or candidate committee of any candidate as a contribution under this act shall be used or be made available for the personal use of the candidate and no such moneys shall be used by such candidate or the candidate committee of such candidate except for:

- (1) Legitimate campaign purposes;
- (2) expenses of holding political office;

For the purpose of this subsection, expenditures for "personal use" shall include expenditures to defray normal living expenses for the candidate or the candidate's family and expenditures for the personal benefit of the candidate having no direct connection with or effect upon the campaign of the candidate or the holding of public office.

The response to your question depends on whether the purchase of a vehicle is for legitimate campaign purposes or whether the use of the vehicle is a legitimate expense of holding political office. The statute specifically prohibits expenditures of campaign funds for personal use. The expenditure must have a direct connection with or effect upon the campaign of the candidate or the holding of public office. All other expenditures are for personal use, and thus are prohibited.

In Opinion No. 1996-16, we addressed the question of using campaign funds to purchase computers, fax machines and cellular telephones. We concluded as follows:

While expenditures for these types of items may be necessary for campaign purposes or holding office, they also have the potential to be used for the personal benefit of the candidate. Therefore, the Commission advises all candidates and office holders to refrain from using any items, purchased with campaign funds, for his or her personal use. Items purchased entirely with campaign funds may not be used for personal use.

If a vehicle is not used for personal use, and is used exclusively for activities that have a direct connection with, or effect upon, the campaign of the candidate; or the vehicle is used solely for activities relating to the holding of public office, the vehicle could be purchased with campaign funds.

What constitutes a legitimate campaign expense or an expense of holding political office depends on the facts surrounding each expenditure. Whether the use of a vehicle by a candidate or office holder in a parade, county fair or other event is a legitimate campaign expense or an expense of holding office depends on the circumstances of the particular event. For example, in Opinion No. 1996-20, we stated that the cost of an entry fee for a parade is a legitimate campaign expenditure as long as the person was identified as an office holder or candidate in the parade. That opinion also concluded that the cost of a sign to be put on a car for a parade or for campaigning is a legitimate campaign expense as long as the sign identified the person as a candidate or office holder.

In summary, a vehicle to be used exclusively for legitimate campaign activities or for activities of holding political office may be purchased using campaign funds. Whether an activity is a legitimate campaign activity or an activity of holding political office under the Campaign Finance Act depends on the specific facts of the activity.

Opinion No. 2007-02

Written January 17, 2007, to Colene Fischli, Administrator, Kansas Parole Board, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter received by email on December 13, 2006, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Governmental Ethics Commission concerning the state level conflict of interest laws, K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We note at the outset that the Com-

mission's jurisdiction concerning your questions is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*, and whether some other statutory system, common law theory or agency rule or regulation applies to your inquiry is not covered by this opinion.

Factual Statement:

We understand that you are asking for this opinion in your capacity as Administrator of the Kansas Parole Board. You state that you will soon take over as the President of the Kansas Correctional Association (KCA), an affiliate of the American Correctional Association (ACA). You indicate that you are able to hold this position because of your employment in the corrections field. The membership of the KCA and ACA is open to anyone employed in the corrections or criminal justice field, including employees from local, state and federal levels of government as well as private sector employees. You indicate that as president you will be involved in planning conferences for the KCA. You will be visiting various hotels and cities to determine the best location for the conferences. You anticipate that hotels and convention and visitors' bureaus may offer gifts and meals to you and other KCA convention planners. You seek guidance on whether you may accept gifts or meals provided to you in your position as KCA president.

Question:

Is it a violation of state level conflict of interest laws for you to receive gifts and meals in your capacity as President of the Kansas Correctional Association?

Opinion:

K.S.A. 46-237a limits the receipt of gifts and meals by officers and employees of the executive branch of state government. That statute states in pertinent part:

(b) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept any gift, economic opportunity, loan, gratuity, special discount or service provided because of such person's official position. . . .

. . .

(c) No person subject to the provisions of this section shall solicit or accept free or special discount meals from a source outside state government, except:

. . .

(3) meals provided to a person subject to this act when it is obvious such meals are not being provided because of the person's official position . . . (Emphasis added.)

The Presidency of the KCA is not a state office, and, therefore, not subject to the state level conflict of interest laws, including K.S.A. 46-237a. Thus, any gifts or meals provided to you because of your position with the KCA are not being provided to you in your "official position" as a state officer or employee. It is not a violation of the state level conflict of interest laws for you to accept gifts and meals in your capacity as President of KCA.

Public Notice

Notification is hereby given to the public of the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) intent to reimburse local governments and state agencies for eligible costs incurred to repair publicly-owned facilities damaged as a result of severe storms that occurred from December 28, 2006 to December 31, 2006. The areas affected are: Cheyenne, Clark, Decatur, Edwards, Ellis, Finney, Ford, Gove, Graham, Grant, Gray, Greeley, Hamilton, Haskell, Hodgeman, Jewell, Kearny, Kiowa, Lane, Logan, Meade, Morton, Ness, Norton, Osborne, Pawnee, Phillips, Rawlins, Rooks, Rush, Russell, Scott, Seward, Sheridan, Sherman, Smith, Stanton, Stevens, Thomas, Trego, Wallace and Wichita counties in the state of Kansas. The President declared these areas a major disaster area on January 7, 2007.

Comanche and Stafford counties were declared eligible for category "B" (emergency response) damages only.

In addition, Cheyenne, Rawlins, Decatur, Sherman, Thomas, Wallace, Logan, Greely, Wichita, Stanton and Morton counties were declared eligible for Snow Removal Assistance under category "B."

Eligible applicants in each of these declared counties may apply for the repair and or replacement of disaster-damaged public facilities. Additionally, all counties in the state of Kansas may apply for Section 404 Hazard Mitigation Assistance.

This assistance is granted under the authority of Public Law 93-288, as amended the Disaster Relief Act of 1974. This notice concerns those facilities that are within the base or 1 percent chance floodplain (also known as the 100-year floodplain), or critical actions within the 500-year floodplain. These facilities may adversely affect the floodplain or they may be vulnerable to flooding damage if they are restored to pre-disaster condition. These facilities include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Non-emergency debris clearance.
2. Protective coastal facilities, including dams, reservoirs and channels, and their applicable non-emergency repair.
3. Public roads, including streets, culverts and bridges, and their applicable damage.
4. Water control facilities, pipes and distribution systems and their applicable damage.
5. Public utilities, including sewage treatment plants, sewers and electrical power distribution systems, and their applicable damage.
6. Private, nonprofit facilities (e.g. hospitals, educational centers, emergency and custodial care services, etc.), and their applicable damage.
7. Hazard mitigation projects designed and constructed to reduce the impact of future damage.

The President's Executive Order 11988 on Floodplain Management requires that all federal actions in or affecting the base floodplain be reviewed for opportunities to relocate out of the floodplain or to minimize future flooding damage. FEMA has determined that in certain situations there are normally no alternatives to restoring the

facility in the floodplain. These are situations that meet all of the following criteria:

1. Where the FEMA-estimated cost of repairs is less than 50 percent of the estimated replacement cost of the entire facility and is less than \$100,000.
2. When the facility is not located in a floodway or coastal high hazard area.
3. When the facility has not sustained structural damage in a previous Presidentially declared flooding major disaster or emergency.
4. When the facility is not a critical one (i.e., hospital, generating plant, contains dangerous materials, or emergency operation center, etc.).

FEMA intends to provide assistance for the restoration of facilities described above to their pre-disaster condition except where certain measures to mitigate the effects of future flooding may be incorporated into the restoration work. For example, insufficient waterway openings under culverts and bridges may cause water backup to wash out the structures. The water backup could spread and damage other facilities in the area. Increasing the size of the waterway opening would mitigate, or lessen, the potential for this damage. Other mitigation measures could include providing erosion protection at bridge abutments or levees and extending entrance tubes on sewage lift stations.

Facilities or projects that do not fall into one of the four criteria listed above are required to undergo more detailed review, including study of alternative locations. The public is invited to participate in identifying alternatives and analyzing their impact. Details on obtaining information on specific projects and responding with comments will be found at the end of this notice. Future notices like this one will explain the final determination on the restoration of these facilities.

An applicant may have already started restoration of a facility described in the above paragraph before the federal inspector visited the site due to the urgent need for use of the facility. Some of these facilities would normally fall into the category requiring examination of alternative sites. These facilities will be restored in their original location where at least one of the following situations applies:

1. The facility is functionally dependent on its floodplain location. Flood control facilities and bridges are examples.
2. The project facilitates an open space use. Facilities, which are part of a park or other open space use, are examples. This type of use represents sound floodplain management and, therefore, there is no need to change it.
3. The facilities, such as roads and utilities, are an integral part of a larger network, which would be uneconomical to relocate.

The effects of not restoring these facilities were examined and, in each case, there was an overriding public need for the facility that clearly outweighed the Executive Order's requirements to avoid the floodplain and made non-floodplain sites impractical. FEMA consulted state and local officials to make certain that no actions taken will violate either state or local floodplain protection stan-

dards. The restoration of these facilities also will incorporate certain measures designed to mitigate the effects of future flooding. This will be the only notice to the public concerning these facilities.

Hazard mitigation projects may involve construction of a new facility, such as a detention pond or a debris dam, modification of an existing undamaged facility (such as improving waterway openings of bridges or culverts), relocation of facilities out of the floodplain that may require demolition of remaining structures or other projects designed to limit damage from future floods. Subsequent notices will provide more specific information as project proposals are developed.

Following is a summary of the proposed amendments:

K.A.R. 28-16-28g is the classification and use designation section of the Kansas Surface Water Quality Standards. Designated uses of surface waters are listed in the Kansas Surface Water Register, which is adopted by reference in K.A.R. 28-16-28g. The register identifies major classified streams, lakes and wetlands and the uses that are existing or attainable. In the period of April 1 through October 31, 2005, 560 stream segments and 140 lakes/wetlands were evaluated by a UAA to determine the appropriate use designation. Eighty stream segments are proposed for deletion from the Kansas Surface Water Register (removed from classification), 352 stream segments are proposed as secondary contact recreation, and 111 stream segments are proposed as primary contact recreation. One stream segment is proposed for restricted aquatic life and 17 stream segments have been rerouted and combined to form one segment. Forty-four lakes and wetlands are proposed for primary contact recreation and food procurement, and 96 lakes and wetlands are proposed for irrigation, livestock watering, domestic water supply, industrial water supply and groundwater recharge.

There are no additional costs of compliance resulting from these changes in recreational use designations. The department estimates an annual cost to perform 500 recreational UAAs as required by K.S.A. 82a-2004 and amendments thereto to be \$200,000 per year. Currently, this cost is funded by the State Water Plan and state general fund.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a 60-day public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulatory action. Comments should be submitted to Craig Thompson, KDHE,

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has received a permit modification request to expand the Holcomb Common Facilities, LLC industrial landfill, currently operating under KDHE Permit 420. The landfill is located at 2440 Holcomb Lane, Holcomb, in Sections 20 and 29, Township 24 South, Range 33 West. The application indicates that Holcomb Common Facilities proposes to expand landfill operations from the existing 115-acre disposal area to a 188-acre disposal area within a 292-acre tract totally surrounded by several thousand acres containing the Holcomb Station power plant. The proposed expansion will add approximately 12.2 million additional cubic yards of disposal capacity. The landfill would receive combustion wastes from the existing power generating unit and any additional units that may be constructed. Ownership of the landfill was transferred from Sunflower Electrical Cooperative to Holcomb Common Facilities on June 23, 2006.

The Finney County Commission and the Finney County Planning and Community Development Department have certified that the application described herein is consistent with the county's solid waste management plan and local land use restrictions or zoning. KDHE has reviewed the application and found it to be in conformance with state solid waste statutes and regulations.

KDHE is providing public notice of its intent to approve the proposed Holcomb Common Facilities, LLC landfill expansion. However, a final decision to approve

the expansion has not been made, and KDHE will consider information gathered during the public comment period before making a final decision.

After consideration of all the comments received during the public notice period and hearing, KDHE will make a final decision on whether to issue the permit modification. (b) The price of pull tab tickets sold by a retailer for this game shall be \$1.00 each.

(c) Approximately 1,200,000 tickets shall be ordered initially for this pull tab game which shall be packaged in packs of 300 tickets each. The ticket numbers in each pack in this game shall start with 000 and end with 299. Additional ticket orders shall have the same prize structure, the same number of prizes per pool of 300,000 tickets, and the same odds as were contained in the initial ticket order.
